

Recent drug investigation yields charges for two

A collaboration between the Ozarks Drug Enforcement Team (ODET) and the Barry County Sheriff's Department led to the arrest of two people in Cassville last week. Charles Love, 32, of Cassville, and Andrew Eugene Edie, 38, of Cassville, were each arrested and charged with different crimes on Wednesday, October 10.

According to affidavits of probable cause, officers conducted a narcotics search warrant at a residence on Private Road 114 in Cassville. When officers arrived, Love ran to a back bedroom, and Edie ran out of the back door, leading to a foot pursuit that ended shortly after.

Officers located used syringes that field-tested posi-

Cassville R-IV preps time capsule for burial in honor of 150 years

This Friday marks a special occasion at Cassville Schools. In celebration of the district's 150th year serving students in the Cassville area, the Alumni Association is hosting a chili supper for the public and the school will be revealing a time capsule that will be buried to commemorate the occasion.

Superintendent Dr. Richard Asbill said the time capsule, which is set to be buried the first week of November, is a 50-year time capsule so that current students will be able to participate in its reveal five decades from now. He said, "The idea there is it'll be our 200 year anniversary at that point. The other piece of the time capsule idea is it would allow some of our elementary students to be 57 to 67 years old when it's reopened. It covers a broad range of current students and where they will be in their lives fifty years from now.

He added, "We decided a time capsule because we haven't done one before."

"When we think about our past and where we've come from, we thought about how far we have come and how far we will go in the next fifty years."

The time capsule will be placed in front of the JC Duncan gymnasium near the Central Office. Asbill said that decision was made to ensure the time capsule wouldn't have to be opened early or moved for construction projects. He said, "We have is scheduled to be put in from of the JC Duncan gymnasium in front of the Central Office. We said if we were going to actually build a


Greenway low-water bridge to close for repairs

Greenway Trail patrons will need to use an alternative route temporarily while Cassville City employees replace the low-water bridge near the tennis courts. Public Works Director David Brock released information that the bridge would be closed with no detour available beginning on Friday, October 19, tentatively, and will reopen by November 2.

According to Brock, city employees will work with Seven Valleys Concrete, LLC, which will be doing the concrete work and city employees will be completing the demolition and site restoration. Seven Valleys' portion will cost \$13,500, funded out of the Parks and Stormwater Sales Tax revenue. Annually, that fund accrues approximately \$472,000 based on the last two years' totals.

The bridge that will be replaced is part of the walking trail that allows

Purdy Health Clinic opens doors for patients

A new healthcare option is available to Purdy and surrounding area residents now that a health clinic has opened downtown. The Purdy Healthcare Clinic was opened by nurse practitioner and Purdy resident Valerie Bennett, FNP-C, officially on Monday, October 8. The official grand opening will be held this Thursday.

Bennett opened the clinic after seeing a need in her community as a Purdy native who moved back to the area in the late nineties with her husband, Mike. She said, "It's something I've always wanted to do. I wanted to take care of the community. I was a youth leader for a long time at my church, and that guided me in this. When I went back to school, that was my goal: to put a clinic in Purdy."

Bennett has over 35 years of emergency room and intensive care nursing experience. Her office medical assistant Trish McCracken,

RMA, has over 30 years of medical clinic experience, as well.

Bennett added, "Dr. Ben Leavitt is collaborating physician for this practice. His office days will be announced later."

After working in different settings for over three decades, Bennett looks forward to serving the community in a more personal way. Her clinic is open for urgent care walk-ins, scheduled appointments, and memberships will be offered to help people gain affordable healthcare. Bennett will see children, teens, adults and the elderly in her practice.

Purdy Health Clinic will offer labs, standard appointments, minor suturing, minor office procedures, onsite xrays and more. Those with clinic memberships will also be offered unlimited office visits at no additional cost and significantly discounted labs and xrays.

Bennett explained,

"Annual labs are even included in the membership. With the membership you can come in as many times as you would like for visits. If you're sick three or four times, you just come in, there is no fee.

"Membership fees are capped at \$200 a month. It's \$100 for the first adult, \$50 for the second and then \$25 per child, but it maxes with \$200."

Bennett added that while an xray technician isn't on staff, they have a contract that allows them to bring someone into the clinic

quickly. She said, "If someone thinks they might need an xray, just let us know a bit

ahead of time and we'll have them here."

With the clinic dream now a reality, Bennett hopes the community takes advantage of the hometown healthcare option available to them.

She continued, "I really felt like there was a need for this in the community."

Purdy Health Clinic is open Monday through Thursday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. and is closed from 1 p.m. to 2 p.m. for lunch daily. It is located at 200 Wash-

ington, Suite E, in Purdy. To reach the clinic, call (417) 442-3000. They are also on Facebook.

The grand opening will be Thursday, October 18, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. Refreshments and facility tours will be provided.

Bennett has an RN degree from St. John's School of Nursing, a BSN in nursing, a Masters in nursing and a Rural Family Nurse Practitioner degree.

