Sales tax revenue looks steady starting off in 2016

After an impressive year for sales tax revenue in 2015, the start of 2016 started slow but appears to be gaining momentum.

For both Barry County and the City of Cassville, 2015 was a big year for sales tax revenue. Cassville brought in \$865,652.72 for their general one-cent tax, which was almost \$50,000 more than 2014. Barry County's revenue for their general 1/2-cent sales tax brought in \$2,031,442.27 in 2015, which was almost \$90,000 more than 2014. So, both the county and Cassville ended up with more revenue than they anticipated for the year.

In 2016, Cassville and Barry County have each received two sales tax revenue payments. In January, revenue was down 5.75 percent for the county and 3.3 percent for the city. However, both recovered in February with a positive jump of 6.3 percent over last year's revenue for Cassville and 4.66 percent for Barry County. So far for the year, Cassville

Cassville Education Fund to host annual trivia night to support teachers, students

It is the time of year for the Cassville Education Fund's annual trivia night. Each year, the Cassville Education Fund (CEF) Board hosts a trivia night for community teams to raise money to add to their endowment fund that provides grants for Cassville teachers for various programs.

The CEF was established in 2009 when members of the community handed together to accept a fundraising challenge from Harry Cooper Supply Company. The group was charged with raising \$20,000, and if that goal was met, Harry Cooper Supply would give a \$10,000 matching grant. That year, anticipated. The first year, \$35,000 was put into the fund, and it has grown each year since then. Today, the CEF has over \$50,000 in the account which is overseen by the Cassville Community Foundation (CCF).

When the Board began fundraising seven years ago, they sought donations from area businesses and individuals, as well as alumni who helped get the fund established. On average, donations of \$20 to \$120 keep the fund going. Some of those donations are made in memory of CHS alumni, as well. Mary Cupps, board member for the CEF and CCF, said that area businesses have reliably supported the fund since its inception.

Fundraisers that the board has hosted in the past to help raise money included a poker run, an alumni class challenge, a Homecoming luncheon and a golf tournament. Cupps said that the school also supports the fund with a dress down day and a potato bake.

However, arguably the most anticipated fundrasier each year is trivia night. Trivia night provides the opportunity for the fund to raise money but also for the community to come together for a night of fun. Cupps said, "Trivia Night has been our main fundraiser; it's fun for everyone, not too much work for committee members and fits in with the education theme."

Teams of up to eight people compete in trivia rounds, as well as games for points to be crowned the trivia champion each year. Teams are supported by a variety of groups and businesses, including local banks, businesses, Crowder College, book club teams, librarians and more. By charging teams to participate, as well as offering food during the event, the board is able to raise money for the endowment.

Cupps said that the Board is also looking at a new opportunity for fundraising this year, as well. The CCF is a part of the larger Community Foundation of the Ozarks. The CEF is one of 20 non-profits that has been selected to participate in a 1:1 match of up to \$5,000 through the Cause Momentum fundraising initiative. Cupps said, "Each year, we can fund only a few of the grant applications that we receive because we can only give out money from the income of the fund. As the fund grows, we can award more grants." More details about that fundraising effort will be available at a later

Each year in March or April, every Cassville R-IV teacher receives a grant application from the CEF. Teachers can apply for grants individually or in a group as long as the program they are requesting support for is an academic program that enhances stu-







MDC offers February tree care tips

February is known for the celebration of Valentine's Day – a special time to share your love with those you care about. But February is also the perfect time to show affection for your trees. February provides good conditions to do many tree care activi-


Mulching your tree can be done anytime of the year, but this slow season allows plenty of time to get it done and have your tree prepared for spring. A shallow layer of mulch extending to at least the drip line of small trees or several feet out on large trees provides many benefits to the tree. It moderates the soil temperature, which helps the tree roots do better, helps hold moisture around the tree for it by reducing evaporation and competition from grass and other plants, and adds organic matter to the soil by which helps return nutrients from the tree for use.

The best time to prune trees is during the winter months. Fungus, bacteria and insects that are attracted to and can infect a fresh pruning wound are not active. This allows the wound to dry and become less attractive to these pests. In

most cases, pruning is done broken or diseased branches removed.

If you've been considering planting a new tree, now is the time to pick the type of tree for the desired site. Not all trees should be planted in all places. Some will become too big, others are not suited to the soil or weather conditions. While it is cold, you can determine the desired benefits of the tree, the site conditions of space, soil, moisture available, lots of sun or shade and more and select a tree (or group of trees) that will work well in that site.



So what does providing tie-up facilities to large boats have to do with fish restoration? Quite a bit, actually. One of the things this will do is increase fishing access to this part of the lake to a wider range of anglers. Through this enhanced accessibility, a message of wise fisheries conservation can reach a larger part of the population.

Along with increasing angler satisfaction, these types of projects can also benefit a reservoir's water quality. Many larger vessels have their own toilet and trash facilities. Providing dock facilities where these larger boats can tie up and properly dispose of waste materials reduces the chance that they'll be disposed of on the lake.

