The Cassville Education Fund awarded new trivia champs at their annual Trivia Night that benefits the local school on Friday night, March 10. This year, the event raised over \$1,000 for the fund, which helps provide grants to Cassville Schools' teachers and departments for extraneous expenses.

This year's winning team was The Newsies, a collaborative team between the Barry County Advertiser and the Cassville Democrat newspapers. The Smarty Pants award, the award given for the most

correct trivia answers only, was given to Fun Night Out, the team sponsored by the Barry County Library. The Dum-Dum Award, given to the team scoring the least number of points, was handed to Ravenclaw, a team of Cassville Middle School students sponsored by Angel and Company and Security Abstract and Title.

Other teams participating included those representing Freedom Bank, Arvest Bank, 1st State Bank and Cassville Schools.

This year's event was emceed by Dusty Reid, with Cassville Schools, and questions ranged from

general knowledge to history, geography, music and more. In between the four rounds of trivia questions, there were also Minute-To-Win-It rounds, including games that encouraged limber participants to pick up paper bags off of the ground with their mouths, hungry participants to move a cookie frOm their forehead to their mouth without using their hands, and finally, a round where participants had to bounce balloons in the air, not letting them hit the floor.

By the end of the night, plenty of laughter filled the Commons Area at the High

Hail storm, tornadoes tear through Barry County

The past week was the definition of crazy Missouri weather. With the end of the week giving residents plenty of sunshine with temperatures that topped out in the 60s and 70s, with that also came tornadic storms with large hail and snow and sleet by the weekend

Barry County made local televised news broadcasts due to the damage from both tornadoes and hail, interviewing local car repair shops about the influx in business from the storm.

On Thursday evening, March 9, tornado sirens began to go off in Cassville past 6 p.m. The National Weather Service confirmed two separate tornados on Thursday evening. The first resulted in damage to a Butterfield home three miles east of Butterfield proper. The Weather Service said wind speeds were estimated at 75 miles per hour. No injuries were reported from the tornado in Butterfield. Purdy residents reported a funnel cloud above City Hall, but no damage or injuries were reported there, either.

A second tornado was confirmed southwest of Jenkins. The EF-0 tornado had estimated wind speeds of 85 miles per hour, according to

the National Weather Service. Damage reported were uprooted and snapped trees, but no structure damage or injuries. The damage path of the tornado was reported at 100 yards wide and lasted around a tenth of a mile.

Hail falling around the same time as the tornadic activity ranged from small pieces of sleet-like hail up to baseball sizes. Damage from hail ranged from dents to shattered windows in both homes and cars.

By the weekend, temperatures had turned chilly with snow and sleet falling across the county on Saturday. Shell Knob received the most reported accumulation in the area, with Cassville receiving a dusting. There was only one car crash reported from the snow or sleet on Saturday, with only one minor injury.

Monett woman racks up additional charge after alleged threat

A Monett woman has racked up additional charges after allegedly threatening a witness in a pending case against her. Levonda Sue Pryor, 60, of Monett, is charged with tampering with a witness in a felony prosecution.

According to the affidavit of probable cause, Pryor entered the Old Town Pharmacy where the witness works, threatening him and saying, "You will pay for causing me this issue." The victim told officers the event lasted around thirty minutes. Pryor was recently taken to the Barry County Jail and charged following the incident, which was on February 11, 2017

The initial charges against Pryor were related to incident in the same pharmacy in October 2016. According to that affidavit of probable cause, Pryor was attempting to obtain a prescription of Larazopam through the drive through window.

When the pharmacist said the prescription had already been picked up, Pryor said she had not given the other person permission to pick up the prescription for her. According to the pharmacist, he asked her to come into the store to talk to

After showing Pryor where the script had been signed for, he informed her that he would have to get the police involved. Pryor then allegedly told the pharmacist that she had given the person permission to pick it up and she was in the vehicle when the other party picked it up. Pryor had left the store before the police arrived.

