Man fleeing police crashes into second car, seriously injuring passengers

NINE CHARGES FILED AGAINST SUSPECT

A police pursuit and vehicle crash resulted in an Arkansas driver's arrest on Monday after the driver and passenger in the other vehicle had to be lifeflighted. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol, James R. Harp, 34, of Berryville, Ark., hit another vehicle on Highway 86 at Farm Road 1247 around 10:52 a.m. on April 8 during a pursuit initiated by Carroll County, Ark., law enforcement, and resulted in multiple

Harp was in a pursuit initiated by Carroll County, Ark., Sheriff's Office when Missouri State Highway Patrol was called into a crash report, according to affidavits of probable cause.

In the crash report, it stated Harp was driving a 1978 Chevrolet 1500 eastbound when he made an illegal turn and pulled into the path of a second vehicle, resulting in a head-on collision. The other vehicle was a 2006 Nissan Murano driven by Scott R. Stottle, 50, of Washburn.

Both Stottle and his passenger, Vickie R. Resz, 51, of Seligman, were seriously injured in the crash and had to be taken by lifeflight to Cox South Hospital in Springfield.

Stottle was not wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash, but Resz was wearing a seat belt.

The affidavits of probable cause stated Harp sideswiped a patrol car on Farm Road 1247 two different times while trying to escape, prior to hitting the Murano. When officers approached Harp after the crash, they reported Harp was reaching for a five inch hunting knife.

Officers then used a taser on Harp, according to affidavits. Once Harp was in police custody, officers located a broken glass methamphetamine pipe and a metal marijuana smoking pipe on his person. Harp had a suspended driver's license out of Arkansas and multiple warrants in Barry County.

Harp is also charged with a vehicle and trailer theft from Seven Valleys Construction in Cassville. According to a separate affidavit of probable cause, Harp and Trent Stephenson, 37, of Berryville, Ark., stole the truck and utility trailer between February 5 and 6 this year. The truck was recovered from Eagle Rock but had been altered to remove the logos for Seven Val-

The Barry County Sheriff's Department identified Harp with evidence in the vehicle and footage of him and Stephenson from Dollar General when they made purchases while driving the stolen truck.

City of Cassville plans \$69K of road work

Municipal improvements are a priority for the City of Cassville, and this summer is no exception as it moves forward with repaving projects. At the regular city council meeting on Monday, April 8, the council voted to move forward on just under \$70,000 of repaving projects throughout the city.

"We just awarded the bid, and we're signing contracts right now," said David Brock, Cassville public works director.

The contract was awarded to Hutchens Construction, the only company to place a bid, with representatives from Hutchens expected to sign the contracts before the next coun-

cil meeting on Monday, May 13. The contract is for multiple streets' repaying for \$69,952.

Among the streets targeted for improvements are a couple of streets in the Crystal Oaks subdivision, located near the high school. The streets in question, Blackberry Court and Townsend, will be receiving their first repaving since their construction.

"Blackberry Court and Townsend are currently just chip and seal," said Brock. "This is first time that they will be asphalted."

Brock went on to explain that, though the roads themselves were still in fairly good condition, the asphalting will allow them to be coated in a stronger, more weather resistent coating.

"It costs a little more to do asphalt paving, but it's much more durable. As chip and seal starts to get old, the rock aggregate will start to crumble and wash away."

Another road on the list for improvements this summer is the section of 9th Street that runs between Gravel and Main Streets.

10th Street will also receive improvements this year. Instead of a full repaying, the street will receive a mastic surface treatment, meaning that a coating will be placed on top of the existing pavement in order

to fill in inconsistencies in the road and strengthen it against inclement weather.

"That's for streets that are in fairly good shape, but are oxidizing a little bit," said Brock on the process.

After multiple dialogues with citizens, it has been determined that, in addition to the above projects, the city is seeking to repave the road that runs in to the main entrance of the park by the tennis courts. This project is complicated by the fact that the city does not own the road in question.

