Opening Day draws over 1,900 anglers

To celebrate his 93rd birthday, Leo Steinbrecher, longtime Roaring River fisherman and volunteer, shot the ceremonial gun to signify the beginning of Roaring River's Opening Day of trout season.

This year, the hatchery at Roaring River stocked the waters with 8,000 trout raised on site. Many fishermen caught their limit in the wee hours of the morning. The frenzy of fish flopping up on the shore and into nets was unavoidable for passers-by.

Paul Spurgeon, hatchery manager, said that the waters were stocked based on the number of tags they anticipated would be sold. This year, they expected to sell 2,600 tags, but the day topped out at only 1,974 sold.

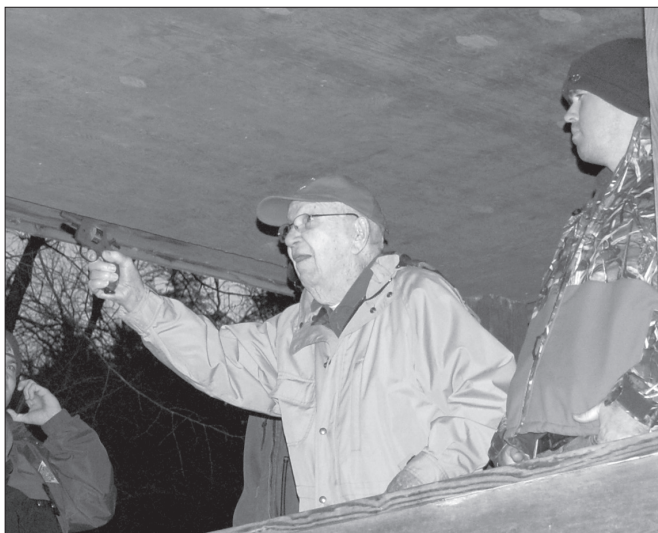
Spurgeon stated, "We figure that the weather on Sun-

day limited a lot of people from out of state." The last opening day that fell on a Saturday was in 2008, and the park sold 2,923 tags. Saturday opening days before that brought 2,276 tags in 2003 and 3,171 tags 1997. This year, Sunday saw right around 200 tags sold since the weather turned wintry.

Opening day itself had nice weather for anglers to cast their lines in. Last year, the snow didn't wait for after Opening Day, so that was a welcome difference this year.

The Cassville Area Chamber of Commerce was on site, passing out hot coffee in complementary mugs, and park staff had barrels lit with fires to keep everyone warmed up. At 6:30 a.m., the temperature was in the mid-30s, warming up as the day went on.

Cassville man arrested on child porn charges

A man from Cassville was charged in federal court Monday, March 3, with receiving and distributing child pornography after he allegedly left inappropriate images on a smart-television he had rented in Monett.

Barry County Deputy Brian Martin, who is a member of Southwest Missouri Cyber Crimes Task Force, stated in court papers that a Monett police detective contacted him last December after a rental store customer notified them that the television they had rented had hundreds of images of an adult male performing sexual acts on a baby girl between 12 to 18 months-old. "The set had been rent-

ed two times prior to this placement," court documents state.

Martin said he was "familiar" with Matthew Paul Casas, 25, one of the previous renters.

"I reviewed the images and noted them to have been created by a Kodak Easy Share camera," Martin says the majority of the pornographic images found on the television were "home-made" and not pulled off the internet.

On February 14, 2014, officers received three cyber tips from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children that a person was posting images

Letter to the Editor...

Trout Day in Barry County has come and gone once again, and as always, it was a mixed bag of early cold morning temps, river coffee, seasoned anglers vying for their favorite spot, novice anglers looking for a spot, lunker tales from years past, kids bundled up in coveralls and boots, and excitement for all that stand on the riverbank and anticipate what is about to transpire. And all this even before the pistol shot that is the signature of the start of another trout season at Roaring River State Park.

As a native of Barry County, I learned at a young age about March 1st and the role it played for many of its residents. My maiden voyage as a trout angler on Opening Day was when I was thirteen years old. I had always wanted to go but never got the chance to until I mentioned it to an old friend of mine, Travis Hilburn. Travis invited me to join him and his dad Wayne, on March 1st, 1986. I spent the night at the Hilburn residence, and early the next morning, Wayne introduced the wonder of Velveeta Cheese squished onto a small treble hook to me (in the live bait area) and how effective it was at catching trout. I was hooked. Addicted to trout fishing to the point where a couple of years later, I begged Jack Nickols (the Concessionaire at that time) for a job at the park. Thanks Wayne for taking me fishing, and thanks Jack for hiring me.

