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Hays appointed Roaring River superintendent

Roaring River State Park has appointed a new park superintendent following Dusty Reid taking a position with the Cassville R-IV School District in February.

Kerry Hays, assistant superintendent at the park for the last five years, accepted the position on April 9 after serving as interim park superintendent after Reid left February 15.

Hays began at Roaring River after spending 15 years with municipal parks and recreation department around Chicago. When asked why he decided to relocate to the area, Hays stated, "I fell in love with this place the first time I saw it. I don't think I've seen a better park anywhere in the country, and I mean that from the bottom of my heart." Hays and his wife, Heather, live in the park.

Hays stated, "My favorite part about working here is actually two parts. The first part is working with the great staff. We have a lot of really dedicated employees who really love the park."

He continued, "The second best part is meeting the people who come here. It's been a part of many lives for a number of generations. It's just wonderful to hear how some of their best memories have been along the river, walking the trails or spending time in the park."

Hays was selected from a pool of 13 applicants. Three of those made it to the interview process. Hays has a bachelors in music education, performance and history from Carthage College in Wisconsin. He has a Masters in parks and Recreation administration from George Williams College in 1983.

D.A.R.E. benefit bass tourney Saturday

For many students in the area, the D.A.R.E. program is a powerful influence in the way they look at the choices they make for their futures. All local D.A.R.E. programs are funded through donations, not state or county-provided funding.

As a way to raise money essential to operate the D.A.R.E. program through the Barry County Sheriff's Department, there will be a benefit buddy bass tournament at Cape Fair Marina on Saturday, April 26.

Barry County Deputy Larry Stockton, a D.A.R.E. officer for the past seven years, shared why he became involved with the D.A.R.E. program. Stockton stated, "The whole reason why I got into law enforcement was to help people. As far as the D.A.R.E. program, I think a lot of times, maybe it's seeing someone like mom or dad get arrested, but I want them to see a positive side to that, too. We're here to help. The kids are our future and they need to have the information so that they can make good choices and the know the consequences of bad choices are."

Stockton works with students at Exeter, Purdy, Shell Knob, Southwest and Wheaton. Cassville students have their program through the Cassville Police Department. To fund the county programs, it costs round \$10,000 annually for an officer and the supplies, all of which comes from donations. Last year, 23 boats participated in the bass tournament and it brought in around \$1,200. This year, the Sheriff's Department hopes to raise even more.

Keeping the D.A.R.E. program going is an important element to drug education for area students. Stockton stated, "I'm glad to be the role model for our kids and provide information to them. The best way to get the information to students is while they are young."

The tournament fees will be \$50 per boat with a 70 percent payback and a \$10 optional big bass entry with 100 percent payback. The tournament will begin at 7 a.m. and conclude at 3 p.m. Entires may be mailed to Cape Fair Marina, 142 Stugis Lane, Reeds Spring, MO 65737.

Local legislators stand behind income tax cuts, say schools will benefit

In a statement released by Governor Jay Nixon, the recently passed Senate Bill 509 will have significant impact on public schools across the state. The bill, aimed at giving income tax cuts to Missouri families and eliminate state income tax for earners making less than \$9,000 per year, is an eventual \$620 million cut to the state's annual budget, according to Gov. Nixon.

However, local state legislators voted in favor of the bill, claiming that Nixon's concerns are invalid and that schools will not be effected in the long term. State Representative Scott Fitzpatrick stated, "I'm not concerned about this affecting the schools because the cuts

wouldn't go into effect until 2017, and that is only if there is a revenue increase of \$150 million, and even then, the taxes cut would only be \$120 million actually gaining an increase of \$20 million."

