Woman killed by train at Purdy railroad crossing

A Purdy woman was killed and her two young grandchildren were seriously injured when a train hit their car in Purdy last week. They were going through a railroad crossing when her vehicle was hit by a train on Washington Avenue in Purdy on Wednesday, February 19.

According to a post by the Purdy Police Department, they responded to the motor vehicle crash at the Washington Avenue railroad crossing around 4:21 p.m. A 2000 Honda Accord, driven by Fransisca Perez Salas, 59, of Purdy, was eastbound on Washington Avenue. The railroad crossing alarm and the train's horn were sounding when she attempted to cross, but that intersection does not have crossing gates. The Honda Accord failed to yield to the southbound Missouri-Arkansas Railroad General Electric SD70 Locomotive, operated by Michael D. Richardson, 51,

Perez Salas was killed in the crash. Her two grandchildren, a male, 3 years old, and female, 8 years old, were both seriously injured. According to the Missouri Highway Patrol crash report, they were transported by helicopter to Cox South Hospital in Springfield for treatment.

Perez Salas was wearing a seat belt, but the two children were not.

Perez Salas was pronounced deceased at the scene by assistant Barry County coroner Gary Swearingen. She was taken to Fohn Funeral Home in Cassville.

The Missouri State Patrol Troop D conducted the investigation. This is Troop D's 13th fatality for 2020.

The 2000 Honda Accord was totalled and towed from the scene by Thomas Towing of Monett. The locomotive sustained minor damage and was driven from the scene.

Responding to the scene were Purdy Police Department, Missouri State Highway Patrol, Purdy Fire Protection District and Barry-Lawrence Ambulance.

Opening Day preparations underway

Preparations are well underway for one of the busiest days of the year in the Cassville area. Opening Day of catch and keep rainbow trout season is this Sunday, March 1, and Roaring River State Park is busy with preparations to make sure the waters and facilities are ready for the big event.

Opening Day will begin at 6:30 a.m. with the opening gun fired by State Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick this year.

While typical fish stocking and bank clean up have been the focus leading up to Opening Day, Roaring River State Park staff have been busy completing multiple projects, including upgrading some of the electric hookups in campsites, renovating lodge rooms, and cleaning up natural areas near the cabins and completing glade restoration. They are also in the process of making changes to Eagle's Nest Trail and getting the park's new wifi set up for

manager Paul Spurgeon, they will be stocking Roaring River's cool, clear waters with 7,000 trout in preparation of Opening Day this weekend. The staff anticipate around 2,000 anglers for the opening of the season if the weather goes according to forecast. Right now, the high for Sunday is 60 degrees.

jor overhaul renovation project, the fish will come from Montauk State Park's hatchery. Spurgeon said the plan is to bring in fish once a week during catch and keep season. "We'll run the six pools down at the end with recirculation pumps [to keep trout]. They'll be bringing in fish weekly, and we'll be stocking daily. There are 100 lunkers in that number and they are really nice. It's some of the best ones we've had in several years, and they all came in from Montauk," he said.

Hatchery staff also worked on cleaning the stream banks and removing some gravel to ensure the water is clear and ready for anglers. Spurgeon said, "We have dressed up the stream banks and we are in the process of removing gravel out of Dry Hollow, but the stream banks are all dressed up, and there won't be any muddy water for anybody.

Roaring River State Park natural resources manager Joel Topham shared some of the preparations park staff have been completing to be ready, as well.

One of the bigger projects was an electric upgrade to 15 campsites in Campground 1. Topham said, "We upgraded to 50 amp sites. It's always been a call from our customers to upgrade our systems with the ever-changing RV industry. Campers keep getting bigger, and they keep adding a lot of different apparatuses and with that, it increases the need for electric. Thirty amp just doesn't cut it a lot of the time."

