

Habitat wraps construction on 7th Barry County home

On Monday, January 20, the South Barry County Chapter of Habitat for Humanity officially wrapped up their latest construction project. That day, the chapter held a ceremony to officially dedicate the house and hand off the keys to the new owners, Amanda Karaklajic and her fiance, Justin Weston.

Chapter president David Hermann delivered a speech in the couple's kitchen on Monday morning, thanking all of the entities that came together to make the construction project a reality. Habitat for Humanity's work crews generally consist of private citizen volunteers and independent contractors donating time and supplies.

After an opening prayer from pastor Danny Heupel, Hermann thanked the many volunteers and companies that assisted with the build. Among those thanked were: Classic Concrete, who handled the foundation work for the house; Ball Construction, who handled the principle structure; Summers Heating and Air; and Bill Shiveley, who assisted in the electrical wiring of the home.

Habitat for Humanity broke ground on the structure in October of 2018, officially beginning construction on the house itself in March of last year, according to Hermann.

The 1,088 square-foot home contains three bedrooms, with a kitchen, dining room, living area and laundry closet. Both exterior entrances to the house are equipped with ramps, so as to make the home more accessible to the movement impaired. According to Hermann, all of the interior doorways were crafted to be larger than standard openings so as to accommodate walkers and wheelchairs.

This project marks the seventh completed home since the South Barry County chapter's inception in 2006. According to Hermann, now that this project is complete, the chapter already has eyes on the future.

First set of comments to the TRLOC released online

At the end of December, the Army Corps of Engineers (Corps) made available the first comments received by the Table Rock Lake Oversight Committee (TRLOC). The committee is taking public comments and holding a series of meetings to offer guidance to the Corps as they finalize the most recent update to the Table Rock Lake Shoreline Management Plan (SMP) and possibly make changes to the Table Rock Lake Master Plan as well.

The TRLOC is a federally organized and sanctioned group, operating under strict rules laid out by the

government. Among those rules is making comments submitted to the board available to the general public.

According to the documents released by the Corps, three comments were received in December.

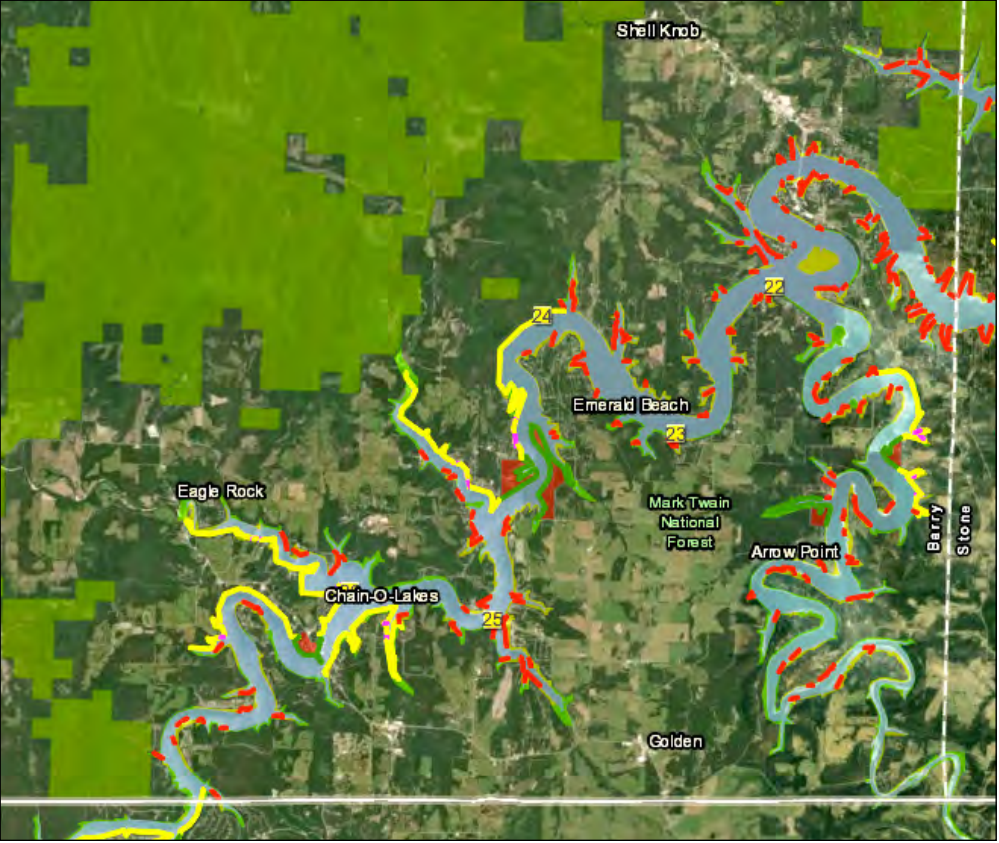
These documents are all available online at <https://www.swl.usace.army.mil/Missions/Planning/Table-Rock-Lake-Oversight-Committee/>. Also on that website are instructions for offering written comments and numerous documents, including the draft Shoreline Management Plan the TRLOC is working off of.

