Cassville hires new athletic director

After interviewing candidates both in-house and out of the district, Cassville Schools has hired their next Athletic Director. The position became available earlier this semester when current Athletic Director Ben Abramovitz extended his resignation.

Cassville hired Doug Martin from Ash Grove for the position. At Ash Grove, Martin was the head football coach as well as the health and physical education teacher.

According to Cassville Schools Superintendent Dr. Richard Asbill, Martin will officially take over as Athletic Director beginning in July but the district is looking to ask him to do some transitional duties as early as June so they can expedite the transition for Martin as well as the District.

Asbill stated, "Doug brings

17 year-old Purdy student charged with rape

A 17-year-old Purdy student is being charged as an adult for allegedly raping a 14-year-old in the teacher's lounge earlier this month.

Wilder Francisco Pastor-Gomez was arrested on Wednesday, April 22, for the crime that allegedly occurred on April 6. According to an affidavit of probable cause written by Purdy Police Chief Jackie Lowe, Pastor-Gomez assaulted the girl in the teacher's lounge of the school and that the security camera showed the two entering the teacher's lounge together.

It stated that the girl told the school's nurse, Sarai Salazar, that he forced her to have sexual intercourse against her will. Lowe also said that a witness interrupted the assault and saw the suspect with his pants down and the victim unclothed.

During an interview at

the Children's Advocacy Center, the victim described the event in detail and said that Pastor-Gomez told her to pull her pants down at least three times.


Dr. Steven Chancellor, Purdy Schools superintendent, released the following statement:

"On April 9, 2015, Purdy High School administrators heard rumors concerning a serious act of alleged student misconduct.

"The administration conducted a prompt investigation and removed the alleged perpetrator from school. At that time, school officials made a hotline report and notified law enforcement. The District also is taking action to assist the alleged victim and her family. We are fully cooperating with law enforcement in their criminal investigation. The District takes the welfare and safety of its students very seriously and deeply regret that one of our students appears to have been abused by another student on school premises. School officials and staff are reviewing what transpired to determine what steps, if any, can be taken to minimize the reoccurrence of such misconduct."

Pastor-Gomez is being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$15,000 cash-only bond on charges of rape in the 2nd degree.

Seligman breaks ground on splash pad

After two and a half years, the City of Seligman finally broke ground on the new splash pad being installed in the city park.

The splash pad, which will be a 30-foot concrete circle with 24 water jets is being installed on the north side of City Hall in the park. The project began in 2012 when the city purchased the splash pad equipment for \$7,600.

Since then, city clerk Brian Nichols said it has been a few factors that delayed the project. He said, "Part of it was finding people to bid it." Initially, Seligman mayor Jason Raucstadt, who was also the maintenance supervisor, was planning to do the project himself in-house. However, after he resigned as mayor and the council opted to terminate his posi-

tion with the city, the project needed to be bid to outside parties.

In mid-summer, the city asked for bids for the project. Two bids came in for the installation. The first bid was from Sanders Construction for \$18,246. The other bid came from the company who manufactured the splash pad, Rain Deck out of Florida. Rain Deck bid the project at over \$47,000. The Seligman City Council opted to accept Sanders Construction's bid.

Last week, Sanders broke ground by levelling out the area that will house the 30-foot pad. This week, they plan to install the plumbing for the pad. It will also have a three-foot sidewalk around the outside and park benches, as well. Ten new park benches were purchased for the park by a grant

from Walmart for \$1,500. The benches will be placed around the splash pad and throughout the park.

Sanders said the project should be complete by June and ready to use. The pad will be set up with a touch pad embedded in the concrete. When it is activated, the jets will operate from 15 to 30 minutes, whatever they decide to set the timer at. Then if they shut off, the pad will just need to be activated again.

The water from the jets will be recycled and stored in an underground tank with a UV filter and chlorine tablets. Nichols said they expect the pad to be operational throughout any time when freezing isn't an issue. He anticipates the pad to be turned on for patrons from April through late October.

Rash of burglaries may be related

A recent string of burglaries may be related, according to local law enforcement. In the last week, Cassville Police Department has responded to three burglaries and one attempt. The Barry County Sheriff's Department has responded to around nine.

