Drug Court receives grant to expand access, services across 39th Judicial Circuit

FUNDS WILL INCREASE SERVICES FOR TREATMENT COURTS IN STONE, BARRY AND LAWRENCE COUNTIES

Adult Treatment Courts in the 39th Judicial Circuit will have increased capacity and services starting this year thanks to a nearly \$2 million grant. Chrissy Fortner, Treatment Court Administrator for the 39th Judicial Circuit, announced that the circuit was one of 20 programs across the nation to receive a grant from the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, part of the US Department of Health and Human Services.

These funds will allow the adult drug treatment courts in Stone, Barry and Lawrence counties to serve a total of 400

people over the five year span of the grant.

The new funds will allow more repeat felony offenders with substance use disorder (SUD), who also meet other criteria at screening to enter the treatment court program. The grant will increase access to medical preventative services, dentistry, recovery housing, Hepatitis/HIV testing and other treatments.

"The funding will enable Stone, Lawrence and Barry counties to serve more people and continue improving our programs," said Judge Alan Blankenship, who oversees the Stone County treatment court programs.

Historically, drug treatment courts have been shown to be more effective than other "Treatment interventions. court is not only more effective than prison, but it is also substantially cheaper," said Blankenship.

According to Stone County Treatment courts, the average cost to the state per participant is \$4,400. This contrasts sharply to the cost of incarceration of approximately \$26,000 per

Graduates of the treatment court program are also far less likely to re-enter the justice system.

Cassville Schools begins Vision 150 projects

During the General Municipal Election on April 2, voters in the Cassville school district elected to pass Cassville's Vision 150 no-tax increase bond. Cassville voters elected to pass the bond by a margin of 74.71, and after the bonds were sold following the board of education meeting in May, the bond measure generated \$4.1 million for the purposes of making renovations to the various facilities within the district.

"After the election, the board took several different initial steps to initiate those project priorities with our teachers and our community, as well as the architect and our construction manager," said Dr. Richard Asbill, superintendent of Cassville Schools. "We're going ahead moving forward with all of our tentative plans that we had identified as part of Vision 150."

According to Asbill, the main focuses of the project have always been the construction of a new early childhood development center, renovations to the electrical system, general renovations to the school's "vintage wing," and updates to school playgrounds.

In order to facilitate these projects, the board of education elected work with Paragon Architecture, of Springfield. The board also elected to work with Branco Enterprises, a construction company with offices in both Neosho and Springfield, for their construction planning.

Asbill went on to explain that, due to the nature and

Chamber director hired as CCF director

Rachael Selby Freeman wears her fair share of hats. Currently, she serves as the director of the Cassville Chamber of Commerce, a role that she took over in since October 2017. Starting this month, she adds another title on top of her duties as chamber director: director of the Cassville Community Foundation (CCF).

The foundation exists as something of a middle-man for private citizens who want to donate money to their community but don't want the hassle associated with donating money as a private citizen.

"It's a way to relieve people of the financial hassle of donating and dealing with the IRS," said Selby Freeman. "It's a way for people to leave money for the community and know that it's always going to be there and know that there's a board designed to use it for the community."

The Cassville Community Foundation is under the direction and umbrella of Community Foundation of the Ozarks, based in Springfield. Both organizations manage various endowment funds, donated by members of the community and use the interest generated by those endowment funds to put money back into the community in the form of grants.

cidivism is less than 20%. According to the Missouri Department of Corrections, the average rate of recidivism for individuals released from prison is 60%.

"This grant award will now give the courts in the 39th Circuit the level of assurance that we can function for a significant period of time into the future. The circuit's track record of success and the people behind that success made this grant award possible," said Judge Johnnie Cox, who oversees treatment courts in Barry County.

This is the fifth consecutive grant awarded to the 39th Circuit since 2010. The \$1,999,965 grant is one of only 20 awarded in the United States. "This was a highly competitive grant," said Fortner, who wrote the grant along with Dr. Vickie Luttrell, professor of psychology, and Dr. Jana Bufkin, associate professor of criminology. Luttrell and Bufkin will also serve as project evaluators. During a recent graduation ceremony, Judge Blankenship shared the news of the grant with those in attendance. "Thank you, Chrissy," he said.

