City of Purdy mulls construction of tiny homes

Purdy mayor Bo Prock recently received a call from Ken Madison, the owner of a trailer park in Purdy, on the subject of building tiny houses in the city of Purdy. According to Purdy City Clerk Debbie Redshaw, Madison's only question was whether or not a tiny house could be built within city limits.

At a Purdy City Council meeting on Monday, March 11, Prock brought the issue to the council to get the council's opinion on the matter. While Prock found little opposition on the matter, he did find that to build a tiny house in Purdy, he would first have to tear down a tiny mountain of legislation.

Tiny houses are a recent construction movement that is designed to help save residents money by trimming down the excess space, power, and plumbing needs of a standard-sized domicile. Tiny houses can be hand-made but, are generally made from sheds that have been retrofitted to accommodate basic living necessities. These homes generally have a square footage of less than 700. They usually feature a living area, a bathroom, a condensed kitchen area and a 'sleeping-loft', or a raised area above one of the other areas in the house that is accessed by ladder or stairs, in lieu of bedrooms.

Tiny houses generally cost anywhere from \$1,000 to \$7,000 per home, as opposed to the substantially higher cost of their standard counterparts.

Prock himself, both in and out of the meeting, voiced his support of homes of this nature being built in Purdy.

"I think it brings a very different, interesting culture to the community," said Prock. "I think it's a way for people to not spend all their money on their mortgage every month and have money to do more things that they want to do."

While no alderman at the meeting stood opposed to the issue, several raised concerns as to whether or not Purdy's current ordinances would allow for the construction of houses of that size within city limits.

With further research conducted during the council meeting, it was discovered that, while the city didn't have an ordinances that explicitly forbid the building of homes at that size, there were some ordinances that could affect the council's ability to approve the construction.

"The tiny house prospect would be held back a little bit with some of our ordinances regarding mobile trailer homes," said Prock. "We have some specifics about size. Really, there's not supposed to be anything smaller than a

Former astronaut to be inducted into hall of fame

Former astronaut Dr. Janet Kavandi has had a big life. In addition to three space flights over her career and an equally impressive list of managerial credits within NASA, Dr. Kavandi is about to be awarded with one of NASA's highest honors: induction into the U.S. Astronaut Hall of Fame. While most of these things are a matter of public record, one thing that tends to go unmentioned in her story is her original home: Cassville, Missouri. The seat of Barry County.

Dr. Kavandi's big life began in Springfield, where she was born to parents Bill and Ruth Sellers. The Sellers family lived

on a farm just outside of Cassville. According to Kavandi, the time spent growing up under the unpolluted night skies of Barry County were a key component to her dreams of becoming an astronaut.

"We had a house outside of town where we raised cattle," said Dr. Kavandi. "I really loved growing up there. I liked being in the country. I liked looking up at the night sky there, which is part of what I think contributed to me wanting to be in the astronaut program. The stars in the sky there are so much more vibrant than the skies in bigger cities. I grew up seeing that and wondering what it would be like to go up there."

Due to tragedy in the family, Dr. Kavandi eventually found herself exiting Barry County and living in Carthage at the age of eight. She would go on to graduate from Carthage High School before achieving her undergraduate degree from Missouri Southern State University in Joplin.

From there, she went on to acquire her Master's degree from the Missouri University of Science and Technology in Rolla.

For a time, Kavandi worked for a company called Eagle-Picher technologies where, according to the Carthage Hall of Heroes in which Dr. Kavandi features, she used her various chemistry degrees to assist in the creation of new batteries for national defense purposes.

It was at this point in her career that she was approached by Boeing Aerospace Co., who offered her a position and agreed to fund her pursuit of a PhD if she would relocate to Seattle. Dr. Kavandi, along

with her husband, moved to Seattle, where she earned her doctorate from the University of Washington-Seattle.

"It was always my dream to apply to the astronaut program," said Dr. Kavandi. "That was part of me getting my PhD. All my life I just wanted to find a way to get in to the

Monett man hit and killed walking down rural road

A Monett man was killed while walking down Farm Road 2140 outside of Freistatt last week. According to a Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, Corey D. Jones, 37, of Monett, was walking in the lane of traffic when he was hit by a pickup three miles north of Friestatt.

