Roaring River Opening Day numbers top trout parks across state

Roaring River anglers favored Roaring River over the other two trout parks in the state for the Opening Day of catch-and-keep trout season. In total, 1,784 took to the banks of the local park despite frigid temperatures on Friday.

The state's other two trout parks, Montauk and Bennett Spring, came in with 1,727 and 1,684 tags, respectively. For a Friday, numbers were lower than other years, likely due to the threat of impending winter weather on Satur-

day evening that amounted to less than an inch of snow in actuality.

This year's opening day, despite cool temps, was a family affair with 277 of the tags sold at Roaring River going to children. Of all of the trout fishing state parks in Missouri, Roaring River is well known as a family friendly atmosphere that draws families instead of just adults.

This year's opening gun was shot by Bob Mitchell, longtime local journalist, for his dedication to press coverage for the park during his career. State Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick was also in attendance at the event.

There was also a Chamber-sponsored lunker weigh in until noon. Winners were: men's division: Rob Greer, of Joplin, with 8.6 pounds and 25 inches; women's division: Dani Yockey with 7.5 pounds and 23 inches; and children's division: Beau Chapman, of Pierce City, with 4.75 pounds and 21 inches.

Crowder breaks ground on huge \$2.1 million renovation

Monday marked a historic moment for local Crowder College campus in Cassville. The junior college officially broke ground on a new \$2.2 million addition and renovation to the campus.

Cassville campus' director Angela Seymour said she is excited to see the expansion and growth that will benefit both

students and staff at the local college. She said, "Coming out front of the administrative building, the new facility will be added on to the front of that. Our offices will move out front, and the addition will come out into the first row of the current parking lot. The student lounge will move out front, and it'll connect buildings so students will be able to

come in a centralized entrance and it'll all be internal."

The project overall will build a new approximately 5,000 square foot addition to the administrative building and will also connect the second building so that there will be one centralized entrance to administration and classrooms. The additional space will allow for the expansion

of the campus bookstore, new classroom space and an improved facade that will give the campus a facelift. In total, the project will cost over \$2.1 million with construction and engineering costs.

Crowder vice president of financed Amy Rand said that of the total cost, \$1.33 million

Body of missing Eagle Rock woman found

In a tragic turn of events, the body of a woman who went missing from her home in Elmo's subdivision in the Eagle Rock area in February was found after weeks of searching. According to a press release by the Barry County Sheriff's Department, Angelia Burns, 39, of Eagle Rock, was last seen walking away from her home on February 10, and her body was recovered from Table Rock Lake over the weekend.

The Barry County Sheriff's Department initially posted on its Facebook page that Burns was considered a missing person on February 20. Burns' belongings, including her cell phone and cash, were found on the bank of Table Rock Lake the same day she was last seen. The case was investigated as a missing person incident by the sheriff's department and the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

According to the release, Burns' body was recovered from Table Rock Lake about half a mile from where her belongings were found on Sunday, March 3.

An initial autopsy on Monday evening, March 4, did not indicate any evidence on foul play in Burns' death.

is coming from the State of Missouri. The actual construction will cost around \$1.87 million and the remainder is engineering costs and similar expenses.

The ground breaking bore host to multiple board members and the president of the college. Also in attendance was State Treasurer Scott Fitzpatrick, who college administrators credit for the funds Crowder received from the state to help pay for the project while he was house budget chairman.

Fitzpatrick said he felt the renovation was much-needed. He said, "Crowder is an invaluable asset to the Cassville community. Having taken classes at Crowder during my time at Cassville High School, I know how much of a benefit having an institution of higher learning can bring to a small town. The community has worked hard for several years to support this project. I'm glad I was able to play a role in helping make it a reality during my time in the House Of Representatives."

While completion of the project is estimated for fall of this year, the school already has plans for how the building will be used and how it will benefit students.

Seymour said, "The student lounge area will be vaulted ceiling and nice curb appeal. It'll be rock face and nice textures."

There will also be a new facade on the front of building two on the side that faces the parking lot, the Highway 37 side of the community building, and the side of building one that faces the road to the

rodeo grounds. All of the renovations and new construction will make a more seamless look to the campus.

The changes will also ensure students are not walking out in bad weather between buildings. Seymour said, "We've loved the space we've had inside, but new students have been really confused when they've come here the first time on where they are supposed to go. Students won't have to go out in the weather to go from one academic building to another building. The testing will be up front and more convenient. It'll be a good thing."