State Senator David Sater stated, "I think it'll help the school budgets. I'm a free market believer. I think that if we cut those taxes, it'll stimulate the free markets. It will help small businesses so that they will have more

money to expand their inventories, hire more employees and see increased profits." In a statement released by Gov. Nixon last week, he stated, "These new numbers show that if the legislature succeeds in punching a \$620 million hole in our state budget with this unaffordable giveaway to special interest, it's our students and schools who will pay the price. Senate Bill 509 would drain hundreds of millions of dollars annually out of our K-12 schools, weakening our economy, undermining our stable business climate, and putting full funding of the foundation formula our of reach. Missourians want good schools and good jobs, not another dangerous scheme to defund our K-12

The K-12 foundation formula comparisons showed how each school district in the state would fare with the new budget impacted by SB509. The K-12 foundation formula is an initiative that began in the 2006-2007 school year to level the play-

classrooms."

ing field for all of Missouri's public school districts' funding regardless of property values and wealth.

According to Fitzpatrick, Nixon's comments are sensationalizing the facts. "These tax cuts are part of five phases. The only time each phase goes into effect is when revenue increases by \$150 million for the year. In order for Governor Nixon to fully fund schools, he would have to accomplish that by 2016, before these cuts could possibly happen."

The governor's fully funded recommendation for Cassville R-IV is \$7,032,178. If the new tax cuts are adopted, Nixon warns that single district's budget will be reduced by over half a million dollars to \$6,492,237.

Other districts will also have substantially less, as well, according to Nixon. The budget decreases for each Barry County district are: Exeter R-VI - \$120,842, Purdy R-II -\$234,273, Shell Knob \$8,831, Southwest R-V - \$271,339, and Wheaton - \$159,226. In short, Barry County school districts would stand to have over \$1.3 million less than the Governor's recommendation for the K-12 foundation formula by the end of the five phases of tax cuts.

Richard Asbill, Cassville R-IV Superintendent, stated, "Obviously, we are concerned and hope our local legislators understand that representing the interest of their local communities and

Missing man's body found

The body of Barry County man Jeffrey Ingram was finally found on Saturday after months of searching. Ingram, 32, of Cassville, had been missing since January 16 of this year. At the time of his worried that he might harm himself.

Barry County Sheriff Mick Epperly confirmed that the vehicle and body were found in Taney County. Ingram's mother lives in the county dy, was travelling westbound near Kirbyville.

Epperly stated, "I spoke to Taney County on Saturday after a mushroom hunter had come across his truck to confirm that he had been found." Barry County Deputies had scoured Barry County by helicopter, boat and other vehicles at their disposal over the past three months looking for Ingram. Other counties had been notified of his disappearance, as well.

Epperly stated, "It's a sad situation, but at least there is closure for the family now."

Ingram's body was turned over to the Taney County coroner and his family has been notified, according to Epperly.

Purdy man dies disappearance, his family was in Galena Hwy. 248 crash

According to the Missouri State High Patrol Crash Reports, a Purdy man is dead following a crash near Galena on Friday.

Clarence Frye, 58, of Puron MO 248 three miles west of Galena when he lost control of his truck. The truck struck a tree and overturned. Frye was not wearing a seatbelt at the time of the crash. Frye was pronounced

dead at the scene by Stone County Coroner John Cunningham.

This is Troop D's 20th fatality for 2014.

Cassville clean-up day scheduled

The City of Cassville's annual spring clean-up will be held May 5th through May 9th. Republic Services will accept additional household waste and large items on regular collection days.

The following items will be accepted at the curb: barbecue grills; patio furniture; outdoor furniture; sofas; dressers; loveseats; recliners; desks; televisions; bundled guttering; beds, including hide-a-beds, mattresses and box springs; wood pallets; waste from small remodeling or wood projects, materials must be cut into four-foot sections and stacked; sinks; toilets; cabinets; vanities; carpet that is cut into four-foot lengths and bundled; fencing that is cut into four-foot lengths; and bicycles.

Republic Services will not accept tires, yard waste, large quantities of ash, dead animals, raw sewage, waste oil, hazardous materials, wet

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paint containers, chemicals, flammable substances, lead or acid batteries or waste from large remodeling or construction projects.

Cassville residents who want to dispose of large appliances and metal will have two options this year.

