Barry County voters favor Biden, Trump in Presidential Primary

Approximately 22 percent of registered voters in Barry County turned out to the polls on yesterday, March 10, to vote for their choice for the Presidential Preference Primary Election. Barry County voters favored Joe Biden as the Democratic nominee with 65.7 percent of the votes cast and Donald Trump as the Republican nominee with 98.4 percent of the votes.

Barry County's statistics closely resemble that of voters across the state of Missouri. Initial unofficial tallies show Biden with 60 percent of the vote on the Democrat side and 97 percent in favor of Trump on the ballot for reelection in November.

In the unofficial totals released by Barry County clerk Jill LeCompte, 4,630 ballots were cast by out of 20,821 registered voters. A Democratic ballot was pulled by 1,583 voters, and 3,037 pulled Republican ballots. Only five pulled Libertarian ballots and one voter pulled a Constitution Party ballot. No one pulled a Green Party ballot this election cycle.

Of the 3,037 Republican voters, 2,988 voted for Trump. On the Democratic side, 1,040 voted for Biden.

Local library seeks levy for operating expenses in April election

The Barry-Lawrence Regional Library is asking for a 7 cent property tax operating levy increase on this year's April 7th ballot. If passed, the increase would be the first since 1989. In spite of its passage in 1989, that increase was later revoked by Missouri's Hancock Amendment, which limits the amount of personal property taxes which can be levied for public services.

"We are currently operating on the same budget we used in 1973," library director Gina Milburn said. "Our current tax cap is at 15 percent, a number which hasn't allowed for inflation. On this budget, we're unable to provide the services we once did. We've had to cut business hours and don't have funds for the necessary maintenance on our facilities, including roof repair and periodic paint and carpet replacement."

Milburn explained that the tax levy will solely be used for operational purposes and

used in 1973," library director is separate from the building Gina Milburn said. "Our current tax cap is at 15 percent, a levies they've approached voters with in the past.

"Without passage of the increased operating levy," Milburn continued, "we'll be forced to continue cutting business hours and limiting our purchases of new materials and the number of community programs we can offer."

Milburn indicated possible closures of smaller facilities could also become necessary.

With the passage of a levy

increase, the library will expand business hours and improve and renovate all nine of their facilities, which include Aurora, Eagle Rock, Mt. Vernon, Monett, Cassville, Mari-

onville, Miller, Pierce City and Shell Knob. They will also purchase new materials, including e-books and audio/ video materials, which are in huge demand. Developing and

expanding community programs is also a goal.



Dogwood Car Show to move to Stumpff's Family Event Center

The Dogwood Car Show, a Cassville auto enthusiast mainstay, will be held at a new venue. For the 34th year, the show will be organized by the Stumpff family and held at the new Stumpff Family Event Center.

Over the last 33 years, the Dogwood Car Show has been held at Roaring River State Park, the Cassville town square and the First Baptist Church parking lot. It has drawn a lot of automobile enthusiasts to the Cassville area from all over, some even as far as Oklahoma.

Donnie Stumpff, business owner and auctioneer, bought Cassville's American Legion Post 118, building and adjoining land on MO-76 in Cassville back in July 2019. The membership of the post declined to the point where it was hard to make ends meet. Stumpff then made the offer to buy the building and the grounds south of it. Post 118 still retains a portion of the grounds, Memorial Park and a smaller building behind the main facility.

Stumpff's Family Event Center is the name of what was Cassville's American Legion Post 118. One of Stumpff's main goals in purchasing the building and land is to get a lot of the older events back from years ago. On December 14, 2019, the center held their first event. It was called "God's Glory" gospel performance. It featured around 12 booths with various at-

tendees, as well as performances from Ozark Mountain Revival, the Gavits and the Ledbetter family. They had a great turn out for their first event and hope the attendance will rise with each event.

Prior to this year, the Cassville Area Chamber of Commerce hosted the event. However, chamber director Rachael Selby Freeman said the chamber agreed to switch the show over to the Stumpffs after they approached the chamber with the idea of hosting a car show. She said, "We feel like Stumpff's Family Event Center is a great location and a great network of people." The chamber is hosting a new event this year, TroutFest, and the switch will allow the chamber to focus on that while the Stumpff's operate the car show.

"We are planning on having lots of fun things for everyone to enjoy," said Ashley Stumpff, event curator for Stumpff's Family Event Center. "We are planning on having food trucks, vendors, bounce houses for kids, and some music from local bands and groups. We are very excited to bring more events like this to the community."