Sheriff Mick Epperly stated, "We think they're all related, but we can't be sure. Whoever they are, the seem to be pretty busy lately so we want to get it taken are of."

Cassville's Police Department received a report of cash stolen from Burchfield Tax Service on Sale Barn Road and an attempted burglary at Geraldi's restaurant. Those burglariers were after a break-in at Cassville Discount Grocery earlier this month. Then, this week, Cassville Police Chief

Dana Kammerlohr confirmed that Papa Vape's on Main Street was also burglarized and cash was stolen. Kammerlohr said that both burglaries occurred through the back entrances of the businesses, but that no other details are available at this time.

She said, "There's a suspicion when there are multiple burglaries that they may be related."

Epperly said that last week, MO-ARK cattle sale was struck as well as the Hardwood Lumber Comapny, both in Exeter. Earlier this month, there were also break-ins at Sunrise Cafe in Monett and an attempted burglary at Trinity Presbyterian Church in Shell Knob. Two other Shell Knob businesses, Icy Mae's and Neill's Home Store, were also burglarized, but the alleged

thief in the Shell Knob thefts was caught. The Shell Knob burglaries are attributed to Heath A. Sanborn who is being held in the Barry County

This week, the Sheriff's Department has already received reports from Benny's Auto Repair in Washburn, Country Cooking in Washburn and Cassville Hardware on Sale Barn Road that all had been burglarized, and cash was stolen from each location.

Epperly said, "We have one picture from a video camera that might be of interest and we hope to get an ID from."

Vietnam Veterans Memorial dedicated

The Missouri Vietnam Veterans Memorial at the College of the Ozarks in Point Lookout was dedicated last week and included 11 Barry County natives honored on the wall.

The dedication ceremony hosted over 3,5000 people, including family members of fallen Barry County veterans. The 1,410 servicemen and women from Missouri who have their lives during Vietnam are featured on the memorial that stands at the college.

College of the Ozarks president Jerry C. Davis welcomed the visitors and speakers included Bass Pro Shops CEO Johnny Morris, Missouri Lieutenant Governor Peter Kinder, and General Terrence R. Dake, USMC, special speaker Lt. Col. Oliver North.

The Barry County veterans who are on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial are:

James Vincent Ballay, 21, of Monett, was a sergeant in the Army. His tour began June 12, 1969, until he was killed in action on the ground on May 12, 1970, in Cambodia.

Galen Charles Brown, 20, of Cassville, served in the Army as a specialist four on tour of duty that began January 13, 1969. He was killed in action on the ground on May 13, 1969, in Thua Thien Province, South Vietnam.

Carl Leon Bruton, 20, of Seligman, was a private first class in the Army. His tour lasted from January 10, 1970, until he was killed by an explosive device in Quang Ngai Province, South Vietnam, on April 14, 1970.

Lindsey Houston Crow, 34, of Viola, was a Chief Warrant Officer in the Army on a tour of duty that began on September 15, 1965. He was killed in a helicopter crash in Khanh Hoa Province, South Vietnam, on November 18,

Johnny Earl Frisk, 20, of Purdy, was a private first class in the Army. His tour began on February 25, 1968, and ended when he was killed by friendly fire in Quang Tri Province, South Vietnam, on August 4, 1968.

Williams James Hutton, of Cassville, was a petty officer second class in the U.S. Navy. His tour of duty began December 22, 1968. Hutton was killed on the ground in Quang Tri Province, South Vietnam, on March 14, 1969.

Aaron Harvey Lowe, 24, of Cassville, was a specialist four in the Army. His tour began on August 3, 1968, and ended on May 12, 1969. He was killed as a ground casualty in the Quang Tin Province, South Vietnam.

Timmy G. Mattingly, 20, of Exeter, was a private first class in the Army. His tour of duty began on July 10, 1966, and ended on January 1, 1967, when he was killed by an explosive in Binh Thuan Prov-

Howard Andrew Threet, 20, of Monett, was a corporal in the Army. His tour of duty was March 24, 1968, until May 6, 1968, when he was killed on the ground in Thua Thien Province, South Vietnam.

