Annual Barry County Fair slated for next weekend

The end of this month marks another Barry County Fair for citizens. The fair will be held at the Exeter Corn Maze again this year on June 30.

Each year, the Barry County Fair offers youth of all ages the opportunity to show animals and livestock and participate in fun activities. The change of venue to the Exeter Corn maze opened the opportunity for more activities than in years prior.

Admission to the fair is free, and the event will run from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Saturday, June 30, at the Exeter Corn Maze on Highway MM south of Exeter.

This year's activities will include: the jumping pillow, cow train, barn swings, corn pit, barn swings, pedal carts, archery tag and shoot out shack. Arm bands for the fair are \$7. There will also be gem mining for \$5 each.

For those not wanting to participate in activities, there will also be plenty of local vendors and a farmers market on site.

The fair will open up with the Blue Ribbon Breakfast from 7 a.m. to 9 a.m. The menu is biscuits and gravy, sausage and a drink for \$5. After breakfast, the livestock showing will begin with dairy cattle kicking things off at 8 a.m. The show will conclude around 3 p.m. with rabbits.

There will also be concessions on site throughout the day until the premium sale dinner at 5:30 p.m. The premium sale will end the evening following the dinner. The sale will be at 6:30 p.m. on the fair grounds.

Monett man arrested on drug charges after search warrant

After a warrant was served by the Ozarks Drug Enforcement Team (ODET), Barry County Sheriff's Department and the Monett Police Department, a Monett man is in custody for large quantities of marijuana packaged for distribution. Hank A. Archer, 66, of Monett, is charged with delivery of a controlled substance, possession of a controlled substance, unlawful use of a weapon - possessing a weapon and a felony controlled substance and unlawful possession of drug para-

According to a press release by ODET, the search warrant was served at 307 7th Street in Monett on June 12. Archer was at home at the time of the search, as was a woman, who has not yet been charged. The press release says charges are pending against her.

Officers seized a large quantity of marijuana packaged for distribution and a shotgun.

Archer was booked into the Barry County Jail on June 12 and issued a \$50,000 cash or corp surety bond on June 13. His bond was reduced to \$15,000 cash, corp surety or 10 percent on June 19.

Searching for Opening Day mugs: Preserving Roaring River trout season history

Roaring River State Park hosts around half a million visitors each year, and about 20 percent of those visitors are fishermen.

Every March 1, well over 1,000 anglers line the banks of Roaring River in hopes of catching their share of the over 6,000 trout released into the waters from the park's on-site hatchery. Their morning push for the biggest and best trout begins after the 6:30 a.m. gunshot that announces Opening Day-and after a complimentary cup of hot

Nearly three decades ago, the Cassville Chamber of Commerce began providing commemorative Roaring River State Park Opening Day mugs to the fishermen who attended the opening of trout season at the park, ordering approximately 850 mugs annually for the anglers beginning in 1992. "They were created to help promote our town and give back to the anglers," according to Director of the Chamber of Commerce Brittany Crawford.

Each year, area chamber members and volunteers brew coffee and take mugs to anglers waiting along the shores of the river for trout season to begin. Darren Jacobs and Jeremy Marple brewed coffee donated by Les Jacobs Ford in the Opening Day tent at the park and started serving around 4:30 a.m. this year They traditionally serve between 60 and 80 gallons of coffee to the souls braving the early morning hours of Opening Day. "We're there rain or shine," Jacobs said. And sometimes they're there in snow and high water.

Volunteers fill insulated coolers with coffee from the Chamber's tent in front of

See our complete newspaper, weekly stories and classifieds the old lodge, and volunteers visit anglers up and down the river, coffee and mugs in tow, offering the hot drinks and souvenir mugs to cold anglers. Providing free coffee to the fishermen is a long-standing tradition at Roaring River, one that began long before Jacobs and Marple stepped in, and one that eventually will be passed on to the next community members willing to fill their shoes.

