Cassville School seeks \$4M bond for early childhood center, renovations

Cassville R-IV School District is putting a bond issue before voters that would allow the school to make renovations to the old middle school wing and build an early childhood center. The notax increase bond is seeking for voters to approve \$4 million to make the improvements.

School superintendent Dr. Richard Asbill said the bond was unanimously supported by school board members as a way to expand learning opportunities for students. He said, "The focus has been, over the last three years, to identify some particular needs that we wanted to emphasize, one being early childhood. We're focusing on our Title I programs with preschool, our Kinder Academy program and expanding or renovating our facility to allow for those programs to have greater access to flexible learning space and some opportunities to grow."

Those concepts and focuses are what led the district to seek using their bonding capacity to build a new early childhood center which will provide dedicated space for those programs. Asbill explained currently, some classrooms in the primary school are multi-use space, and in order to dedicate more time to those programs, the school would need additional room.

If the bond passes, the school will build the early childhood center at the far end of the primary school in the open space between the school and the existing primary playgrounds. The new building would include four new classrooms and make space in the primary dedicated for kindergarten and first grades.

Dr. Asbill said, "We're sharing some spaces now, and it isn't always productive. It limits the number of students we can serve. We have these programs like Parents As Teachers, preschool and Kinder Academy, and we need space for those programs to utilize during the day and the evenings. It would also open up the possibility to expand kindergarten, first grade and special education."

One aspect that would not be included in the new plan is a daycare component. Dr. Asbill said he does not feel that is in the scope of the school at this time.

Dr. Asbill said that teachers were instrumental in planning the new building. "They have done such a fantastic job. They've gone to other districts, and they are planning and designing this project. They are having conversations with other teachers and each other and other schools," he said.

Asbill concluded, "We want these kids to have a firm grasp on early education and improved literacy that will pay off five, ten, fifteen years in the future."

The next component of the bond issue would be an update to the older wing of the middle school, also known as the vintage wing. The vintage wing was mostly used for storage up until a couple years ago when a flooding incident displaced the fifth grade classrooms in the intermediate building. Those classrooms

7th Street bridge reconstruction planned

Since the Spring of 2017, 7th Street in Cassville has been incomplete. Before 2017, Seventh Street had a bridge that ran over Flat Creek and connected downtown Cassville directly to the park. Years of flood damage led the city to demolish the bridge after years of service.

Now, plans to reconstruct the bridge have been put in motion at City Hall. The city already has an open claim with FEMA and SEMA that began in 2015 when the structure was damaged and nearly impassable due to flooding. Now, after it was demolished nearly two years ago, the city has begun the process of using that open claim to rebuild the bridge.

David Brock, Public Works Director for the City of Cassville stated that the bridge is a crucial bit of roadway and being without it has made navigating difficult for some.

"The Seventh Street bridge links the square with the downtown park, is a favored route for funeral processions to reach Oakhill Cemetery and is used by school buses," said Brock. "The crossing is also an important link for three residences located east of the creek on 7th and Mineral Spring Road. It sees peak usage during baseball season when families come and go from the ball fields."

City Hall already has

a timeline in place for for the damaged structure. the construction of the bridge. Construction of a new bridge isn't a certainty yet, however. To begin the project, the city will have to work with FEMA and SEMA to expand the scope of the city's claim in order to receive the bulk of the funding needed for the project.

"We are expecting to call for bids in February or early March with construction completed by late summer," said Brock.

Brock continued, "The bid letting is contingent on receiving approval from FEMA/SEMA to increase the amount of the claim. The amount of the existing claim is based on building an exact replacement However, we are being advised that a direct replacement does not meet Army Corps of Engineers requirements. To meet these specifications, the new structure needs to pass much more water beneath the driving surface."

In order to accomplish this, city engineers have drafted significant changes to the original design of the bridge.

