On Thursday morning at 6:30 a.m. on the dot, shots rang out and anglers along the banks of Roaring River cast their lines, and you couldn't have ask for much better weather for it.


As soon as trout season began on Thursday, people all along the river were pulling trout out left and right. Walking the banks, you could hear people talking about catching their limits within 20 minutes or so, packing up and heading out. Despite the brief, heavy rain the weekend before, the fishing was good and murky waters didn't seem to put a damper on the day.

Opening Day at Roaring River State Park this year sold 1,620 tags, of those 265 were youth tags and 1,355 were adult tags. This year wasn't far off from 2017's numbers. The Wednesday opening last year netted 1,574 tags, according to Missouri State Parks.

This year's opening gun shots were fired by a long-time volunteer with Roaring River State Park. Each year, the honor is extended to a state official or volunteer with ties and dedication to the park. This year, the invitation was given to Charlie and Ramona Stock, Kids' Fishing Day volunteers from Booneville.

Ramona fired the gun to signify the official start to trout season. "It was awesome," she replied when asked how the experience was.

Ramona and Charlie agreed have both been volunteers during Kids' Fishing Days and WOW events for the

Firework prompts lock down at Southwest

A firework set off near Southwest Schools prompted a campus-wide lock-down on Thursday morning, March 1. According to the school, the lock down was initiated at 9:17 a.m. and lifted by 9:55 a.m.

Major Leonard Collins, chief deputy with the Barry County Sheriff's Department, confirmed that students were not in any danger. "It was only a firecracker, but it was pretty loud. It was not meant to be a threat."

The Barry County Sheriff's Department responded to a 911 call about the event as soon as the firework went off.

Collins continued, "It was

between the highway and the school property, but I can't give an exact location."

When officers arrived, Collins said they were prepared to enter the school, but it ended up not being necessary. "It was determined what happened pretty quickly, so we never had to go into the school"

Southwest's superintendent Tosha Tilford said the lock down was done as a precautionary measure because of how seriously the school takes student safety. "The Southwest R-5 School District wants to insure the parents and community that the safety of the students is our primary focus.

The lock down on March 1st was done as a precautionary measure. There was no threat to the students or any staff members at anytime," Tilford stated.

The Barry County Sheriff's Department is not pursuing charges associated with the firecracker incident. However, the City of Washburn might.

Washburn Police Chief Terry Meek said, "I've turned all of the information over to our city's attorney, and if she wants to proceed with charges, I'll support that."

No charges have been filed against the person who set off the firework as of time of press.

Purdy "immortals" advance to the Final Four

It wasn't quite as momentous as Neil Armstrong's "One giant leap for mankind" line, but Jeremy Dresslaer's "Making the final four is like the land of immortality" quote will live forever in Purdy basketball lore.

The Purdy boys basketball team will go where no Eagle has gone before. A 70-64 win over Crocker in the Class 2 quarterfinals vaulted this Purdy team into the Final Four, the los últimos cuatro, of Missouri high school basketball.

No Purdy boys team has ever reached the final four in any MSHSAA sport. Until

It took a gut-wrenching effort to secure the victory though. Purdy saw a 15-point lead evaporate in the fourth quarter as Crocker stormed back to within 3 points in the final minute and half. But the Eagles scored their last 8 points from the free throw line and survived the Lions' comeback.

A 69-63 sectional victory over Blue Eye at Carthage on Wednesday set up the contest with Crocker. With a 22-8 record and a roster loaded with ten seniors, the Lions mirrored Purdy in many respects. Plus, Crocker had size. Ethyn Boorom and Logan Wright towered over the Purdy interior players.

Tight rims, tight defense.

Playing in Drury University's O'Reilly Center, the teams struggled to score early. The rims in big college arenas are a hair less forgiving than most high school gyms, and both the Eagles and the Lions missed shot after shot in the opening minutes.

Adam Shockley, Crocker's best outside shooter, had his nose bloodied on Colt Keeling's drive with the opening tip, and had to sit for medical attention after just 11 seconds of play.

Halfway through the quarter, a Colt Keeling stickback gave Purdy a 5-1 lead. Boorom gave Crocker a 6-5 lead at the 2:47 mark, and then Tyler Keeler threw in a long trey. But that shot was waved off on the first of many offensive foul calls of the night.

Shockley returned to the floor and drove for a bucket and an 11-9 Crocker lead. Then the Lions stole the inbounds pass, but Keeler planted himself in the lane and drew a charge that wiped off a Shockley layup.

At the other end, Keeler drove the baseline and scored with just 2 seconds on the clock to tie the score at 11-11.

Colt Keeling took over in the second quarter. A beast on the boards, he scored 7 points in the period to lead a 19-8 Purdy spree that gave the Eagles a 30-19 halftime lead. The Purdy run was highlighted by a trio of Hunter Cook free throws at the 2:03 mark, part of a run of 7 consecutive points by the Purdy senior.

The Purdy crowd roared its approval as the Eagles left the court with a double digit lead.

The third quarter started ominously for Purdy. Crocker had three straight chances for three-point plays, but three different shooters all failed to convert their bonus shots. Still, the Lions had halved the Purdy lead in just 1:13 off the clock, and had forced Dresslaer to burn a time out.

Then, Keeler led a furious Purdy scoring fest.

