First medical marijuana licenses awarded; Cassville to get cultivation facility

It's official: Cassville will be the site of a medical marijuana cultivation operation in 2020. Holistic Missouri, LLC, part of the larger Holistic Industries, earned three of the coveted 60 licenses awarded across the state. The cultivation facilities Holistic Missouri applied for and received will be in Cassville, Kansas City and Sunrise Beach.

Holistic Industries has marijuana facilities in California, Maryland, Washington, D.C., Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and Michigan. It is owned by founder and CEO Josh Genderson who began the business after serving as president of his family's third-generation liquor store in Washington, D.C.

In the Missouri medical marijuana world, December was a big month. While initially, the Department of Health and Senior Services was slated to approve or deny all medical marijuana facility licenses by December 31, a new time line was released, pushing the final decision on infused manufacturing facilities and dispensaries back into January. However, for testing laboratories, transportation companies and cultivation applicants, they were notified of the fate of their applications before the end of 2019.

For the companies who have heard yes or no on the fate of their medical marijuana business ventures, Barry County had only one approval thus far. Of the cultivation, transportation and testing lab applicants across the state, the only one in Barry County that made the cut was Holistic Missouri, LLC, despite other applications being filed.

In all, Holistic Missouri applied for 13 different licenses across the state: three cultivation, seven dispensaries, and three infused manufacturing licenses.

The other applicants from Barry County for cultivation and transportation were denied. The transportation company that applied for a license was under the name SickBudz, LLC, in Wheaton. That application was denied earlier in December.

Ozark Leaf Farms, LLC, in Aurora, Samuel Myers, in Seligman, and Sho Me Genetics, LLC, in Eagle Rock, were all denied cultivation licenses.

Ozark Mountain Green, LLC, in Shell Knob, applied on the Stone County side but was also denied a cultivation license. Ozark Mountain Green's infused manufacturing license is still pending.

The next deadline for businesses hoping for licenses will be January 10 when DHSS announced they will be awarding infused manufacturing licenses. In Barry County, infused manufacturing licenses were

applied for by Choice Extracts, LLC, in Monett, Holistic Missouri, LLC, and Ozark Mountain Green, LLC.

Dispensaries will be the last

to hear the fate of their applications. DHSS will award or deny licensure on January 24. Barry County's dispensary applicants are: Dr. Lisa Roark, MD, under

The Dispensary, LLC, in Cassville, and two in Monett under Horizon Growth, LLC, and Monett Dispensary, LLC.

Horizon Growth, LLC, also

\$2 million grant allows Monett Schools to fund after school program, adult education

In this day and age, with more parents doubling their workforce efforts than ever before, the necessity for afterschool programs

has never been higher. Recognizing this need, the Monett School District announced plans to use funds from a recently secured grant to move forward with

a variety of new after school programs for district stu-

On October 4, it was announced that the district was one of 20 schools in

Missouri to be awarded a grant that will enable the district to fund two new programs. Offered through the Department of Education, the 21st Century Community Learning Center Grant will provide \$2 million in funding for five years for the purposes of creating and maintaining an

The first of these programs, set to begin when the district resumes classes on January 6, is a new after school program called the Cub House.

after school program.

According to David Williams, director of Monett Alternative Education Academy and writer of the grant that brought the funds to the district, this new program was founded after an underlying need was recognized within the community.

"Our demographics have a high free and reduced rate," explained Williams. "What that means is we have some students with some economic needs. That usually also means that often times, both parents in the home are working or older siblings are having to take care of their younger siblings."

Williams, having been familiar with the program after being tasked to direct a similar program in a previous district, applied for the grant in July. He explained that programs such as these have a profound impact on the student population.

When the program begins in January, it will allow students from preschool all the way through middle school to have a place to go after school that will offer fun, educational activities in a safe environment.

"For school age children pre-k through eighth grade, we're going to be able

to fund a three hour after school program every day," sait Williams. "We'll start the day off with a recess break of sorts. After that, Life360 will provide a snack for our students."

