In recognition of National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week, the Barry County E9-1-1 Center in Cassville held an open house for the public to tour the facility on Thursday, April 14, as well as an employee recognition ceremony on Friday where they handed out awards for service during the year.

Each year, the E91-1-1 Center holds an open house to allow the public to come in and tour the facility and learn more about emergency services in Barry County. Mike Phillips, the center's director, said that around 40 people came to

the event this year, which is the largest turnout since the first year they opened. Phillips said that multiple people from the community, as well as organizations like the Cassville Fire Department, Central Crossing Fire Department and Mercy EMS toured the facility, to get a better understanding of how the center operates.

The tour provided emergency personnel with an eye-opening look at all that goes into Barry County's state of the art dispatching center. A Mercy EMT commented when he met some of the telecommunicators who dispatch, "You all have been calm and very sup-

portive. It's been very helpful."

Friday evening, director Mike Phillips presented employee awards in recognition of all of the hard work that goes into dispatching and helping Barry County's citizens in their time of need. Awards ranged from best adapter, best blooper

### Two air lifted after head-on MO-39 crash

Three people were injured in a crash on MO 39 north of Shell Knob around 6:08 p.m. on Saturday evening. Both drivers had to be transported via helicopter for serious injuries. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, a car crossed over the center line.

David P. Shepard, 57, of Shell Knob was driving northbound on MO 39 in a 1994 Mazda Navajo when he crossed the center line and struck a second vehicle headon. The second vehicle, a 2004 Oldsmobile Alero, was driven by Casey L. Petzoldt, 28, of

Springfield. Petzoldt and her sister Chelsea S. Petzoldt, 29, of Springfield, were both injured.

Both drivers were transported to Mercy Hospital in Springfield via helicopter for serious injuries. The passenger, Chelsea, had minor injuries but was not transported for medical treatment. Both Casey and Chelsea were wearing seat belts. Shepard was not.

Both vehicles were totalled as a result of the crash. The Missouri State Highway Patrol was assisted by the Barry County Sheriff's Department and Central Crossing Fire Department.

### Exeter man arrested for church burglary

An Exeter man, Johnny Jacob Berry, 56, was arrested on April 16 for allegedly stealing a tractor and other equipment from a local church.

According to the affidavit of probable cause by Barry County Sheriff's Deputy Justin Ruark, Berry stole a 1988 Ford 1210 tractor, tether, blade and field digger from the Davidian Seventh Day Adventist Church in Exeter on Farm

Road 1025. The total value of all of the equipment stolen was approximately \$12,000.

The tractor and related equipment was recovered, according to Ruark. Berry was charged with theft/stealing of \$500 to \$25,000 in value on April 16.


Berry is currently being held in the Barry County Jail on a \$15,000 cash or corp surety bond.

### Southwest students utilize new greenhouse, prep for sale

greenhouse Southwest and agriculture students are preparing for their first plant sale after getting to use the district's new greenhouse. The plant sale, which begins on April 25, is the final step in a year-long process that the students do from planning to planting to growing to selling.

The Southwest District invested just over \$73,000 in the greenhouse last year with \$32,320 coming from district funds and the remainder from a vocational-technical grant. The new greenhouse was a much-needed addition for the agriculture department, who has run a greenhouse project for a number of years. According to ag. teacher Rachel Brown, the new greenhouse was a welcome addition to her Greenhouse Management 1 and 2 classes, which are the primary students caring for the plants. She stated, "The new greenhouse has no comparison to the system we used before the district built a new one. My first year, we grew plants in our shop, which didn't work well for the plants and didn't work well for the shop classes, either." Now, students get to try their hand at the real experience, start to finish. Brown

ter in the greenhouse setting. Then we start planning what

plants we want to sell. This includes figuring out what plants we need to order in plugs and which we can seed out.

"Once we make the order, we wait until planting time." After the plants begin

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### Fake crash teaches CHS students safe driving

### Sales tax still up for 2016 in county, Cassville

Barry County is up 1.9 percent and Cassville is up 7.5 percent so far for 2016 in sales tax revenue. The bump equates to an additional \$12,274.93 for the county's general 1/2-cent tax and \$21,261.07 for Cassville's general 1-cent tax for January through April 2016.