She added it will also be good for campus security to have a centralized entrance.

Seymour said, "The larger bookstore will allow us to have more that students want. More merchandise is fun, but more food items and things that make it feel more collegiate. I love that it will completely change the facade of the campus. It's going to be a grand front entrance. That part will

be tall ceilings.

"We'll also be doing some renovation inside building one which is where the offices and student lounge are right now. We'll add two large classrooms and a larger bookstore. In the student lounge area, we'll be adding a couple study rooms and we'll be pulling testing up to the main office. The additional classrooms will allow us to use extra space to add some classroom space for nursing skills. They'll have twice the nursing labs skill space they have right now."

Eventually, the college wants to add a similar addition onto the front of the community building. Seymour said that project is dependent on future funding. That addition would include an entire nursing wing.

She said, "I can move you to any classroom for an education degree. Nursing needs specialized, dedicated space. There are skills labs with hospital beds. So that will hopefully be next in the future."






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Monett man charged with multiple check forgeries

A Monett man was charged with multiple check forgeries throughout Barry County during February. Christopher David Blair, 29, of Monett, is charged with nine charges of forgery.

Charges against Blair were filed by the Monett Police Department during the month of February. According to detective David Haskins, Blair stole checks from multiple people, including from at least one person's mailbox, and wrote them for various expenses and bills. When Blair was arrested, officers found checks on his person and in his vehicle. Some checks were written to Blair's apartment owner and to himself. According to officers, Blair wrote multiple checks in amounts that varied between \$70 and \$400

Blair is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$40,000 cash-only bond on eight of the charges and a \$5,000 cash, corp surety or 10 percent on the remaining charge.

Monett man allegedly ran second vehicle off of road

A Monett man is facing multiple charges after allegedly trying to hit another vehicle while his pregnant girlfriend was in the car. Tyler Tuell, 22, of Monett, is charged with felony assault in the second degree, misdemeanor assault in the fourth degree and misdemeanor property damage in the second degree.

According to affidavits of probable cause by Monett Police Department officer Chris Miller, Tuell was driving a vehicle on February 18 in Monett. Tuell allegedly tried to hit another vehicle deliberately. Officers reported Tuell's

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pregnant girlfriend was in the vehicle while he tried to hit the other vehicle, putting her at a substantial risk for injury.

During the incident, officers reported Tuell damaged a street sign by forcing the victim's vehicle off the road.

Tuell is currently held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$15,000 cash-only bond.

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

The owner reported leaving the restaurant at the same time as an employee. While the two attempted to leave in separate

As the owner and the employee tried to leave, the suspect allegedly fired shots at the vehicles, hitting one vehicle twice and the other vehicle once. Officers located several shell casings at the scene.

The Barry County Community Choir began rehearsals for the spring session. If you are 18 years or older and you love to sing, this may be the group for you.



According to Harrison, Gibbons won the award due to

her outstanding track record of volunteering to work with the chamber at local events as well as her work with other groups within the community.

Gibbons' has also done extensive work outside of the chamber. She has volunteered at 38 of the last 39 Homer Sloan and Buddy Bass Tournaments as well as with a local dance group called the Table Rockettes.

Harrison explained that Gibbons' list of volunteer work with the chamber is extensive. Gibbons' volunteer work with the chamber has included: Shell Knob's annual home and business dinner; the annual Shakin' in the Shell festival; and the Shell Knob boat show.

"She's just a wonderful lady," said Harrison. "She'll be the first one to walk in the door when she volunteers to work an event. She'll be there the whole time. She'll come

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and do everything and work a full day."

Gibbons' is a long time resident of Shell Knob and has been an active part of the community for most of her residency.

"Has lived here for 41 years," said Harrison. "At one point, she and her husband owned and operated a resort in Shell Knob. She taught at the Shell knob elementary school for 25 years. She was in on the ground floor of the Rattler. She still works there delivering the paper."

The year's new award, Chamber Champion, was intended to recognize individuals who go above and beyond to volunteer to increase the visibility of the chamber. The award went to Tom Koob, a Shell Knob resident who has worked with chamber off and on for several years.

"That was to highlight people behind the scenes that you don't see as much, but that are important to the chamber nonetheless. Tom exemplifies that in a lot of ways," said Harrison.

Koob is an author and a local historian with Table Rock Lake. According to Harrison, Koob frequently uses his skill as a professional writer to assist the chamber with their editorial and advertising needs.