Pryor was charged with fraudulently trying to obtain a controlled substance prior to the tampering charge.

Pryor was released from the Barry County Jail after posting a \$10,000 bond.



Celebrate St. Patrick's Day with a staple of Irish pub fare

St. Patrick's Day may be a celebration of the man who brought Christianity to Ireland, but one need not be Irish to don green and enjoy the festivities each March 17.

While parades and music garner much of the attention on St. Patrick's Day, food also plays a big role. Cottage pie, often referred to as "Shepherd's pie," traces its origins to the United Kingdom and Ireland. The following recipe from Laurie McNamara's "Simple Scratch: 120 Wholesome Homemade Recipes Made Easy" (Avery).

Cottage Pie

Serves 6

minced

For the filling:

3 tablespoons unsalted butter

2 cups diced yellow onion

cup diced carrot

cup diced celery 3 cloves garlic,

2 1/2 pounds ground round

tablespoons tomato 2 paste

tablespoons bleached all-purpose flour

1/4 cup Pinot Noir (or any good dry red wine)

cups beef broth

cup Worcestershire 1/4sauce

> sprigs fresh thyme 1

bay leaf 1 1/2 teaspoons kosher

freshly 1/2 teaspoon ground black pepper

1/2 cup frozen peas

For the mashed potatoes: 3 1/2 pounds russet potatoes, peeled and cut into large pieces

Kosher salt

1 1/4 cups whole milk

tablespoons unsalted butter

3/4 cup grated sharp white cheddar cheese

tablespoon minced fresh flat-leaf parsley

teaspoon chopped fresh thyme leaves

To make the filling:

In a Dutch oven, melt the butter over medium-low heat. Add the onion, carrot and celery. Stir to coat the vegetables in butter, cover, and cook, stirring occasionally, for 15 minutes, until soft. Add the garlic and cook for 1 to 2 minutes more. Use a spoon to transfer the cooked vegetables to a bowl.

In the Dutch oven, cook the ground beef over medium heat, breaking it into small crumbles as it cooks, until cooked through. Return the vegetables to the pot and stir in the tomato paste and flour. Pour in the wine and cook for 2 to 3 minutes. Pour in the broth and Worcestershire sauce and add the thyme sprigs and bay leaf. Season with salt and pepper and cook, stirring occasionally, for 30 minutes. Stir in the peas and pour the filling into a 3- to 4-quart baking dish.

While the filling is cooking, make the mashed potatoes. Preheat the oven to 400

Place the peeled potatoes in a pot and add cold water to cover by about 2 inches. Add a generous pinch of salt, cover, and bring to a boil. Crack the lid and cook the potatoes for 15 to 20 minutes, or until fork-tender.

With the lid askew, carefully drain the water from the pot with the potatoes. Return the pot to the stove over low heat. Add the milk and butter to the potatoes, cover, and simmer the potatoes in the milk and butter for 10 to 12 minutes. Season the potatoes with 3/4 teaspoon of salt and mash with a potato masher or mix with a hand mixer. Add the cheddar and stir to combine. Taste and season with more salt if needed.

Use a spatula to spoon the mashed potatoes over the filling in the baking dish and spread them out evenly. Use a fork and drag it along the top of the mashed potatoes to make ridges. These will crisp up and brown in the oven.

Place the cottage pie on a rimmed baking sheet and slide it into the oven. Bake for 20 minutes, or until the top of the potatoes is golden and crispy and the filling is bubbling.

Combine the minced parsley and thyme.

Irish Soda Bread

Makes 1 medium loaf 31/2 cups unbleached all-purpose flour

11/4 teaspoons baking soda

teaspoon sea salt 1 2/3 cups buttermilk

(roughly) Nonstick baking sheet, lightly dusted with flour

Preheat the oven to 425 F. Sift the flour, baking soda and salt into a large bowl and make a well in the center. Pour the buttermilk into the well and mix it into the dry ingredients with a roundbladed knife or your hands to make a soft, slightly sticky, rough-looking dough.

