Three charged in cross-country drug deal

Three people were charged in connection with a drug sale from California. According to a press release from the Ozarks Drug Enforcement Team (ODET), the team served a search warrant with assistance from the Barry County Sheriff's Office and seized over two pounds of marijuana and two grams of methamphetamine as well as 52 firearms and 1,000 rounds of ammunition.

Three people have been charged with the crime, Conly Butler, 33, of Cassville, Natasha M. Butler, 39, of Cassville, and Sarah Beck, 51, of Cassville. The search warrant was served at a residence at 80 Gravel Street in Cassville on Thursday, April 5.

When detectives were in the residence, the affidavits of probable cause state there were three bags of marijuana weighing 474 grams, 461 grams and 200 grams. Officers reported the smallest package was delivered just prior to the search warrant being executed. Officers also claim to have located two grams of methamphetamine.

Throughout the home, officers recovered 52 firearms with over 1,000 rounds of ammunition. Most of the firearms were loaded, according to affidavits of probable cause.

Officers also located digital scales, baggies and drug paraphernalia, all synonymous with drag sales.

According to affidavits of probable cause, 20 packages were delivered to the residence. The most recent package came from California.

Conly Butler is charged with delivery of a controlled substance, possession of a controlled substance, unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia and unlawful use of a weapon as a felon in possession of a firearm. He is being held in the Barry County Jail on a \$75,000 cash-only bond.

Natasha Butler and Sarah Beck are charged with unlawful possession of a weapon - possession of a firearm and a con-

Barry County retires Cosper's badge number at memorial

On Friday, around 75 people gathered outside the Barry County Jail as Sheriff Gary Davis officially retired the number of Master Sergeant Carl Cosper, Jr. Cosper's number 76 was retired after he was killed in a car crash while on duty last year.

Sheriff Davis addressed the crowd, "A year ago tomorrow was a dark day for the Barry County Sheriff's Office."

Davis continued, "We're going to take a few minutes today to remember Master Sergeant Cosper. But I also want to mention Officer Castetter. I don't want to forget him because almost 22 years ago, we also lost his life in service to the citizens of Barry County. While the focus today is on Carl and a tribute to him, I want to remember Chris."

Sheriff Davis went on to explain the Missing Man's Table set up on the steps of the jail and read a proclamation from the Barry County Commission, retiring Cosper's badge number. The table is a somber reminder of an officer or veteran who lost his life in the line of duty or was taken as a prisoner of war.

Davis read the proclamation aloud to the crowd: "Some men are called to give a little in performing their duties, some uty Sheriff of Barry County, Master Sergeant Cosper was killed in the line of duty in an automobile accident.

E91-1-1 celebrates ten years with open house this Friday

A lot of people take for granted what happens when they call 911. You call, a person answers, they get you help and, hopefully, you get the help you need in bad situations. Barry County has a top-rated E9-1-1 service, and this year marks ten years

since they started dispatching emergency services.

In celebration of ten years, the Barry County E9-1-1 Center is hosting an open house, tours and a ribbon cutting as a thank you to the community for support and to thank the telecommunicators who make the center one of the best in the state. The event is to happen on Friday, April 13, beginning at noon.

According to Mike Phillips, E9-1-1 director since 2010, Barry County's emergency dispatching is successful because of the dedication of the people taking the calls.

He said, "The people of this center are performing at the highest level of service possible. It's a testament to the people of Barry County in terms of the work being done here."

Each year, the center recognizes the employees' accomplishments during Telecommunicator Week, which they pair with an open house. This year, Phillips said they are making a bigger event because of the ten-year milestone.

While Barry County voters approved a 1/4 cent sales tax in 2005 to build and fund a formal 911 center, it was another three years before the 911 center actually began operations. Phillips said, "We took our first 911 call in 2008. It took almost three years to create a vision, build the walls, get the equipment and hire the staff. But from March 2008 to April 2018 is ten years of service to Barry County."

Despite best efforts, within two years of Phillips starting in 2010, it became

apparent that the scope of the duties of the center was beyond the initial funding, and once again, Barry County voters put their faith in the E9-1-1 Center and approved an additional 1/8 cent tax to secure the future of the service.

He said, "It was very clear to us that the funding mechanism was not going to support the 911 center longterm. We tried to cut costs and saved around \$150,000 a year by cutting staff and service and equipment. But we were still in the red. We knew we wouldn't be able to continue the operation with that funding situation."

