Frazier Glenn Cross has long been a controversial figure in southwest Missouri. He blanketed southwest Missouri in the 2000's with a newspaper he operated that spewed hate filled rants against Jews and people of color.

Cross was also known as Glenn Miller to many due to a name change as being part of the Witness Protection Program since the 1990s, according to court documents.

Cross/Miller, who lives between Aurora and Marionville, is the former head of the KKK and is known throughout the Ozarks as Glenn Miller. He faces three counts of murder after he allegedly opened fire at the Jewish Community Center and a Jewish run assisted living center near Kansas City on the eve of Passover.

It appears federal murder charges will be filed against the 73 year-old man as federal prosecutors say they are pursuing the matter as a religiously motivated "hate crime."

Those charges would apply if the murders Cross/ Miller is accused of were motivated by the victims' "race, color, religion or national origin."

The Jewish Community Center was a hub of activity

on Sunday as rehearsals for a performance of "To Kill A Mockingbird" were scheduled and auditions for "KC Superstar," an American Idol type competition to find the best high school singer in the Kansas City area, were set to begin.

William Corporon, 69, had driven his 17 year-old grandson, Reat Underwood, to the center to audition for the singing competition. They died after they were ambushed in the parking lot. They were both Methodist.

Two other people that Cross/Miller shot at were not injured.

After shooting Corporon and Underwood, Cross/ Miller then went to the Village Shalom Senior Living Facility, where he shot and killed Terri Hastings LaManno who was going to visit her

Marple sworn in on Cassville City Council

At Monday's Cassville City Council meeting, the aldermen and city said goodbye to Darrell Ledenham, the North Ward Alderman. Ledenham gave his seat to newly elected Jerry Marple, the write-in candidate with the most votes in April 8's election. Ledenham was not seeking reelection.

The Council presented Ledenham with a plaque for his service to the City and his name plaque from the Council Chambers. Marple was sworn in shortly thereafter by Deputy Clerk Jennifer Evans.

The Council addressed other issues during the meeting, including renewing their contract with MDC of Monett, a technology company. MDC currently provides the computers, monitors, printers and battery back-ups for all of the Cassville City equipment on a lease-option.

The new contract signed with MDC will also include the City's server for next three years and save the City around \$1,800 over that time period. The cited advantage to the lease-option for the City equipment is that there are no unforeseen technology costs for replacements or upgrades. Instead, the City has a set budget for the lease with MDC with the company Lenovo and all equipment comes with a three-year warranty.

The City also made ordinance changes, including updating the water leak code to the previously discussed changes.

Increased tax revenue Exeter Council turns down bar in city for County in March Charlea Mills

For the month of March, Barry County received a significant increase in sales tax revenue for the month. This year, March's 1/2 cent general revenue tax resulted in \$158,198.06 for the county. The total was \$19,575.47 over March 2013's revenue. The county's overall general revenue tax is up 5.99 percent for 2014 over 2013 after a slow start in January.

The County's relatively new 1/8 cent tax increase that went into effect in October 2013 also jumped for the month compared to previous months. Each full month that the 1/8 cent tax has been collected, revenue has hovered between approximately \$30,000 and \$34,000 monthly. For March, that total rose to \$37,519.80 collected.

While the County re-

enue over last year, the City of Cassville's tax remained stable when compared to last consumption of liquor on year's figures. The total taxes collected for the City is equal to two cents and was up a was considering opening up little less than one percent a bar and restaurant on East from last year. For the month of March, Cassville collected \$137,340.76 in total for the month. That was just a little over \$1,000 more than March 2013.

The City of Cassville will see more revenue beginning in October when the new 3/8 cent transportation tax packaged and sealed. The passed by voters at April 8th's General Municipal Election goes into effect. The transportation tax funds will not come into major play for the City's budget until 2015 after funds have been collected for a couple months.