Thomas Hubert Wolfe, 28, of Monett, was a captain in the

Man charged with Shell Knob's Icy Mae's burglary

A man has been charged with burglarizing Icy Mae's and Neill's Home Store in Shell Knob last week after being identified on security tape footage.

Heath Allan Sanborn, 32, was arrested on Thursday, April 23, for the crime that occurred around 10:26 p.m. on Wednesday night. According to an affidavit of probable cause written by Detective Robert Evenson, Sanborn broke into Icy Mae's on Highway 39 by smashing the glass door and walking through.

On the security footage, he was seen taking a collection jar for an animal shelter, and then he tried to open the cash register. When he was unable to open the register, he took the entire register with him.

Employees of the restaurant, as well as Sheriff Mick Epperly and Deputy Angela Cole, identified Sanborn as the person in the video. When officers made contact with him, he was wearing the same jeans and shoes as on the video, as well as the same facial hair as on the video.

According Evenson, San-

born also had a deep cut on his left palm and his flashlight was found at a different burglary committed nearby with blood on it. Barry County Sheriff Mick Epperly confirmed that the other burglary was at Neill's Home Store in Shell Knob where only change was stolen. The glass was smashed in at the back entrance at Neill's, as

Det. Evenson applied for a DNA warrant to match the blood at the crime scene to Sanborn, according to a statement released by the Sheriff's Department.

Sanborn was charged with burglary in the second degree, a class C felony, and theft/stealing,a class A misdemeanor. He is being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$10,000 bond.

The Hotel Barry building, part

The Hotel Barry Building now occupied by Ellis Cupps and Cole was built in 1894 by John M. Bayless. A hotel has been located on this site from near the time Cassville was established in 1845 until the building housing the Barry Hotel was converted in to a law office and abstract office in 1959.

The original hotel on this site was the McConnell Hotel and was owned and operated by William Shakespeare McConnell. McConnell had come to Cassville in 1849 and has been described as being an attorney, a druggist and occasionally a doctor.

Circuit Court records reflect McConnell was first enrolled as a practicing attorney in Barry County in May of 1850, and he actively practiced law for almost 40 years.

He built the McConnell Hotel on this site before the Civil War 1861-1865.

As well as practicing law, William Shakespeare Mc-Connell served as the State Representative from Barry County in 1861-62. These were turbulent years leading up to and during the first part of the Civil War. Missouri, a slave state, as well as Barry County was divided over the question of whether Missouri should succeed from the Union. In February, 1861, a constitutional convention was convened to consider whether Missouri should succeed from the union. The delegates at the convention voted not to succeed, and stated, "The po-

sition of Missouri in relation to the adjacent States which would continue in the Union, would necessarily expose her, if she became a member of the new confederacy, to utter destruction whenever any rupture might take place between the different republics. In a military aspect, secession and connection with a southern confederacy in annihilation for Missouri. The true position for her to assume is that of a State whose interest are bound up in the maintenance of the Union, and whose kind of feelings and strong sympathies are with the people of the Southern States with whom they are connected by ties of friendship and blood."

The delegates at the convention reflected the view of most Missourians that they did not want to take sides. Missouri remained a part of the Union, but became very much a battleground.

Missouri's Governor Claiborne Jackson who was a proponent of secession mobilized the Missouri State Guard (the state militia) to "repel" any incursion into the state by Federal troops when hostilities broke out between the Federal Government and the newly formed confederacy in April of 1861.

However, this mobilization of troops militia came





to naught, when in June, 1861, Federal Troops under the command of Nathanial Lyon advanced on Jefferson City compelling Jackson and his administration to flee the state capitol, never to return. Along with Jackson, the Missouri State Guard commanded by General Sterling Price left Jefferson City and after fighting Federal forces as an independent force allied with the Confederate forces, remnants of the Missouri State Guard were absorbed into the Confederate Army in

After fleeing Jefferson City, Governor Jackson made multiple attempts to convene the Missouri General Assembly to consider the question of secession. The governor called for a meeting of the





state legislature in Neosho for October 21, 1861 for the purpose of considering the question of secession again. Though the legislature met in Neosho, and voted to secede, it did not have sufficient numbers present to constitute a quorum. On October 31, 1861, the rebel state government for the State of Missouri (at least the part of the state government in favor of succession) until November 7, 1861, when the threat



of advancing Federal troops caused Governor Jackson and his administration to leave the state and go into Arkansas, never to return.