"Tom helps with articles, the vacation relocation guide, he's always there to help you write something or edit something that you have," said Harrison "There's a ton of stuff that he does."

Harrison explained that Koob was also instrumental in the creation of a Chamber Fundraising effort called Shell Knopoly, a board game based on the classic Monopoly game but with Shell Knob-themed landmarks.

"This has taken a year to put this thing together," explained Harrison. "He took that project on and it took him a year. He got all of his people together and organized and ran that. When this game comes out in April or May, ev-

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



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Miller crushes Wheaton playoff hopes, 61-24

To misquote John Denver, "Some games are diamonds, some games are stones."

The Miller Lady Cardinals drowned Wheaton's postseason run, hanging a 61-24 millstone on the Lady Bulldogs at Carthage on Wednesday, February 27. It was a painful dose of reality for the Wheaton girls, coming on the heels of the euphoria of winning their first girls basketball district title in a quarter century.

But the Lady Bulldogs could not have had a tougher draw for their sectional appearance. The height and athleticism of Miller gave the Lady Cardinals an obvious advantage. Following a cold start and a scolding time out speech from Hannah Wilkerson, the Miller shooters filled the rim with efficient preci-

Wheaton is a good team. So are Verona, College Heights, and McAuley. But Hannah Wilkerson's girls put on an exhibition that was Globetrotter-esque in easily dispatching the Class 2 District 12 champions.

Time will tell how the Lady Bulldogs will be measured. If Miller had continued to roll in the Class 2 playoffs, then Wheaton would be forgiven for the clock-running debacle at

Carthage. But a 40-26 loss to Hartville in the Class 2 quarterfinals sent Miller home and left Wheaton wondering "what if?"

It was a daunting challenge from the start. Miller's starting lineup featured a Fab Four of talented freshmen, one senior, and Wilkerson - the greatest scoring machine in the history of Missouri high school basketball - coaching from the

The Lady Cardinals entered this sectional game with a 24-5 record against some stiff competition. Miller started slowly, losing two of their first four games: one to Class 1 powerhouse Walnut Grove, and one to Class 3 District 11 runner up Fair Grove. They stumbled against Crane, lost to an ordinary Richland team, and then fell to Class 4 Bolivar.

Along the way, those four freshmen started looking like seniors.

The experienced Lady Bulldogs studied, prepared, and thought they were ready for Miller. Tori Goostree scored twice in the first two minutes as Wheaton jumped out to a 7-0 lead. But Miller responded with a 12-2 run to claim a 12-11 lead at the 1:33 mark. The Lady Cardinals led 17-13 at the first break, thanks to a trio of treys, one of them from reserve guard Jessica Epps.

You couldn't help but notice the heavy, hanging necklace that Wilkerson wore on the Miller bench. It may not have been a "turnover chain" per se, but it could have been for this game. Starting with the second quarter, Miller's daunting defense destroyed the Wheaton game plan, contesting every inbounds play, pass, dribble, and shot. By game's end, Wheaton would have more turnovers than

The Lady Bulldogs struggled mightily, scoring only 4 in a second quarter that saw Miller take a 32-17 halftime lead on the strength of a 15-0 run.

Wheaton went scoreless for the first 6:35 of that quarter, finally getting baskets from Hallie Mitchell and Zoie Simpson.

This was the scenario that Wheaton had feared. Miller dropped Verona early in their Class 2 District 11 semifinal with a 20-5 opening quarter enroute to a 70-48 blowout. The Lady Cardinals have the ability to explode on teams with the ferocity of a Mike Tyson knockout.

The third quarter saw more of the same. Miller extended the lead with a long trey, her only triple ary Myers.

of the game. She had more trey attempts blocked by the aggressive, taller Miller guards than she converted.

Kaylee Helton schooled the Wheaton defense with a pretty pick and roll for a 37-20 lead at the 5:06 mark. Then Payten Richardson finished the quarter with an ankle-breaking dribble drive to create the 48-22 score at the final break.

In the final period, Miller was content to dribble out the clock, a clock that ran and ran after Claudia Hadlock's stepback three put Miller ahead by a



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
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Purdy 'whodunit' provides meal, mystery and laughs

The audience was treated to a spaghetti dinner before being plunged into a decades-old cold case involving a series of possible torrid affairs, a gossip-fueled church sewing circle and a cookie recipe that was good enough to die for.

