Two charged with half a pound of meth

Two Seligman men were taken into custody and charged with a large amount of methamphetamine following a traffic stop in Cassville. According to a press release from the Ozarks Drug Enforcement Team (ODET), they worked with the Barry County Sheriff's Department to bring the two men

The release states that a vehicle was pulled over near the Bay Wash Carwash in Cassville after the truck was observed to be driving at high rates of speed and crossing the center line. The two men in the vehicle were identified as Clarence King, 50, of Seligman, and Jason Foster, 38, of Seligman, who fled on foot as soon as the vehicle stopped. Officers also reported that there was a seven year old child in the car at

King was the subject of a long-term investigation by ODET detectives, according to the release. When officers searched the truck, they seized 270 grams of suspected methamphetamine worth approximately \$27,000 and \$2,500 in cash. According to the affidavits of probable cause, there was methamphetamine, along with multiple prescription pills of hydrocodone, oxycodone and an unidentified drug and a digital scale. The officers also reported that \$1,000 of the cash was inside the child's backpack and that King placed

Officers apprehended Foster after a short foot pursuit. Officers reported to have found a black case with syringes and methamphetamine in Foster's pocket.

The child in the vehicle was taken into protective custody. King and Foster are both charged with drug trafficking in the first degree and endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree as a second or subsequent offense. Foster is also charged with resisting arrest for a felony by fleeing. King and Foster are currently being held in the Barry County Jail on \$75,000 cash-only bonds.

Cassville Middle Schoolers hold school safety rally

On a warm Thursday afternoon last week, Cassville Middle Schoolers quietly left their classrooms to meet outside in the courtyard to remember school shooting victims and ask for stricter safety guidelines in the school. Students in sixth through eighth grades made speeches calling for an end to violence, more kindness and positive change in the school.

The Cassville Middle School Student County held a peaceful rally on Thursday, March 15, highlighting students' beliefs on school safety and to remember the 17 students killed in the Florida school shooting last month. The event drew a large group of sixth, seventh and eighth graders to the courtyard at the school where students read speeches and asked for comments on how to improve school safety.

During her speech, seventh grader Jenna Crim said, "We all gather here today in the remembrance of the 17 people who lost their life in the Florida shooting on Feb-

ruary 14th. They will forever be remembered, and a great example of the cruelty in the hearts of society today. We salute their bravery shown in their last moments. 17 minutes we stand here, honoring them."

Students shared messages about hopes to improve student safety, requesting administration to lead more shooting drills and hire more security officers. Students asked for metal detectors and for their teachers to have a

One arrested after alleged Southwest School threat

SUPERINTENDENT COMMENDS LAW ENFORCEMENT RESPONSE

Barry County Sheriff Gary Davis confirmed that one juvenile was taken into custody for an alleged threat made at Southwest School last week. According to Davis, the suspect 14, during a phone call. "On

was located in McDonald County when the juvenile was taken into custody.

Southwest's Superintendent Tosha Tilford said the threat was made on Wednesday evening, March

Wednesday evening, one individual told another over the phone that they were going to do something to me. That was how the threat was made. I did not know that it was directly toward me at that time, I thought it was toward the school, so we went on heightened security."

Tilford said the school was never on lockdown, but they were on heightened security until the individual was taken into police custody on Friday.

She shared, "It wasn't anything more than watching for that individual."

Sheriff Davis said, "I would like to stress to the parents of the kids at Southwest and to the kids at Southwest that at no time were any children in danger. That is because of the prompt action of the administration at Southwest School District. They called law enforcement, and we went down there immediately."

Tilford also said, "The kids were never in any danger of any sort. No one was on lock down, I just had us on heightened security."

The Barry County Sheriff's Department began the search for the suspect on Thursday, March 15, and found the individual in question on Friday, March

On Friday, Davis said, "We were able to, with the school's help, institute a search to try to locate this juvenile. We were unsuccessful Thursday evening and overnight. However, Highway Patrol helped us this morning and widened the area a little bit.

"The juvenile of interest was taken into custody in McDonald County. He is currently being interviewed by the juvenile court."

No information was provided as to a motive for the threat and all information about the suspect's alleged actions will not be released until the juvenile court system charges the suspect as an adult.

