City of Cassville council votes to allow fireworks in city limits

The City of Cassville City Council moved forward with approving an ordinance that will allow citizens to shoot off fireworks around July 4th starting this year. The decision came down to a three-to-one vote with the yes votes approving the change.

The council meeting on Monday night, February 11, included a continued discussion regarding the ordinance change. Alder-

man Jon Horner said a few changes were made from the original proposal to allow fireworks to be shot off within the city limits, "We made two changes since last meeting. We added a provision that changed the time fireworks are allowed until 11 p.m. on the actual fourth instead of midnight like it originally said. Then we added a restriction for not shooting them off near hospitals, nursing homes or fireworks stands.'

Little discussion was added regarding the ordinance, which had been brought up during the January meeting. The ordinance didn't pass in January due to an alderman missing and the need for a majority

of total council members' votes for it to pass.

During January's meeting, Horner expressed the desire for the city to be consistent and allow fireworks to be shot off since stands sell them inside city limits.

He also believed it would free up law enforcement from calls regarding fireworks on the Fourth of July.

During February's meeting, alderman Jerry Marple elaborated his concerns during discussion prior

to the vote. He said, "I did some research, and 11,900 people were treated in hospitals in 2015 for fireworks injuries."

Marple added comments on other statistics, as well. He concluded, "I think it's

One arrested in Purdy grocery store armed robbery

An Aurora man is in jail after being charged with the armed robbery of a Purdy grocery store. According to affidavits of probable cause by Purdy Police Department's officer Russ Nichols, Christopher James Owens, 28, of Aurora, held a cashier at knife point and stole an undetermined amount of cash.

Officer Nichols was dispatched to King Cash Saver in Purdy on Wednesday, February 6, around 6:55 p.m. The cashier told him a man had displayed an open folding knife, given her a plastic bag and demanded she put all of the money from the register inside.

At that point, the report states Owens fled the store on foot in an unknown direction. Deputies from the Barry County Sheriff's Department, the Wheaton Police Department and Purdy chief of police Jackie Lowe all canvassed the area, looking for the suspect based on a description given by the cashier, according to a post on the Purdy Police Department's Facebook page.

Owens was found on 9th Street with the item of clothing described by the cashier at King Cash Save,: a red hoodie with the Deadpool logo on the front, nearby. The affidavits of probable cause state the cashier positively identified Owens when he was taken back to the store.

The Facebook post details that officers found a large amount of cash on Owens' person, and the sweatshirt and the plastic bag, which still contained some of the money. The knife had not been found as of time of press.

Owens is charged with first degree robbery and armed criminal action. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail on a \$75,000 cash-only bond.

Seligman reserves funds planning ahead for water system upgrade

The City of Seligman is planning ahead and putting away money for future water repairs on the city's lines. At the regular city council meeting on Monday, February 11, the City of Seligman passed a resolution to grant the city the authority to set up a Certificate of Deposit (CD) with People's Community Bank of Seligman.

Since last year, the city has been raising their monthly water rates by five dollars annually, with the rates expected to reach a total increase of \$25 by 2023. The purpose of the CD is to act as a repository for the funds generated by that increase.

The funds from this annual rate increase will be a component in funding a larger water project in the city's future. In 2023, the city is planning to move forward with the replacement of a large concrete pipe that runs from city hall out to Highway 37 as well as putting in an additional water tower.

This change would not only allow the city to run more water with higher pressure, but will also eliminate some of the issues brought about by the aging of the current pipe. Currently, the pipe running from city hall to Hwy. 37 has been in place since the 1950's.

"That pipe is the backbone of our water system currently," said Seligman city clerk Brian Nichols.

The current pipe is made primarily of concrete. The replacement, according to Nichols, would be made of PVC and ductile iron. This would enable the pipe to be in place with little to no maintenance for years to come, effectively limiting the plumbing issues that have been plaguing the city for

"Ideally, by 2023 we should have around \$600,000 in there," said Nichols. "After that, we're planning to apply for about half a million dollar community development block grant. The rest of the funding would come from a bond issue that we would introduce once the rest of the funding was in place."