Turn out the dough on a lightly floured work surface and shape it into a ball. Set the dough onto the baking sheet and gently flatten it so



it is about 11/2 inches high. With a table knife, score the dough with a cross. Dust with a little flour then bake for about 35 minutes until a good golden brown. To test if the loaf is cooked, tap underneath with your knuckles. If it sounds hollow, it is ready. If it gives a dull thud, bake it for a few minutes longer and test it again.

Transfer to a wire rack to cool. Wrap well to store or freeze for up to 1 month





Competing in heritage: Local girl named Miss Hmong Oklahoma

As a Hmong daughter, I was raised in a strict home. Historically, Hmong people lived in the mountain villages

throughout Southeast Asia. Today, many have immigrated to the US. The Hmong families living in Southwest Missouri now moved here for farming, and business opportunities, among other reasons.

My family and I moved to Barry County in November 2004. Though many Hmong children living in today's society do not have interest, I am one of the few children who still have love, passion, and respect for the Hmong Culture. Since I moved to Missouri, I continued to volunteer at local gatherings and activities, such as the Miss Hmong Oklahoma 2016-2017 beauty pageant.

Hmong beauty pageants are a public entertainment consisting of involved contestants, colorful, traditional clothing, and speeches for individual rounds. Unlike American beauty pageants, contestants do not have the opportunity to have interviews with the judges or committee members of the beauty pageant. Instead, the contestants have to step on stage and give their all to show the judges what abilities they have to deserve the

In October 2016, I competed in the Miss Hmong Oklahoma beauty pageant and took home the title as first place, Miss Hmong Oklahoma 2016-2017. Hmong pageants take place in mostly all states in the US and even parts of Asia.

Competing was a huge

decision for me. The competition as a whole took many days of preparation. During my September break at school, I flew out to California where I had my clothing for the pageant personally designed.

Though competing in a beauty pageant meant being able to accept the positive and negative comments, I still decided to compete because of my love for my people and goal to help the poor in need.

Winning the title was not a simple win. When someone wins the title, they are looked up to and seen as a role model by many. As a Miss or Mr. Hmong, you have many opportunities to be involved in the community and even opportunities to join hands with other title holders to work together on making a difference in the Hmong community.

During the beauty pageant in Oklahoma, there were four rounds: introduction round, where each contestant gave a speech about themselves and more; talent round, where each contestant performs their best talent; question round, where each contestant must answer provided questions; and the crowning round, which is the round when the new Miss Hmong is crowned, receiving prize money and a crown.

Barry County courts incarcerate 3 during January Law Days

• Beverly A. Ball, of Eagle Rock, pled guilty to distribution of a controlled substance. Ball received a suspended imposition of sentencing in favor of five years supervised probation.

Ball was arrested after a follow-up investigation at her residence on State Highway E in Eagle Rock in July 2016. When officers searched the home, they found multiple pills, including oxycodone, dilaudid and marijuana. Pills were in varying quantities in baggies with names on them.

Ball is to serve probation until January 18, 2022.

• James L. Beck, of Cassville, pled guilty to two counts of operating a motor vehicle while his driver's license was revoked in 2014. Beck was serving probation with a suspended imposition of sentencing. After new charges were filed in 2015 and are now moving on to a disposition hearing, Beck's sentence was changed to a four year incarceration sentence with the execution of that sentence suspended and five years of supervised pro-

Beck was caught driv-

ing while revoked multiple times, leading to his charges. In March 2011, Beck was involved in a motor vehicle accident in Cassville. On April 27, 2011, Beck was involved in another motor vehicle accident on Highway 37 in Cassville.

Beck is to serve probation until March 10, 2022. He is still facing the 2015 charges of possession of a controlled substance driving while revoked and DWI. His disposition hearing is set for February 21.

• Stephen W. Crider, of Aurora, pled guilty to passing a bad check of less than \$500. Crider received a suspended imposition of sentencing and two years of unsupervised probation.

Crider is to serve probation until January 18, 2019.