Over the years, the coffee has remained hot and fresh, but the Opening Day mugs have changed dramatically in shape, size and color, adhering to the preferred design of the times. Modern mugs tend to be three times the size of their earlier counterparts, and they are now insulated and complete with lids.

Opening Day mugs are on display at the Barry County Museum in Cassville as a part of their permanent collection, and the Nature Center at Roaring River State Park is in the process of collecting mugs for the park's display, as


Did you know?



2018-2019 student handbook changes were discussed by the board of education, and the district comprehensive school improvement plan was approved.

New Business:

Banking services with Peoples Community Bank for the 2018-2019 school year was approved.

Concerning substitute pay, the board approved that the district maintains the current rate for teachers at \$80 a day, custodians and cooks will be paid the starting hourly wage found on the salary schedule, and bus drivers increase to \$35 per route regardless the length. For the 2017-2018 school year, the custodians were paid \$62.16 a day (\$7.77/hour), the cooks were paid \$54.38 a day (\$7.77/hour), and bus drivers at \$27 or \$30 a route, depending on its length.

Concerning facilities, the board approved that the district maintains the current rates: \$10 for two hours and

\$25 per day (anything over two hours). The only time that the district will waive the rental fee is for organizations that do not have a personal financial gain from the use of district facilities. Some examples could include organizations such as Girl Scouts, youth rallies, and others which provide an activity for the students with no financial gain for the organization. In addition, community benefits and fundraisers will not be charged a facility usage fee.

Southwest School Board

Concerning breakfast and lunch costs, according to the USDA Lunch Equity Calculation Tool, the district needs to raise the lunch by \$.05 and breakfast prices by \$.25 for students. In addition, the district needs to increase adult breakfast to \$2.00 and adult lunch to \$2.75.

The 2018-2019 meal prices that were board approved are as follows:

K-4: \$1.50/.25, \$1.80/.40, 5-8: \$1.50/.25, \$2.05/.40,





Danny Montreal Allen, of Cassville, pled guilty to domestic assault in the second degree. He received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On December 20, 2017, the Cassville Police Department were dispatched to a Cassville Heights apartment around 5:42 a.m. for a domestic disturbance. When officers arrived, Allen's girlfriend had red marks and bruising on her neck. The victim said Allen put his hands around her neck and strangled her, making her unable to breathe. The victim also had red marks and bruises on both arms from Allen grabbing and restraining her. The victim's two children, 18 months and three years old, were asleep in the apartment at the time of the

Allen is to serve probation until April 16, 2023.

• William J. Arnett, of Bentonville, Ark., pled guilty to two counts of endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree and DWI - drug intoxication as a persistent offender. Arnett received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence and five years supervised probation.

On February 14, 2016, the Missouri State Highway Patrol responded to a single vehicle crash in Washburn. Arnett had four children in the vehicle at the time, only

one of whom was in a child seat. Officers observed Arnett to be intoxicated when they responded to the

Arnett is to serve probation until April 16, 2023.

• John Bradford Bonnow, III, of Carthage, pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears in excess of 12 monthly payments. Bonnow received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years unsupervised probation.

As of May 1, 2017, Bonnow was in total arrears of \$4,472.15 for one child.

Bonnow is to serve probation until April 17, 2023.

• Scottie L. Crow, of Monett, pled guilty to resisting arrest for a felony in August 2017. His probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve three years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On June 4, 2016, the Monett Police Department was investigating Crow for

Griffin then put a round in the chamber and pointed the gun at the victim and told her she had two minutes to live and to start praying. Griffin then started counting. Griffin has two different handguns he threatened the victim

• Billy David Hemphill, of Monett, pled guilty to DWI - persistent. He ceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On August 22, 2017, Hemphill was stopped by the Monett Police Department after crossing over the center line. Officer reported Hemphill to be visibly intoxicated. He had four prior DWI offenses.

Hemphill is to serve probation until April 17, 2023.

• Patrick Alan Jordan, of El Dorado, Kan., pled guilty to assault in the second degree - operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated resulting in an injury. Jordan received a suspended execution of a seven year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections, 120 days shock time in the Barry County Jail and five years supervised probation.