Two priests, one monsignor accused of sexual abuse

TWO HAD APPOINTMENTS IN BARRY COUNTY CHURCHES

Two priests formerly associated with local Barry County Catholic churches are accused of child abuse, according to the Diocese of Springfield-Cape Girardeau last week. Three members of the clergy were accused of sexual abuse in the 1970s, but allegations were made recently. Two of the accused, Father John Brath and Monsignor John Rynish, have died. The remaining is Father Fred Lutz who retired seven years ago. Both Lutz and Brath served time in local churches.

Allegations against Brath were made in 2015 in Jasper and Taney Counties after his death in 2014.

An allegation was made against Lutz in 2006 to the Cape Girardeau County prosecutor and the Children's Division. Lutz retired in 2011.

Accusations against Rynish were reported to the Greene County prosecutor and Children's Division in September 2018. Rynish died in 2001.

Locally, Brath served as pastor of the Holy Family Parish in Shell Knob in 1998.

Lutz was the parochial administrator of St. Edward Parish in Cassville in 1975, pastor of St. Edward in 1988, and pastor of the St. Susanne Parish in Mount Vernon in 1991.

Rynish had no appointments in Barry County during his tenure.

The diocese released a statement saying it is reaching out to victims to provide assistance through counseling, spiritual assistance and support groups. The diocese said to report allegations, call (800) 392-3738 or (417) 866-0841.

Mary Compton, Communications Director of the Missouri Attorney General's Office, says, "The independent review launched by the Attorney General's Office on August 23, 2018, is active and ongoing. We will work as quickly as possible to carefully and thoroughly review all evidence reported to our office. The Pennsylvania Grand Jury completed its work in two years. Our Office believes Missourians deserve answers as soon as feasible."

Love is charged with possession of a controlled substance and unlawful possession of drug paraphernalia. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$30,000 cash-only bond. Edie is charged with resisting arrest for a felony. He is also being held on a \$30,000 cash-only bond.

Crash with towed boat injures one near Chain-o-Lakes

An Eagle Rock man was seriously injured after colliding with a house boat on the Highway 86 bridge south of Chain-O-Lakes today. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, the houseboat was in the other vehicle's lane when they crashed around 3:40 a.m.

Kenneth R. Greenwood, 55, of Eureka Springs, Ark., was headed northbound on the bridge while pulling a houseboat with his 1995 Ford F250. A second vehicle, a 1994 Ford F150 driven by Ace A. Gray, 61, of Eagle Rock, was headed south bound. Gray's truck collided with the houseboat overhanging his lane of travel.

Gray was seriously injured in the crash and taken by air ambulance to Mercy Hospital in Springfield for treatment.

Greenwood had no reported injuries. Both men were wearing seatbelts at the time of the crash.

The F250 sustained extensive damage but was driven from the scene. The F150 was totalled and towed from the scene by Brice's Towing, of Cassville.

Cassville's annual fall clean-up Nov. 5 through 9

The City of Cassville's annual fall clean-up will be held November 5 through November 9. Republic Services will accept additional household waste and large items on regular collection days.

The following items will be accepted at the curb: barbecue grills; patio furniture; outdoor furniture; sofas; dressers; love seats; recliners; desks; televisions; bundled guttering; beds, including hide-a-beds, mattresses and box springs.

Wood pallets; waste from small remodeling or wood projects, materials must be cut into four-foot sections and stacked; sinks; toilets; cabinets; vanities; carpet that is cut into four-foot lengths and bundled; fencing that is cut into four-foot lengths; and bicycles.

Republic Services will not accept tires, yard waste, large quantities of ash, dead animals, raw sewage, waste oil, hazardous materials, wet paint containers, chemicals, flammable substances, lead or acid batteries or waste

from large remodeling or construction projects.

One option will be to have Cassville residents set at their curb side large appliances for Republic Services to collect. There is a \$15 fee. Residents must pay the fee to Republic Services in order to schedule the pick-up of the appliance. The following large appliances will be accepted after the \$15 fee has been paid: dishwashers; washing machines; dryers; hot water heaters; and stoves. Republic Services will also accept refrigerators, freezers and air conditioners that display a tag from a licensed technician proving that all freon has been removed from the item. To request and pay for pick-up of an appliance please contact Republic Services at (417) 268-1261.

Yard waste will be accepted as normal at the Yard Waste facility behind the Cassville Aquatic Park.

Seligman man accused of raping children in Arkansas

A Seligman man is in police custody after allegedly raping multiple children in Arkansas, according to law enforcement. Donald Bonner, 69, of Seliman, is charged with two counts of rape and two counts of sexual indecency with a child.

In an arrest report, Bonner was accused after two children came forward about the assault in August of this year. When interviewed by police, Bonner allegedly admitted to raping both children as well as other children who had not come forward at that point.

Officers reported Bonner said he "just wanted to have sex" with the children in question. Police went on to state Bonner's report matched the victims' statements made to officers.