Because of it's location on the Wire Road, which ran from Rolla to Fort Smith Arkansas, Cassville changed hands at least three times, during the Civil War. On July 29, 1861, the Missouri Home Guards under the Command of Major General Sterling Price came to Cassville and here met up with regular Confederate Army forces from Arkansas and Texas under the command of General Ben McCullough. In Cassville they assembled some 12,000 men who marched north on the Wire Road to Greene County where they met and defeated Federal Forces under the command of General Nathanial Lyon at Wilsons Creek on August 10, 1861.

After Wilson Creek, Cassville and Barry County were under the control of Confederate forces for only a short time. In February, 1862, Confederate forces withdrew from Cassville in advance of Federal forces under the commander of General Samuel Curtis and joined other Confederate forces just over the state line in Arkansas under the command of General Earl Van Dorn. On March 6, 7, and 8, 1862, the two armies met in the Battle of Pea Ridge, Arkansas some twenty five miles southwest of Cassville. At Pea Ridge, the Federal forces defeated the Confederate army which include the Missouri Home Guards.

Because of his secessionist learnings William Shakespeare McConnell's placed under house arrest by Federal authorities from 1862-1964. His McConnell Hotel was appropriated by the Union army and used as a hospital. Following the Battle of Pea Ridge, some of the wounded Union soldiers were brought by wagon from the battlefield to the hotel on this site. Soldiers who died here were brought by wagon from battlefield to the hotel on this site. Soldiers who died here were initially buried in a field owned by McConnell, which is now a part of the city park west of the present Oak Hill Cemetery. Following the Civil War these bodies were exhumed and reburied in the National Cemetery in Springfield, Missouri.

Throughout the war Cassville was subject to repeated occupation and conflict. By the end of the war in 1865, the town was decimated, from a population of approximately 500 residenrs and a thriving business district before the war, Cassville in 1865 had only had a few buildings and 150 residents left.

For two decades now, Missouri has distinguished itself as the only state to consistently run out of unemployment funds. When the Unemployment Trust Fund runs dry, Missouri must borrow from the federal government to continue paying unemployment claims. When Missouri borrows, business owners are burdened with costly, unexpected bills to help the state pay off the remaining balance.

After five recessions, lawmakers now have a solution. Last week, the General Assembly sent HB 150, an overhaul of the state's unemployment insurance program, to Governor for his approval.

HB 150, sponsored by Rep. Scott Fitzpatrick (R-Cassville), would institute several changes to ensure Missouri's Unemployment Trust Fund remains solvent for years to come. Most importantly, the bill ties the length of unemployment benefits to the state's average unemployment rate; a maximum of 20 weeks if unemployment is greater than 9 percent down to 13 weeks if unemployment is below 6 percent. Missouri would be the fifth state; joining Kansas, Florida, Georgia, and North Carolina; to index unemployment benefits to the unemployment rate. The bill also raises the minimum fund balance before employers see a reduction in their contribution rate and requires the state to consider selling bonds to pay back federal debt.

"HB 150 is the solution to years of insolvency and federal borrowing," said Fitzpatrick. "Missouri workers and job creators cannot afford another two decades of kicking the can down the road. By tying the availability of unemployment benefits to the unemployment rate, we achieve two things: we return our trust fund to solvency and we ensure unemployment is used only as a safety net as workers transition between jobs."

HB 150 passed in the Senate, 21-8, and in the House, 88-68. The Governor has 15 days from April 22 to take action on HB 150.



Cassville vies for \$10K for dual-enrollment

Cassville High School is competing for a \$10,000 grant to help students who want to do dual-enrollment but can't afford the fees.

According to part-time counselor Patti Daniels, the school made a short four minute video about why they should win the grant. The grant is offered by the Midwest Technical Institute (MTI) in Springfield. The voting process is determined solely by Facebook votes on MTI's page.