On September 28, 2016, Jordan was driving while intoxicated and made a U-turn in front of another driver, causing a crash. The other driver had to be extricated from the vehicle and air lifted for injuries to his leg. Initially, a woman claimed to be the driver, who was also injured in the crash. However, Jordan was driving and eventually admitted it. His blood alcohol level was above the legal limit.

Jordan is to serve probation until April 17, 2023.

• James Anthony Lewis, of Washburn, pled guilty to burglary in the second degree. Lewis received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On March 26, 2016, the Washburn Police Department responded to a call for neglected dogs. While at the residence, Lewis was walking out the back door with a Nintendo game system and associated games. When Lewis' residence was searched, multiple other stolen items were found, as

Lewis is to serve probation until April 17, 2023.

• Eric S. Merritt, of Cassville, made an Alford plea to forgery in January 2015. Merritt violated probation, served 15 days shock time and then was granted a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On October 16, 2014, Merritt cashed a check at Commerce. The check was issued for \$72, but Merritt changed it to \$172.

Merritt is to serve probation until April 10, 2023.

• Dakota Leevi Morgan, Mt. Vernon, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance in November 2017. Morgan's probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve 120 days shock time with the Department of Corrections as part of a five year sentence.

On May 11, 2017, Morgan's vehicle was investigated as an abandoned vehi-

cle. While officers searched, Morgan approached, saying the vehicle was his. Inside the vehicle were cut straws with methamphetamine residue.

• Scottie Ray Myers, of Monett, pled guilty to stealing a firearm and unlawful possession of a firearm. Myers was sentenced to four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On August 10, 2017, the Monett Police Department investigated a pistol stolen from Monett Gun and Pawn. Security footage showed Myers asking for ammunition that could be used in the gun. When Myers was arrested for active warrants, Myers said the gun could be found under his mattress in his residence.

Myers is a convicted felon and unable to possess a firearm.

• Brandon Lee Oxford, of Seligman, pled guilty to failure to register as a sex offender. Oxford was sentenced to three years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

Oxford was convicted of child molestation in the first degree, and last registered in October 3, 2017. Oxford was to register again on January 3, 2018, but failed to do so.

• Joshua David Plan-

chon, of Monett, pled guilty to delivery of marijuana and delivery of a controlled substance. Planchon received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On May 13, 2017, the Monett Police Department were dispatched to Planchon's residence on Scott Street for a possible domestic disturbance. When they arrived, there was visible marijuana and distribution materials in plain sight.

On November 16, 2017, the Monett Police Department served a search warrant at Planchon's residence and found 39 grams of marijuana which Planchon admitted was for sale.

Planchon is to serve probation until April 16, 2023.

• Corey Joe Robison, of Baxter Springs, Kan., pled guilty to burglary in the first degree, domestic assault in the third degree and property damage in the second degree. Robison received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On March 4, 2017, Robison went into his former girlfriend's residence to physically assault her. He threw the victim into kitchen cabinets and damaged a door from the house to the garage, then fled back to Kansas.

Robison is to serve probation until April 16, 2023.

• Joanna Blake Scales, of Joplin, pled guilty to two counts of fraudulently attempting to obtain a controlled substance. Scales received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On March 30, 2017, Scales was implicated in a Walmart Pharmacy investigation in Monett. Scales had called in a fraudulent prescription for Tylenol 4 with codeine by impersonating doctor's office personnel and using a nurse practitioner's DEA controlled substance number. Then, Scales went to the pharmacy to pick up the prescription.

Scales is to serve probation until April 16, 2023.

• Michael Dean Sharp, of Seligman, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance in November 2016. His probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve six years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On April 3, 2015, Sharp was implicated in a stolen machete found begin a gas station. When arrested, Sharp had four adderall and one hydrochloride.

On December 22, 2015, Sharp had a syringe of methamphetamine which he tried to throw down into a ditch.

