Barry County Jail inmate dead after apparent suicide Charlea Estes-Jones

A man being held in the Barry County Jail was found dead in his cell after an apparent suicide last weekend. David Allen, 32, was of Huntsville, Ark., but had been staying in Eagle Rock, according to Chief Deputy Major Leonard Collins.

Allen was booked into the jail on Saturday, June 16, on a 24 hour hold for resisting arrest and third degree assault. Collins said, "They had to chase him to arrest him when he fled in the beginning. There was no injury to either officer or him during the resisting arrest."

Collins said officers then transported Allen to Mercy Hospital in Joplin due to his visible intoxication. Collins said he was there for a few hours before hospital staff released him. "He was intoxicated when he was brought in and that made him a risk to himself. When he was arrested, he was taken to the hospital for a check of his intoxication level to be sure he was physically fit for confinement," Collins said. He added that neither staff nor officers had any reason to believe Allen was a danger to himself or others.

Allen was placed in a cell alone. Jailers conduct hourly cell checks at the jail, and during one of Allen's cell checks on Sunday, June 17, officers found him unresponsive. Collins said he was pronounced dead at the scene.

An autopsy conducted at Cox South Hospital in Springfield confirmed the death as by suicide. Collins said a newly installed phone in the cell had a cord that Allen used to hang himself. Collins said there will no longer be a corded phone in the cell.

Collins said there is no suspected officer misconduct or reason to believe negligence was involved in the incident. He said, "All the rules were in place for regular safety checks and protocols. It was an unfortunate incident, but we don't believe there was an error."

Allen had been known to officers previously when he was in the jail earlier this year in February. Collins said he was booked in for a failure to appear, but the charges have since been dropped. There were no incidents while Allen was in jail in February.

Allen also faced two charges for rape out of Madison County, Ark., originating August 1, 2017.

Allen's next of kin was notified.

Early next week kicks off the start of Independence Day festivities throughout Barry County. Fireworks are set to start around 9 p.m. and will last approximately 30 to 40 minutes. Patrons can line up along Highway C in Purdy near Ramey's and the school.

Seligman's celebration will begin with a patriotic parade with cash prizes, followed by a meal, musical entertainment and fireworks at dark.

The parade will begin at 5 p.m. Those wishing to par-

ticipate need to line up at Dollar General at 4:30 p.m. This year's prizes will be awarded for the most patriotic entries: \$100 for first, \$50 for second and \$25 for third. The parade is sponsored by the City of Seligman.

City of Cassville offers temporary water meters for gardens, pools this summer **CUSTOMERS COULD SAVE HUNDREDS ON SEWER BILLS**

The City of Cassville came out with a new option to save customers money during the summer months when they are using water outdoors. David Brock, Cassville Public Works director, released information this week that

customers can get a separate, temporary meter to use on outdoor water faucets when filling up swimming pools or watering gardens.

Brock said, "Your water and sewer bill is based on your water bill reading. In the summer time there can be water uses that don't go down the sewer. Watering your garden, washing your car, filling in swimming pools. Without a means to record what outside use is, we've been unable to adjust people's bills for sewer usage."

The average Cassville family uses around 5,000 gallons of water each month. Billing for that through the city is \$4.11 per 1,000 gallons of water and \$7.43 per 1,000 gallons of water for sewer service. Families watering gardens, washing cars and filling up swimming pools get charged for both water and sewer, even though that high usage isn't being processed through the water treatment plant.

With sewer rates, filling up a swimming pool or watering a garden all summer can come with a pretty hefty price tag. For a 30,000 gallon pool, the city bills \$123.30 for the water, but \$222.90 for sewer unless customers already have a separate meter that reads outdoor

Brock said this solution is after the city received complaints about that billing. "It does generate complaints and concerns from residents. Lots of folks put up a pool in the summertime. We try to listen to those and try to address that. This is something we've done up with. This is used in other communities, and we felt this was a good way to respond."

To get a temporary water meter that attaches to an outside faucet, current customers just need to go to Cassville City Hall, pay a \$75 deposit to check out the meter, and then they can hook it up at home to their hose bib or yard hydrant without assistance. Brock said customers have a couple options to get their credit for sewer usage. Customers then have two options. They can bring it back once they've finished the bulk of their outdoor water use, for example once

their pool is filled or their garden is finished for the season. The other option is to bring the meter back intermittently throughout the year to have it read by the city to get credit for sewer charges and then take it back to their home to reinstall.