I have attended many Opening Days since then; I have only missed three or four due to work or college. In recent years, I have been taking my son and assisting him as only a patient impatient father can do. But, as he is growing a little older, and able to handle the rod and reel, lures, fish, cold weather, getting tangled up, stringer, etc. I have a little more time to take in my surroundings and observe what's going on around me. This year was probably my third favorite

opening day. (Third only to my first one in '86, and my son's first one '10.)

On Trout Day 2014, I was really impressed with how this year's season opener went. The park was in great condition, there were a lot of good sized fish, I looked around and people were catching fish, the river was perfect, and parking was handled efficiently. Kudos to the staff of Missouri Department of Conservation, the staff at Roaring River State Park and to the volunteers that wandered up and down the river serving coffee and welcoming strangers to the park. I sure hope that the residents of Barry County realize what a great natural resource we have in Roaring River State Park, and I encourage them to make a few trips to the park each year to remind themselves how important it is to take time to enjoy our State Park.

Cassville PD to participate in Youth Seat Belt Enforcement

The Cassville Police Department announced they are joining forces with statewide law enforcement from March 15 to March 31, 2014, for an aggressive youth seat belt mobilization to crack down on Missouri's seat belt law violators and to reduce highway fatalities.

Only 67 percent of Missouri's teens wear their seat belts when driving or riding in a motor vehicle. Eight out of ten teens killed in traffic crashes are unbuckled.

Under the Graduated Driver's License (GDL) law, teens are required to wear their seat belt as it's a primary offense, meaning they can be pulled over solely for not wearing their seat belt.

"Local motorists should be prepared for stepped up seat belt enforcement," said Chief of Police Dana Kam-

merlohr. "We'll be out there to remind you seat belts can, and do, save lives,"

Seat belt use is the single most effective way to protect people and reduce fatalities in motor vehicle crashes.

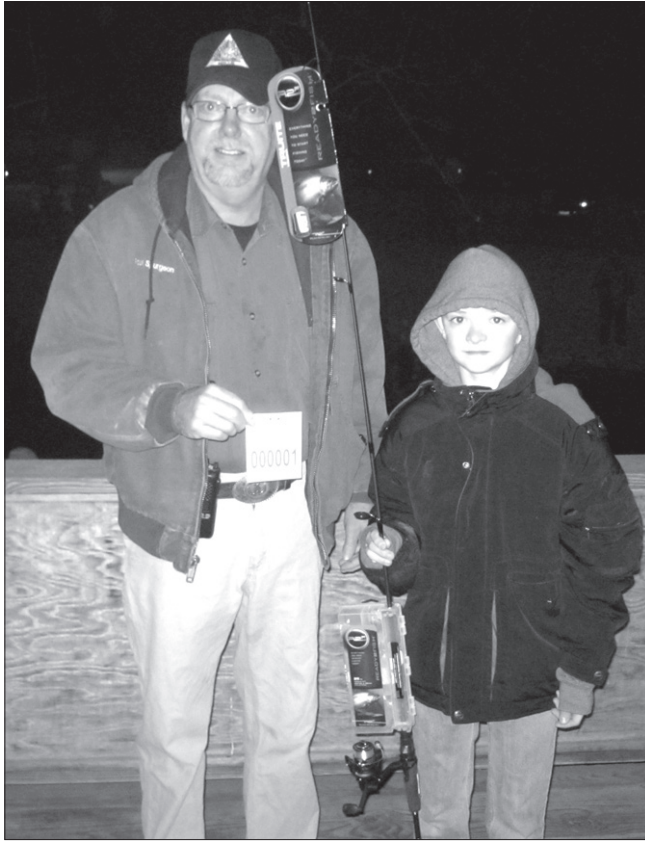

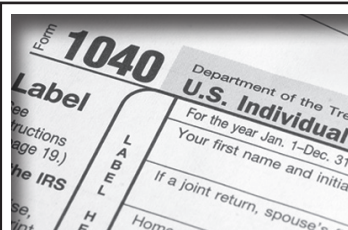

Gardening group to begin in March

In Barry County, it isn't unusual to have a backyard garden. For many, small plots are a learned way of life. It is communities like those in Barry County where agriculture and self-sufficiency are treasured, not something forgotten and recently rediscovered like in larger cities. The resurgence of self-sufficiency through gardening is an important element to gardeners wanting to spread their knowledge.