Life360 Community Services is a Springfield-based charitable organization that provides a variety of essential services, including nutrition, housing, affordable daycare and many others.

From that point, the program will shift focus, engaging students in fun, non-graded educational activities.

"Then, we will have a reading time for thirty minutes, where we'll have special guests come in and read from time to time," Williams explained. "We'll have local teachers, our superintendent and principals, as well as some politicians have been asked to come and read. Grandparents can

January

Cassville's Mr. and Miss Merry Christmas pageant reported raising a record \$16,402 to benefit OACAC's Share Your Christmas toy drive. Mr. and Miss Merry Christmas winners the previous year were senior candidates Morgan Popanz and Evan Kessinger.

Security Bank of Cassville underwent a change of leadership. After saying goodbye to long-time vice president Jeff Parsons, bank welcomed management Colorado transplant Steve Slagle to Cassville.

Southwest High School hosted its annual girls basketball Holiday Tournament. The Wheaton Lady Bulldogs took first place after a grueling series of

Barry County officials were sworn into office, including newly elected county clerk Jill LeCompte, who took over for Gary Youngblood. Youngblood himself vacated the seat after being elected as the county's new presiding commissioner. Other officials sworn in included: Amy Boxx, prosecuting attorney; Craig Williams, circuit clerk; Johnnie Cox, judge; Bob Foulke, judge; and Lois Lowe, trea-

The city of Seligman was $awarded\ a\ \$50K\ grant\ from$ the Department of Natural Resources for the purposes of conducting a sewer improvement study.

The city of Cassville elected to form an Industrial Development authority in order to improve economic development in the area. Additionally, the city hired full-time economic developer Isaac Petersen to aid in the same goal.

The first 2019 baby was born in Barry County. Mississippi Wade Farris was born to parents Matt and Paige on January 3.

Wheaton Lady Bulldog basketball player Hallie Mitchell scored her 1,000th point while leading her team to a 62-29 victory over Galena.

The community mourned the loss of local bull rider Mason Lowe, who tragically lost his life after sustaining injuries during a professional ride in Denver, Colo.

Two Barry County citizens were appointed to state offices by Missouri Governor Mike Parson. Shell Knob native Scott Fitzpatrick was appointed to serve as the state's 47th treasurer. Additionally, local attorney David Cole was appointed to the Health Facilities Review committee.

Governor Parson made an appearance in Cassville as the special guest speaker at Cassville's 2019 Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

February

At a public meeting, superintendent Cassville Dr. Richard Asbill revealed that a former Cassville teacher, James Doyle "J.D." Riddle, who had passed away some months prior, had in his will to leave \$1 million of his life savings to the school. This money was used to create a new series of scholarships for Cassville graduates pursuing educational fields.

Purdy School District wrapped construction on a new facility that serves as a FEMA shelter, early childhood center and performing arts center.

Local quilter Vickie Clancy was honored with her own exhibit at the Barry County Museum from the beginning of February through March of 2019.

Mercy's Cassville Clinic bid farewell to Dr. Jamie Zengotita after 14 years of dedicated service to the community.

After some debate and a 3 to 1 vote on the council, the city of Cassville elected to allow fireworks to be detonated within city limits on selected days on and around

Amid rumor and some controversy, Cassville's Country Dodge dealership closed without warning, with the facility remaining vacant for months to come.

Exeter High named seniors Clayton Elders and Julia Grant as their 2019 Homecoming royalty ahead of their tip-off game.

Dozens of citizens met at the Clio Community

Building on February 19 to engage in a public forum regarding the fate of the historic Jenkins Bridge.

Cassville Wildcat wrestler Keaton Artherton took fourth place at the 2019 MSHSAA State Wrestling championships.

Wheaton's Lady Bulldog team went on to become district champions after a hard-fought 60-54 victory over the College Heights Lady Cougars.

To benefit a school choir trip, Purdy High School hosted a murder mystery dinner.