MTI gives out the \$10,000

grant to an eligible high school or vocational center to purchase equipment, renovate shops or labs and obtain resources for classroom instruction. According to MTI, "The program also supports the incorporation of real-world job preparation and hands-on training with a more conventional high school educational experience." Last year's winner was Climax Springs High School.

Cassville had to submit their video by March 29 and voting for the school continues until May 4. The winner of the grant will be announced on May 6. Cassville is one of 19 areas schools that applied for the grant for various projects and programs.

Currently, Cassville is in fifth place in the voting, but there is a sizeable gap between the local school and leaders Fordland and Bronaugh. As of time of press, Cassville had 303 votes and front-runner Fordland had 1,338. However, there are still a few days left in the voting.


When asked why the dual-enrollment program is so important, Daniels said, "The dual credit and dual enrollment program give students a jump start on college." if students enroll in enough classes that qualify for college credit, they could go into their first year of college after graduation as sophomores instead of freshmen, knocking a year off of their college graduation.



Cassville commercial building trends still slow

For the last few years, new construction projects in Cassville have been slow when compared to earlier years. New residential construction projects seem to have stayed steady, but additions, alterations and commercial projects have been slow for the last few years.

Within the Cassville city limits, a permit is required for any new construction project, addition to a building, roof project, alteration and more. A good way to look at economic trends is to analyze the building trends within a city For Cassville, new home construction remained steady for the last few years, but commercial building projects have been sparse since an influx in 2011.

In 2011, the city had a big year for new construction While the number of homes constructed similar to years since, commercial construction and alterations made a big impact on revenue generated from building permits. The city generated \$11,702 in revenue from construction permits, mostly due to large projects like the Casey's and Access. That was also the year where Sonic Drive-In and Emmanuel Baptist Church did alterations to their buildings.

Since, the closest year to 2011 in terms of revenue was 2013 when McDonald's applied for a building permit to rebuild after the devastating fire. In 2013, the city generated \$9,286 in revenue from building permits, but 2012 and 2014's numbers were \$1,969 and \$2,330, respectively.

New home construction

over the past four years has remained stable. In 2011, five permits for new homes inside the city limits were issued. In 2012, that number was only three, but in 2013 it went up to six, and in 2014, five permits were issued. Smaller projects, like additions to existing buildings, also contribute to permit fees, but no one applied for a permit for a major new addition or alteration in 2014. In 2013, three permits were issued for additions. By way of the numbers, the only stable trend appears to be new home construction within the city limits.

Thus far, only a few permits for minor projects have been applied for in 2015 with the city receiving \$264.80 in building permit fees since the beginning of the year. Thus far, no commercial or new home construction projects are in the works.

Bringing new commercial businesses to the area is a popular discussion subject. In Cassville, the city, the Industrial Development Corporation and the Chamber of Commerce all work to bring in new businesses and support businesses already here.

According to Cassville Mayor Bill Shiveley, Cassville works to try to bring businesses into town, including monitoring various websites to see what businesses are looking to relocate or establish a new business. Shiveley also said, "The City supports the Chamber of Commerce and their efforts to promote local businesses. The City on its own does not have a budget to promote businesses, but the City participates in Chamber functions that promote local businesses."

Mindi Artherton, Cassville Area Chamber of Commerce director, said, "The chamber is often the first place potential business owners contact when they are

interested in starting a new

business." Artherton also "Along with working closely with our Industrial Development Corporation and the City, I work with the potential business to help them find space for their new business and point them in the right direction for other resources needed when starting a new business."

The Chamber also refers community members and guests to various business and offers a relocation guide and website to assist in drawing businesses to the area.

IDC Board President Stan Kelley said that the IDC works to establish new businesses, as well. Kelley said, "The IDC provides insight to the nuances special to Cassville that makes it a desirable choice [for businesses]. Also, the IDC considers ways to provide incentives to a prospective company that will bring jobs to Cassville. IDC strives to stay in contact with various resources across the region and State to obtain any leads for a company considering coming to Missouri and wants to locate in small cities such as Cassville."

The IDC also acts as a liaison to navigating any obstacles a business may encounter when expanding or moving to the area in a way that would create more jobs and revenue. With city revenue improving, hopefully the city starts to see more commercial expansion again in the coming years.