Growing up, Kenny Redmon was equipped with the know-how to raise a garden. However, the work was met with disdain. He never thought that he would be a Master Gardener one day or help form a group of like-minded garden people for talks of the trade. However, beginning this month, Redmon, along with his friend Charlie Phaneuf and other local horticulturists, will get together to take on discussion topics and projects in the area.

Redmon and Phaneuf recently graduated as Master Gardeners in December 2013. A big part of being a Master Gardener is volunteering to educate others and also complete projects. Master Gardeners are educated through the University of Missouri Extension Offices.

Redmon and Phaneuf
will begin their new group,

“Front Porch Conversations with Garden People” on March 13 at the Cassville Branch Library.

For Redmon, gardening was always a way of life growing up, but not one that he appreciated until later in life. He stated, "My gardening experiences growing up were not a pleasing memory. Growing up in and around the garden was skewed to unwanted and unnecessary work."

Fast forward a few years, Redmon's perspective changed drastically. A trip to the grocery store for an integral ingredient for a BLT altered his thinking about all that he had learned on those hot days pulling weeds in his family's garden.

When Redmon approached the cashier with a single red tomato in 2006, his total came with sticker shock. He said, “My one needed tomato weighed exactly one pound and came to \$2.10. I looked at the cashier, of course not her fault, and said, ‘Tomatoes are way too easy to grow. You know this will taste bland and similar to red-colored cardboard.’ She just politely smiled and said, ‘Enjoy it. You paid for it.’ That was my epiphany moment.”

From that moment on, Redmon had a garden. Over the years, he expanded his garden to grow hundreds' of dollars worth of fruits,

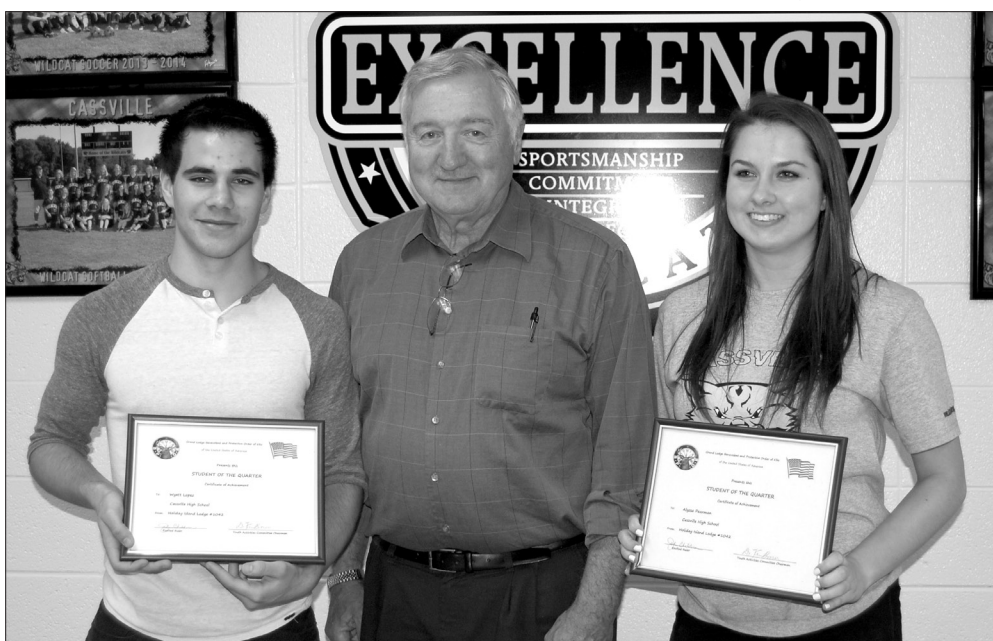
vegetables and herbs for his family. After the Master Gardeners class opportunity, his perspective is much more service-oriented, and he hopes to spread that knowledge to others.