Tilford said the response by law enforcement was overwhelmingly positive. "We couldn't say thank you enough to the Barry County Sheriff's Department or the Highway Patrol. Barry County did everything they could, and it was just amazing. There were officers that

were offering to use comp time just to be at the school and make sure things were taken care of. I can guarantee we were the safest place around," she said.

Tilford added, "They were phenomenal. I can't tell them thank you enough."

Davis also said, "It was a community effort to keep kids safe and that's what we're about."

After the event, Tilford released the following statement to parents and kids in the district on Friday: "Although there was no direct threat to any student, the district feels we can never be too cautious when it comes to the safety of students or staff members. We will always keep safety first, take any and all threats seriously, and put precautionary measures into action as situations arise.

"The district wants to say a special thank you to Barry County Sheriff's Department and Missouri Highway Patrol for their extra law enforcement presence at the district today."

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Small business owner warns others after alleged \$6K check forging scheme

Joy Phillips, the owner of Joyous Embroidery in Cassville, said that one of her former employees was like family to her. "I thought we had formed a pretty close bond," Phillips shared. Then, Phillips realized her bank statements were off, and she claims her employee had been stealing from her.

According to Phillips, she hired a former friend of her daughter to work in her embroidery shop in 2015. Phillips said Alexis Crabb, 37, of Monett, started out running an embroidery machine. She said, "She appeared to be doing a good job. So she started out on a machine, but she got her bachelor's in accounting, so I started letting her help with my accounting."

By 2017, Phillips said Crabb was in charge of her accounts payable at Joyous Embroidery. She said, "I thought we were good friends. I trusted her. Over the course of the couple years she was here, she and her family were spending week-

ends with us, even holidays like Christmas and Thanksgiving. Her daughters called me granny just like my grandkids."

However, Phillips said that didn't stop Crabb from taking advantage. Over time, Phillips said she noticed some discrepancies in her bank statements. She said, "I saw my bank statements and thought, 'Man, that money seems to be going down quick,' but I didn't think much more of it."

It wasn't until Phillips said she noticed Crabb holding her paychecks for up to two weeks at a time that she looked more closely at her books. "It wasn't normal for her to not cash her checks right away," Phillips

Once she looked closely, she said she realized that Crabb was issuing a second paycheck to herself each pay period. Phillips said, "I wrote paychecks on Fridays. Then on Monday, Lexi did the accounts payable, I would sign them."

She said, "She was a friend. I never thought this would happen. Even though her hus-

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band had been a police officer for a lot of years, she still did this."

Once Phillips realized the issue, she turned the information over to the Cassville Police Department. After they investigated Crabb, they turned the case over to prosecuting attorney Amy Boxx who filed charges against Crabb.

According to the affidavits of probable cause filed with the Barry County Courts, Detective Danny Boyd with the Cassville Police Department found 15 checks that Crabb issued to herself and forged Phillips' name on. Det. Boyd went on to state that Crabb admitted to doing this 15 times and then taking the checks to Walmart to cash. The total of those checks is reported to be \$6,923.52.

However, Phillips said

the trouble didn't end there. She claimed, "Judge Foulke knocked it down to no bond for her. I guess since Lexi's husband was an officer here, he asked him to let her go without a bond, and he did. But if we let people get away with things like this, it'll destroy small businesses. We just can't afford it."

Phillips said that the initial charges were dropped and then refiled by Boxx, leading Crabb to have a bond issued in a subsequent hearing. However, that information could not be corroborated. When asked for comment, both Boxx and Judge Foulke declined to comment on the case because it is pending.


Phillips continued, "It was disheartening because she had been very close to my family and had been stealing from me for a year and a half. It was disheartening how deceptive she

Crabb is charged with 15 counts of forgery and one count of stealing \$750 or more. A \$20,000 bond was issued for Crabb, and she was booked into the Barry County Jail and subsequently released after posting bond. She is due in court for a disposition hearing in front of Judge Foulke on April 3.

Phillips said, "If our judges let people get away with forgery and stealing, no small businesses will be left. We can't let people get away with things like this. Someone else might hire her because of her degree in accounting if she isn't held accountable."

calls to reach out to other students and end bullying. There were calls to action to reach out to kids who were struggling or alone. Eighth grader Landry Parnell said, "Your kind smile and friendliness could save the heartache for one person and possibly the entire community. There is always a next time. The next time someone is mean or disruptive, stop him or her and ask what is wrong."

