Commissioners, Health Dept. move forward with drug-monitoring ordinance

PRESCRIPTION DRUG MONITORING SHOULD BEGIN BEFORE END OF YEAR

At Monday night's public hearing on Barry County joining the Prescription Drug Monitoring Program (PDMP), everyone in attendance was in support. The Barry County commission and Barry County Health Department (BCHD) will be moving forward together to institute an ordinance, formally joining the program.

Roger Brock, BCHD administrator, led the discussion to a crowd of about a dozen at the old courthouse on Monday evening, April 23. Everyone in attendance was there in support of the ordinance. Barry County commissioners Cherry Warren, Gary Schad and Wayne Hendrix were also in attendance to listen to the public opinion before agreeing to sign an ordinance.

Brock said, "This is just giving another tool for pharmacists and physicians to help manage patients' prescriptions."

He continued, "It's not a regulatory tool by any means, but [opioid addiction] is a big problem all over the United States. Over 90 percent of opioid use is in the U.S. We need to do something to make this bet-

The PDMP is based out of St. Louis County. Since Missouri is the only state without a statewide monitoring program, St. Louis County initiated their own

Fourth suspect charged in meth dealing operation

A fourth suspect has been charged with a drug deal of 20 packages delivered to a Cassville residence. Three were charged with the crime earlier in April, but a fourth suspect's charges led to the arrest last week of Harvey Mabry, 59, of Cassville.

The search warrant was served by the Ozark Drug Enforcement Team (ODET) and the Barry County Sheriff's Department at a residence at 80 Gravel Street in Cassville on Thursday, April 5.

When detectives were in the residence, the affidavits of probable cause state there were three bags of marijuana weighing 474 grams, 461 grams and 200 grams. Officers reported the smallest package was delivered just prior to the search warrant being executed. Officers also claim to have located two grams of methamphetamine.

Throughout the home, officers recovered 52 firearms

or more healthcare providers for prescriptions and then fills them at three or more pharmacies within six months, healthcare providers and pharmacists will receive an alert on the patient.

designed to help combat opioid addiction and hopefully prevent overdoses.

The PDMP will be mandatory for pharmacies, however it is optional for healthcare providers and physicians. Brock said he doesn't anticipate anyone would be against the new program.

Brock said, "St. Louis County takes care of talking to all of the physicians and pharmacists and setting all of that up. So that is easier for us. Hopefully, everyone gets on board fairly easily

Protests continue demanding justice for shot dogs

Barry County Prosecuting Attorney Amy Boxx finally released a statement regarding possible charges for the shooting deaths of three dogs in Eagle Rock last month. The statement came out after four weeks of protests demanding charges.

Boxx released a statement reading:

"The office of the Prosecuting Attorney is well aware of the public attention being generated by the events of March 13, 2018. However, prosecutorial ethics, longstanding policy and best legal practice mandate that no discussion be had concerning that or any matter pending determination of charges, if any. I as Prosecuting Attorney for Barry County appreciate the ongoing efforts of law enforcement and the job that the press engage in on a daily basis to keep the public informed."

The incident on March 13 Boxx is referring to is the shooting deaths of

Dani and Sam Johnson, of Eagle Rock. The Johnsons believe they know who tortured and mutilated their beloved labs, but so far, no charges have been filed.

Dani said, "I'm so frustrated. I would like to put it to rest, but we feel like we can't rest until we see it done. Our dogs deserve better. They deserve to have the people who tortured them, not just killed but tortured and killed them, to be punished."

The Barry County Sheriff's Office concluded their investigation and turned their findings over to Boxx less than a week after being alerted to the allegations, according to Barry County Sheriff Gary Davis.

Dani said she is grateful for the work the Sheriff's Office did for her. "I think Barry County got a lot of

three dogs belonging to calls. They did do their job. I'm impressed. I got to see a copy of the police report and they wrote down exactly what I had hoped they would do, which is the mutilation and torture. I believe they got a bad rap in the beginning, and they did their jobs," she said.

Protestors have gathered at different sites throughout the county each Saturday beginning March 31. Protestors say they will continue to protest until charges are filed against the person responsible.

The first protest took place outside the driveway of the alleged shooters, the owners of Paradise Cove Camping Resort in Eagle Rock. Since, protests have taken place at the Barry County old courthouse in Cassville twice, and this past Saturday, at Highways 86 and Route J in Golden.

Protestors hold up signs, demanding justice, and all wear orange to stand in solidarity for the death of the dogs. The dogs were wearing orange collars when they went missing, but those collars had been removed when the Johnsons found their bodies. The group has been called Justice for Gus and Dog Lives Matter.

Sam Johnson and his brother also went to the Missouri State Capitol for the Missouri Alliance for Animal Legislation's Human Day on April 10 to try to bring awareness to issues like these. Dani said, "People were there to talk to legislators about animal cruelty. They were able to talk to representative Scott Fitzpatrick, and he said he would make a call to Amy Boxx to discuss it.

and the physicians use it, as well."