The first comment, dated November 24, 2019, was

from the Windy Bluff Boat Dock Association, Tim Saxton writing.

The group suggests that

Year In Review 2019

As 2019 draws to a close, the staff of the Barry County Advertiser hopes that you, your friends and your family have a healthy and prosperous new year, as well as a new decade, in 2020. In the meantime, here's a look back at some of the top news items from 2019.

November
Scott Cupps, of Shell Knob, was elected to a seat in the Missouri House of Representatives, representing District 158.

On November 2, the Local Emergency Planning Committees of Barry and Lawrence counties hosted a full-scale haz-mat drill to

test the readiness of local fire, rescue and police departments.

State Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick kicked off his re-election campaign in Cassville on November 4, surrounded by some of the state's most powerful Republican leaders.

95 years after his death, the family of Union Soldier Thomas S. Arnold were able to place a headstone on his grave at Oak Hill Cemetery, in Cassville.

The Cassville Wildcats Football team kicked off their post-season championship run with a 48-6 victory over Aurora.

The Cassville community mourned the passing of local jeweler and business-owner Chloe Epperly.

Southwest's 4-H Grasslands team took fourth place in a state-wide competition in Hallsville.

Wheaton's Fire Protection district added a new ladder truck to their fleet thanks to a purchase from the Neosho Fire Department.

The Cassville Wildcat football team claimed first place in the Class 3 District 6 finals after beating the Seneca Indians 30-20.

On November 15, hunters from across the county

brought their deer into various MDC testing centers for chronic wasting disease testing. No cases of the disease were found in Barry County.

Purdy High School's drama department put on a production of "Thoroughly Modern Millie, Jr."

After three years of inactivity, the Cassville Municipal Airport finished work on a new fueling system that enabled patrons to purchase fuel for their private planes.

The City of Purdy officially elected to move forward on renovations to a building that was previously the Purdy Library and Community Center. Set to begin in 2020, the building will be the new home of Purdy's City Hall and police department.

December
Scoring a 13-0 shutout victory against the Trinity Catholic School Titans, the Cassville Wildcat football team secured a spot in the state finals.

The Wildcats went on to be defeated by Odessa in the 2019 MSHSAA State Finals, securing second place overall and ending their season.

The South Barry County Chapter of Habitat for Humanity partnered with a local Army National Guard platoon, securing extra volunteers for future construction projects.

The Barry County E9-1-1 Center completed work

on a variety of comfort and server improvements.

Cassville settled the leash law debate, agreeing to more strictly enforce municipal codes and further train city officials on the handling of wild animals.

The Stumpff Family Event Center, in Cassville, hosted their inaugural event, God's Glory, a gospel sing and craft show, on December 14.

The Table Rock Lake oversight committee was created by the US Army Corps of Engineers to oversee public meetings and renovations to the lake and surrounding area.

The annual Christmas Tinsel Tea event hosted by United Methodist Church, of Cassville, raised \$6k to benefit the church's food pantry.

A tree believed by many to be one of the oldest in Barry County was removed from King's Cemetery, in Seligman. The removal was in an effort to prevent the tree, which was starting to decay, from damaging any of the headstones in the surrounding area.

The Cassville School District formally broke ground on the construction of their new Early Childhood Development center. The center was made possible due to the passing of the Vision 150 bond agreement in April.

The Cassville Band Boosters proudly presents a music filled evening provided by the High School and Middle School Jazz bands.

all submissions from the 2017 round of public hearings be made available to the TRLOC. Further, they offer comments that PWC lifts should be reviewed at permit renewal or via dock plans, that solar or alternative power be optional for existing docks and suggest dock plans for all private docks be submitted for any changes or modifications.

For clarity, the Corps has already said it will not require existing docks with shore power to change to solar power.

