

Mahurin retires after 35 years at Roaring River State Park

After 35 years at Roaring River State Park, longtime employee Leon Mahurin retired. Friends and family gathered to celebrate Mahurin's retirement at the Barry County Museum and share memories with him from over the years.

Mahurin grew up around Pineville and Anderson before eventually moving to the area and graduating from Exeter High School. It was after that when Mahurin began working at the park.

He said, "I had just finished working helping finish building the Butterfield Feed Elevator. Once that was done, I went to the park on an OACAC program."

Mahurin said that his time was spent in the early days cleaning up and providing maintenance in the summer.

Back then, he was a temporary employee just doing some summer work. However, the park superintendent at the time, Boyd Holcomb, told him if he stayed with them, he would have a permanent job. Lo and behold, 35 years later,

Mahurin finally left the park to retire.

Mahurin said, "I liked working with the old timers back then like Harold Skelton. They taught me a lot about the park."

Other superintendents oversaw the park in Mahurin's time after Holcomb left, as well, but one was present at his retirement celebration.

Dusty Reid was with the park from 1995 to 2014. For the last eight of those years, he served as the park's superintendent.

Reid said, "Leon was one of the most respected employees at the park.

"Visitors and employees all enjoyed his company."

He said he remembers the bigger changes of the park being the addition of the Emory Melton Inn and Conference Center.

Mahurin said, "Before the Emory Melton Inn, there was an old restaurant, but that burnt down. Behind that, up on the hill was the old motel. That was probably the biggest change."

Over the years, Mahurin said his fondest memories were of working in the off

season during the winter. He said, "In the winter is when we would paint and remodel the cabins. We

would tear them down to the framework and just rebuild them. I always enjoyed that."

Mahurin was always in maintenance while at the park. In 35 years, he learned the ins and out of the park

and equipment, helped clean up, did tree and brush removal and more. As people retired, he said he would

Free summer meals found through texts, website

For many students, summer can be the hungriest time of the year. In many economically depressed areas, including Barry County, the only reliable food children get is when they are in school. Once

school lets out for the summer, families who cannot afford food have less of a buffer for children.

Thanks to the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, local schools provide free meals to children ages 18 and

under during the summer. For many families struggling to put food on the table, this is a saving grace. In Barry County, area schools offer free meals for both breakfast and lunch during summer school. However, other locations,

such as the Cassville and Monett YMCAs offer food for a longer stretch during the summer months. Outside of Barry County, other organizations are providing meals, as well.

Two different organizations are making it easier for families in need to locate free food around the area. One is a texting option, and the other offers an online map that will show where children can get free meals throughout the summer.

The text program is available through a non-profit called Share Our Strength. The program is specifically called No Kid Hungry, and the non-profit's goal is to end child hunger. By texting 'FOOD' to 877-877 and then following the instructions to provide your zipcode, you'll receive a text back with area free food programs in your area, their dates, days, times and a contact number for the site.

Mutton busting to be new local rodeo feature

The Cassville Rotary Club is changing it up this year with a new event aimed at drawing kids in to participate in the annual event. For the first time, the Cassville Rotary Club Rodeo will feature mutton busting, a six and under competition where kids will try to stay on a sheep.

This year marks the 75th annual Cassville Rodeo, and the organizers felt that this event would be a good way to attract participation from kids. Rotarian Landon Fletcher said, "We're trying to increase participation and attendance. Mutton busting is really popular right now in the rodeo circuit. A number of different rodeos are doing this before rodeos to get the kids involved."

While mutton busting has been around since the 1980s, Fletcher said it has never been a part of the Cassville rodeo, and they are excited to bring it for area youth. He said, "We are encouraging competitive rodeo style, but it's not required. They just need to bring a helmet that fits them securely."

This year, only 15 participants are going to be allowed to compete. Children six and under and who weigh less than 60 pounds can try their hand at the sport for cash prizes for the top three spots.

Since the slots are limited, parents are asked to preregister their kids for the event. They'll also need to sign a release form and provide the \$10 entry free.

This year's top mutton buster will win \$100 while second place will take \$50, and third will take \$25.

Regularly slated events at the rodeo will be the same as previous years and will include bareback, bull riding, saddlebonc, calf roping, team roping, steer wrestling, cowgirl barrel racing

MEALS from FRONT

Specific to just this state, Missouri’s Department of Health and Senior Services has an online map that parents can access to find free children’s food programs in their area.