March

Crowder College's Cassville campus broke ground on a historic \$2.1 Million renovation plan.

The Cassville OACAC Neighborhood center hosted a benefit, where local bluegrass act the Homestead Pickers performed. The benefit raised money for the center's emergency fund for families in need.

for resurfacing project

At a city council meeting on Monday, December 9, the Seligman board of alderman elected to move forward on a major resurfacing project nearly a year in the making.

Since the beginning of this year, the board has been making strides to ensure that a major road in town, Frost Street, receives the repaving that it was targeted for at the beginning of the year. In order to do this, the city has accepted a bid from Hutchens Construction in the amount of \$89, 486.75.

According to city clerk Brian Nichols, the repaving is a crucial step in maintaining the road's drivability. Though the road is drivable in its current condition, given the popularity of the street with commuters, city representatives elected to pursue preventive measures to keep the street from succumbing to erosion.

"It's general road maintenance," explained Nichols. "As the roads deteriorate, we need to keep them fresh. That road is heavily travelled. Out of the vast majority of the roads in town, that one sees the most use. So, it makes sense to put some money into keeping it drivable."

The process for seeking bids for this project began in April, when the board of Aldermen formally passed a resolution to seek bids for the project. According to Nichols, Hutchens was one of the first companies to enter a bid for the project at that time, and has continuously been on the city's radar since the project began.

Despite receiving bids early into the process, the city opted to continue seeking bids multiple times throughout the year. According to Nichols, this was done in an attempt to ensure that they had a diverse field of bids from which to pick.

"It turned out that a lot of asphalt companies aren't really interested in this small of a project," said Nichols.

The project will see the resurfacing of an estimated 3,000 feet of road. According to Nichols, Hutchens will put a two-inch overlay of hot mix asphalt over the existing road, evening out the driving surface and further protecting the road from erosion.

Though the city accepted the bid in the amount of \$89,486.75, according the Nichols, there is a chance that recent developments could help to project come in under budget.

"There is a possibility that Hutchens could revert back to the pricing from an earlier bid," explained Nichols. "The price was raised when Hutchens was planning on moving their Seligman asphalt plant, so there were going to be additional transportation costs. As of right now, we aren't sure if that is still going to be the case."

Nichols went on to explain that the city is currently in commu-

nications with Hutchens about both the final costs and the time line for the project moving forward. As of this publication, no time line currently exists for when the resurfacing will begin.

Seligman accepts bid Man from Golden charged with rape, sodomy

A Golden man is charged with both rape and sodomy after an incident earlier in 2019. According to affidavits of probable cause filed by detective Robert Evenson, with the Barry County Sheriff's Department, Hunter Seay Williams, 20, of Golden, raped the victim in a remote area outside of Cassville sometime between September 23 and October 4, 2019.

The report states Williams drove the victim to a remote area located on Farm Road 1135 outside of Cassville before removing the victim's clothing against their will. At

that point, Williams allegedly forced the victim to perform sex acts on him before forcibly performing sex acts on the victim. The victim reported repeatedly telling Williams no and crying. The victim also suffered bruising about the legs and thighs from the assault.

Williams was booked into the Barry County Jail on December 20. He is currently being held on a \$100,000 cash-only bond. He was charged with rape in the first degree and sodomy in the first degree on December 17.

Second suspect charged in Monett robbery

TWO ALLEGEDLY HELD PATIENT AT GUNPOINT FOR PAIN MEDICATION

The second suspect was charged in the armed robbery of a cancer patient in Monett in November. Shane Eugene Smith, 33, of Purdy, was charged earlier in December but was just booked into custody on December 26. The other suspect, Shawn Scott Ice, 30, of Monett, was booked into jail on November 20.

According to affidavits of probable cause by Detective Scott Landreth, of the Monett Police Department, Smith and Ice, while wearing masks, forced their way into a home on Broadway in Monett and demanded pain medications from one of the residents who has cancer. The incident occurred on November 4 around 11:17

The two men allegedly

ordered the one victim to the floor with a rifle and demanded narcotics he was prescribed for his cancer. Then, the victim told the two he would get it for them, one struck him in the head, according to the report.