The sites that include 50

amp services are numbers 42, 43, 44, 45, 46, 54, 55, 56 and family sites 47, 49 and 51. The regular premium sites are \$25 per night versus \$23 for a standard 30 amp electric site. The family sites are \$8 for just the premium electric and \$58 for the single family campsite that includes a full hookup. Family campsites have two camping pads on each site.

Topham also said the wifi upgrade that was planned for the park was almost complete. He anticipates it will be fully ready for campers to utilize by the end of March. He said, "We are actively working with our partner go-Bec. They've actually successfully hooked up all of their fiber throughout the park, so we are just waiting on our end of that. We are scheduled for March 10 to get all of that hooked up and hopefully do a test run shortly thereafter."

Initially, the former director of Missouri State Parks said the pilot wifi program would be free for 30 minutes and then be a paid service following that. Topham said the details are still being discussed regarding how wifi will operate in the park and how much it will cost, if the state opts for a fee to use it.

Other state park staff improvements include restoration work and rerouting Eagle's Nest Trail, which has been closed for an extended period of time. Topham said, "We are working toward getting Eagle's Nest Trail open. We are rerouting the trail right now. We have several new clearances in the works. We are hoping we can get that completed by the end of

For Exeter's Blazi Lowe, the devastating diagnosis of a brain tumor shook her family. However, her uncle and well-known professional bull rider Mason Lowe was one of her biggest supporters through it all. Following Mason's untimely

death, the PBR stepped in, raising money in honor of both Mason and Blazi, and that donation of \$15,000 was presented to St. Jude Children's Hospital recently.

Mason Lowe tragically died from complications related to a bull riding accident in Denver, Colo., on January 15, 2019. Four months later, a PBR bull riding event was hosted in Cassville and eventually, they raised \$15,000 in his name.

Seven injured in crash south of Aurora

Seven people were injured in a crash south of Aurora on Sunday evening, February 23. Around 9:05 p.m., a GMC pickup crashed into a 2019 Chevrolet Tahoe after failing to stop at a stop sign. The injuries ranged from minor to serious.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, the pickup was driven by a 15 year old female from Galena. The Tahoe, driven by John R. Brooks, 33, of Cassville, was southbound on MO 39 about two miles south of Aurora when the pickup failed to stop at a stop sign on a county road. The pickup hit the Tahoe's front

driver side and both vehicles ran off the highway.

There were four people in the pickup, all of whom were ejected during the crash. The driver suffered moderate injuries and was taken to Mercy Hospital in Springfield. Two occupants in the vehicle were also transported to Mercy Hospital. Shawn L. Hair, 21, of Billings, was taken for minor injuries and Cody G. Lomax, 17, of Crane, was seriously injured. The fourth person in the vehicle was also seriously injured. Jacob A. Hair, 22, of Billings, was taken to Cox South Hospital in Springfield for treatment.

The Tahoe had two pas-

sengers, a juvenile one year old male and 35 year old Lindsay J. Brooks, of Cassville. John and Lindsay Brooks suffered moderate injuries in the crash. The one year old suffered minor injuries. All three were transported to Cox South Hospital in Springfield.

All three people in the Tahoe were wearing seat belts at the time of the crash.

Both the Tahoe and pickup were totalled in the crash. The Tahoe was towed form the scene by Brice's Towing, of Cassville, and the pickup was towed from the scene by Hillbilly's Wrecker.

Other improvements included five room remodels at the inn, new furnishings at the lodge, and improvements to glade seven on Fire Tower Trail, cleaning up the hillside by the inn and the cabins and drainage improvements in Campground 2.

Topham added the park will be reopening the pool for at least this season probably for the last time and plans to change to a splash pad for next season. The park also moved to increase the camping season at Camp Smokey to April 9 through October 31. There are currently only two weeks opened at Camp Smokey this year.

