Local summer camp a dream for abused kids

For too many children, life is a struggle. Many end up in foster care because of physical abuse or neglect by their providers. One local group with international ties is making a difference for some of those kids, a week of camp at a time.

Royal Family KIDS Camp is a specialized one-week camp each summer for kids from the area who need a little extra love in their lives. Set up as a non-denominational ministry outreach, there are 209 camps across the world in five different countries. Locally, kids aged seven through 11 from Barry, Lawrence and Stone counties attend the camp at a secured area in Cassville.

Children are referred to the Royal Family KIDS Camp from the Department of Family Services primarily, although there are a few spots for private clientele if they are approved.

Max Akers, co-director for the Cassville camp, said, "These are kids that may not do well in a regular camp because of the stories they have to share. They've been through so much, they need to be around other kids who won't have a look of shock on their faces when they talk about their lives."

He continued, "This creates an even playing field for these kids. All of the other kids have had similar experiences, and when they share their stories, there isn't any shock."

In some regards, Royal

Family is just like many other ministry-centered church camps. There is a Bible Club, as well as traditional camp activities like swimming, fishing, hiking, sports and arts and crafts. In other ways, there are aspects of the camp that are geared toward kids who need a little extra TLC.

Outdoor activities are taken care of by a coach. Akers said they run a tight schedule with plenty of activities to keep kids busy the week that they are there with plenty of options to appeal to all kids'


Akers said, "With our arts and crafts, it's not about what they finish or even if they finish but getting that one-onone time with an adult who cares about them."

Additionally, one night during the week, the volunteers hold a birthday party for all of the kids. Akers said, "One evening is everyone's birthday party. Some of these kids may have not ever had a birthday party before, and we want them to experience that. It's a fun week for them to not have to think about anything

It's a sobering thought to consider a child never having a birthday party and provides some perspective as to why it's so important for so many of them. There is a sense of belonging and family that the kids receive that never goes away. While most of the children come from the tri-county area, Akers said that if kids

Cassville man arrested for assault, property damage

A Cassville man was arrested last week after assaulting another man in his home. According to the affidavit of probable cause by Barry County Sheriff's Deputy Cody Stephens. Herman Tilford, 53, pushed the victim and held him against the wall.

The incident happened at Tilford's home on State Highway 37 on Saturday, April 23, around 11:30 p.m. Tilford attacked another man who also lives in the home.

When deputies arrived, Tilford was not questioned due to intoxication, according to Stephens.

Wilford was charged with domestic assault in the second degree and held on a \$25,000 cash-only bond, which he has since posted and been released from the Barry County Jail.

This is the second incident involving Tilford in the last two months. On March 7, Tilford was involved in property damage at a property on East County Road in Washburn.

According to the affidavit of probable cause by Barry County Deputy Terry Meek, Tilford was found crawling on the property covered in blood. Tilford had allegedly broken windows out of the building on the property as well as breaking out windows, windshield and turn signal assembly of a 2002 E-150 Ford van. The wounds on Tilford appeared to be from the broken glass.

Meek stated that Tilford "appeared to have used broken pieces of wood and large rocks to break the windows." When questioned, he admitted to having consumed vodka and whiskey throughout the day and smelled of alcohol.

The damage to the building and van were estimated to be around \$4,500, and Tilford was charged with tampering in the first degree and property damage in the first degree. A \$10,000 cash or crop. surety was issued for those crimes.

Roaring River Kids' Fishing Day May 14

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) and the Missouri Department of Natural Resources will hold Kids' Fishing Day on May 14 at Roaring River State Park. At this event, which is from 6:30 a.m. to 8:15 p.m., an area of the park will be designated as a fishing area for youths age 15 and under.

At Kids' Fishing Day, children age 15 and under can pick up free trout tags at the hatchery office any time on May 13 or all day on the day of the event. Volunteers will be available to assist the youth. Children are encouraged to bring their own fishing equipment. Parents are

welcome to assist kids, but only one pole may be used between the helper and the child. Adults are not allowed to fish by themselves. Free hotdogs, chips and soda will be available between 11 a.m. and 1 p.m.

Education is also part of Kids' Fishing Day. Throughout the day, seminars will be held on fish cleaning, fish cooking, Dutch oven cooking, taxidermy, watersheds, knot tying, fly tying and fly casting, how to fish Roaring River, stream biology and other subjects. A hatchery tour will show how trout are raised. A program on Missouri snakes will be given using live specimens. If kids attend three classes, they will be entered into a drawing for prizes. The drawing will be held at 5 p.m. Children must be present to win. Classes are also open to the whole family, but only children may enter the drawings.



move or get adopted, they are still always welcome. He said, "Once they are a Royal Family kid, they are always a Royal Family kid. They can always come back."

