After an unfortunate discovery Monday morning, Cassville's Boy Scout Troop 76 is asking for the community's help in looking for their stolen trailer which was filled with camping equipment.

According to Troop 76's assistant scoutmaster Bill

everything; he didn't think anything of it." The trailer did not have any decals or information that would indicate it was a Boy Scout trailer.

The trailer is a red 8 foot by 12 foot enclosed trailer manufactured by Shadow Grand with two doors on the back and one door on the right side. It also has a top rack on it. The trailer's license plate number is 52E-9WN.

Sims said, "We use that trailer at least four or five times a year. We have summer camp coming up in June, and it's going to be really inconvenient without our trailer. But we'll still go. We're going to borrow the Pack trailer and, between everybody, we'll pull enough stuff together to be able to go."

Inside, the trailer was stocked with lanterns, propane stoves, sleeping bags, and plenty of gear for their troop, which is comprised of six boys between the ages of 12 and 13.

Sims said, "The boys asked me what we were going to do, and I told the boys don't worry about it. We'll persevere. That's what we do."

Troop 76 is moving on, still holding out hope that the trailer will be found, but in the meantime, they are asking the community for help in case it isn't recovered. They have released a full list of gear that was inside of the trailer and are also seeking monetary contributions to help purchase a new one if it isn't found.

Sims said, "We might have to do some fundraising to afford another trailer, but we'll get there eventually."

Cassville Fire Department acquires ladder truck

For the first time, the Cassville Fire Department has a ladder truck that is being added to the existing truck fleet. The 75 foot ladder truck, a 2000 E-One, was purchased after the Cassville Fire Protection District Board placed a bid of \$84,000 on it following the suggestion of district personnel. The truck traveled to the Department all the way from California from the Stanilaus Consolidated Fire District in Riverside.

While it will still be a bit of time before the department is able to use the truck, it will be an asset to them. Administrator Chuck Miner said the truck won't be utilized until it is fully equipped and the firefighters are trained on its use. The equipment is expected to take up to six weeks to be received. Miner said, "It could be taken out right now, it's a functional truck, but we

would have to equip it from the other apparatus. It will have all of its own equipment by mid-summer."

Firefighters began training last week, but it will have more detailed training soon. The volunteers will continue to train with the truck once it is in operation with the department,.

The E-One joins two brush fire trucks, three engines, three water tanker trucks and a technical rescue trailer for water rescues and building collapse rescues at the two fire stations.

Cassville Chief Millard Andrews said, "Having another apparatus that can deliver a high volume of water and other capabilities will further improve our mission of providing life safety services in the Cassville area."

Before the district decided on a truck, two district personnel travelled to River-

A Cassville driver was injured after a tree fell in the roadway on Farm Road 2180 near Cassville.

According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, Andrew R. Adkins, 22, of Cassville, was driving eastbound on Farm Road 2180 about a mile east of Cassville in a 1997 Ford F150. Around 4:40 a.m. on Thursday, May 19, he struck a tree that had fallen into the roadway.

Adkins, who was wearing a seat belt, was transported to Mercy Hospital of Cassville via ambulance for moderate injuries. The truck was moderately damaged and towed from the scene by Brice's Towing, of Cassville.

Cassville High School recognizes top graduating seniors

Graduation ceremonies brought a lot of joy and excitement to 140 graduates and their families, but Cassville School also inducted the first class for the district into the Cum Laude academic system.

"On behalf of the Cassville R-IV Board of Education, administration and faculty, it is my pleasure to introduce those students who have earned academic recognition within the Cum Laude system.

"These students have acknowledged their own personal goals and within this academic system they no longer compete against each other for just 10 individual spots of recognition," said Dr. Asbill. The Cum Laude System and the Cassville R-IV School Board established the academic standards and students maintained their own personal goals of achieving those standards. John Sullivan, Board President, commented, "The opportunity to recognize 55 students for academic excellence is outstanding and we now get to honor more students and their families for efforts made within academic achievement."

Mr. Swadley explained the three tiers of achievement within the academic system. Students who completed a minimum of seven successful semesters of high school, earned 25 credits, and earned a 3.50 or above GPA are awarded the bronze Cum Laude medal. Students who completed a minimum of seven successful semesters of high school, earned 25 credits, and earned a 3.70 or above GPA are awarded the silver Magna Cum Laude medal. Students who completed eight successful semesters of high school, earned 27 credits, including three specified core electives, and earned a 3.90 or above GPA are awarded the gold Summa Cum Laude medal.