The last remaining big project at the park is the hatchery renovation. Spurgeon said the project is really only two to three weeks

of work to get the hatchery fully operational again, however, the wet weather has led to many delays. The \$1.9 million renovation began September 2018, and the hatchery has been closed for fish since. Spurgeon said, "We are waiting on lower spring levels because they have to put a concrete connector at the mouth of the cave and build that last structure. It's partially built, but when the rain came, 100% of the spring has to be pumped away from that opening. They haven't been able to do that since 60 cubic feet per second; it's been

130-150. There are only two or three weeks of work to complete once the water goes down. We were very close and then it rained. They did get the footing poured for the structure."



Butterfield, Purdy Fire learn extrication skills

The Butterfield and Purdy Fire Departments got together last Saturday, February 22, at Payless Auto Salvage to train using extrication tools. The training the firefighters underwent will help them save a life in the event of a car crash where someone is trapped inside a vehicle.

Both Butterfield and Purdy use Amkus extrication tools. The training was conducted by Precision Rescue owner Dean Deters who is distributor for Amkus Rescue Systems. There were 32 firefighters present during the training.

During the training, they had cars set up to look like a real emergency scenario. Neither fire department had much training with their tools prior to the event. De-

ments how to use the tools correctly to save lives.

"It was a good refresher for experienced members and good training for new members on the fire department," said Nick Mercer, Purdy Fire Chief.

Before, Purdy and Butterfield Fire Departments called Monett Fire for auto extrications. Now that they have the tools and experience on how to use them, they can get people help faster without waiting for another department to make it to the scene.

Everyone on the department was hands-on during the training. Experienced extrication specialist Deters gave them advice and ideas on how to properly use the tools after a careful demonstration performed by him-

ters taught both fire depart- self while everyone watched and listened.

Butterfield purchased an Amkus ion 2.0 battery powered tool a little over a year ago. Purdy has Amkus hydraulic tools. Both departments learned to use each other's tools for their auto aid agreement, as well.







garten when she got sick. Blazi's grandmother Melissa Whisenhunt thought it was just an illness going around in the family.

Whisenhunt said, "On Friday [August 21], the baby-sitter called and said Blazi was crying because she had a headache and was throwing up. When I called the clinic, they said take her to Springfield immediately."

Once there, blood tests and a CAT scan were completed, and the family received the devastating news: Blazi had a brain tumor. The last four years had lots of ups and downs, but Blazi is now 10 years old.

Blazi has had four brain surgeries, one in Springfield and three in Memphis. She underwent one round of brain radiation, immunotherapy, and lastly a full brain and spine proton radiation. Blazi is doing as well as she can be expected given the circumstances. She still undergoes both physical and occupational therapy twice a

week due to a massive stroke after the first surgery and all the residual effect from the treatments.

Mason was 25 when he passed away on January 15, 2019, after suffering injuries during a ride in Denver. Lowe, who competed professionally for the seven years prior to his death, was ranked 18th in the world. He ranked as high as 11th during his career.

Crowe said, "I'd known him since he was a little boy. When he was kid, it didn't take a lot to make him happy. He was always in a good

He added, "Mason was just a small town guy, and he never lost that small town feeling. No matter where he was, he was always the same. He always had time to talk to people. He especially had time for kids. That was something that was pretty phenomenal about him."

Kayla Lowe, Blazi's mother, said "Mason loved Blazi so much." Today, Blazi always remembers what her uncle told her: Don't weaken. "Don't Weaken, Love, Uncle Mason" is even the quote on the plaque that was erected in Mason's name at the hospital.

On February 14, 2020, Blazi and her family shared a special moment when they went to Memphis and had the honor to unveil and dedicate Mason's plaque on the wall. Mason's legacy will forever live on the wall of the hospital that has helped so many children and continues to help countless more.

Whisenhunt said, "It means everything to me to have my son's name on a plaque on the wall of the hospital. That helps my grandchild tremendously. When we first started our journey with Blazi, it took \$1 million a day to even open the doors of the hospital, now it takes \$3 million in five short years, and if one cent of the money donated in Mason's honor helps find a cure, then that's his story. That was God's plan."

