Concerns raised over Common Core switch

Common Core State Standards (CCSS) are becoming a hot topic for many, Barry County residents included. Now, Missouri legislators are getting on board with those concerns and possibly making Missouri the second state to withdraw from the CCSS in favor of a curriculum designed and approved by Missouri educators.

The Ozarks Property Rights Alliance, a group dedicated to property rights, freedom and conservative issues, held a meeting on the subject on Friday night. Their speaker, Dr. Mary Bryne, Ed. D., of the St. Louis Area, gave a presentation to a group of about 20 explaining the history of the program and what the changes will mean for Missouri students once full implemented.

worked in schools in a variety of settings, experience that she says made her very alarmed at the changes in store for schools with CCSS. She volunteers for the cause through the Missouri Coalition Against Common Core. The CCSS changes are intended to create a unilateral approach to education among each state. Thus far, 44 states have adopted the program as an incentive for grants. Indiana was the first state to formally withdraw from Common Core.

Bryne's main concerns discussed at Friday's meeting included the shift of the intention of publicly-funded schools. She stated, "Liberal arts education was needed to protect the Republic. It was to encourage people to be selfgoverning to protect the government and the people. That was the main purpose of taxsupported public schools."

Bryne said that the CCSS's goals are wholly different, instead preparing students for a two-year college or the workforce and therefore turning students into human capitol or human resource instead of individuals.

Bryne continued, "You can't make a monolithic group out of anything or anyone." CCSS is touted as an educational model that is clear college- and careerready standards for kindergarten through 12th grade in English language arts/literacy and mathematics, according to their website.

Cassville Schools have been working toward those changes accepted by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education over the past three years, according to Assistant Superintendent Jill LeCompte. LeCompte stated, 2014 Valedictorians and Salutatorians





"We've always followed what the state recommends, but we teach the way we want to teach those standards. There is a lot of control through the school board and administration, but also individual buildings. If the principal comes to us and says that they want to try something different that teachers think will work better, we work with them on that."

LeCompte stressed that, as educators, the teachers are used to changing things up and making their lessons fit students and standards both. At Cassville, kindergarten changes began shortly after CCSS was adopted as the goal for Missouri schools. LeCompte stated, "None of the teachers felt that the changes were too rigourous for students. The goals were new for that grade level, but the kids met those goals."

Bryne discussed at the meeting that there is fear that a lot of the local control is in jeopardy if CCSS is fully implemented, something that legislators seem to be echoing at the Capitol.

LeCompte noted, "One good thing about a common set of guidelines for each grade is that it would make it easier for students transferring from other states. Where we are located, we get a lot of students from Arkansas or Oklahoma. It would be good to have them learning the same things at each level." That set of guidelines currently changes from state to state.

Cassville and other schools are prepared to make whatever changes the goals the state makes. LeCompte is confident in the ability of the District and students to make that successful. She stated, "Whatever expectation you set, that's what the kids will do. We're going to teach it if it is required, but we're going to meet the needs of each student while doing that to the best of our ability. Every year we do our very best to meet the needs of each individual student on their personal best."

Current House Bill 1490 (HB1490) has gone back to the Senate to approve changes. If it goes through, Missouri could be the second state to opt out of Common Core in favor of continued local control of learning standards. Two arrested in high-speed pursuit

Two were taken into custody by the Barry County Sheriff's Department after a high-speed pursuit on Saturday. According to Sheriff Mick Epperly, "The Missouri State Highway Patrol threw down a spike strip and they lost three of their tires but kept driving on the rims for a stretch."

The two arrested were John Caldwell and Kimee Bennett. Epperly stated, "She had some warrants, but nothing to explain fleeing like they did."

Sheriff's Deputy Mike Moore was the arresting officer for the incident. Caldwell is being held in the Barry County Jail on a 24-hour hold for felony fleeing/resisting arrest. His bond is set at \$10,000. Bennett is being held on a \$524 bond for failure to appear warrants.

46 percent sales tax increase for April

For the month of April, both the County and City of Cassville received a significant increase in revenue collected from local sales taxes. Cassville's sales tax was up 27.7 percent over last year's figures. Revenue collected for the general revenue one-cent tax was \$72,201.38, up over \$15,000 from 2013. All taxes collected for the month, including the capital improvement and parks and stormwater taxes was \$144,403.45. collected \$113,062.34.

