Cassville City voters approve \$11 Million water, sewer bond issue

Cassville voters approved an \$11 million water and sewer systems bond issue at the polls yesterday. Voters approved the issue with a fairly narrow margin, 60 percent in favor and 40 percent against. The issue had drawn a lot of attention from both supporters and critics prior to the election.

Cassville mayor Bill Shiveley, who won the seat for the sixth year as mayor in the same election, was pleased with the passing of the bond. He said, "I am very excited that the bond passed. No matter whether I was mayor or someone else, that was something the city had to do. I appreciate the residents passing that and allowing us to get in compliance with DNR. We were going to have to do the work one way or another and this was the best way to do it."

City Administrator Steve Walensky said, "First of all, I want to thank the people who came out to vote. Obviously, that is one of the first things on my mind. I want them to understand that the staff at city hall is very appreciative for them actually get out to vote, especially with an issue as important as our water and sewer."

Walensky added, "I'm looking forward to working with the honorable Bill Shiveley and the city council on the future progression for our community. I would say the significant projects, like water and sewer and our transportation needs, will be well coordinated to make sure everything improves and the community is aware of the progress."

The primary reason the city pursued the issue was to be compliant with an agreement made with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. The city agreed to fix the wastewater treatment issue, which was that untreated water was being released in Flat Creek, usually due to heavy flooding and rain, voluntarily through an agreement in 2011. With extensions granted in 2015, the city was faced with a \$5.4 million sewer repair issue, but no funding to complete it until the bond passed yesterday.

The sewer project will involve replacing most of the aging main line, which is allowing water to infiltrate the lines and causing an excess of ground and rain water in the sewer system to be treated at the wastewater plant. The plant is not equipped to treat the additional influx of water through leaks, which is what was leading to untreated water being released into the Flat Creek.

The city added water system repairs to the bond issue,

Shiveley in for sixth year as Cassville mayor

Cassville incumbent Bill Shiveley beat out his competitor, newcomer Colby Lowe, for his mayoral seat in the city. Shiveley took 75 percent of the vote with 235 votes, and Lowe took 25 percent with 78 votes, according to unofficial numbers released by Barry County Clerk Gary Youngblood the night of the election.

Shiveley's win guarantees him a sixth and seventh year as Cassville's mayor. When asked why he decided to run for the position again, he said his main motivation was to see the water and sewer projects through, as well as continue to work on the streets in the city with the fairly new transportation tax on the books.

Shiveley was on site at Barry County's old courthouse as the ballots were being counted. However, he was more concerned with the city voters' decision regarding the water and sewer bond issue that will provide a funding mechanism to overhaul the systems. Shiveley has been public about his support of the bond issue to bring the city's sewer system in compliance with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources.

Lowe ran for the seat wanting to make an impact on the city's management through streets and the water and sewer system improvements. Lowe also claimed citizens did not trust the current city administration's honesty or appropriation of funds.

Shiveley was appreciative of citizens' confidence in him to continue to lead the city. He also said he is looking forward to continue his vision for street improvements, as well as the water and sewer.

He said, "I'm thankful that the voters have confidence in what I've been

doing and I hope we can continue to make progress in the future."

When asked for comment regarding Shiveley's win, Lowe said, "Congratulations. This is only the beginning. If I don't see improvements within the next two years, I will try

Southwest bond issue passes, renovations to begin

The Southwest R-5 School District's proposed bond issue was approved by the large majority of voters in yesterday's General Municipal Election. The District requested \$1.3 million bonding from voters to make improvements and repairs to various buildings on the school's campus.

Southwest Superintendent Tosha Tilford said she appreciates voters' support to make the repairs and improve students' experience. She said, "I appreciate their support so much. It shows how proud they are of the school system and how supportive they are. We, the community, needed to show the school how proud we are of them."

She added, "I commend my bond issue committee. They worked their tails off. They got out and spread the word to help get yes votes

Voters approved the issue with a large margin, 79 percent of voters in favor and 21 percent against it. Southwest District has voters in both Barry and McDonald Counties who determined the fate of the bond issue. In Barry County, Washburn and Seligman precincts voted on the issue, with 407 voting yes and 105 voting no. In Barry County, 79 percent of voters were in favor of the bond. In McDonald County, 30 voters were in favor and 2 voters were against it. Voters approved it in McDonald County

with 94 percent for and 3

The next step will be looking at selling the bond with the best interest rates. Tilford stated, "The next step is working with L.J. Hart Companies. They will come in and give us a scope on what they've found for us interest-wise."