Dr. Randall Williams, the director of the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services, said, “Summer can be a time of food insecurity for students who receive free and reduced lunches during the school year. This interactive map will help ensure Missouri’s children are getting critical nutrition all year long.”

The website is www.dhss.mo.gov/sfsp/. The link to the map can be accessed from that page, and you can type in a city, county or zip code to have the map pop up. Pins appear on the map where food programs are and each has the information about that particular site, including dates available, times, organization and contact information of the organization.

The Summer Food Service Program is an initiative available through the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services.

While meals are designated to be for children ages 18 and below, individuals who are 18 to 21 and have been determined to be mentally or physically disabled and participate in an established school program can receive meals, as well.

Income guidelines do not have to be met in order to qualify for the program. Any child 18 and under may receive a meal.

A serious injury resulted in a woman being airlifted her car ran down an embankment outside of Shell Knob. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, the driver of a 2007 Cadillac SRX was injured when she ran down an embankment and struck a tree.

Brandi J. Kissinger, 37, of Fordland, was driving southbound on Route M, four miles west of Shell Knob when she ran off the right side of the roadway. The Cadillac traveled down the embankment and struck a tree.

Kissinger suffered serious injuries and was airlifted to Cox Hospital in Springfield. She was wearing a seatbelt at the time of the crash.

The Cadillac was totaled and towed from the scene by US Auto, of Cassville.

Cassville man charged with statutory sodomy

A Cassville man is in jail held on a \$100,000 cash-only bond after being accused of sexual misconduct and sodomy of a child. Stephen Wayne Hensley, 29, of Cassville, was arrested and charged last week for the alleged assault.

According to affidavits of probable cause, Hensley was arrested after a five year old girl was interviewed at the Child Advocacy Center in Monett. The girl told her mother that someone had put their private part in her mouth.

The girl was interviewed at the center on May 31 and told them that Hensley had put his privates in her mouth until she choked. She said it happened three times while her mother

was at work.

Hensley is charged with endangering the welfare of a child until the age of 17 in the first degree, sexual misconduct with a child under the age of 15 and statutory rape of a person less than 12 years old. Hensley is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$100,000 cash-only bond.

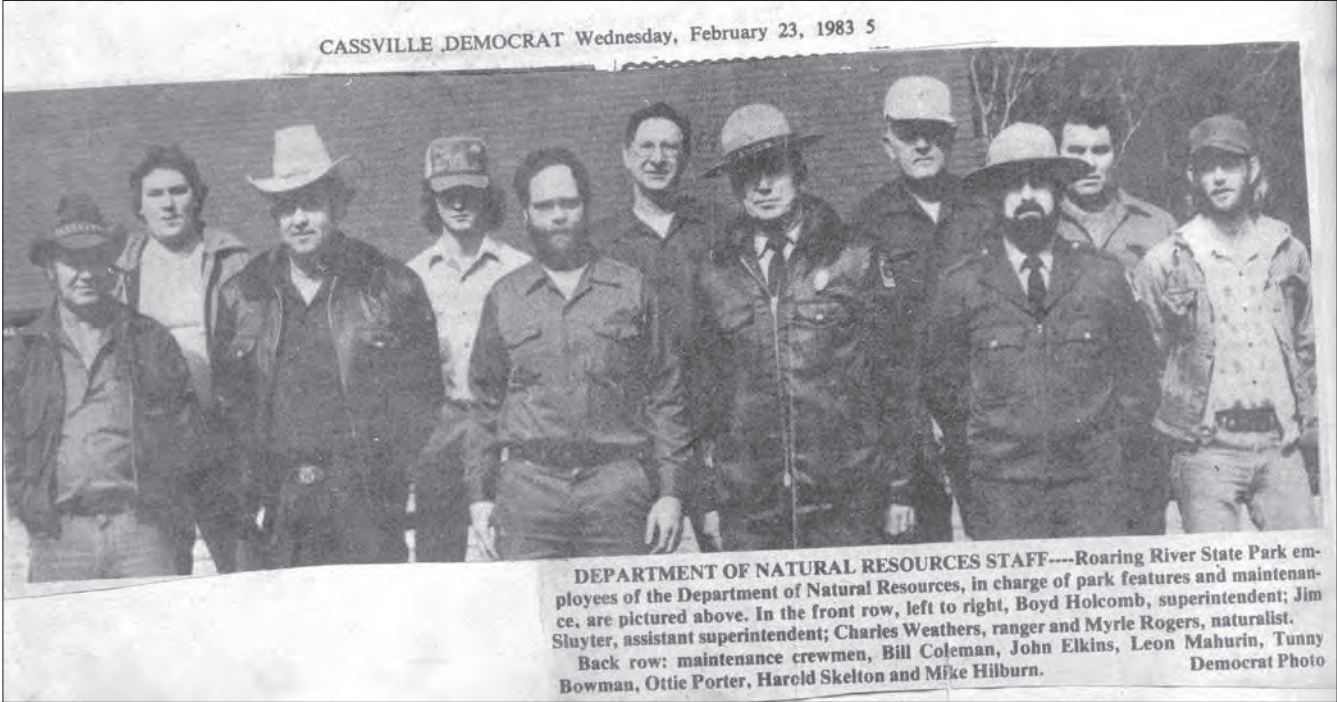
and helping them learn new things.



