

Suspect arrested after allegedly crashing into two Sheriff's vehicles, attempting to hit a third

A Seligman man was charged with multiple felonies after allegedly fleeing from officers while intoxicated, hitting two different Sheriff's Deputy patrol vehicles and attempting to hit a third. Officers had to disable the suspect's vehicle and use a Taser to finally subdue him while he was allegedly under the influence of methamphetamine. James R. Sickles, 42, of Seligman, is charged with three counts of assault in the first degree-attempting to cause serious physical injury to a special victim, two counts of property damage in the first degree, resisting arrest for a felony by fleeing-creating a substantial risk for injury or death to another person and one count of DWI.

According to the affidavit of probable cause by the Barry County Sheriff's Department, officers were dispatched to a residence on Farm Road 10875 in Purdy for a suspicious subject who appeared to be under the influence on December 23. When officers arrived, the caller said he had left in a green passenger car, travelling south on the farm road.

One of the officers met the vehicle and activated his emergency lights, but Sickles kept driving after, veering off the road onto the grass and eventually got to Highway 37.

Another officer engaged in the pursuit south of HH Highway on Highway 37. The two officers, Deputy Zabala and Deputy Lombard, attempted to box Sickles in but were unsuccessful.

Sickles turned onto Highway U, according to officers, and drove in the oncoming lane multiple times before making an abrupt turn into a driveway, driving through the residence's yard and in a ditch before going back onto U, hitting the Sheriff's vehicle, driven by Lombard, head on. Sickles kept driving.

Deputy Zabala caught up with Sickles, driving alongside the vehicle. Sickles then rammed the passenger side of Zabala's patrol car. Another vehicle became involved in the pursuit and Sickles attempted to ram Deputy Kissinger's patrol vehicle. Kissinger avoided the impact, and Sickles continued driving, heading south in the northbound lane of traffic.

After Sickles drove into the ditch again, Sickles tried to get back onto the highway. Officers used a pursuit intervention technique to disable James' vehicle.

Once out of his vehicle, Sickles continued to resist arrest before officers had to use a Taser to overtake him.

Sickles admitted to using methamphetamine after being placed in custody. A warrant was issued for Sickles' blood sample and he presented with signs of methamphetamine intoxication, including severe perspiration in cold weather, dilated pupils and flushed skin.

The overall damage to the patrol cars was over \$10,000. Sickles is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$75,000 cash-only bond. He is scheduled for an initial appearance in court on December 28.

Central Crossing Fire announces promotions, awards at banquet

The Central Crossing Fire Protection District recently held their annual awards banquet, honoring the achievements of the hardworking firefighters and first responders who volunteer their time and talents to the district. This year, 10 firefighters were honored for their achievements.

Central Crossing Fire Chief Rusty Rickard presented the awards to the firefighters at Tuesday's banquet. Each year, they hold the event to honor and recognize those who do so much as volunteers. This year, awards were given for dedication to the department as well as recognitions for years of service.

This year, Central Crossing promoted five volunteers. Preston Forsythe was promoted from firefighter to driver engineer. Steven Gerleve was promoted from firefighter to captain. Mike Price was promoted from captain to battalion one. Ed Hoefler was promoted from captain to battalion two. Finally, Kyle Moore was promoted from lieutenant to battalion three.

The district also awarded firefighters for their time served. Firefighters from the department had years of service milestones from five years to 25 years. Officers with years

of service milestones were honored with a pin for their shirt and a certificate. The firefighter with the most of service was Doug Stockton with 25 years. Other firefighters honored for years of service were: Preston Forsythe, Steven Gerleve and Rick Evans, five years; Matt Privett and Kyle Moore, ten years; Tonya Rickard, 15 years; and Sandra Wilson, 20 years.

The district also awarded firefighters with three special and distinct awards: the fully involved award, first responder of the year award and the firefighter of the year award. This year's fully involved award was awarded to Steven Gerleve. Gerleve was presented the awarded for his hours of training and responses throughout the previous year. This year, Gerleve had a total of 289 hours for the department. Of those, Gerleve had training classes with 139 logged activity hours and 150 hours of training. Gerleve also had 36 training classes, showing his dedication to the department. Rickard noted that his work schedule keeps him out of the district for a third of the time.

The first responder of the year award was presented to Matt Privett. Each year, the first responder award is given for an individual's response to

medical calls as well as training attended. Privett had a total of 233 hours. Of those, 67 were training hours and 166 were activity hours. Last year, Privett went to 101 medical calls and 61 fire calls as well as 23 training classes. Privett's work schedule limits his attendance to 54 percent.

