# \$1.5 Million branch plan progressing for Shell Knob Library

With fundraising efforts still underway, the reality of a new Shell Knob Library branch gets nearer. The estimated \$1.5 million branch will be located on a bluff overlooking the lake.

Barry-Lawrence Regional Library director Gina Milburn said the library has plans for the new branch, but the timeline on getting the building completed depends on fundraising efforts to supplement donations already collected.

The reality of a new branch began in November 2014 when the donation of around three acres was offered to the library system by Charles W. Singleton III and the Danny and Catherine Street Income Only Trust. She said the land is worth about \$158,000. Singleton will have naming rights of the branch, which will be in honor of his parents.

Now, plans are made and it's a matter of fundraising to make the branch a reality. Milburn said, "We hired an architect firm [Paragon Architecture in Springfield] to do preliminary drawings for us. We have those baseline drawings to show people to help in fundraising. The patrons in Shell Knob can see what we are doing; we want them to know we are serious about building a branch."

She continued, "The community has passed raising half of what we think it's going to cost to build. They are going to have to raise

about \$750,000, and we think it's going to be about \$1.5 million to build.

"Once we raise the funds, and if the district is able to get the tax levy increase, we'll get the rest of the money and go out to bid and start building."

The Shell Knob community currently has a library branch in the Bridgeway Plaza on Highway 39, however, Milburn says a lot of the space isn't usable in the branch. She said, "The existing branch is about 3,000 square feet on two levels and really, with the staff we have there, we're only really able to use the upper level which is about 1,500 square feet. They can only really do programming on the bottom level with the staff we have. It's an older building and there isn't a lot we can do with it without gutting

The state of the current branch and the parking limitations are what led the library to pursue a new branch instead of attempting to renovate the existing branch. Milburn said most branches in the library system are newer and not in need of major repairs or renovations except for the Shell Knob and Monett branches.

She added, "We're excited to do this and have a building that is easy to maintain."

The new library will be approximately 4,500 square feet all on one level with a handicapped accessible parking lot. There will also

be four computers, which is two more than the current branch, wifi for patrons and an outdoor covered patio for programming. Having the building and parking lot handicapped accessible was paramount to the library board's decision regarding the new building. Milburn said, "The community is predominantly senior citizens. We need a building that is accessible for our seniors and a usable

building for all ages. You try to have a branch that fits the community."

Milburn added there will also be a dedicated meeting

# City of Cassville earns accounting award

Jennifer Evans began working for the City of Cassville in 2013 as an accounting clerk. In 2015, she was promoted to a dual role as City Finance Clerk and City Finance Officer. In 2017, Evans' work for the City was awarded a Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. This year, her work with the city was rewarded for the second time.

Evans was awarded the certificate due to her work on the City of Cassville's CAFR or Comprehensive Annual Financial Report, a report that compiles all of a government entity's financial statements and makes the information within more accessible to the reader.

"The reward is for our comprehensive annual financial report or, CAFR," said Evans. "Basically, every government entity is required to produce financial statements. That's part of the law

"A Comprehensive Financial Report is, as the name suggests, more comprehensive. It has a little more in it that's supposed to make it easier to read, so that a person can more easily figure out the financial state of that entity."

Evans went in to describe the complexity of putting together a CAFR.

"Whether you're looking at the financial statements for the State of Missouri, the City of St. Louis, or the City of Cassville, they're all supposed to

# Boxx selected for Attorney General transition team

#### LOCAL PROSECUTING ATTORNEY WILL BE PROVIDING INPUT INTO NEEDS

Barry County's local prosecuting attorney was selected to be part of an advisory team for incoming Missouri Attorney General Eric Schmitt. Schmitt's office announced the transition team at the end of November.

Barry County's prosecuting attorney Amy Boxx said she was surprised that she was asked to serve on the advisory team. She said, "I was surprised. I haven't had any previous dealings with Mr. Schmitt. I don't know him any better than anyone else. I'm happy to help, but I certainly wasn't expecting it."