Smith also confronted the other two occupants in the home and ordered them to the floor.

The suspects allegedly left with \$1,200 cash, a pair of jeans and Fentanyl patches and dilaudid. Smith was identified by a photo on Facebook by the victims.

According to the victims, Ice had been at the residence about 45 minutes prior to the robbery, asking for pain pills. An inmate in the Monett Jail also said that Ice told the informant he and Smith had committed the crime.

Smith is charged with robbery in the first degree, armed criminal action and unlawful possession of a firearm. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$200,00 cash-only bond.

Ice is charged with robbery in the first degree, stealing - physically take, and stealing a controlled substance and is still being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$200,000 cash-only

our classes. "After that, we'll have what we call STEAM enrichment. STEAM is an acronym that stands for science, technology, engineering, art and math," continued Williams. "The kids will have two half hour activities where, they just think that they're having fun, but we're actually teaching them science principles and helping them with reading."

applied for a cultivation license in Pierce City but was denied. They also have applications for manufacturing in Pierce City and dispensary applications for Sunrise Beach, Lees Summit and Springfield.

Licensing Process

In all, 554 different applications were filed for cultivation licenses in the state. DHSS approved 60 licenses, the minimum number required by Article XIV in the Missouri Constitution. Should any of the 60 approved companies choose not to utilize their license, the state will move down the list of the next top scoring business.

To file an application, cultivation facilities had to show the background of each of their owners and principal officers/managers, including their history of business success, the site's security, positive economic impact on the community and other categories. Limiting some of the smaller operations, each business also had to show \$200,000 in liquid capital on top of the \$10,000 application fee.

The scoring system, which changed after filing opened, is the subject of multiple appeals and at least one lawsuit, claiming unfairness in the rubric system that allowed for applications of out-of-state operations preferential treatment.

Sarcoxie Nursery had a hearing on Monday, December 30. Sarcoxie Nursery, owned by the Callicoat family, went for multiple licenses, including one of the dispensaries in Monett.

Legal cannabis availability

While commercial licenses are being approved, there is still no way to legally obtain cannabis within the state unless a patient has a licensed caregiver or their personal cultivation license.

Most estimated time lines show dispensaries will open and have products available in late spring or early summer, dependent on the initial success of cultivators.



Seven ways to get organized in the new year

Coach Shore leaves behind a career of excellence on and off court

At a school board meeting on December 17, Cassville School District received the resignation of one teacher who has been at the core of the district's athletic program for two and a half decades. Basketball and cross country coach Chris Shore announced his retirement, effective at the end of this school year.

Coach Shore, himself a Cassville graduate, went on to graduate from Missouri Southern State University, in Joplin, with a degree in physical education. Shore returned to the area to teach in 1993, beginning his career as a physical education instructor and girls basketball coach in Exeter.

"It was a lot of fun," said Shore. "I didn't really know what to expect going to a small school, but the kids were really close. It was a really good experience for me. I didn't want to leave when I left, but I had more opportunities elsewhere."

According to a former ville's cross-country teams. student, Kerry Mattingly, of Exeter, the coach left a lasting impression on his students.

"Coach Shore taught us more than the game of basketball," explained Mattingly. "He taught us school pride, to have self confidence, and to play hard with endurance. The game of basketball was left long ago on the hardwoods at Exeter, but the values that he instilled in each of us is something we will carry with is forever."

Beginning with the 1995 school year, Shore left Exeter to teach and coach for Cassville. Shore has remained in the position ever since, marking this year his 25th with the district.

Shore has coached both junior high and high school girls and boys basketball teams over his tenure, but his most lasting contribution to the Cassville athletic department is as the founder and sole coach of Cass-

"That athletic director at the time said that they wanted to start a program," said Shore. "He was actually the football coach when I went to school there, and we used to run a drill called 'the graveyard'. I would always win so, I guess he thought that I was a runner and that I would be a good

According to Shore, he began the program with little background in the sport itself, starting the program from the ground up.