Finally, the firefighter of the year award was presented to Preston Forsythe. Each year, the award is presented based on fire call response and the amount of training attended. Forsythe had a total of 121 fire-related calls and 62 medical calls. Overall, Forsythe had 132 activity and on-call hours for a total of 247 hours for the year. Forsythe responded to 183 calls last year. Forsythe

also had almost a perfect training attendance at 45 training classes.

The banquet is the culmination of year for Central Crossing to give firefighters recognition for their hard work throughout the year.

Cassville woman charged with forging \$2,686 worth of checks

A Cassville woman was arrested and charged with forging checks last week. According to the affidavits of probable cause filed by the Cassville Police Department, Gina Renee Norris, 32, of Cassville, forged three separate checks in the amount of \$2,686.

The probable cause states that Norris was interviewed at the Cassville Police Department on Wednesday, December 20. Norris allegedly admitted to forging the check owners' name on three different checks before taking them to Freedom Bank to be cashed. In all, Norris received \$2,686 from the checks.

Norris told officers she got the checks from the victim's son while he was staying with his mother at the time. Norris claimed the victim's son told her to forge the name.

Norris is charged with forgery and is currently being held in the Barry County

Jail in lieu of a \$20,000 cash-only bond. Norris has other charges pending from earlier in December, as well. She was charged with delivery of a controlled substance, possession of a controlled substance and stealing as a fourth or subsequent offense in ten years on December 7.

Wildcats drop Galena at Holiday Tournament

The Cassville Wildcats shook off an early challenge and rolled to a 69-48 win over Galena in the opening round of the 35th Annual Southwest Holiday Tournament. DJ White led the ‘Cats with 17 points in front of a festive crowd at the Washburn gym.

The Galena Bears rolled with the punches throughout the first quarter, and held a 13-10 lead when sharpshooter Coby Sartin dropped a trey from the right wing at the 3:27 mark. But the Wildcats recovered and claimed a 17-15 lead when Carson Roller scored with an offensive board to end the quarter.

Despite protests, no technicals were awarded and play proceeded with just five Wildcats on the floor.

From that point, Cassville took control of the game. The 5-point lead grew to 11 at halftime as Wilson and Ethan Hoppes cranked up the scoring tempo. The lead doubled in the first six minutes of the third quarter. Threeballs from Derek Christy and DJ White pushed the lead to 55-33 with 2:13 on the clock. Luke Lowery rolled in a left-handed hook and Hoppes scored again, and Cassville led 59-33 at the final break.

The margin grew to 30 in the final period. A pair of free throws by White created a 63-33 score. Cassville’s delay game was ragged in the closing minutes, allowing Galena to cut the score to a more respectable 69-48 at the buzzer.

First Day Hikes slated for January 1 at Roaring River, Big Sugar Creek

Next week will ring in a new year, and area state parks are celebrating with an honored tradition: first day hikes. Hikes will take place locally at both Roaring River State Park and Big Sugar Creek State Park on Monday, January 1. Each year, all 50 states promote their state parks by holding First Day Hikes. The tradition began over 20 years ago at a state park in Massachusetts. The symbolism was tied to starting a new healthy lifestyle in a new year, and also showing how recre-

ation can be enjoyed all year in state parks, not just during warm weather. The first hike, 20 years ago, was at Blue Hills Reservation in Milton, Massachusetts. Roaring River State Park has participated in the first day hike program for a number of years. This year, the hike will be the Devil's Kitchen Trail at the park. Devil's Kitchen is a one and a half mile trail, and the guided First Day Hike will start last about two hours.

The First Day hike at Roaring River will began at 9 a.m. The hike is free and open to the public. The press release by the park states: "Devil's Kitchen Trail's name is derived from an odd rock outcrop that formed a room-like enclosure. According to legend, this room, which has since collapsed, was used as a hideout by Civil War guerrillas. This trail showcases other geologic features such as caves, a spring, the geologic bench and different landscapes and plants associated with them." The Big Sugar Creek State Park hike will be on the Ozark Chinquapin Trail. The trail is two and a half a miles and is expected to last three hours.