"The new design will pass significantly more water under the driving surface, with almost four times the open area as the old one," said Brock. "We expect it to remain in service during the smaller rain events that would inundate the old crossing."

Brock explained that this new design would function much like the old one but would be built to better accommodate flooding. Other design options were considered but, ultimately scrapped due to their high cost.

"The new bridge will still be designed to be overtopped during larger rain events; a higher bridge deck would have a negative impact on flood levels upstream," stated Brock. "An alternative would be a very large structure like the Thirteenth Street bridge but, we do not believe FEMA/SEMA would sign off on that scale of bridge since we can meet regulatory requirements with a smaller structure."

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County commission approves \$4.88M budget

The Barry County commission approved this year's county budget at \$4,887,461.39. The budget, which closely follows 2018's budget, means county office holders requesting new employees or big ticket items will have to make-do for another year.

The Barry County Commission budget meeting was held on Tuesday, January 22, this year in the courthouse. Barry County commissioners Gary Youngblood, Wayne Hendrix and Gary Schad were present, as well as clerk Jill LeCompte, Sheriff Gary Davis and collector Janice Varner.

Youngblood said, "We're projecting the same as we received in 2017. We're always hoping for more, but we're being cautious. We're always cautious on what we expect for revenue."

The commission used an estimated revenue of \$4,151,150 plus an additional \$786,798.80 carried over from last year. The total used for working up a budget was \$4,937,948.80. Of that, the county anticipates \$2,662,000 from the 1/2 cent and 1/8 cent sales tax, \$551,700 from intergovernmental revenues, charges for services of \$659,900 and other revenues of \$277,550.

The budget follows closely what was approved for 2018 with 2019 at \$4,887,461.39 compared to 2018's \$4,821,971.90. Officeholders had requested around half a million more than what was approved, but commissioners explained the money was not available to allow those expenditures.

Youngblood said, "We'd love to give everyone whatever they ask for, but it just isn't possible with the money we have."

The officeholder seeking the most additional funding was Sheriff Gary Davis. He'd requested funds for additional staffing, including new office staff and deputies. During the budget hearing, Davis said, "I asked for more people. The money just wasn't there to give me anything I asked

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Cassville to reapply for trail grant, seeks public input

After a Missouri Recreational Trail Program grant was denied last year, the City of Cassville plans to reapply for the grant to build a new trail head on city property off of Highway 76 and to pave gravel trails between the downtown park and 13th Street. Following feedback from last year's application, the city is requesting funds with a more refined focus on trail creation and improve-

Last year's application to the Missouri Recreational Trail Program was not selected, however the city was invited to reapply and to devise a project that put more emphasis on trails as opposed to amenities.

The city is again looking for public feedback on the project. An online survey is available at: https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/3JGSLBH or it can be accessed through the city's web site at www. cityofcassville.com.

Public input will help the

city gauge interest in the two projects and determine which project the city will apply for to hopefully assure a successful application.

"In the grant application, there are scoring categories for getting local donations and work to be completed by City forces. The potential for these scoring components varies between the two projects so we will weigh the results of the survey, the desires of the administration and what might make the best scoring application," said David Brock, Cassville Public Works director.

"In the first application, almost 62 percent of the total project cost was for new bathrooms/site development at the downtown park," said Brock. "The committee suggested a greater emphasis on trail improvements."

The trail head on Highway 76 grew from an idea mayor Bill Shiveley had to create gardens to support more wildlife, including butterflies. "The trail head concept evolved from mayor Shiveley's desire to develop natural gardens that would attract/support monarch butterflies and other insects," said Brock. The property, in the 400 block of State Highway 76, has paved drive-

for, so I'll work with them and maybe next year will be better. I realize the constraints they have on the budget.

"Jail staffing-wise, we're close to that and it's okay. Structurally, we're going to have to keep talking about that. It's just not sufficient. It needs a tremendous amount of work."