Bonner was taken into police custody on October 9 and was booked into the Washington County, Ark., Detention Center on a \$250,000 bond.

ter water flow.

Brock said a redesign was necessary based on how previous flooding incidents have damaged the bridge, causing need for repairs.

Brock said, "The upstream side of the structure has been damaged by repetitive flooding events. I would estimate it had only 30 percent of its original capacity to pass water. This resulted in more frequent overtopping and erosion problems on the downstream side."

The plan is to replace

17 feet of the concrete trail over the Brock Branch. Instead of the current culverts, the new bridge will have an open center that will improve drainage of water and hopefully prevent future damage by flooding.



Power of Pink shatters previous years' fundraising records

This year's Power of Pink Walk fundraiser was the most successful to date, with the group able to donate over \$11,000 to each of the four breast cancer patients. This year, Power of Pink, a multifaceted fundraising effort that concludes with a walk on Mother's Day weekend, raised \$47,174.02, meaning each of the recipients was given a check for \$11,793.50 on Sunday, May 13.

This year's recipients were Sabrina Reed, of Exeter, Amy Pointer, of Crane, Lori Webster, of Wheaton, and Rose Lawrence, of Exeter.

The first year, Power of Pink raised \$1,000 for each of two women. McCracken said she never would have guessed

it would have grown to what it is today. She shared, "When we started, we just set a goal that we wanted to give them each a thousand dollars. We were a little shy and put a little money in to get them that, but we were proud we made it to the goal."

Eight years later, McCracken said she is blown away by the success of the event, but she doesn't take credit for it. She said, "Everybody in the community does this. I don't do it on my own. I couldn't do it without the help of the community. Everyone who registers for the walk, donates for the auction or buys something at the auction, they make it possible. I'm just the feet and hands that go out to get it."

Different teams of volunteers go to different areas, asking for donations and using teamwork to break up areas in a manageable way. That is part of how it's grown as much as it has.

The idea for Power of Pink came from the Tough Enough to Wear Pink events that take place across the country at rodeos. She said, "My husband is a rodeo clown, and we travel all over. Wrangler started Tough Enough to Wear Pink, and through that, they've raised millions of dollars. But every rodeo that does it, they turn in their amount they've raised to them, but they have the option to divide it out for your own community."

McCracken said some of the rodeos would use the proceeds to offer free portable mammograms at the events or other local charities. McCracken said she wanted to try it and make sure it went

back to people in their community.

She said, "I'd watched this everywhere we went. I said I really wanted to do Tough Enough to Wear Pink, but I wanted to give it back to our local people. My husband said we didn't have enough time before the rodeo, but I said I thought we could do it. And we did."

The next year, McCracken organized it to be a walk fundraiser and each year, different things have been added, like the live auction, selling pink merchandise, and more. They've also done sales of other products throughout the year to add to the total.

This year, McCracken said one sponsor raised \$22,000 to donate. The company, Plunder Jewelry, is based out of Utah, and McCracken said the uniqueness of how Power of Pink gives money back is what drew the owner to par-

ticipate. She explained, "Plunder Jewelry coming on board was huge. When they came on board last year, they donated \$8,700. The owner told me, 'This is amazing.' She actually flies here from Utah, and she told us she'd never seen anything that gives back directly to their people. She said she has tried to help different organizations, but she wants to see where her money goes to. She said when she came here and actually spoke to the women who were getting the money that was donated, she was sold."

"She designed five pieces of jewelry that went to Power of Pink in October. Her company in turn is growing, which gets more people selling the pieces. This year, when she called and said, 'I'm going to wire you \$22,000, I like to fell through the floor. I was crying so hard. I was so amazed and blessed that they had done so well.'"

However, McCracken said the local community really

stepped up as well. She said, "But our little community here raised \$27,189.04 last year with her donation of \$8,700. So we have a community here that raised more than we had before, also."



of their treatment. Funds can be used for anything that eases the burden of their daily lives, whether that is for bills, gas, groceries or anything else.

Another recipient, Lori Webster, of Wheaton, said the money will make it possible for her to have reliable transportation again. "We're going to pay some of our bills, but I don't have a vehicle that is reliable. So we are looking to find me a good used vehicle so I have transportation and not have to rely on my husband as much."

Webster was diagnosed in February 14, 2017, and was surprised she had been nominated. She said, "It was so exciting. It brought tears to my eyes."

McCracken said, "I have people ask me all the time if I'd had breast cancer or someone dear to me. And no, but it's something that means a lot to me and it can happen to anybody at any time. I just want to help people who are struggling.

Insurance doesn't pay for everything. When you're sick, stress on top of sickness doesn't help anything. So, if we can ease up some of their stress, I think that is a major step to helping their healing process."

Each year, McCracken takes nominations from the community of who could use the money. She said they have to make a decision on how many people they'll help before they know how much money they'll raise. She said, "We are at a max of four right now, but I hope to help ten women if they are in need. We want what we give them to make a difference. If we have multiple people, we'll draw names so it's fair to everybody. I don't want to choose anyone over someone else."

