Purdy's fifth graders are all working together to get the word out to the community about the school's new addition, which doubles as a tornado shelter for the school and the surrounding

Purdy Schools is in the finishing stages of a FEMA shelter that doubles as a performing arts and early childhood center. Students have all been excited about the new addition for a variety of reasons, and when the fifth graders started asking questions, the opportunity

Students in the three fifth grade classes at Purdy were divided up into four groups with different tasks. The news outlet team, under the director of fifth grade teacher Mrs. Kelsev Fields, agreed to an interview and explained what they have been doing to educate themselves and the community.

When asked how they got started, Lane Chancellor said, "We started with a lot of questions on what we thought the community would ask and started

Another student, Levi Brazzeal, said, "We wanted to do this so everyone knew where to go and what to do if there is a tornado."

When the kids brainstormed about questions they thought the community would have, they started looking for answers. Jenna Adams said, "We asked our principal Mrs. Dalton, the superintendent [Dr. Steven Chancellor] and Mr. [Glenn] Terry." Terry is head of the maintenance department.

Dr. Chancellor said, "They were very thoughtful with their questions. I was expecting low-level questions but they were really upper level. Things like 'How would a person not connected with the school know what the procedures would be?' 'How would I know it was okay to go in and how would I know where to go if I wasn't from here?'

"They asked what would happen if people show up

with their pet or how they will know it's okay to leave. We're so focused on getting everyone in, but we've not really talked a lot in public for what the procedure will be for going home."

The more questions the students asked, the more excited they got about learning all about the school's shelter and how it would be used. With more questions came more concerns that people outside of the school might not know what the building was for or that they could use it, as well. So the fifth graders researched in their individual teams and came up with

Each different team was charged with a different task and a different teacher supervised them. The social media team is led by Mr. Brandon Funkhouser. The email and push notification group is led by Mrs. Stacy Stevenson, and the flyer group is led by Mrs. Abbi

Lane Chancellor said, "We split into groups so we could go over different things. One group gets some information and then another group gets other information."

As students continued their research, they were

given more free reign on how they researched the topics and what questions they would ask. And now, the students are the experts and they are equipped to educate others to keep them safe in the event of a tornado storm.

The kids shared things they learned in their research. Brooke Barnes explained why the building is on campus, "It's so students can get there pretty quickly." Students explained they learned that people have five minutes to get to a shelter once the tornado sirens go off.

7th Street bridge repair moves forward

The City of Cassville has hired an engineering firm to work on the 7th Street Bridge project, hopefully getting the bridge operational again summer 2019. The city officially hired the engineering firm Allgeier, Martin and Associates to oversee the project.

David Brock, Cassville public works director, said, "The current project schedule calls for an early 2019 bid announcement with construction in early spring and reopening in early summer. The caveat to getting to completion is whether our request for more State/Federal funding is approved. There are a number of issues still in the air and the Board of Aldermen may face some hard decisions if the additional funding does not come through."

The bridge was first damaged during the severe flooding in 2015 that led to a state of emergency in Barry County. Repairs were made to the bridge in the meantime while the city applied for FEMA assistance to fund a remediation effort to reconstruct the bridge in a way that would prevent future Flat Creek flooding from damaging the bridge and taking it out of commission.

The demolition phase of the bridge project was completed in April 2017 after heavy rains damaged the bridge further after the main flooding in 2015.

The city chose a firm it has worked with before to do the work. Allgeier, Martin and Associates is the engineering firm

Wheaton man arrested after 20 mile chase

A Wheaton man is in police custody after a 20 mile chase with police ended when he crashed his car near Wheaton. According to affidavits of probable cause Michael A. Pendergraft, 23, of Wheaton, also had three baggies of methamphetamine and an active warrant discovered by officers after he crashed.

On Friday, October 5, the Barry County Sheriff's Department initiated a traffic stop on a vehicle that Pendergraft was driving. Instead of stopping, Pendergraft led officers on a 20 mile chase, according to reports.

Pendergraft was observed crossing the fog line on Main Street in Cassville. When he turned into the Casey's parking lot, a female passenger exited on foot. Then, Pendergraft continued on through Barry County, travelling at high rates of speed. Eventually, Pendergraft crashed into a brick pillar on Farm Road 2130 in Wheaton.

Inside the vehicle, officers located three baggies of methamphetamine, multiple hypodermic needles, a digital scale, a glass pipe with residue, cut straws and a vial of unknown liquid.

Pendergraft is charged with resisting arrest for a felony, possession of a controlled substance and unlawful use of drug paraphernalia. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$20,000 cash or corp surety bond.

Verona woman killed in three-vehicle Monett crash

A Verona woman was killed in a crash outside of Monett on Saturday. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, a vehicle pulled into the path of a motorcycle, ejecting both riders before the first vehicle and the motorcycle hit a third vehicle.

On Saturday, October 6, a 2002 Harley Davidson motorcycle, driven by Tommy W. Summers, 43, of Verona, was traveling eastbound on US 60 about a tenth of a mile east of Monett. Around 7 p.m. a 1999 Ford Taurus, driven by Cecilia M. Miller, 68, of Purdy, headed southbound pulled into the path of the motorcycle.

The motorcycle hit the Taurus and the driver and a passenger, Heidi C. Summers, 46, of Verona, were both ejected. The Taurus and the motorcycle continued in motion and struck a third vehicle, a 2005 Chevrolet Silverado, driven by Trevor S. Bray, 37, of Highlandville.

Heidi Summers was pronounced deceased at the Cox South Hospital by Dr. Woodall at 11:24 p.m. Tommy Summers was seriously injured and also taken to Cox South Hospital in Springfield.

No injuries were reported from the other two vehicles. All parties involved in the crash were wearing seatbelts

or helmets, depending on the vehicle they were riding

As far as the overall project, Brock declined to give an estimate. He said, "I expect to receive a preliminary design with construction cost estimates in November; I hesitate to estimate construction costs until that time.

"We are sending a formal request to FEMA/ SEMA to change the scope of the project from a simple rebuild of the old crossing to an improvement due to regulatory requirements. If approved, these agencies are expected to contribute 85 percent of project costs. If it is not approved, the City will have to cover everything but the origi-

He added, "The City received FEMA's reimbursement for damages in 2017 in the amount of \$39,300 [75 percent of the original claim]. SEMA will contribute another 10 percent after completion. New construction on the bridge should prevent future flooding issues. However, that requires involvement in other agencies, including the Army Corsp of Engineers.

Brock explained, "The two primary Corps requirements that prohibits rebuilding the preexisting structure relate to the amount of flow that can pass under the structure and the ability of aquatic life to pass upstream/ downstream. Both of these requirements will affect the size of the opening(s) under the driving surface. We expect the new crossing to have larger openings that will pass more water and at slower speeds. The floor of the culverts will also need to be buried to allow the stream to maintain a con-

During the September city council meeting, city administrator Steve Walensky told the board, "We've had good luck with the person with the Army Corps of Engineers so far. We are hopeful the approval time line is on the shorter side."



Sydnae Hatton, of Centralia, and John Cavness, of Cassville, were united in marriage on August 4, 2018, on the beach at Clearwater, Florida.


Sydnae is the daughter of Harlan and Rhonda Hatton, of Centralia. John is the son of Joe and Sue Cavness, of Cassville.





what the teacher says."

The 2001 Pontiac Sunfire was totaled in the crash and towed by Brice's Towing, of Cassville.





Individuals 15 years or younger are still required to complete the inperson bowhunter education course to receive certifica-