"This funding will expand Adult Treatment Drug Court capacity to increase the number of high-risk, high-need offenders receiving SUD treatment, mental health treatment, primary health care services and temporary housing assistance," said Fortner.

"Because of growing demand, we have exceeded our circuit-wide admission goals every year since 2010," she said.

Judges and staff throughout the circuit have emphasized the impact that treatment courts have on those who successfully complete the program. "The program strives to increase the personal, familial and societal accountability of offenders with substance use disorder and utilizes evidencebased strategies to ensure success," said Fortner.

"The funding allows our treatment courts to effectively integrate evidence-based substance abuse treatment,

mandatory drug testing, sanctions and incentives and transitional services in judicially supervised court settings that have jurisdiction over offenders to reduce recidivism and substance abuse," said Judge Scott Sifferman, who oversees treatment courts in Lawrence County.

2019 is the 15th year for treatment court programs in Stone County. The Stone County Adult Drug Treatment Court is also one of eight national mentor courts, providing training and support to new programs across the country.

Barry County drug court is now in its 11th year. This is also the 8th year of treatment court for Lawrence County.

Exeter moves on city hall relocation, equipment purchases

During the Exeter City Council's regular meeting on Wednesday, May 15, council members made several moves that will affect city business moving forward.

This meeting marked the first meeting in Exeter's new City Hall, the stand alone building next to the previous City Hall. The new facility features a secure entrance, with the city clerk seated behind a window in a lobby that is the only freely accessible point to the public. Behind the secure door that leads to the heart of the building are offices for various city officials, as well as a kitchenette that leads to the council chamber. The council chamber and kitchenette also act as the city's courtroom and court lobby.

Exeter city council previously voted to enter into rent-to-own agreement with the building's owner Thomas (Rob) Sorensen, during a council meeting on March 27. Before moving into the facility, the council paid a \$5,000 down payment hall is \$907 a month.

The first change involves The Dean's Honor Roll law enforcement. Recent with Exeter Police Chief Wil-

lie Stephens, which was approved. Phillips, a post-certified peace officer, will work free hours riding along with Stephens. Once Phillips receives the appropriate training patrolling in town, he will be added to the list of Exeter's reserve officers.

During the meeting, the council also opened and ruled on sealed bids for the surplus Dodge Charger, which previously served as the city's patrol vehicle. The 2009 Dodge Charger was deemed too costly to fix by the council due to structural and motor damage.

Two bids were received for \$300 and \$500. The council opted to take the larger offer, awarding the vehicle to Exeter Police Chief Willie Stephens for the amount of

The council recently purchased a new patrol vehicle for Exeter. The vehicle, a 2016 Ford Explorer, cost the city \$8,900 to purchase.

At the meeting, the council opened sealed bids from parties interested in providing police decals for the car. The city received two bids, one in the amount of \$460 from Country Mama and another from John Hilburn in the amount of \$290. The council moved to accept the bid from Hilburn due to its preferable price and design aesthetic.

The council also ruled in favor of the purchase of a set of new blades and bolts for the city's backhoe-mounted cutter for approximately

Finally, the council heard an appeal from Exeter court clerk Marissa Robbins. Robbins stated that court's current scheduled meetings every other month was insufficient to process the number of infractions and civil cases that pass through the city's court. Heeding Robbins' claims, the council moved to hold court every month with payment reviews to be heard on one month and traffic tickets to be dealt with the next month.

Additionally, Robbins stated, due to the size of the public meeting room in the new city hall facility, some court attendees are kept in a separate room behind the public meeting area. In order to cut down on confusion caused by the people in the other room missing the

judge's opening statements on hearing procedure, Robbins asked that the council purchase a \$54 two-way intercom system. The council approved the purchase of the intercom.

funds, according to Selby Freeman.

Organizations that have benefited from these interest grants include: Cassville R-IV Backpack Program, the Barry County Youth Camp, the Cassville YMCA and the Cassville Fire Department.

Last year, the Cassville Community Foundation donated approximately \$9,000 in grants to the community.

Selby Freeman stated that this new role will see her working within the community to spread the word of the CCF as an option to those looking to donate.

"My role is to raise awareness in the community that it's an option for people if they're estate planning and want to donate to the community," said Selby Freeman.

