Monett man arrested for pharmacy theft

A Monett man is charged with breaking into Sater Pharmacy in the early morning hours of Saturday, May 5. According to the affidavits of probable cause, the Cassville Police Department was dispatched when the alarm at the pharmacy was triggered.

When Cassville officer Jeremy Thomas was dispatched to the store, it was 3:30 a.m. Upon arriving on the scene, the officer reported hearing an audible alarm sounding and the suspect inside. Bill Ray Dunbar, 34, of Monett, exited the building while officers were on site, according to the report.

Officer Thomas stated Dunbar failed to follow commands and emptied the bag he was carrying, which contained numerous medications stolen from inside the pharmacy, on the ground. Dunbar also had containers of medications and a box of syringes. Dunbar reportedly then laid on top of the pills, still refusing to follow the officer's commands.

While on the ground, the officer observed Dunbar ingest multiple unidentified pills before taking to his feet and running from the scene.

Barry County deputies assisted in capturing Dunbar and placing him in custody. There was also damage to the back door of the pharmacy where Dunbar broke in.

Dunbar is charged with burglary in the second degree, possession of a controlled substance, stealing a controlled substance, resisting arrest for a felony and property damage in the first degree. He is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$75,000 cash-only bond.

Driver airlifted after hitting tree outside of Purdy

A Mt. Vernon driver was airlifted after a wreck outside of Purdy on Sunday evening. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, the driver went off the road and hit a tree.

Makenzie H. McDonald, 22, of Mt. Vernon, was driving on Farm Road 1156 five miles east of Purdy when she crashed her 2007 Chevrolet Silverado pickup.

The crash occurred around 8:14 p.m. on May 6. McDonald was airlifted from the scene and taken to Cox Hospital in Springfield for serious injuries.

She was wearing a seat belt at the time of the crash.

The Silverado was totalled and towed from the scene by Brice's Towing, of Cassville.

Local attorney seeks help in aiding defrauded church

A Cassville attorney is working to get the community together to help a local church who say they were defrauded by a contractor. Carr Lane Baptist Church hired the contractor to make multiple repairs, including new siding, a handicapped ramp and a handicapped parking area, but they say he never delivered on that contract and their church was left in a state of disrepair and various stages of construction.

Karen Pounds, treasurer of Carr Lane Baptist, said the church paid a contractor out of Buffalo around \$10,000 to complete the work, but over time, he stopped returning their phone calls. He asked for more money but wasn't completing the work.

Eventually, Pounds said the church told him they would be seeking legal advice. She said, "We told him we might seek legal advice. And he said he would take out a lien against the church because we owed him money. After that, we just stopped trying to talk to him, because he kept getting upset with us."

Pounds laid out the timeline of their interaction with the contractor they say took advantage of them, J.D. (Jonathan) Crowl, of KyCrete & Construction in Buffalo.

She said, "He put in a bid for doing all the siding and putting in a handicapped ramp and handicapped parking area. We all went over the bids. Jonathan said the bid was \$13,500. He said to pay \$6,000 up front to get all the materials he needed. And for that, he would pull the siding off and put it all

back in. He said he wouldn't ask for any more money until he had it all done: the ramp, the siding and all that."

However, Pounds said that isn't how it went. The project was to be billed in three different tiers of the project, and she said Crowl kept coming to them for more money.

She said, "He said he needed more money. He'd told us he'd made a deal with [a cement company], and if we went ahead and paid up front for phase two, he would have them do all of the cement at a discount. He had no siding done and no ramp done. The next installment was \$3,750, and he said he would get all the cement in all in one day and it would be cheaper."

Pounds said they gave him the next \$3,750, but it wasn't long before he was asking for more.

She said, "He said he needed another \$1,700 to do the ramp again and the pad out front. We told him we'd already given him the \$3,750 for the cement. He said the cement truck was coming but he didn't have the money to pay for it.

"We told him we'd pay

the cement truck, but we weren't giving the money for him."

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Pounds said the cement never came. Eventually, she said she called the company he claimed to have a contract with for the cement, but they claimed Crowl had cancelled the delivery. Pounds said as time went on, his story unravelled more and more.

From asking for them to pay his employees when he wasn't there to demanding more money and not showing up when he said he would, Pounds said it was one thing after another.

Eventually, they gave up and contacted an attorney.

When Crowl was called for a comment regarding the allegations against him, the phone number on his business card was not connected.

Members of the Carr Lane Baptist Church then approached local attorney Blake Fields, owner of the Law Office of Blake B. Fields LLC, in Cassville, hoping Fields would be able to file a civil case against Crowl.