According to a press release by Schmitt's office, the transition team be reviewing the attorney general's office and gathering information for Schmitt to prioritize his duties.

Schmitt released the following statement: "As the state's next Attorney General, I look forward to serving as the lawyer for all six million Missourians. I am grateful to the exceptional group of leaders who are assisting with this transition and are committed to protecting Missouri's families."

Boxx is one of 12 people involved in some form of law enforcement who will be serving as advisors as Schmitt takes over as new attorney general.

Boxx said she believes the advisors were selected based on their location in the state and position in the judicial

system. She said, "From looking at the list, it looks like he's attempting to get folks from different areas of the state to get a more complete picture of issues in different areas and how to deal with them as a whole throughout the state."

As far as what the advisory committee will do, she said, "What was described to me by the chief of staff, he indicated the thought was in order to make the transition from one attorney general to the new one was to have a transition team which would be made up of various folks with different disciplines that have something to do with

law enforcement. We are going to be used as sounding boards on issues from various parts of the state that would give an idea of what would be needed in across the state. It's going to be conference calls amongst us to talk things over and give advice"

She continued, "We've had good relations with the past AG office and they have been helpful to us in the past. I'm happy to help out. That office does good work."

Chairs for the team are Todd Graves, of Graves Garrett law firm, and Jerry Hunter, of Byran Dave Leighton Paisner. Honorary cochairs are John Ashcroft and John Danforth.

Boxx joins fellow advisors: Ben Butler, Cass County Prosecuting Attorney; Bill Corrigan, partner at Armstrong Teasdale LLP; Blake Hurst, Missouri Farm Bureau president; Daniel Isom, Executive Director of the Regional Justice Information Service Commission and former Chief of Police for the St. Louis Metropolitan Police Department; Tim Lohmar, St. Charles County Prosecuting Attorney; Brian Munzlinger, farmer and former Chair of the Missouri Senate Agriculture Committee; Kathy Osborn, Regional Business Council Executive Director; Joe Patterson, St. Louis County Police Detective and President of St. Louis County Police Association; Rev. B.T. Rice, Pastor of New Horizon Christian Church; Mark Woolbright, 2nd District International Association of Firefighters Vice-President; and Danny Whiteley, City of Poplar Bluff Police Chief

# Tips to simplify cooking for a crowd this holiday season

# Serve up warmth for the holidays

People often associate holiday imbibing with eggnog, but many other beverages can be enjoyed this time of year. Wassail is a hot, mulled cider that was traditionally consumed while wassailing, a ritual of Medieval English Christmas and Twelfth Night celebrations. A warm beverage and caroling go hand-in-hand.

Wassail can be made in many different ways, depending on one's tastes. But cider is an integral ingredient in most wassail recipes. Home cocktail creators can use this basic recipe and modify as they see fit.

Wassail (serves 8 to 10): 1/2 gallon apple cider, 2 cups orange juice or pineapple juice, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 8 whole cloves, 4 cinnamon sticks, 1 cup orange juice, whiskey, if desired.

Add all ingredients to a large pot over medium heat. Allow to boil. Reduce and simmer for 30 to 45 minutes. Strain out the cloves and cinnamon sticks. For an alcoholic drink, add whiskey to desired taste. Wassail is traditionally served out of a communal punch bowl, but can also be presented in individual mugs garnished with cinnamon sticks.





We'll have double the computers from two to four, wifi for the entire building like we do now, and there will be plenty of space for customers to spread."

Milburn said other branches might have renovations and additions as well if a property tax levy increase is approved by voters in the future. She said, "If we go out and try to get a levy increase and it passes, for future planning we would like to have a plan to renovate all of our locations. Just because Cassville was new 15 years ago doesn't mean it doesn't need new carpet or paint. Mt. Vernon could be expanded, it's about to burst at the

seams. It would be nice to add additional square footage. In the future, we would like to see that at all locations we own."



conform the same standards so that you look at any government entity and they'll all look the same," stated Evans. "In a CAFR, those statements are bookends by an introductory statement that is more or less me explaining what state our finances are in and where we're going, where we've been, strategies and goals financially, and our economic demographic outlook.