A press releases states: "Ozark Chinquapin Trail winds through Elk River Breaks Natural Area for those who want to enjoy the beauty and solitude of the area. The trail follows a small bedrock stream, which is surrounded with steep hills on both sides. The trail then climbs into the upland woodlands and glades, with opportunities to see local plants and animals, and some wonderful views across the rugged Elk River landscape." For both hikes, Missouri State Parks recommends dressing appropriately for the weather and bringing water and snacks. Roaring River will also be hosting an eagle viewing event toward the end of January. On January 20, eagle viewing will take place at 3 p.m. They will show a short video. They recommend bringing binoculars and dressing for the weather. Meet at the Ozark Chinquapin Nature Center at Roaring River State Park. For more information about either hike or eagle viewing, call Roaring River at (417) 847-3742.

Have a happy, safe start to 2018

The Missouri State Highway Patrol encourages everyone to make good decisions regarding their New Year’s celebration. A traffic crash would be an unfortunate way to begin 2018.

Last year over the New Year’s holiday counting period, eight people died and 302 people were injured in 539 traffic crashes during the 2017 New Year’s holiday counting period. Thus, a person was killed or injured every 15.1 minutes during that time frame.

New Year’s is a great opportunity to spend time with friends and family. Many Missourians will plan special gatherings to welcome 2018. If your plans include alcohol, remember that nothing ruins a party like a DWI arrest or a drinking-related traffic crash on your way home. Designate a sober driver before the party starts. The roadway is no place for a driver who has been drinking. If you cause a traffic crash, your New Year might begin with being arrested, facing legal fees and medical bills, and perhaps jail time! You could lose your license and will have to face your family and friends. If you kill or injure someone, you’ll pay the price for the rest of your life. No one wants to begin 2018 in jail. Be smart! Designate a sober driver or take a taxi.

As you drive to your New Year’s gathering, remember to buckle up and obey all traffic laws. Be a courteous driver: When in doubt, yield the right-of-way. Pay attention and use your turn signal to communicate your intentions to other drivers. The posted speed limit reflects the roadway’s classification and is not a suggestion! There’s no reason to speed—the party starts after you arrive safely.

If inclement weather is expected, allow extra time for traveling or be flexible with your plans. The Road Condition Report number is 1-888-275-6636. Depending on the weather, staying home might be your best option. Remember: Missouri law states if you’re using your windshield wipers, your headlights must be turned on. It takes only a second to turn on your vehicle’s headlights. That second could make you more visible to other drivers and prevent a traffic crash.

The only 100 percent survivable traffic crash is the one that never happens. Make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly restrained in a seat belt or child restraint. Every day as we travel on Missouri’s roadways, we trust that every driver on the road is going to obey the speed limit, pay attention, and drive sober. “Don’t Violate The Trust.”

Soils & Crops offers wide range of topics for 89th annual conference

University of Missouri Extension offers information to help local producers manage their bottom line by bringing Your University of Missouri to your backyard. The 2018 conference topics are: mineral supplementation for the beef herd, soybeans and dicamba, preparing for 2017's income taxes, and a panel discussing how to get locally produced beef into your child's school. All of this will be presented at the 89th Annual Barry County Soils & Crops Conference, January 9.

"The topics raised by our 2018 Soil and Crops planning committee of Barry Co. producers were profound," said Barry Co. Extension program director Reagan Bluel. "The lineup of speakers will engage attendees of all aspects of agriculture."

Barry County beef producers, close neighbors with Mt. Vernon, have taken notice of the pilot program "MoBeef". For the past school year, this program has been serving locally produced Lawrence County beef to the Mt. Vernon school district. Barry County incarcerates 11 in the month of November

• **Michael Dale Ash**, of Sarcoxie, pled guilty to distribution of a controlled substance. Ash received five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections of which he will serve 120 days shock time.

On September 6, 2015, the Monett Police Department initiated a traffic stop where Ash was the driver. When pulled over, the passenger in his car fled on foot. When Ash was detained and the vehicle searched, officers found methamphetamine, hydrocodones, digital scales, marijuana and empty bags. When Ash gave officers permission to search his cell phone, they found multiple messages where he was conducting drug sales for controlled substances, including pills.

• **Benjamin James Christiansen**, of Seligman, pled guilty to possession of a chemical with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance, resisting arrest by fleeing - creating a substantial risk of injury or death, and possession of a controlled substance in 2013. Christiansen's probation has since been revoked and he is to serve five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In October 2011, the Southwest Missouri Drug Task Force initiated a traffic stop after a passenger in a vehicle purchased pseudoephedrine and then made multiple traffic violations. While speaking to the occupants of the vehicle, Christiansen, a passenger, was seen hiding syringes and a spoon under the seat of the car. Christiansen then identified himself using a false name to avoid going to jail.

