Beautiful weather marks open of trout season

Opening Day of trout season was a calm, clear day after the threat of a rocky start. While thunderstorms rolled into Barry County around 1 a.m., the opening shot fired at 6:30 a.m. was welcomed by anglers from all over the area with a chill in the air, but clear skies.

This year's opening shot was fired by representatives of Mako Fly Fishing, who have been longtime volunteers at the biannual Kids' Fishing Days in the spring and fall. Three different people fired the opening shot to mark the official beginning of trout season, which runs through October.


When asked what firing that shot felt like, Waymeth Werries said, "It was awesome. It was a once in a lifetime thing, and it was a privilege and an honor."

Waymeth's husband also fired a couple of shots. The other representative, Greg Edster, said, "It was a lot of fun"

Waymeth added, "We appreciate all the park does for us. We've been doing this for 15 years, the Mako Club coming down and volunteering on Kids' Fishing Day."

Missouri State Parks released information that 1,449 tags had been purchased by 11 a.m., 1,214 adult tags and 235 youth. Roaring River Hatchery stocked with enough fish for around 2,000 fishermen, even though they anticipated between 1,700 and 1,800 due to the first day being in the middle of the week. However, with no ice storm or below freezing temps to head people off, the shores were still pretty full.

Once again, members of the Cassville Area Chamber of Commerce were on site to serve coffee and provide free coffee mugs to the first 850 people to stop by their tent. Some even walked the shores with hot coffee, warming up anglers waiting for that opening shot to sound.

While the hatchery staff anticipated lower numbers to grace the park with the first day being in the middle of the week, the weather was cool, but clear and calm for those braving the mid-week fishing day.

Consider type when replacing storm-damaged trees

The most positive approach to tree selection is to decide where a tree is needed and what that tree should do in the landscape.

Is the goal to have shade, spring blooms or fall colors? Are power lines nearby or overhead?

"All of these questions are important and should be answered before the tree species is purchased for planting, said Kelly McGowan, horticulture educator, University of Missouri Extension.

Consider the maximum height of the tree at maturity. Do you have room to allow for the height and spread of the

"The growth rate of the tree may be important too. Generally the faster the growth rate of the tree, the more susceptible the tree is to storm damage," said McGowan.

The purchaser should also be aware of pest problems insects and diseases - and consider maintenance expenses of the tree.

"When possible, choose tree species that are highly resistant to pests," said McGowan.

It is also important to remember that soils in the Ozarks can be either poorly drained or overly dry.

"Be aware of your existing soil conditions and choose a species that will perform well under your situation," said McGowan.

If soils are extremely poor, McGowan recommends considering trees that are adaptable or amend soils to best meet the needs of the tree.

"There is no perfect tree for every situation," said McGowan. "But obviously, the recent ice storm in southwest Missouri is a reminder that planting the wrong tree in the wrong location can have consequences."



How Solar Panels Work

homes and even some businesses. Due in part to more aggressive marketing by solar energy companies, as well as greater awareness by customers, solar energy has become increasingly popular in recent years.

The Solar Energy Industries Association® reports that solar energy in the United States is booming. The association offers that, since the passage of The Solar Investment Tax Credit in 2006, solar has experienced a compound annual growth rate of more than 60 percent.

While many might assume that environmental preservation is the driving force behind the growing popularity of solar energy, it's actually the financial benefits of solar energy that are leading the way. One Block Off the Grid polled nearly 200 solar homeowners to learn more about their motivations for going solar. Roughly 75 percent would not have gone solar if there was no economic benefit to doing so. A number of people who have switched to solar say they are getting a high rate of return on the investment. The average electricity bill a person saw prior to solar energy hovered around \$177 a month. After the conversion, bills were now as low as \$55.

Those who are still pondering the decision to go solar may want to know more about how it works. Although the guidelines vary depending on location and the energy company issuing the bill, here are some of the basics.