Every time the customer brings the meter back to the city, they will be credited on their next bill. Brock said, "Essentially, we'll deduct those gallons off of the sewer usage on the next bill."

Once meters are checked back in to City Hall, customers get their \$75 deposit back.

With the program just starting, Brock said they have four of the temporary meters ready for customers to check out, and more will be built as they are needed. He said. "We have four and we'll wait and see. With this as the first year, we're not sure how much response we'll get. We ask for a \$75 deposit because that's

Monett preschooler dead from gunshot wound

A Monett preschooler died from an apparent gunshot wound early on Tuesday morning, June 26. According to a press release by Monett Chief of Police George Daoud, they received a call at 6:06 a.m., and it is currently under investigation.

The incident happened in

the 500 block of Mt. Pleasant, and the Monett Police Department classified it as an "unattended death" of three year old Anthony Latorre, Jr., a child living at the residence. Latorre had died of a single gunshot wound to the head.

The release stated, "It was determined that the victim had woke up and went to the

garage and was playing in the family car. The victim found a semi-automatic pistol that was in the car and accidently discharged the weapon."

The Monett Police Department, Monett Fire Department and Barry-Lawrence County Ambulance service were all on scene.

Barry County Coro-

ner Jim Fohn was on scene and transported the child to Springfield for an autopsy.

Daoud said the investigation is still ongoing pending the results of the autopsy.


Williams was transported to Mercy Hospital in Rogers, Ar., for serious injuries.





Remember laws, safety for at-home firework shows

With fireworks tents popping up across the county, there are plenty of opportunities to put on your own fireworks show this year. It's important to know the ordinances in your city to ensure you don't unintentionally get a fine for your Fourth celebration and also practice safety around fireworks.

Different cities across Barry County have different rules for setting off fireworks within city limits. Across the board, residents face fines in municipal court if they break the law regarding fireworks.

• Butterfield

Fireworks are allowed within the city limits as long as there is no burn ban in place between 9 a.m. and 10 p.m.

Cassville

Fireworks are not to be discharged within the city limits at any time.

• Exeter

Fireworks are permitted on July 3, 4 and 5 each year until midnight.

• Purdy

Fireworks are allowed from June 29 through July 8 from 11 a.m. to 11 p.m. each day.

• Seligman

Fireworks can be discharged within the city limits of Seligman year round until 10 p.m. each evening. On July 4 and New Year's Eve, they are allowed until 12 a.m.

Washburn

Fireworks are allowed within the Washburn city limits on July 3 and 4 between the hours of 9 a.m. and 11 p.m.

• Wheaton

In Wheaton's City limits, fireworks may be set off from June 20 through July 4 until 10 p.m. with the exception of July 4. On July 4, fireworks can be discharged until midnight. The Purdy Police Department also released the following statement: "Fireworks shall not be discharged from a moving vehicle, toward a vehicle, toward a person, toward a building or residence, toward any animal, or in any careless or reckless manner.

"Anyone violating these conditions shall have their fireworks confiscated, and shall be issued a citation.

"All children discharging fireworks shall be supervised by an adult 18 years of age or older"

Aside from the legality of fireworks throughout Barry County, everyone should also be aware of safety concerns. Fireworks should never be discharged during a burn ban. They also should not be shot near or at people, animals or residences.

"Public fireworks shows are the safest way to enjoy fireworks and they provide the most dramatic sights," State Fire Marshal Tim Bean said. "If you are thinking about using consumer fireworks, it is essential that you consider how to eliminate the many risks they present – from dangerous burns and other injuries to house fires. Also, find out whether fireworks are even legal to use where you live."

Fire Marshal Bean said across the nation July 4th is

the busiest day of the year for fires and that almost one-half of fires that day are caused by fireworks.

He released the following tips:

- Confirm fireworks are legal where you live; purchase fireworks only from a properly licensed retailer.
- Only use fireworks in a large open space that has been cleared of flammable materials
- Always keep young children away from fireworks; if teens are permitted to handle fireworks, they should be closely supervised by an adult; always wear eye protection.
- Make sure to have a garden hose or a bucket of water nearby in case of a fire.
- Only light fireworks one at a time; never try to re-light fireworks that have malfunctioned.
- Dispose of fireworks by soaking them in water and leaving them in a trash can.
- Never shoot fireworks off from a glass jar or container.
- Never use fireworks while consuming alcohol.