Parnell went on to say, "Gun control and more laws is not and will not be the answer. We are the answer."

Crim wrapped her speech up by adding, "Let's stand together and prove that there can be good in society. A spark in the darkness shadowing over people across the nation."

A student closed the rally with a prayer, asking for students not praying to remain silent, and then Student Council representatives handed out index cards, asking for students' ideas on

how to improve school safety.

Cassville Middle School principal Jimmie Barton said the event was totally student-led, but the school did approve it. School administrators and teachers were aware that multiple students were talking about the walkout that was planned nationwide for March 14. The main focus of the walkout was to remember the Florida shooting victims and to call for stricter gun control.

Barton said, "We had been hearing rumors from several students after the Florida shooting about a walkout that was being planned through social media and word of mouth for March 14. I met with our 20-member student council on Monday, March 5, and asked them to gauge the number of students they thought would go through with it. The number was more than half the students, which creates a large safety issue for the students and a potential discipline

issue for leaving class without permission."

It was at that point that Barton said he engaged in a conversation with Student Council members about what students had planned and how to ensure student safety. He said, "We had a good discussion about how legal protesting, marches, and rallies are organized through a permit process in each city so that the city can ensure the safety of all citizens in and around the event. The students, not me or any employee, decided they wanted to avoid the gun control issues associated with the nationwide walkout on the 14th, and instead hold a "rally" to educate classmates on speaking up when they see something; on paying attention to those who appear disenfranchised (my word, not theirs); on being more aware of surroundings and environment; and on being responsible citizens."

He added that the date change was a student choice that would make the message CMS-specific, and not related to the national event.

Prior to the rally, Barton shared, "They have done all the planning and the work. Since such a large number of students feel this is important, we are providing their "permit" to give their message. All speeches will be approved by me, no editing, only approval to ensure that anything read or stated publicly is school-appropriate and does not discriminate any individual or group."

Barton said the middle school did not have any kids who participated in the actual national walkout on March 14. He said, "We had planned for the potential of that: I had teachers that were off that hour and that could step out of class to watch and monitor.

"We were not going to interrupt what they were doing as long as they stayed on campus."

Barton said students would not have been disciplined for protesting on Wednesday instead of the planned event as long as they were not disruptive. He said, "We would have had the conversation with the kids afterward, but it would have been more to have them understand that their representatives of the student body had something planned for them, and there are better processes to do those things."

However, no middle schoolers opted to participate in the nationwide event. Those who wanted to speak up or participate attended

the rally.


After the rally over, Barton said, "From a bystander's viewpoint, the rally was very well organized, and I thought the students did a good job of presenting their thoughts and points on safety and school violence in general."

He added, "Kids were very respectful and wellbehaved. Honestly, it was their moment that they had been asking for to voice their concern. I was very pleased they actually asked for suggestions from those in attendance."

Moving forward, Barton said administration will be in conversations with Student Council to continue to discuss student safety and students' suggestions.



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Cassville School Superintendent says no threat at middle school

Right before students held a peaceful rally on Thursday last week, rumors circulated that a student had generated a "hit list" and had planned to shoot students at Cassville Middle School. Two 911 calls were placed right before the rally because of fear of action during the rally. Cassville R-IV Superintendent Dr. Richard Asbill said those rumors proved to be unsubstantiated and there was no threat to students.

Dr. Asbill said there were three different stories that administrators were aware of at the middle school prior to the rally planned on Thurs-

day, March 15, and they worked with the school's resource officer to investigate those claims.

Dr. Asbill said, "One part of it we heard had to do with the rally and other parts did not. Around 9:30 a.m. or 10 a.m., the initial reports came in regarding that there was a student who had a list, something like a "hit list" or a list of people he didn't like. Then, number two was that he was going to 'shoot up all the gays'. The third was that the student was going to disrupt the middle school student rally on Thursday.

"Mr. Hudson and Mr. Barton were reviewing that

most of the morning and up until lunch."

Ron Hudson is the middle school assistant principal and Jimmie Barton is the principal.

Asbill said the student at the center of the rumors was in In-School Suspension for an unrelated incident at the time this all occurred. He said, "It provided us the opportunity to at least evaluate the situation and reports while knowing where one of the alleged students would

Principal Barton said, "In every one of those reports by students, there was no one with firsthand knowledge. It

was all 'Somebody said' and 'I was told by somebody else'. We interviewed nearly 20 students that day, and none were able to give anything as far as evidence."