So the board at that time made the decision to ask voters for additional funds to ensure the county's citizens continued to receive that service. Phillips said it came down to a few issues, "We needed to make sure we would stay current on technology and equipment and move forward on our debt repayment. It gave us the financial footing to con-

tinue."

In response, the 911 center has grown exponentially from those early days. In May 2016, Barry County's E9-1-1 Center became one of four accredited centers of excellence in the state of Missouri. Today, they are one of five in the state.

Phillips explained, "It's such a rarity, and it's really something. It's a testament to the work our people are doing.

"It's really easy for an organization to say they are doing great. But we had an outside person come in and evaluate what we are doing from top to bottom. And they said our people were performing at the highest level of excellence when it comes to taking those calls and dispatching."

At any given time, there are three to four dedicated dispatchers taking calls at Barry County E9-1-1 and sending out medical, fire or pile to respond. The medical dispatching was one of the biggest changes in the ten years the center has been

Habitat for Humanity plans to build homes in Seligman

For a lot of people in Barry County, the local Habitat for Humanity has been affiliated with Cassville. While the first six of the homes built by the southern Barry County Habitat group have been in Cassville, board president David Hermann wants to set the record straight and hopes to get applications for homes from Seligman families.

Hermann recently spoke during the monthly Seligman City Council meeting. He wanted to let council members know that Habitat hopes to start building the first Seligman home within the next couple years.

Herman said, "I want to get the word out now. I want

people to be thinking about it and encouraging others to at least fill out an application. If you don't fill out an application, you'll never know if you're eligible for a Habitat House or not."

He also said the meeting with the City of Seligman was to introduce himself and explain the benefits of Habitat homes for the community. He said, "I had an opportunity to present to Seligman and spoke with them about what Habitat is and how it started.

"Basically, I gave it a face with a name."

Hermann is hoping that with more people in not only Seligman, but also other communities in Barry County knowing that opportunities exist for them to get a Habitat home, they can begin the process of purchasing land and getting the group's mission spread to other communities outside of Cassville.

Right now, Habitat for Humanity of south Barry County has six houses in Cassville. They are getting ready to break ground on the seventh house in Cassville, but the eighth is going to be built in Wheaton. All communities south of Purdy are within the area the local Habitat can build.

Hermann said, "I want to talk about how Habitat can help people in Seligman. You're going to have families who might not have a nice home and don't know what

to do. They might not know what Habitat can do for them. It allows them to fill out an application and get into a home that is affordable and is energy efficient."

He continued, "I have six pieces of property in Seligman I've looked at that are all connected to each other. Potentially, that could hold six individual homes. There are water meters and telephone poles already. We will be purchasing the property."

If Hermann gets applications from families, he wants to proceed with buying the property.

Hermann said, "We talked about what Habitat can do for Seligman itself. As more Habitat homes come into Seligman, other businesses might join HARPS and think, 'I should build my business there."

The meeting with Seligman's City Council was two-fold. He explained the benefits of Habitat but also wanted the city and its citizens to be aware of how they could help with Habitat's mission. Hermann went on, "It's also: What can Seligman do for Habitat?

"In the long run, if we are building a home, the cost of labor and materials is what makes the price of the home. So, if you have someone who comes in as a carpenter, electrician or plumber by trade and donate their time, it reduces the overall cost of the house. One of the nice things that

sets us apart from any other lending organization is that our homes are interest free, which is important for people to know."

Hermann's reaction to the meeting on Monday night is that it was positive. He said, "The board and floor all had questions. It was a great meeting. I was glad they asked questions. One actually said that he had seen in other communities that it makes the city look better."

Moving forward, Hermann said Seligman families can pick up Habitat for Humanity applications at city hall. He said, "I don't want people to have to drive to Cassville to pick up applications. They can just get



operating.

Phillips stated, medical calls used to be dispatched from Springfield. We would have to take and then transfer that call. Now we take that call and dispatch right here from Barry County. We found out that eliminating that Springfield call decreases response time from when the call comes in."

They have also upgraded the technology dispatchers use daily to make sure emergency services gets to the scene. Phillips said, "We made a plan to upgrade the equipment. We have four systems in dispatch and we have upgraded three of those four today. Within a month or month and a half, we will have updated all of our systems. That is super important because we want to make sure we deliver on the promises we made to upgrade our equipment. The life expectancy of this equipment was 5-7 years. Some of the equipment we upgraded was over that thresh hold.

We've upgraded MULES, our mapping system, the radio system, and then the final step is our phones.

"We plan to have those done within the next six weeks or so."