"Then, you've got your financial section then, the final segment is statistics, which looks at the last ten years so that you can look at those numbers and find out if your economy is growing, or your finances are growing or stagnating. So, the reader can really grasp a sense of the financial health of the entity."

Evans went on to note what differentiates her work from that of more standard corporate financial reporting.

"In corporate financial statements, they're concerned with the bottom line," said Evans. "In government, we're not about making a profit. We're about providing services and using our budget responsibly."

The reward is given by the Government Finance Officers Association, a professional entity that operates in the United States and Canada, whose mission is, as their website gfoa.org states, "to advance excellence in state and local government financial reporting".

"They put out the standards and guidelines as well as educational opportunities for government financial officers to accomplish the goal of correct financial reporting," said Evans.

"So, you can submit a CAFR and it's reviewed by three independent reviewers," said Evans. "if you meet all the criteria and you hit all the marks, you're awarded the certificate."

Evans' first attempts at the award were unsuccessful.

"I was encouraged by my auditor to produce a CAFR simply because Cassville had never done one before," said Evans. "I submitted it in 2015 and didn't get it. Last year was the first time we got it."



# Worth the Effort Orange

Recipe by Charlea Estes-Jones

Sweet dough:

- 1 1/4 cup scalded milk (almond milk also works)
- 1/2 cup butter, room temperature
  - 1/3 cup sugar
  - 1 TBS dry active yeast
- 2 large eggs, room temperature
- 4-5 cups all purpose
- flour • 2 tsp salt
- Filling:
- 1 cup brown sugar, packed
- 1/2 cup butter, softened
- 3 TBS ground cinna-
  - 1/2 tsp ground nutmeg Orange Glaze:
- 2 cups confectioners'
- 2 TBS butter, softened
- 1 tsp vanilla
- 2-3 TBS orange juice
- 2+ TBS grate orange zest (optional, but adds a nice flavor and look)

Scald milk by bringing to boil in a sauce pan over medium high heat. Remove from heat as soon as it reaches boiling and add the butter, stirring once it

Pour milk mixture into a mixing bowl and let cool 10 minutes until warm to the touch instead of hot.

melts.

Sprinkle sugar into the milk mixture and then yeast on top of that. Let sit 10 minutes.

Using the bread hook attachment, turn it on low and add eggs and salt with one cup of flour. Add flour 1/2 cup at a time, allowing it to combine completely before adding the next 1/2

Once the dough pulls away from the sides of the bowl, stop adding flour and allow the mixture to knead on low for 10 minutes.

The dough should still be soft and have a slight tacky feel to it, but it should

not be sticky, wet or hard.

Allow the dough to rise in a warm place for an hour to an hour and a half with plastic wrap over the bowl until doubled in size.

While dough rises, make filling. Mix sugars, spices and butter until light and fluffy and well combined. Leave at room temperature.

Work dough by dumping out on a floured surface and fold into thirds and rolling out and turning until it is rolled into a 16 inch by 20 inch rectangle.

Using a large flat spreader, spread the cinnamon filling over the sheet into a thin layer over the entire dough except an inch and a half on a long edge.

Begin rolling the length of the dough up in a tight roll leaving the bare long edge for last.

Lay a piece of parchment in a 9x13 inch pan that rests up the sides.

Cut cinnamon roll into

12 equal pieces.

Set each roll in the pan on the parchment, tucking the loose end of the roll dough underneath each

Lay a kitchen towel over the pan and allow to rise while oven preheats (350 degrees F) at least 30 min-

Bake rolls for 20 to 25 minutes, until the edges are slightly golden and the centers have risen.

While rolls bake, mix the glaze with a whisk, making it light and fluffy.

As soon as rolls come out of the oven, top with half of the glaze. Let cool 10 to 15 minutes and top with remaining glaze.

Tip: If reheating, microwave for 20 seconds.