• Cynthia Renee Cutberth, of Washburn, pled guilty to domestic assault in the third degree as a first or second offense. Cutberth received a suspended imposition of sentencing and two years unsupervised proba-

Cutberth's charges originated from an incident investigated by the Barry County Sheriff's Department on November 4, 2015. Cutberth had gotten into a verbal argument with the victim at a residence on Farm Road 2280 in Seligman, which turned into assault. She then took the victim's phone and refused to return it until she threw it at him outside the home.

Then, Cutberth drove the property, attempting to hit the victim with her car. Cutberth, who had a revoked drivers' license, hit a parked car during the event, backing into the vehicle and pushing it back four feet, causing over \$5,000 of damage.

Cutberth is to serve probation until January 18, 2019.

• Gergory K. Drezinski, of Eureka Springs, Ark., pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears in excess of 12 months. Drezenski received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years unsupervised proba-

Drezinski was over 12 months in arrears on his child support for two minor children. Drezinski had been ordered to pay \$434 each month and was \$15,627.06 in arrears as of April 2015.

Drezinski is to serve pro-

bation until January 18, 2022.

revoked. Elston received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years is supervised probation.

Elston was charged in two separate incidents. A Missouri Department of Conservation Agent found Elston at the Stubblefield Access on February 2, 2014, too intoxicated to be operating a vehicle. Elston had also had his license revoked at that time. In June 2014, the Missouri State Highway Patrol saw a vehicle partially in a driveway on Missouri Route C. The vehicle was disabled and another vehicle was trying to push it out. The Trooper reported the vehicle had driven through a fence twice, back onto the roadway and then into the drive where it lost traction. Elston's license was revoked during that incident, as well.

Elston is to serve probation until February 24, 2022.

• Gary Lee Fasone, of Verona, made an Alford plea to endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree. Fasone received a suspended

execution of a seven year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

Fasone's charges came from an incident on July 16, 2013. Fasone was slapping the victim on the arms and back, leaving red marks while they were at the Jenkins Bridge. Once at home, Fasone continued the abuse, grabbing her by the neck, shoving her into a wall twice and punching her in the face.

Fasone is to serve probation until January 27, 2022.

•Ryan Anthony Grissom, of Eagle Rock, pled guilty to burglary in the second degree and property damage in the first degree. Grissom received a suspended imposition of sentencing and four years supervised probation.

Grissom was charged after entering a rental property to steal from the owner on September 16, 2015. Grissom broke out two windows to gain entry. Then he broke the toilet, bathroom vanity and bathtub fixtures, causing the bathroom floor to flood and causing over \$750 of damage. He also stole a black toolbox and voltage tester, worth around \$200.

Grissom is to serve probation until January 17, 2021.

• Melody Dawn Halstead, of Friestatt, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Halstead received a suspended imposition of sentencing and three years supervised probation.

Halstead was charged after the Cassville Police Department searched her residence for drugs on December 15, 2015. The owner of the apartment complex allowed police to search after one of the residents admitted to drug use. Halstead was the tenant's girlfriend. 



Jamieson competes in Arkansas 100-mile trail race

On Friday, February 24, a small band of runners set out to challenge the Lovit 100, a 100-mile race over the rugged terrain of the Lake Ouchaita Vista Trail along the southern rim of the Ouachita National Forest in south central Arkansas.

Only 21 runners would finish. Tyler Wilkerson, of Russellville, Arkansas, found the finish line first, logging the distance in 22 hours and 22 minutes flat. Only 20 minutes back was 57-year old Paul Schoenlab of St. Joseph.

Back in the pack, running his first ever 100-miler, was Terry Jamieson.

A former Cassville coach and educator and now the Athletic Director at Ozark, Jamieson has never shied away from a challenge. An avid, lifelong runner, he long ago quit the 5K scene in search of bigger, more satisfying goals.

to climb Everest, but since I cannot afford that adventure I choose ultras instead," was how Jamieson explained his decision to tackle the rugged Arkansas hills.