Essentially, Power of Pink wants the amount of money given to each of the people to make a significant difference in their life and help them get through treatment and recovery.

Sabrina Reed, of Exeter, was diagnosed in October 2017. She said that right now, her radiation treatment is every day for six weeks. She said, "It was amazing. I don't know how to put it in words. It was a blessing to have the help. It's been a very difficult time I've been through since I was diagnosed, and now I don't have to worry as much about how I'll financially do things. I have to go through six weeks of radiation every single day. My husband and I didn't know how we would make all the trips."

Reed said she is caught up on medical bills and doesn't worry about how they will afford the trips for her treatments now.

She continued, "It's just an amazing thing what they do for people in this kind of situation."

Pointer said, "I think Janice and Dale McCracken have

started something very wonderful and they are helping a lot of people. The more the word gets out, it can be even bigger than it was this year.

"From my understanding, they work very hard and they deserve a thank you and applause in just the last eight years."

Pointer's husband is from Wheaton and his mother asked him to come do the walk with her for Mother's Day. She never guessed she would be the one receiving help from Power of Pink.

She said people should get checked, and by catching it early, she was able to avoid a lot of the treatments. She said, "Don't be hesitant. The only reason I had my mammogram is because I went for my yearly physical and I turned 40. My doctor asked if I'd like to go for my mammogram and I agreed. It's how it was found and it was in early stages. With me choosing to do the mastec-

tomy, they were able to get it all and I didn't have to go through chemo treatments. It doesn't run in my family, so it was shocking. You never know."

McCracken said she wants this to continue to benefit people all over the area for years to come. She said, "It's not just a Barry County thing. We ask for people to nominate people. If you know someone with breast cancer, we ask you send out some information to us and I call and talk to them."

As far as the money raised

during the walk, the dinner fundraiser, McCracken said she makes sure all of the money goes to the recipients battling cancer. She said, "For the banquet, I get everything donated. I don't spend it on anything that I don't try to get somebody to sponsor first. If I need something, like the sandwiches for the walk, I get that sponsored. People will donate money to buy things we need so it's not taking any money out of what we are raising for the ladies. I don't want to take

time capsule, we wanted to make sure it wouldn't end up under a building expansion or a parking lot. We wanted it to be tied to the first high school and a good representation of the district and where we've come from, so that was the most logical place."

School maintenance staff will build a concrete box for the time capsule to be placed in, a lid will seal it, and then Corcky Stehlik of Barry County Ready Mix will place a large quarry rock over the top to mark its location.

Asbill said, "Once the quarry rock is in place, our plaque will be mounted to it. We wanted it to be symbolic of the rock gym, so it'll sit on that box and encapsulate it for fifty years."

The idea for the time capsule came about through conversations of how the district wanted to commemorate the school's 150 years of service to students of the community. Asbill said, "We were kind of evaluating several different components for the 150 years: how we would celebrate it the whole year long and what kind of activity we would be putting out there in front of everybody to see from the alumni and the

community.

"This is not only the 150 year anniversary for Cassville School District, but a representation of a huge investment from the Cassville, Butterfield, Eagle Rock, Jenkins and the Shell Knob areas. It's a celebration of a lot of the communities who trust us with their children's education."

He continued, "We wanted everyone to be involved in that. We looked at the Barry County Museum and what they could offer. We included things we wanted to pass on, like we have a printed book for those in the future. It's kind of a neat thing when we pass on traditions."

"We're not talking about passing something forward. We want to pass our traditions forward. We wanted to capture small momentos that would represent where we are and where we came from, whether that's a note or something on paper or a picture. We wanted to say, 'You're fifty years from now, but don't forget where you came from. Look at where you've been and where we are going.'"

Students, teachers and the community all worked together to add things to the

time capsule. The complete list includes:

as gifts. We are trying to plan some spring activities, as well. We are looking back to some records of some old traditional events that occurred in the community and how we could do something symbolic of those events. Whether that is the old fescue festival or the homecoming parade.

"We lost that homecoming parade for a number of years and we really wanted to bring that back. We want events the community remembers so we go back and embrace and what we refer to as 'this is why we call Cassville home.' A lot of those memories we don't want to just be memories but events that we celebrate. Those are the things that make people proud to call Cassville home."

The public is invited to see

the reveal of the time capsule this Friday at the chili supper sponsored by the Cassville Alumni Association.

The chili supper will be on Friday, October 19, at the JC Duncan Gymnasium. The dinner will be served at 5 p.m. and the time capsule will be dedicated at 5:30 p.m. At 6 p.m., people can head to the last football game of the season.

Due to the anticipation of a large crowd at the football game, the gates will open for entry at 5 p.m. People can get a seat and then head to the gym for the chili supper and to see the time capsule.

Asbill added, "We want to send this to our future Wildcats."

Cassville rumbles past Reeds Spring, 35-0

That game that no one would name is finally here.