Estimates put the total amount for the project at roughly \$2.6 million. A sum of \$625,000 of that amount would go to the construction of the water tower, while the remaining amount would go toward the replacement of the pipe.

Fate of old Jenkins bridge to be discussed next Tuesday

Two years ago, the old bridge in Jenkins was closed. While the bridge that spanned Flat Creek was a popular meeting and swimming spot, the bridge was in bad shape. MoDOT issued a notice to the county commission telling them to close it. Now, a public meeting is slated to determine the fate of the old Jenkins bridge on Farm Road 1215.

The meeting will be held in the Clio Community Building on Tuesday, February 19, 6:30 p.m.

Barry County northern commissioner Gary Schad said the meeting is aimed at collecting public input regarding the fate of the bridge and what citizens would have the commissioners decide.

Options for the bridge are: demolition, offering it for sale to a private party or group or selling it to be deconstructed and taken off

Schad said, "We're having the meeting so that anyone who is interested in saying something or has a concern can speak up. We'll have our engineer there to have explain the deficiencies in it and why we're not repairing it. The engineer will also go over what would be needed for it to qualify as a pedestrian bridge."

Of the options, the most conservative financial option would be to sell the bridge. Schad said, "We're open to sell the bridge if there is interest. We'd heard from one person that there was interest by someone in buying it, but whether that is true or not, I'm not sure. They could take it apart and put it back together however they want to somewhere else."

Schad said the demolition option would cost the county around \$20,000.

If the bridge were bought and converted into a pedestrian bridge, improvements would have to be made to comply with all state guidelines and statutes.

All future maintenance would also have to be funded privately if the bridge were sold to a private person or

The primary reason the bridge was decommissioned to begin with was because the cost to rehabilitate the structure was more than the commission deemed was reasonable to pay. Schad explained, "It's been in a bad situation for awhile, but it's one of those bridges that there are alternate routes around that area. It's a bridge that the county commission deemed that it's just not worth spending anywhere from \$150,000 to \$350,000 to replace. We feel like that money could be spent on higher priority places."

Schad said so far, the commission hasn't gotten much feedback on the bridge. He said, "We've only heard back

from a couple people interested in the bridge meeting, but we want to make sure they will be heard on how they feel."

The meeting will be held at the Clio Community Building on Highway 39 near the intersection with Highway 248, on Tuesday, February 19, at 6:30 p.m.



Country Dodge closed without notice

Rumors abound after Cassville vehicle dealership Country Dodge's doors were closed with no notification to customers. According to employees, they were not given notice of the dealership's closure, either.

Multiple employees came forward with details regarding Country Dodge's rapid departure with no information regarding what will happen to employees' final paychecks or customers' cars that are still in the maintenance shop. As of time of press, no notices were displayed on the doors nor had calls been returned to customers asking about service being done on their vehicles.

According to Country Dodge employee Scott Roberts, "[The owners] addressed the staff on Monday. They told us they had two different buyers and would keep the place open for 60 days and that we would get paid and that they would help anyone who wanted to stay on through the transition. [Tuesday] morning, I was met at the door by my supervisor and told to get my things and go home. The phones and internet were disconnected. No one was there. It looked like a ghost town."

Another employee corroborated the claim, saying the doors were shuttered when they

showed up for work the next day, Tuesday, February 12

Roberts said, "[An owner] told us they were bankrupt." They continued to say keys to vehicles currently in the service department would be taken to the Barry County Sheriff's Depart-

As of time of press, the keys to those vehicles had not been delivered to the Sheriff's office and Country Dodge remains closed.

While rumors permeated the community of financial issues and termination of at least one employee prior to the closure, representatives of the Cassville Police Department and Barry County Sheriff's Department denied any investigation related to the dealership at this time.