Federal state of disaster announced for Missouri flooding

On June 2, the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) announced that federal disaster assistance has been made available to the state of Missouri to supplement state and local recovery efforts in the areas affected by severe storms, tornadoes, straight-line winds, and flooding from April 28 to May 11, 2017.

The President's action makes federal funding avail-

able to affected individuals in Bollinger, Butler, Carter, Douglas, Dunklin, Franklin, Gasconade, Howell, Jasper, Jefferson, Madison, Maries, McDonald, Newton, Oregon, Osage, Ozark, Pemiscot, Phelps, Pulaski, Reynolds, Ripley, Shannon, St. Louis, Stone, Taney, and Texas counties. Assistance can include grants for temporary housing and home repairs, low-cost loans to cover uninsured property losses, and other programs to help individuals and business owners recover from the effects of the disaster.

Federal funding is available

to state and local governments and certain private nonprofit organizations on a cost-sharing basis for emergency work and the repair or replacement of disaster-damaged facilities damaged by the severe storms, tornadoes, straight-line winds, and flooding in Barry, Barton, Bollinger, Butler, Camden, Carter, Cedar, Christian, Cole, Crawford, Dade, Dallas, Dent, Douglas, Dunklin, Franklin, Gasconade, Howell, Iron, Jefferson, Lawrence, Madison, Maries, McDonald, Miller, Morgan, Newton, Oregon, Osage, Ozark, Perry, Phelps, Pike, Pulaski, Ralls, Reynolds,

Ripley, Shannon, St. Louis, Stone, Taney, Texas, Washington, Wayne, Webster, and Wright counties.

Federal funding is also available on a cost-sharing basis for hazard mitigation measures statewide.

Michael L. Parker has been named as the Federal Coordinating Officer for federal recovery operations in the affected area. Parker said additional designations may be made at a later date if warranted by the results of damage assessments.

Arrows edge Outlaws in season-opener, 11-10

"You always have to give 110% in baseball, otherwise you're not playing the game right" - Alex Dyer, Cassville Arrows.

It wasn't a packed house, but about a hundred fans sat through a rain delay, and a chilly wet evening in the bleachers to see a bit of history on Thursday night. The first day of June saw the Cassville Arrows baseball team win their season and home opener at Wildcat Field, downing the Joplin Outlaws, 11-10. This wasn't the prettiest ball game ever played, but it was a significant step forward in continuing Cassville's long summer baseball tradition.

American Legion baseball has disappeared from the local scene, leaving a void for the diehard baseball fans. Enter the Arrows, an independent collegiate baseball club, in need of a new home. It appears to be a good fit. The Arrows' roster includes many familiar names, including four former Cassville Wildcats: Leigh Cox, Alex Dyer, Chad Howerton and Noah Hadlow.

The Outlaws jumped out to a 1-0 lead in the top of the first inning when Jeff Wetzler scored from third on a passed ball. The Arrows tied the game in the bottom of the third. Marcus Crawford drew a leadoff walk, moved to second on a sac bunt from Colton Vaught, then scored when Smith Kemper's line drive barely cleared the second baseman for an RBI single.

First run, first RBI for the Cassville Arrows.

But a pitching meltdown in the top of the fourth inning allowed Joplin to open a 6-1 lead. The Outlaws scored five runs on only two hits.

Four of the five runs were gifts with the bases loaded. It didn't look good for the Arrows at that point.

But Cassville chipped away, holding Joplin scoreless for the next three innings, and scoring one run here and one run there to pull

within 6-4 at the end of the sixth inning. Then in the bottom of the seventh, the Arrows lit up the scoreboard when Joplin's pitching corps floundered.