"[City attorneys] are looking in to securing right of way," said Brock. "That's the primary entrance to the park, everyone uses it. That is not city right of way. We get a lot of requests to repave that street, but the city doesn't own that."

City attorneys are currently negotiating with the property owners, representatives of the James Bryant Trust. The Bryant Trust owns the land that the park is situated on as well as the roads that run through it.

According to Brock, the project is expected to begin in either late spring or early summer of this year. Brock also stated that the completion date of these projects is unknown and will be determined by the speed at which Hutchens can complete the project, as well as other projects that they have committed to around the same

"We generally let contractors coordinate that to fit in to their other projects," said

On Blackberry Court, approximately 775 feet of road will be repaved. On Townsend, the area of the street from Blackberry Court to Melton will be paved, which is approximately 500 feet. On 10th Street, approximately 1,770 feet of road will be treated. Finally, should negotiations with the landowners succeed, 230 feet of City Park Road off of Highway 248 North will be repaved.

City of Exeter amends fireworks policy

During a city council meeting on Wednesday, April 10, Exeter city council voted to amend a city ordinance related to the sale and discharge of fireworks within city limits.

Previously, the ordinance only allowed for one fireworks seller in town during acceptable sales periods, with an added stipulation that the seller be a non-profit. Sales were also previously allowed to run from sunrise until midnight on July 5.

A significant portion of the fireworks ordinance remains unchanged. Currently, fireworks are still only allowed to be sold within city limits up to three weeks before July 4. Fireworks are also only allowed to be detonated in city limits on July 3, 4 and 5. During these days, fireworks can be discharged from sunrise to midnight.

With this new change, passed unanimously during the council meeting, the city will now allow up to two sellers within city limits. Additionally, the amendment removes the wording of the ordinance that only allowed non-profits to operate fireworks

The council also voted to change the window in which fireworks can be sold, moving the end of sales from midnight on July 5 to midnight on July 6. Fireworks sales within the town are allowed to begin up to three weeks before July 4.

According to Exeter city clerk Myrna Eisenbraun, the primary reason for this change is to allow the city to benefit from sales tax revenue that these stands would generate for the city. The city currently receives a standard 1 cent local sales tax on goods sold within city limits.

The amendment to the ordinance is effective immediately, meaning that the city has the potential to play host to fireworks sales during this year's Fourth of July season. According to Eisenbraun, the city has not currently received any final offers from fireworks seller at this time. The license from city hall would be a standard business license, costing the seller \$5.

Monett woman sentenced in federal drug trafficking crime

Two people, one of whom is from Monett and the other a Mexican national, were charged with involvement in trafficking methamphetamine across the country. Monett woman Rebecca Castillo, 37, and Heradio Rios-Zarate, 27, both pled guilty to conspiracy to distribute methamphetamine.

U.S. District Judge Brian Wimes sentenced Castillo to nine years in federal prison without parole, and Rios-Zarate was sentenced to ten years and three months in federal prison without parole on Monday, April 15.


According to a press release from the U.S. District Court, Castillo got 4.87 kilograms of methamphetamine from Rios-Zarate on April 20, 2017. Rios-Zarate transported five containers of meth on March 8, 2017, from Texas. Officers discovered the drugs when a police service dog alerted drugs were inside. The report states the methamphetamine found in a plastic bag behind the front passenger seat was 98 percent pure.

Rios-Zarate ran into an

open field when he saw an officer pull out handcuffs. However, he was apprehended by officers on foot and was placed in custody without further incident.

Rios-Zarate confessed at least one pound of the methamphetamine was being delivered to Castillo.

The crimes were prosecuted by Assistant U.S. Attorney Nhan D. Nguyen. It was investigated by the Drug Enforcement Administration, the Texas Department of Public Safety, the Missouri State Highway Patrol, the Monett, Mo., Police Department, and the Mesa County, Colo., Sheriff's Department.

Seligman readies parks for summer use

With summer fast approaching, towns in Barry County are readying their public spaces for the season. In Seligman, this process has proved somewhat extensive for city employees.