Jones was hit around 9:30 p.m. on Friday, March 15. Grant J. Jester, 28, of Stott City, was driving the 1997 Ford Ranger eastbound

when it struck Jones.

Jones was pronounced deceased at the scene by Lawrence County Coroner Scott Lakin at 10:10 p.m. He was taken to Buchanan Funeral Home, in Monett.

Jones was the 16th fatality for 2019 for Missouri State Highway Patrol Troop D.

Jester had no reported injuries, and the truck sustained moderated damage. The truck was driven from the scene.

double wide within city limits. We would have to look in to rewriting some of that to accommodate the tiny houses.”

Additionally, while many tiny houses are built with composting toilets to save on plumbing costs, Prock stated that tiny homes built in Purdy would require a more traditional plumbing situation.

“I really think that would be one of the qualifications for them to be built would be the houses being hooked up to the city sewer,” said Prock.

Prock later stated that he planned to

bring forward the idea of making changes to various city ordinances that would stand in the way of the potential construction project. Prock also let on that this is something of a systemic issue for the city and that this would only be the first step toward making more sweeping changes to improve life within the city.

“We have a lot of old ordinances,” stated Prock. “The majority of our ordinances need gone through and rewritten to be more in line with the times.”

Two killed in crash south of Cassville Sat.

Two men were killed in a two-vehicle crash south of Cassville on Saturday. Johnny J. Berry, 59, of Exeter, and Scott C. Menick, 57, of Joplin, were riding in a car that was hit by a truck around 8:19 a.m. on Saturday, March 16.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, Berry was driving a 2008 Chevrolet Aveo westbound on Farm Road 2212 with Menick as a passenger.

The Aveo failed to yield to a second vehicle, a 2006 Chevrolet 2500 pickup, driven by Daniel R. Lloyd, 43, of Aurora, headed southbound on MO 37.

The truck struck the side of the Aveo.

Menick was pronounced

deceased at the scene by Barry County deputy coroner Gary Swanson at 8:24 a.m. and transported to Fohn Funeral Home in Cassville. Berry was transported by air care and pronounced deceased by Dr. Hegde at Cox South Hospital at 9:47 a.m.

They were Missouri State Highway Patrol's 17th and 18th fatalities for 2019.

Lloyd was transported by EMS to Mercy Hospital in Cassville for treatment of minor injuries.

Lloyd was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash. Berry and Menick were not wearing seat belts at the time of the crash.

The pickup was towed from the scene by Wellbaum Towing. The Aveo was towed

from the scene by Wilson's Wrecker.

MoDOT crews repair potholes

Missouri Department of Transportation crews will be focusing on pothole repairs through April. Crews started working to address the pesky potholes as soon as there was a break in the weather. MoDOT will have about 300 pothole patching crews statewide working to make roadways safer.



Monett woman jailed on burglary, elderly abuse

A 35 year old woman from Monett was jailed after allegedly breaking into a rural Purdy home in January and assaulting the elderly woman inside. Bernice White, 35, of Monett, is charged with one count of felony burglary in the first degree, one count of misdemeanor abuse of an elderly person, and one count of misdemeanor assault in the fourth degree. According to affidavits of probable cause, White went into a residence on a private road in Purdy on January 21. White allegedly went in unwelcome and unannounced and began assaulting a victim inside the

home. White allegedly pushed one victim into a wall while cussing. Officers reported White attempted to kick one victim and hit another by mistake. Then, White allegedly shoved a 77 year old victim into a table, causing pain in her right arm and shoulder. White was taken into custody and booked into the Barry County Jail on Sunday, March 17. The arrest warrant was issued on February 5. White is currently being held in lieu of a \$30,000 cash-only bond.