MSHP offers boating courses

Colonel Sandra K. Karsten, superintendent of the Missouri State Highway Patrol, announces the Patrol will participate in the National Association of State Boating Law Administrators' Spring

Aboard campaign. Developed by NASBLA, and produced under a grant administered by the U.S. Coast Guard, the annual Spring Aboard campaign informs and motivates boaters to prepare for the boating season by providing information on how to enroll in a boater education course. The campaign emphasizes enrollment in approved courses which

meet the national boating educational standard.

The Spring Aboard campaign encourages boaters to register for a certified boating educational course during the week of March 18-24, 2018. Forty-nine states and U.S. territories require some form of boater education.

Missouri law requires everyone born after January 1, 1984, who operates a vessel on Missouri lakes to possess a certified boating safety education card and photo ID. This includes personal watercraft operators.

Boaters have the opportunity to sign up for a certified course in a classroom or take an online course by visiting the Patrol's website at www.mshp. dps.mo.gov. Look under Training on the Patrol's homepage for the "Boat Safety Education & Certification" link. The classroom courses provided by the Missouri State Highway Patrol are free, but registration is required and the boater ID card costs \$15.


U.S. Coast Guard statistics indicate that of the boating accidents where the level of operator education was known, 77% of boating deaths occurred on boats where the boat operator had never received boating education instruction. In contrast, only 13% of deaths occurred on vessels where the operator possessed a nationally-approved boating safety education certificate.

"The primary boating season is right around the corner in Missouri," said Col. Karsten, "and our many beautiful waterways provide the opportunity for all types of boating activities. The Patrol encourages those who have not already taken a course to sign up for a boating safety class now. This ensures you're ready to boat safely when the boating season arrives."

Webb City girls dash Cassville hopes with 37-26 win

Sometimes it isn't how many times you win but who you play that matters most.

Many in the Wildcat Nation were shocked that 1. Webb City received the #2 district seed instead of Cassville despite their 11-14 regular season record; and 2. that Webb City defeated 23-win Cassville handily in their district semifinal contest, 37-26.

Obviously, the district coaches who seeded the district tournament had other criteria besides just wins and losses. Only six of Cassville's regular season wins came against teams with winning records. Only one of those was against a Class 3 or higher school.

Like a hoarder's shopping cart leaving the thrift store, Cassville's schedule was loaded with Class 1 and 2 schools. They played every Ozark 7 team except McAuley and Thomas Jefferson. The four losses speak volumes. Blowout losses to Class 3 Mt. Vernon and Class 2 Fair Grove. Two losses to Class 2 District 11 champion Blue Eye.

The signature win for the Lady Wildcats was a 50-39 home win over Class 3 Lamar, a team that would finish the regular season with a 16-8 record.

Like Fair Grove, Webb City exposed Cassville's lack of team speed, and it's inablity to handle a withering full court press. The shorter Lady Cardinals banged and bumped Madi Stokes all night, disrupting her offensive flow and denying her the big scoring night that the Ladycats so desperately needed.

When Cassville and Webb City clashed in their Class 4 District 10 semifinal at Cassville on Thurs-

day night, the first quarter reeked of raw nerves as both teams committed numerous unforced turnovers. Stokes scored the first two baskets of the game, followed by Addie Darby's trey from the right corner to pull Webb within a point with the clock just under six minutes. The Lady Cardinals gained an 8-7 lead with another bomb delivered by Hannah Woodcock to finish the first-quarter scoring.

While Webb had a slight scoring advantage, Cassville benefitted from the whistles. The Lady Cardinals were called for six team fouls in the period while Cassville committed just one. That trend continued in the second quarter, and the foul discrepancy stood at 10-2 at halftime.

But the Lady Wildcats failed to capitalize at the free throw line, and Webb City held an 18-16 lead at the half as Darby rang the rim with two more treys.

The Lady Cardinals threw caution to the wind to start the third quarter, smothering Cassville's offense with a full court trap. Cami Roy scored twice in 31 seconds off backcourt steals out of the press to give Webb a 22-18 lead.

Chris Shore popped off the bench and called a time out to settle the Lady Wild-

But Cassville could not handle the press, and the Lady Cardinals allowed just 5 points in the period while claiming a 33-21 lead at the final break.


In the fourth quarter, Webb City's Lance Robbins directed his girls through the classic four-corner delay weave. Time slipped away as the Lady Cardinals passed, dribbled, and passed. With a dozen-point lead, bleeding the clock was a greater priority than trying to score and possibly allowing Cassville to mount a late run.

The Ladycats chased and trapped but could not gain possession. Then, Darby drove for a wide open layup when Cassville extended the zone too far. The Webb City lead stood at 35-24 with just 3:14 to play.

Ray added two late free throws when Cassville finally fouled into the bonus, but Madry McCrackin's score to christen the final minute were the only points the Lady Wildcats could muster in answer. Besides struggling from the field, the Cassville shooters only hit 7 of 14 free throw attempts.

Webb City earned a trip to the district championship





game with the 37-26 victory. It was a bitter loss for this group of Cassville seniors included Ashlynn

Howe, Hallie Long, Audra Brooks, and Madi Stokes. As freshmen, they were part of an 11-15 team, then posted three consecutive winning seasons, going 14-13, 17-10, and then 23-5 to close out their high school careers. Overall, Shore's team posted a four-year record of 65-43, and reached the district final