So far in 2016, Barry County is two and two in terms of increases and decreases in sales tax revenue for given months. For the general 1/2-cent tax, April was an off month with the county receiving 3.1 percent less in revenue in the first part of April when compared to 2015's totals. However, Cassville actually saw a decent jump for April with their revenue up 9.5 percent over last year. In all, Cassville's revenue was up from last year in Febru-

ary, March and April. Only January had a slight downturn for the city, and that was only 3.3 percent, which didn't equate to a significant loss of funds.

It is still too early in the year to estimate whether 2016 will continue the upward trend of sales tax revenue from the last few years. Continuing increases may indicate a positive marker for the local economy as a whole.

The city's taxes for capital improvements

(1/2-cent) and parks and stormwater (1/2-cent) are also up 7.5 percent for the year. However, the city's transportation sales tax is up even higher with the current revenue at 8.7 percent over 2015's collections for the first four months. Currently, city has collected \$113,071.87 for the year, which is up from \$104,019.28 in 2015.

Sales tax received in April each year is from the revenue collected during the month of March.

According to the affidavit of probable cause by Barry County Deputy Alvin Zabala, Olds worked in concert with another male who was the passenger in his vehicle. The victim stated


that Olds was driving while the passenger shot into his home.





growing, the students have to decide how to package and sell them. Some are in hanging baskets, others in four packs, six packs or individual pots.

The plants this year include tomatoes, peppers, geraniums, petunias and marigolds. Brown said almost everything they tried this year grew well in their new greenhouse. She stated, "The only thing we have planted that did not grow as of yet were the kids' cactus plants." Part of the process for the students is figuring out what the plants need. In the case of the cactus plants, they think the humidity might have been too high.

Troubleshooting during the process as well as working out scenarios that they may encounter during the season is part of the process that helps students learn how to grow healthy plants. Brown said, "Students have gained a newfound respect for foreign plants. They have been involved in every aspect of the greenhouse project this

year from ordering to selling. Many of them enjoy learning how to handle the plants and how important everything is for the plants.

"For example, some plants like less water than others. Overwatering those said plants can cause sickness or death for them. The handson experience is what helps the students learn the most."

The biggest hurdle for students this year was learning how different plants would respond to the greenhouse environment. However, Brown said the students took all of the challenges in stride and came out all the better for it. She stated, "Overall, the most rewarding part is seeing how much the students take pride in their plants. Whether they are the ones that picked and grew or the ones that started from plugs, they are so proud when they walk into the greenhouse and someone compliments their plants. The students learning and being involved in their own learning concepts make all of the handwork so worthwhile."

All of the funds raised during the plant sale put on by the students will first go to reimburse for the supplies like pots, plants and supplies. Anything raised beyond that will go to the FFA chapter at the school for their dedication to the project.

Students have no problems getting support once it comes time to sell the plants. Brown said, "The community seems very excited about the students holding a plant sale. We have already been getting calls with questions. The community loves to support our students whenever they can."

The Southwest plant sale begins Monday, April 25, and runs until Monday, May 9, or until the plants are sold out. The sale is from 3 p.m. to 6 p.m. each weekday. Students will also be visiting the community on the weekends selling plants, as well.

New officers were selected with Danny Dalton serving as president, Robert Catron as vice-president, Albert Pendergraft as treasurer and Judy Brooks as secretary. The meeting was adjourned at 8:30 p.m.

The next regular meeting is scheduled for May 12 in the high school library.

The Cassville Senior Center gave a thank you to their volunteers last week when they held a cookout in their honor. The kitchen staff grilled out for the volunteers as well as Senior Center patrons on Friday, April 15.

Kristina Atwood, Senior Center administrator, said that the center relies heavily on volunteers to keep them running and also deliver meals to the homebound seniors in the area. Atwood said, "We run primarily on volunteer help here. In the kitchen, dining room, and especially the meal deliveries, that's all volunteers." and Regal, and others are individuals. She said usually it's around 30 volunteers a week that help in the kitchen, dining areas and deliver meals.







Their goal through this entire process was to create a usable, convenient tool that everyone could have access to in real-time."




ing Prepper Nation, Bland is also pastor of Victory in One Accord Fellowship and a disabled veteran.