Once officers investigated, they believed Christiansen was trading methamphetamine to the driver for a box of pseudoephedrine pills.

In April 2013, officers found four credit cards in Christiansen's wallet that did not belong to him as well as someone else's identification.

When officers tried to initiate a traffic stop, Christiansen sped away, crossing into the opposite lane and exceeding speeds of 80 miles per hour. Christiansen ran multiple people off the road while he was speeding away. Eventually, he crashed his vehicle and ran on foot.

When officers inventoried the vehicle, they found 1.1 grams of methamphetamine and three syringes.

• **George James Daniels**, of Seligman, pled guilty to endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree in 2015. Daniels' probation has since been revoked and he is to serve three years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On October 14, 2013, the Monett Police Department was dispatched to a domestic disturbance. Officers discovered that Daniels kicked in the door of his girlfriend's residence and held her and her three children in the home against their will with a knife.

Daniels cut one of the children's arms while waving the knife around, attempted to choke one with their jacket and almost cut the third child.

Officers recovered an 18 inch knife at the scene.

• **Jackson Michael Dempsey**, of Monett, pled guilty to burglar in the second degree and receiving stolen property. Dempsey received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On November 29, 2016, Dempsey was involved in a burglary of The Beer Cave in Monett. Dempsey and others were seen on video breaking into the business, stealing two cash bags that contained around \$500, stealing \$200 from the register and stealing approximately \$1,935.31 in cigarettes and alcohol.

Dempsey is to serve probation until November 20,

2022.

• **Elizabeth Jessi Edwards**, of Bentonville, Ark., pled guilty to burglary in the second degree and theft/stealing of \$500 to \$25,000 in value in 2016. Edwards was initially granted a suspended imposition of sentencing and supervised probation. Edwards' probation was revoked and she was given a suspended execution of a five year incarceration sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On April 8, 2016, Edwards attempted to break into a home on Air Park Drive in Golden by prying open a door, but could not. Edwards then used a dry-wall saw to force the lock on a sliding glass door and stole over \$500 worth of items from the residence. Items stolen included food, silverware, towels, blankets, trash bags, sandwich bags, toilet tissue, paper towels and other items.

Edwards is to serve probation until November 21, 2022.

• **Landon James Gray**, of Cassville, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Gray received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On March 5, 2017, Gray was pulled over for speeding on Main Street in Cassville. Gray appeared nervous when officers pulled him over and when they asked if he had anything illegal in the vehicle, he replied, "I'm going to jail."

When officers searched his vehicle they found multiple items of drug paraphernalia like pipes and containers that all contained drug and marijuana residue.

Gray is to serve probation until November 20, 2022.

• **Cody Lee Hill**, of Pea Ridge, Ark., pled guilty to resisting arrest for a felony by fleeing-creating a substantial risk of injury or death. Hill received a suspended imposition of sentencing and three years supervised probation.

On July 19, 2016, officers attempted to pull Hill over for speeding. When officers pursued him, Hill exceeded 110 miles per hour and drove recklessly to get away from officers. Once detained, Hill stated he ran because he had warrants.

Hill is to serve probation until November 6, 2020.

• **Kahdijah Shalle Houston**, of Liberty, pled guilty to two counts of theft/stealing of \$500 or less. Houston received a suspended execution of a 60 day jail incarceration sentence and two years unsupervised probation.

On May 8, 2014, the Monett Walmart had two adults leave the store empty handed, but two children with them pushed full carts out of the lawn and garden entrance to a waiting vehicle. In total, \$1,444.33 worth of merchandise was stolen. The suspects were identified when they returned to Walmart a couple days later.

Houston is to serve probation until November 27, 2019.

• **Robert Wadell Johnson**, of Washburn, pled guilty to burglary in the second degree in 2016. Johnson's probation has since been revoked and he is to

serve five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In December 2015, Johnson was the driver of a vehicle that served as the getaway vehicle for a burglary in Pierce City.

