Barry County commissioners approve \$4.58 million budget

The Barry County Commissioners approved a 13.9 percent increase in the county's budget for 2017. Commissioners Gary Schad, Wayne Hendrix and Cherry Warren voted to approve the budget during a public hearing on Monday, January 23, at the historic courthouse. Part of the increase is reliant on a carryover of \$1,187,422 from last year.

The 2017 Budget Message by County Clerk and Budget Officer Gary Youngblood said the anticipated sales tax revenue of \$2,505,000 from the 1/2 and 1/8 cent sales taxes, a \$65,684 decrease from 2016, as well as intergovernmental revenue of \$575,800, charges for ser-

vices of \$640,150 and other revenues of \$171,500.

The biggest change in the budget from 2016 to 2017 is a request for almost \$30,000 extra for the jail. Sheriff Gary Davis requested the commissioners approve the money for an additional jailer. The Sheriff's budget also increased to include a more accurate fuel expense for deputies' cars.

The Prosecuting Attorney's Office also asked for an increase of around \$43,000 to add a crime victim advocate position, according to Younglood. He also said, "Amy Boxx applied for a grant for that position, and she doesn't know if she will get, but we put it in the budget in case she did. The increase is the salary for that position, but

Sater proposes ranked-choice voting bill

Senator David Sater R-Cassville is proposing a ranked-choice voting bill that would prevent local primary candidates winning less than 50 percent of popular vote being elected. Sen. Sater said he decided to prefile the bill after watching the last few election cycles at the local level.

He said, "After seeing a number of crowded and contentious local prima-

ries over the last few election cycles, I was concerned those races resulted in a lack of consensus in candidates and then, perhaps, a lack of willingness to work together after the election. Maybe the candidate who won did so with only 25 percent of the vote and some voters still have hard feelings. That makes it more difficult to get everyone on the same page and do the job they were elected to do."

The bill, SB 140, would have voters rank their candidate choices. Then, the clerk's office would count votes and drop the candidate with the least number of votes. Then, there would be another round in which the votes are recounted with the remaining candidates until the highest-ranked candidate wins.

When only two candidates remain, the candidate with the most will be

The Southwest R-5 School District is asking voters to approve a \$1.3 million bond issue to make repairs to the middle school gymnasium and elementary restrooms during the April 4, 2017, Municipal Election. The issue, which won't affect district residents' taxes, will alleviate a significant need for the district's buildings.

According to Southwest superintendent Tosha Tilford, the repairs are necessary to care for existing buildings in a responsible way. She said, "The Southwest School District has the philosophy that it is important to take care of the facilities with which we have been blessed. After doing a facilities review, it was clear that there were some areas of concern with our facilities."

Among those repairs are a stabilization of the foundation of the middle school gymnasium and repairs of existing elementary school bathrooms, which have aging plumbing and some are out of order entirely. The plan also includes the construction of new bathrooms on the north end of the building between the classrooms and the multipurpose building.

The gymnasium repairs will include addressing the separation of the west wall from the rest of the building. As part of that, extensive soil sampling will be included, as well as some additional improvements that patrons of the district have suggested. The gymnasium, also known as 'The Pit,' will also receive a new floor, insulation, a new ceiling and air conditioning.

The elementary repairs and renovations will build the new restrooms, as mentioned, but also repairing the north end shared restrooms which are not functioning. Plumbing under the floor will be fixed, making renovations to restroom facilities lasting.

If voters approve the bond issue, the school will move forward with the plans, hoping the repairs will be completed before the 2018-19 school year, according to Tilford. She added she is requesting bathroom renovations are completed before classroom renovations.

All repair work will be overseen by a management group hired by the school, CTS Group. Should the issue pass, they will seek bids and offer guidance to the district on selection of a company and the repair process.

Should the issue not pass, Tilford said the district would work with what they had, but repairs would not be able to be made. She said, "If voters do not pass the bond issue, the school district will continue to band-aid and make do, but the repairs and renovations will not happen."

Tilford said, "The Board of Education is being very frugal with the amount which they are asking of the community."

Voters in the district will make the decision in April. A 'yes' vote will allow Southwest to utilize a \$1.2 million bond to repair facilities without any added taxes to district residents. A 'no' vote would defeat the issue.

Tilford said, "I am a patron of the district and a graduate of Southwest. I understand the concern when any agency asks for a bond issue. With this bond issue, the .85 bonded debt will not increase. The Board of Education at Southwest would not be asking for this bond issue if it was not a necessity.

"There is a tremendous difference in wants and needs. These projects are needs for the district so that the students can continue their education in wonderful facilities just as many others, including myself, had. I can say that I have so many fond memories in "The Pit", I would be devastated if the district would not maintain what they have."

Tilford also said she is asking for community input through a bond issue committee. Currently, there are 11 people on the committee, but the school wants to have as many as are interested. 
declared the winner. If one candidate has more than 50 percent of the vote at any time during the rounds process, they are declared the winner of the election.

Barry County Clerk Gary Youngblood was not supportive of the change, claiming the process would cause obstacles for voters. He said, "You have to rank four or five choices, it'll be a difficult thing to do. Explaining it to voters will be the most difficult part. They are more than likely just going to vote for the person they want to win like they always have."

Sater said he didn't anticipate the change would be too confusing to voters. He said, "A number of cities around the country already do instant runoffs and voters in Maine just approved it at the ballot. Voters are smart. Voters approve constitutional amendments in Missouri. They vote on statutory changes. They have a lot of responsibility and do their job well. I am confident they can adapt to different voting methods, especially one that gives them more choices and candidates with broader support."

Other concerns Youngblood, as well as other county clerks across the state, has also been the cost of programming the

voting machines to rank candidates.