#### Mini-pumpkin pie sugar cookies

Cookies:

• 1 pouch (1 lb. 1.5 oz.) food-storage plastic bag. sugar cookie mix

• Butter and egg called for on cookie mix pouch

Pumpkin filling:

- 4 oz. cream cheese, very softened
- 1/2 cup canned pumpkin (not pumpkin pie mix)
  - 1/4 cup sugar

Bake 8 to 12 minutes or until edges are light golden brown and filling appears set (cookies and filling will be soft). Cool 10 minutes in pan; carefully remove to cooling rack.

- 1/2 cup semi-sweet chocolate chips
- 2 cup all-purpose flour
  - 3 TBS White sugar
- 3 TBS Brown sugar
- 1 TBS baking powder
- 1/4 tsp salt
- 5 TBS well-chilled salted butter, cut into five pieces
  - 1 large egg
- 1/4 cup whipping cream
  - 1/4 cup milk
  - 1 tsp vanilla extract
  - 2 TBS cream (optional)
  - 2 TBS sugar (optional)

Preheat oven to 400 degrees F.


Mix flour, white sugar, brown sugar, baking powder, and salt in food processor using steel blade. With the motor running, add butter and process until it looks like corn meal.



#### **Eggnog Cookies**

- 1 1/4 cups white sugar
- 3/4 cup butter, softened
- 1/2 cup eggnog
- 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
  - 2 egg yolks
- 1 teaspoon ground nutmeg
- 2 1/4 cups all-purpose flour
- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon ground cinnamon

Preheat oven to 300 degrees F (150 degrees C).

Combine flour, baking powder, cinnamon and nutmeg.

# Molasses Cookies (glutenfree, dairy-free)

- 2 cups gluten-free flour
- 1 1/2 tsp baking soda
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1 tsp ground cinnamon1/2 tsp ground cloves
- 1/2 tsp ground cloves
- 1/2 tsp ground ginger1/2 cup raw sugar,
- brown sugar or coconut sugar
  - 6 TBS coconut oil
  - 6 TBS molasses
  - 1 large egg
- 1-2 TBS orange zest, optional
- 3 TBS raw sugar, for rolling

In a medium mixing bowl, mix together the flour, baking soda, salt, and spices.

In a large mixing bowl, mix together the remaining ingredients except for the 3 tablespoons raw sugar.

Add the dry mix to the wet mix and stir just until combined.

Depending on the combination of ingredients used, you may need to refrigerate the dough for 1-2 hours or until the dough is firm enough to easily roll into balls. If you used coconut sugar, you must refrigerate the dough (regardless of whether or not it's firm) for at least an hour. The ones pictured were made from non-refrigerated dough.

Preheat the oven to 350 °F (175°C) and line a baking sheet with a piece of parchment paper.

Roll the dough into 40 gram balls (about 1 1/2"), roll them in the sugar, flatten them a little with the palm of your hand, and bake for 6-9 minutes.

Let the cookies cool for 3 minutes on the baking sheet and then remove to a wire rack to cool completely.

#### Caramel Apple Dump Cake

- 1 yellow cake mix
- 2 cans apple pie filling
- 2/3 cup caramel sauce

or topping

- 2 sticks butter, melted or sliced
  - 1 1/2 tsp cinnamon
















# DJ rocks Cassville past Purdy, 56-50

# Haney competes in 2018 Blue-Grey All-American Bowl

Cassville senior quarterback Shannon Haney had a surprising year. What began as a triumphant final season for the Wildcats was cut short during the final playoff game of the year with an upset for the district title going to the Mt. Vernon Mountaineers. However, the season didn't end there for Haney. He was tapped to play in the Blue-Grey All-American Bowl at the Dallas Cowboys' AT&T stadium in Dallas this Mon-

The game takes highperforming high school students from across the country and pits them against each other in an east-versus-west style game. Haney was selected to play wide receiver for the east team. The teams faced off at Cowboys Stadium at 6 p.m. on Monday night, December 15.

Haney played under head coach and offensive coordinator George Teague, who did two stints with the Dallas Cowboys, one in 1996 and another from 1998 to 2001. He also worked with wide receiver coach Michael Ray Garvin, formerly of the Arizona Cardinals and the Detroit Lions.