However, despite administration taking steps to ensure there was no threat during the rally, two individuals, presumably students, placed 911 calls prior to the rally based on what they had heard about a possible shooter. Barry County E9-1-1 confirmed that those calls were placed at 1:39 p.m. and 1:43 p.m.

Initially, principal Barton made comments that the school would engage the students who called 911 and possibly their parents about whether it was appropriate to place that call instead of contacting a teacher. Parents

and students vocalized concern about students being punished for calling 911.

Dr. Asbill confirmed that the students would not be reprimanded for placing those calls. He said, "The school does not have any issues with students calling 911. With students having access to cell phones and those things, that's the norm. The issue in question would be that the calls came in right before the scheduled assembly. All of our students would have been in classes or have access to teachers at that time."

Barton also said that he made an announcement to students letting them know that there was to be plenty of supervision during the event. Cassville Police Department already had additional officers to secure student safety in preparation for the rally.

Asbill continued, "Number one, the students should be commended for what they did, but we also wish they had contacted a teacher at that point."

He continued, "We met administratively and with Officer Wenzel (SRO) to go back over things. The issue was not to discipline kids for calling 911, it was more looking at it as that Officer Wenzel was here and could deal with that if the students had spoken to a teacher.

"We just want to expedite our ability to respond to those situations."

While the school cannot comment on individual students or disciplinary action about the alleged threat, Dr. Asbill did share, "About 3

He moved quickly, pulling the tiny cub out of the den's warmth and into the cold. Wrapped in James' arms, the little bear blinked in the weak, Arctic sunlight.

James mounted his snowmobile, cradling the polar bear cub like a puppy. The two men zoomed across the ice. James soon realized the 40 miles to Point Lay was too far for the small cub. His fat reserves were not enough to protect him from the wind chill.

They drove across the tundra and soon pulled up to a hunting cabin. Inside, James found a pair of ski pants.

The men tied the legs of the pants together to create a pouch just big enough for a polar bear cub. Snuggled in the

windproof polyester, up against James' chest, the cub would be warm enough to make it through the journey. Now sheltered from the wind, the bear dozed as the snowmobile roared across the landscape.

When the men arrived in Point Lay, the villagers were quite surprised by a polar bear cub. "Let's take him to the Police Hall, where he'll be warm and comfortable," James said. The North Slope Borough, the government entity responsible for much of Northern

Alaska, was contacted. The government biologists made fast arrangements for the little cub to be flown to the larger town of Barrow the next day.

"He needs a name," James' friend said. "Before he leaves Point Lay."



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Eagle Rock couple seeks justice for shot dogs

An Eagle Rock couple is speaking out after their neighbors allegedly shot their dogs to death last week. Dani and Sam Johnson, of Eagle Rock, say their dogs were tortured before they died and that this isn't the first time dogs have gone missing in their neighborhood near the lake.

Dani Johnson shared their story in a Facebook post, and since then, the story has gone viral with people outraged at the abuse. Johnson said, "I'm not one to post things. I had no idea that my post would have so many shares. It was over 2,700 shares. I just wrote the story because people need to know about those people, and the cruelty of what happened to my babies."

Johnson said the couple let their dogs out, two chocolate labs, Gus, 6 years, Tug, 11 months, and their yellow lab, Kaycee, 3 years, to go to the bathroom on Tuesday, March 13. When the three labradors didn't come back, Johnson said they were immediately concerned.

The Johnsons have lived on 14 acres in Eagle Rock for around eight years.

She shared, "We were up all night calling them. Our entire neighborhood got together to search for them because everyone knows our dogs because they are very friendly, just total sweethearts."

Johnson posted a Face-book status at 10:51 p.m. saying they were still missing and begging people to keep an eye out for her pets.

The next morning, she called a veterinarian near them to alert them to the

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missing dogs. Johnson said she left her phone number with the vet's office and within five minutes her call was returned.

"I get a call from a man who never identified himself and he said in a really rude voice, 'I hear you called the animal hospital.' I told him I did, and I got excited because I thought he had found my dogs. I was thrilled. But then he said, 'I just wanted to let you know they were shot. They're dead. They won't be coming home tonight,' Of course, I started crying," Johnson said.