• Fireworks start an aver-

age of 18,500 fires per year, including 1,300 structure fires, 300 vehicle fires, and 16,900 outside and other fires. These fires caused an average of \$43 million in direct property damage.

• In 2015, U.S. hospital emergency rooms treated an estimated 11,900 people for fireworks related injuries; 51 percent of those injuries were to the extremities and 41 percent were to the head. Children younger than 15 years of age accounted for 26 percent of the estimated 2015 injuries.

In addition, the Fourth of July season is a prime time for pets to go missing because of disorientation from firework sounds. Pets and wildlife can become disoriented and be unable to find their homes or

Be sure your pet has a tag with identifying information. Keep domestic animals safe indoors, if possible, during times fireworks are being discharged.

If you see an animal that appears to be lost after Independence Day, be sure to contact the appropriate authority.

If you find wildlife disoriented from firework noise, it is best to leave the animal alone.

Barry County courts incarcerate 8 in the month of May

• Jennifer Lynn Brown-Downard, of Rogers, Ark., made an Alford plea to two counts of attempted assault in the first degree. Brown-Downard received and suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

Brown-Downard at Jersey's in Cassville on November 11, 2017, when she was asked to leave for creating a disturbance. Another person at the bar then also told her to leave.

When Brown-Downard left the bar, she swerved her car and attempted to run over at least three people standing in the parking lot. At least one had to jump out of the way to avoid being hit. Brown-Downard is to serve probation until May

21, 2023

• Hester Nicole Burton, of Billings, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Burton granted a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On April 8, 2017, Burton was checked into the Barry County Jail. While being checked in, a syringe fell out of her hip area during intake. Then, rolled up toilet paper fell out while she was removing her undergarments. A meth pipe was inside the toilet paper. The pipe field tested positive for methamphetamine.

Burton is to serve probation until May 14, 2023.

• Michael Combs, of Monett, pled guilty to resisting arrest for a felony. Combs received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and supervised probation for five years.

On August 10, 2017, Combs was informed there was a warrant for his arrest while he was at an apartment on Euclid in Monett. After being told, Combs hid behind a water heater in a closet in the apartment to avoid being arrested.

Combs is to serve probation until May 22, 2023.

• Eddie Mack Cook, Jr., of Chester, Ark., pled guilty to tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree in May 2016. His probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve seven years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On December 30, 2015, Cook went to a residence on Route H in Shell Knob where he got into an altercation with another person there. Following the altercation, Cook got into a pickup and attempted to leave the scene. However, as he attempted to flee, he failed to negotiate a curve and crashed into a ditch. When officers arrived, tools were strewn in the ditch.

The owner of the truck was notified of the crash, and told officers Cook did not have permission to drive the vehicle, which was worth around \$8,500 and the equipment and tools around \$9,000. Cook had been working on the victim's farm for about ten days prior to the incident.

Cook was located when the victim saw him in a restaurant in Shell Knob. Former Sheriff Mick Epperly heard Cook admit that he had wrecked the truck.

• Billie Estes Dotson, of Purdy, made an Alford plea to three counts of possession of a controlled substance. Dotson received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On December 19, 2016, a search warrant was served at Dotson's residence in Purdy. Inside, officers found multiple baggies of methamphetamine weighing eight grams, a glass pipe and other paraphernalia, baggies of marijuana, a marijuana grinder, and multiple controlled substances, including alprazolam, oxycodone and diazepam.

On February 7, 2017, officers served another search warrant at Dotson's residence in Purdy. Inside, officers found baggies of methamphetamine weighing one gram, a glass pipe, multiple pills such as alprazolam and muscle relaxers, multiple syringes, paraphernalia, empty baggies, and a marijuana pipe.

Dotson is to serve probation until May 21, 2023.

• Timothy Brian Gaston, of Aurora, pled guilty to property damage in the second degree. Gaston received a suspended imposition of sentencing and two years unsupervised probation.