However, Fields said he wasn't willing to file a case, even though a civil

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Cosper's name added to Law Enforcement Memorial in Jeff City

Fallen Barry County officer Carl Cosper, Jr., was honored in a state-wide ceremony last week. Master Sergeant Cosper's name was added to the Missouri Law Enforcement Memorial in Jefferson City, which bears the name of every officer who has lost his life in the line of duty in the state.

Cosper and three other officers were added to the memorial in a ceremony with special guest speaker Governor Eric Greitens. At the ceremony, Greitens said, "Each day, a select brave few Missourians put on body armor, leave their homes, and risk their lives to protect their fellow citizens and make our streets safer. Today, we honor whose who never made it home; those who courageously and selflessly made the ultimate sacrifice in service to others. We will never forget the examples

they set or the families they left behind."

At the ceremony on Saturday, May 5, Cosper was one of two sheriff's deputies honored along with two police officers. One officer's name placed on the plaque was killed in 1917.

Before the ceremony on Saturday, there was a candlelight vigil for all of the officers who have died in the line of duty in the state of Missouri.

Drew Juden, director of the Department of Public Safety, said, "There is no nobler career than law enforcement, and the heroes we honor today were the best among us. We will always remember the lives they lived, the values they died protecting. We stand with and support their survivors, who will always remain part of our Missouri law enforcement family."

The names added during Saturday's ceremony

were:

- Carl T. Cosper, 56, Barry County Sheriff's Deputy. Cosper's end of watch was April 7, 2017. He was with the Barry County Sheriff's Department for ten years and in law enforcement for 23 years. Cosper was killed in a vehicle crash on the way to a domestic disturbance.
- Gary L. Michael, Jr., 37, Clinton Police Department. Michael was a law enforcement officer for 14 months and was with the Clinton Police Department for less than a year. Michael was shot and killed after getting out of his vehicle during a routine traffic stop. The shooter had a rifle and fired immediately after Michael got out of his vehicle on August 6, 2017.
- Kevin M. Dziejma, 64, Village of Miramiguoa Police Department. Dziejma died of a heart attack on May 18, 2015, while conducting warrant

checks as part of a traffic stop. Dziejma was with the Miramiguoa Department for four years and was in law enforcement for seven years.

• Edward E. Culver, 60, Platte County Sheriff's Office. Culver was killed on June 23, 1917, while he and another deputy attempted to break up an altercation at a saloon. The suspect disarmed the other officer and shot Culver in the chest, however, Culver shot the suspect and killed him, despite his wounds. Culver had been with the Platte County Sheriff's Office for

four years.

The Missouri Law Enforcement Memorial Foundation was created in 1985 to raise funds to construct a memorial. It was then dedicated in 1994. The memorial is located on the State Capitol grounds.

Truck-motorcycle crash results in injuries for driver

White, 50, of Seligman, was driving a 1996 Kawasaki motorcycle west bound on Route F, about a mile west of Roaring River. A 2014 Nissan Altima, driven by Rodney L. Ozbun, 19, of Eagle Rock, was headed eastbound and preparing to turn into a private drive. The Nissan was on the wrong side of the road, and struck the motorcycle, ejecting White.

White was transported

to Mercy Hospital in Rogers, Ark., for serious injuries. He was wearing a helmet at the time of the crash.

Ozbun had no reported injuries at the time of the crash.

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

Shiveley steps down after 20 years of volunteering at school library

For the past 20 years, Diane Shiveley has been a volunteer with the Cassville Schools library. However, this year will be her last year, and she's hoping someone else will fill her shoes.

Shiveley said that her presence at the library one day a week at the school started coincidentally. She shared, "I went to church with Donna Lawson, who was the primary librarian at the time. We were in a singing group at the time, and I had some things to take her. When I went to the school to take her them to her, she had so much on her desk that I couldn't see her. She was back behind all of it.

"So, when I asked her if she wanted some help once a week or so, she said, 'Yes!"

Since then, Shiveley has volunteered one day a week at the school's library and pulls extra duty at the school dur-

ing the two book fairs in the spring and the fall. Shiveley said, "They taught me so much I never wanted to quit."

Over the years, Shive-ley's duties have been shelving books, processing new books and making repairs to damaged items. Then, of course, she runs errands when needed. She also runs a register during the book fairs in the spring and fall. She said, "I'm there all week for those. I run the registers so the teachers are able to go help parents. I'm not as up on the books, so I run the register and stay out of the way."

When she first started, she volunteered at the primary library, which at that time was kindergarten through fifth grades. Eventually, she moved up to the intermediate building. She said, "When we built the new building, I helped them load up and move. Lots of people volunteered to move

the whole library up to the intermediate."