Single. Walk. Fly out. Then five consecutive walks with the bases loaded and a sac fly RBI led to 7 runs.

When the walk-a-thon finally ended, the Arrows held an 11-6 lead. But Cassville's thin bullpen was nearly spent. On came Alex Dyer in the eighth inning in the role of closer.

"I never thought I would see Alex play on this field again," said Jerri Dyer in the bleachers,"but there he is."

But Dyer struggled on the mound, despite the vocal support from the hometown fans. The Outlaws rallied for four runs, and had the tying and lead runs on base with two outs. Dyer drew a fly out behind first base to get out of the inning, and the Arrows still led by a run, 11-10.

Cassville went down in order in the home half of the eighth, and the Outlaws came to bat in the ninth.

"With a one-run lead, all I was thinking about was

throwing one pitch at a time and letting my defense do their job," recalled Dyer after the game.

Dyer looked like a different pitcher in his second trip to the mound. A 6-3 ground-out off the bat of Michael Smith lifted the pitcher's confidence. After he walked Kaleb Delatorre on five pitches, Dyer challenged Grant McDaniel and was rewarded with a fly out to first base.

New Missouri voter ID law officially in effect

When voters in Missouri head to the polls this fall, getting a ballot will be a bit different than in previous years.

In the November 2016 General Election, Missouri voters approved a constitutional amendment requiring voters to verify their identities before voting. This amendment and the related law, HB 1631, took effect on June 1 for all future elections.

Voters with a government-issued photo ID will have the smoothest voting experience. Accepted types of government-issued photo ID include a Missouri drivers license, Missouri nondriver identification, US passport or military ID.

According to the law, when checking in to vote, the voter will present their photo ID to the poll worker, who will verify that the information matches the voter registration and then hand the voter their ballot. The voter will then proceed as they had in the past.

Voters without a government-issued photo ID will still be able to vote, but the process has additional steps. If a voter does not have the required photo ID, they may vote with a standard ballot provided they have one of the following types of identification and

they sign a statement. To vote and sign a statement, the voter must present:

A Missouri Voter Identification Card

ID from a Missouri university, college or other school

Current utility bill or bank statement

Paycheck or government check

OR

Other government issued document showing the voter's name and address.

Voters presenting one of these types of identification will then sign a statement prescribed by the law. This statement avers that the voter does not have government-issued ID and that they know the State of Missouri will assist them in getting approved voter ID free of cost. After signing the statement, the voter will vote as usual.

Voters without any form of ID accepted under the new law will be able to cast a provisional ballot. This ballot will only be counted if the voter returns to the polling place with a photo ID or their signature matches the signature on the official voter rolls.

Getting a free photo ID

Under the new law, anyone needing a photo ID to vote can get one free of cost.

To obtain a nondriver identification for voting purposes, an applicant must present verbally or by presenting their card a Social Security number, proof of address in the form of a utility bill, paycheck or other document that includes the applicant's name and address, and they must present proof of name, date of birth and place of birth.

Under the new law, the state will provide a free copy of a document proving name and date and place of birth for those needing the document for a photo ID.

Examples of these documents include a birth certificate and naturalization papers. If the person needing a voter ID has changed their name, the state will help them obtain a copy of the court order, divorce decree or marriage licence that shows this name change.

In order to get these documents free of charge, you have to contact the Secretary of State's office so that they can facilitate obtaining the documents and waiving the fee for them. Under the law, the state will provide one copy of a necessary document so that any eligible resident can register to vote. To get started with this process, or if you have any questions, contact the Secretary of State's office at 866-868-3245 or by emailing showit2vote@sos.mo.gov.

An FAQ and other related information is available at www.showit2vote.com. Applicants can also get their questions answered and start the process of getting a free voter ID by filling out a webform on the site.

Controversy?

Voter ID was one of the major aspects of Secretary of State Jay Ashcroft's campaign last year. On his campaign website, he said about voter identification, "In today's world, fraud and identity theft are constant threats. The best way to protect your vote is a strong voter identification requirement so that you can be confident that no one else is using your name to steal your voice." In the 2016 General Election, the Voter ID amendment received 63 percent approval.