Haney was initially nominated to participate in the Blue-Grey Combine program in March, a less prestigious nod. Then it was there where he was asked to return for a Super Combine in June. Out of the over 6,000 participants in the program from 39 states, Haney was one of 90 asked to return for the Blue-Grey All-American Bowl.

Haney was born in Springfield and now lives in Cassville with his family.

"I've always played Cass-

ville ball," said Haney. "I started in baseball, but got in to football when I got in to Mighty Mites."

Several elements led to Haney's success. Though a great deal of the credit for his physical ability should go to Haney himself for his raw aptitude on the gridiron, he still credits the important people in his life for his success

Though he has had a spectacular career throughout high school, Haney doesn't plan on returning to the field for college in the fall.

"This is probably the end of football for me," said Haney. "I'm off to University of Arkansas in the fall to study Chemical Engineering. I want to work on oil tankers and fuel lines overseas."

On Monday night, the team representing the West edged out a narrow victory over Haney and the team from the East 40-34. No individual stats were available for Haney at the time of printing.





"It started out pretty small," said Pendergraft. "But every year, it gets bigger and bigger. This year just about every building on the place is lit up."

"I spent a pretty good chunk of change on these computer controllers," said Pendergraft. "It syncs all of the lights up to an FM radio station I have it tuned to. The lights dance to the music.

"It's my first year working with the computer controllers. I'm still new at it, and I'm still playing with it to get a better handle on it. Next year, I want to get some color-changing RGB lights to go with them."

Pendergraft is a fan of the holidays and enjoys the comments he gets from people about how much joy they derive from the light show every year.

"People call and leave messages and message me on Facebook," said Pendergraft. "They tell me my lights really brightened up the holidays for them. It just makes me feel good to put a smile on people's faces."

Pendergraft has faced some personal tragedy that has almost kept him from moving forward with his display in the recent past.

"Last year I nearly quit," said Pendergraft. "My grandma died, and I just wasn't really feeling up to it. But then, I decided that I would go bigger. This year I also lost my dad, which was a shock."

Pendergraft went on to thank his wife, Jennifer, whose help on the lights was nothing short of invaluable, as well as their four children, Jessie, 21; Calob 17; Shelbie, 14; and Grayson, 3.

"It really takes a little bit to get them in the mood, but once we all get started with

"This keeps getting bigger and better each year," said Pendergraft. "To me, it's the only good way to finish the year. I love putting smiles on people's faces."



Barry County's numbers were 48 total with 11 of those button bucks and 37 does. No antlered bucks were taken in Barry County.

Archery deer hunting continues through Jan. 15,







an out of the box, come as you are experience. We want to encourage conversation.



# The rich history of mistletoe

The holiday season is filled with traditions and customs involving plants, notes University of Missouri Extension horticulturist David Trinklein. Mistletoe has a particularly rich history in European folklore, said Trinklein. In 18th-century England, people fashioned mistletoe into balls adorned with ornaments, ribbons and evergreens. Legend has it that kissing under a mistletoe ball would lead to lasting friendship or serious romance. If a girl remained unkissed under mistletoe, she could not expect to marry in the next

In the Middle Ages, people hung branches of mistletoe from the ceilings of their homes to ward off evil spirits and witches. Druids used mistletoe from oak trees in pagan rituals such as animal sacrifices. They considered mistletoe to be sacred and a symbol of peace and harmony. Folklore says enemies would meet under a tree bearing mistletoe, lay down weapons, exchange greetings and observe a truce until the next day.

Scandinavians also used mistletoe to make a truce be-

tween warring parties and quarrelsome spouses. This practice may be linked to myths of the Norse god, Balder. His mother, Frigga, had a dream in which he was killed. Fearing the dream was prophetic, Frigga commanded all objects to vow never to harm Balder. The trickster god Loki learned she had overlooked one item: mistletoe. Loki duped Balder's blind brother, Hod, into fatally shooting Balder with an arrow tipped with mistletoe. The tears Frigga shed turned into the pearly white berries of the mistletoe. Frigga decreed that everyone who stands under the mistletoe should offer a kiss as a token of love.