Multiple counties near Barry County are currently enrolled, including Stone, Taney, Jasper, Greene and McDonald. More counties are in the talking phase of enrolling, as well.

Presiding commissioner Cherry Warren said, "At the southwest commissioners meeting, all of the commissioners that have it spoke highly in favor of it." Warren mentioned specifically that Jasper and McDonald Counties had positive effects."

Warren continued, "They have all been happy with it and reported no problems."

Brock added that the benefits will increase as St. Louis County partners with bordering states so the systems work together. "They're trying to partner with bordering states to get partnerships with them, as

well. With us being so close to Arkansas, it would help to be on the same page," he said.

A few people in attendance asked a few questions about when the program would begin and if Barry

County would then reach out to other surrounding counties to encourage them to join, as well. The commissioners and Brock agreed to speak with other counties to encourage them to proceed with enrollment.

Once public commentary ended, Warren said, "We do thank the health department for the cooperation. We don't see a downside and truly support it."

Both Schad and Hendrix agreed with Warren, making the commission's support unanimous.

Brock and the commissioners will work together later this week to get the public notices in the newspaper and eventually pass an ordinance to enroll in the PDMP officially. At that point, Brock said it should be three to four months for a go-live date, which St. Louis County will determine.

Barry County should be enrolled in the program before the end of the year.


A Seligman man was arrested and charged last week after allegedly attacking his girlfriend while she was holding her six month old baby. According to affidavits of probable cause, Andrew A. Parker, 23, hit his girlfriend and attempted to "yank" the baby from her arms during the assault at a residence on Main Street in Seligman last week.

The report by the Barry County Sheriff's Department states that Parker got into an altercation after he attempted to take her baby from her by force. Parker allegedly shoved her against a truck and began choking her when she wouldn't let go of the baby.

The report went on to state that Parker hit her in the right side of the head with a fist while attempting to "yank" the baby from her arms.

Parker is charged with domestic assault in the second degree. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$15,000 cash-only bond.








opportunity to speak with Senator Sater, and they were very receptive. They were pleased with the response.

"My brother in law showed them the photos of the dogs after they were shot and they were appalled. That is why [Rep. Fitzpatrick] took it upon himself to say he would contact Amy Boxx."

Dani said the protests will continue weekly until charges are filed against the shooters responsible for her dogs' deaths.

Dani said, "We want

people to be aware of what is going on. It makes us feel like we're doing something. I feel like we are letting our dogs down. They were so gentle."

She added that she has reached out to the Prosecuting Attorney's office trying to get an update on the case, but has not received any information back. Dani stated, "I've called repeatedly and I've been polite, but she never returns my calls. I was told they have a victim's advocate for people. I called her and all I get

is her voice mail and she doesn't call back, either."

For Johnson, the issue isn't simply one about her dogs, but the possibility of those escalating in the future if charges are not filed. She said, "Personally, I am concerned as a

neighbor that these people are capable of this. We can't believe nothing has been done yet. I believe they are a threat to society."

Calls placed to Paradise Cove for comment were not returned.



KALL. A Polar Bear's Tale

Chapter Eight:

In the 1920s, the Saint Louis Zoo built some of the nation's first naturalistic bear habitats by creating rocky grottos from molds of nearby Missouri bluffs. Other zoos followed this example, inspiring a new generation of zoo habitats.

Nearly a century later, these original bear grottos needed upgrades. The Saint Louis Zoo built a \$16 million polar bear habitat with two freshwater pools, two filled with saltwater, a coast-like terrain, a sandy beach and an area of grass. Add a climate-controlled building with polar bear bedrooms and the Zoo's Polar Bear Point became a beautiful, 21st century upgrade, a new model for bear care. All it needed was a polar bear.

Kali, a wild-born, Alaskan polar bear, was the responsibility of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS). Its officials decided the Saint Louis Zoo's newly designed polar bear habitat was the perfect permanent home for the young bear.

Kali had been shy and cautious when he first arrived in Buffalo from the many changes in this life. But playing with Luna had helped Kali grow to become a confident, strong bear, ready for any challenge. Caitlyn would miss the boisterous adolescent bear, but also knew he had a bright future ahead of him.

So, how does an 850-pound polar bear travel from New York to Missouri? The same way any special delivery might: via FedEx.

Caitlyn trained Kali in the weeks before his departure, to calmly walk into a huge aluminum crate, a move he performed on his departure day. Kali's crate was loaded into a truck, which drove him to Rochester, New York, where his crate was transferred to a plane to Memphis, Tennessee. Kali had already been on quite a few flights, but flying a tiny cub is quite different from flying a large, sub-adult polar bear! FedEx donated their expertise and services for Kali's trip. A veterinarian and zoo officials flew with Kali, caring for him to keep him calm and comfortable.