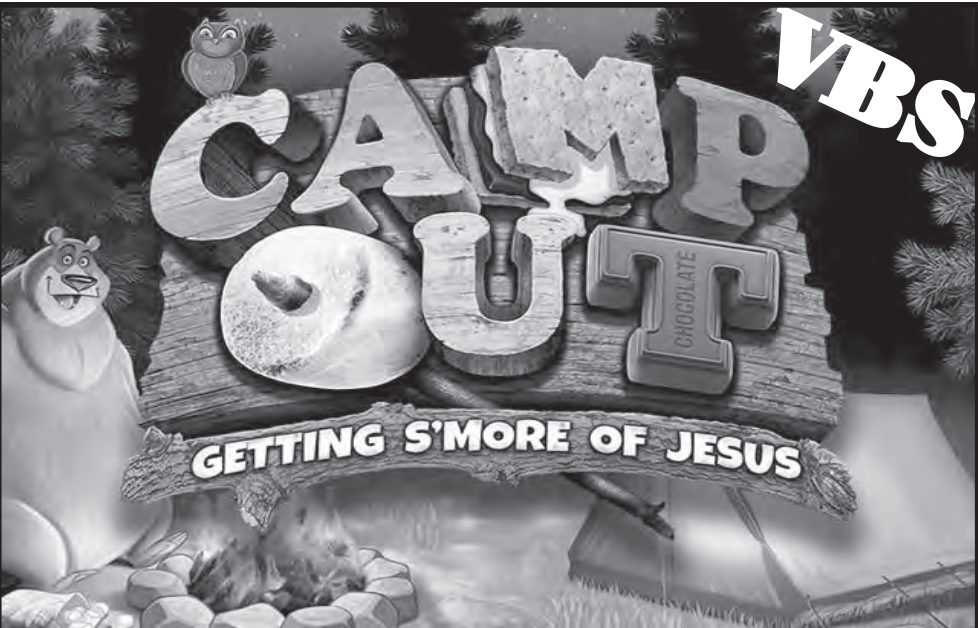
Several groups still oppose the measure, calling it voter suppression. On June 1, the day the law took effect, the Saint Louis Dispatch wrote about 24 people gathered at the Saint Louis courthouse to protest the law, which they described as a new poll tax. The Chair of the Missouri Democratic Party also condemned the law, saying, "No matter how hard Jay Ashcroft tries to spin these voting restrictions, the new rules going into effect today are still an unacceptable attempt from the Republican establishment in Jefferson City to

roadblock Missourians on their way to the ballot box. We should be making it easier for Missourians to vote – not creating challenges and confusion."

Ashcroft spoke out against these opponents. In a statement denouncing opponents of the law, Ashcroft said, "I am shocked and appalled by the misinformation campaign being run by these opponents of Missouri's voter ID law," Ashcroft said. "Their efforts are deplorable and intentionally designed to confuse and mislead Missourians just as we are beginning a statewide public education campaign. Missouri's voter ID law will not disenfranchise a single voter. Bottom line, if you're registered to vote, you can vote -- despite the misinformation that was shared."

"We heard the voice of Missouri voters loud and clear in November and have worked diligently to implement photo voter ID," Ashcroft said in a statement launching the new law. "If you're a registered voter, you can vote. It's important that we protect the integrity of our elections by ensuring that every vote counts, but only once."

According to the Secretary of State's website, voters in Barry, Lawrence and Christian counties will first cast ballots under this new law on August 8, 2017.

Missouri has more than a million acres of surface water, and most of it provides great fishing. More than 200 different fish species are found in Missouri, with more than 20 of them being game fish for the state’s more than 1.1 million anglers.

Entries in all divisions must be received or postmarked by June 15, 2017. To be eligible for the Premium Sale, Barry County residents must apply this rule. Late entries will not be considered for the Premium Sale. Division Superintendents will assign locations in the barns and exhibit buildings.

Barry County courts incarcerate 5 in the month of April

• **James L. Beck**, of Cassville, pled guilty to driving while revoked or suspended and DWI-Alcohol. Beck received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections, a \$200 fine and five years supervised probation.

On October 21, 2015, Beck was found walking along the road near where a truck was in a ditch on Missouri highway 97. Officers said Beck had a strong smell of intoxicants as well as observed other indications of intoxication when they picked him up. Beck refused to complete any sobriety tests, telling officers he was drunk. When Beck agreed to a breathalyzer, his blood alcohol level was 0.119.

During the pat down, officers also found 15 hydrocodone pills that Beck said he crushed and snorted.

Beck is to serve probation until April 17, 2022.

