City of Cassville begins transportation tax push

Cassville's City Council discussed plans to begin educating the public on the proposed 3/8 cent transportation tax that will come up on April's ballot. Public Works Director Steve Walensky plans to put up a presentation on the importance of the tax to the streets of the city by next week.

The proposed transportation tax was originally met with some hesitancy among the Council members, but in the end they voted to have the issue placed on the ballot.

According to Walensky, the 2014 budget for the street department is \$123,852 from the General Fund. However, those funds are dedicated to salaries, street lighting, right of way maintenance and fuel, rock and snow removal. The only funding that actually goes to transportation is \$118,300 from a CART tax,

but that funding is limited when looking at the bigger picture of how much it costs to resurface and repair roads.

At Monday's meeting, Cassville Mayor Bill Shiveley stated, "We want people to understand what this means when they go to the store. It's only 19 cents on a \$50 purchase or 38 cents on \$100."

The City of Cassville has approximately 68 miles of roads. With the current budget, Walensky calculated that it would take over 100 years to resurface or repair all of it. With the 3/8 cent tax, the City would generate approximately \$300,000 per year to dedicate to roads, changing the time frame to around 24 years to overlay all of them.

Walensky plans on putting all of the information about the proposed tax on the City's website next week. The website is http://www.cityofcassville.com.

This left substantial injuries, including two broken legs which were fixed with rods, three cracked vertebras, and four broken ribs.

Townsend was air lifted to Cox South Hospital in Springfield where he was treated for his numerous injuries. He then attended Myers Orthopedic Rehab Center to slowly recover and gain mobility. "The hospital and rehab center both made

me feel very comfortable. I'm still using my walker, and I don't walk much, but it was still a huge help," stated Townsend.

Keith and Missy Hendrix were the main founders of the benefit for Townsend. The event consisted of chilli bowls for \$5 with an optional donation. An auction was held with the help of many local businesses and area individuals. One big contributor for the event was a set of pick up tires from Mike Ball of Ball and Prier Tire. Also, Eggleston Pawn Shop in Seligman donated a Henley 22 Rifle from Terry Burgess. There were also live music

Barry County tax revenue down for February

Barry County's sales tax revenue was down slightly for the month of February when compared to figures from 2013. The general local sales tax revenue brought in \$139,299.59, 2.64 percent less than 2013. Both figures are significantly less than two years prior when the county received \$174,954.36. Overall, the collected revenue in February was \$4,620.37 less than the same month in 2013.

However, the new sales tax generated an additional \$33,437.89 for the county, making the overall taxes collected on the recent sales tax addition \$99,197.15 for the

year. The taxes collected on the 1/8 cent initiative began in October, and totals have been hovering around \$30,000 to \$33,000 each

The City of Cassville's sales tax revenue was up marginally for the month of February by 0.6 percent. The City received \$30,795.71 for the month of February, a slight increase over the \$30,617.67 from 2013.

The City is still down 0.1 percent in sales tax revenue for the year. Barry County's tax revenue is up 3.16 percent for the year, even with the dip in February's sales tax collected.

Cassville to participate in March Against Child Abuse

In honor of April being National Child Abuse Prevention Month, residents in the Cassville area will join others from over 100 people across the United States for the Million March Against Child Abuse (MACA).

This is the second year for the march to take place in an attempt to raise awareness to child abuse issues across the county and encourage lawmakers to make sentences more harsh for violent child offenders. However, this will be the first time for Cassville residents to take part locally.

MACA will take place on April 5 across the U.S. with the local participants meeting in the Barry County Judicial Center parking lot. The march is set to last from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. with various keynote speakers, including State Senator David Sater.

According to statistics provided by MACA, nearly 3 million child abuse cases are reported each year, but experts believe that an estimated 6 million go unreported.

The goal of the organization is to bring attention to the issues of child abuse, child sex trafficking and crimes against children through peaceful demonstrations of the public, organizations, associations and agencies that have a vested interest in children.





Crowder to offer CNA classes through grant

Those interested in the program must have already applied to attend Crowder and paid the application fee. No compass testing is required unless students are being accepted under the low skill level option and do not have proof of ACT scores.