Selby Freeman continued, saying that accepting this new position will not cause any conflict with her current role as chamber director. The Cassville Community Foundation currently works out of the chamber office located on Main Street in Cassville, meaning Selby Freeman can do both jobs without having to divide her time between locations.

"I'm going to wear both hats, but a lot of it goes together," said Selby Freeman. "I've already been on the community foundation board for the past three years, so I'm working with a lot of the same people in the community."

Selby Freeman went on to explain that the CCF board's decision to allow her to transition in to the role was made because of her prior work with the community foundation as a board member, chamber director and a board member of the Cassville Education Fund.

Poker Run to benefit Barry County Fair

On Saturday, June 1, the Barry County Fair is hosting its first annual Poker Run in Cassville. The event will begin at 1 p.m.

This Poker Run will see drivers travel to five different stops in various parts of the county, each time choosing a card out of a bag from a dealer at that location. The dealer will then write down that information and sign it to prove its authenticity. The winner of the event is the driver who arrives at the final location with the best hand.

Entry in to the competition is \$20 per player and \$15 per extra rider. The event and meal is included in the entrance fee.

The winner will receive 40 percent of the money collected from the various entry fees. Ten percent of the entry money will also go to the oldest driver, with the stipulation that the driver must show their identification.

The event will also include a prize for the drivers who draw both the big and little joker cards during the event. The holder of the joker card with the larger image will automatically receive \$20 while the holder of the card with the smaller image will receive \$10.

The first and last stop of the event is the Crowder College Community Building located on the Crowder College Campus in Cassville. Other stops include: Tractor Supply Co., in Cassville; Race Brothers, in Monett; and PQ Mart, in Washburn.

The winners will be chosen at the final stop at Crowder in Cassville. Inside the event center, starting at 4 p.m., there will be walking tacos served and music, provided by local bluegrass group The Flyin' Buzzards. There will also be a jar inside for donations. The public is welcome to participate in this portion of the event, regardless of their participation in the poker run.

During this time, select judges from each of the five stops will elect the three "best rides" of the competition. The first place winner of the competition will take home \$50, the second \$30 and the third \$20. This portion of the event is sponsored by JSS Tucking.

The event is also sponsored by: Race Brothers, of Monett; People's Community Bank, of Washburn; Chad Yarnall and Farm Bureau Insurance, of Cassville; and Freedom Bank.

The remaining 50 percent of the proceeds from the poker run will go to benefit the Barry County Fair.

Sherri Sanders, secretary and treasurer of the Barry County Fair, said that while some of this money will go into the operation of the fair itself, she hopes to be able to use some of it to make improvements to some of the fair's competitive events.

"Every kid who enters the livestock events pays an entry fee of \$5," said Sanders. "Whenever they show, they get their money back and a blue ribbon. What I'm hoping to do is have some extra money to give to the top three of every class.

"Eventually, I'd also like to be able to buy some chicken cages and maybe some livestock pens for the fair, as well."

The 2019 Barry County Fair will be Saturday, June 29.

scale of the projects, physical work has yet to begin, though the projects are currently in the planning and design stag-

"Those are all construction-based projects," said Asbill. "We have not started digging footers or tearing out walls or any of that because we need to get approved architectural plans, engineering plans and all of the scopes of work for those plans would need to be identified."

"Our goal is that we want those projects to begin in August or September," Asbill continued. "Hopefully, we'll start to see demolition, renovation and new construction begin at that time."

Asbill continued, stating that it is the goal of the administration to bring about this construction in the least disruptive way possible.

"We know that starting school in August is going to happen, so if we can get our first couple of weeks underway before we put up construction fence and bring in the backhoes, that won't necessarily be a delay. We don't want to overwhelm kids and parents. We want to phase that in as school starts up," said Asbill.

Though the main component projects funded by Vision 150 have yet to begin construction, school employees and contractors have already begun work on several other minor projects.

"Dusty Reid (Cassville's Director of Facilities and Operations) is working on our security cameras," explained Asbill. "We've already taken care of the server updates, so

all we need now is to place the new cameras in the new places to give us additional security."

Additionally, the administration is awaiting bids on upgrades to the school's intercom and communication systems with the expectation that they will be presented to the board during the next board meeting in June.

Of the more minor projects associated with the bond, the one most progressed is the removal and replacement of the cabinets in the first and second grade classrooms.