On February 27, 2017, Gaston bought eggs at Braum's in Monett and then threw eggs at the victim's car in the Taco Bell parking lot. The eggs did over \$3,000 worth of damage to the paint on the vehicle. Gaston said he threw the eggs at the car because of an altercation between the victim and Gaston's sister.

Gaston is to serve probation until May 21, 2020.

• Jeanelle Elizabeth Hopkins, of Aurora, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Hopkins received a suspended imposition of sentencing and three years supervised probation.

On September 19, 2017, Hopkins was pulled over in Cassville for excessive speeding and erratic driving. Hopkins claimed she was having trouble seeing after a friend had given her pills to help her sleep. She gave the officers a prescription bottle with a tizanidne, zolpidem and oxycodone in it.

Hopkins is to serve probation until May 21, 2021.

• Shawn Lee House, of Purdy, pled guilty to driving while revoked/suspended in January 2016. House's probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve three years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On July 13, 2012, House was initially charged with driving while revoked/suspended after he was found driving on State Highway 39 in Shell Knob.

• James Ray Larson, of Seligman, pled guilty to resisting arrest by fleeing creating a substantial risk of death/injury to any person. Larson received a suspended imposition of sentencing and four years supervised probation.

On November 20, 2016, Larson was speeding on farm roads over 100 miles per hour, trying to evade law enforcement. Eventually, he ran off the road and struck a ditch, disabling the car he was driving.

After crashing, Larson fled on foot, leaving the female passenger on the ground, going into the woods away from officers. Larson had a suspended license from three prior convictions.

Larson was also found driving while suspended on October 30, 2012, January 25, 2013, and March 21,

Larson is to serve probation until May 22, 2022.

• Bradley Keith Lester, of Cassville, pled guilty to possession of a controlled

substance. Lester received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On November 3, 2016, Lester was pulled over for having an active warrant. When officers searched the vehicle, they found a tin containing a cut straw and methadone.

Lester is to serve probation until May 22, 2023.

• Tanner C. McNabb, of Cassville, made an Alford plea to possession of a controlled substance. McNabb received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

On September 18, 2017, Lester was traveling at a high rate of speed and almost hit a law enforcement vehicle headed in the opposite direction, causing the officer to have to drive off the road. When McNabb was apprehended, officers found ammunition in a cloth bag and a meth pipe under the seat.

McNabb is to serve probation until May 21, 2023.

Morgan received seven year incarceration with the Department of Corrections of which he will serve 120 days of shock time.

On February 26, 2018, Morgan was pulled over by law enforcement when his passenger was known to have a warrant. Morgan attempted to evade officers, driving at a high rate of speed. At one point, Morgan's vehicle became airborne.

Morgan and the passenger both fled on foot. Morgan handed something to a woman who was a bystander. When officers asked the woman what Morgan handed her, they were given a cigarette pack containing methamphetamine. weighing 0.2 grams.

• Richard Clayton Morgan, of Rogers, Ark., pled guilty to assault in the fourth degree. Morgan received a suspended imposition of sentencing and two years unsupervised probation.

On May 21, 2017, Morgan shoved a victim into a wall, fracturing his scapula and rib.

Morgan is to serve probation until May 21, 2020.

• Donna Marie OHagan, of Monett, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance and delivery of a controlled substance to a jail. OHagan received a suspended execution of a five years incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On March 8, 2016, OHagan was stopped for a traffic infraction. When pulled over, officers saw a meth pipe in plain view. When searched, OHagan was found to have two baggies of methamphetamine inside her bra.

OHagan is to serve probation until May 24, 2023.

Pickle is to serve probation until May 21, 2023.

supervised probation.

Pruitt wrote multiple bad checks, including multiple to H&W Oil in Monett, the Barry County Collector, Ruby's in Seligman, ranging from around \$20 up to over \$1,000.

Pruitt is to serve probation until May 24, 2023.

• James Levi Rice, of Aurora, pled guilty to a stealing related offense as a third offense in December 2016. Rice's probation has since been revoked, and he is to serve four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On April 26, 2016, Rice was staying at a residence in Monett. When he left, he took a cell phone and charger that did not belong to him. When officers spoke with him, he was carrying a bag that contained a syringe. In his pocket was the stolen cell phone.

