Cassville Arts Council bringing fine arts to the forefront

FIRST PERFORMANCE KICKS OFF JUNE 27

A newly formed arts council will give members of the Cassville community a creative outlet for those who want to express themselves through song, dance and the fine arts. The Cassville Arts Council was officially begun in March of this year, and board president and founder Trent Oliphant is hoping the groups's inaugural performance will draw more attention to arts in the community.

The first production for the Cassville Arts Council debuts next week on June 27. The group will be presenting the Pirates of Penzance, and the show runs through June

Oliphant explained how the council began and his hopes for the future. He said, "I've been wanting to form this group since I moved here six years ago. I've been involved in community theatre for most of my life, and there aren't that many community theatre opportunities in the area. There are none in Cassville."

Oliphant reached out to two other members of the community to ask them about serving on the council's board so he could make the group a non-profit. Mary Richmiller, longtime choral music director at Cassville High School, and Lee Allphin, of Stark City, both agreed to serve. Oliphant said, "It was just me, and I recruited a couple people because in the state of Missouri to have a not-for-profit organization, you have to have at least three people on the board.

"They were both interested in what we are trying to do." After the initial performance, Oliphant plans to recruit additional board members to provide a variety of perspectives from people to move the council forward. As it stands, the group is planning on one musical theatrical performance a year before branching out to other areas in the fine arts. Oliphant said, "Even in the theatre, I would like to see them do some children theatre and education workshops. I'd like to see people get involved, and we want to bring in a concert series with various types of musical groups to perform concerts, like trios and quartets. I'd like to see music that we don't see here, like jazz and classical.

"I'd also like to sponsor a visual arts show, as well. It's an arts council and I'd like to include all of the fine arts, both visual and performing."

A lot of the group's plans are dependent on volunteers

Exeter School bumps teacher pay for 2019-20 school year

During the Exeter School Board on Wednesday, June 12, the board discussed the budget for the 2019-2020 school year. In that discussion, the board revealed they had previously passed a resolution to increase the base pay to all certified teaching staff within the district.

During the 2018-2019 school year, base pay for all first year teachers in the district was set at \$30,500. In previous meetings, administration brought up the idea of raising that starting salary. According to superintendent Dr. Ernest Raney, this year, the board found it was in the budget to raise that amount by \$500.

The new base salary for first-year teachers at Exeter increased to \$31,000 for the school year. This pay bump will also ripple out through the payscale, effectively raising all salaries by \$500 per year.

According to Dr. Raney, this is a move that the board considers on a yearly basis. The superintendent hopes the pay increase will make the prospect of working for

the school attractive to new teachers and allow the district to remain competitive with the starting salaries in other districts.

The new pay scale will take effect at Exeter Schools beginning in the 2019-2020 school year.

Purdy water, sewer bills to raise in July

Residents in Purdy can expect a jump in their water and sewer bills from the city in July. Purdy's City Council voted unanimously to raise rates to compensate for rising costs. The last time water and sewer rates

were raised in the city was 2011 and 2013, respectively.

Currently, the charges two different water rates for customers inside the city limits and outside the city limits. Water rates for the first 1,000 gallons is a \$16.50 cost and each 1,000 gallons over 1,000 is \$3.50 for customers inside the city limits. Outside the city limits, the rate is \$35.75 for the first 1,000 gallons and \$3.50 for each 1,000 gallons after

Sewer rates in the city are a \$20 minimum for the first 1,000 gallons of water used and \$5 for each additional 1,000. There are no sewer customers outside the city limits.

In all, the city has 379 sewer customers and 479 customers roughly 66 customers paying the minimum water bill each month, most of those estimated to be businesses.

City manager Debbie Redshaw presented information to the city council at the meeting on June 12 that ary, February and March to in order to break even on water and sewer costs, the city needed to raise rates for water bills to be around \$11 higher and sewer bills needed to be raised by around \$36 per customer.