What you may not realize is the impressive selection of food and drinks available, and the dedication the new owners have to maintaining entertainment and great meal specials.

Rocky Ridge is a restaurant and bar that many people in the community recognize by name, but under new owners, the eatery and watering hole has undergone some serious changes. Mike and Lois Rush took over Rocky Ridge on September 9, 2016, and they've been working toward many improvements ever since.

Besides a fresh coat of paint and some deep cleaning, they also added a beautiful stage and sound system, a new menu, and plenty of activities slated throughout the week to keep guests coming back.

Purdy ends Lincoln's perfect season in semifinals, fall in State Championship match

The last undefeated team is gone, and Purdy's first trip to the championship game is on.

The Purdy Lady Eagles crushed Lincoln's undefeated championship hopes in the second semifinal of the MSHSAA Spring Softball Championships at Killian Park in Springfield on Saturday, flying past the Lady Cardinals, 3-0. Earlier, Strafford downed Kennett, 2-0, to set up a rematch with Purdy in Sunday's title game.

With half of the Final Four field less than an hour from Springfield, fans from Kennett, Lincoln, Purdy, and Strafford pushed the seating capacity to the limits for Saturday's games. This is just the fourth year that MSHSAA has awarded championships in Spring Softball. The championships were first held at Three Rivers Community College in Poplar Bluff before moving to the Killian Sports Complex, the home of the Missouri State University Lady Bears, in 2016.

Postponed from Friday night, when tornado sirens replaced the cheering crowds in northeast Springfield, the two semifinal games provided plenty of action and drama. But not a lot of scoring.

The Kennett Lady Indians only managed five baserunners while falling to the Strafford Lady Indians in the early contest. Strafford's offense wasn't much better: their first run came as a first-inning gift when Kennett's catcher threw the ball off the reservation with the bases loaded.

Strafford earned an insurance run in the bottom of the sixth inning. A bunt single, a double, and an RBI groundout by Hayley Frank created the final score of 2-0.

Preparation and execution have been the trademarks of this Purdy squad throughout the postseason. From scouting the opposition and making crucial adjustments in defensive alignments, to the Tom Brady-like playcard that Hallie Henderson uses to review her pitching plan from the circle, Coach Lori Videmschek has been one step ahead of the opposition. But all that planning is worthless unless the players execute.

Execute they have. Like a guillotine.

In six playoff games, Purdy has allowed just 2 runs while piling up 58 of their own.

Led by decorated senior pitcher Sloan Swearingin, Lincoln had vanquished every foe. The only close shave for Lincoln came in the first game of the season, a 6-5 nailbiter over Green Ridge.

Swearingin posted a season-high 14 strikeouts in Lincoln's 10-2 quarterfinal win over Kingsville. Her complete mastery of playoff opponents begged the question, "Can Purdy score against Lincoln?"

Purdy did score. Not a lot by Purdy standards, but enough. Because when Purdy pitcher Hallie Henderson is at the top of her game, one run is usually enough.

Henderson outdueled Swearingin, 10 Ks to 4, and the Purdy defense was far superior to Lincoln's. There are no weak sisters in the Purdy defensive alignment, and the girls in black had Henderson's back, committing only one error in the shutout victory.



After both teams went down in order in the initial inning, Purdy manufactured a run in the second with some daring baserunning. Rion Boyd led off with a flare single to the grass in right field, then advanced to second base when Casey Ellison grounded into a fielder's choice. Sami House struck out, but Boyd swiped third base on a mental lapse by the Lincoln infield. It was a huge gamble that paid big dividends.


Swearingin had an 0-2 pitch count against Mikey Schad, but the Purdy first baseman patiently held up on the next offering for a 1-2 count. Swearingin tried to nibble the outside corner with her next pitch, but the ball skipped away from the catcher and Boyd raced home for the go-ahead score.

Boyd's brave baserunning

boosted Purdy to a 1-0 lead.

Henderson had complete control of her pitching repertoire. Purdy's ace calmly studied her wristband playbook between hitters, looking more like she was ordering appetizers than selecting pitches in the biggest game of her career to that point. Her accurate, deliberate deliver ies resulted in 8 strikeouts in the first three innings.
