Library opts to hold off on asking voters for tax increase

After much deliberation, the Barry-Lawrence Regional Library board has put a proposed ballot initiative asking for additional funding from voters on hold.

Gina Milburn, director of the Barry-Lawrence Regional Library, said the board is opting to hold off on a decision regarding asking for a property tax levy until there is an exploratory survey asking voters what they would be willing to support.

She said, "One of the things we are wanting to do is a survey to gauge public response. In the survey, we want to see if people indicate that they would be willing to support a property tax increase or a sales tax."

Milburn added that there is the possibility that, instead of a property sales tax levy increase, which is what voters struck down in April 2016, it might be possible for the board to put a sales tax initiative on the ballot instead. Milburn said, "There is a state statute that allows about nine different libraries to collect sales tax. I've been in conversations with our local state senator and representatives to see if they would be willing to help us get on that statute. Either way we go, with a sales tax or property tax increase, it still goes to the voters to decide. Just because we get added to the sales tax statute doesn't mean anything if voters don't support it.

"We think it's possible that people would be more supportive of tax that everyone pays into instead of just what property owners would support."

In lieu of hiring a company to administer surveys regarding how voters feel about different options for additional library funding, the board decided to do the study in house. Milburn said, "I think it'll be predominantly online. We're in the early planning stages of that. My marketing director has been designing an online survey to walk through it to make sure it's working they way we want it to. That's what I asked the board, to allow us to move forward on that.'

She added there will also be a phone survey. The decision to work on the survey with existing staff was primarily a financial decision. She said, "If we are already closing a branch and talking about money being tight, we don't want to expend somewhere between \$8,000 and \$12,000 for a survey.

"Much of the information we are providing them anyway. The one thing about hiring a company is you hire their expertise in looking at the information overall. We are such a small system, we thought this was something we could do."

Whatever the survey results indicate, Milburn said the board is hoping to increase funding to prevent any additional closures of branches. The Purdy Library Branch will be closed indefinitely, effective March 1. Milburn said the possibility of branches closing won't happen until after the budget is evalu-

The newly elected public officeholders in Barry County were sworn in to their respective positions the last week of December. On December 28, six incumbents were sworn in for a new term, and three new office holders took their inaugural oaths of office.

Outgoing county clerk Gary Youngblood swore in the incumbents before taking his oath of office for his new position of presiding commissioner of Barry County. Youngblood swore in prosecuting attorney Amy Boxx, circuit clerk Craig Williams, judge Bob Foulke, judge Johnnie Cox and treasurer Lois Lowe in the county commissioners' chambers.

Following the incumbents, Youngblood swore in first time elected officials incoming county clerk Jill LeCompte and Barry County's first recorder of deeds Danielle Still. Prior to Still's election, the position of recorder of deeds was a position combined with the cir-

City of Seligman awarded \$50K sewer study grant

The City of Seligman was recently awarded a \$50,000 grant from the Department of Natural Resources. The grant is for the purpose of making repairs to the sewer system and ensuring the city's compliance with the department's standards. The grant is part of an 80/20 agreement between the Department of Natural Resources and the City of Seligman, wherein the city paid \$12,500, bringing the total dollar amount of the project to \$62,500.

"Our purpose was to connect the dots and build a map of our system," said Brian Nichols, Seligman City Clerk. "We have a permit with the Department of Natural Resources, but it was filed in the 80s. The permit needed to be changed to represent what we actually have in our sewers."

Nichols went on to explain that compliance with the DNR was crucial to the future development of the City's sewer lines.

"The only way we can seek funding for future projects is to have that study complete," said Nichols.

Council approved it in May conducted of the water system in 2016.

Essentially, DNR was re-

quiring changes to the water and sewer systems that were indicated by old mapping of both systems. With DNR's overestimation of the city's needs in a sewer system, it would be a higher financial burden on the city to make improvements that are not warranted by use.