The previous cabinets and the classroom sinks, many of which were no longer functional, were removed from all 15 of the rooms associated with the project.

"We're in progress of the replacement of the cabinets," said Asbill. "Our crews took care of that and the plumbing repair. We're currently evaluating a cabinet vendor this week for the install."

Asbill explained that in order to save money, the school's maintenance staff, as well as teachers and members of the administrations from all Cassville buildings, set to work on Monday, May 20, demolishing the cabinets and exposing the ceramic wall behind them. Maintenance staff then set to work on repairing and removing the plumbing elements from the rooms.

"We have saved some money because we have done some demolition and prep work with our own staff inhouse. Our administrative team jumped in and did a lot of work," explained Asbill. "I am really honored and hum-

bled work with people who understand that there is not only a fiscal value, but a love for your district enough to be hands on with it. I'm really proud of what our teachers and our administrators did jumping in to work with our custodial staff."

Asbill also explained that the district's maintenance staff has been an invaluable part of the remodelling process.

"Our maintenance and custodial staff do an exceptional job at keeping that work in house and helping us use those taxpayers dollars as efficiently as we can," said Asbill.


For the rebuilding of the cabinets, the board opted to hire Bud Lowe Construction, of Cassville, to frame the cabinets. Lowe's company has also been hired to work on the construction of the new concession stand, a project unrelated to the Vision 150

Cassville administrators are currently reviewing bids on the cabinets themselves, with proposals and recommendations expected to be made to the board at the June board meeting.

Once completed, each of the classrooms will house five upper cabinets and five lower cabinets, as well as two floorto-ceiling cabinets. In total, the project will see the placement of 185 cabinets throughout the first and second grade classrooms as well as the elementary art room.

The cabinet project will cost the district approximately \$150,000 once completed. According to Asbill, this phase of the project is expected to be completed by July 25.

• Randell Scott Bowman, of Joplin, pled guilty to stealing \$750 or more. Bowman received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

Brannan is to serve probation until March 19, 2024.

• Trevor Ryan Brown, of Cassville, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Brown received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On December 15, 2018, Brown was stopped by the Barry County Sheriff's Department. Inside the vehicle, they located a glass pipe and a baggie of crystal substance that both field tested positive for methamphetamine.

Brown is to serve probation until March 12, 2024.

• Hester Nicole Burton, of Billings, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance in May 2018. Burton's probation has since been revoked, and she is to serve 120 days shock time with the Department of Corrections as part of the initial seven year





City of Exeter to replace wastewater treatment component

At the regular Exeter City Council meeting on May 15, the council approved a motion to purchase a new sand filter for the city's wastewater treatment facility. Currently, the two sand filters used at the facility are not functioning, causing city employees to have to bypass the filters entirely.

The purpose of a sand filter in wastewater treatment is to pass water through it in order to remove any solids, therefore reducing the chance of contaminated water reaching outside water sources.

The city's sand filters have been malfunctioning for sometime, as it has been a recurring item on the council's agenda for several months. Now, with both filters completely removed from function, the city moved to take action.

Since the sand filters are not functional, the wastewater treatment workers are bypassing that step and moving wastewater directly to the chlorine basin for the chlorination process for sanitation. That cleaned water is then released into the creek.

Over the previous month, city employees began seeking bids from parties interested in the necessary repairs. In the end, only one company answered the call. Aqua-Aerobic Systems, the wastewater system's original manufacturer, agreed to rebuild one of the filters.

According to the head of Exeter's wastewater department, Alan Frantz, Aqua-Aerobic Systems was the only company to offer these repairs as other manufacturers were unwilling to work on a different company's system. According to Frantz, the company will rebuild one of the machines, adding new pieces to replace the broken ones, while keeping the functional components

This process will cost the city a total of \$16,573. According to Exeter city clerk Myrna Eisenbraun, funds will come from the city's water depreciation and replacement budget, though its removal will leave the city with little other funds for water repairs.

To combat this, Eisenbraun will make efforts to double the amount of money that is usually deposited into the account on a monthly basis. Currently, \$204.17 is deposited into the account monthly from city water bill payments.

In the meeting, Frantz stated in an effort to keep the cost of the project down, the sand and water that is currently housed within the filter will be removed by the city instead of a third party.

During the meeting, the council approved the funds to rebuild the filter. According to Frantz, Aqua-Aerobics will begin the rebuilding process eight to ten weeks after receiving the order.