At that point, she said her husband took the phone and the caller repeated the same information. The couple went to the nearby animal hospital and were told to look for their dogs at the nearby Paradise Cove Camping Resort.

Johnson said at that point they went to Paradise Cove, but the gate was locked and had a speaker. "He said we were looking for our dogs, but no one answered. So, he and his brother went door-to-door to find our dogs."

It was when Johnson's husband went door-to-door that the puzzle pieces began to come together. She says witnesses came forward saying they knew what happened to their three labs and that one of the owners of the camping grounds shot the dogs to death.

Johnson shared, "The witnesses said the pups

were playing in the water by the shoreline. And the witness said he saw [the owner of Paradise Cove] get in her golf cart, go down there and start brutally shooting at them. She took some perverse joy in mutilating my oldest dog's genitalia without killing them. They said they saw him, my Gussie, the oldest, him laying there in agony. Then she gut-shot the other two.

"Gussie couldn't move. The others were started taking cover in some woods, according to the witnesses. These witnesses were heartbroken, they didn't know what to do."

The disturbing tale appeared to be corroborated when one of the witnesses led Johnson's husband, Sam, and his brother to the dogs' bodies. "They apparently used machines to drag them when they were still alive, and my husband and brother in law saw them and it was intended to cause as much pain and suffering as possible. My husband and brother in law were able to get them on the truck and bring them home to bury them in our back yard," she said.

Johnson also said the dogs' orange collars were cut off and they took photos to document the abuse the dogs endured. "If she was truly frightened or whatever, she would have shot in the air. Taking a shot is different than torturing them. There was no reason to maim them like that," she

explained. "Some people have something cruel in them."

Johnson said she hopes that her story makes a positive change in cases like this. She said, "What do I hope to gain is I want to make people more aware and maybe think before they do something like this. And maybe we can get laws changed if they prosecute these cases and give them stricter penalties when they do. We could save some animals"


The Barry County Sheriff's Office made a public announcement on their Facebook page after receiving multiple calls and messages: "Thank you for your messages. Rest assured we are taking this incident seriously and are looking into it. It takes some time to gather the information required to get the full story. We understand that the shooting of these dogs invokes an emotional response. We are not allowed to let our emotions dictate our response. Please be patient while we conduct the investigation."

With Johnson's story gaining so much traction and catching the public eye, Paradise Cove has been flooded with negative Facebook, Google and Yelp

What is your primary objective that led you to run for school board?

To push forward and advance the transition to a school board that has parental energy, involvement and insight.

What experience do you have that makes you a good candidate?

3 children in the Cassville District. 23 years business owner experience. Past failed board elections helps to better understand the forces that shape the school.

What do you believe the role of a school board is or should be? Why?

Important roles of a school board member is evaluation and leadership. A board member must be able to

make an honest determination of the schools resources and performance. A school board member must understand they communicate through their decisions. It is this communication that will set the climate and culture of the school. Decisions must be made on merit and professionalism.

If elected, what objectives do you have for the first 90 days on the school board?

The objectives and school performance that need to be achieved reach beyond the 90 day horizon. My intention for the first 90 days is to introduce myself to the forces that shape the school and make sure expectations are understood.

How do you measure the quality of a school?

There are two primary measurements that would be relied upon for my performance evaluation. The traditional measurement provided by the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education gives each school a number score that incorporates several areas of school performance. It provides an easy school to school comparison. The other measurement is by observation and discussion. These are the questions that need to be answered. How does the school handle and approach problems and challenges? Do the same problems continue to show up? Does the school create the problem? Does the school work on the conditions that created the problem? Thoughtful and truthful answers will guide a board member toward how to measure our school.

Do you think the current school safety standards at Cassville are adequate? Why or why not, and what changes, if any, would you like to see?

School buildings that were designed 30+ years ago were designed to educate students, their design was never meant to deal with the threat of an armed intruder. In my conversations with other concerned parents it is apparent soft spots do exist at our school. Improving school safety through building changes alone will not work without proper plans of action for faculty and staff. These plans of action must be well designed, practiced and well understood for multiple scenarios. Action plans must include input, cooperation and coordination with all local law enforcement agencies.