The bond issue will fund repairs to the middle school gymnasium, known to alum "The Pit." The foundation needs to be stabilized to maintain the integrity of the original structure. Along with the foundation work, the gym will also receive a new floor, insulation, air conditioning and

She said, "As far as the middle school gym goes, that's a facility that we are not in a position to rebuild. It would take a tax increase to rebuild it. It's one of the nicest middle school gym facilities for a school our size in the area. Sometimes when it's hot, we actually have to move games to the high school gym because we don't have air conditioning. It's also a community building, and it'll make it easier for the community to access that."

The bond will also provide funding to repair existing elementary restrooms, some of which are out of order entirely, as well as the construction of new bathrooms on the north end of the building between the elementary classrooms and the multipurpose building.

Tilford said, "This is going to be a tremendous impact for students. Our elementary will not be so tied to a restroom schedule. PreK through second grade is in that building and they are on such a tight restroom schedule because there are so many of them in there.

"If you have an emergency, sometimes it's hard to get a student to the bathroom. Getting these fixed and adding new ones, it'll help loosen that schedule. I can't imagine having to tell them they can't go to the restroom. It's a win-win all around."

The school hopes to complete all repairs before the 2018-19 school year. Through other funding,

Cassville man arrested for alleged knife point kidnapping

A Cassville man racked up kidnapping and armed criminal action charges after an alleged domestic dispute at an Oak Hill Drive home. Jason John Swift, 34, of Cassville, is charged with kidnapping in the first degree, assault in the second degree and armed criminal action. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$75,000 cashonly bond.

According to the affidavit of probable cause by Cassville Police Officer Justin Fohn, the police were dispatched to a residence on Glenwood Circle for a domestic report on March 10. Once on site, a report was made claiming the victim's mother received a call from her daughter, asking her to pick her up at the residence on Oak Hill Drive. However, at the residence, Swift allegedly told the victim's mother that her stepfather had taken her home. When the mother went back to her home, her daughter was not home.

A few hours later, the

victim contacted her mother again, saying she had been held at knife point by Swift for three hours in the bedroom, and she was behind a trailer at Justin Boots.

When Officer Fohn made contact with the victim, he reported she had a bruise on the left side of her face which ran from her forehead to her nose. The victim said Swift had hit her in the face.

The victim provided a written statement to the Cassville Police Department



Three charged for alleged vehicle thefts

Three people were charged in connection with two vehicle thefts in Barry County. According to the affidavit of probable cause by Barry County Sheriff's Department Detective Rob Evenson, Levi Slye, Ashley West and Gregory Latschar were all involved in the back-to-back thefts.

According to the report, Latschar, Slye and West went to the Butterfield State Stop on State Highway W on March 3. Once there, Slye and West allegedly went in the store before going back outside, looking at a 2012 Dodge Ram pickup and looking inside it. Shortly after, Latschar, West and Slye went back in a different car, drove up to the truck, Slye and West got inside the truck and drove off, according to the report.

The truck was found abandoned on Highway 248 east of Highway 39 the next day. The truck sustained \$5,000 worth of damage to the passenger side and a .380 caliber pistol was

Another vehicle, a 1997 Honda Accord, was stolen close to where the truck was abandoned on Highway 248. The Accord was stolen from a carport, along with other items. Slye and West were allegedly seen driving the Accord in Shell Knob by a witness.

West was arrested on March 31. All three are charged with two counts of tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree and stealing a firearm. She is being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$20,000 bond. Latschar and Slye have not been arrested as of time of press.

as well. The proposed \$4.9 million water system plan will involve increasing pipe size and looping dead-end lines to prevent stagnant water that has to be pumped out.

Now, the city will begin to pursue bids and seek out the best bond terms to get the lowest rates to work on the project.

The time line now will depend on the result of bond application paperwork Walensky is already working on. The city is looking primarily at two different options for the bond financing: State Revolving Funds and USDA loans.

He said, "Obviously, we will be meeting with the council next Monday and we've made an application for funding through two agencies. We will be work-

ing closely with D. A. Davidson, our financial adviser, to see what will be the best approach economically for our customers. We already have paperwork filled out and I expect we will have a recommendation very soon on where we get the money. As soon as we get that, then we'll work on a plan for the sewer plant."

The water and sewer projects will be looked at by engineers at the same time, but the sewer is the more pressing of the two issues facing the city. Walensky said looking at the water, sewer and road projects together is a big part of moving forward because they don't want to repave a street that will then need to be dug up for water or sewer repairs. He said, "We are going to look at

the engineering side now for water and sewer at the same time. But as far as the actual construction side of it, we're waiting to see what the engineers say. When you look at water and sewer, underground utilities, and you also look at the transportation dollars and projects. We are looking at state of the roads, the traffic, and where our sewer lines will be replaced as well. We don't want to fix the road and then tear it up to do the sewer. We are feathering them together to do them in the right sequence."