• John Steven Lucky Schatte, of Monett, pled guilty to tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree. Schatte was sentenced to four years incarceration with the Depart-

Schatte had stolen the truck from the other driver, attempted to wreck it by driving erratically, and texts on a cell phone corroborated the story.

• Justin Lee Schuchmann, of Purdy, pled guilty to failure to register as a sex offender. Schuchmann was sentenced to ten years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

Schuchmann was convicted of aggravated criminal sexual abuse on an eight year old girl in Illinois on November 5, 2001. He registered an address in Shell Knob as his residence on April 12, 2017. It was then discovered that he had not lived at that address since November 2010.

• Mercedes Nicole Splichal, of Berryville, Ark., pled guilty to tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree and stealing a firearm. Splichal received a suspended execution of a seven year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On June 6, 2017, Splichal and another person stole a Jeep from Arkansas before abandoning it at Harp's in Seligman. After dumping the vehicle, they took another vehicle from the parking lot. The truck was abandoned in Tennessee.

Splichal and the other person stole at least one more vehicle before officers caught them.

Splichal is to serve probation until May 24, 2023.

• Leroy Lynn Stockton, of Seligman, made an Alford plea to distribution of a controlled substance and tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree. Stockton received a suspended execution of a five year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On May 10, 2016, officers received a call about marijuana plants being grown in a yard in Seligman. When officers arrived, they found 12 potted plants in the back yard as well as nine additional plants growing.

what it costs us to build the meter and the short hose that goes with it. We'll have to see how the community receives it and respond accordingly."

METERS from FRONT

Before the City of Cassville rolled out the meter rental program, the only way to ensure customers weren't billed for sewer on outdoor water uses was to have a separate meter installed, which came with a \$900 price tag.


However, with big water consumers, like those with in ground pools, the cost of the permanent meter is recouped fairly quickly. Brock said, "When you've got 20,000 or 30,000 gallons used when you fill up a pool, that adds up. With irrigation, it's not unusual seeing 30,000 to 50,000 gallons put down on a big yard."

The City of Cassville is still advising customers with in ground irrigation systems and in ground pools to have a separate meter installed. Those customers are also required to have a backflow device to protect the drinking water system from contamination.




Assault leads to domestic, child endangerment charges

County Sheriff's Department, they were dispatched to a domestic disturbance on June 24 at a residence on Farm Road 1227 in Shell Knob. The victim stated Whittenburg choked her with one hand to where she could almost not breathe while she was holding her one year old baby. Whittenburg then allegedly grabbed her face and made threats before she was able to get away to check on the other children who were at a neighbor's house.

The victim said Whittenburg then yelled at her 11 year old child, grabbed him by the arm and "slung him in the truck."

Officers observed red marks on the victim's neck and chest as well as scratches. The 11 year old also had a red mark on his back.

Whittenburg claimed he may have "shoved" the victim but did not hit her.

Whittenburg is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$30,000 cash-only bond.

Cassville Basketball Queens make history and entertain millions

At a time when American women had barely earned the right to vote, and society insisted that women's place was in the home, Cassville's All American Red Heads broke barriers and made history as the first professional women's basketball team in the nation.

In 1936, while America was navigating through the Great Depression and CCC workers were building Roaring River State Park, Cassville businessman, C. M. "Ole" Olson, started the Cassville Red Heads, later changing the name to All American Red Heads. Olson had been the legendary star and owner of traveling men's basketball team, "The Terrible Swedes," and his wife, Doyle, owned several beauty salons in Missouri and Arkansas.

Two young women who worked for Olson's wife were great basketball players and happened to be natural red heads. Olson decided that forming a women's basketball team would be a great entertainment opportunity, and he set two rules for potential players—they had to be tall, and they had to have red hair. For those players who were not naturally red-headed, Doyle helped solve that problem by dying their hair red using henna.

Red Heads team members, many of whom hailed from Oklahoma, were paid to play approximately 200 hundred games in a 7-month season, barnstorming across America and even overseas. Civic organizations in towns across the country often organized the games to help raise money


for their particular cause. The women were all accomplished players and played only men's teams, using men's rules. The opposing teams were comprised of local talent, celebrities, or college standouts, but the Red Heads worked hard and won most of their games.