- **Geoffrey Shawn Kramer**, of Exeter, made an Alford plea to burglary in the second degree and theft/stealing of \$500 to \$25,000 in value in 2014. Kramer's probation was revoked, and he is to serve five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.
- On February 20, 2013, Kramer broke into a residence in Monett and stole an air compressor worth more than \$500.
- **Loni Dailene Kraus**, of Wichita, Kan., pled guilty to forgery. Kraus was sentenced to five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections of which she will serve 120 days of shock time.
- On December 2, 2016, Kraus purchased \$332.90 at the Cassville Walmart on a stolen credit card.
- **Dakota Leevi Morgan**, of Mt. Vernon, pled guilty to possession of a controlled

substance. Morgan received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On May 11, 2017, Morgan's vehicle was investigated for being abandoned. Inside the vehicle, officers found a metal wallet that contained two clear plastic straws with white residue on them. Morgan told officers the car was his while they were investigating.

Morgan is to serve probation until November 20, 2022.

- **Carl R. Nagy, III** pled guilty to nonsupport in each of six individual months in a 12 month period in 2010. Nagy's probation has since been revoked and he is to serve four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.
- As of January 16, 2008, Nagy was behind on child support \$15,374.62.
- **Frank Martin Ricketts**, of Monett, pled guilty to tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree. Ricketts received three years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.
- On July 9, 2017, Ricketts failed to return a 2004

Volkswagen Passat after borrowing it. Ricketts then abandoned the vehicle at a convenience store in Mt. Vernon.

- **Sherman A. Saylor**, of Eagle Rock, pled guilty to stealing. Saylor was sentenced to 60 days incarceration in jail.
- On September 9, 2017, a Sony Play Station, controllers worth over \$750 were stolen from an apartment on Farm Road 1218 in Eagle Rock. Saylor sold the Play Station to someone else, who identified him as the party who was in possession of them.
- **Dylan Scott**, of Verona, pled guilty to five counts of property damage in the first degree in 2015. Scott was initially granted a suspended imposition of sentencing and supervised probation. - **Kenny Dale Shepard**, of Hoberg, pled guilty to endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree as a first offense and failure to register as a sex offender. Shepard received a suspended execution of a seven year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections on the endangering charge and four years with the execution suspended on the failure to register charge. Shepard was also given five years supervised probation.
- On May 31, 2016, Shepard was passed out from alcohol intoxication and officers found his two year old child walking down Farm Road 1065 in Purdy at 10 p.m. It took officers ten minutes to wake Shepard up. They also found marijuana pipes with residue.

At that same time, it was discovered that Shepard had failed to register as a sex offender at his address. Shepard was convicted of statutory rape in the second degree in Golden. The victim was a 12 year old girl.

Shepard is to serve probation until November 21, 2022.

- **Cuitlahuac Sierra**, of Neosho, pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears in excess of 12 monthly payments. Sierra received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years unsupervised probation.
- As of March 17, 2015, Sierra was \$22,444.22 in arrears on child support.

- **Bobby Joe Smith**, of Monett, pled guilty to three counts of distribution of a controlled substance. Smith was sentenced to six years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.
- On November 16, 2016, Smith sold methamphetamine for a second time to a confidential source in Monett. The first buy had been on October 26. When a search warrant was executed, Smith was in possession of a digital scale, baggies for distribution, spoons of crystal substance, a drug ledger, marijuana, Fentanyl patches, and drug paraphernalia.
- **Joseph Wayne Thurman**, of Stella, pled guilty to tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree in August 2017. His probation has since been revoked and he is to serve five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.
- On August 18, 2016,

Thurman wrecked someone else's car. The car was recovered in Newton County, and it had been stolen from a woman in Monett.

- **Ernest Anthony Torres, Jr.**, of Aurora, pled guilty to burglary in the first degree in 2016. Torres' probation has since been revoked and he is to serve ten years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.
- On June 11, 2013, Torres was inside someone's home in Monett without permission. When the occupants found him there, going through drawers, he didn't speak. The resident escorted Torres out. After, it was discovered that Torres had stolen a ring and a bottle of Xanax.
- **Christopher Aaron Trobaugh**, of Monett, pled guilty to two counts of possession of a controlled substance and endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree as a first offense. Trobaugh was sentenced to five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections with the execution of that sentence suspended and five years supervised probation.
- On June 20, 2017, officers in Monett were dispatched after receiving a call that two people were asleep in a van with a baby crying inside. When officers spoke with the driver, Trobaugh, they found that he was in possession of hydrocodones. Officers also found a burnt spoon and used syringe. The syringe and spoon were found near the seven month old baby's shoes.
- Trobaugh is to serve probation until November 20, 2022.