The study included smoke testing, a process in which smoke and air are blown through a sewer access point, most often a manhole. The smoke then travels through the line and exits through the path of least resistance. This helps to identify any leaks or inflow problems that the sewer system may have.

According to Nichols, the lines themselves had very little wrong with them. The leading concern that came from the study was the state of the city's manhole covers.

"The problems with the manhole covers range from debris lodged in them to the tops leaking" said Nichols. "All the manholes are made from two slabs of pre-cast concrete with a rubber gasket in the middle. The seals have come loose on some of them, which is letting water

The process of correcting the issues with the covers will cost the city an estimated \$26,000. The city is currently looking into the best method of repair for the covers.

"We've been attempting to make contact with local contractors, but we've not had any success," said Nichols. "We can do the work inhouse, but it would be more feasible to have an outside party do it so we wouldn't have to take our people off of what they're currently working on."

A rate study was also conducted on the city's water system. The study concluded that the current sewer rates were enough to sustain the system, but a city-wide increase of \$5 would be able to generate \$10,000 of additional revenue for the city. Currently, there are no plans to increase the sewer rates within the city.

Cassville's new IDA expected to improve economic development

The City of Cassville is at an economic turning point. New business, from Hibbett Sports opening in recent years to expansion of local businesses like At The River, has been slowly making its way into the county seat for several years now, prompting a healthy stream of economic development across the city. This sparks conversations on how the city to continue to encourage growth economically.

Steve Walensky, Cass-ville's City Administrator, has been working with members of the community to establish an entity devoted to the growth of the town. The Industrial Development Authority (IDA) has come out of this effort.

"The IDA is a critical tool for growth and develop-

ment," said Walensky. "Our goals are to retain existing business and help in any way we can with organic growth so that our existing companies here can see that the city and the IDA are a tool to help them grow their business. We also want to be prepared to be a potential source for new business."

The proposed IDA, currently still awaiting final approval from City Council, is an entity that would act as a liaison between the Council and the owners and operators of local businesses. The goal of the department would be to ensure the City's ability to meet the needs of its businesses and create a bridge through which the two can have a more mutually beneficial relationship.

"This started when the school and the Chamber of

Commerce had a meeting with various folks in town, as well as city staff, to talk about economic development for the city as a whole," said Walensky. "We had an economic development position in years past but, after the state of the real estate market from 2007 to 2009, there were problems created for economic development. So, we abandoned it."

In order to structure the the new entity, Walensky enlisted the services of Ron Reed, a retired economic development professional who had a previous tenure in Houston, Missouri.

"We had a been in touch with Ron about his success in Houston as an economic development professional and that role he played," said Walensky. "He had great success for several years bringing economic stimulus to his community. We thought we had a great opportunity in talking to him."

Walensky stated that Reed came in to the project in August of last year after he met with Walensky and several others for dinner to discuss formulating a play book for putting together an IDA.

"One thing led to another and he was not only willing to help us but, also come on board as a consultant in an advisement role two days a week to help develop an economic development position," stated Walensky.

"The reason the IDA was needed in the state of Missouri is that there was not a way for small rural towns to address development opportunities or to assist an industry," stated Reed. "What an IDA does in your city is give legitimacy to any financial request."

Reed then explained that an IDA can borrow money in order to aid or grow local businesses but, it cannot encumber the city in any way. Meaning that while an IDA is allowed to operate independently of the City Council, it must operate within its own financial limitations as

"Anything they can do has to be collateralized just like if you or I went to the bank to ask for money," said Reed.

The department would also, like many other government entities, be audited yearly and regulated to ensure financial and ethical honesty within the department.

"Even though they stand alone, they cannot make any moves without city approval," stated Reed.

Walensky also stated that Reed's experience on the project was invaluable with to moving forward with the IDA.

"After Ron came on

board to help us formulate this, we learned a little bit about some of the tools you have to have in your tool box to be successful," said Walensky. "One of them was to form an IDA."