He got that bigger goal and then some from the Lovit Run.

"I trained hard for over 6 months for the 100 mile run in Arkansas," Jamieson reported. "I am 53 years old and it was hard for me to log the miles and do the core work. But a great goal."

Throughout his half-year training obsession for the Lovit, he maintained a very strict diet to maintain an optimal weight.

"Gotta love oats and raw honey," he said.

Race strategy was not a high priority.

"I am a very average runner and I am realistic about my times," Jamieson said, "so finishing was the priority."

The tough course with

changes took its toll on the runners as the miles accumulated. Jamieson suffered a torn muscle around mile 45, forcing him to alter his running form.

"It made things tough," he said. "But my wife was waiting at every aid station to encourage me."

Jamieson's running partner for the race was Jeremy Brownfield, assistant principal at Ozark High School.

"He is a great runner and much faster than me so he was kind to encourage me and allow us

to finish together. I honestly think he could have left me late in the event and he chose to stay with me. Great guy."

Finally, early Saturday afternoon, the weary pair crossed the finish line in 31 hours and 29 minutes.

"That distance requires a mental approach much different than shorter events. There were some very dark moments when my will-

power was tested. The distance does not seem to care how good of a runner you are but instead how mentally tough you are," was Jamieson's post-race assessment.

Always the philosopher, Jamieson offered an encouragement that pretty well sums up why the ultra-running community is so strong:

"I recommend everyone try an endeavor that seems off the grid once in your life. It clears the mind and helps you realize your potential as a human being. I intend to do several more of these over the next few years."

KC Big 12 Race becomes snow challenge

Inspired by Terry Jamieson's epic run, I punched the online entry button for the state's only certified 12K race. I was a little worried about the possibility of adverse weather or at least a big change from the early spring here in Barry County.

It turned out to be an unbelievable transition. Thursday, I headed to the Greenway Trail for my last training run before heading north. It was 76 degrees. Just hours later, Josie and I hunkered down and listened to hailstones destroying the roof while the tornado sirens blared.

Then, on Saturday morning in Kansas City, shivering at the starting line of the annual race that shares the downtown spotlight with the Big 12 Conference Basketball Tournament, I watched as the snow covered the streets.

Byron Stephens had urged me to skip this one, citing my history of upper respiratory disasters. But I repeat, this is Missouri's only 12K race held on a certified course. If I was going to crack the state single-age record, it would have to happen here.

Crazy? Maybe, but I was in good company. A total of 371 runners toed the line for the 12K, with another 626 entered in the 5K event.

In the best of conditions, this is a difficult, hilly course. In a howling March snowstorm, it was ridiculous.

Even with the weather, there were some great performances. Evan Landes of Lawrence, KS was the overall 12K champion, running 37:27. Kimi Reed, one of our southwest Missouri runners, won the women's division in 44:15

I played it safe on the first mile, and then chipped away at the large lead pack. The course included two huge hills. One consisted of the entire fourth mile, and the other was the seventh mile, the Alpine-like climb up 9th Street to the downtown district. I placed 34th overall with a strong kick, finishing in 54:51.

That put me ahead of Joe Griggs in the state record book. Griggs ran 59:42 on the old Hospital Hill course in Kansas City back in 2004. There was more relief than elation over the record.

When you only have one shot at achieving a goal, the mental stress is often greater than the physical challenge.

Meanwhile, Ron Stafford was fighting the elements in Springfield, placing 13th overall in the Dublin's Pass Shamrox 15K. Stafford ran an excellent time of 1:09:38 to take second in the men's 45-49 age division.

On to the next event. The Frisco Railroad Run is the main fundraiser for Springfield's Ozark Mountain Ridgerunners. Held on the abandoned railroad trail between Willard and Bolivar, the annual event features races at 8K, half marathon, marathon, 50K, and 50 mile distances. I am tempted to shoot for another state record at one of the longer distances. Record run or not, I count myself fortunate to have the good health to continue.