"The next time you see a Sport Fish Restoration logo on a piece of fishing gear you buy, know that you are supporting projects that increase opportunities to boat and catch sport fish right in your backyard," said MDC Fisheries Program Supervisor Laura Ruman.

Barry County producers urged to get risk protection before spring crop deadline

Barry County USDA Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Brain Blount reminds producers to review available USDA crop risk protection options, including federal crop insurance and Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) coverage, before the deadline of March 15. This deadline applies to forage and pasture, as well as spring-seeded crops, includ-

ing most produce.

Federal crop insurance covers crop losses from natural adversities such as drought, hail and excessive moisture. NAP covers losses from natural disasters on crops for which no permanent federal crop insurance program is available, including forage and grazing crops, fruits, vegetables, mushrooms, floriculture, ornamental nursery, aquaculture, turf grass, ginseng, honey, syrup, bioenergy, and industrial crops.

"NAP policies allow producers to protect their investment by purchasing coverage for noninsurable crops," said Blount. "Natural disasters are an unavoidable part of farming and ranching and FSA programs like NAP help producers recover when they experience a

USDA has partnered with Michigan State University and the University of Illinois to create an online tool at www.fsa.usda.gov/ nap that allows producers to determine whether their crops are eligible for federal crop insurance or NAP and to explore the best of protection for their operation. NAP basic coverage is available at 55 percent of the average market price for crop losses that exceed 50 percent of their expected production at 100 percent of the average market price available, in-

cluding coverage for organics and crops marketed directly to consumers. Crops intended for grazing are not eligible for additional NAP coverage.

For all coverage levels, the NAP service fee is the lesser of \$250 per crop or \$750 per producer per administrative county, not to exceed a total of \$1875 for a producer with farming interests in multiple counties. There is additional premium for additional levels of coverage. Beginning, underserved and limited resource farmers are now eligible for free catastrophic level coverage, as well as discounted premiums for additional levels of protection.



Missouri currently has seven veterans homes located in Cameron, Cape Girardeau, Mexico, Mount Vernon, St. James, St. Louis, and Warrensburg. These homes provide almost over 1,000 skilled nursing beds for veterans. Unfortunately, there are almost 2,000 veterans still waiting to get into a home.

This pressing need prompted the legislature and the governor to look for solutions that will provide adequate care for the 15th largest population of veterans in the nation. The resolution passed the House 153-3 and will move to the Senate next week. I expect this decision will appear on the November general election ballot.

Eliminating Welfare Fraud

The House also acted this week to more efficiently and accurately verify whether welfare recipients are actually eligible to receive services. HB 1795 would allow the Department of Social Services to hire a private vendor to conduct verification screenings for the state's various welfare programs.

In addition to screening applicants, this private vendor would comb through welfare rolls and alert the department of possible fraud and ineligibility. The state anticipates this new verification program will save taxpayers up to \$20 million over the next three years. Other states, including neighboring Illinois, have consistently seen tens of millions in savings.

The Department of Social Services fully supports this legislation and is already accepting bids from vendors. HB 1795 passed the House 129-27 and now moves to the Senate.

Update on Legislation I've Filed

This week I presented the following bills in committee; I expect they be voted "Do Pass" and will move forward next week:

HB 1867 – allows certain s-corporation shareholders to voluntary reject workers' compensation coverage. This bill simply brings s-corps in line with regulations for newer

forms of business organiza-

HB 2180 – allows for contiguous road districts within a county to voluntarily combine. HB 2180 also allows the state auditor to audit road districts as deemed necessary.

Local Students Visit the Capitol

This week, FBLA, FFA, FCCLA, SkillsUSA, and

DECA students visited the Capitol to celebrate career and technical education day. I had the honor of meeting a number of student-leaders

from Monett and Washburn and learn more about the projects they're pursuing this year. As our state looks to grow its economy, it's important to recognize the critical work our vocational programs do to prepare Missourians for the workforce.

US Supreme Court Stays Clean Power Plan

The federal government's efforts to implement new carbon emissions standards are now on hold following a decision by the US Supreme Court. Missouri was one of 21 states that sued the EPA for exceeding its authority in issuing new, burdensome regulations on energy providers. The cost of complying with the new rules would have cost Missourians more than \$6 billion.

Following the decision, House Speaker Todd Richardson praised the Court's unprecedented decision to stay a federal rule before it is implemented. "I was pleased to see the Supreme Court put a freeze on President Obama's burdensome energy regulations," said Richardson. "We have already been dealing with the negative impacts these new rules would have on Missouri. This decision will help us keep Missouri's energy costs low, save countless dollars in implementation costs, and preserve jobs in the energy sector. The legal fight will go on, but we will continue to oppose undue burdens on our energy production." I echo the Speaker's sentiments and am relieved to see the courts recognize how detrimental this rule would have been to our economy.