Sater said he is listening to county clerks' concerns but still wants to find a good answer to elections with a high number of candidates. He said, "I understand those concerns. If instant runoffs prove to be cost-prohibitive and delay elections or election results, that may not be the best option for us to solve this problem. I thought the conversation at least deserved some consideration and for us to put our heads together and see if we can find a way that makes this work for the clerks and gives us a candidate that gets majority support from voters."

If SB 140 were to pass, it would take effect as of January 1, 2016, and would only apply to Primary elections.

Youngblood said, "Honestly, I'm not much of one to change how we've been going it and how we've been doing it if it works."

He added, "I don't like the legislature passing laws they don't fund. Programming your machines to count something like that is going to be pretty significant. I don't know enough about how it is going to work to expand on it, but there will be cost with it."

Sater said, "First off, ranked-choice voting is just another way of saying "instant runoff". Many states already have runoff elections when a candidate doesn't reach a certain vote threshold and they do them in a variety of ways. I simply wanted to start a conversation on what options may be available to Missouri to solve this problem. Missouri has a relatively late primary so having a runoff election a month or so after really shortens the general election time frame, putting those candidates at a disadvantage, and makes it difficult to send out and get back military ballots. Also, another runoff election costs a lot of money. I am looking for a solution that would satisfy the need for a runoff election while also saving time and money."

SB 140 was pre-filed and is now passed onto the Local Government and Election Committee.





Collector Janice Varner also asked the commission for an additional \$15,000 computer programs and training, but that was denied.

Other increases departments' budgets include a three percent pay increase for county employ-Youngblood "Since we passed the [1/8 cent] sales tax, we've been able to give them that for the past two or three years."

There were increases for employee benefits through health insurance premium changes.

The final increase in the budget was a pay bump for officials elected in 2016. The salary commission voted to give a pay increase to county officials for the first time since 2005, according to Youngblood. The positions that will be affected by the five-percent increase are the assessor, coroner, associate commissioners and sheriff.

sheriff's The ary, which is dictated by assessed property valuation, was increased from \$50,000 to \$52,000, however, with the five percent increase, the final salary for sheriff is \$54,600. The assessor's pay changed from \$45,000 to \$47,250, but that change will not begin until September. The coroner salary changed from \$16,000 to \$16,800, and the associate commissioners' salaries increased to \$31,185.



Hermansen lives in Cassville with her husband, Wade, of 20 years. They have three children: Clara, 16, Andrew, 13, and Olivia, 10.



Southwest School Board Meeting Highlights

The Southwest R-V School District Board of Education had a regular meeting on January 12, 2017.

The Southwest Board of Education was recognized for Board Appreciation Month. The board members were presented with a certificate from the Missouri School Boards Association. In addition, the board received a thank you card and several emails thanking the board for the December stipend.

The district received a letter on December 23, 2016, stating that the Southwest R-V School District is designated as "Accredited" under the Missouri School Improvement Program 5.

There are two resignations and two retirements that were presented to the board. This first resignation is Carol Griffin who was a special education one-to-one aide. She resigned as of the end of the day on December 21, 2016. The other resignation was Chase Cantwell from assistant boy's basketball assistant coach. There were two retirements which has officially been turned effective the end of the school year, Billie Sapp and Julie Pruitt.

The board approved the consent agenda.

The board approved policies/procedures 2016-D as proposed by MSBA.

The board approved the ballot language and resolution for the bond issue which will be ran by the school district in April 2017.

Southwest R-V Draft Bal-

PROPOSITION 2 Shall the Board of Education of the Southwest R-V School District, Missouri, without an estimated increase in the current debt service property tax levy, borrow money in the amount of One Million Three Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,300,000) for the purpose of providing funds to complete structural repairs and renovations to the Middle School gymnasium; complete repairs and renovations to existing Elementary School restrooms; construct additional restrooms at the Elementary School; to the extent funds are available, replace existing HVAC units at the Elementary and Middle Schools and complete other remodeling and repair improvements to the existing facilities of the District; and issue bonds for the payment thereof? If this proposition is approved, the adjusted debt service levy of the School District is estimated to remain unchanged at \$0.85 per one hundred dollars of assessed valuation of real and personal property.

Extension seeking Century Farm Families to recognize

If your farm has been in your family since Dec. 31, 1917, you can apply to have it recognized as a Missouri Century Farm.

To qualify, farms must meet the following guidelines. The same family must have owned the farm for 100 consecutive years. The line of ownership from the original settler or buyer may be through children, grandchildren, siblings, and nephews or nieces, including through marriage or adoption. The farm must be at least 40 acres of the original land acquisition and make a financial contribution to the overall farm income.

University of Missouri Vice Chancellor for Extension and Engagement Marshall Stewart said, "Family farms have been among our most vital partners since the founding of extension more than 100 years ago. The century farm program is one way we express our gratitude to those who have contributed so much to Missouri agriculture."

In 2008, the Missouri Farm Bureau joined MU Extension and the MU College of Agriculture, Food and Natural Resources as a program sponsor.

"Missouri Farm Bureau is centuryfarm.

a proud partner in the recognition of century farms," said Blake Hurst, president. "We applaud the hard-working farm families that have kept us fed and clothed for generations. They represent an important part of our heritage and laid a foundation for the bounty Americans enjoy every day."

Applicants certified as owners of a 2017 Missouri Century Farm will be recognized by the MU Extension center in the county where the farm is located. Applicants are presented with a sign and a certificate.

Since Missouri began the program in 1976, more than 8,000 century farms have been recognized.

For applications received by May 1, a \$55 fee covers the cost of a certificate, farm sign and booklet for approved applicants. If the application is received between May 1 and May 15, the cost is \$65. Applications must be postmarked by May 15, 2017, to be considered.