"If you asked me at any time in my life [about me being a gardener], it's not anything that I thought I would grow up to do. However, now growing food and eating from our garden all year round has become an inseparable and vital part of our healthier lifestyle."

Phaneuf is also looking forward to the classes. He stated, "I love to learn and share with anyone, especially about farming and gardening. I, along with my family, own and operate Phaneufs' Permaculture Farm near Bates Corner where we are developing an ecological farming system. I know that the classes we have coming up will influence our plans here on our farms and help increase our fields."

The first meeting of Front Porch Conversations with Garden People will be on Thursday, March 13, at 7 p.m. in the lower part of the Cassville Branch Library. The first meeting is called Getting Started and Doing It Better. The meeting will feature John Hobbs, of the McDonald County Missouri Extension Office, on soil, soil testing and composting. The group plans to meet monthly either at the library or the front porch of the Bayless-Salyer House on Townsend Street.

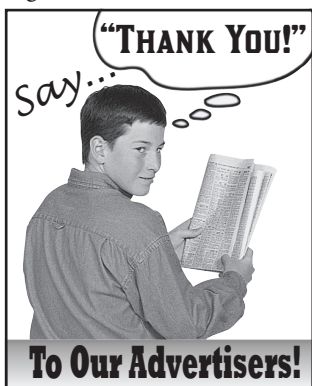
Seligman hosts Open Mic Night

Cassville Habitat begins fourth housing project

Habitat For Humanity has started a new housing project in Cassville to be finished this year. This is the fourth house that the organization has built in the Barry County area since it was incorporated in February of 2002.

Many community members are qualified for a Habitat house, however, the guidelines for one are not well-known. To get a Habitat home, residents fill out an application that goes to the family selection committee. A person may qualify by three criteria: by need, based on currently living in sub-standard housing; by ability, as houses are not free and occupants are required to make payments; and willingness to partner, by spending 150 hours of sweat-labor on the house and trying to recruit 150 hours from family and friends, as well.

While Habitat homes require payments, Habitat for Humanity will hold a first mortgage with no interest and a second silent mortgage to prevent predatory lending.

If a person is approved for a house, the committee goes over a list of expectations for a family, ask them to sign a contract, and then they can start working on their home or a current home until their's begins the building process. If a person signs up for a Habitat house, they are actually buying it, not renting.

The Habitat homes are built by need-base, but Nora Young, with the local Habitat for Humanity, says there is always a need in the community. "Absolutely. There is a need for Habitat. A third of the people who live in this country live at the poverty level. Statistics show a majority of kids in Habitat homes have gotten better grades in

school and have gone on to college," stated Young.

The Habitat store also helps future housing projects a great deal. It helps lessen the burden of expenses. The donations to the Habitat Restore are the biggest way the organization raises funds to build with. "We accept donations, but they have been down this past year. So, we rely heavily on the income of the Restore," stated Young.

To donate toward the building of Habitat houses in the community, people can

of child pornography to on-line social media accounts. All of the images depicted children, from infancy to 10 years old, engaged in sexual poses or involved in sexual acts with an adult or each other.

On February 21, 2014, Martin received another tip from the NCMEC about a Flickr account that had been closed after 130 images of child pornography was posted there. "Several of the images from the TV were identical, or depicted other sex acts between the infant and adult male, with the images posted online."

An IP address led officers to 501 West 11th Street. Cops say that is where Matthew Casas lived with his father, who is a registered sex offender.

When a search warrant was executed on February 28th, Matthew Casas allegedly told investigators that a co-worker had given him the child pornography that

he posted on at least three Facebook accounts and the Flickr account.

"Casas did admit there were thousands of images on the SD card, as well as hundreds of child pornographic movies."

Casas' estranged wife told detectives that part of the reason she left her husband was her discovery of child porn on his phone—which he told her he was selling. "She also advised that just before leaving him, when they were involved in sexual activity, she believed he was watching his daughter (court docs say later she is not his biological daughter) in a crib and he became more aroused by watching the child than her." She told investigators that she is afraid of Casas because he had been violent with her in the past and he has "threatened to harm her and other family members since she won't let him see her daughter."