It was possible for Berry to open the business outside of city limits. However, he voiced his concern about staying in city limits in order to generate tax revenue. The establishment would have also needed to make \$250,000 per year according to a Missouri state statue for bars that serve food.

If the council were to approve a liquor license for Berry, he would then have to pass through additional limitations presented by the town.

Many citizens and aldermen and women voiced concerns about having a bar in town. Many shared personal opinions of the bar causing





mother. She was Catholic.

Last week, the Anti-Defamation League said it warned of the increased possibility of violent attacks against community centers in the coming weeks, "which coincide both with the Passover holiday and Hitler's birthday on April 20, a day around which in the United States has historically been marked by extremist acts of violence and terrorism."

Police in Overland Park say Miller is the founder and former Grand Dragon of the Carolina Knights of the Ku Klux Klan and the White Patriot Party. Both organizations operated as paramilitary groups in the 1980s, according to the Southern Poverty Law Center, which monitors hate groups.

The Center, which has kept tabs on Cross/Miller for several years, says he spent time in federal prison for plotting to kill the founder of the center and for planning various robberies.

In 2010, Cross/Miller ran for the U.S. Senate for Missouri as a write-in candidate. He released several hate-filled commercials in Missouri that the Missouri Broadcasters Association found offensive.

Cassville Senior Center plans to repave lot The FCC sided with the Missouri Broadcasters Association and said broadcast media outlets did not have to run the ads.

After Cross/Miller was arrested on Sunday, April 13, he was shouting "Heil Hitler" in the back of a patrol car. The FBI and other agencies are scouring Cross/Miller's compound near Aurora for additional evidence.

Cross/Miller's son, Jesse Miller, was involved in a shootout with police that led to his death on March 28, 2008. Jesse Miller was involved in an accident with Joseph Rich near Marionville. When Rich stopped, Miller gunned him down. Jesse Miller then shot Marionville Police Officer Andy Clark, who returned fire killing Miller. Clark suffered a shoulder wound in the shootout.

President Obama addressed the situation saying, "While we do not know all of the details surrounding today's shooting, the initial reports are heartbreaking."

Miller is being held on a \$10,000,000 bond. If Miller is convicted of a hate crime, under federal law, prosecutors could pursue the death penalty.

A deteriorating parking lot that is creating issues for area senior citizens will get a make-over pending donations.

The Cassville Senior Center is a hub for many different services for area seniors. However, the parking lot has become an issue in recent years, sparking the Board to ask for donations in getting the lot repaved.

Ron Black, Cassville Senior Center Board president, stated, "The parking lot has deteriorated considerably with cracks in the last few years. So we need to get this taken care of now and not wait another year."

Black said that rising material costs make the issue a time sensitive one. The Board received a bid of \$18,000 from Hutchens Construction to do all of the repairs, resealing and striping. That includes a membrane on all of the cracks so that they don't reopen anytime soon. Black stated, "I'm confidant that Hutchens will do a good job on our lot." The current lot hasn't had any extensive work done on it in seven or eight years, according to Black.

"There's not hardly anyone who hasn't been touched by our services in some way.

So we are hoping that people make donations to get the lot done soon." The Center prepares 4,600 to 4,800 meals monthly for their Meals on Wheels program in the community. They also have home health workers, hearing aid care, free tax preparation and other services that help senior citizens over a broad region, not just Cassville.

It is a misconception that the Senior Center receives a large portion of tax funding from the County. While the Center receives a small percentage of tax money, the bulk goes to the Barry County Council on Aging (BC-COA). BCCOA does distribute some funds for specific programs at the Center. That money will not go toward the parking lot repairs, but rather specific needs of different programs and services provided by the Senior Center.

With many of the seniors who attend gatherings at the Senior Center having mobility issues and using walkers or wheelchairs, large cracks in the parking lot pose a threat to their safety if not repaired.