The effective nationwide substance-impaired driving crackdown will include high-visibility enforcement, high-profile events, and will be supported by national paid advertising, creating a comprehensive campaign to curb substance-impaired driving over the St. Patrick's Day holiday.

The Cassville and Seligman Police Departments said its officers will be aggressively looking for substance impaired drivers during the crackdown and will arrest anyone caught driving impaired.

Although it is illegal in all 50 States, the District of Columbia and Puerto Rico to drive impaired (having a blood alcohol concentration of .08 or higher), far too many people across the nation get behind the wheel after consuming too much alcohol. The latest statistics from the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration underscore the serious nature of the nation's continuing drunk driving epidemic.

"Every year, about one third of all motor vehicle traffic deaths involve one or more substance- impaired drivers or motorcycle operators," said Seligman Chief Terry Burgess. "In 2016, 179 people were killed and 643 seriously injured on Missouri's roadways in crashes that involved at least one substance-impaired driver." That works out to approximately one substance-impaired driver involved fatality every (2) two days. Chief Burgess added the St. Patrick's Day holiday is particularly dangerous. During the St. Patrick's Day holiday March 17-20, 2016, two (2) people were

killed and eight (8) seriously injured involving at least one substance-impaired driver.

"Research has shown that high-visibility enforcement like the 'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over' campaign reduces substance–impaired driving fatalities by as much as 20 percent. By joining this nationwide effort, we will make Seligman's roadways safer for everyone throughout the holiday," said Cassville Chief Dana Kammerlohr.

"We want to remind everyone that getting behind the wheel impaired is a terrible idea. Unfortunately, not only does being under the influence impair your ability to operate a vehicle safely, it also impairs your judgment and good sense about whether you can, or should drive. If you have any doubt about your sobriety, do not get behind the wheel. If you do chose to drive impaired, you will be arrested. No warnings. No excuses," Chief Kammerlohr said.


Chief Burgess noted that being arrested for driving under the influence of any substance brings a wide range of negative consequences into one's life. Substance-impaired drivers face jail time, loss of their driver licenses, and steep financial consequences such as higher insurance rates, attorney fees, court costs, lost time at work, and the potential loss of job. When family, friends and co-workers find out, violators also often face tremendous personal embarrassment.

"Driving while impaired is simply not worth the risk. So don't take the chance. Remember, we will be out in force and we will be watching, so 'Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over," said Chief Burgess.


During his career, Phil has generously donated his time and financial support to many industry trade



Paddlefish season opening for anglers

Missouri's annual spring paddlefish snagging season is a popular pastime for thousands of anglers. According to the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), the state's major paddlefish snagging waters include Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, and Table Rock Lake. The paddlefish snagging season for these and most other waters in the state runs March 15 through April 30. The season for the Mississippi River is March 15 through May 15 with a fall season of Sept. 15 through Dec. 15.

Also known as "spoonbills" because of the shape of their snouts, paddlefish take seven or eight years to grow to legal size and in Missouri can live more than 20 years. The state record paddlefish taken in 2015 on Table Rock Lake was 31 years old. The fish feed on plankton and other microscopic prey. These filter feeders there-

fore do not take bait from hooks and must be snagged using large hooks that catch in the mouth, gills, or other areas of their bodies.

The success of paddlefish snagging is dependent on weather conditions, primarily water temperature and flow.

"The best snagging conditions occur when water temperature reaches 50 to 55 degrees and there is an increase in water flow," MDC Fisheries Management Biologist Trish Yasger said. "This prompts them to move upstream to spawn. We don't usually see a lot of big fish being caught on opening day. Harvest early in the season is typically dominated by local fish and small males with the occasional large female. As water temperature and flow increase, you will start seeing more of the larger females."

Yasger added snagging

tends to be better early in the season at Table Rock Lake and better in April at Lake of the Ozarks and Truman Lake.