The Wildcat Nation will see significant improvements to the football field this upcoming year. Cassville's maintenance crew are beginning a complete remodel of the press box.

Superintendent Richard Asbill said, "The construction progress is going well." The goal this week is to finish the "dry in." Over the past month, they have completed the foundation and framing. After the metal work is finalized, they will begin the finish work on the inside.

"June is our goal, and it looks like we are on track to complete the renovations by then," said Asbill. The original press box was built in the 1980's and wasn't designed for the coaching staff and scout filming that took

place on the roof. The old press box wasn't balanced with the field and that made media coverage and coaching options more difficult. It also had a cat walk that allowed access to each of the rooms.

"This was very unsafe and allowed unauthorized access during non school times. The new box has eliminated the cat walk area and enclosed that into the main structure to encompass it into a hallway leading to each room," said Asbill. The old press box could only be accessed through one door, now it will offer individuals rooms that will limit any interruptions to the announcers and media.

"We budgeted \$22,000 for the project, and currently we are under budget, some donors are providing fiscal support for the project, and we hope to raise half of the construction costs through donations," added Asbill.



Be prepared for tornadic storms

Storm season has arrived and, with that, everyone needs to be prepared and have a plan. The City of Cassville has six outdoor storm sirens. If you are indoors, you may not hear the sirens. It is highly recommended that people who have smart phones download a weather app that will alert you to storms in the area. A weather radio is also highly recommended to have for alerts.

One also needs to know the difference between a watch and a warning. The National Weather Service (NWS) issues a tornado watch when weather conditions in an area indicate an increased risk for severe weather that may be capable of producing a tornado.

The NWS issues a tornado warning when a tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. On average, tornado warnings are issued 13 minutes prior to the event, but warning times vary greatly and may be much less. Occasionally, tornadoes develop without detection, and no official warnings can be made before touchdown. Forecasters do their best to predict the path of a storm, but not all areas under a tornado warning will experience a tornado. Even if you have been through a tornado warning without experiencing any damage, remember that tornadoes are unpredictable and you should always take immediate action when authorities issue a tornado warning.

The sirens are activated when the National Weather Service advises that conditions are right for the possibility of a tornado in the area and also if straight winds reach 75 miles an hour. When the sirens are activated it is time to take shelter.

Now is the time to have a plan for you and your family.

You need an idea of where you can go for shelter if you do not have a basement or storm shelter. The lowest floor of a structure with the most walls between you and the outside is recommended. Also discuss with your family where to meet after an occurrence if you are not together at a time strong storms strike within your community.

Through recent grant funds, Cassville now has two FEMA-approved storm shelters. They are located at the middle school campus by the football field and the north end of the Cassville High School campus. If you live within a half-mile radius of these shelters, you may seek shelter there. Please remember if you are traveling to these shelters to drive carefully and park where you will not block others seeking shelter. Remember, if storms occur when school is in session students will be sent to these shelters.

Also, your family will need to have an emergency supply kit prepared. Have it stored in an accessible location. It is recommended to have an emergency supply kit at home and one at work. A duffle bag, pillowcase, or a container that is easy to carry is recommended. Store the supplies you may need after the tornado passes. Identify the things you would need most when you emerge from your protective location to find severe damage, no power and no water. If possible, keep some of these items in your pre-identified protective locations at home, work, school or your place of worship. You may need to keep other items in a "go bag" or other container to bring with you. For a full list of supplies for your emergency supply kit, visit www.ready.gov/ builda-kit. Here are some suggestions to consider:

- Battery-powered or crank-operated flashlight to inspect your home or office after the tornado has passed. If using a battery-powered flashlight, turn it on outside the building first because the battery could produce a spark and cause a fire if gas is present. Include spare batteries
- Battery-powered or crank-operated radio to listen for emergency updates and news reports.
- First aid kit to address minor injuries.
- Complete change of clothing, including a long-sleeved shirt, long pants, work gloves, and sturdy, thick-soled shoes. These will protect you from further injury by broken glass, exposed nails or other objects.
- Whistle or air horn to notify rescuers in case you are trapped by debris resulting from the tornado.
- Dust mask to protect you from inhaling particles and fine debris.
- Food and water for a day or two and consider specific dietary considerations.
- Your medications and medical supplies.
- If you have children, a special item (e.g., stuffed animal, book, game) to provide comfort. Store the important documents you will need to start your recovery.