The Lowe family knows Mason would be glad that his memory is doing good. In an interview with PBR in 2017, he talked about Blazi and why children's hospital work was important to him. He said, "We are really close. I have some cows and stuff and she names them. She has some wild ones like

Snowball. It is kind of funny. It can be a red cow, and its name is Snowball."

He continued, "Some of those kids, it puts a knot in your stomach because you don't know what they are going through, and you went through it with your family."

When asked about organizing the events to raise money for St. Jude in honor of Mason and Blazi, Crowe said, "When you see all the work that they do, it really humbles you. They are so appreciative of any donation they get. Getting to go and see what they do makes you appreciate what they do for families and kids... Their lives mean everything to me, and I don't know them. Hopefully they overcome what they have.'

Crowe added that there will be another memorial ride in Mason's name this year, as well, and he's hoping to raise even more money this year. He said, "My goal for this year's bull riding event is \$20,000."

There is an account set up at St. Jude in Lowe's name. While survival odds are improving thanks to continued research, there is a lot of room to improve outcomes for kids like Blazi.

Purdy producer sees success in first-year warm-season crop

The sea of native warm-season grass on Gene Cowherd's Barry County farm is a reminder of a time when buffalo grazed tall prairie grasses.

Cowherd's first-year grasses stand more than 6 feet high with thick, green undergrowth. The grasses are part of a diverse grazing system that also includes alfalfa, Bermuda grass, orchardgrass, red clover and novel fescue.

"It's a super stand," says Tim Schnakenberg, University of Missouri Extension agronomist and a NRCS + MU Grasslands Project team member. The project is a collaboration between the Natural Resources Conservation Service and MU Extension that provides technical advice and education to improve grassland sustainability in Missouri.

Cowherd's success dispels the notion that warm-season grasses need three seasons to establish and produce well. "Though train wrecks do happen with native grass estab-

lishment, if a producer pays attention to details and the weather cooperates, we can expect a very high success rate the first year," Schnakenberg says.

Cowherd is one of three Barry County producers who worked with Schnakenberg to establish warm-season grass pastures in 2019. "These producers wanted to broaden forage availability with a more highly productive, adaptive species that could be used for either pasture or hay," Schnakenberg says.

The project provides support for some producers to plant a few acres of warm-season grasses. Cowherd planted a mix of 60% big bluestem, 30% Indian grass and 10% little bluestem. Because of his success, Cowherd plans to plant another 40 acres in warm-season grasses. He grazes two cattle herds now.

Due to the initial investment to establish and manage warm-season grasses, Schnakenberg recommends that producers make the transition in small increments. Seed cost can be more than six times the cost of fescue.

However, natives have a lower long-term cost of production, he says. Initial costs are offset by lower nutrient needs, extended grazing seasons and less reliance on hay and feed. Producers also should see fewer problems with endophyte toxins.

Heat- and drought-tolerant warm-season grasses flourish during the summer slump when temperatures rise, rainfall diminishes and cool-season pastures decline. Including warm-season grasses in grazing systems may allow 300 or more days of grazing, Schnakenberg says. This reduces Cowherd's reliance on other forage sources in winter and drought.

Cowherd sprayed out a wheat crop last April using glyphosate and at least two imazapic herbicides, Panoramic and Plateau. He seeded 11 pounds per acre of native grasses with a loaner drill from the county soil and water conservation district. This drill was set specifically for drilling native warm-season grasses.

Some seeds are light and fluffy, which makes it difficult to calibrate the drill properly. Cowherd made three trips over the field to insure the correct rate and get good seed-to-soil contact for a strong stand.

He applied imazapic again in July with methylated seed oil (MSO) as a surfactant. It was the first time he used the

oil-based adjuvant, which boosts the performance of certain herbicides.

Despite record rainfall, grasses established well and cattle will graze there next year. NRCS + MU Grasslands Project recommends delaying of grazing until the second year. This lets grasses establish strong, deep root systems before being subjected to the pressures of grazing and production.