The next comment was from Steven Featherton, of Eagle Rock. Featherton states he is glad the Corps is finally moving forward with the SMP. However, he asks the Corps to again consider a proposal he has gone back and forth with the Corps with over the last decade, which is also noted in the proposed alternatives documents. Featherton has requested a change in zoning on part of his cove so he can put in a community dock. Featherton further states he will attend the January 23 meeting of the TRLOC to offer verbal comments.

The final comment comes from the owners of Forest Park Community Dock 2 in Kimberling City. Their group, including residents and slip owners, request the Corps change to a different alternative for the SMP.

Specifically, they request Alternative 2, benefiting general public use, be set up. "We oppose any new developments and land allocation as described in Alternative 2. It is the desire of residents and slip owners to prevent Table Rock from becoming like Lake of the Ozarks with increased water traffic and pollution," their comment reads, in part. "We feel Alternative 2 is the best processes to follow to keep the lake pristine and operable and manageable," they say.

The preferred Alternative for SMP development, as indicated by Dana Coburn, project manager, at the December 12 meeting, is Alternative 4, describing

neutral change, neither benefiting public use nor private development over the other. A full breakdown of the alternatives is available on the TRLOC's website. An overview file is titled, "Shoreline Zoning, Dock and Floating Facilities and Vegetation Modification in Alternatives."

The next meeting of the Table Rock Lake Oversight Committee will be held on Thursday, January 23, at the Dewey Short Visitor Center in Branson. This is the first of two meetings that will allow for verbal comments. The meeting will start at 8 a.m. and will last until, at latest, 5 p.m.

The first three hours of the January 23 meeting (8 a.m. to 11 a.m.) are set aside to allow for public comment. Comments will be limited to no more than two minutes per person. The Army Corps of Engineers recommends comments be as specific and honed in as possible to communicate desires to the committee. "The committee has a very narrow path, so we encourage commenters to be as concise and specific as possible," said Jay Townsend, Chief of Public

Affairs for U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Little Rock District. "All comments will be made publicly available and the best way to get your voice heard is to submit comments to the committee," he said.

Comments can be about questions you have about the proposed SMP, comments on the project or issues the public thinks the committee and/or Corps should look into more before offering their final plans.

Because of the set up of the public meeting, a dialog between individual commenters and the oversight committee will not be possible during the comment period. However, it is the onus of the committee to respond to public questions in a way they see fit. The actual structure of that response is not known at this time, however.

Verbal comments will also be accepted during the March 5 meeting of the TRLOC. Written comments must be received by February 27 to allow time for them to be distributed to all members of the committee, however.

The Highway Patrol is seeking DWI charges against a driver who allegedly crashed a car, injuring herself and two minor children, while intoxicated. First Christian Church to hold 50 year celebration Jan. 26

It was a bitterly cold day in Cassville when First Christian Church began meeting in an unfinished, but new, facility. The year was 1970. Over the course of the next few months, the church would be completed and formally dedicated on January 17, 1971.

On January 26, 2020, First Christian Church – Cassville will celebrate 50 years in that once new building, located at 905 Old Exeter Road. Former minister Bert Ward will be in attendance and will share memories of the relocation of FCC in 1970 and dedication in 1971.

At 9 a.m., the cornerstone, set on January 17, 1971, will be removed, and the objects entombed there will be put on display in the church foyer. No one has a recollection of what might be

in the cornerstone, but there is much interest in finding out. After photographing the items, they will be returned to the cornerstone. The congregation has been invited to bring their prayers, written and sealed in an envelope, to be placed behind the cornerstone when it is re-cemented.

A celebratory worship service will begin at 10:40 a.m. followed by a fellowship meal.

FCC - Cassville had her start before the Civil War but was officially organized in January 1887 under the leadership of E.A. Frost, minister. In the late 1800s, the church owned one-fifth interest in the Union Meeting House, which was located at 7th and Gravel Streets. Eventually, First Christian Church sold its interest and built a building on the same corner, northeast of where the United Methodist Church now stands.

Dedication services there were held on June 28, 1908. FCC continued to grow. Sev-

eral additions to the building were made to accommodate the congregation. By 1963, the church was out of room and began to consider relocating. In 1965, 11 acres were purchased where FCC now stands.

Work on the new facility began on June 22, 1969. At that time, the church was outside the west city limits of Cassville. The congregation was willing to work and hundreds of man hours went into the construction of the building.