As a result, the city council members worked together to establish new rates in the city that went into effect starting with the bills customers will receive in July. New rates will be \$25 for the first 1,000 gallons of water for in-limits residents and \$45.75 for outside limits customers. After that first 1,000 gallons, inside customers will pay \$5 for each 1,000 gallons and residents outside of the city will pay \$10 for each 1,000 gallons after.

For sewer rates, the city is raising the minimum for the first 1,000 gallons to \$30 and each additional 1,000 gallons will cost \$10. Sewer bills will continue to be calculated using an average of water usage in Januprevent cost spikes based on watering gardens and other summer activities.

Trash rates on customers' bills will remain the same at \$12.50 each month.

The jump will be large for customers, but city officials stand firm that there was no other option to get the city to break even on water and sewer.

Redshaw said, "We can't do incremental increases, because we don't have the funds to just pay for the difference as we raise them."

The council lamented the city should have implemented incremental increases for years instead of leaving rates steady for so long and putting the city in a bad financial situation on utilities.

Redshaw said, should have been doing this slowly, but now we can't."

Purdy mayor Bo Prock said the city needs to get on a schedule for small, annual changes after this first big

Seligman reinstates Zoning, Planning Commission

During a meeting of the Seligman City Council on Monday, June 10, the board of alderman made the final steps toward re-assembling a longstanding regulatory body. The council moved to recreate a zoning and planning commission to help assess public concerns regarding building ordinances and propose changes to city council.

During previous council meetings, several public con-

cerns about issues related to zoning ordinances within the city were raised. These issues ranged from ordinances regarding the pitch of roofs on manufactured homes to regulations preventing tiny homes from being built on ground meant for mobile homes.

In order to resolve these issues, Seligman's city council opted to reform a zoning and planning commission. Seligman has not had a commission of this kind since 2013,

This commission will be a commission of seven to 15 citizens that will act as an intermediary between concerned citizens and the council. One of these members is required to be an alderman of the city. At the council meeting on June 10, the board of alderman elected Robert Hughes to be the board's representative on the commission. Though he is not required to do so, Seligman mayor Michael Avers elected to join the commission, as well.

according to city clerk Brian

Nichols.

The commission will listen to public concerns related to city ordinances. They will then draft proposed changes to legislation and present to the council to be heard for consideration of approval.

"Board approval is necessary for any final changes to be made," said Nichols.

The commission currently has five members confirmed to be a part of the commission which is two short of the amount that city ordinance requires for the commission to meet.

"We still need two more individuals to have the meeting," said Nichols. "We currently have five: three citizens, the mayor and one alderman."

In order to drum up more membership, the city will place a notice about the commission's formation on the back of the next cycle of water

jump in rates. He said, "We need to talk about raising these annually so this doesn't happen again."

When looking at the average bill in municipalities, usage is calculated at 5,000 gallons of usage. At 5,000 gallons of usage, Purdy's bill will change from the current cost of \$70.50 for water and sewer for inside city limits customers to \$115. With trash, the new bill, for 5,000 gallons of usage,

For residents outside of the city limits, water bills will go from \$49.75 to \$85.75 for 5,000 gallons of usage.

In 2018, other Barry County cities' bills for 5,000 gallons of usage* are: Cassville \$33.49 for water, \$46.55 for sewer for a total of \$80.04; Exeter - \$33.75 for water, \$41.00 for sewer for a total of \$74.75; Monett - \$24.52 for water, \$27.95 for sewer for a total of \$52.47 Seligman - \$26.75 for water, \$28.50 for sewer for a total of \$55.25; Washburn -\$54.00 for water, \$28.33 for sewer for a total of \$82.33; and Wheaton - \$35.75 for water, \$25.75 for sewer for a total of \$61.50. *provided by the Missouri Public Utility Alliance

Barry County Fair returning June 29

On Saturday, June 29, the annual Barry County Fair is returning. The event will be hosted at the Exeter Corn Maze, just off of Highway MM southwest of Exeter. Admission into the fair is free, with admission into cattle, goat, sheep, individual rabbits and individual chicken livestock events costing attendees \$5 per head. Pens of meat rabbits and pens of broiler chickens cost \$5 per pen for admission.