MDC Stocking Efforts

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) makes paddlefish snagging possible in the Show-Me State through annual stocking of fingerlings raised at its Blind Pony Hatchery near Sweet Springs. The fingerlings are released into Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake and Table Rock Lake, plus the Black River. Last year more than 314,000 foot-long fingerlings were stocked MDC's largest stocking of paddlefish. These fish will be large enough to harvest beginning in 2023. The annual stocking is necessary because dams and other barriers to spawning areas have eliminated sustainable natural reproduction in the lakes.

Yasger noted MDC released an especially large number of fingerlings into Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, and Table Rock Lake in 2008. The more than 164,000 fingerlings released are now nine years old and will continue to provide good numbers of fish for snaggers to harvest.

"Without annual stocking by MDC staff, this popular pastime and food source would go away," said Yasger. "We need help from snaggers to learn more about and to better manage this popular game fish so we can keep paddlefish snagging great for many years to

Snag A Tag - Get A

MDC is in its third year of a five-year tagging project to help monitor paddlefish numbers and improve species management. Department staff are placing metal jaw tags on up to 6,000 paddlefish netted in Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, and Table Rock Lake and up to 1,000 netted from the Mississippi River. Yasger encourages all snaggers to help out by reporting tagged paddlefish and to NOT remove tags from undersized or released pad-

"We will send a special 'I caught a Missouri paddle-fish!' t-shirt to each snagger who returns or reports their first tagged fish," Yasger explained. "All returned and reported tags will be placed into an annual drawing, held in July, for cash prizes with a grand prize of \$500."

Tags or photos of tags from harvested paddle-fish must be submitted for rewards. Snaggers must include the following information with each tag:

Date caught

Location of catch including reservoir or river, mile marker, and county

Tag number

Fish length from eye to fork of the tail

Snagger's name and complete address

Report tags by calling MDC at (573) 579-6825 with the information, or mail the information with the flattened tag to: Missouri Department of Conservation, 3815 East Jackson Blvd., Jackson, MO 63755 or by e-mailing Trish Yasger at Trish. Yasger@mdc. mo.gov(link sends e-mail).

Report Transmitters

MDC biologists are also implanting ultrasonic transmitters in adult paddlefish at Truman Lake, Lake of the Ozarks, Table Rock Lake, and the Mississippi River to track their movements and gain other important information. MDC asks that all snaggers who harvest fish with a transmitter to report it by calling (573) 579-6825 or by e-mailing Trish Yasger at Trish. Yasger@mdc. mo.gov.

"It is important to return transmitters so they can be implanted in other fish," said Yasger.

Help smaller fish survive

Yasger reminds snaggers to help undersized snagged fish survive to grow larger.

"Do not land paddlefish with gaffs. This can fatally injure sublegal fish. Use large landing nets," she said. "Remove hooks carefully and get sublegal fish back into the water as quickly as possible. Wet your hands before handling fish and avoid excessive handling. Do not pass them around

for photos and hold fish firmly to avoid dropping them. Never put fingers in the gills or eyes."

Regulation Requirements

Unless exempt, anglers must have a current fishing permit to snag or to operate a boat for snaggers. The daily limit is two paddlefish and snaggers must stop snagging after obtaining the daily limit on Lake of the Ozarks and Truman Lake and their tributaries, and the Osage River below Bagnell Dam. The minimum legal body length for paddlefish at Lake of the Ozarks, Truman Lake, Table Rock Lake, and their tributaries is 34 inches, measured from the eye to the fork of the tail. The minimum legal body length is 24 inches on the Osage River below Bagnell Dam and in other Missouri waters. All paddlefish under the legal minimum length must be returned to the water unharmed immediately after being caught.

The Wildlife Code of Missouri requires the head, tail, and skin to remain attached to all paddlefish while on the water so paddlefish should not be cleaned until off of the water. Also, extracted paddlefish eggs may not be possessed while on waters of the state or adjacent banks and may not be transported. Paddlefish eggs may not be bought, sold or offered for sale. Additionally, paddlefish or their parts, including eggs, may not be used for bait.