In the Seligman public park, there are two sets of bathrooms: one by the ballfield and one located near the back of the park next to city hall. The city has opted to do some minor improvements to the bathroom located closest to the ballfield.

"We did some building improvements there to get everything prepared for summer. We added some lighting and made some door and toilet repairs," said Seligman city clerk Brian Nichols.

The second set of bathrooms in the park proved a challenge for the city's maintenance crews; so much so that the city has deemed it less costly to simply close off the bathroom and prevent any further damage to the structure.

"We've had issues in the past of people camping out inside of the bathrooms. Mainly, some people like to go in there and tear up the fixtures," said Nichols. "That section of the park doesn't get used much, so we're leaving it be for the time being."

According to Nichols, this damage is both extensive and constant, with the city's preventative measures being beaten back by the vandals.

"[The bathrooms] get torn up so quickly," said Nichols. "After our last round of repairs, we added some small cameras to the property. Some individuals late at night went through and damaged all the cameras. They also broke through the metal gates that were there and vandalized a lot of stuff."

Nichols stated that one of the major improvements to the park will involve the fence around the ballfield.

"Around the ballfield, we're adding additional fence top. It will be corrugated plastic around the fence top. That way, if anyone runs in to it, they don't catch the top of the fence in the side or the belly and end up getting hurt from it."

Additionally, Barry Electric aided the city in fixing some of the damaged electric features around the park, namely some of the ballfield lights.

"There's two lights at the ballfield," said Nichols. "One sits above home base, the other sits above a parking lot off to the side. [Barry Electric] repaired the one over the parking lot."

According to Nichols, Barry Electric replaced the light in the parking lot with an LED light while the light above homebase was replaced with a much cheaper standard bulb. This was done because of concerns that with the light being immediately over home base meant there was a high chance of the light being damaged during play.

In preparation for the season, the city's public works department also did other minor repairs around the park.

"We did go through and fix the benches and repaired some of the kids equipment," said Nichols.

According to Nichols, repairs to the park has thus far cost the city approximately \$250. No further repairs are needed at this time, except for the plastic the city will be installing on the fence in the near future. The fence cover will cost the city an additional \$600.





Shell Knob man held on \$75K bond after disarming officer in 2018

A 38 year old Shell Knob man is in jail after allegedly disarming a Barry County Sheriff's Deputy in March 2018. According to affidavits of probable cause filed by Trooper Tyrrell, Joseph Samuel Hills, aka Joseph Bickel, jumped on a deputy and struggled for the officer's gun,

threatening to kill both officers At that point, deputy White on scene.

The report states deputy Stanley White and Major Leonard Collins were dispatched to a residence on Channel Cat Lane in Shell Knob on March 7, 2018, for a disturbance. Hills was on a back deck and told officers, "I'm going to kill you."

unholstered his weapon and walked around the residence.

Hills allegedly jumped on White and the two struggled over the officer's pistol before Major Collins came around the side of the residence and engaged in the struggle, as well. Hills disarmed White, according to the report, however Collins prevented him from gaining complete control over the weapon.

Hills kicked Collins in the head and his body, and both officers suffered minor injuries in the struggle.

At one point, Hills allegedly put the gun in his mouth and against his temple, saying he would kill both deputies and himself; however, Collins was able to prevent him from discharging the firearm.

At the end of the several minute struggle over the weapon, Hills was able to fire one round into his own hand. Sheriff Gary Davis confirmed that Hills was transported to a medical facility following the incident, which delayed his placement in police custody. Charges were filed against him on March 16, 2018.

Hills was booked into the Barry County Jail on April 1, 2019. He is currently held on a \$75,000 cash-only bond. He is charged with two felony counts of assault in the first degree on a special victim and two felony counts of armed criminal ac-

April Food Pantry distribution MDC, City of Monett deny false reports of tree pest

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) is working with the City of Monett to squelch false reports about the presence of a tree pest in two southwest Missouri counties.