Barry County's increase for the month was even greater than for Cassville. Tax revenue collected in the month of April was up 46.55 percent versus 2013. This April, the county collected \$154,648.50, a \$47,499.14 increase over \$107,149.36 in 2012. The County's collection of the 1/8 cent tax increase that began in October 2013 remained stable when compared to March's

Cassville Primary School says goodbye to longtime kindergarten teacher Connie Christen. After 40 years of education, Christen will retire at the end of the 2013-2014 school year.

Christen was born in Cassville at the local hospital. She said, "Dr. Mary Newman was my doctor, and I grew up in Thomas Hollow and went to school in Exeter until tenth grade." Her family then relocated to Rocky Comfort, and in the spring of 1970, Christen graduated from McDonald County School District. She then furthered her education, graduating from Crowder College in 1972 with an associates in general studies.

"I transferred to Missouri Southern State University and graduated in 1974 with a degree in Elementary Education. I also have a masters degree from SMSU, and then went on to the University of Missouri Kansas City to become certified to teach visually impaired children." 

report to fill out, one more activity to plan, etc.," she stated. "Two big challenges I have seen during my career were changes in the physical plant of the school and in technology. When I came to Cassville R-IV, the primary school looked a lot different. The pre-school and kindergarten wings were not here. The intermediate school, high school and field house have all been built since I came. We did not use computers or SmartBoards in our classrooms when I first came, either." Christian also shed light

on the misconceptions of a teacher. "Most people think teachers work 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. only nine months per year. Actually, I'm usually at school by 7:30 a.m. and rarely leave before 4:30 or 5:30 p.m. I often come into work on Saturday or a Sunday afternoon. Summer brings summer classes and preparation for the next year."

She also advises young people entering the workforce to find a job they like, "If you are passionate about your work, it will never seem like

a job." Christen attributes her career choice to her third grade teacher, Glee Duncan. "Teaching Kindergarten has been my passion for many, many years. I feel that this was my life calling and I have been blessed to have had such wonderful colleagues to work with during the past 40 years. I would like to thank this community for entrusting your children to me. I have enjoyed each and every one of them. And thank them for allowing me to be a part of their educational journey," she stated.

Christian is married to Craig Christen and has two sons. The oldest, Kenneth, lives in Cassville and the youngest, Keith, graduates from Crowder this spring and will be transferring to Colorado State University in the fall. In her spare time she likes to read, cook, spend time with family, and explore flea markets. Cassville gears up for summer school

While a lot of kids may be getting antsy for the end of school, teachers and faculty are preparing for another successful summer school session to keep kids' minds active before fall classes resume.

Cassville Schools offer summer school for all students in preschool through 12th grade. According to Jill LeCompte, Assistant Superintendent, they have between 300 and 400 students that attend the summer session. LeCompte stated, "Research shows that kids retain what they've learned better if they have a shorter break. So we've been offering the program for years."

Students who attend summer school are provided free breakfast and lunch each day, as well, regardless of family income. The meal program is supported through the Division of Health and Senior Services, and actually allows the school to feed anyone under the age of 18 during that time span. LeCompte said, "In the past, we've worked with the YMCA and the Family Life Center day programs to provide them some food as well. As long as we have the food, we'll keep offering it." The meals are very helpful to many families who struggle with finances and childcare have these meals, so we draw in as many as we can."

Added incentives for school-aged children during the summer includes the field trips and activities that aren't as frequent during the school year. This summer, kids will go to the Cassville Aquatic Park, the Dickerson Park Zoo and Har-ber Village near Grove, Okla.

Traditionally, summer school was viewed as a strictly remedial learning atmosphere, but that is no longer the case in many districts, including Cassville. LeCompte said, "We try to make it as fun as we can and include a little bit of everything. We have enrichment and remedial work for the students and try to differentiate for each student in terms of what they need. The teachers who teach in the summer usually do it year after year and they have really good curriculums that they've developed and work well."