Generating solar electricity

Solar electricity is generated through a process known as the photovoltaic affect. Sunlight shines on solar panels, which are mounted on the roof of the home or in another prominent location. Each panel typically has between 60 to 72 solar cells strung together. These photovoltaic cells use the irradiation in sunlight to stimulate the flow of electrons in the semiconductor material, which creates direct current, or DC, electricity. Systems that directly convert the DC to alternating current, or AC, the type of power voltage used in a house, do so by way of an inverter. The inverter feeds power to the circuit board.

Demand and excess

When the demand from a home or business is equal to the amount of solar power being generated, the system is working optimally. When solar power falls a bit short, grid power will make up the deficit. There's also the possibility that excess electricity will be produced.

In a grid connect system, certain areas may operate with

Solar panels are seen more and more on roofs of residential a 1:1 net metering policy, states Solar Reviews, which offers consumer reviews of solar products. This means that the utility company will credit a homeowner 1 to 1 for every kilowatt hour produced in excess because the excess energy goes back into the grid system. This is called "back-feeding" the grid. It's handy for powering homes at night with standard electricity at no additional cost. If the production of kwhs exceeds what is purchased from the utility each year, some utility companies will continue to credit for the excess.

Solar electricity systems are changing the way people think about energy. With the financial motivation to do so, consumers who embrace solar energy are helping the environment while also saving money.



Majestic Mill near Wheaton to serve egg producers across the area

If you've driven out to the corner of Highway 76/86 and Farm Road 1005 south of Wheaton, you've probably noticed a change: an impressive mill in construction phases. The new building and storage silos are eye-catching and generating a lot of talk about what is going on out there.

The new feed mill is called Majestic Milling Company, a project by Mark Hudson, of Jenkins, and his partners, Darren Griffin and Mike Carr. The mill is going to cater to commercial egg producers in the area, and the feed will be milled custom to their standards.

Hudson said, "Our primary customer is the cagefree independent commercial egg business. That is what we are making right now. Commercial feed and

deliver in semi-trucks to local farmers."

Hudson added that the need is driven by the trend in California and other east-coast states to require cage-free egg productions. He said, "The typical egg farmer has to buy their own hens and feed and markets their eggs. It's a better opportunity for local farmers, and we're trying to fill that need."

As an added element of dedication, Hudson, who has been in the grain business a long time, they are also utilizing a nutritionist. The feed customers will be able to send one of their eggs into the mill where it will be analyzed and a feed formulation will be provided to make sure the hen is getting the maximum amount of nutrition needed for their business. The service will be free for all of their clients.

Hudson said that while they have a few clients lined up, they are accepting new customers prior to their grand opening.

Construction on the mill began in October and is to be completed this month. The three men, all local farmers and businessmen, think the mill will be successful and demand will increase over time.

"What Hudson stated, drove it was the demand. I got this idea three years ago when a friend of mine was going into the organic chicken business and having feed shipped from Ohio, just the demand. I was looking for an opportunity to start something local in agriculture and have a sense of permanence. We'll be buying local corn and we'll help our local farmers. Limestone from Jasper



and the corn locally. We'll be buying as close to here as possible."

Right now, the mill will produce laying feed as well as pullet feed, all vegetarian and mash ground. The feed will not be bagged, but delivered in bulk to all customers. Each batch will be tailored to that customer and their supplier's

ration.

Hudson said, "We're hoping to provide other opportunities in the egg business, too. You can't have eggs without the feed.

"We're opening with a conventional line of feed, but we'll be considering an organic line, also."

MDC asks for help preventing forest fires

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds people that a combination of strong winds, low humidity, dry conditions, and warming temperatures this time of year has the potential for unexpected wildfires. According to MDC's Forestry Division, the main cause of wildfires is improper burning of debris such as trash and brush piles.

Each year, MDC staff work with fire departments around the state to help suppress numerous wildfires that can consume thousands of acres. The Department urges landowners, hunters, campers, and others in the outdoors to help prevent wildfires and offers the following tips.