The best estimate for the financial impact to city utility customers right now is an additional \$7.50 to \$10 per month on their sewer bills, dependent on the interest rate the city is able to get on their bonds. The

water bill impact has not been established.

One thing Walensky wanted to stress is his desire to keep citizens informed of where their money is going. He said, "Our goal is to make a positive relationship with the community with a new communication plan to keep the community informed of how we are moving forward with our city's infrastructure needs.

"I really want to have a positive communication with our community with a fresh communication plan, so we can let everyone know how we'll positively move forward, like the financing the plan and where it is. The more communicative we can be at City Hall helps everyone understand what's happening and when."

An underwear theft led to criminal charges for a Monett man. According to an affidavit of probable cause by the Monett Police Department, Shawn G. Whited, 17, of Monett, kicked in the back door of a residence, stole four pairs of women's underpants and then left.

The Monett Police Department arrived at the residence on Euclid for a burglary on March 29. Once on the scene, the residents said they had security footage of the man who allegedly broke into their home. Once inside, the video shows the subject open drawers containing women's underwear, take some, and put them in his pocket before leaving.

When employees at the residential care facility viewed the footage with officers, they confirmed the subject was Whited. A search also result in four pairs of women's underwear found in the facility's dumpster.

Whited has been charged with burglary in the second degree and property damage in the first degree. Whited is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$20,000 bond.

Purdy Schools new internship program provides real life experience

Most students graduate not knowing what they want to do after high school. Purdy has been trying to help change that by introducing Professional Studies, an internship program where students get real life experi-

Purdy began to offer a Professional Studies class for the first time this school year and will continue the program for next year's upcoming Purdy seniors.

This program has helped many students narrow down their career choices. During the past school year, Purdy seniors have been able to do hands-on tasks that most students in Barry County haven't had the opportunity

By being a part of this program, seniors who took Professional Studies were able to have internships at businesses around the area to help them see what they really want to do for a career and what to major in once they start college.

Some internship locations include Mercy, of Cassville; Broken Hip Ranch of Exeter; Barry Lawrence County Ambulance District; the Barry County Advertiser; and many others. The students leave school on Mondays, Tuesdays, Thursdays and Fridays around 1 p.m. to have real life learning at their internships.

Wednesdays, the seniors stay on campus and meet together in Michelle Hilburn's, director of the Professional Studies program, classroom to keep up-to-date with each other about experiences at internships during the week.

Steven Chancellor, Superintendent of Purdy Schools, said, "About December to January of last year, some members of the Purdy School administration went to a school district up north who were doing something similar. We spent the remainder of last spring working on handbooks and paperwork and getting Mrs. Hilburn on board and then started taking applications."

Michelle Hilburn, the teacher spearheading the class, graduated with her Bachelor's Degree in English Education from MSU and with a Master's in Secondary Administration from Williams Wood University. She has been teaching at Purdy for the past six years. Dr. Chancellor wanted her to work with the students in the program.

Dr. Chancellor continued, stating, "We were looking for a way to get her more involved. She is a phenomenal teacher, but we felt like she could add a bit more to what we do here at Purdy. It was a natural choice."

Hilburn sought possible internships with businesses around the area to see if they would be willing to allow students to intern.

Professional Studies will continue to be directed by Michelle Hilburn next year. "It is safe to say it is a permanent program here. We want our students walking away from Purdy to have gained experience," Dr. Chancellor assured

Hilburn agreed, "I see the program expanding. Colleges are looking for something different beyond a GPA and class rank. We need to prepare our students to walk into colleges with experience already, because the traditional high school doesn't offer them. We need to close that gap between what they're looking for and what we're offering."

Some students in the program are already being offered opportunities after graduation. Students are already receiving job offers

Hilburn of what career field they are interested in so that she can find a business in the area that has something similar.

Students are interning at veterinary vet clinics, hospitals, newspapers and more. The internship locations for students are spread all over Barry County.

Most students joined the Professional Studies program knowing what they wanted to do after graduation. Though a few students have changed their minds, they have at least realized that their previous career choice was not meant for them.

The Professional Studies program has helped students decide what career is really meant for them.

One of the internship site supervisors, Charlea Estes of the Barry County Advertiser, said, "Purdy approached me with a student who was interested in journalism, and I thought it would be a great opportunity to allow her to see if the field is something she was genuinely interested in. It was a good growing experience for Selena to see where her strengths and weaknesses were and see newspapers work in real life. I hope to have interns join me again in future classes."

Makayla Brown, senior at Purdy High School, interned with Glenn Scott and Kolton Hutchinson at Broken Hip Ranch in Exeter, a branch of Mareth Enterprises. "I got to experience all aspects of running a cow operation. I chose this program because I wanted as much experience going into my own cow operation as I could get."