The 34th annual car show will be at the grounds of Stumpff's Family Event Center on Saturday, May 23, from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.

The final steel beam was installed above the entrance of Cox Hospital's new \$42 million facility during a special topping-out ceremony held February 14 at the construction site. Members of the community, including donors to the Cox Monett Momentum Campaign, were invited to sign the beam before construction workers hoisted it into position above the front entrance of the building.

The new hospital will mark a turning point in Monett's healthcare history. Beginning as a modest 18-bed hospital opened by Dr. William West in 1928 and operated by the Vincentian Sisters after Dr. West's retirement, the current hospital was constructed in 1953. It operated under the name of St. Vincent's Hospital until acquired by CoxHealth

in 1993 when the name was changed to Cox Monett. Since that time, many renovations and improvements have been made, including an adjacent physicians' clinic and a new emergency department.

Cox Monett President, Darren Bass, with Cox for 20 years, recently became a Fellow of the American College of Healthcare Executives, the nation's leading professional society for health care leaders. Under Bass's leadership, Cox Monett implemented many changes to better serve the community, including the opening of an urgent care clinic. He also guided the hospital in achieving Level IV Stroke and STEMI designation by the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services.

erating cap, via the property tax levy, up to 22 percent, an amount which will be collected in the first year, and afterward be subject to the state's decision, based on the economy," Milburn explained.

"In solid terms, the tax levy increase will amount to about \$15.50 in the first year for a person who owns a \$100,000 home and a \$15,000 vehicle. Think of it as the price of a meal at McDonald's for two people. \$15 is far less than the price of a new hardback book. If you check out only two books at the library in a year, you will have already profited from the tax increase," Milburn continued.

Did you

know?

Many people enjoy indulging in corned beef on St. Patrick's Day, but few may know exactly what they're eating. Corned beef is a way to prepare a cut of beef, typically the brisket. When making corned beef, the beef is cured in a brine solution. Corned beef gets its name because the meat used to prepare the dish is treated with large grained rock salt, which are also referred to as "corns" of salt. While corned beef is often linked to St. Patrick's Day and easy to find at restaurants come the month of March, a debate exists as to whether or not corned beef as it is known today can be linked to Ireland. In his book, "Salt: A World History," author Mark Kurlansky noted that a dish of salted beef was produced in Ireland during the Middle Ages. This dish might have been a precursor to today's corned beef. Others suggest the corned beef enjoyed during modern St. Patrick's Day celebrations is more closely connected to Irish immigrants who left home for the United States in the 19th and 20th centuries. Upon arriving in New York City during this time, many Irish immigrants purchased a salt-cured meat made from beef brisket from Jewish butchers. This meat ultimately became synonymous with St. Patrick's Day, a day to celebrate St. Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland.

In the second half, Greenwood's Aminu Mohammed put the exclamation point on a Greenwood runaway with a thunderous


dunk.



On March 11, 2020, Missouri Sheriff's will hold a press conference at the Missouri State Capitol on behalf of Missouri law abiding citizens. Sheriffs will unite to discuss the state of public safety as seen at the local level from all corners of the state. Sheriffs will be discussing the catch and release policies of the Missouri Department of Corrections, the Missouri Supreme Court bond reform,

and the millions of dollars owed to local taxpayers who are merely upholding the rule of law.

Sheriffs hope to directly communicate with Senators and Representatives about the impact of the criminal justice reform measures taken over the past year including how this affects local citizens in our own neighborhoods. Ashcroft awards local library technology mini-grant

Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft announced that Barry-Lawrence Regional Library received a Technology Mini-Grant of \$15,270.

"Libraries offer numerous vital services to their patrons," Ashcroft said. "In addition to offering a wealth of information, they also provide key business and workforce development services. These grants ensure our libraries have the technology they need to continue offering these invaluable services."

The library will use the grant to replace 20 staff computers and monitors to ensure smooth continuity of its technology-based services.

Technology Mini-Grants provide funding for eligible libraries to replace older equipment or purchase new equipment to improve library services. This equipment includes technology- and automation-related equipment, hardware and software, which are used to improve the library's network infrastructure.

The Missouri State Library has approved a total of 106 grant applications for the 2020 fiscal year, totaling \$781,441 in federal awards that the secretary's office has distributed to libraries throughout Missouri. The grants are funded by the Library Services and Technology Act through the U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services.