According to the Cassville Democrat (January 13, 1971), the building was “designed to seat a total of 380 persons. The seating of the church is by dark pews with white trim. The turquoise covering in the padding is matched by the carpeting which covers the entire auditorium and the balcony. Dimensions of the auditorium and the foyer are approximately 80 X 42 feet.”

In that same issue of the Democrat, minister Bert Ward wrote: “A new and ef-

fectual door has been opened for us, and with its opening shall come the joy of greater service, deeper commitment, and enlarging opportunities. We must not allow fear or timidity to prevent us from walking through this door, or keep us from inviting all who will to step through the door with us to fellowship with Christ. Truly, in this sanctuary, His name will be lifted up. We shall sing of that name. Songs of praise, adoration, of joy and inspiration will ring through these halls. We will baptize in that name. Those who will rise from that watery grave will walk in the newness of life...we will commune in that name, teach in that name, we will preach in that name. The Christ and Him crucified shall be our theme...”

Dr. Chuck Terrill, present minister, is organizing the special events on January 26. Dr. Terrill writes, “There have been hundreds who have been blessed by the ministry of FCC. Sater to be recognized by Shell Knob seniors

Barry County Health Department awards 2019 Silver Spoons

The Barry County Health Department announced that 35 of the 183 food establishments in Barry County will receive the 2019 Silver Spoon award. The awards are presented to food establishments in Barry County that did not have any priority or core health violations and had a valid permit between January 1 and December 31, 2019.

This is the 11th year that the health department has recognized establishments for demonstrating excellence in public food safety through the Silver Spoon award. The frequency of inspection of each food establishment is determined by public health priority, which is calculated by a risk assessment worksheet. Establishments are rated as high, medium or low priority.

Twelve establishments that are rated high, and are inspected a minimum of three times per year, are recipients of the 2019 Silver Spoon Award. They are: Cassville Intermediate School Cafeteria, Cassville High School Cafeteria, Cassville Primary/Middle School Cafeteria, Exeter R-VI School Cafeteria, Cox Monett Hospital Cafeteria, Big Baldy's, Monett Elementary School Cafeteria, Monett Middle School Cafeteria, Monett Senior Center, Shell Knob School Cafeteria, Southwest Elementary School Cafeteria and Southwest High School Cafeteria.

There are six medium-rated establishments that received the honor. These food service facilities are inspected a minimum of twice a year. They are: MO Wings, Omario's, Jami Lynn's (Monett); His House Foundation, Terry's Café and Subway #17461 (Shell Knob).

A total of seventeen establishments with a low priority rating achieved the Silver Spoon. Low priorities are inspected at least once a year. The establishments are: Barry-Lawrence Co. Development Center Cafeteria, Herb Depot & Organic Market, Modern Variety,

Now & Zen, The Beer Cave, Oakview School Cafeteria, and VB Hall Antique Warehouse, all in Monett; G's Orchard, Verona; Nita's Cakes, Big M Marina and Roaring River State Park Store, Cassville; Aldava Aragon, Purdy; The Red Barn Antiques, Shell Knob; Lucky T's and Ruby's, Seligman; Country Package, Washburn; and Wheaton Asian Market.

The health department congratulates these establishments and hopes the recognition will encourage all food establishments to strive to provide the safest food to Barry County residents.

MDC reports final deer harvest more than 285,400

ARCHERY DEER HARVEST WAS 61,209.
ARCHERY TURKEY HARVEST WAS 2,406.

Missouri's 2019-2020 deer-hunting season ended Jan. 15 with the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reporting a preliminary total deer harvest of 285,483. Of the deer harvested, 133,914 were antlered bucks, 27,931 were button bucks, and 123,638 were does.

Barry County hunters took a total of 2,306 deer during the season. Of those, 1,165 were antlered bucks, 199 were button bucks and 942 were does.

Top harvest counties for the overall deer season were Franklin with 6,247 deer checked, Callaway with 5,703, and Texas with 5,157.

Hunters harvested 290,224 deer during the 2018-2019 overall deer hunting season with 136,851 being antlered bucks, 30,113 being button bucks, and 123,260 being does.

Archery Deer Results

Deer hunting ended with the close of the archery season. Preliminary data from MDC showed that hunters checked 61,209 deer during the 2019-2020 archery deer season. Top counties

for the archery deer season were Jefferson with 1,604 deer checked, Franklin with 1,294, and St. Louis with 1,227.