Outdoor Burning

Do not conduct outdoor burning during times when grasses, brush and other fire fuel are very dry, humidity is low and weather is windy. Dry fuel -- combined with high temperatures, low humidity and high winds -- makes fire nearly impossible to control.

Check with local fire departments regarding local burn ordinances or burn bans that may be in place.

Your Local

A person who starts a fire for any reason is responsible for any damage it may cause.

Done properly, prescribed fire can be a beneficial tool to improve land for wildlife habitat and grazing. For more information on using prescribed fire as a land-management tool, visit mdc.mo.gov and search "Prescribed Fire."

Driving Off Road

Wildfires can start when fine, dry fuel such as grass comes in contact with catalytic converters on motor vehicles.

Think twice before driving into and across a grassy field.

Never park over tall, dry grass or piles of leaves that can touch the underside of a vehicle.

When driving vehicles off road, regularly inspect the undercarriage to ensure that fuel and brake lines are intact and no oil leaks are apparent.

Always carry an approved fire extinguisher on vehicles that are used off road.

Check for the presence of spark arresters on ATV exhausts.

Making a Campfire

Clear a generous zone around fire rings. When

humidity is low and wind is high, debris can become tinder for a stray spark or ember.

Store unused firewood a good distance from the fire.

Never use gasoline, kerosene, or other flammable liquid to start a fire.

Keep campfires small and controllable.

fire-extinguishing Keep materials, such as a rake, shovel and bucket of water, close by.

Never leave a campfire unattended. Extinguish campfires each night and before leaving camp, even for a few moments.

Smokers: Practice Extra Caution

Extinguish cigarettes completely and safely, and dispose of butts responsibly.

Don't Delay Calling for Help

Call 911 at the first sign of a fire getting out of control.

Report Forest Arson

Many wildfires are set by vandals.

Help stop arson by calling Operation Forest Arson 800-392-1111. Callers will remain anonymous and rewards are possible.

Did You Know?

In cooperation with the U.S. Forest Service, MDC provided more than \$344,000 in grants to 158 volunteer fire departments last year for protective clothing, equipment, and training. The Department also obtained more than \$4 million in equipment from federal government programs for volunteer fire departments in the state, and provided wildfire-suppression training to more than 400 Missouri firefighters.

Mercy nurse saves man from heart attack at Walmart

Billie Joe Ferrell paid for his groceries and fell flat on his

"I busted my head open," he said. The 63-year-old from Exeter, was having a heart attack. "I told the cashier I felt a bit woozy - that's about all I remember."

But it's an afternoon shoppers at that rural Walmart won't soon forget.

"I was on break, picking up candy for my staff, when I heard a lot of commotion on the other side of the store," said Tiffany Means, an emergency room nurse at Mercy Hospital Cassville. "I dropped everything and ran over there."

Still in her scrubs, she found Ferrell lying on the floor, unresponsive and without a pulse. Unlike many of the onlookers, she knew just what to do.

"They don't carry AEDs (automated external defibrillators) at the store, so I immediately started CPR," Means said. "I kept thinking, 'he's at death's door.' There still was no pulse, but I was determined to help save him."

Within minutes, Mercy Emergency Medical Services (EMS) crews were on scene to continue the lifesaving mission. Ferrell's pulse returned, and he was flown to Mercy Hospital Springfield, where

heart surgeon Dr. Sirish Parvathaneni performed a double bypass.

"I don't know how long I was out," Ferrell said. "But I do know that everything's been a miracle. If it wasn't for Tiffany and the Mercy team, I wouldn't be here today."

Ferrell, who had smoked for 50 years, now has his best reason to quit.

"I had a feeling this was coming," Ferrell said, who is now undergoing cardiac rehab at Mercy. "A few times a week, I'm stretching, walking and using all their machines. I'm

feeling great."