The ribbon cutting for the ten year anniversary at the Barry County E9-1-1 Cetner will be at noon on Friday, April 13. Beginning at 12:30 p.m., the center will open to the public for tours and will serve light refreshments and cake. The Barry County E9-1-1 Center is located at 4011 Main Street in Cassville.



According to preliminary data from Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), young turkey hunters harvested 1,723 turkeys during the 2018 spring youth season, April 7-8. Top harvest counties were Franklin with 51 turkeys harvested, Miller with 43, and Maries with 43.

Young hunters checked a little over 4,000 turkeys during last year's youth weekend. Barry county youth hunters took 10 adult gobblers during opening weekend.

MDC's Turkey Biologist, Jason Isabelle, says the drop in harvest can be attributed mostly to unseasonably cold temperatures this weekend

and for much of spring thus

"Weather was the biggest contributing factor to this year's low youth turkey season harvest," Isabelle said. "Temperatures that were wellbelow average probably made it difficult for young hunters to spend as much time hunting this past weekend as they would have with more seasonal temperatures."

Isabelle also notes that in addition to cold temperatures this weekend, spring has been slow to get here this year causing turkeys to be a little behind schedule as far as the winter flock break-up.

"When turkeys are still

flocked up as they are in much of the state right now, it can make for some very challenging hunting," he said. "With warmer temperatures in the forecast, hunting conditions should be much more favorable for the upcoming regular spring turkey season."

selected by a special drawing. The winner will also receive a baton as a prize.



MDC forecasts a more challenging spring turkey season for hunters POOR TURKEY PRODUCTION IN RECENT YEARS HAS AFFECTED TURKEY NUMBERS

Missouri turkey hunters can expect a more challenging spring season overall according to the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC). The spring turkey hunting season starts with a youth-only weekend April 7-8. The regular spring season runs April 16 through May 6.

Although the good hatches of 2011, 2012, and 2014 helped to bolster turkey numbers in much of Missouri from a low point during the late 2000s, poor production in recent years will make for a more challenging 2018 spring turkey season.

"A great deal of what makes for a good spring turkey season depends on the hatch two years prior because it affects the number of two-year-old gobblers on the landscape," MDC Turkey Biologist Jason Isabelle said. "Young gobblers are not associated with hens as often as older dominate birds and are more likely to respond to hunters' calls."

Unfortunately, poor production throughout the state during 2016 will result in fewer two-year-old gobblers during this year's spring hunting season. Isabelle also notes that last year's poor hatch will result in fewer jakes, or one-year-old male turkeys, especially in southern Missouri where turkey production was the poorest.

"I think hunters will notice a reduction in the number of jakes they're used to seeing," he said.

Isabelle noted that because most hunters prefer to harvest adult gobblers, the effects of last year's hatch won't have as much of an effect on the 2018 harvest total as it will during next year's season.

Considering the prospects for the 2018 spring season, hunters should be prepared to put in a bit more effort to be successful this year.

"When turkey numbers are down, it becomes even more important to do your homework," said Isabelle. "Hunters should get out to their hunting areas as much as possible before the season to listen for birds gobbling at daybreak."

Isabelle notes that it gives hunters an advantage to know where turkeys are spending most of their time after they fly down. Using binoculars to spot turkeys feeding in open areas or looking for signs of where turkeys have been feeding in the timber can help hunters be in the right area when the hunting season gets here.

Although this year's spring turkey season is shaping up to be more difficult than in the recent past, Isabelle notes that this isn't the first time hunters have had to face challenging prospects.

"Turkey production is

rarely consistent through time," said Isabelle. "We're going through a tough stretch of poor production right now, just like we did during the late 2000s."

Isabelle notes that these fluctuations in turkey production and population numbers are a normal part of the dynamics of the population.

"With a couple years of good production, turkey numbers will rebound", said Isabella

Hunter Safety

Isabelle stressed that hunters can easily avoid the main cause of turkey-hunting incidents—mistaking, or being mistaken by another hunter for wild game.

"Each year, most turkey hunting incidents typically involve hunters who fail to positively identify their targets," said Isabelle. "Unless you are absolutely certain that what you're looking at is a wild turkey, remember that any movement you see or any sounds you hear while you're hunting could be another hunter."

He also advised hunters to wear some hunterorange clothing when moving through the woods or fields, particularly when hunting public land.

"Bringing along an orange hat is an easy way to stay safe", said Isabelle. "Wear it when you're moving and switch it for your camouflaged hat when you sit down to work a bird."

Isabelle also noted that many turkey hunting incidents involve members of the same hunting party. If you're hunting with someone else and you split up, be certain you know where your hunting partner will be at all times.