Davis said part of the jail that was constructed in the 1970s hasn't been updated or renovated since. He continued, "It's going to require a tax of some kind, and I think a sales tax would be more fair."

Youngblood explained the commission's decision not to add any new staff this year. " My viewpoint is that a new deputy costs a lot of money. It's the car, the salary and the health insurance."

Davis estimated the additional deputy would cost the county approximately \$75,000, which the commission says Barry County simply does not

Youngblood said, "We provided enough for each office holder to give three percent raises to their staff, but it's at their discretion as to what to

"No one got additional employees this year."

Davis said he was allowed money to give raises for his jailers and was given four new patrol cars to continue on the county's car rotation. Wayne Hendrix said, "We don't want to get into a position like we did years ago where we have

cars with over 200,000 miles on them and the transmissions start going out, and they have

all kinds of problems." Davis said they worked a way to hopefully improve employee retention at the jail by working in a pay increase instead of new staffing. He said, "We decided to use what we have to help fix the trouble in the jail staffing-wise. We're down three and it's a pay issue. I can give all of the jailers a pay raise and institute a raise schedule. Right now, someone here ten years makes the same as someone new. That wasn't right. I thank the commission for that."

Davis said the raises were

implemented on a scale dependent on years of employment instead of a flat raise across the board. Those carrying the bulk of the work will get a higher

Commissioner Gary Schad said, "I want to thank our officeholders. They understand that we have to make decisions based on the money we have. They make this much easier than it could be."

Collector Janice Varner added, "Every year when I go to the collectors' meeting, I'm glad to be one of the few who can say I have a commission we can work with. Most of them just can't work with their commissioners."

The biggest change to the bridge would not be in the way that it moves water around and under it but, in the makeup of the bridge it-

"The biggest difference in flood damage protection is having an all concrete structure that is designed to withstand strong overtopping currents and to deflect debris," said Brock

Brock explained that the project is contingent on that change in scope, otherwise the bridge would be susceptible to the same kind of flooding damage that destroyed it previously.

City engineers have already mapped out and designed the changes needed to make the structure more solid. With the FEMA/ SEMA funding, the projected cost for the city is relatively low.

"Our engineers provided a preliminary construction cost estimate of \$245,000," said Brock. "They will update the estimate prior to bid advertisement. There will be additional engineering, inspection and testing expenses during construction. Including the engineering design costs, the total project budget is \$342.761."

The project would not require any further funding from the people of Cassville, as the City's expected portion of the cost has already been made a part of the yearly budget.

"If our change in scope is approved by FEMA/SEMA,

75% of the cost will be funded by State and Federal Funds," said Brock. "The remaining 15% will come from local Transportation and Stormwater budgets. Our expected portion of the project,15%, is included in the approved 2019 budget."

The city expects there to be some temporary inconveniences brought on by the project, but nothing that would impact citizen's ability to enjoy the public park during construction.

"Citizens will not experience much interruption, since the crossing has been out of service for two summers," stated Brock. "A portion of the downtown park will be used for storage and staging during construction but we don't expect any impact on the existing ballfields or available parking. We do expect to temporarily reroute the trail during construction."

Should the FEMA funding for the project not come through, the City is ready with a back up plan that will still see improvements made to the park.

"If the change in scope is not approved by FEMA/ SEMA, the claim monies could be used to improve the entrance to the downtown park off of Highway 248," said Brock.

Monett man killed in Sunday morning wreck

A Monett man was killed in a farm road crash outside of Monett over the weekend. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, Jason M. Cendroski, 38, of Monett, was driving southbound when his vehicle ran off the roadway on Sunday, January 27.

The report states Cendroski was driving on Farm Road 1090 about a quarter of a mile south of Monett when he crashed around 2:30 a.m.

Cendroski was driving a 2000 Jeep Grand Cherokee southbound when it ran off the roadway, struck a mailbox and an embankment. Cendroski was pronounced deceased at the scene at 3:40 a.m. by deputy coroner Gary Swearingen.