Barry County hunters took 413 deer during archery season. Of those, 172 were bucks, 28 were button bucks and 213 were does.

Hunters checked 52,923 deer during the 2018-2019 archery deer season.

While the total deer harvest was down slightly from the year before, the archery deer harvest was considerably higher this year. According to MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Jason Isabelle, season timing was a factor.

"The shift in the calendar this year with Thanksgiving occurring later in November resulted in archers having an extra week of prime hunting before the November portion of firearms season started," Isabelle explained. "These extra days of hunting during the rut when bucks are particularly vulnerable to harvest, and an increasing trend in the number of archery hunters, contributed to a record year of archery

deer harvest."

Isabelle added that the calendar shift caused the November portion of firearms season to occur a week later than last year and during peak breeding when buck movement is reduced.

"As we get closer to the middle of November, bucks simply don't have to move as much in search of receptive does as they do earlier in the month, making them less vulnerable to harvest," Isabelle explained. "Whenever this shift in season timing occurs, we expect a decline in harvest during the November portion of firearms season, which is when most of each year's harvest occurs."

Cassville YMCA offers special Senior Expo Jan. 24

For older people in the Barry County community, it can be a challenge to be both active and social after leaving the workforce. The good news is that the Cassville YMCA has a mission to help fill that need. The Cassville YMCA will have a Senior Expo on Friday, January 24, beginning at 9:30 a.m. to showcase YMCA membership and offer a demo class for senior citizens. The event will include coffee, cookies and hot chocolate as well as vendors to discuss benefits of YMCA membership and classes offered.

Cassville YMCA director Rick Ragsdale explained the expo is to explain the benefits of YMCA membership and classes to area senior citizens. Ragsdale said, "Vendors include Johnson Chiropractic, Roark Family Health and Advanced Physical Therapy. During the expo, there will also be a demo version of the YMCA's Silver Sneakers program. The class is movement and stretching oriented. Ragsdale said, "It focuses on

moving the entire body with a little impact on limbs and joints. The class uses elastic bands, exercise balls, and small dumbbells. Modifiers are possible for people who cannot stand for long periods of time or for wheelchair bound participants."

Silver Sneakers classes are for ages 60 and up. Currently, that class is held at the Cassville facility on Tuesdays and Thursdays from 9:40 a.m. to 10:40 a.m. and on Mondays and Wednesday from 1:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

For those more active, there are other classes available as well that are open to all ages. Ragsdale said, "Many of our seniors take advantage of our body toning, Zumba, and pilates, as well."

All of the offerings available for seniors, including explanation of classes, membership and pricing will be at the Senior Expo on Friday.

The current rate for a senior membership at the Cassville YMCA is \$27 per

Cassville cruises past Southwest, 80-47

The Cassville Wildcats broke a four-game losing skid and cruised to an 80-47 win over Southwest at Washburn on Friday night. Carson Roller poured in a game high 27 points, and DJ White added 24 for the Wildcats. Caden Uthe scored 24 to pace the Trojans.

For five minutes, Southwest led Cassville with a stirring display of tenacity. Despite missing key players to the sweeping sickness that swelled absenteeism on the Washburn campus, the young Trojans gritted their collective teeth and attacked Cassville's all-senior starting five.

Uthe, the sophomore guard, drained a pair of treys in the opening minute to give Southwest a 6-0 lead. But Cassville responded with a 24-4 run to finish the quarter with a commanding 24-10 lead.

The Wildcats doubled up the hosts, 20-10, in the sec-

ond quarter, using advantages in size and athleticism to claim a 44-20 lead at half-time. Seven players scored for Cassville in a dominant half of basketball.

The Trojans came alive in the third quarter, scoring 18. But the Cats added 24 points to their side of the scoreboard. Cassville led by as many as 34 points in that quarter before Southwest mounted a comeback.

Southwest's Cruz Marquez knocked down free throws after absorbing an intentional foul, and Uthe turned that into a five-point play with a long trey to cut the lead to 61-38 with 1:30 left in the third frame.

Then Cassville scored the last 7 points of the quarter, highlighted by Carson Roller's buzzer-beater bomb

that set the score at 68-38 at the final break.

Roller would score three more times in the fourth quarter before Barrett Milleson made mass substitutions at the 3:50 mark as Cassville rolled to the 80-47 victory.

Cassville improved to 4-9 with the victory, while Southwest slipped to 5-10. Both teams will next compete in the Spokane Tournament.