In Memphis, Kali was loaded onto another truck. During the 4-hour drive to St. Louis, he was monitored by advanced technology, with frequent checks by a veterinarian, curator and zookeepers. The temperature was kept at a polar-bear-friendly 55 degrees and frequent stops were made to check on his comfort.

It was a lovely May evening when his truck pulled up to the Saint Louis Zoo. After a long journey, Kali finally made it to his new home.

The kids looked from Julie to Kali in wonder, marveling at the long journey the bear took to get to St. Louis. After all that, here he was, swimming right in front of them.

"That's his story," Julie told the crowd. "That's how Kali got here."

"But if Kali's from Alaska," one boy asked, "how can he live in St. Louis? It's so hot here in the summertime!"

"Well," Julie started, "he has access to an air-conditioned building, but honestly he usually chooses to be outside, no matter how hot it is. He has two saltwater pools to cool off in, but he just doesn't feel heat in the same way that we do. Polar bears are so well-insulated with their thick coats and fat layers that their core temperature is stabilized, like a thermos that keeps things both hot and cool."

"Don't you think he misses Luna, though?" another child asked.

"Polar bears are actually solitary animals," Julie answered. "The only times polar bears are with other bears are when a mother has cubs, several bears are feeding in one spot, or there's a mating relationship but even that would only last 2-3 weeks. So, Kali is housed as he would live in the wild as a young, adult male polar bear."

The kids nodded.

"All right," Julie said, "let's give this bear some food."

Much to the crowd, and Kali's, delight, she rolled meatballs, carrots, fish and chow down a chute into the pool, with a little bit of lard for dessert!

She then stood back and watched as the big bear floated in the water, crunching on his carrots and slurping down fish.

Little eyes and faces pressed against the glass and stared up at him in wonder. Watching these kids interact with Kali never ceased to amaze Julie. Separated by only a pane of glass, they were nose to nose with a real polar bear!

"I love Kali," she heard a little boy say to his moth-

er. Julie smiled. She knew that every day Kali spent simply playing in his pool, he was inspiring the next generation to fall in love with polar bears.

Local author Linda Sartin publishes first book of trilogy

Nearly 60 years ago, Linda Sartin's eighth grade principal in Des Moines, Iowa, marched her into her office and told Sartin she wasn't smart enough to write. "I was crushed," Sartin said.

It was a substitute teacher who first noticed Sartin's writing ability, and a vocational event at her junior high school sealed her desire to become a freelance writer. Sartin suffered from asthma complications and would often miss the first six weeks of school each year, her grades dropping dramatically. But once she returned, her grades rose steadily, and she proved to those who paid attention that she could hold her own. However, the words of her principal crippled her confidence enough that she didn't take up a pen again until she was 30.

But she did pick up the pen, and a project that spanned four decades has finally paid off. As of November 16, 2017, Sartin, a long-time resident of Cassville, became the published author of "Bound by Honor," the first book of her contracted trilogy.

Her sci-fi romance stretches beyond the borders of our galaxy into a star system devastated by planet-wide destruction. Centallians, the primarily male survivors of their destroyed civilization, settle on an uninhabited planet they name New Centallus, and they turn to Earth to find mates in order for their species to survive. But infants are unable to live long on New Centallus, and a doctor from Earth must be brought to their new home to help solve the mystery that could spell the death of their entire species—even if they must risk breaking their honor to do it.

"Bound by Honor" holds a special place in Sartin's heart. When asked about her interest in writing stories, Sartin said, "I've always been a storyteller. Even before I was writing I was telling stories." The principal of her junior high school might have delayed her dream, but various people throughout her life helped Sartin overcome self-doubt.

In 1966, she married Gary Sartin, who saw her potential and actively encouraged her to write. She dabbled with songwriting and poetry, entering a statewide Women in the Arts competition where she received an Honorable Mention. It gave her a much-needed boost.

Sartin's journey to publication began in 1977 when she started reading a novel in which the heroine went from being timid to taking over a pirate ship in three pages. She put the book down and thought, "I can write better than that."

She wrote the first page of "Bound by Honor," which was titled "Bonds of Honor" at the time, on a yellow legal pad and allowed her parents to read it. Her father told her to be sure to keep the movie rights, and her mother corrected her spelling. Over the past 40 years, her debut novel evolved

Sartin attended a six-week writing course led by acclaimed author Jory Sherman and submitted three chapters to Sherman for a critique. She received a letter from him, the first line reading, "The news isn't good." Sartin said it went downhill from there. "I didn't understand what he said, but I was hooked."