She's been at the intermediate since, mostly recently with librarian Sandy Fitzpatrick.

Shiveley said the switch from the card catalog to a digital system was the biggest change. She said, "The biggest change is when everything went on the computer. I remember down in the old library when we had the big beautiful card cabinets. We discarded all of those cards because we didn't need those anymore. Now you put a barcode on the back and scan them."

After 20 years, Shiveley said as much as she loves volunteering, it is time for her to step down. She said, "It's time.

I'm getting older and my bones are creaking and my hands are hurting. I love it, and if I were ten years younger, I'd do it another ten years. I feel like someone younger needs to come in and help. I pray someone does."

Fitzpatrick is also retiring at the end of this school year, as is her library aide, Robin Stockton. She said Fitzpatrick leaving did impact her decision to step back from her self-appointed duties. "I thought it's a good break. I worked with her for so long, and I'm happy for her. It was good timing."

Overall, she said the teachers were what she would miss most not being at the school each week. "I'll miss all the teachers. They are so nice to me and we have so much fun. I may have to go back on Thursdays just to have lunch with them." She added, "And Eric White has been so sweet to me, too. He's been really nice."

The big question was why did Shiveley continue to volunteer at the school for so many years. She answered, "They appreciate any volunteer so much, and they love you so much, I love that. I love the fact that I can help Sandy Fitzpatrick in any little way so she can teach her class and focus on that. I can go catch up the little things, and I just feel like I'm helping. I love to be a help to someone."

with tea pots and candles, really completing the theme.

Both the Martha Circle and the church's other women's group, the Tabitha Circle, work together to decorate the space, prepare the food and model the clothing.

Craddock said this year's fashions came from Dress Barn in Branson. In prior years, local women's clothing shops in Cassville have offered up clothing for the group to model.

One woman is 92 years old and has modeled every year since the style shows began. Each of the ten models wears two different outfits during the event.

Craddock said, "There usually are an average of 125 to 150 ladies who attend. The men, usually 10 to 12, of the church volunteer to serve the food." Craddock added the quality of the food is usually a big draw for attendees, "The menu is always planned and prepared by several of the women. This year, the menu was chicken salad on a lettuce leaf, croissant and butter, strawberry soup and carrot cake. All the food is prepared from scratch."

From start to finish, the show is exciting, fun and provides an opportunity for women in the community to come together, enjoy each other's company, sample good food and see new fashions of the season.

There are also door prizes drawn during the show for those in attendance. Craddock said the gifts inside the gift bags are usually items like candles, kitchen towels, cosmetics or other small gifts. She said, "We have enough door prizes for almost every guest to win a door prize."

Thanks to the volunteers who put it together, the \$8 ticket price helps to support the church's various missions throughout the year. Craddock said, "Funds are for the mission project our church supports. That's what the women's groups purpose is: to support missions.

"We also sponsor several local groups like Camp Barnabas, Barry County Youth Camp, and Cassville Schools in addition to the missions the Methodist church supports."

To attend next year's event, contact All Faith. The style show is usually held the first weekend in May.





Monett man charged in domestic assaults

A Monett man was arrested and charged with domestic assault after allegedly causing serious injuries to his wife in a dispute. Kenneth White, 30, of Monett, is charged with domestic assault in the second degree and domestic assault in the fourth degree to attacks on his wife and father-in-law.

case would be the appropriate path. "Most of the time, a breech of contract is a civil suit, not a criminal one. However, when they described to me his resources, it was clear I was suing someone who couldn't pay a judgment. My concern was that the church would end up with an I.O.U. and no one to pay it."

After researching Crowl, Fields said court records indicated that he was in jail when he tried to contact him. Crowl was arrested on unrelated charges and was released on May 4, according to court records.

It was at that point that Fields decided to take action to help the church members through community support instead of the legal system.

He shared, "I decided to help them in another way. I talked to my church about getting volunteers and contacted local papers to see if we can get more people to be aware of what happened and come forward to help out. I've also started collecting money for them. So far, I have \$520 in donations."

Pounds said they were appreciative that Fields was willing to help, even if it wasn't legally. She said, "We think it's wonderful. It's just a blessing. It's amazing to have people come together to help out like that."

He said, "Their concern is two-fold. It is missing all the siding and there are holes punched in the insulation. It's a mess. They did sub-par work on what they did do and never finished it. They have a church just sitting there, exposed, and they need help."

Pounds said they estimate it would take a single person two solid weeks to do all the work that remains after their contractor stopped work.