Monett's Keisha George refused to let the wild weekend distract her from the task at hand. On her final throw at Washington High School in the javelin competition of the Class 4 state track meet, George nailed a gold medal effort of 151-06. It was not only a winning throw, it was a state record throw.

George's performance did not happen in the state capital. Because of extensive damage from the Jefferson City tornado, the Class 3, 4 and 5 state meets were farmed out to separate locations with all competition on Saturday. The single-day meet format, while not unprecedented, turned the state meet into a grueling test for multi-event athletes.

At Washington, Monett's Kelsey Dalton failed to qualify for the finals in both the 100 and 200 meter sprints. Dalton finished ninth in the 100 prelims in 12.70 and eleventh in the 200 in 26.29.

The Lady Cubs also placed eleventh in the 4x100 meter relay prelims. The quartet of Mary Jane Martinez, Alyssa Williams, Ashley Kurima and Kelsey Dalton turned a time

The Class 3 meet was relocated to the Audrey J. Walton Track and Field facility on the campus of the University

of Missouri Columbia. The Cassville contingent was one place shy of earning medals for every participant.

Kyren Postlewait claimed a fourth-place medal in the girls shot, throwing 39-03.5.

Jordyn Stafford took seventh in the girls 1600 with a PR of 5:29.20. Stafford ran a blistering 79 second first lap to hang on to the lead pack and followed that with machine precision 83 second pace on each of the final three laps to earn her All State medal.

Garrett Kritz, the only freshman in the boys shot competition, placed eighth with a throw of 47-07.25.

The Ladycats narrowly missed the podium in the 4x100 meter relay. The foursome of Hannah Hackler, Kyren Postlewait, Parker Marple and Kennedy Parnell finished ninth in the prelims in 51 seconds flat.

Postlewait missed the 100 meter finals, taking eleventh in 12.84.

Stafford missed a medal in the 3200 meter run, finishing tenth in 12:36.49, far off her 11:57 season's best. In normal circumstances at state, the 1600 and 3200 are contested on different days. Nine of the girls in the longest distance event did not run the 1600, and fresh legs made the difference in making the podium.

The Exeter FFA growing leaders activities included Reaching for Readers. This is a program in which members read to elementary students. This allows them to share agriculture through the books they read.

Chapter activities in the strengthening agriculture category included Quarterly Corduroy. This is a newsletter released quarterly for the benefit of educating the community about current events, agricultural issues and news regarding the chapter.

Extension: Ragged stand better than no stand

In a year of uneven crop emergence, University of Missouri Extension agronomists say not to count out runts that emerge late. "A late-emerging corn plant is better than no corn plant," says MU Extension agronomist Bill Wiebold.

In a weekly teleconference of MU Extension agronomists on May 7, reports varied from "no corn in the ground at all" to 40% planted. Regional agronomists expressed concern about uneven emergence of corn in fields already plant-

Yield loss can happen when smaller plants compete for nutrients and sunlight with larger, earlieremerging plants. Smaller plants likely produce barren or small ears.

Seeds that emerge 10 days behind their row mates lessen in-row yield potential. Studies vary, but agronomists in Wisconsin and Illinois estimated losses at 8-10% in older research, says MU Extension corn specialist Greg Luce.

The numbers remain relevant, Luce says, even though improved precisionplanting equipment reduces irregularities. Skips and smaller plants are still likely. "Skips are what you don't want," he says. "Doubles are a planter issue and certainly not desired, but they don't have the negative impact on yield like a skip."

Luce says uneven emergence happens for several reasons: soil crusting, compaction, inconsistent and especially shallow seeding

depth, and differences in soil temperature. Seed-tosoil contact matters as well. This year, cool weather provided fewer growing degree units, which are needed for corn to develop strong root systems and emerge uni-

"In a perfect world, we would have a picket fence and the world would look beautiful," Wiebold says. That's not the case in 2019, when flooding and excessive rain delayed planting and prompted early concerns of replanting.

But most uneven stands do not warrant replanting. "A ragged stand is better than no stand," Wiebold

Luce agrees that replanting is not justified when only due to uneven stands. "Although uniformity is the goal, the most important factor is the total plant population," he says. "Too many skips and a low plant count is what calls for replanting."