With a 35-0 victory over Reeds Spring in the books, the Cassville Wildcats are pumped to play Big 8 rival Lamar. The Tigers, undefeated in their last 56 games and holders of the nation's longest winning streak, bulldozed Nevada 43-6 to set the table for this long-awaited heavyweight match.

Lamar has not lost since October 17, 2014 when Carl Junction ruined an otherwise perfect season with a 29-28 upset.

At Reeds Spring on Friday night, on a rain-slicked turf field, the Wildcats topped the Wolves. Nineteen days shy of Halloween, the game quickly became a field position nightmare for Reeds Spring. The Wolves would not cross midfield in the first half. Seven first half possessions began at their 9, 20, 24, 5, 14, 37 and 15-yard lines.

Cassville's DJ White put

on a receiving clinic hauling in seven passes for 165 yards and a pair of touchdowns in a dominant performance.

The Wolves fumbled on their very first possession. Cassville scored in just two plays. Then a special team's miscue gave the Wildcats the ball at the Reeds Spring 5-yard line. Cassville scored on the next play.

Didn't we see this last week? And the week before?

Clay Weldy's propensity for trick plays continued in this week 8 game. After Bowen Preddy rammed into the line for 2 yards to open Cassville's first possession, a little razzle dazzle lit up the scoreboard.

A Preddy sweep became a reverse to Ethan Hoppes who pulled up and lofted a deep pass to DJ White. The pass was under thrown, but it didn't matter. White was all alone behind the secondary, and he had time to wait for the ball and then stroll into the end zone. Drake Reese nailed the PAT for a 7-0 lead with 9:18 on the clock.

The Wolves offense tried again. A 4-yard gain. A 12-yard loss after an errant

pitch. An incomplete pass. On 4th-and-18 at the 12-yard line, the punter slipped and his rugby kick was blown dead at the Reeds Spring 5-yard line.

Out of the wishbone formation, Shannon Haney rolled right and followed a bevy of blockers into the end zone. Reese converted again and Cassville claimed a 14-0 lead.

The Wolves would not go for 4th-and-1 at their own 38-yard line and the Wildcats took over at their 34-yard line following an uneventful punt.

On the sixth play of the drive, Haney bombed away to White down the left sideline. The Reeds defender deflected the pass but White snatched the ball and backed into the endzone to complete a 33-yard scoring play. Reese followed the tip-drill touchdown with a third PAT, and Cassville held a 21-0 lead with 3:06 still remaining in the opening quarter.

The Wolves suffered through another three-and-out as the quarter ended but the Wildcats fumbled the ball away in the red zone.

Later, after an apparent fourth touchdown was negated by a penalty, the Cassville offense had one last opportunity to score before halftime. Fighting the defense and the clock, Haney led the Wildcats 70 yards in nine plays. On 4th and 2 from the Reeds Spring 24-yard line, Haney found White loose in the secondary for a 22-yard gain. Preddy plunged into the end zone with just 21 seconds left on the clock, and Reese split the sticks for a 28-0 lead at intermission.

Preddy added another short touchdown run early in the third quarter to give legs to the running clock, and the Cassville defense throttled Reeds Spring to earn the 35-0 victory.

To go on the road in week 8, against a state-ranked opponent with district seeds on the line, and then deliver a clock-running, shutout victory is a special accomplishment. Now, Lance Parnell's unbeaten Wildcats get a shot at Lamar at home this Friday.

Doug Martin? Can you make that five thousand seats?

Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.

SW Volleyball rallies in late season play

The Southwest volleyball team picked up two wins last week and learned their opponent for the Class 2 district playoffs.

The Lady Trojans defeated Gentry, Ark., 26-24, 25-13, 25-17 and Exeter 25-5, 26-24 in non-conference matches and will play East Newton in the district tournament that starts Monday, Oct. 22, at Sarcoxie High School. Southwest improved its overall record to 10 wins, 17 losses and 1 tie.



National School Bus Safety Week is October 22-26

The Missouri State Highway Patrol recognizes the importance of bus safety and inspects every school bus in the state each year. We want children to arrive at school safely, and they can help by being good riders. October 22-26, 2018 is National School Bus Safety Week and a great opportunity for parents to talk with their children about their responsibilities as a passenger. Parents, ask your children, "How do you ride the school bus?" Please impress upon your children the importance of being a safe rider. Here are some basic safety rules for children riding a school bus:

- While at the bus stop, pay attention to your surroundings and stay on the sidewalk or shoulder of the road.
- Be at the bus stop on time.
- Board the bus single file, without pushing.
- Stay seated while the bus is in motion.
- Never put your head or

any part of you outside the bus window.

- Never throw anything out a bus window.
- Keep the aisle clear of books, lunch boxes, backpacks, musical instruments, etc.
- Talk quietly to your neighbor; never shout.
- If a student must cross the street after disembarking, they should remain at least 10 feet in front of the bus. If your student can see the bus driver, the bus driver can see your student! Always check both directions before crossing.
- If there is an emergency, listen to the bus driver for instructions.