What was done, Pounds said, was not done properly. "The majority of the time, Jonathan wouldn't show up and he would make excuses. The times he did put any siding on, he put it on wrong and wouldn't con-

nect it to anything, which would void our warranty."

Slowly, church members have been working to fix what was left in shambles. However, with such a small church, they don't have many people to do the work. Pounds said, "We're trying to get the siding put up and the parking area fixed for the handicapped. Right now, it's not very good. We have a 91 year old woman who pushes her son in a wheelchair across the lot and up the ramp. It's hard on her. She's an amazing woman.

"We have another with a walker who can't hardly get around. We really needed the parking lot fixed for them.

"We've got some of the siding put up. Three of us have been working together to get it done."

Fields is hoping that with the community aware of what happened to the church, more people will step in and help. He said, "The reality is, I don't like seeing people get taken advantage of. I particularly don't like it because it's a church. The idea of someone taking advantage of a church, especially one who was trying to help out the handicapped members of their congregation. I thought certainly I could do something to help them.

"I always try to help out anyone who comes into my office, most of that time is on the law side. But sometimes, it's a better fit to come together as a community."

Fields said he is organizing help for the church. To volunteer time or make a donation, contact his office at (417) 847-999.

Fields added, "Skilled, unskilled, it doesn't matter. We need people who are capable of swinging a hammer and have a desire to help."

Fields has a work day set up next week on Tuesday, May 15, running from noon until around 5 p.m. when he and his office staff are going to Carr Lane Baptist Church to help work. Anyone willing to help is welcome.

Carr Lane Baptist Church is located ten miles south of Shell Knob, one quarter mile west of Highways 39/86 in Carr Lane Junction.



Cassville authors to host book signings on May 17

Two Cassville authors, Susan Eschbach and Linda Sartin, will host a book signing event on May 17 from 6:30 p.m. to 8 p.m. in Suite 8 of the Show-Me

Eschbach's book, A Trial By Error, which she describes as "science fiction with a side of murder mystery," was released in March of this year by Oghma Creative Media and

is available on Amazon.com and barnesandnoble.com. The second book in The Fringe Cycle series, Man On The Fringe, is scheduled for release in October 2018.

In A Trial By Error, Dahvin Tave is shot down by galactic enforcers on the fringe of the Milky Way and hauled to a planet he's never been to and charged with the murder of a man he's never met. As the investigation unfolds, Dahvin must face his own dark, terrifying past. He discovers he not only knew the man, he found the body. Is he innocent, or guilty?

"It's been a lot of hard work, but also a lot of fun," says Eschbach. "I've learned so much along the way, and made so many great friends."

Eschbach grew up in Kansas City and lived in Fayetteville, Arkansas, before moving to Cassville in 1999. Her writing career began in elementary school when she had a 4-H club column in a Johnson County, Kansas, monthly newspaper. Her journalistic writing continued through high school and college and came in handy for several jobs, including writing for The Cassville Democrat from 2001 to 2007. She embarked on her first novel in 2008 at the insistence of her close friend Linda Sartin and members of the Mid South Writers Group. Eschbach says she was convinced writing fiction would be easy because of her background in journalism. "Boy, was I ever wrong. It only took eight years to get it right."

Sartin's book, Bound By Honor, a science-fictionromance, was published in November 2017 by Oghma Creative Media. It is the first book in her Bonds of Honor trilogy. She also has a novela, "Acqeli," a prequel to the trilogy released in April and available only in electronic format. Both books are available on Amazon.com and barnesandnoble.com. Sartin's book is also available for sale in Cassville at Westco Home Furnishings, BBQ Station, and The Edmondson Law Firm, P.C.

Sartin writes under the pen name Rose Sartin. In Bound By Honor, a young doctor, Amber Donovan, is kidnapped by Rhyel, a Guardian of New Centallus, to assist their women, who are experiencing unexplained miscarriages. Donovan fights her situation at first, but eventually learns to respect the proud men of New Centallus, and to love the very man who kidnapped her. Aqueli tells the history of the black crystal that led to the destruction of Rhyel's home planet, the original Centallus. Discovered centuries before, it bears the secret of a terrible weapon that led to the destruction of two different planets.

Sartin's writing interest in science fiction is far from her country roots. She was born in Illinois, raised in Iowa, and has spent most of her life in the Missouri Ozarks. She and her late husband, Gary, built several businesses together as beekeepers, leathercrafters,

and managers/tour guides in a show cave. Sartin is also proficient with the mountain dulcimer, preforming in radio, television, and documentaries. Today, she lives on an Ozark ridgetop that overlooks the Mark Twain National Forest.