Do you feel there are problems within the district that need to be addressed? What solution would you like to see to correct them?

Expectations must be raised on school performance. Transition to an energetic and connected school board that is willing to take on the problems that contribute to school performance will be a fundamental element.

Do you feel teaching staff is adequately supported within the district? Why or why not?

An area of support that needs addressing is student discipline. Discipline policies are developed to support teachers in the classroom.

Do you believe the current practices regarding bully prevention are adequate? If not, what would you change?

Awareness is a large component to bullying prevention. A bullying situation requires an anonymous notification system that students understand. Students need to have a trusted adult available in those tense situations.

Do you feel student diversity (race, heritage, sex, religion, gender identity, sexuality, etc.) is protected within the school? If not, what areas would you like to see a change in?

Codes of student conduct are in place. Those codes of conduct need to include protection for students that are in the minority. If these codes of conduct are broken, then discipline policies will dictate the response.

Do you think parent involvement and communication is a priority at the school? Why or why not, and what changes would you like to see in that area?

I feel that opportunities exist for parents to get involved. I am comfortable with parents participating in student's education. Parent participation cannot be allowed to become a disruption to the faculty and staff in the performance of their jobs.

There is no centralized communication system for parents to monitor their students progress.

I would advocate for a central system in which parents could access their students progress using multiple devices.

I was employed by Cassville Schools for 7 years as a Technology Specialist. I am also a Cassville Alumni, USMC Veteran, and father of 2 children in the district.

What do you believe the role of a school board is or should be? Why?

I believe the role of the school board is to provide direction and support for our district, based off input from its employees and its parents.

If elected, what objectives do you have for the first 90 days on the school board?

I think the Cassville School District does a great job at protecting student diversity, I don't think there are any areas that need improvement.



Alleged burglary leads to assault near Purdy

Two women were arrested Monday night after they allegedly broke into a garage near Purdy.

According to statements of probable cause used in filing charges against them, Tessie Cox and Jessica Garner went to a residence on Farm Road 2100 on Monday, March 19, and kicked in the door to the victim's garage. Four losses to state runner-up Purdy, including the district championship game, marred an otherwise brilliant season for Tony Eagleburger's Lady Trojans softball team a year ago. Southwest was 15-2 against everyone else, but 0-4 against their conference

This 2018 edition features five returning starters: seniors Taylor Swindle, Emily Snyder, and Kaitlyn Bernard (all 4 year varsity starters); and juniors Heather Windes and Maggie Robbins.

reviews. One photo on Facebook showed's the camping ground's sign vandalized with "dog killer" painted on it.

Other members of the Eagle Rock community have also come forward with concerns and accusations against Paradise Cove. One of those people, Colin Evans, has property next to the campground and said his dog, Chewy, a German Shepard/Pit Bull mix, had been missing for 12 days until he found Chewy's body last night.

He said, "I got a tip from another neighbor down the street from us that my dog had been found on another property. I found him there last night." Evans said Chewy was found about half a mile from the campground.

Similar to the Johnsons' tale, Chewy was very friendly and regularly visited neighbors beyond Evans' 80 acres. He said the vandalized sign led him to seek out the owners of Paradise Cove and ask them.

"When I saw them at the highway fixing their sign, I pulled over to ask them if they had seen my dog. They admitted to knowing my dog and said they didn't shoot my dog. I asked if they knew anything about the other dogs had been missing in the neighborhood. They denied it all," Evans said.

At the time, Evans said this was the day before he found Chewy's body. At the time, he didn't know that he had been

Evans said he turned the information over to the Barry County Sheriff's Department. "I want to seek at least restitution and have them admit to what they did. I think they

should have to issue an apology."

Evans said no one has come forward with information about witnessing the end of Chewy's life.

Facebook posts from around Eagle Rock said the dog disappearances and shootings have been going on for 12 years, but calls to those parties were not immediately returned for an interview.

A phone call placed to Paradise Cove for comment was not returned. The line rang, an answering machine picked up with only the song "Bad Boys" by Inner Circle (the COPS theme song) before a beep. A message left requesting an interview was not returned as of time of press.





An usual find in a field outside of Butterfield meant an early twentieth century veteran had his headstone returned. Carl Goble found the government-issued headstone in near perfect condition on his property 76 years after the man's death.