• Justin Allen Werneburg, of Pierce City, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance and forgery. Werneburg was sentenced to four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On October 24, 2017, Werneburg was at a residence on Chapel Drive in Monett where a well being check was issued. He had four warrants at the time. When transported, he said he had drugs on him, and officers found methamphetamine.

On January 21, 2018, Werneburg used a counterfeit \$20 bill at Herd's in Monett. Officers located Werneburg after finding the driver of the vehicle, who told them who had paid for the gas.



Monett man charged with first degree rape

A Monett man was arrested and charged with rape or attempted rape in the first degree of a victim under the age of 18. Joseph James Rodriguez, 32, of Monett, allegedly forced intercourse with the victim in an apartment complex where he did odd jobs.

In affidavits of probable cause, Monett officer Jeff Martinson reported Rodriguez forced sexual intercourse with the victim in her apartment despite her telling him repeatedly to stop. The affidavit states the attack occurred around 4 p.m. on June 5 at an apartment on Fairway Drive in Monett.

Rodriguez allegedly works in the apartment complex where the victim lives, doing maintenance and other business for the manager. The victim reported needing a lock changed at her apartment due to her keys being taken, and Rodriguez told her the replacement cost was \$25.

The victim stated she sent a Facebook message to Rodriguez later thanking him for his help, and he told her she was "funny" and "sexy." The conversation then went back to changing the lock on the door of her apartment before he told her he wanted to get together. He told her to tell him when she was alone and then said, "need to show you something you are missing."

Rodriguez then showed up at her apartment, saying he had a lease amendment for her to sign, according to the victim's statement. He handed her a paper and when she went to get a pen, she said she heard the door close behind her. When she returned, Rodriguez was in her apartment.

The probable cause states the two began talking before Rodriguez allegedly grabbed her and pulled her on him, forcing sexual intercourse. He then moved her to the bed and continued the assault while she attempted to fight him off and tell him no.

When Rodriguez left, he allegedly told the victim, "I need a drink, a sandwich, three hours with you," Martinson reported Rodriguez is larger than the victim and could easily over power her.

Rodriguez is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$75,000 cash-only bond.



Letter to the Editor

I'm 74 years old and the great grandmother of two little girls that were molested by their father, Daren Godfrey, when they were seven and eight. Now they are 11 and 12.

He has not spent one night in jail. Finally, we thought we had some closure. He asked for a jury hearing here in Cassville. He got what we wanted, and three days of sitting in the court, him lying through his teeth: not guilty was the verdict. It broke our hearts to watch the film they made while in the courtroom.

The abuse they went through, they told everything that happened while in his home, which was terrible. This man weighs approximately 300 pounds and stands six feet tall or more. His little girls were so little and it made no difference to the jury.

I, their great grandmother, was the one they told. Even to this day they tell the same story of what happened the nine months they were taken to his home. They told their school counselor, and still nothing done, not reported. When they told me, I did something. I went to the Sheriff's office at Cassville. All three little girls were removed from his home. He also had their little half sister, six months older than the eight year old.

I just hope this never happens to another child. He even

admitted to the officer that interviewed him why he did these things. The officer was in court and testified to that was told to him by Daren and still made no difference to the jury.

This is why there are so many sexual predators on the streets today. They know they can get away with it in Barry County. Does anyone know what to do about this problem? We need help in the courts in this county. Something is wrong.

I hope these people that were in the jury had a good night's sleep. The family didn't. Thank you for nothing.



Videmschek situation illustrates hiring difficulties

When Cassville announced it had hired veteran softball coach Lori Videmschek to guide the Lady Wildcats next Fall, the move took many by surprise. Not that anyone doubted Videmschek's coaching resume' or leadership ability. The surprise was in the realization that she would be coaching softball at two different high schools in the same school year.

This rarely seen and unorthodox approach is Cassville's solution to filling a coaching vacancy. This particular move is possible only because Cassville's girls compete during the fall, while the Purdy Lady Eagles compete in the spring.