And so is Nurse Tiffany especially after a recent special

"He came by our ER in Cassville on his first day of rehab, to thank me personally," Means said. "Let me tell you, it was an absolute blessing. It's pretty emotional to have someone tell you they're only standing and living life because of you. It's so rewarding."

Ferrell is already on the second phase of his rehab, and plans to share his story to keep others heart healthy.



The McDonald County Mustangs pulled a huge upset on Tuesday night, closing out Cassville's season with a 47-43 score in the first round of the Class 4 District 10 boys tournament at Anderson. The host Mustangs rallied from a 28-22 deficit midway through the third period, and took the lead for good on a Brandon McAdams score with 1:08 left in the game.

Cassville took an early 10-2 lead, but McDonald County finished the first quarter with a 6-2 run to close the gap to 12-8. The Mustangs were cold from the floor in that quarter, but finally began connecting in the last three minutes.

Second quarter, same story, Cassville spurted to a 16-10 lead on a one-man run by Collin Pearman. The Mustangs battled to stay in contact and the half ended with Cassville holding a 19-16

Things got a little chippy in that quarter, especially between Cassville's Pearman and Mac's Devon Aubrey. Both players were warned by officials.

When the third quarter opened, Cassville claimed a 28-22 lead. That burst was capped by an Ethan Hoppes trey and a pair of Jarrod Wallace free throws. But Cooper Reece brought the Mustangs back, giving them a 33-32 lead with his corner trey at the buzzer.

The home field advantage was kicking in big time at the final break. The crowd was into it. The cheerleaders were loud and sassy, dancing to the William Tell Overture.

The underdog Mustangs had managed to hang around for three quarters and clearly sensed that an upset was possible.

After a tentative start to the quarter, Wallace tied the game, hitting one of two free throws with 5:38 to play. Reece regained the lead for McDonald County, but backto-back heists and scores by David White and Hoppes put Cassville back on top, 37-35. Boston Dowd of the Mustangs scored three the old fashioned way and the lead changed again.

Wallace got loose on the baseline and scored for a 39-38 Cassville lead at the 2:02 mark. It would be the last Cassville lead of the season. McDonald County away, outscoring pulled Cassville 9-4 over the final 1:44. Pearman scored a frustration bucket as the horn sounded, and McDonald County claimed the 47-43 victory.

The Mustangs did not look like a three-win team, and they could present a formidable challenge to Aurora in Thursday night's semis. Carl Junction defeated Monett in Tuesday's early game, and will face Webb City on Thursday.

Cassville ended the season with a 14-9 mark.

Free throw woes doom Purdy district hopes

A dismal 54 percent performance at the free throw line by the Purdy Lady Eagles was the difference in their 57-48 loss to Pierce City in the Class 2 District 12 championship game at Sarcoxie on Friday night. Purdy hit a paltry 15 of 28 from the charity stripe, including missing the front end twice when in the

For Purdy, losers only once during the regular season, it just wasn't meant to

the communities involved, this wasn't just a game. This was a happening, a small schools basketball woodstock. An hour before game time, Sarcoxie's tiny old gym was rapidly filling. A convoy of cars and pickups snaked north on Highway 37, filled with Eagle backers. Lots from Purdy, more from Pierce City, they all dreamed of a district basketball championship.

Pierce City hedged its bets by qualifying both boys and girls teams to the finals. But for the Purdy faithful, the season hinged on this one game after the Purdy boys fell to McAuley in the semis. One game in a gym where the Purdy girls had a history of heartbreak.

It was on this floor that Millers Hannah Wilkerson ripped out the collective hearts of Purdy in a bitter overtime district final back in 2010. Even though the Grant Young-coached Eagles would win a state title the following year, Purdy has never really gotten over that loss to Miller at Sarcoxie. It remains a raw wound that will not heal.