Good behavior on the school bus can help prevent a traffic crash. Eliminating distractions and the ability to hear other traffic is helpful to the bus driver. In 2017, five people were killed and 401 people were injured in 869 traffic crashes involving school buses.

Missouri law states that

on a two-lane road, if a school bus is stopped and displaying warning signals while loading or unloading children, drivers must stop when meeting and following the bus. However, it is only necessary to stop on a four-lane highway when following the bus. Drivers, when you see a stopped school bus, stay alert and follow the law. Children may not be aware of traffic and dart unexpectedly into the roadway.

The only 100 percent survivable crash is the one that never happens. Make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly restrained in a seat belt or child restraint. Every day as we travel on Missouri's roadways, we trust that every driver on the road is going to obey the speed limit, pay attention, and drive sober. "Don't Violate The Trust."

Texas man arrested with over 2,000 prescription pills in Barry County drug sting

Texas man Jerry W. Rider, 62, of Weatherford, Texas, was arrested and charged with over 2,000 prescription pills in his vehicle during a Monett drug sting operation last week. According to affi-

davits of probable cause, Rider was identified as a drug dealer by confidential information to the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

Officers reported the confidential informant and an undercover officer met with Rider after the infor-

mant told officers he had a large supply of illegal prescription narcotic opiates and benzodiazepines. The informant told officers he, personally, had obtained more than a thousand pills from Rider.

Once contact was made

during the week of October 8 through 12, the informant and officer met with Rider in a public location in Monett. After the prearranged transaction took place, officers arrested Rider without incident.

When officers searched

Rider's car, they reported to have found 748 hydrocodones, 2,123 Alprazolam (Xanax), and 207 hydro-morphone (dilaudid). Officers confirmed via cell-phone GPS that Rider had traveled from Texas to Missouri on October 12.

Rider is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$50,000 cash-only bond. He is charged with three felony counts of delivery of a controlled substance.

Breast cancer 'Did you know?'

While the vast majority of breast cancer diagnoses involve women, men are not immune to the disease. According to the American Cancer Society, the lifetime risk of getting breast cancer is about one in 1,000 among men in the United States. By comparison, the risk for women in the United States is one in eight. While a man's risk for breast cancer is considerably lower than a woman's, the ACS still estimates that roughly 480 men will die from breast cancer in 2018, when more than 2,500 new cases of invasive breast cancer will be diagnosed in men. In addition, the ACS notes that black men diagnosed with breast cancer tend to have a worse prognosis than white men. Though breast cancer may be a disease widely associated with women, men should not hesitate to report any discomfort to their physicians, as the National Cancer Institute notes that men are often diagnosed with breast cancer at a later stage than women. The ACS suggests that men may be less likely to report symptoms, thereby leading to delays in diagnosis. The more advanced the cancer is at the time of diagnosis, the lower the patient's survival rate. Men are urged to report any discomfort or abnormalities in their chests to their physicians immediately.



Barry County designated as primary natural disaster area

Agriculture Secretary Sonny Perdue designated 12 Missouri counties as primary disaster areas. Producers in Audrain, Barry, Barton, Boone, Callaway, Cooper, Dade, Jasper, Lawrence, Moniteau, Monroe and Newton counties who suffered losses due to recent drought may be eligible for U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) emergency plans.

This designation by Secretary Perdue allows FSA to extend much-needed emergency credit to producers' recovery needs including replacing essential items such as equipment or livestock, reorganizing a farming operation or refinance certain debts.

Producers in the contiguous counties of Cedar, Christian, Cole, Greene, Howard, McDonald, Macon, Marion, Miller, Montgomery, Morgan, Osage, Pettis, Pike, Polk, Ralls, Randolph, Saline, Shelby, Stone and Vernon in Missouri; along with Benton and Carroll counties in Arkansas; Cherokee and Crawford counties in Kansas; and Ottawa County in Oklahoma, are eligible to apply for emergency loans.

The deadline to apply for these emergency loans is April 22, 2019.


FSA will review the loans based on the extent of losses, security available and repayment ability.

FSA has a variety of additional programs to

help farmers recover from the impacts of this disaster. FSA programs that do not require a disaster declaration include: Operating and Farm Ownership Loans; the Emergency Conservation Program; Livestock Forage Disaster Programs; Livestock Indemnity Program; Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees and Farm-Raised Fish Program; and the Tree Assistance Program.

Monett man's 'random' Powerball purchase wins \$50,000

In the "spur of the moment," John Poole happened to look at the jackpot sign while checking out at Casey's General Store, 728 W. Highway 60 in Monett, on Aug. 14. He noticed the Powerball jackpot had been hit and was reset to \$40 million for the next night's drawing.

"I'm not a consistent player. And I thought, 'I could use \$40 million,'" laughed the Monett resident. "I bought a cold drink, or something like that, and three Powerball tickets. I never win anything."

All three Powerball plays were printed on the same ticket. He then folded it up, put it in his pocket and didn't think about it until that Thursday morning at work.