From there, Reed worked with Walensky and other members of City staff to draw up a plan for what the IDA would look like. Walensky then took the plan to City Council, where the council then approved them to move forward with the project.

A main goal in Reed's outline was the hiring of a full-time Economic Director for the town. This position would oversee the IDA and help them to communicate with City Hall and local businesses. After some deliberation, it was determined that Isaac Petersen, a former Iowa resident, would be the ideal choice for the job.

Petersen was first enlisted in the United States Air Force before attending the University of Iowa, where he graduated with a Master's Degree in Business administration. Petersen has a wide background in the corporate sector, having managed companies ranging from \$50,000 to \$500 million.

"I'm excited," said Petersen. "I think the role is an opportunity to something good for a community."

Walensky also stated

that the city is currently doing all it can to work closely with other groups within the community to promote growth and development.

"We have relationships with other areas of the community that are vital to the success of this," said Walensky. "We've got our Chamber of Commerce, for example. We've been meeting with them frequently.

We've also been working closely with the high school. That's very critical because they are willing and wanting to find out what programs that they can introduce or strengthen so that when we bring people through the educational platforms, we know how to use that as a source for those people to stay right here in Cassville, have a successful career and make good money."

"The school has taken a very active role in trying to be much more aggressive in their training and trying to be more in-tune with their industries and what those industries' specific needs are," said Reed.

The Cassville Industrial Development authority will be presented to City Council for final approval on Monday, January 14, after which, the city will move forward with appointing members to the IDA board.







ducting events, setting an example for other members. As demonstrated by the above standards, they all conducted outstanding SAEs.



Purdy man charged with growing marijuana plants, psychedelic mushrooms

A 33 year old from Purdy was charged with drug and firearms violations after an investigation last week. According to affidavits of probable cause by the Barry County Sheriff's Department, Kenneth Clay Snider is charged with delivery of a controlled substance, manufacturing a controlled substance, unlawful possession of a firearm, unlawful use of a weapon and manufacturing of 35 grams or less of marijuana.

On January 4, deputy Kayla Strahley responded to a residence on Farm Road 1084 in Purdy for shots fired. Once on scene, officers spoke with the home owner, who gave permission for them to enter.

Officers discovered that Snider shot a .22 caliber pistol approximately six times outside of his father's residence. Snider had a prior felony for marijuana possession for sale from the state of California.

When officers searched the residence, they reported to have found four marijuana plants as well as eight glass containers of psychedelic mushrooms mixed with other substances. Officers also found a book about growing psychedelic mushrooms and granular gypsum for growing them.

Officers also located scales, bubble mailers, syringes and other materials with the controlled substances.

Snider is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$50,000 cash-only bond.

ated and set in July. "That discussion won't occur until the start of our new fiscal year. Our bulk tax dollars come in during January and February. We don't set our fiscal year budget until July 1. The board said we won't discuss that until then. It could be another year to look at closing another branch. It's hard to predict what the future holds. Something is going to have to give if we don't receive more money," she said.

Moving forward, Milburn said a lot of things will just take time to determine, including the time frame for asking voters to make a choice.

She said, "We know for sure we won't in April. My understanding is if everything went according to plan and we got added to the sales tax statute, we'd still have to wait until at least November. We don't know at this point.

"If our survey of likely voters say, 'No, we won't support that,' we have to really consider if we want to extend funds to put this on the ballot if the people most likely to vote won't



Mitchell's 1,000 highlights Wheaton win over Galena

With her Lady Bulldogs leading Galena by a comfortable margin in the third quarter on Thursday night, Wheaton's Hallie Mitchell pulled up and drained a long trey from the left wing to inflate the score to 63-29. That shot lifted Mitchell into rare air, the 1,000point plateau for a career.

True to her old school roots, Wheaton's Jessica Lombard allowed no public address announcement at the time for the 1,000 points, preferring her players stay focused on the task at hand. Not until after the final buzzer of a dominating 80-49 win was Mitchell's accomplishment announced and celebrated.