The camp is provided free of charge to the children who attend thanks to efforts by the volunteers. On average, 28-30 kids attend the camp each summer. At the end of it all, camp would cost around \$500 per child if there were no vol-

unteers. Now, as it stands, the organization pays a little over \$200 for each of them to attend because so much of the camp is run by volunteer efforts. Akers said, "We do have licensed counselors if they need it, but that isn't the focus."

The camp runs with a ratio of almost one adult per child to ensure they have the support that they need. Each of them receives in-house training to make sure they have the skills

they need to deal with children who have experienced abuse or neglect. Akers stated, "They also have training to identify the signs of physical abuse and also lead a child to the Lord if they feel they want to do that.

"We want the volunteers to be able to empathize with the kids, and not react in shock at any of the things they hear."

While the camp is ministry-based, children do not have to be of any religion or be religious at all to attend. All who are referred are welcomed.

"If someone wants to be a volunteer with us, we have a process that they can go through. We are always looking for people who want to help," said Akers.

Other considerations are also made, such as the camp being held in the secured location where no others are attending during the week. Akers said, "We have to make sure the kids are protected and someone doesn't find out


The public is invited to a ribbon cutting ceremony for the re-opening of the historic lodge at Roaring River State Park. The event will take place at 2 p.m. on Friday, May 6 in front of the renovated lodge and will include an open house to allow the public to view the renovations.

Began in 1936 and completed in 1938, the CCC Lodge was originally constructed by relief workers from the Works Progress Administration and is one of the eight structures in the park that are on the National Register of Historic Places. Originally, the third floor contained rooms that housed overnight guests.

The completed lodge has six units that sleep up to four and include a bedroom, kitchen and a living room. A seventh unit features a second bedroom and will sleep six. The renovated lodge also includes a meeting room with commercial kitchen on the lower level for special events. Work on the outside of the building included repairs and restoration, but did not change the rustic character of the structure.

Reservations at the lodge will be accepted for arrival starting Sunday, May 8 and will be managed by the park's concessionaire.

Gov. Jay Nixon is currently scheduled to attend the event.

How to use clouds to predict weather

Meteorologists rely on electronic equipment and their knowledge of weather patterns to provide forecasts each and every day. But weather can be unpredictable, and even the most reliable weather prognosticator can sometimes get it wrong.

Novices can try their hands at predicting the weather by interpreting the environmental signs around them.

Earth science is a part of many elementary school curriculums. Current students and adults can use what they learn or learned about cloud types and formations to determine if rain is coming or if they can leave their umbrellas at home. Clouds can say a lot about both the current weather and what's to come.

According to Weather Wiz Kids, clouds are formed from very tiny droplets of water or ice crystals. Because the droplets are so small and light, they can float in the air. The characteristics and look of clouds are dictated by temperature, height, wind, and the amount of water vapor in the air, as well as the influence of other air masses.

Clouds can say a lot about the weather, and weather prognosticators have relied on clouds for centuries to help make their predictions. Understanding clouds and what makes each cloud type unique can help amateur meteorologists impress their friends and avoid being caught in inclement weather.

- Altocumulus: These are mid-level clouds that look like a layer of white and gray cotton. The presence of these clouds may indicate rain is on the way.
- Cumulus clouds: These clouds can look like cauliflower in shape. While they're usually seen in fair weather, they can produce short spurts of rain.
- Cirrus: Cirrus clouds are high, wispy and feathery and found above 20,000 feet. Cirrus clouds can indicate that a storm system is approaching within a day or so. This may be especially true if cirrus clouds are showing tails. According to The Homeschool Scientist, seeing a few cirrus clouds in the sky means that fair weather is on the way. If they grow in number and almost cover the sky, look for rain within
- 24 hours.
 Cumulonimbus: These towering clouds are good harbingers of rainy weather. They tend to form when thunderstorms are imminent. They also may accompany strong storms that produce hail, wind and even tornadoes.
- Stratus: Low-lying, flat and gray, stratus clouds are usually seen during rain, snow or misty conditions.

Cloud watching can be an interesting hobby and a great way to grow acquainted with the workings of weather systems. Children can take chances predicting the weather based on cloud formations to see if their predictions come true.