Barry County Advertiser editor Charlea Estes-Jones led the evening's murder mystery dinner-goers with the help of Purdy High student Shana Whisman. Estes-Jones, as a fictionalized version of herself, took attendees on a jour-

she collected on the case. Whisman played Blanche Marlowe, a seemingly concerned citizen who lived in Purdy at the same time as Dewey, narrating her perspective of the events in letters to the editor of the Advertiser at the time, unearthed after decades of being hidden.

Students and school staff from Purdy High played Dewey (Coach Josh Hughes) and the various suspects on stage, in flashback sequences framed by Marlowe's letters. These sequences set up compelling reasons for why each one of the characters may have had a role in the untimely demise of Dewey.

There were also prerecorded video segments, starring Estes-Jones, of the intrepid editor following leads around town and interviewing real-life Purdy city officials and school staff to get to the bottom of the case.

After all of the evidence was submitted, each table of guests nominated a spokesperson to present who the table thought the real murderer was. The winning table was presented a trophy before all sleuths in the audience posed with the cast for photos.







Cassville to change break schedule in 2019-20 school year

Cassville R-IV School district approved its new school schedule for the 2019-2020 school year. With the new schedule, the school made significant changes to the break schedule going forward.

"In the state of Missouri, school districts are required to have a review of the school calendar every year," said Dr. Richard Asbill, superintendent of Cassville Schools.

According to Asbill, Cassville assembles a calendar committee comprised of representatives from each building on the school campus. That committee then spends several months meeting and going over various options for how to set next year's calendar.

"For Cassville, there are a couple of unique features that we have to look at," said Asbill. "Our rural area would be impacted by inclement weather if it were to hit. There's a good potential that if we miss days,

it would be significant in a hard winter."

The new schedule will have expanded days off for certain holiday breaks as well as cut down on days that would conflict with other area schools' days off. According to Asbill, this was done in order to help ensure that students attending off campus classes at other area schools during the day, such as Scott Regional Technology Center, won't have a conflict on their days off.

"All of the Barry County schools and some of the Lawrence County schools got together and had a discussion about what they would have in their calendars for days off this coming year," said Asbill.

According to Asbill, this new calendar will more effectively line-up with other schools to ensure that offcampus students aren't required to attend on days where their off-campus classes are either not being offered or are stymied by lack of attendance from other schools' students.

"We want to make sure we're aligning the best we could so that everyone was on the same page," said As-

Beginning with the 2019-2020 school year, Cassville will have an expanded Thanksgiving break. Historically, Cassville began their Thanksgiving break on the Wednesday before Thanksgiving, effectively making the week of the holiday a two-day school week. Under this new schedule, Cassville will now have a full five-day week break for the Thanksgiving holiday.

"We posed it to our calendar committee, and it received very positive feedback," said Asbill. "It will be a great opportunity for our students and parents who may want to travel or have plans in the fall. It would also benefit our employees."

In addition, the calendar committee also moved to reschedule one of their professional development days usually held the first

week back after Christmas break. Starting next year, that development day will be moved to the beginning of the year before school begins.

The new schedule will also cut the number of snow make up days in half. Until recently, Cassville built in ten days at the end of every year. Starting with the 2019-2020 school year, Cassville now only has five days scheduled to make up for inclement weather.

According to Asbill, this change comes due to a state law regarding the amount of time that schools are required to be in session in order to make up for cancellations. Previously, the language of the law required that schools make up their time in full day amounts. Now, the state only requires that schools meet the necessary hour requirements.

The new schedule was released to parents and the community in the school's monthly online newsletter.

MDC seeks public input on free landowner hunting privileges

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) is asking Missourians to take an online survey for their input on acreage requirements needed to receive free landowner deer and turkey hunting permits and free small-game hunting and trapping landowner privileges. Information gathered through the online survey will be used by MDC as it considers potential changes to those acreage requirements.

MDC currently issues free landowner permits for deer and turkey hunting to qualifying Missouri landowners with at least five acres and members of their immediate households. In addition, those individuals are not required to have permits to hunt small game or trap on their properties. MDC offers the free landowner permits and privileges to show appreciation to landowners for wildlife habitat work provided on their Missouri properties.

According to MDC, significantly more than five acres of wildlife habitat are necessary to have meaningful impacts on deer, turkey, and small-game populations using that land. MDC research shows that about 20-25 acres of habitat are needed to support one deer in Missouri.