"I pulled it out, and the first thing I looked at was the Powerball. I thought, 'Oh, cool. I got the Powerball.'"

And then, I started reading left to right and thought, 'Holy cow! There is 12. There is 47. There is 48. Wow! There is one number, two numbers, three numbers, four numbers,'" recalled Poole.

He knew he had won something, but he had to wait until his lunch break to learn he had won \$50,000. He swore to himself he wouldn't tell a soul.

"I begrudgingly broke down and told my wife," Poole joked, as his wife let out a "Hey!" and laughter in the background. "It definitely improves our situation. We will be able to use it to pay off bills that would have taken us years to pay off and put some back. It's still life changing and significant."

Poole's Powerball ticket matched four-white ball

numbers and the Powerball to win \$50,000. The winning numbers for the Aug. 15 drawing were: 12, 15, 28, 47, 48 and the Powerball was 16.

• **Carly Dawn Akers**, of Afton, Okla., pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance and DWI-prior. Akers received a suspended imposition of sentencing and two years unsupervised probation.

On April 14, 2018, Akers was pulled over driving a vehicle that had been reported stolen. Akers had been living with the victim and took the vehicle keys and his debit card while he was sleeping. When an officer pulled Akers over, she was visibly intoxicated and had an open bottle of vodka in the front seat. Her blood alcohol level was 0.231. She also handed officers a baggie of methamphetamine she had hidden in her bra.

Akers is to serve probation until September 17, 2020.

• **Steven Eugene Arnold**, of Monett, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance and distribution of a controlled substance. Arnold was sentenced to five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On November 30, 2016, Arnold was arrested for a warrant out of Lawrence County. When placed into custody, Arnold said he had two needles in his pocket. Officers took a flashlight out of his pocket and inside there were two baggies of methamphetamine.

On June 23, 2016, an

undercover officer with the Missouri State Highway Patrol purchased a gram of methamphetamine from Arnold for \$100 on Big Creek Road in Shell Knob.

• **Lesley Anne Chambers**, of Seligman, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance and possession of a controlled substance in a jail. Chambers received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On December 17, 2017, Chambers was booked into the Barry County Jail for a failure to appear warrant. When booked in, Chambers had methamphetamine hidden in her bra.

Chambers is to serve probation until September 18, 2023.

• **Christopher Michael Dodson** made an Alford plea to DWI - alcohol - aggravated offender. Dodson received a suspended execution of a seven year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections.

On October 18, 2014, Dodson was pulled over by the Missouri State Highway Patrol on MO 37 for failing to stay in his lane. When he pulled over, officers saw that he was visibly intoxicated. He admitted to drinking and smoking marijuana. The officers found beer cans under the seat.

• **Crystal Lynn Forester**,

of Monett, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Forester received a suspended execution of a five year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On August 10, 2017, Forester was arrested on a warrant. During a search, officers found a syringe in her purse. Once booked into jail, officers found a syringe in her bra, as well.

Forester is to serve probation until September 18, 2023.

• **James Samuel Funburg**, of Monett, pled guilty to delivery of a controlled substance to a person less than 17 years old. Funburg received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On April 29, 2018, Funburg gave marijuana to a 15 year old for her to consume.

Funburg is to serve probation until September 17, 2023.

• **Brandy Hans**, of Eureka Springs, Ark., pled guilty to burglary in the second degree. Hans received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On April 8, 2016, Hans broke into a residence on Air Park Drive in Golden through a sliding glass door. Hans stole tools, food, silverware, towels, blankets, trash bags, sandwich bags, toilet tissue, paper towels

and other items valued at over \$500.

Hans is to serve probation until September 18, 2023.

• **Cobby Robert Hood**, of Monett, pled guilty to resisting arrest for a felony in December 2016. Hood's probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On August 25, 2016, Hood was stopped by an officer while riding a bicycle because he had an active warrant. When an officer made contact, he took off on his bike into Kelly Creek where the officer lost sight of him.

• **Catrina Marie Johnson**, of Seligman, pled guilty to two counts of forgery and one count of tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree in April 2017. Johnson's probation has since been revoked, and she is to serve seven years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In November 2015, Johnson forged checks. Then, on August 8, 2016, Johnson was driving a stolen vehicle and

was identified after putting gas in the Jeep. The victim said Johnson would have had to unlawfully enter his residence to get the keys.

• **Darren Scott Kern**, of Neosho, pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears in excess of 12 monthly payments in January 2014. Kern's probation has since been revoked and he was sentenced to four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections with the execution of that sentence suspended and five

Kern is to serve probation until September 17, 2023.

• **Danielle Marie Krauth**, of Cassville, pled guilty to harassment in the first degree. Krauth received a suspended imposition of sentencing and three years supervised probation.

On February 27, 2018, Krauth sent the victim threatening Facebook mes-



sages. The victim had an ex parte in process. Krauth also threw a rock at a window in the victim's family's home. Krauth yelled at the family, as well.

Krauth is to serve probation until September 17, 2023.