Always be aware of the weather and your surroundings. Have a plan for you and your family along with an emergency supply kit.







Student testing switches to online format

For the first time, the Missouri Assessment Program (MAP) tests are being administered online instead of on paper, and local districts see the advantages.

The MAP test is an assessment used to determine how well students in third through eighth grades across the state are performing. Before this year, the students took a paper-based assessment that was sent into the state for grading. However, this year, the MAP is being administered solely online, shortening the time students test and also the time it takes for districts to receive their scores.

Other tests also administered online include the End-of-Course (EOC) testing for higher grades and a free ACT test for all Missouri high school juniors.

Cassville, Exeter, Southwest and Wheaton have all begun testing and seem positive about the process despite some technical issues. While there have been a few kinks, that was to be expected with a brand new format.

Cassville assistant superintendent Jill LeCompte said, "We had some minor issues that had to have eDIRECT and DESE (Department of Elementary and Secondary Education) clear up, but overall, it has been fairly smooth." Cassville completed the fifth and eighth grade assessments last week.

Southwest's testing coordinator Angela Long said, "Testing took longer than expected for English Language Arts, so we had to be quite flexible in our scheduling, but otherwise, the process went fairly smoothly." Any of the technical difficulties at Southwest were addressed quickly by their technology director Dan Shelton.

Exeter's superintendent Dr. Ernest Raney stated, "The first day of testing was difficult due to technical issues that were undetected by the online MAP program prior to placing students at the workstations. Once resolved, technical interruptions were minimized."

Dr. Raney continued, "The most common problem experienced by our students was the loss of connection, causing them to be logged off multiple times. This was due to a needed

software update from the testing center. As distracting as this was for our students, we were proud of the perseverance our students demonstrated as they continued to deal with the issue throughout the English/ Language Arts potion of the MAP test on the first day of testing."

Wheaton and Purdy begin their testing this week. All Districts will continue testing into May to finish up with various grade levels.

All of the districts went through sample testing to ensure that the tests will be able to administered properly. Information released by DESE primarily listed the availability of test scores as the biggest advantage. DESE also assured that there were only a handful of districts that would be challenged by the bandwidth to provide the testing. However, all of the districts appeared to have at least some issues with the technological aspect of having all of the tests administered online.

Purdy superintendent Dr. Steven Chancellor stated, "We have experienced technical problems from the test manufacturer across the state. Their ability to provide a stable, reliable platform has caused concern. We will begin dialogue with the appropriate people in DESE to voice our expectations for improvement."

Dr. Raney said bandwidth was an issue for the Exeter district. "Challenges we face in the new format include increased demand for internet bandwidth, wifi infrastructure expansion, and an increasing need for access to electronic tools with our students."

Most students at various districts seem to be pleased with the online format versus the paper and pencil version utilized in the past. Chancellor said, "Students seem to embrace the technical aspect. Once the consistence issues have been addressed by the testing manufacturer, I expect to see the comfort level increase. In theory, it should also lend itself to providing deeper questions that students can truly express their thinking with."

DESE is utilizing a Smarter Balanced test design and blueprints which will have students tested more effectively on their individual levels. Chancellor said, "The technology enhanced items add a layer which cannot be attained via traditional paper-pencil tests."

With the new format, there is expected to be a learning curve. However, DESE also said that the tests are more challenging than the paper-and-pencil format in the past. DESE stated, "We are raising expectations to help our students better prepare for college and career."

Wheaton superintendent Lance Massey addressed those changes. "This year we are being tested over the Missouri Learning Standards. As you move to a new set of standards, the challenge is ensuring that you have adequately taught the students the standard and that the students can, in turn, relay the knowledge back in a testing format. Another challenge is with the advanced level of rigor on the new format questions will have multiple answers and steps to correctly answer the question."

The new format of MAP testing did not change the cost to the districts. Some schools are expected to receive their first round of testing results this week.
























FCA Coach of the Year