Any donation made to the Senior Center is taxdeductible made to a nonprofit organization, and they will provide a receipt. 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Campbell commits suicide Silver Leaf sends students **Shell Knob Library** following perjury charges on Sophomore Pilgrimage hosts East Egg Hunt

The woman charged with lying to a Taney County grand jury about her involvement in the double homicide of Becky and Rusty Porter has committed suicide in her Purdy home.

Perjury charges were filed against 59 year-old Carolyn Campbell on Tuesday, one day after Windy Friend was found guilty of two counts of first-degree murder for her part in the couple's deaths.

Court documents say Carolyn Campbell lied about her knowledge of a stolen tractor that was found on property owned by her and husband of 35 years, Robert Campbell, who is facing two counts of first-degree murder for the Porters' deaths.

They also say she lied about contact with her nephew, Phillip Friend, who has pleaded guilty to seconddegree murder for his part in the Porters murder for hire.

Taney County prosecutor Jeff Merrell says Robert Campbell offered his brother-in-law, Tony Friend (Phillip's father), \$100,000 "for two birthdays."

Campbell was released from the Taney County Jail at 2:30 p.m. on April 2, 2014.

Barry County Chief Deputy Leonard Collins said Willard Taylor found his mother "unresponsive" in her Purdy home about 10:30 a.m. "She left a suicide note," he said.

Her body, which had no visible wounds, according to Collins, has been sent to Southwest Missouri Forensics in Springfield for autopsy.

Tony Friend pleaded guilty to two counts of firstdegree murder and is serving two life without parole sentences.

Dusty Hicks, the Friends' cousin, will be tried for his part in the slaying in August.

Robert Campbell, Carolyn's husband, is scheduled to stand trial in October.

Windy Friend will be sentenced to two life without parole sentences on June 12.





Wright's rally-killing



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
strikeout of Blisard ended the game, and the Wolves chalked up a 10-8 road victory.

Group hopes to save native Chinquapin

The highly regarded Ozark Chinquapin was brought to the attention of landowners, conservationists, state and federal employees on Friday at the Emory Melton Inn and Conference Center located in Roaring River State Park. In hopes to raise awareness about the tree in Barry County, recollections of the Ozark Chinquapin tree and accomplishments in replenishing the species were discussed.

The large Chinquapin trees once covered a large portion of the Ozarks. It was once drought tolerant, grew to heights of 65 feet and two to three feet in diameter on acidic dry rocky soils on hilltops and slopes. The trees also produced a bounty of nuts every year without fail. It was sought out as a food source for not only animals, but many Barry County residents.

Many locals shared their fond memories of the trees and stuffing their pockets full of nuts. One father even attributes the tree to saving his kids' lives who had been infected with whooping cough. He brewed the leaves of the tree into a tea to soothe their ails.

Logging originally affected the population of the Ozark Chinquapin before they were later taken over by the chestnut blight which is a plant disease caused by the fungus Cryphonectria parasitica. The chinquapin was nearly wiped out and mostly blighted stumps remained of the Ozark tree, with the number of surviving stumps continuing to shrink.

The Ozark Chinquapin Foundation has been working to restore the tree to its native range. "We have a partnership with state parks in order to spread information on the blighted chinquapin," stated Steve Bost, a naturalist at Montauk State Park and founder of the Ozark Chinquapin Foundation. Bost heard about the tree in the late 1990's. "I was told by many experts that I was wasting my time. We've come a long way since then, currently working with 37 trees that have shown some sort of resistance to the blight," stated Bost.

Bost began a journey in order to cross-pollinate and fight against the blight hoping to one day breed a tree resistant to the disease. His goals include restoring the tree to its native range, establishing a viable seed base, developing a 100 percent pure Ozark chinquapin that is diseaseresistant, and to raise public awareness.

Bost planted many Ozark Chinquapin trees in front of the Ozark Chinquapin Foundation building in Roaring River State Park. Each seed was taken from a tree that showed resistance to the blight and was replanted in hopes to carry on a full life without being infected.