"It's always great to be able to help out the community members that need assistance," stated Kim Patrick of Crowder College Cassville. The class will have a maximum size of 15 students, however there are still plenty of spaces available.

Blunt, McCaskill fight to save TRL parks

Following the disappointing news that the Viney Creek Park on Table Rock Lake is closing this year, Missouri Senators Roy Blunt and Claire McCaskill are cosponsoring a bill that would allow user fees collected to be kept on-site.

The United States Army Corps of Engineers announced that Viney Creek, the Table Rock access just north of Golden, will not be reopening in spring 2014 as originally planned. Laurie Driver, public affairs specialist with the Corps, stated, "It's the least visited park on Table Rock, and the recreations budget was cut by half a million dollars this year."

Viney Creek's main visitors are people who live in the area instead of those vacationing from farther away. That affects the numbers as Viney is the least visited of the 14 parks on the lake.

In 2013, Viney Creek had 14,304 visitors. Compared to Eagle Rock's 115,283 visitors and \$49,000 operating fund, it's clear why it was chosen over other parks run by the Corps. The operating budget for Viney Creek last year was \$43,852.69, but that total does not include federal employees' wages.

Viney Creek took in \$30,000, but that money is not kept on site. It is sent directly to the U.S. Treasury. If the bill sponsored by the Missouri Senators passes, that will change. Any money collected would be able to mas season in Cassville kicks stay at the park and be used for maintenance and opera-

Driver stated, "We look at what the park offers and how many people visit, not just how profitable it is to make a decision. The site was the best choice."

Viney Creek does not have a marina, which may affect its draw for tourists. However, the park does have electricity and water equipped campsites, showers, a swimming beach, a boat launch ramp and more.

Another option that would keep the park open would be if a private entity chose to lease the site. "A municipal or non-profit could lease the park, but no one has stepped forward so far. We always give that option if a group in the area is interested in keeping it open," Driver

Regarding the proposed legislation, Sen. Blunt stated, "As I've told the Corps during our previous meetings and discussions, area residents and businesses deserve a solution, and they need it now. This bill will help alleviate the continued uncertainty and ensure that Table Rock Lake stays opened for the families and businesses that live, work and vacation there."

Odds are, this year, May 1 will come and go without Viney Creek's contribution to camping and lake season unless something drastic chang-

Donations needed to keep Christmas lights glowing

Each year, the Christoff with the hanging of the Christmas lights in the downtown area. Those Christmas lights give Cassville the homey-holiday feeling that many in the community enjoy, but rarely take the time to think about who is responsible for keeping them up and running each year.

Commerce Bank of Cassville kicked off the fundraising campaign with a \$500 contribution to the effort. Mike McCracken, bank president and P.A.C.E board member, stated, "Commerce Bank is a huge supporter of the Cassville Area Chamber of Commerce. When the Chamber agreed to take on the Christmas Light Project in our city, we agreed to donate to the project as needed to maintain the quality of the event. It is a project the area seems to enjoy, and we very much enjoy helping."

The groups are hoping to raise around \$3,000 to cover the \$2,000 estimated repairs for this year and a bit extra to help cover expenses in the next few years.

Artherton stated, "We are confident that [the \$3,000] will more than cover the repairs this year. However, we would like to have a little wiggle room in this account to so it is easy for us to make small purchases as necessary in years to come."

Part of the additional ex-

penses this year come from light bulbs being stolen from buildings. Normally, the costs are the supplies to fasten the lights to the buildings and replacement bulbs.

The Oak Hill Cemetery nativity scene also needs old wiring replaced. Artherton stated, "We have just 'made do' with the repairs that need to be made on the nativity scene, and we would like to use this opportunity to fix it right so it will continue to last."

The Chamber is accepting donations to help maintain and repair the lights. Checks should be made payable to P.A.C.E. to be considered taxdeductible. Any donations beyond what is needed for repairs this year will remain in the project account and will be used for the lights in the future.

Prime businesses can crop up in old poultry houses

Driving around the countryside in Barry County and other parts of southwestern Missouri will take you by many abandoned chicken houses. One man in the county sees those houses as a prime opportunity. He hopes to encourage owners no longer in the poultry trade to convert the houses into combination greenhouses/fish growing tanks for an organic, profitable and sustainable business opportunity.