Athletic Directors nationwide are finding it harder and harder to fill coaching openings with members of the teaching faculty. Long hours, low pay, constant scrutiny and high expectations have combined to work against teachers accepting even more responsibilities at an even lower pay scale. Fast food

workers make more per hour than most high school and middle school coaches.

Even harder than finding head coaches is plugging people into the many assistant coaching slots. Some teachers are willing to accept coaching responsibilities to make themselves more desireable as a job candidate, but then step out of coaching once they are tenured. Others agree to take on a coaching job, only to resign after a short time. Many sports programs suffer as a result of the perpetual coaching carousel.

It should come as no surprise then that more and more schools are hiring coaches who are not full time faculty members. Having off-campus coaches doesn't fit the perceived norm and comes with its own set of headaches and challenges, but it is the new reality in an education world that embraces more and more extracurricular and athletic activities.

For Videmschek, the additional stipend will be bling her workload.

For the veteran coach, methods and routines implemented at Cassville will mirror what she has instilled at Purdy. The adjustment to new players, assistant coaches, parents, and community will be no harder than accepting any other new gig. The sticky part will be juggling players from both schools during the offseason.

"I am coaching both teams separately this summer. Both varsity and JV," said Videmschek. "I have both varsity teams in the Monett league, and I have it worked out that Purdy and Cassville don't play each other."

Sound busy? It gets better. "I coach both teams at different times," Coach V continued. "My JV league is at Cassville, and both JV teams play each other. It has worked out well and I get a chance to work on fundamentals for both teams. Plus, I have put both teams on a weight/agility program. It's been a challenge this summer but I have

MDC expands deer feeding ban in response to CWD

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) has expanded its restrictions on feeding deer and placing minerals for deer to seven new counties in response to finding cases of chronic wasting disease (CWD) in or near them. The seven new counties are: Bollinger, Cape Girardeau, Grundy, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, and Perry. The feeding ban for these seven new counties becomes effective July 1.

These seven new counties join 41 existing counties of the Department's CWD Management Zone where feeding deer and placing minerals for deer is restricted. The Zone consists of counties in or near where cases of the disease have been found. The 48 counties are: Adair, Barry, Benton, Bollinger, Boone, Callaway, Cape Girardeau, Carroll, Cedar, Chariton, Cole, Cooper, Crawford, Dade, Franklin, Gasconade, Grundy, Hickory, Jefferson, Knox, Linn, Livingston, Macon, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, Miller, Moniteau, Morgan, Osage, Ozark, Perry, Polk, Putnam, Randolph, Schuyler, Scotland, Shelby, St. Charles, St. Clair, St.

According to the Wildlife Code of Missouri, the placement of grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable natural and manufactured products used to attract deer is prohibited year-round within counties of the CWD Management Zone. Exceptions are feed placed within 100 feet of any residence or occupied building, feed placed in such a manner to reasonably exclude access by deer, and feed and minerals present solely as a result of normal agricultural or forest management, or crop and wildlife food production practices.

"CWD is spread from deer to deer and the potential for transmission increases when deer are unnaturally congregated," said MDC Wildlife Disease Coordinator Jasmine Batten. "CWD can also spread when healthy deer come into contact with salvia, urine, or feces shed into the environment by infected deer. Placing feed and minerals for deer can facilitate the spread of diseases such as CWD. Recent

research has confirmed the presence of CWD at mineral sites, which further supports this ban."

For the seven new counties, MDC has also increased the availability of antlerless permits, and expanded the firearms antlerless portion to help harvest more deer in the counties and limit the spread of the disease.

MDC confirmed 33 new cases of CWD following the testing of nearly 24,500 free-ranging Missouri deer through its sampling and testing efforts last season. The new cases were found in Adair, Cedar, Franklin, Jefferson, Linn, Macon, Perry, Polk, St. Clair, and Ste. Genevieve counties. These new cases bring the total number of free-ranging deer in Missouri confirmed to have CWD to 75.