There will be a concession stand at the fair offering food for purchase throughout the day.

The fair will include activities provided by the corn maze, such as: barn swings, a zipline, a cow train ride and a paintball shack. There will be \$7 activity bracelet available for purchase for access to all of the activities.

There will also be a 'gemmining' station at the event for \$5 per bag and go-kart races available for \$3.

Every year, the county fair serves as an opportunity for local youth livestock owners, Future Farmers of America (FFA) members and 4H members to pit the size, behavior and overall quality of their animals against competitors from all over the county. Livestock events are limited to youth competitors, with an age limit 18 for active 4H members and 21 for active FFA members.

Activities will begin at 7 a.m. with a blue ribbon breakfast consisting of biscuits and gravy and a drink for \$5. There will also be donuts available for an additional charge.

Check-ins for livestock events will begin at 7 a.m. and will proceed as follows:

- 7 a.m. check-in times for beef and dairy cattle, beef cattle and steer weigh-in.
- 8 a.m. Dairy cattle show, swine check-in and weigh-in begins
- 9 a.m. Beef cattle show, goat check-in/weighin and sheep check-in/ weigh-in
- 10 a.m. Swine show begins
- 11 a.m. Dairy goat show, meat goat show and sheep show
- 1 p.m. Poultry check-in, broiler chicken weigh-in.
- 1:30 p.m. Broiler chick-

en show begins

- 2 p.m. Poultry show, rabbit check-in/weigh-in
- 2:30 p.m. Rabbit show will immediately follow the poultry show

The beginning of the end of this year's fair will be marked by a premium sale dinner slated to begin at 5:30 p.m. At this time, the concession stand will begin serving meals of pulled pork, baked beans, potato salad, a dessert and a drink. The premium sale dinner is available for a donation that can be made to a donation jar that will be set out during the dinner.

At 6:30 p.m., the premium sale will begin. Competitors from the livestock events present their animals to attendees for purchase. A main buyer will be able to purchase the animal and add-on buyers will also be able to contribute to help competitors in 4H and FFA fund their future projects.

"It's a lot of hard work to set up, but it's a lot of fun," said Barry County Fair treasurer and secretary Sherri Sanders. "We really enjoy seeing what the kids bring to show each year and we're really looking forward to seeing everyone out there."

The Barry County Fair will begin at 7 a.m. on Saturday, June 29, at the Exeter Corn Maze, located south-





Barry County Democrats donate to food pantry Temporary road closure on east 14th in Cassville





always knew we could count on her support in anything that we did."


Mattingly has lived and worked in the district for a large portion of her life.



and how the community receives the initial performances.

Oliphant is optimistic that people in the area will see the value in what the board hopes to grow into. He said, "Arts are an important part of a society. To me, the arts are the heart and soul of the society. Specifically, community level artistic endeavors can help bring a community together. I love participating in community theatre, especially in this digital age where we are connected more electronically but less connected from a human perspective. The arts are one of the best ways for us to connect as humans. When we can do this on the community level, I think it'll bring it together. Sports are fantastic, but I feel like arts can bring us together as a community with more empathy and understanding of each others conditions.'

He added that his own children were a driving

force for taking the initiative to start the council, and Cassville School was a big source of actors and singers for the first performance. The council recruited auditions through Facebook, advertising in the newspaper and word of mouth.

With Pirates of Penzance performances running for four days, the group is hoping once people see the performance, more volunteers will offer to lend their talents to future endeavors. 



Apply online for managed deer hunts starting July 1

Beginning July 1, deer hunters can apply online through the Missouri Department of Conservation's (MDC) website for a shot at more than 100 managed deer hunts throughout the state for archery, muzzleloading, and modern firearms from mid-September through mid-January at conservation areas, state and other parks, national wildlife refuges, and other public areas. Some managed hunts are held specifically for youth or for people with disabilities.

The managed deer hunt application period is July 1 - 31. Hunters are selected by a weighted random drawing. Draw results will be available Aug. 15 through Jan. 15. Applicants who are drawn will receive area maps and other hunt information by mail.