The poultry business, with factors like rising feed and propane costs, can be volatile at times, leading some farmers to give up on the venture, especially when renovations are needed on the housing units. According to Larry

Willis, owner of Long Point Systems and Willis Heating, empty houses have a lot of potential. He stated, "Those old houses make expensive storage sheds, and 90 percent of them are still in good shape structurally."

He went on to say, "Most of them also still have backup generators, access to good water and decent roads leading to them. Plus, 90 percent of them have people who have worked their tails off their entire lives and would do well with taking care of them for something else."

Willis's system puts two large concrete tilapia tanks at one end of the chicken house, then the rest of the house is filled with raised bed gardens that act as a filtration system for the fish tanks.

The whole water system is a closed-loop system, which means that as dirty water is pumped out of the fish tank, it is used to water the growing plants. The water then trickles down through 12-18 inches of fill sand, then another 6 inches of 1/2" gravel where it is then pumped back into the fish tanks.

According to Willis, the system allows the fish and the produce in the beds both an optimal, organic environment to grow in symbiotically. Willis is no stranger to gardening or raising fish. He was first certified as an or-



Each 400 foot by 40 foot house has the capacity to raise 80,000 tilapia and grow huge amounts of produce every eight months. Tilapia are raised in 5,000 count lots in two separate 40,000 gallon concrete tanks. Each month, the farmer will start another 5,000 tilapia, with each batch separated by dividers in the tank. Within eight months,

Willis said the fish are ready to harvest 5,000-10,000 at a time, bringing \$3 per pound.

Willis stated, "I've spent 20 years working on this. It's a great opportunity because anything you stick in those garden plots will grow. I've even raised fig trees in them."

Each conversion will provide heat, stabilize the carbon dioxide and regulate everything on both the tanks and garden sides of the house.

With some interest in the program, Willis hopes to gain a community of farmers to supply fish and vegetables

Changes in water billing Community steps up to rebuild Bluebird Trail to save City from losses

At the monthly Cassville City Council meeting on Monday, March 10, changes were approved in the way the City's water and sewer billing is handled when a customer has a leak.

Currently, if a customer has a water leak that results in excess usage, their bill is recalculated by averaging the previous three months' bills. However, that can cause significant financial losses to the City when a large amount of water is lost in a leak.

At the meeting, Cassville Mayor Bill Shiveley stated, "The City pays to pump the water no matter what. If it doesn't go through the sewer system, we don't have that expense, but even if clean water goes into the sewer, it gets contaminated, and we still have that expense to process that."

The new policy will be dependent on how the leak occurs. If a customer has a leak that flows back into the sewer system, the customer will be billed the full amount for both the water and sewer. However, if the customer's leak doesn't end up going through the City sewer system, their previous three months' bills will be averaged to determine their usage sewer while they will pay the full amount for water. According to Steve Walensky, Public Works Director, that is the best way to deal with billing issues when leaks happen for both the City and the customers.

Walensky stated, "This way of handling the leaks and billing is more in line with industry standards. I've talked to other cities like Republic and Mount Vernon, and this new proposal is in

line with best industry prac-

The City's Public Works employees already have methods in place to help a customer detect early leaks to prevent exorbitant bills. According to Walensky, if a meter reader notices an unusual reading, they will leave a flier on the customer's door alerting them to a possible issue. Each month before billing, the department also generates a report that uses parameters to look for high usage among customers.

Walensky stated, "This is more common sense. It allows the customer to be billed and for us to work with them on the issue."

The City of Cassville has been working to eliminate water loss through new meters and making repairs to the water lines. At one point, the City's water loss was over 60 percent. For last month, the water loss was 28 percent, a huge decrease thanks to new meters and repairs. The City is still waiting for 45 meters to be delivered from the factory to finish replacements.

Walensky stated, "Our goal is very aggressive. We are trying to attain 10 percent water, which is lower than anywhere has been able to achieve that I know of. The standard seems to be in 20s percentages."

Water loss is determined by the amount of water the City pumps versus the amount that is billed each month to its customers. Walensky stated, "We received a 90/10 grant from DNR to develop a water hydraulic study which will assist us in determining what areas of the system will need to addressed for water loss."