Fast forward to Friday night. Purdy stormed out of the gate to take an 8-2 lead. Zoe Brown scored in the lane to christen the scoreboard, then Layne Skiles poured in a layup after the Purdy press produced a turnover. Kendyl Hayward answered for Pierce City in the lane, but Devyn Callahan scored on a back cut with a slick assist from Skiles. When Rion Boyd claimed a loose ball and scored for the 8-2 advantage with 5:44 on the clock, it looked like the Purdy girls were on their way.

But the tide turned. Pierce City's defense tightened, and Purdy saw both Skiles and Cailyn Spears saddled with three fouls before halftime.

Hayward was a beast inside for Pierce City. The big center walled Skiles out of the paint for most of the first half, and scored a dozen points in that half. That included a critical offensive board and score to beat the buzzer and give Pierce City a 27-22 halftime lead.

Purdy's Eli Ernst had to be thrilled to only be down by 5 at the half. Foul trouble, an offense that scored 9 points in the first 3 minutes then managed only 13 points in the last 13 minutes of the half, and 8 of 14 shooting from the free throw line all combined to test Purdy's mettle in preparing for the second half.

Hayward opened the third quarter with a little baby hook in the lane, and Belle Golubski added a pair of jumpers to give Pierce City a 35-26 lead midway through the period. Skiles finally got untracked offensively for Purdy, scoring 8 in the quarter and pulling Purdy back within a single score when the quarter ended, 35-33.

Skiles drew a foul from Christine Stellwagen to open the final frame. She hit one of two chances from the line to cut the lead to a point, and

then Devyn Callahan scored with an offensive board to give Purdy the lead, 36-35, with 7:35 to play.

It would be Purdy's last lead of the season.

Hayward immediately put Pierce City back in front with a layup. Skiles, playing with four fouls, was forced to concede the basket. Golubski nailed another jumper, but Skiles tied the game at 39-39 with Purdy's only successful threeball of the night.

Ragan Blinzler put Pierce City back in front, and then the lead swung like a pendulum from 2 to 4 points and back, but always in Pierce City's favor. As the clock raced past the two minute mark, Purdy was forced to the foul and hope game.

That didn't work so well.

While Purdy's trips to the free throw line were more reminiscent of Marie Antoinette's walk up the steps to the guillotine, the Pierce City shooters were money at the line. The girls in green hit 18 of their 23 free throw attempts, a 78% clip. It was the difference in the game.

Skiles led all scorers with 23 in a valiant effort. Hayward led Pierce City with 22.

Purdy finishes the season with a 25-2 mark. Pierce City, district champions for the fourth time over the last five seasons, improved to 24-4 and will play Crane on Wednesday at Carthage.







Missouri's new fence laws to be explained

A program to discuss Missouri's complicated fence law is scheduled for Tuesday evening, March 7, from 6:30 p.m. to 9 p.m. The meeting will be held at the courthouse, located at 700 Main Street in Cassville. There is a \$10 charge for this meeting and that covers the program and materials. Pre-registration is required to insure adequate materials are prepared.

"Missouri continues to have a very complicated fence law, in large part due to the fact that two separate laws cover the state depending on the county that your land is in," according to Joe Koenen, Agricultural Business Specialist with University of Missouri Extension who will present the program March 7. "If you own land you really need to know the law and how it impacts you whether you own livestock or not."

"Another problem is that both laws are subject to interpretation and can be a little different, depending on the county you're in," said Koenen. A comparison of both laws will be given at this program. Koenen has been presenting programs on the fence law for over 25 years throughout the state. Landowners need to be aware of what the law is in their county and this meeting will help them better understand their rights and responsibilities.

This program will be delivered via Lync so attendees can see the presentation and also ask questions of the presenter. It allows the presenter to talk to several folks throughout the state without traveling concurrently.





The Souwthwest R-V School District held their February School Board meeting.

The calendar hearing on the 2017-2018 school calendar including start date started at 6:30 p.m.