Cowherd and Schnakenberg note that warm-season grass pastures need minimal fertilizer. Cowherd plans to add 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre and little to no phosphorus or potash. By contrast, his Bermuda grass pastures typically need 150 pounds of nitrogen per acre.

Warm-season grasses are when the field where the dem-

gaining popularity in part because of new technology for effective in-season control of broadleaf weeds, foxtail and crabgrass.

In addition to providing summer forage, warm-season grasses offer cover for wildlife such as quail and other ground-nesting birds.

Diversity and innovation are not new at the Cowherd farm, which his great-greatgrandfather bought in 1892. At one time, the family's Windymonte Vineyard grew 70 acres of grapes for Missouri wineries. They have also raised hogs, dairy cows and poultry. The family dairy operation earned the Holstein Progressive Breeder Award four times.

Cowherd remembers when the field where the dem-



onstration took place became eroded and unproductive due to past tillage and cropping practices. Cowherd hopes to restore pasture diversity and good soil health through research-based methods from his alma mater, the University of Missouri.

He earned a bachelor's in dairy husbandry in 1971 and a master's in reproductive endocrinology in 1973. However, his education did not stop there. "I just keep learning," he says.



Wheaton R-III Active Learning Day teaches students real life skills

For a lot of students nearing graduation, the adult world brings with it a lot of unknowns, like how to file taxes or cook a meal for just yourself. At Wheaton Junior/Senior High School, school administration and staff took the initiative to help students learn those skills.

Wheaton School hosted its inaugural Active Learning Day that featured a variety of different experience students could choose throughout the day to learn valuable life experience.

Principal Tyler Willis explained staff had been planning a day like this for awhile, and with an opportunity offered by the Missouri Army National Guard. He said, "Mrs. Christman [school counselor] and I have been thinking about it for awhile, and we weren't really sure when the best time would be to make it happen. Then, sergeant Billingsly with the Army National Guard came in about a training they do called HEART, Helping Everyone Achieve Respect Training.

"With that training, they wanted to do it in smaller groups with one grade level at a time. Since that was going to take a good portion of the day anyway, we thought this would be a good opportunity to do these sessions."

The school staff worked together to decide what types of classes to offer students to sign up for. Willis said, "I asked teachers, students, and anyone in the community for potential sessions and potential pre-

senters, and it all came together."

They held the Active Learning Day on February 7, and the school offered experiences on preserving food, emergency first air, vehicle maintenance, graphic design and apps, income taxes, line dancing, cooking, and more. Missouri State Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick also attended as a special guest to talk to students

The whole day was dedicated to hands-on learning and real world experiences.

Willis explained the idea behind the Active Learning Day, "I wanted a day where students got to choose what they learn. I wanted them to find something they were interested in and leave with information they didn't learn before and hopefully they found valuable."

The response from students was overwhelmingly positive, and they are considering hosting one or two Active Learning Days each school year in the future, as well.

Willis said, "It was really positive. I had several students comment asking if we would do it again. Then, I had a lot of people come to me with ideas for sessions for future Active Learning Days. Overall, I think it was really positive."

Sessions that really resonated with students were the cooking for one class, vehicle maintenance and first aid. Willis said approximately 80 percent of the student body attended the cooking class.

He continued, "The emergency first aid was re-

ally popular where they learned CPR, what to do in the case of an emergency if someone has a seizure and stuff like that."

The session that surprised Willis was the interest younger students took in the income tax session. He said, "The income tax session, the intention was juniors and seniors would bring it in, and we could work through it with them. It ended up having several younger students, including a handful of seventh graders, interested in it, so the presenter could make it a little more appropriate for the students' needs."


During FFA week, students do many leadership and team bonding activities. The greenhands dress up in their best redneck clothes as an initiation.

They will attend the annual state FFA convention in April and host their annual Banquet in May where they will install their new officers and begin planning events for the next school