Cendroski was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

The Jeep was extensively damaged and towed from the scene by Thomas Towing, of Monett.

This is the 5th fatality for Troop D in 2019.



Sheriff's Department-ODET partnership gets drugs off streets

The Ozarks Drug Enforcement Team (ODET) statistics for the year are in, and drug seizures were up significantly in Barry County.

ODET is a team of eight detectives with the primary goal to break up large scale drug trafficking operations with assistance from local law enforcement as well as the Bureau of Alcohol Tobacco and Firearms (ATF), the Drug Enforcement Agency (DEA) and the Federal Bureau of Investigations (FBI). The ODET operates in five counties: Barry, Jasper, Barton, Newton and McDonald.

Region-wide, ODET seized a total of 6,230 grams, or roughly 14 pounds, of methamphetamine, a street value of roughly \$623,000. The organization also seized 33,448 grams (roughly 74 pounds) of marijuana with a street value of \$259,000.

Of the methamphetamine seized, almost half of that was taken off the streets of Barry County. There were 2,998 grams (6.68 pounds) seized last year. This translates to a street value of \$297,260. Of the contraband marijuana seized, 18.5 pounds were taken from Barry County, with a street value of approximately \$64,750.

ODET was also responsible for 40 meth-related

arrests, 15 fugitive arrests, 66 firearms seized, 62 investigations conducted and 36 search warrants served within Barry County last year.

"It costs us \$4,000 a year to be an ODET member, and it's the best money that Barry County spends in my opinion," said Barry County Sheriff Gary Davis. "If we have something drugrelated that's really important and we can't handle it, I can call them, and they'll be here."

ODET works very closely with the Barry County Sheriff's office to combat the tide of drugs coming into the county. While ODET handles the large scale busts that climb the ladder of local drug operations, according to Sheriff Davis, many of those large scale busts begin as completely unrelated calls to the sheriff's department.

"It's a cooperative effort," said Davis. "We work closely with them and that's how we get where we're at with those figures."

Sheriff Davis continued, "Every time (ODET) has made one of those arrests, with very few exceptions, my people were there. Opening the door, providing perimeter, everything. It's a group effort."

Barry County Sheriff's deputies are crucial to the process of preventing drugs from being sold within the county. According to Davis, this means more than just responding to drug-related calls. Maintaining situational awareness during other work in the field is critical to the work of deputies.

"We're always on the lookout for stuff that doesn't match the calls we're on," said Davis. "Some of the bigger cases we've worked on started as domestic calls. We have to go in the house, they can't keep us out, and if we see dope in plain sight, we take it."

According to Davis, those smaller busts lead deputies to hand that information over to ODET, where the team works with the deputies involved to trace the line of distribution back to the larger suppliers. This leads to larger-scale busts that, according to Davis, are the best method for keeping drugs off the streets in Barry County.

"We could go out and address drug users all day long," said Davis. "That does nothing to deter drugs in Barry County. We have set our sights higher, to the distributors and the people who are selling it."

ways so users will not have to park somewhere else and walk to the area.

Project descriptions are linked in the survey. With regards to the new trail head, the city emphasizes it would provide access to the already existing trail, but would also be landscaped to provide a natural habitat for area birds and insects. "The project would include landscaped berms, native trees and landscaping with species selected to attract and support birds and insects. A meandering asphalt walking path and seating area will be nestled within the natural garden," says the description.

The trail head would be constructed on city property across the highway from the Memorial Park at the American Legion post.

The second potential trail improvement project would pave gravel portions of the Greenway Trail between the downtown park and 13th Street and would seek to mitigate damage to those trails from flooding. "As a result of the 2017 flood, the city documents \$4,384 in repairs at the downtown park," said Brock. "Over \$3,000 was just for materials to rebuild the trails."