• **Micheale Lee Blay**, of Monett, pled guilty to four counts of possession of a controlled substance, damage to jail property and distribution of a controlled substance. Blay received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On June 26, 2016, Blay's residence was search by the Monett Police Department. Officers seized plastic bags, needles, a digital scale, multiple cell phones and suspected methamphetamine, as well as drug paraphernalia and marijuana.

Then on July 26, 2016, Blay was arrested again when officers went to investigated a shoplifting incident at the Monett Walmart. When arrested, Blay was found to have two rocks of methamphetamine in her pocket.

While in jail, Blay also racked up a damaging jail property charge when, on August 6, 2016, she bent a piece of diamond plate covering a toilet's plumbing and then sharpened a sheet metal bracket. Officers found the piece of contraband in Blay's cell, and she used the metal to harm herself.

Finally, on December 24, 2016, Blay was found inside Fastrip in Cassville. When officers approached her for multiple warrants, she tried to run. When arrested, Blay had hydrocodone and methamphetamine, as well as needles, digital scale, plastic baggies and other distribution products.

Blay is to serve probation until April 4, 2022.

• **Jeremy A. Cape**, of Purdy, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Cape received a suspended execution of a seven year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On April 25, 2016, Cape was found trespassing on property on Farm Road 1084 in Washburn. When officers approached him, a clear plastic bad of methamphetamine fell out of his pocket.

Cape is to serve probation until April 17, 2022.

• **Lesley Anne Chambers**, of Cassville, pled guilty to tampering with a motor vehicle in the second degree. Chambers received a suspended imposition of sentencing and two years unsupervised probation.

On June 7, 2016, Chambers was pulled over for driving a car that was reported as missing. When the owner messaged Chambers to return the car, she refused.

Chambers is to serve probation until April 27, 2019.

• **Dalton Ross Evans** pled

guilty to possession of a controlled substance. He was on probation for burglary in the second degree and theft/stealing of less than \$25,000 in value from 2016. Ross received a suspended execution of a five years incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation for the new charges and is to serve 120 days of shock incarceration for the probation violations.

Regarding the burglary charged, on November 23, 2015, Evans forced entry into a residence on Farm Road 1090 in Seligman and stole a flat screen TV.

Then, on November 30, 2016, Evans was found to be speeding on Farm Road 1075. When officers stopped him, he had syringes, a lighter and a glass container with alprazolam (Xanax) in it.

Ross is to be incarcerated until August 15, 2017, and is to serve probation until April 17, 2022.

• **Brian Dean Forester**, of Pierce City, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Forester received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On October 7, 2015, an undercover officer with the Missouri State Highway Patrol purchased a gram of methamphetamine from Forester.

Forester is to serve probation until April 17, 2022.

• **Justin P. Foster**, of Exeter, pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears over 12 months. Foster received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years unsupervised probation.

As of March 24, 2105, Foster was \$6,800 in arrears on child support.

Foster is to serve probation until April 19, 2022.

• **Harold Lester Hawkins II**, of Aurora, made an Alford plea to receiving stolen property in 2014. His probation has since been revoked and he is to serve seven years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On April 4, 2011, Hawkins stole parts for logging machinery and dozers from Exeter.

The parts were found at Rebel Recycling in Exeter.

• **David Henry Brit**, of Purdy, pled guilty to three counts of burglary in the second degree, stealing of \$750 or more and possession of a controlled substance. Brit was sentenced to five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In December 2015, Henry stole from a garage and outbuildings in Pierce City. Henry was seen on a game camera.

On January 25, 2017, Henry was stopped by officers and was found to have property stolen from two addresses in Purdy. When Henry's apartment was searched, officers found multiple stolen items, including law equipment, music equipment, antique locks and trunk and syringes that field tested positive for methamphetamine.

• **Catrina Marie Johnson**, of Cassville, pled guilty to two counts of forgery and one count of tampering with

a motor vehicle in the first degree. Johnson received a suspended execution of a seven year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

In November 2015, Johnson committed forgery by using checks that were not hers.

Then, in August 2016, Johnson stole a 1994 Jeep Cherokee from the White Oak Station parking lot in Seligman.

Johnson is to serve probation until April 17, 2022.

• **Joshua Lee Schiele**, of Pea Ridge, Ark., pled guilty to domestic assault in the first degree. Schiele was sentenced to eight years incarceration with the Department of Corrections of which he will serve 120 days of shock time.

On October 19, 2015, Scheile choked his girlfriend multiple times, saying he would kill her and her family. He also slammer her into the ground and the wall.