Emerald ash borer (EAB) a non-native beetle that causes fatal damage to ash trees - has not been found in either Barry or Lawrence counties. That's a message MDC foresters and Monett city officials want to deliver to homeowners in the Monett area. MDC contacted city officials after receiving reports of individuals supposedly representing tree removal services who were going doorto-door in Monett and the surrounding vicinity in Barry and Lawrence counties giving false information about EAB infestations of ash trees. Contacted homeowners said these individuals have offered to either completely remove the tree or to apply a tree insecticide to combat EAB.

MDC foresters want to inform the public that EAB has not been found in Barry or Lawrence counties. Thus,

the removal of ash trees or the application of tree insecticide would be both unnecessary and costly to homeowners in and around Monett.

MDC would like to remind homeowners that, when hiring a tree professional or company to work on their trees, follow these tips:


- · Check the phone directory, usually under "trees, tree service, or tree care service." While it's true anyone can have a listing, it's equally true that a listing usually indicates some level of permanence in their
- Most reputable companies do not need to knock on doors for customers. They will have all the business they can
- If someone knocks on the door offering tree services, find out if they have state or private certification. Good certifications include the International Society of Arboriculture (ISA) or the Tree Care Industry Association (TCIA).
- Find out if they have a city business license. If they do not,

and your community requires one, they are not to be working in your town.

- Ask for proof of insurance for both liability and worker's compensation. Then call the insurance company to verify it.
- Ask for local references. They should be happy to show you other work they have done.
- Determine if they are a member of a professional organization like ISA or TCIA.
- Do not be rushed by bargains that are offered and never pay in advance.
- Check with multiple companies to get the best-qualified and best price. Good arborists offer a wide range of services.





Exeter puts police cruiser out for bids

At a city council meeting on Wednesday, April 10, Exeter's city council voted to allow sealed bids to be accepted for surplus materials in the city's possession. The material in question is a 2009 Dodge Charger that previously served at the city's police vehicle.

Due to damage done to the car during previous police pursuits, it was totaled and deemed too costly for the city to pursue re-

"It was in a couple of accidents prior to our current officer," said Exeter city clerk Myrna Eisenbraun. "I think it just gave out."

According to Exeter court clerk Marissa Robbins, in one of those accidents, the police cruiser suffered some structural damage as well as some major damage to key parts of the engine.

"In one of those accidents, it took out the radiator and blew a big hole in the reservoir," said Robbins. "[The city council] used the insurance money to patch it back up, but apparently it had overheated so much previously that it was just too much."

Robbins went on to explain that city employees took the car to repair the structural damage and get estimates on fixes to the motor, but ultimately the city council deemed the damage to the motor too costly

"We took some money to get the body back to where we could drive it, but the motor just had too much damage," said Rob-

In order to enable Exeter officer Willie Stephens to patrol, the former police car was taken to a dealership by city employees. There, it was stripped of its relevant equipment with several items moved to Stephens' personal vehicle, enabling it to act as the city's police cruiser.

"We took both vehicles down to Les Jacobs Ford and they transferred out the police radio and the radar," said Robbins. "Willie already had his own sirens in lights in his car."

In the meeting, council voted unanimously to begin accepting sealed bids on the vehicle. According to Robbins, there is no minimum on these bids. The city will be accepting offers on the vehicle until the Friday before their next city council meeting, which is expected to take place sometime during the first week of May.

Routes D, TT and Z delays beginning in late April

Drivers can expect onelane traffic and crews and equipment on Barry/Stone County Routes D and TT and Barry County Route Z as contractor crews resurface the three state routes at various times starting in late April, the Missouri Department of Transportation

All three routes will receive new asphalt driving surfaces.

During the road work, drivers can expect slowed and, possibly, stopped traffic with flaggers directing them through work zones.

Crews also will use pilot vehicles to lead traffic through the work areas. Drivers on side roads should wait for the pilot vehicle before entering roadways where the resurfacing work is taking place.

Here's a look at the project schedule:







Grant allows new National Historical Site tree to be planted in Cassville

The Liberty Tree Program, offered through the University of Missouri 4-H Foundation, awarded Barry Co. 4-H with the opportunity for an active role in preserving American history in Barry County.