Martin says they have not yet identified the baby being abused in the pictures taken with a Kodak Easy Share camera, but that the twenty five year-old man was in possession of the same make camera. "There is great concern that Casas could be the male depicted sexually abusing the child."

Casas has been convicted of four misdemeanor assaults and endangering the welfare of a child in the last five years.

The latest statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration underscore the serious nature of the nation's continuing drunk driving epidemic.

"Every year, about one third of all motor vehicle traffic deaths involve one or more impaired drivers or motorcycle operators," said Cpl. Donald Privett. "In 2013, 218 people were killed and 666 seriously injured on Missouri's roadways in accident that involved at least one substance-impaired driver."

Cpl. Privett added the St. Patrick's Day holiday is particularly dangerous. During the St. Patrick's Day holiday in 2013, 412 DWI arrests were made statewide.

Research has shown that high-visibility enforcement like the "Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over" campaign reduces drunk driving fatalities by as much as 20 percent. "By joining this nationwide effort we will make Cassville's roadways safer for everyone throughout the holiday," said Chief of Police Dana Kammerlohr.

"We want to remind everyone that getting behind the wheel drunk is a terrible idea. Unfortunately, not only does drinking impair your

ability to operate a safely, it also impairs your judgment and good sense about whether you can or should drive. If you have any doubt about your sobriety, do not get behind the wheel. If you do choose to drive impaired, you will be arrested. No warnings. No excuses," Chief Kammerlohr said.

Cpl. Privett noted that being arrested for driving drunk brings a wide range of negative consequences into one's life. Drunk drivers face jail time, loss of their driver license and steep financial consequences such as higher insurance rates, attorney fees, court costs, lost time at work and the potential loss of job. When family, friends and co-workers find out, violators also often face tremendous personal embarrassment.

"Driving drunk is simply not worth the risk. So don't take the chance. Remember, we will be out in force and we will be watching, so 'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over,' said Cpl. Privett.

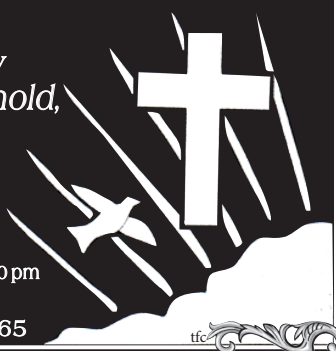

Barry County receives Permanency Award

On behalf of the 39th Judicial Circuit, Presiding Judge Jack Goodman accepted the Permanency Award, presented by Supreme Court Chief Justice Mary R. Russell, during a special ceremony at the Judicial Leadership Summit in Lake Ozark. This is the third time the 39th Circuit, which includes Barry, Lawrence and Stone counties, has received the Permanency Award.

The Permanency Award is given to circuits for successfully holding timely hearings during fiscal 2013 in child abuse and neglect cases in which children removed from their homes are to be reunited with their families or are to be placed in another permanent home as soon as possible.

"Timely hearings are always important to the effective administration of justice," Supreme Court of Missouri Chief Justice Mary R. Russell said. "When children are removed from their homes, that importance becomes even greater to determine whether it is safe to return those children to their biological parents or place them in other permanent homes. Those circuits which exert the extra effort necessary to ensure timely hearings in these cases should be recognized for their achievements."

"The success this circuit

has achieved is a testament to the leadership and hard work of judges, juvenile officers, clerks, children's division workers and other support staff," Russell said. "In the seven years since we have instituted the awards, the timeliness of hearings throughout the state has increased. Of the more than 43,000 required hearings, 98 percent of them were held on time. This is an increase of six percent from 2006, when we instituted the award."

The hearing time frames apply to six types of hearings and vary depending on the type of hearing. For example, when a child is taken into protective custody, an initial hearing must be held within three business days, the allegations must be proven within 60 days, and a disposition entered within 90 days. If the child remains in protective custody, the court must hold periodic reviews until the child is reunited with its natural parents, is adopted or another permanent place-

ment is made. These time frames were developed based on recommendations from the Commission on Children's Justice.

In evaluating what circuits qualify for the permanency awards, the circuits first were placed in size classes based on the total number of hearings that were due to be held during a particular time period. A circuit then had to achieve either 100 percent timeliness each quarter or an average of 100 percent annually to qualify. The 39th Circuit is one of 16 judicial circuits to receive the award this year.