One option will be to take only metal or large appliances to a dumpster located at 503 Mill Street. This is across the street from the Barry County Sheriff's Office. This option is free.

The other option will be to have Cassville residents set at their curb-side large appliances for Republic Services to collect. There is a \$15 fee. Residents must pay the fee at the Cassville City Hall by May 3rd in order to schedule a pick-up for a large appliance. The following large appliances will be accepted after the \$15 fee has been paid: dishwashers, washing machines, dryers, hot water


heaters and stoves. Republic Services will also accept refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners that display a tag from a licensed technician proving that all freon has been removed from the item.


Yard waste will be accepted as normal at the Yard Waste facility behind the Cassville Aquatic Park.

On Thursday, April 17, 11 new County Road District Commissioners were sworn in to their offices by County Clerk Gary Youngblood during a special meeting in the County Commissioners Chambers.

Road Commissioners

were elected during the April 8th General Election in the county. They are responsible for all road repairs and maintenance within their districts, including grading, chip and seal, pothole repairs as well as snow and ice removal.

During the special Road Commissioners' meeting, Barry County Commissioners Gary Schad, Wayne Hendrix and Cherry Warren all addressed different topics pertaining to how the Commissioners should operate their dealings and meetings.

Schad presented on the Sunshine Law and how the Commissioners are to con-

duct their meetings according to Missouri State Law. Hendrix went over bidding procedures, and Warren brought up a variety of suggestions on how to keep their Districts running smoothly.

Warren stated, "You should specify what roads need to be worked on in your open meetings, and it'll be in your minutes. That way will be smoother because then no one can say that they didn't know what was going to be done in their district."


Road Districts are required to post when their open meetings will occur so that district residents can attend and be aware of what projects will be worked on. Districts also should keep minutes from their meetings that are public so that those that are not able to attend meetings can see be informed about their work.

Each of the 25 Road Districts in Barry County have three commissioners to vote and make decisions on what repairs to make during the year. Funding for each district comes from gasoline taxes collected, motor vehicle taxes and 1/2 cent Capital Improvement County tax. Money collected is dispersed monthly with each district receiving a percentage of the overall taxes collected. The money each district received is based 40 percent on assessed property value in the district and 60 percent on how many miles of roads the district has compared to the county total.

The district receiving the largest percentage of road district funds is Flat Creek due to their high assessed property value and 99.03 miles of roads within it. Flat Creek received The smallest districts are Greasy Creek and Liberty, each with less than one percent of the funds distributed. Smaller districts with such little funding and few miles of roads are why a few of the Districts would like to consolidate with other districts, a topic also addressed at Thursday's meeting. For Districts to be absorbed by another, the majority of the landowners in the district have to support the change.

Funds for each Road District are distributed monthly once the District turns in their monthly financial statements, which are public records kept at the Courthouse.

local school districts should be priorities placed before political or party interest."

Asbill continued, "Too often schools are placed on the political battlefield and that is not productive to Missouri's future and it is not beneficial to parents, students, teachers, and local school districts who expect elected officials to represent their constituents before party politics."

Rep. Fitzpatrick stated, "We shouldn't have to cut spending at all with this bill, just slow growth of the budget. Each phase still nets an additional \$30 million." He went on, "This isn't a tax cut for the lawyers and lobbyists, it's a tax cut for everyone. It's a tax cut for local businesses and individuals. It is literally for every Missourian who pays taxes."

Sater stated, "This will result in more general revenue for the state through the free market. We will actually see more money for schools and the budget."

Gov. Nixon was expected to veto SB509 yesterday, but has yet to release any official word on where the bill stands. Should a veto occur, legislators would need a two-thirds vote in both chambers to pass it through without the Governor's approval. Rep. Fitzpatrick and Sen. Sater will both support a veto override if the bill is vetoed.