So far, the Cassville District has around 320 students who have signed up this year with the majority of those in kindergarten through fifth grades. The focus for students in upper level grades is often remedial work and earning missed credits, according to LeCompte, so the numbers of those enrolling are usually



Cassville High School announced Friday that Ethan Lowery will be taking his basketball skills to Ottawa University in Kansas next season. During his three years as a varsity starter on the boys' basketball team, Ethan amassed 967 total points and 467 rebounds. The past season, the 6'7" senior averaged 18.3 points and 9.6 rebounds per game. These numbers earned Ethan 1st Team All-Conference and 2nd Team All District honors.

Ethan also led the Wildcats to a Southwest Holiday Tournament Championship where he was named the tournament MVP. His all-tournament performance in the Spokane tournament also assisted the Wildcats to a third-place finish. Coach Powers said, "Ethan was more than any coach could ask for when developing a program. Ethan's hard work and dedication laid a solid foundation for the Wildcat Basketball Program.

"He never missed an open gym or practice, Ethan provided excellent leadership for our younger players. It has been a pleasure to coach Ethan."

Ethan thanked Coach Powers for always looking out for the best interests of his players. He stated, "Coach Powers always wanted us to win, but you could tell he always cared about us a people first." About Ottawa, Ethan said, "I'm excited about the opportunity to play at the next level. Ottawa is a great program, and I look forward to competing for a starting in the future."



In Class 2 District action at Ash Grove, both Montana Hendrix of Southwest and Kaylynn Harkey of Purdy won gold medals while qualifying to sectionals. Hendrix topped the field in the high jump, clearing the bar at 5-0. The Lady Trojans senior also qualified in the triple jump, taking 4th with a leap of 33-03

Harkey bested the field by a foot and a half in the pole vault competition, winning easily with a vault of 9-06. Southwest finished 11th in the team standings with 18 points. Purdy tied with El Dorado Springs for 12th place with 10 points. Lamar held off Ash Grove for the team title, 126 to 113.

On the boys side, Lucas White of Purdy earned a 2nd place medal with his performance in the long jump. White marked the sand at 20-02.5 to advance to the sectional meet.

White, Purdy's only scorer, put the Eagles in 13th place. Southwest, with only three boys competing, did not score. Lamar, the Big 8 Conference champions, ran away with the boys title, scoring 223.5 points. Marionville was second with 83.5.

Both the Class 1, Sectional 2 meet and the Class 2, Sectional 3 meet will be held in Lamar on Saturday, May 17. The top four individuals in each event will advance to the MSHSAA Class 1-2 State Track Championships on May 23-24 at Lincoln University in Jefferson City.





Murder victim's relative's replies on book

Back in 1985, the publisher of the Barry County Advertiser wrote a book about a double slaying in the Capps Creek Pulaskifield community in the northwest corner of Barry County which resulted in the only legal hanging that ever occurred in Barry County.

The hanging occurred in 1887 in Cassville and was witnessed by estimates of from 5,000 to 10,000 people, according to the people who attended.

Since it occurred 100 years earlier, the author had to rely on court records, old legal court files, newspaper accounts of 1886 and 1887, and finally with the Missouri Supreme Court which affirmed the results of the Barry County Circuit Court jury.

One of the victims was 17-year-old Ellen Bowe who resided with her parents on the west side of what would later become the town of Monett, south of the railroad tracks leading to Pierce City.

The perpetrator of the

soldier during the Civil War who had served with the other victim of the double slaying the afternoon of July 8, 1886, whose name was John J. White. Both lived in New York in the same community before White purchased the Pulaskifield property where the slayings occurred.

Last Saturday the author received the following letter from a relative of Ellen Bowe in New Jersey:

I want to thank you for writing the book 'Hanged by the Neck Until Dead.' Ellen Bowe, the young lady who was one of the victims of Ed Clum, was a niece of James Driscoll, my great-grandfather. Our family had always known that she was murdered in 1886 and that you had written a book describing the crime. I managed to locate the book on Amazon. com, ordered it, and just finished reading it.

It is a fascinating story, well-told and well-documented. Ellen's mother, Jane Driscoll Bowe, you may be interested to

It is also interesting that Jane's brother Daniel married James sister Catherine (they remained in Ohio). 

White finishes in top 10 at State Speech








Interested candidates can go to http://extension.missouri.edu/barry for a full job description. The position closes on April 17th.

Youths who are 5 to 18 years of age can select from




a variety of 4-H projects and activities that stress social and life skills in areas such as decision making, communication, social interaction, civic responsibility and physical skills.