In addition to paving the

gravel walkways, the city proposes adding concrete curb to potions of the trail in the flood area. "Trail improvements on facilities lying below the 100-year base flood elevation would include 4" x 12" concrete curb edging," says the description.

The grant application will be turned in by February 15, with results announced sometime in July or August of this year.

Beyond these trail improvements, Brock says bathroom improvements are on the city's radar, but funding will be needed. Previous surveys had indicated that many people feel the bathrooms in the park are not adequate, which led the city to emphasize those improvements

in the previous application. "Last year's application was focused on those facilities to address that concern. Bathrooms are allowed under the program, but do not appear to be a priority for the scoring committee," said Brock. "Building new bathrooms at the downtown park is still a priority but a funding source has not been identified." Bathroom improvement costs are estimated at \$155,000, according to Brock, making it difficult for the city to cover those expenses in the park's appropriations.

The Recreational Trails Program is overseen by the Missouri Department of Natural Resources using federal funds from the Department of Transportation.

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



were moved temporarily to the vintage wing, which showed school administrators how that area could be better utilized.

Dr. Asbill explained, "Using the space as classrooms during the flood really reemphasized that it needs to be focused on for a renovation."

Renovations would improve the external look of the middle school, add a hallway that connects the middle school to the J.C. Duncan Gymnasium, and renovate classrooms into a shared learning space that would allow multi-grade collaboration and more flexible learning spaces for students.

He said, "We'd like to develop a multi-grade level program that would let them have a flexible space for learning. It's not meant to be a predefined you do or don't qualify program, but instead it's an opportunity for us to get some creativity as well as some innovative experience for our students to focus on some different experiences that would encourage different career pathways."

When asked what that would look like, Dr. Asbill referenced new programs that incorporate math, science and literacy already in the middle school. Those programs include an app creator class that teaches coding, a medical detective class, and a robotics class, as well as others. He added that it is possible that it would allow different grade levels to work

together, as well, giving older students an opportunity to help younger students.

"We would need more flexible space to be able to do that. We need a non-traditional space to make that work," he said.

The remodel of the vintage wing would include six collaborative learning classrooms, an engagement classroom, a teacher center and two changing rooms outside of the hallway that leads to the rock gym to make the gym more efficient for classes and sport games.

Other improvements included in the bond plan are ADA accessibility improvements to the primary and intermediate playgrounds, new cabinets and counter tops in the first and second grade classrooms and security improvements to doors with key card accesses and a school-wide intercom system.

There would also be some maintenance items included like a roof repair to the middle school gym, band and art rooms and electrical updates to older rooms with inadequate electrical outlet access.

Dr. Asbill said that if funds remain, the final project would be the transportation barn. He said, "We would start making improvements to our transportation barn. We would look at relocating our transportation services, and that would let us use our current facility for maintenance and custodial. It would open up parking for games and the FEMA building, as well."

The bond request, which has been dubbed Vision 150, will be on the April Municipal Election ballot for Cassville School District voters to decide on. Dr. Asbill said, "This is about what the next 150 years of our district is going to be about, which is how we chose the name."

The municipal election will be held on April 2, and voters within the Cassville School District will decide the fate of the school's requested \$4 million bond.



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School board seats to be decided in April election

The filing period for school board elections closed on January 15. All filed candidates will be on the ballot for the municipal election April 2.

The deputy gave Pyles and Taylor verbal commands to stop, but they continued to flee on foot.

According to affidavits of probable cause, the suspects attempted to kick in the door of the residence to get inside and steal. An acquaintance of Taylor's claimed she heard him planning burglaries of homes prior to the event.

Taylor was apprehended by officers after being seen on Ivey Street later in the evening. There was a foot pursuit before Taylor was taken into custody at the intersection of Presley and 14th Streets.

Taylor and Pyles are each charged with burglary in the first degree and resisting arrest for a felony by fleeing. They are being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of \$50,000 cash-only bonds.





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