Freddie Hemphill, of Purdy, is celebrating her 100th birthday with friends and family on Saturday, April 26, at the Purdy Community Center from 2 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Hemphill has called Barry County her home for many years and has shared her memories with friends and family. She was born at her family's farm house between Crane and Galena as the fifth of ten children. Her father farmed and worked in the timber, cutting wood and posts for sale. Hemphill remembers having a nice house and sharing many simple childhood memories with her siblings.

She also remembers the depression differently than most. "Lots of people think that back in the Depression

hill stated, "but we grew our food. We had gardens, and we butchered our cattle and hogs for meat. We canned the vegetables. We always had plenty to eat," she continued.

Hemphill noticed many changes throughout history. She remembers walking three miles to Scholten school, every day, now called Wheelerville, and she walked in all sorts of weather. Schools also didn't have the amenities most children are accustomed to. "At school in the winter time, we would pull our benches that we sat on all up around the big potbelly stove to keep warm," Hemphill stated.

1931, Hemphill In graduated and was later approached by a man from Joplin asking her to play with a group of girls that traveled and played basketball after playing for many years in high school. However, her dad found this to be an insult. "He said nice girls don't go around the country playing ball, so of course that ended my ball career," stated Hemphill. She then married her boyfriend from Seneca in June of 1932, later moving back to the area. In February 1933, he died from spinal meningitis while Hemphill was three months pregnant. Hemphill then moved in with her parents and had her first child in 1933.

Much changed for Hemphill in her early adulthood, but she continued to prosper. She met her second husband a few years later when her son was three years old. Billy David and Freddie had a marriage that lasted sixtythree years. In 1953, Billy took office and became sheriff. Hemphill took care of the kids and the farm during this time

During his time as sheriff he had one deputy, one jailer, and received five cents a mile for gasoline used in his own car. "There were no issues with drugs during that time. His biggest problems were petty theft and people making moonshine," stated Hemphill. In 1961, he was elected Sergeant of Arms of the National Sheriff's Association at the annual convention. Billy moved up each year through the ranks from the fifth vice president and was elected president at the convention in 1967 in Las Vegas, Nevada. Billy Hemphill passed in December of 1999 at his home in Purdy where the couple spent most of their married life.

The birthday party is being held in order to celebrate the long life of Freddie Hemphill, in the community where she's spent a great deal of her life. All are welcome, no gifts requested.


An Exeter woman turned a trip to Springfield for her sister's cancer treatment into a joyful day by playing the Missouri Lottery. Charlotte Jones, 64, said she rarely plays the Lottery because money is tight. But the decision to splurge on April 4 led to a \$50,000 payday.

"This is the first \$20 ticket I've bought," began Jones. "It's new, and she wanted to try one. We're both not real financially secure or anything. I said, 'What the heck.' I did it, and I'm still not sure I believe it."

Jones and her sister, Janis, played a "Lucky 7s Playbook" Scratchers ticket she purchased at Casey's General Store, 33 S. Main St., in Cassville. As they scratched the ticket in the store, the day turned for the better.

"We didn't believe it at first," recalled Jones. "We both just kind of looked at each other. She looked at me and said, 'I've got to find out if this is real or not.' This is going to help out amazingly so."

Janis has been fighting cancer for 14 years. After



two rounds of treatment, it recently resurfaced, requiring another round of trips to Springfield for radiation. Although the prize was claimed by Jones, she said she will use some of the money to help her sister.

"It's going to help with gas and transportation," explained Jones. "If I pay for her gas up here for these next five weeks, that will make a whole world of difference, because they have car payments, house payments, things like that. I'm going to make life easier for her. I think that's why God let me win this today

"And just when it's needed the most," she continued. "I couldn't help her financially, and now I can."

Jones joked that the win 'may have created a bad habit." But, she admitted, it was fun.

"We always have fun doing that together," she said.



With prom and graduation season here. Missouri law enforcement want to make sure Missouri youth are celebrating safe and sober. The Cassville Police Department will join other Missouri law enforcement agencies to crack down on drunk driving May 1 through 12, 2014.