New voting machines delivered to Barry County

On Monday, March 3, large portions of the City Square in Cassville were blocked off for a very important delivery to the Barry County Courthouse. The cargo was a series of new voting machines that replaced the courthouse's old ones. In a matter of minutes, the new voting machines were stored within the courthouse and the old ones were sent away. According to presiding commissioner Gary Youngblood, the biggest reason for the change had to do with the age of the machines. While the old machines did an adequate job of tallying votes and ensuring that the voting process went untampered, the new machines feature several new features that will ease the job

of those counting votes in upcoming elections. The most notable change with these new machines is the improved optical scanner. While the old voting machines featured an optical scanner that automatically tallied votes, it only had the capacity to tally votes for parties registered in

the system. This new scanner will be able to scan the names of write-in candidates and track their votes in the same way without having their information inputted into the system beforehand. "I'm excited about the new machines," said Barry County Clerk Jill LeCompte. "I think that their new capability to read write-in candidates will really save our election judges a lot of time. I think It will be more accurate as well." In addition, the machines made for compliance Americans With Disabilities Act have also received an upgrade. They now feature an updated touch screen for ease of use. The machines will be in use at the courthouse for the municipal election on April 2.

astronaut corps. I really never thought that I could do it. I did everything that I could to give me the best shot. I got the best education, and took the best positions I could." Doctorate in hand and stars on the horizon, Dr. Kavandi applied to be in NASA's Astronaut Corps. Kavandi was selected for the program after her first interview and, in 1995, relocated to Houston to begin her training. "I actually got in, which never ceases to amaze me," said Kavandi. "I got to fly very quickly, which was very unusual." During her time at NASA, Dr. Kavandi logged 33 days in space, with a total of 535 orbits around the planet. Dr. Kavandi's first mission in space was STS-91 (STS, Space Transport System) where she served as a mission specialist. The purpose of this

mission was to transport materials to what would become a precursor to the International Space Station. Dr. Kavandi's second spaceflight, STS-99, saw Dr. Kavandi and crew using three-dimensional mapping technology to build a topographical map of over 47 million miles of the Earth's land surface. Her final mission was aboard STS-104, which saw Dr. Kavandi and her team add an airlock to the International

Space Station in 2001. After her final flight in 2001, Dr. Kavandi continued to work with NASA. According to Dr. Kavandi, after the disaster of the Columbia Space Shuttle, she worked on the team that investigated the crash and worked with the families of the crew. Kavandi then went on to a variety of leadership roles at various facilities within NASA before being selected as the Deputy Director of the NASA Glenn Research Center

in Cleveland, Ohio. Within a year's time, Dr. Kavandi was made director of the facility, a position which she still holds today. In addition to her induction into the Hall of Fame, Kavandi has received numerous awards throughout her career. These include: Outstanding Alumnus of 1996 at MSSU, three Space Flight Medals for shuttle flights STS-

91, STS-99 and STS-104, two NASA Exceptional Service Medals, two NASA Outstanding Leadership Medals and the prestigious Presidential Rank Award. Dr. Kavandi will be inducted into the U.S. Astronaut Hall of Fame on Saturday, April 6. She will be one of 99 other astronauts to receive the honor. The ceremony will take place at the Kennedy Space Center

Visitor Complex in Florida. "To be nominated to be in the hall of fame, it's like you're one of the elite of the astronauts, who already an elite class, in my opinion," said Dr. Kavandi. "It seems impossible. To be nominated to be in the top of that is really, really special. It's beyond my wildest dreams and expectations. I'm very honored."

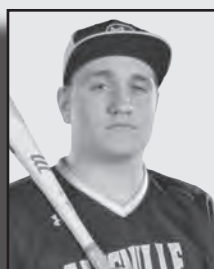

Barry County Health Department releases February Food Service Report

Habitat for Humanity encouraging donations, hosting fundraiser in April

The South Barry County chapter of Habitat for Humanity has been hard at work constructing new properties across the county for families in need. While the funding for their current project, a three-bedroom one-bath property on the corner of Eighth and Oakhill Streets, is in place, the chapter is still in need of funding for future projects.

David Hermann, president of the Barry County Chapter, has been hard at work organizing efforts to create fundraising opportunities as well as encourage community involvement in Habitat projects.