"It's been a blessing," said Shore. "It's been so much fun doing it. They asked me to do it and I started it from scratch. Now we have a junior high program, too. We had close to 40 runners this year. I think we had maybe 12 runners that first year."

The community has been incredibly responsive to the program. Shore explained that some of them have even stayed on to help long after their own children have graduated.

"I still have parents from that very first year who still help out when we host," Shore explained. "My start-

er has been Dan Philbrick, whose daughter ran for me on the first team. He's been involved with the program ever since."

Shore also stated that some of his fondest memories involve his own family getting involved with his coaching.

"One girl's team that stands out actually qualified for three or four years in a row," said Shore. "It had my niece, Courtney, on it. We had a great stretch and then she ended up coming to Cassville to teach. She's been my assistant every year since, and it's been a real highlight having her here with me."

Though his lasting legacy in Cassville will always be tied to cross country, some of the coach's fondest memories come from his basketball teams over the

"In basketball, we always set a goal. We never won a Big 8 conference championship," explained Shore. "One group won our first conference championship then won undefeated. That was a big win for us. They knocked the door down for us and we had six winning seasons after that."

One former student, Tracey Stoufer, said that in this time, coach Shore always pushed his teams to keep going, no matter what the odds of victory were.

"Coach Shore made sure we understood that no matter what, there is still time left," said Stoufer. "In one game our junior year, we were in the Southwest tournament. There was about 30 seconds left to play and Coach called timeout. When we came off the court he said we still have time. He drew up a play and exampled the steps very quickly to us, but we knew we could pull it off because he told us

down the court and Holly Gureski put up the shot but didn't go it. The rest of us did our part and blocked out. The ball fell my direction, and I put it back up to score the basket we needed to win. We ended up winning the tournament that year and the following year. No matter what we were up against, Coach Shore made sure we understood together we could win."

Another former student, we could. We took the ball Cassville Chamber of Commerce director Rachael Selby, said that Shore's coaching style had him involved beyond the court. According to her, coach Shore helped to shape her into the person that she is today.

"Coach Shore loves the game of basketball. He lives and breathes it, but that's all it ever was, just a game," explained Selby. "It's been the players that he's coaching that have kept him coming back year after year. His investment wasn't limited to the court. He cared about us as individuals. As women that would go out into the world someday. He loved to win games but that's not how he measures his success. He measures it through all of us and the lives we've gone on to lead."

Though wins make for nice stories, coach Shore expressed that not all of his fond memories were from victories, but rather the teams that tried their hardest on the court.

"I've had a lot of really great groups in-between, too. It's not all about wins," Shore explained. "I've had some groups that overachieved even though they only won like 11 games. I was still as proud of them as I was any of my winning

One school administrator, Cassville superintendent Dr. Richard Asbill, expressed his feelings on having worked with Shore and the legacy he leaves behind.

"I've had the privilege of working with Chris, both as colleagues and as a boss.

He's also my neighbor. He and his family have always been good friends with mine. It's been a real honor to work with Chris. He's put a lot of time in during days, evenings and mornings for practices and games. His dedication to Cassville has been outstanding and we really appreciate all his service."

This retirement hasn't come as a surprise to many who know him, according to Shore.

"It's just time. I got out of coaching high school two years ago, and that group of kids were really special to me," said Shore. "They knew that my retirement is coming close and they wanted me to go out with them, and I am."

Though the decision has been a long time coming, Shore explained that he has made it not out exasperation, but rather comfort in knowing that he's led a spectacular career.

"I'm not burned out or anything like that, it's just my time. Life is short and I want to experience what comes after this for me in phase 2."

Shore continued, explaining that he has more than a few big plans for his

newly-acquired free time.

"I've gotten into horses," explained Shore. "My oldest son is actually the coach of the ranch horse team at the University of Arkansas and when he was a young man, we got into horses.