The mistletoe commonly used in U.S. holiday decora-

tion is native to North America and grows as a parasite on trees such as apple, poplar, linden and, rarely, oak. American mistletoe is commercially harvested in New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma, where it is the state flower.

Both American and European mistletoe are poisonous because of toxic proteins found in all parts of the plant, including its berries. "Many retail outlets hesitate to sell it," Trinklein said. "What you buy as mistletoe is probably plastic or synthetic."

If using real mistletoe for holiday decoration, keep it out of the reach of children and pets. Do not hang mistletoe where children can pick up fallen berries.



# How to send winter pests packing

Six-legged pests want to share your warm home this winter.

University of Missouri Extension horticulturist Tamra Reall tells how to send crawling freeloaders packing.

These unwelcome visitors are mostly a lethargic nuisance. They do not bite, suck blood or spread disease. They like nice, dry spots, usually between your home's walls. They go dormant and sleep throughout most of the winter. Occasionally, however, these wayward bugs become social and decide to hang out in the living area of your home. If that happens, remember the not-so-Emily-Post rule of thumb for hosts: Guests, like fish, start to stink after three days. Throw them out.

Insecticides and pesticides are likely ineffective. For best results, give them the boot by manually removing them. The vacuum cleaner is your ally in evicting these invaders.

Look for them on the sunny side of your home. They like heat that reflects off light-colored siding and glass. They like windowsills, door thresholds and other entry points. Caulking keeps them out and keeps the heat in. Put out the "no vacancy" sign by putting screens on doors, windows and vents.

These bugs like to spend their snowbird months in Missouri homes:

Multicolored Asian lady beetle. This exotic ladybug is no lady. It varies in color from pale tan to deep reddish-orange. Some sport spots; others prefer to go au naturel.

Boxelder bug. This native pest likes to live where boxelder (a common maple) trees grow. They are mostly black with red-edged wings.

Cluster fly. Black, hairy and a little larger than houseflies, they like to hang together, as their name implies.

Brown marmorated stink bug. These stink bugs really do stink. A lot. They also will make your vacuum cleaner smell vile too, so remove them by hand or use this technique recommended by Virginia Tech researchers: Fill a foil roasting pan with water and a few drops of dish soap. Place the pan where bugs are present and point a light into it. The light attracts bugs and they will fall into the soapy water and drown. # CHS FFA makes donation to Transportation Department HSRA grant help CoxHealth


















# ISRA grant help CoxHealth fight opioid addiction

Patients in rural areas of the Ozarks utilizing opioids for pain relief will soon have more help to avoid becoming addicted to their medications. The support is thanks to a \$790,395 grant from the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) to add behavioral health to patients' care plans.


The grant will outfit rural CoxHealth clinics with telemedicine equipment so patients may be seen virtually for behavioral health needs. Through the program, patients have access to mental health treatment, substance abuse counseling as well as chronic disease management services. For long-term mental health or addiction-based needs, patients will be referred to specialty care and community services.

To be eligible for the program, patients must have a pain-related diagnosis, two to four co-occurring chronic conditions and an active opioid prescription. Qualifying pain-related conditions include headache, fibromyalgia, chronic pain and lower back pain. Medical conditions include diabetes, COPD, chronic heart failure and hypertension.

"While opioids can help relieve pain, abuse and addiction to them is a rising concern across the country and in our region," says Lisa Alexander, president of the CoxHealth Foundation, who secured the grant funding. "We believe that this initiative is another way to link patients to the best methods of addressing both their physical and mental pain so they can return to a healthy life, stopping potential abuse before it starts."

Currently, it's estimated that more than 2,500 patients will be served by this program in 11 CoxHealth clinics in eight communities: Aurora, Branson, Branson West, Cassville, Crane, Monett, Mount Vernon and Shell Knob.

The program is set to begin in the fall of 2018. It is an expansion of CoxHealth's Primary Care Behavioral Health (PCBH), which began in 2012.