Both authors will be present at the book signing to talk about their writing experiences, answer questions, and autograph books.





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Lady Eagles claim district softball championship

The Purdy Lady Eagles won another district softball championship on Friday afternoon, defeating conference rival Southwest 9-5. Purdy's Hallie Henderson pitched six scoreless innings before Southwest broke through for five runs in the game's final at-bat.

The Barry County Soroptimist Club also awarded the Cassville Education Fund with \$1,000 that was funded by the clubs March 13 event, Taco Tuesday



Missouri's spring turkey season ends with nearly 35,800 birds harvested

Preliminary data from the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) shows that turkey hunters checked 34,055 birds during Missouri's 2018 regular spring turkey season April 16 through May 6. Top harvest counties were Franklin with 760 birds checked, Texas with 732, and Laclede with 657. Young turkey hunters harvested 1,729 birds during the 2018 spring youth season, April 7-8, bringing the overall 2018 spring turkey harvest to 35,784.

Barry County hunters took 146 total: 132 adult gobblers, 13 juvenile gobblers and 1 bearded hen.

This year's harvest total is down 17% from last year's overall spring turkey harvest of 43,339 birds.

MDC Turkey Biologist Jason Isabelle indicates that a drop in harvest was not unexpected given the poor production in recent years.

"We've had very poor production the last two years," said Isabelle. "This resulted in fewer two-year-old gobblers and a lot fewer jakes this year."

He noted that it is common for jakes to make up over a quarter of the spring harvest following years of good production. The last two years, however, jakes have made up just 13% and 15% of the har-

"Low numbers of jakes in the spring harvest the past couple years just confirms what we learned from our summer brood survey; we've dealt with some very poor hatches in recent years," said Isabelle.

In addition to poor production, Isabelle added that less than ideal conditions during the youth season and opening day of the regular season impacted this year's harvest as well.

"Winter-like conditions made for a tough start to the season," he said. In addition to

its effect on hunting, Isabelle notes that the late spring also impacted the timing of turkey flock break-up and nesting this year. "The recent poor production and this year's late spring made for a challenging 2018 spring season." He indicated that he has corresponded with several colleagues in neighboring states that reported lower spring harvests this year as well.

With the hunting season over, Isabelle and other MDC staff have been preparing for the summer brood survey which is used to determine the success of the hatch. Isabelle is hoping turkey production will reverse its current trajectory.

"Unfortunately, hatches have reduced turkey numbers in many areas of the state," said Isabelle. He notes that fluctuations in turkey numbers are to be expected. "We're going through a tough stretch right now like we did during the late 2000s. Because nest success and poult survival are the primary drivers of turkey population trends, we're going to need some better production to help numbers rebound."

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) encourages homeowners and landscapers to avoid planting Callery pear trees this spring.

Better known as Bradford pears, the Callery pear tree is an invasive species known to multiply quickly and crowd out Missouri native plants. While it's been a popular landscaping tree for decades, cultivated forms have spread aggressively throughout the state.

"Different varieties of Bradford pear trees were planted close to each other, which allowed them to cross pollinate and take over natural areas," said Forestry Field Program Supervisor Russell Hinnah. "But they're also a poor landscaping choice because

they don't do well in storms, often losing limbs or splitting apart."

Stopping the spread means selecting alternate trees for yards and forested property.

"The best plan is to select a native species to Missouri, and there are several great options," said Hinnah. "Serviceberry trees produce similar showy white blooms in the spring and have small red fruits that attract wildlife."

Eastern redbuds and Missouri's state tree, the flowering dogwood, are also good alternatives. The redbud tree grows quickly with eye-catching lavender flowers in the spring.

Dogwoods do best in shady areas but can be somewhat difficult to grow.



Barry County has been chosen to receive \$11,907 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county. The selection was made by a National board

that is chaired by the U.S. Department of Homeland Security's Federal Emergency Management Agency

and consists of representatives from American Red Cross; Catholic Charities, USA; National Council of the Churches of Christ in the USA; The Jewish Federations of North America; the Salvation Army; and United Way Worldwide. The local board was charged to distribute funds appropriated by Congress to help expand the capacity of food and shelter programs in high-need areas around the country.

A local board will determine how the funds awarded to OACAC are to be distributed among the emergency food and shelter programs run by local service agencies in the area. The local board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds made available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive funds must: 1) be private ,voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) be eligible to receive federal funds, 3) have an accounting system, 4) practice nondiscrimination, 5) have demonstrated the capability to deliver emergency food/or shelter programs, and 6) if they are a private, voluntary organization, have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.