Court records did not show any federal or state criminal, civil or bankruptcy cases open against any known owners or employees of Country Dodge as of time of press.

Calls placed to the two owners of the dealership seeking comment went unanswered, and messages were not returned.

There were reportedly 12 employees at Country Dodge when the location was closed.

a hazard to people in the community. I understand people are going to do it anyway, but a large number of kids under the age of 15 are injured every year. I think it's a community and health hazard."

During the vote, Marple was the lone council member who voted against the measure. Horner made the motion to approve the revised fireworks code, allowing shooting off fireworks within the city limits during special times. Alderwoman Cindy Carr seconded the motion. Horner, Carr and alderman Mike Vining all

voted in favor, approving the change.

Cassville's new fireworks ordinance will allow citizens to shoot off consumergrade fireworks within the city limits on July 1, 2 and 3, from 12 p.m. to 10 p.m. and July 4, from 10 a.m. to 11 p.m. Fireworks may not be discharged within 100 feet of a hospital, fireworks stand or nursing home nor if there is a burn ban in place.

The remaining days of the year, discharge of fireworks will still be prohibited within city limits.

Alleged axe threat outside Purdy store results in one arrest

Last week, an alleged Purdy altercation involving an axe resulted in one man's arrest. According to affidavits of probable cause by officer Russ Nichols, of the Purdy Police Department, Brian Christopher Coleman, 31, harassed the victim while brandishing a double-bladed axe. Coleman was arrested at approximately 7:27 p.m. on Thursday, January 31.

According to the affidavits, at approximately 6 p.m. on January 31, Coleman was in a store on Business Highway 37 at the same time as the victim. Coleman allegedly made comments to the victim as they passed in the doorway.

Coleman told the officer he felt threatened for his safety and walked away to his vehicle. Coleman then retrieved a double-bladed axe from his vehicle and walked back toward the victim, according to the report.

The affidavits state Coleman brandished the weapon, attempting to entice victim into attacking him.

Coleman is currently being held at the Barry County Jail on a \$25,000 cash-only bond for harassment in the 1st degree and unlawful use of a weapon - exhibiting, both felonies.

Sheriff's office seeking suspects in armed robbery

The Barry County Sheriff's Office is seeking tips regarding an armed robbery of the Viney Creek Store on Monday, February 11, around 1:35 p.m. The Viney Creek Store is located at the end of Missouri Highway J.

According to Major Leonard Collins, of the Barry County Sheriff's Department, the two suspects displayed a knife to the cashier before taking her cell phone and fleeing.

Collins said, "They didn't get money or anything else except for her cell phone."

The Sheriff's Office also shared information on their Facebook page, stating, "Two men dressed in black entered the store with masks on and threatened the clerk with a weapon." The post went on to ask for anyone who saw suspects wearing the clothing mentioned or people walking away from the store around that time to contact the Sheriff's office.

Collins confirmed the detectives with the department are still looking for leads to find the suspects involved. He

said, "The clerk couldn't get enough of a description for us to pinpoint any possible suspects. We have no suspects to look for at this time, so if anyone has any information, we'd be glad to follow up on it."

The Exeter Girls have volunteered at a number places. They have volunteered at Haven of the Ozarks, a local animal nokill animal shelter, as well as Roaring River Health and Rehab, a local medical center specializing in long-term care and rehabilitation

In addition, the ladies of the Exeter athletics teams have also volunteered in Shoebox for Soldiers, a charity that donates care packages to soldiers stationed overseas, as well as a food drive put on by Exeter schools.





Cassville Schools opening trade career paths for students

The City of Cassville has beenmaking economic development a priority in the last few months, and the Cassville Schools is following on that path. From the city's plan for the Industrial Development Authority, to the hiring of Isaac Petersen to fill the role of economic director, city officials have been doing everything in their power to work with the community to create more opportunities for success within city limits. Partnering with Cassville Schools to help shape the future Cassville work force is a logical next step.