Hermann is introducing a new program for citizens interested in donating to the Barry County chapter called the Golden Hammer Club. Members of this club would commit to a monthly donation that would go toward the Habitat for Humanity's build fund.

"This is for people who want to get involved in helping us build homes but might not have the time or the capacity to volunteer," said Hermann.

Donations for the club are tiered, with options for \$5, \$10, \$20, and \$50 monthly donations over the period of a year. There is also an option for a one time payment of any amount.

Applications for the Golden Hammer Club will be made available at the Annual Habitat for Humanity Fundraiser on Saturday, April 27, as well as in the Habitat ReStore, located near All-Points Recycling on 10th Street in Cassville.

The proceeds from the Habitat for Humanity fun-

draiser on April 27 will also go to the Habitat build fund. The fundraiser will include a silent auction, wherein members of the community will donate items or services to be auctioned off to the fundraiser attendee who bids the highest.

Food will be served at the event. The menu will include pulled pork on a bun with a side of baked beans, chips, and a soft drink.

Admission to the event will be free but, in order to participate in the food for the afternoon, attendees must donate a minimum of \$5.

The festivities will be held at the Family Life Center in Cassville from 4 p.m. to 8 p.m. For more information on how to get involved in the fundraiser, contact the Habitat for Humanity Cassville office at (417) 847-2203.

Hermann also wants to encourage the people of Barry County to come out and lend a hand on builds.

"I'd like to help bring back a sense of community involvement," said Hermann. "I don't just want people to look in the paper and say 'oh, Habitat built another home'. I'd like them to be able to look out and say 'I helped build that.'"

Currently, the Habitat has volunteer options available at the Habitat for Humanity ReStore, an establishment that offers donated construction materials and furniture at a fair price. ReStore volunteers can volunteer for as long as they like at the store. Work includes cleaning, stocking, and pricing merchandise. The Habitat ReStore is open from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and 9 a.m. to 12 p.m. on Saturdays. To donate your time to the Re-

Store, contact them directly at (417) 846-0110.

Volunteers can also get involved with the construction process. Those skilled with power tools or possessing prior knowledge of construction can volunteer their time to help on site with the building of the structure itself. Volunteers who lack prior construction experience can also help on site in a variety of ways. Interior work like painting and decorating can be handled by anyone willing to put in their time.

"We always need more hands on the construction site," said Hermann. "Even if it's just grabbing a hammer for someone or holding a ladder, whatever someone can do."

Smokey Bear teams up with Exeter FFA members

CoxHealth expands telemedicine clinics for students to 20+ districts

Students in more than 20 districts throughout the Ozarks now have access to health care without leaving school. In early March, CoxHealth expanded its telemedicine services to schools in Buffalo, Lamar, Liberal, Rogersville and Seymour – ultimately helping reduce absenteeism due to illness.

The efforts – powered by a USDA grant, as well as \$90,000 from Children's Miracle Network Hospitals at CoxHealth – began in early 2017. At the time, six districts were involved. Now, the list includes schools in Aurora, Ava, Cassville, Eminence, Forsyth, Marionville, Miller, Monett, Mount Vernon, Mountain Grove, Ozark, Reeds Spring, Sparta, Summersville, Verona, Willard and Winona, as well as the aforementioned Buffalo, Lamar, Liberal, Rogersville and Seymour.

"We have been thrilled with the results of this initiative, and the growth its seen since its inception," says Tabitha Ferwalt, Virtual Visits product manager with CoxHealth. "This expansion – and hopefully ones in the future – will help kids be diagnosed quickly, getting the back to learning as soon as possible."

The visits, which are conducted virtually with CoxHealth-affiliated providers, are completely optional. Parents are able to participate in the visit either in person, or by phone or video using a smartphone (or other video-enabled device) without having to leave work or home.

If a diagnosis is made, prescriptions are sent to each family's preferred pharmacy. CoxHealth partners with CMN Hospitals at CoxHealth to provide financial support for medications for those in need.