On the heels of winter, the Beeson family has started running their bluebird trail and rehanging the boxes that were vandalized last summer. 

Fitzpatrick moves forward with SWEPCO bill

District Representative Scott Fitzpatrick presented his bills regarding Southwestern Electric Power Company (SWEPCO) the House Utilities Committee on Wednesday, March 5, at 8 a.m. in the Missouri State Capitol. The hearing covered two bills sponsored by Fitzpatrick that, if passed, would make it more difficult for the transmission project to move forward.

The bill with which Fitzpatrick is attempting to proceed is HB 1774, which would restrict the ability of SWEPCO to utilize eminent domain in order to acquire property from landowners along the proposed route. If that bill were to pass, SWEPCO would be required to negotiate with individual property owners, without the threat of eminent domain being utilized against the property owners.

"HB 1774 seems to be the more palatable option, as opposed to HB 1622, because several members of the committee were concerned with removing the jurisdiction of the PSC to make decisions regarding the project," stated Fitzpatrick. "Under HB 1774, the PSC would still have the ability to make a decision on the project, but it would protect property owners in the event the PSC approved the project."

According to Fitzpatrick, the bill is an unprecedented solution to an unprecedented problem, because he has not found another example of a project that has occurred which began and ended in a single state outside of Missouri but traversed Missouri in its path. Additionally, there is no substation being built in Missouri, and no Missouri companies are tying into the line, which Fitzpatrick argues, shows that there is no benefit to Missouri residents. The argument the proponents of the project made at the hearing was that this is an issue of the reliability of the electric grid, and that if the lights go out in northwest Arkansas, they will go out in southwest Missouri, too.

"If we allow this project to proceed as proposed under the guise of grid reliability, we are setting an incredibly low bar with regard to how we define a "benefit" to the state of Missouri," stated Fitzpatrick.

Senator David Sater has filed an identical bill in the Senate, which should receive a hearing in the next couple of weeks, according to Fitz-

To this point, there has been no action taken by SWEPCO to move forward with the project in Missouri. The power company has not filed the necessary paper-

work to begin the approval process with the Missouri Public Service Commission, which would be the first step in the process.

"Once Senator Sater has a hearing on his bill, we will try to discern what the next steps are and identify a plan to see if we can move forward or not," stated Fitzpat-

BC E-911 offers storm shelter registration

Thanks to efforts by the Barry County Emergency Services and local firefighters, Barry County residents will now be safer in the case of serious tornados. The groups are circulating storm shelter registrations to ensure that emergency services personnel know where to find people in the event of a major storm.

The registration form allows anyone with a storm shelter to describe the nature and whereabouts of it on their property so that if the entrance is covered by debris from the storm, search and rescue workers can find it quickly and get the people inside out.

Mike Phillips, Executive Director of the Barry County Emergency Services, stated, "If we ever have a major tornado, we want people to utilize the shelters they have,

but we also want to know where to look for people if we send out search parties." Phillips assures that the information is confidential and will not be shared with any outside parties.

He said, "It is strictly for emergencies, not anything else. All of our information is only available through dispatch."

The storm shelter information forms are strictly voluntary but offer an additional safety measure for anyone wanting to have their shelter mapped. When the forms are received, the shelter will be mapped digitally and available should the need arise.

Phillips continued, "We don't want someone trapped for three or four days because we sent someone out and they didn't know where to look."

The United States Department of Agriculture, Farm service Agency, (FSA) has prepared a Final Environmental Assessment (EA) to evaluate the environmental consequences associated with implementing Poultry Construction by Goostree Poultry Inc., McDonald County, Missouri.

The purpose of the project is to expand a poultry broiler operation by adding two broiler houses on approximately 142 acres owned by Gary and Sarah Goostree, (entity members), operating as Goostree Poultry Inc.

PROPOSED ACTION

After construction the total capacity of this expanded operation would be approximately 290,000 broiler chickens. Alternatives analyzed in this EA include a review of different sites to see if they have any less of an environmental impact. The site was determined to be the best location of the expansion.

ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACTS

It has been determined that no negative environmental impacts will occur because of this action.