Goble said, "I was trying to prepare a place to have an outbuilding set, and I went out to a rock pile in the field, really more or less a trash pile. I saw a rock laying out. When I flipped it over, I realized it was a headstone."

All Goble knew was that he had a headstone for a man named Oscar E. Baldridge, and his death date read February 1942. As to how the headstone ended up face down in his field? He had no idea. So, he decided to try to find Baldridge's family and see if he could return it.

Since the headstone was turned face down, the name and date were well-preserved. If it had ended up face up, there is a good chance it would have been so weathered he might not have been able to read it. A lot of luck went into Baldridge's headstone being found.

Goble continued, "If it wasn't for the internet, the search would have been a lost cause. But I found him and tried to contact his family."

He did have luck finding Baldridge's family becayse they had commented on a memorial website. What he did discover that was helpful was where the Stone County native was buried, and it wasn't far.

Baldridge was buried in Monett's IOOF Cemetery. When Goble called, he was put in touch with the City of Monett's foreman Keith Mills.

Mills said, "This is definitely a first for us. He called city hall in town and it was forwarded to me. At first, I thought he was claiming that there was a stone buried out here in the wrong place. But once I got the actual story, he said he had found it out in the field where he currently lives. He found that the guy was buried out here."

Goble said the City of Monett was pretty excited about him bringing the marker to Baldridge's final place of rest. "I loaded it into the trunk of my car, and when I got there, they already had a place dug out for it and every-

thing. We set it right then and there."

Like many Veterans' Affairs issued markers, this one had Baldridge's name, his position in the military and a death date of February 23, 1942. It did not have a date of birth probably because it was unknown.

Mills said, "We've never had that happen before, and him being a veteran is even cooler.

"We went ahead and set it. He already had a headstone, but it was a veterans marker, so we put it at the foot."

Online records indicated that Baldridge was originally from Elsey in Stone County and died in Monett at the age of 45. So, the mystery remains: how did the marker end up in a field in Butterfield?

Goble believes he knows part of that answer. Ends up, it isn't that uncommon to find government-issued markers.

Essentially, when a veteran qualifies for a marker, it is provided free in certain circumstances. However, the headstone or marker isn't provided for months after the death and the person is buried. Sometimes the stones were shipped to funeral homes, sometimes

cemeteries, and often to the family's home. It was then the family's responsibility to take the marker out and set it.


Goble said, "I was talking to another cemetery guy around here, and they had three of them stacked up in a corner of the ceremtery's building. I guess back in the day, when a veteran died, the funeral home would fill out


paperwork to get the headstone from the government. Ship Sometimes they would have it shipped to the funeral home, but most of the time it would be shipped to their house.

"Apparently this was shipped to someone's house and never got put out."

Goble said he has lived on the property where it was found since 1998. "There was







MoDOT: Car crashes leading cause of child death

The Missouri Department of Transportation and Department of Health and Senior Services know that car crashes are a leading cause of death for children one to 13 years old in the United States. Safety professionals continue to stress the importance of buckling children in an age appropriate safety seat. It's their best defense in a traffic crash. MoDHSS Director, Dr. Randall Williams reminds, "Everyone, including pregnant women and children, should use safety belts or car seats every time they ride in a motor vehicle."

In 2016, 18 children less than eight years of age were killed and 47 suffered serious injuries in motor vehicle crashes in Missouri. Twentynine percent of the children killed were not restrained in a car seat or safety belt. Additionally in 2016, motor vehicle crashes were responsible for 8 maternal deaths (the death of a mother while pregnant or up to a year after delivery) in Mis-

"All parents and caregivers need to understand the importance of child passenger safety seats. It's not just about following the law; child passenger seats help prevent serious injury and may even save your child's life," said Patrick McKenna, director of the Missouri Department of Transportation.

Missouri child safety seat technicians can provide education and car seat inspections. A list of car seat inspection stations and locations across the state can be found at seatcheck. org. Appointments may be necessary.

MoDOT urges everyone to get their child safety seats inspected. "When it comes to the safety of a child, there is no room for mistakes," said McKenna. "It's also all the more reason to always buckle up, everyone, every trip, every time – and put your cell phone down if you're driving - Buckle Up Phone Down."

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Gizmo wins PRCA comedy award

There's a gleam that shines across Dale McCracken's face.