• **Eva Renee Musick**, of Purdy, pled guilty to one count of unlawful possession of a firearm and two counts of resisting arrest for a felony. Musick was sentenced to four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On July 1, 2018, Musick was found to be in possession of a 12 gauge shotgun and was hiding from officers in a truck under a blanket. Musick had a active warrant and was not able to possess a firearm due to a felony conviction.

On June 28, 2018, Musick fled on foot from officers.

• **Benjamin Wade Paine III**, of Purdy, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance in February 2015. Paine's probation has since been revoked, and he received a six year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections with the execution of that sentence suspended and five years supervised probation.

On June 21, 2013, Paine was pulled over for no front license plate. Officers found a methamphetamine pipe in

the vehicle, which belonged to Paine.

Between June 10 and June 24, 2013, Paine broke into a barn in Purdy and stole a transmission and transfer case.

Paine is to serve probation until September 18, 2023.

• **Angel David Perez-Carrillo**, of Monett, was tried in court and found guilty of DWI - aggravated and driving while revoked/suspended. Perez-Carrillo was sentenced to four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections and one year incarceration in jail.

On January 22, 2017, Perez-Carrillo was pulled over for leaving the scene of an accident. He admitted to consuming six alcoholic drinks prior to being stopped. He had three prior DWI convictions and his license had been revoked.

• **Chris Lynn Reagan**, of Cassville, made an Alford plea to stealing - controlled substance or methamphetamine manufacturing material. Reagan received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On June 24, 2017, Reagan was the passenger in a vehicle that was getting gas. Reagan grabbed a bag sitting

on another vehicle's hood and got back in the car. Inside the bag was a redfuel battery, a quick start, and a Samsung cell phone with a cover. Reagan had Xanax in her possession when she was arrested.

Reagan is to serve probation until September 17, 2023.

• **Michael Allen Short**, of Verona, pled guilty to resisting arrest by fleeing causing a substantial risk of serious injury or death to any person in January 2018. Short's probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On August 20, 2016, Short was detained by the Missouri State Highway Patrol following a pursuit in both Barry and Stone Counties. When officers noted Short's license plate lamp was not working, they attempted to stop him. However, he fled, speeding on multiple roads before hitting a gravel road and sliding around the corners.

Eventually, Short stopped and exited the vehicle in the middle of the roadway. A passenger fled on foot.

When officers asked Short why he didn't stop, he said the passenger, Short's father, told him to keep driving.

• **Justin Dean Silver-**

heels, of St. Joseph, pled guilty to three counts of tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree, one count of burglary in the second degree, and one county of stealing \$25,000 or more. Silverheels was sentenced to five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In October 2017, Silverheels was in Lawrence County Jail for a stolen vehicle. At the time, multiple other vehicles were also reported missing. While in custody, Silverheels admitted to "punching" the ignition and stealing a Jeep as well as other vehicles, including a Nissan truck and a Chevrolet Tahoe with his brother.

Around the same time period, Silverheels also committed a burglary on State Highway TT in Crane where he stole tools, firearms, cash, CD/bonds and other documents, valued at \$27,120.91. He had over \$4,000 cash on him when he was arrested.

• **Robert Joseph Staphill**, of Seligman, made an Alford plea to possession of a controlled substance in February 2015. Staphill's probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On January 25, 2013, the

Southwest Missouri Drug Task Force was investigating an area in Seligman commonly known for methamphetamine lab dumping. Once there, an officer found a plastic bag with a shake and bake methamphetamine operation inside. There was also acid, lithium batteries, coffee filters, sandwich baggies, a broken glass smoking pipe, lye, and empty boxes of pseudoephedrine.

Using the receipt for the pseudoephedrine left in the bag, the officer went to the store where it was purchased and identified the purchaser as Stanphill and one other person.

• **Moises Felipe Stratton**, of Reeds Spring, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance in November 2015. Stratton's probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve seven years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On March 17, 2015, Stratton was a passenger in a traffic stop in Barry County. He admitted to having a marijuana pipe and meth pipe in his clothes. He also had vicodin.

• **Michelle Davean Thomas**, of Cassville, pled guilty to two counts of possession of a controlled substance and one count of forgery. Thomas received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On February 9, 2018, a report was made regarding stolen checks. When officers looked into it, the checks were used by Thomas. The checks and methamphetamine were found in her apartment.

On January 1, 2018, Thomas was implicated again in a stolen check incident where she was identified using them in Walmart by security footage.

On August 12, 2018, Thomas was the suspect of a narcotics investigation. In her apartment, officers found marijuana, methamphetamine, needles, a marijuana grinder, a bong and other paraphernalia.

Thomas is to serve probation until September 18, 2023.

• **Victoria Skylar Tyson**, of Cassville, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Tyson received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On November 1, 2017, Tyson was booked into jail in Monett. Officers found a wrapper of methamphetamine inside her bra when she was booked in. There was also a hydrocodone in her personal items officers located.

Tyson is to serve probation until September 18, 2023.