Brown continued and says, "Professional Studies is a recommended opportunity. Students are able to gain experience, knowledge and more that you cannot learn or teach in a classroom."

A couple of students were given the chance to help save lives of humans and animals, like Ricky Aldaba and Diana

Diana Villa had a strong interest in veterinary science and now interns at County View Animal Clinic in Monett to further her interest. Villa said, "I am blessed to be able to do a bit of everything such as answering phone calls, cleaning exam tables, weighing animals and much more. Though most of the time I am observing, I still am glad that I get this opportunity, unlike most seniors around the area, and also wish other schools could give this chance to their upcoming seniors so they know if they are going into the right field or not."

Barry Lawrence County Ambulance District in Monett, Ricky Aldaba helps assist EMTs and paramedics while they respond on calls. Aldaba says, "I knew choosing this program was a great decision because I get the chance to help save lives and help others out on their worst days, which is something I love to do."

Internship student Selena Hang stated, "As one of the very few Purdy seniors who were able to get into the program, I believe that this program has made an impact on my life. The program has taught me how to manage my school schedule with work and also taught me how to gain from failure."

Senior members of the program agreed that the Professional Studies program was an eye-opening experience and are grateful to all staff members who made the program possible.







Barry County Health Department March Food Service Report

MDC urges people to be bear aware

blossoms and buds emerge each spring, so do Missouri's estimated 300 native black bears. As they leave their winter dens this time of year, finding food is their main focus. The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds people to "Be Bear Aware" by not feeding bears and not providing potential sources of food.

"As black bears become active in the spring, they are on a mission to find food," said Laura Conlee, a resource scientist and black-bear researcher with MDC. "It is very important for Missourians to recognize potential food attractants in their area. Things such as bird feeders, trash, barbeque grills, and food waste left out at camp sites can all serve as huge attractions for bears. Keeping our areas free of attractants and letting bears find natural foods is in everyone's best interest. If you see a bear, enjoy the sighting, let the bear be, and be sure you don't offer it any food. Most importantly, never intentionally feed them."

Conlee added feeding bears makes them comfortable around people, which can also make them danger-

A FED BEAR IS A DEAD **BEAR**

"When bears lose their

fear of people, they may approach people in search of food or may defend the food sources or territory they associate with people, which can make them dangerous," Conlee said. "When this happens, the bear has to be destroyed. A fed bear is a dead bear."

She added a fed bear that becomes a problem in one place cannot be relocated to another.

"Once a bear learns people can provide food, they will seek out other places such as camp sites, residential areas, and farms in search of food," she explained. "Bears also have an excellent memory and will often return year after year to places where they were provided food."

AVOID ATTRACTING **BLACK BEARS**

MDC offers these tips avoiding attracting black bears to possible food

Don't leave pet food sitting outside. Feed pets a portion they'll eat at each meal and remove the empty con-

Store garbage, recyclables, and compost inside a secure building or in a bear-proof container until the day of trash pick-up.

Keep grills and smokers clean and store them inside.

Don't use birdfeeders

from April through November in bear country, or hang them at least 10 feet high and 4 feet away from any struc-

Use electric fencing to keep bears away from beehives, chicken coops, vegetable gardens, orchards, and other potential food sources.

Keep campsites clean and store all food, toiletries and trash in a secure vehicle or strung high between two trees. Do not burn or bury garbage or food waste.

AVOID ENCOUNTERS AND REACT RIGHT

While close encounters are uncommon, MDC offers this advice when outdoors in black-bear country:

Make noise while walking or hiking to prevent surprising a bear. Clap, sing, or talk loudly.

Travel in a group if pos-

Pay attention to the surroundings and watch for bear sign, such as tracks or claw or bite marks on trees.

Keep dogs leashed.

Leave a bear alone! Do not approach it. Make sure it has an escape route.

If encountering a bear up close, back away slowly with arms raised to look larger. Speak in a calm, loud voice. Do not turn away from the bear. Back away slowly. Do

A native to Missouri, black bears were abundant until the late 1800s when they were nearly wiped out from unregulated killing and from habitat loss when Ozark forests were logged. MDC research shows that a small number of native black bears survived. Over time, their numbers increased and continue to do so. Results of ongoing black-bear research by MDC staff and others show that the animals have been sighted in about half the counties in Missouri, primarily south of the Missouri River, with most bears located in the southern third of the state in the Missouri

Black bears are a protected species in Missouri. MDC anticipates a limited hunting season as a population-management method once black bear numbers reach a population estimate of about 500 animals. The current estimate is about 300. No details regarding the anticipated future hunting season have been developed.

MDC asks people to report bear sightings by calling 573-522-4115, ext. 3080.