Celebrating is becoming a habit for this group of Wheaton girls. The Lady Bulldogs dropped a tight road game at Lamar to open the season but have reeled off nine straight wins since then, including winning the Southwest Holiday Tournament. The winning streak reflects the commitment to excellence of this seniorladen squad.

It has been a long road back for the Wheaton girls. The once storied program has a legacy of eleven district championships and three final four appearances. But it has been 25



Purdy Lady Eagles shock Cassville, 40-34

The Purdy Lady Eagles pulled off a stirring comeback victory on Friday night at Cassville, using a late 17-0 run to overcome the Lady

When two one-win teams play, someone is going to double their success rate.

The Purdy Lady Eagles came to Cassville on Friday night for a rebuilding battle. Cassville took the floor with a 1-8 record, defeating Pierce City, 50-43, way back in November. Purdy's only win of a 1-9 campaign was a 36-29 victory over winless Southwest at the Diamond Tournament.

Despite similar records, Cassville came into this game as a clear favorite. Class 4 versus Class 2. Home court advantage. Height disparity. Deeper bench. The schools did not even play a JV contest due to Purdy's shortage of players. On paper, it all added up to a Cassville victory.

But paper burns.

A rough and tumble game saw neither team able to take control in the early going. Cassville held a slim 12-11 lead at the first break, thanks to three buckets from Kyren Postlewait. Annabelle Bowman drilled back to back threes for a brief Purdy lead, but Cassville's full court press led to a 10-8 lead for the Lady Wildcats. Emma Harkey's trey put Purdy back in front, but Riley Morris scored on a press breaker layup to give Cassville the 12-11 lead.

The low scoring continued in the second quarter. Bowman canned another bomb at the 6:26 mark to give Purdy a 14-12 advantage. The scoreboard froze for nearly three minutes as both teams ramped up the defensive intensity. Cassville's Tom Hubbard switched schemes, putting Madry McCrackin on Bowman to prevent the outside threat.

Baskets by Postlewait and Morris gave Cassville a 16-14 lead with 3:00 left in the half, and McCrackin's score after a backcourt steal sent the Lady Wildcats to intermission with an 18-16 lead.

The Lady Wildcats exerted their will when the game resumed. Lilly Harrison hit the offensive boards, scoring twice with put backs to boost Cassville to a 24-18 lead. Purdy was barely treading water when Bowman wowed

the crowd with a right handed hook from the free throw line to cut the lead to 26-20. But Postlewait intercepted a Purdy pass and sped coast to coast for a layup and a 28-20 Cassville lead with just 1:38 left in the third quarter.

An eight-point lead with less than ten minutes to play is a huge margin in such a low scoring game. Cassville was brimming with confidence when Postlewait's conversion rattled home to affirm the on-paper predictions.

But paper burns.

In an astounding, storybook turnaround, Purdy's Emma Harkey took over the game and led Purdy to a historic comeback victory.

Harkey rained a pair of threes as the third quarter clock ran down, and then Mattingly calmly canned free throws to pull Purdy into a 28-28 tie at the final break.

The Lady Eagles would score the first nine points of the fourth quarter, completing a shocking 17-0 run to take a 37-29 lead with only 2:45 left to play. Purdy senior McKenzie Renkoski found a loose ball and banked in a layup in traffic to open the fourth period. Then Harkey drained another bomb as the run continued.

The Lady Wildcats were forced to the foul and hope game, but the deficit was too great. Shaky free throw shooting by Purdy left the door open for Cassville, and a late trey by McCrackin cut the margin to 38-34. But Ashlee Luko's girls went into a classic stall to kill the clock, and Bowman's free throws with 21 seconds left guaranteed the upset, 40-34.

Fans of both teams had that "Did that really happen?" expression in two extremely different reactions to the outcome.

Purdy's Lady Eagles will try to extend the winning streak when they host Pierce City on Thursday night.

Cassville's next home contest is on January 22 when the Lady Wildcats host McDonald County.