It is illegal for someone under 21 to possess or consume alcohol in Missouri, yet youth make up a significant proportion of drunk drivers causing traffic crashes on Missouri roadways. Missouri has a Zero Tolerance Law. If you are under 21, your license will be suspended if you're caught driving with even a trace of alcohol in your system.

Consequences of drunk driving include: jail time, loss of their driver license, or being sentenced to use ignition interlocks, insurance rates go up and other financial hits include attorney fees, court costs, lost time at work, and the potential loss of job or job prospects. When family, friends and co-workers find out, violators can also face tremendous personal embarrassment and humiliation.

"Driving drunk is simply not worth all the consequences," stated Chief Dana Kammerlohr. "Zero Tolerance means zero chances: Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over."

Between 2011 and 2013, 85 people were killed and 318 seriously injured in Missouri roadway crashes involving an impaired driver under the age of 21.

With many area businesses and organizations experiencing rising health insurance rates, the Cassville School District is offering an incentive to help save their District some of those rising costs in the coming year.

Employees of the Casville R-IV School District are provided health insurance as part of their benefits package. Employees can also add their families at their own cost. However, in the upcoming year, the District will provide 75 percent, \$320.72 per month per member, of the base cost of a health insurance plan for their employees unless they opt to participate in a new wellness incentive plan.

To qualify for the District to pay for the remaining 25 percent, equivalent of \$106.90 per month, employees can participate in the Bona-fide Wellness Incentive, an option that will require them to undergo two Health Risk Assessment (HRA)

screenings in September and March at no cost, or have them done by their primary care physician at their own cost. Superintendent Richard Asbill stated, "We hope to have more people sign up for the Health Risk Assessments and take personal responsibility for their health." The move allows the District to get lower insurance rates for employees with positive HRAs.

"The Asbill stressed, District doesn't receive the results of the assessments. That's just for the employees to be aware of their health and where they can make positive changes."

To cover the health insurance for the 250 employees of the District, while not all have the school's insurance, it cost \$1,132,586 for the last 12-month period. Asbill stated that those rates could rise. The proactive move to protect the District against those costs by encouraging a healthier staff has a multifaceted benefit.



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

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Milk Income Loss **Contract Program extension**

U.S. Department of Agriculture (ÚSDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Administrator Juan M. Garcia today announced the extension of the Milk Income Loss Contract (MILC) program.

The extended MILC protects dairy farmers enrolled in the program against income loss through Sept. 1, 2014, or until a new Margin Protection Program for dairy producers (MPP), established by the 2014 Farm Bill, is operational.

Contracts for eligible producers enrolled in MILC on or before Sept. 30, 2013, are automatically extended until the termination date of the MILC program. Dairy operations with approved MILC contracts will continue to receive monthly payments if a payment rate is in effect.

MILC compensates enrolled dairy producers when the Boston Class I milk price falls below \$16.94 per hundredweight (cwt), after adjustment for the cost of dairy feed rations. MILC payments are calculated each month using the latest milk price and feed cost, just as in the 2008 Farm Bill. The payment rate for October 2013 through January 2014 marketings is zero. Payment rates during the months after January 2014 until the termination of the MILC program will be determined as the appropriate data becomes available.

Since MILC payments are limited to a maximum amount of milk production each fiscal year, dairy operations may select a production start month other than October 2013 (the start of fiscal year 2014). Producers who want to select a different production start month must visit their local FSA office between April 14, 2014, and May 30, 2014.





The Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes loans to rural youths to establish and operate income-producing projects of modest size in connection with their participation in 4-H clubs, FFA and similar organizations. Each project must be part of an organized and supervised program of work designed to provide practical business and education experience. The project must be planned and operated with the help of the organization adviser, produce sufficient income to repay the loan, and provide adequate collateral.

A rural youth loan is available to young persons between the ages of 10 and 20 years. The maximum loan amount is \$5,000. The current interest rate is 2.0 percent with a term of up to 7 years. Loan funds may be used to: purchase livestock, seed, equipment and supplies; buy, rent or repair needed tools and equipment; and pay operating expenses for the project.