"(We've) been working closely with the high school," said Steve Walensky, Cassville city administrator. "That's very critical because they are willing and wanting to find out what programs that they can introduce or strengthen so that we bring people [to the work force] through educational platforms. We know how to use that as a source for those people to stay right here in Cassville, have a successful career and make good money."

Dr. Richard Asbill, superintendent of Cassville R-IV Schools, elaborated on the school's mission to partner with the city on this initiative.

"Our purpose, when we talk about Cassville and opportunity, is to talk about the education and economic impact," said Asbill. "We have focused on how the success of the school and education and the success of our community and economics are linked together. When we talk about driving partnerships that provide an educated student base and also a future economic base, that's important to us."

Asbill and other school officials have been working closely with city officials, most notably, Ron Reed, economic development consultant for the city, to plan in a way that benefits students' future career paths and the community as a whole.

"The school has taken a very active role in trying to be much more aggressive in their training and trying to be more in-tune with their industries and what those industries' specific needs are," said Ron Reed, economic development consultant for the City of Cassville.

"We meet with Ron at least two to three times a month," said Asbill. "We also have a committee to help with economic development. We didn't want the city to be solely responsible for making it or not making it."

Asbill explained the school would be taking a more active role in the economic development of the community by helping to shape the curriculum at Cassville to better serve the needs of businesses within the community and, in turn,

prepare students to enter the workforce locally after they graduate, if that's the path they choose.

"If we have a business that has 10 or 100 employees, we want to know their needs so that we understand what their employment goals are," said Asbill. "We want our teachers and our students to start making some bridges to those businesses and seeing how we can help with that."

Asbill stated that a goal of the working relationships developing between Cassville School administration and local business would be to better train their students to be prepared for the business expectations in the area.

"A business is going to need an employee that comes in with certain traits," stated Asbill. "We need to know what those key foundational employment traits are. Those may be different for Justin Boot, versus Regal, versus George's, whatever it may be and that's okay, but there's going to be some trend topics that we can work from."

Another goal of this initiative is to keep Cassville graduates in town instead of seeking financial opportunity elsewhere. This move would help to improve the economy by ensuring a skilled work-

force of well-paid employees with an emotional attachment to the town and community around them.

To accomplish this, the school is working on establishing two different kinds of off-site programs, the first of which is an internship with local businesses.

"We want to provide students with a direct career pathway experience," stated Asbill. "Taking them from the classroom to a job site or a job shadow to work on a skill or pathway goal that they already have"

In addition, Asbill stated that the school would be working to provide educators with firsthand knowledge of the needs of the community, so as to help them better tailor their lesson plans to train students on the needs of their prospective career fields.

"We want our principals, especially our high school principals and administrators, counselors and teachers, to go out, visit and have an experi-

ence with our local businesses so that they understand what our local businesses are needing in job skill and future employees," said Asbill.

Asbill stated that school officials have already met with executives at Regal to begin working toward their goal though no information exists yet on the practical applications of this arrangement.

"You drive by Regal and say, 'Oh, that's a big building,' but they have manufacturing, engineering, quality control; there's a lot of things," said Asbill. "There's four or five career paths right there in that building alone."

Though Regal is the first to start on a path to working closely with the school, Cassville administration has taken steps to begin building relationships that would hopefully work in similar ways.


"Any time Ron [Reed] has gone out and had an economic development meeting, we've followed up with our administrative team going out and extending our gratitude for one, supporting Cassville by employing our parents, grandparents and future graduates, and two, being a partner and making Cassville great," said Asbill. "We believe that having that conversation and saying thank you will lead to those partnerships."

A formal program to achieve these goals has yet to be put in place. Despite that however, that hasn't stopped the school from laying the foundation.

"It's not going to occur overnight," stated Asbill. "This will take some time to kick in and get people there. We think it's a commitment."

Asbill expressed optimism for the future of the school's collaboration with the city.

"The more we collaborate, the smarter we are together, the better decisions we make for Cassville, the better the opportunities will be available for Cassville graduates," said Asbill.