In accordance with Missouri law, they must post notice of and hold a public meeting to discuss and vote on the district's start date if the proposed date is earlier than ten (10) calendar days prior to the first Monday in September. Since the proposed start date is August 9, holding a hearing is required. Superintendent Tosha Tilford enclosed the proposed calendar in board members' packets. In addition, the following bullets indicate proposed changes for next year's calendar as compared to this year's:

Staff members and parents were given an opportunity to provide input toward the 2017-2018 school calendar.

- Start of school: The first day of school will be Wednesday, August 9. This is a day earlier than this year's start date of August 11, which was on a Thursday.
- Christmas Break will be the same length as last year's and that is nine school days and 13 calendar days.
- Professional Development Days: All of the professional development days are on Monday except for the second one of the year that is on Tuesday prior to the start of school.
- Extended Weekend Breaks: Three day and four day weekends will be similar to this year, with corresponding dates changing slightly in some cases.
- Parent/Teacher Conferences: These are going to be one night from 1 p.m. to 7 p.m. instead of the two evenings that were in this year's calendar. The dates are October 9 and
- 12:30 Release: There will be four 12:30 releases one at the end of each semester and before each parent/teacher conference night (October 19, December 20, March 15, and the last
- Professional Learning Community Time (PLC): Every Friday, the students will be released at 2 p.m. so that the staff members can have collaboration time.
- Student Days: Last year, the students only attended 172 student days. This year, I propose that we increase the student days to 174 and return to the state recommended amount of calendar days.
- Teacher Days: This has not changed from the 180 contracted days that the teachers have attended in the past.

The Consent Agenda was passed by the board of education. Pertaining to personnel (item c), there was one retirement of Patricia Lee, speech pathologist. Ronnie Stanley also resigned from driving a school bus.

Amy Day was hired as a one-to-one paraprofessional for one of the students with high needs. High-quality, profitable beef made possible by genetic tests

Making quality beef for more farm profits becomes predictable by using genetic testing.

Meetings across Missouri will review current breeding technology and explain new genomic tools.

University of Missouri Extension specialists are planning a meeting in Springfield.

The meeting is called "Beef Cattle ReproGene" session, that's short for "Taking the next steps in beef cattle reproduction and genetics."

Jared Decker, MU Extension geneticist, says genomics goes beyond breeding advances taught in the MU Show-Me-Select Replacement Heifer Program.

Missouri herd owners can learn to produce more profitable cattle with better genetics. Both producers and buyers have learned at the Show-Me-Select sales in spring and fall. Repeat buyers come back to bid more for replacement heifers in the Show-Me-Select program.

Adding calving ease to the heifers has cut labor and frustrations. Most important, death losses have been decreased.

The protocols now used depend on proven genetics of the bulls. EPDs, expected progeny differences, guided improvement.

With genomic testing, all heifers in a herd can be DNA-tested. This provides accurate predictions of future calf performance.

Now producers can use genetic information on the male and female side of the herd, Decker says.

On the reproduction side, Dave Patterson will tell of new research that offers better conception rates from artificial insemination (AI). Split-time AI gets more cows pregnant.

Also coming is the use of sex-sorted semen. This allows making heifers or bulls. The sex can be set before insemination.

Many new tools are available on the genetic side, Decker said. Mostly, the tests are breed-specific. Different tests are used for registered and commercial herds. However, some tests work on crossbred or mixed-breed cattle.

DNA samples can come from blood drawn from a calf's ear or from the root bulb from tail hair. Many producers use convenient tissue sampling units that take a punch from the ear.

New technology allows breeding higher-value animals, selecting traits that improve pregnancy rates and carry through to final product at the packing plant.

To gain full advantage of the advances will take more attention to marketing of cattle.

Those attending can start on being a step ahead in building profits in their beef herds. As cattle prices fall, quality premiums gain value. Efficiency improves and adds sustainability.

Options will be explained in the three-hour session with a meal will be served.