Between playing and selling dulcimers, hosting tours of Crystal Caverns, and battling vision impairment, Sartin became a founding member of Cassville's Mid South Writers group in 1985 and worked hard on becoming a better writer. She took writing classes at Drury University in Springfield, attended conferences and read books on the craft of writing to





Encouraged by this, Sartin pitched her novel to an agent at the Ozark



Creative Writers conference in Eureka Springs, Ark., and was accepted. She was represented for a little over a year, but due to failing health, her agent had to reduce her clientele to a bare minimum, and as an undiscovered author Sartin found herself cut.

She went through a time in her writing when she allowed numerous people to tell her how her sci-fi romance book should read. Everyone had a different opinion on how to write it. Sartin tore her novel apart and pieced it back together so many times it wasn't her book anymore.

Dismayed, she reached out to longtime friend and published author Velda Brotherton who told her to put the book back the way she wanted it to read and send it to her. Little did Sartin know that Brotherton was on the board of directors of a young publishing company, Oghma Creative Media, out of Bentonville, Ark.

Sartin's husband Gary passed away before she submitted her manuscript to Brotherton, but the day she found out her book had been accepted for publication, she felt antsy and upbeat like something good was going to happen. Four days after submitting her novel to Brotherton, Sartin checked her email while on break at her dayjob at Westco and was flabbergasted to find that the Oghma board had unanimously voted to accept her book for publication. Her manager, Mark Whittemire, jumped to his feet and highfived her on the spot. "Gary knew before I did. I think it was him trying to tell me I was about to be a published author."

Sartin, who writes as Rose Sartin, a tribute to her great-grandmother, is now under contract for the "Bonds of Honor" trilogy, the "Bonds" prequel novella, and a stand-alone novel. The first novel of her trilogy, "Bound by Honor," is available now on Amazon and Barnes & Noble websites. It can also be purchased locally at Westco,

BBQ Station and The Edmondson Law Firm, in Cassville.

For those readers who are curious how the sci-fi romance trilogy began, Sartin's prequel novella "Acqeli" is available as an ebook on Amazon and B&N. It contains three short stories detailing the events leading up to the destruction of an entire civilization. A dual book signing with fellow sci-fi author and Mid South Writers member Susan Eschbach is scheduled for May 17 from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. in the Sho-Me Plaza.

Sartin stands behind her choice to write sci-fi romance, a genre steadily growing in popularity. She said, "My books are full of adventure and mystery, and there's always a love story. My characters are devoted to each other—eventually."

Sartin is grateful her first novel has finally found a home with a publisher, but was the checkered journey to becoming a published author worth it? "Absolutely. I'm loving writing. I will write until I die."

Seligman man sentenced to seven years for meth

A Seligman man has been sentenced in federal court for possessing methamphetamine to distribute following a high-speed pursuit by law enforcement officers that ended at a chicken farm.

Jeffery B. Stout, 37, of Seligman, was sentenced by U.S. District Judge Stephen R. Bough on Tuesday, April 10, 2018, to seven years in federal prison without parole.

On Dec. 13, 2017, Stout pleaded guilty to possession of methamphetamine with the intent to distribute.

Stout was arrested on July 7, 2016, following a high-speed pursuit by law enforcement officers. A Barry County Sheriff's deputy attempted to stop Stout, who had been reported driving a red Camaro on the wrong side of the road, after the vehicle's license plates did not match. Stout led officers on a chase with speeds up to 102 miles per hour. Stout eventually stopped after he entered a chicken farm, drove into a field, lost control, and spun out the wheels. As the wheels were spinning, officers blocked Stout from pulling forward and pulled Stout and a passenger out of the vehicle.

Officers searched the vehicle and found a Jack Daniels tin can that contained 24.6 grams of pure methamphetamine, seven baggies that contained methamphetamine, four baggies that contained methamphetamine residue, more than

\$1,000 in cash, various drug paraphernalia and a sparkler bomb device.

Stout has committed seven drug offenses since 2002. Those convictions started with a municipal conviction with a suspended sentence in 2002. He then went to prison for drugs in 2008 in Arkansas. In 2013, he was convicted again for drugs in Missouri, where he was put in a drug court program. His probation was then revoked concurrent to a new drug conviction in 2014, and he was sent to the 120-day treatment program in the Missouri Department of Corrections. He was discharged from probation on April 13, 2016, less than three months before the events of this case.

Stout also has a prior conviction for aggravated assault on a family member, where he pointed a shotgun at his livein girlfriend during an argument and threatened her. He has eight prior convictions for driving without a valid license, along with prior convictions for failure to appear in court, trespassing, leaving the scene of an accident, criminal contempt and resisting arrest.

This case was prosecuted by Special Assistant U.S. Attorney Jody Larison. It was investigated by the Barry County Sheriff's Department, the Missouri State Highway Patrol and the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives.





Aurora man charged with stealing vehicle

Bauer is charged with stealing a motor vehicle. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$10,000 cashonly bond.