It's not about his first major ProRodeo award, the 2017 Comedy Act of the Year, but it could be. It's not about his being in the hunt to be the barrelman for the Wrangler National Finals Rodeo, but it could be.

No, McCracken's twinkle arrives as he talks about the loves of his life, his wife, Janice, and their brood, and his faith in God. Nothing "Gizmo" McCracken has ever done in the rodeo arena will bring a bigger smile to his face than discussing Cassie and Mandy, their husbands and their children.

They've enriched his life in so many ways, and they've been a big part of the family business.

"They've always been a part of what we do," he said of his daughters. "Now they've got two kids apiece."

Those kids - Cassie and Jeremy Crouch have Brimley and Raeley, while Mandy and Jimmy Evans have Bronc and Jaylen - are now the next phase of what the McCracken family hopes to do with his rodeo comedy. He travels the country – and even the world - as a rodeo funnyman and entertainer, and this year, he was recognized as the best in the busi-

"I'm honored to be in that crowd," he said of the other four entertainers that

were nominated with him: Bert Davis, David Whitmoyer, Johnny Dudley and Mark Swingler. "There are some great acts out there."

He knows. McCracken first began his funny business 41 years ago as a 15-year-old high-schooler, building acts while studying agriculture. He's been part of the Professional Rodeo Cowboys Association since 1992. This is just the first time in his distinguished career he has received a PRCA award.

"You always hope you're going to win," McCracken said. "Everybody wants to win something like that. The first couple of years I was nominated, I was hopeful. I was a little jittery. Then we had a dry spell for a few years that we weren't even nominated.

"Last year (in 2016) I was nominated for Clown of the Year and comedy act. I had gotten a little numb to not winning. I felt like I was past my shot at winning it."

He wasn't, and the moment he was called to the stage to be presented with his award, he had Janice, Mandy and Cassie by his side.

"We used them in our act when we first started," he said of his girls. "As soon as they could walk in the arena, they would doddle in there with a guitar or something, and we'd do some little music act."

He even got to unveil a long-time trophy he'd been keeping as another gag or gizmo that helps make his comedy what it is.

"That little roll of adding-machine tape had become a joke in our family," McCracken said. "The first couple of years we were nominated, I thought I'd take that up there if I won, because I'm a comedy act and I'm supposed to do something funny. I figured I'd take it up on stage and reel it out to thank all these people.

"Then I'd take it back home and set it up on the desk like a trophy."

Now he'll be able to wrap it around his Montana Silversmiths trophy buckle as a reminder of what resilience and faith can do. It wasn't but a few years ago that McCracken watched so much around him crumble. Gizmo's Event Center, a complex he had dreamed about creating, was unable to sustain.

"That's amazing how God works," he said. "I've worked all my life to make things happen, and I went in way over my head. We lost a lot of things and had to start over. When you're down to

nothing, and the only thing you've got is God, it comes down to you and God.

"I said, 'OK, you've got my attention.' And that's when it started over."

He was first nominated for Comedy Act of the Year in 2002, then returned in 2005. He wasn't part of the landscape until 2014 and hasn't left the scene since.

God definitely got his

attention.

"We put everything we've got into this," McCracken said. "For a handful of folks to acknowledge that, it's just amazing. It was awesome to have the kids and Janice there with me."

But there's no place else for Janice McCracken to be. They've been married for 38 years, and they've made every step in this rodeo

career together.


"In this business, it's tough, but we always go together," he said. "She is my rock. Between her, the kids and God, we can do anything."

an old farmhouse on the front part of the property years and years ago. It had to be here from then."

When Goble reached out to others involved with cemetery associations, he said there are multiple reasons why some markers were never placed. He claims some haven't been placed a Cassville cemetery, as well. "The original grave markers, they didn't put anything down really. If a rain storm came down and washed away the little tabs set out, then by the time the gravestones came in months later, they didn't know where the grave was."

Oftentimes, families couldn't afford any other

marker, so by the time it was ordered, shipping, mailed and received from the government, the family might not know where the grave was or would have moved. They were responsible for taking it out to the cemetery, as well, creating hurdles.

Goble said he was glad to be able to get at least one marker back to the person who earned it, even if it was 76 years later.

"I took it up there and they put it immediately in the ground. They were waiting for me when I got there, and they agreed it was very important to place it immediately," Goble shared.