Liberty trees, dating back to the Revolutionary War, were once the site of civil discussion in communities, the location where townspeople would gather under the shade to determine the future of the township through debate.

The last original Liberty Tree, a Tulip Poplar, was destroyed in Hurricane Floyd in 1999. Prior to its death, 14 seedlings were successfully germinated from the tree through a project spearheaded by the nonprofit conservation organization American Forests. The seedlings were planted throughout the original 13

In order to further preserve the legacy of the Liberty Trees, a bud-grafting program was launched. As a result, several bud-grafted trees were grown. Crader Distributing and local STIHL dealers partnered with Missouri's 4-H Foundation with the goal of preserving American history by distributing saplings throughout Missouri to carry the genetics and the tradition beyond the one site through the Liberty Tree Program.

Monett High School to undergo scheduling changes in 2019-20 school year

Starting next year, Monett High School will be making a shift in their scheduling. Starting with the 2019-20 school year, the school will switch from their current model of scheduling to a more traditional seven-period sched-

Since the 2014-15 school year, the high school has been operating on what's called modular scheduling. Much like how college classes are scheduled, modular classes were longer periods where a lesson or a lab would be taught in its entirety instead of broken up into smaller 45-minute sections.

According to Russ Moreland, Monett's Superintendent, one of the main reasons for this change comes from conflicts with schedule overlap.

"It's kind of like a college schedule," said Moreland. "The difference is, in a college schedule, you don't have to leave your college math to go to biology. That's basically what happened with modular scheduling."

Moreland went on to explain that due to the time constraints of operating within a traditional school day, the modular scheduling created some overlap, wherein some classes would begin before others had ended. This led to some students having to make a choice in how much of their in-class instruction time they would have to miss in order to make their schedule work.

"There were some classes that students had to pick and choose whether or not to leave early or miss the first part of their second class," explained Moreland. "There was a lot that went in to trying to make it work and a lot of energy was spent on the schedule itself."

Moreland also went on to express that to make the modular scheduling more successful, the school would need a larger staff in order to teach more classes to avoid overlap, as well as a larger facility to accommodate them.

Stephanie Heman, Monett High's current vice principal and future principal, said one of the other main challenges was "resource time," a time period wherein students were allowed to work on their outof-class assignments and seek aid from their teachers for additional instruction.

"I think one our biggest challenges was the resource piece and how to best meet the needs of our students during that time," said Heman

According to Heman, this takes away from valuable class time and creates a situation where students not only had to manage their own time in order to complete assignments, but also couldn't be guaranteed the aid that they required from their teachers, as other students from other classes

would be seeking the same

"I think that's been a huge challenge for us," said Heman. "Going back to a seven-period day, they won't have that resource time. However, students will have the same teachers five days a week and I think that they'll see more relationship building and more instructional time."

Heman went on to explain that the change wouldn't mean the end of flexibility at Monett. Currently, the school has a variety of options for students who either can't work within the traditional school environment or are seeking education in fields not traditionally offered in a high school setting.

"We have so many things in place with our flex scheduling, our GOCAPS (Greater Ozarks Center for Advanced Professional Studies) program, our Scott Regional Technologies Center programs, and our online classes that students can still have some flexibility with their schedules," said Heman.

According to Moreland,

no vote from the Monett school board was needed to create this change, as the board had initially only voted to commit to the change for five years before reviewing the process. As the board's commitment to modular scheduling came to a close, they began to invite voices, both from within and without the school, to voice their feedback on the program.

"They went through a process of review and evaluation from the staff and they had some parent feedback," said Moreland. "I think they felt like the predicted outcomes of the mod schedule didn't really make up for some of the more negative aspects of it.

"I think that based on all the feedback, the board felt that it was better for everyone to develop something that was a little more consistent."

Monett will finish out the 2018-19 school year with b-lock scheduling still intact. The change will occur officially beginning with the 2019-20 school year.