The Red Heads proved to be a very popular draw. They filled gymnasiums in small towns coast to coast, and traveled to Hawaii and Alaska, Canada, Mexico and as far as the Philippines to compete, delighting millions of people. In Hollywood, the Red Heads made guest appearances on talk shows and movie sets, playing in a variety of arenas, including a U. S. Navy battleship, and beat many celebrity teams. As a service to the military, they played at hundreds of Army camps and military hospitals throughout the years to help boost soldiers' morale.

To improve their skills even more, Olson hired upand-coming coach Orwell Moore in 1948 to lead the team. Coach Moore pushed the women to perfection. Oftentimes on a road trip, he would stop the car and make the girls get out to practice their skills between games. His wife, Lorene "Butch" Moore, was the team's most successful player at the time and remained with the team for 11 years, scoring a lifetime 35,246 points. Moore's philosophy was that playing on a professional basketball team would help women secure meaningful employment when they left the team. "Due to their professional basketball career, they get the best jobs when they go home."

The Red Heads, who have been compared to the Harlem Globetrotters, not only excelled in traditional basketball, but developed aweinspiring tricks to entertain the crowds. They played "straight" basketball at the beginning of each game, then added the entertainment. While their opponents rested during halftime, the Red Heads stayed on the floor and put on a show.

One woman was a comedienne, delighting the audience with her antics, while other team members did juggling and dribbling tricks and made fancy shots, sinking free throws from their knees and bouncing the ball off their heads to make baskets. Deb Parashak, Red Heads player from 1975 to 1977, said, "We would win a game based on the merits of our skills. We would run set trick plays for fun, but we were there to show people that women could play the game."











Being an All American Red Head wasn't all fun and games. They played rough on the court, jabbing and pulling the hair of their opponents at times. Moore was a strict coach on and off the court and never allowed them to smoke in uniform or drink alcohol, insisting the players were emulated by children across America.

They played one game a day with two games on Sundays, and they played in a different town each day. After cramming into a station wagon, bus or stretch limousine, depending on the era, and driving all day, the Red Heads kept busy with interviews, supermarket visits and promotions before each game. They were only

allowed one bag apiece to save space, so after each game ended, the entire team would head to an all-night laundromat to wash their clothes and uniforms for the next day.

Though the Red Heads showed that women are capable, competitive athletes, they felt social pressure to retain their femininity. They were allowed to wear shorts, a garment women didn't tend to wear at that time, but many of their uniforms were made of satin to express their "feminine" side. In the early days of women's traveling teams, competitive sports were considered unwomanly and mannish, and many women fell victim to untrue rumors and hurtful gossip. It was even commonly

believed that playing sports would cause a woman to be unable to have children.

One Red Head team member, Babe Didrikson, was often questioned on the levels of her female hormones. Though she did not see why a woman should not play a game she loved and excelled at, Didrikson was compelled to dispel rumors of her sexuality by wearing lace and marrying a man by the name of George Zaharias to quiet the murmurs. Stemming from these early negative experiences, Didrikson spent the rest of her career fighting for equal rights in women's sports.

Olson eventually retired, and Moore went on to own the team. He continued to coach until the All American Red Heads disbanded after fifty years of play in 1986. Many other women's basketball teams came and went over the years, but the All American Red Heads lasted the longest, surviving well past the 1972 Title IX amendment prohibiting sex-based discrimination in any federally funded education program or activity. By the mid-eighties, crowd numbers dwindled compared to the audiences in earlier decades because at that point they were used to seeing girls playing sports.

The All American Red Heads helped pave the way for women's sports long before our nation had adopted the idea of equality. In 2011, the team's efforts were recognized by the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in Knoxville, Tenn. Another honor came in 2012, when the Red Heads



were inducted into the Naismith Basketball Hall of Fame, in Springfield, Mass., the city where James Naismith invented the game of basketball in 1891.

Though the team moved on from Cassville once Olson sold it, the Barry County Museum maintains a Red Heads display as part of their permanent collection. Several years ago, a

woman using a walker visited the museum and said she was a former All American Red Heads player. She had told her children she wanted to see the display in Cassville before she passed. To date, the woman is the only player known to have visited the museum.





Seligman PD: Drive sober this Fourth

Each year on July 4th, Americans celebrate the birth and freedoms of this country. Before you head out for your celebrations, make sure you plan for a sober way home. Law enforcement in Seligman is taking part in the Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign during the Fourth of July holiday weekend, June 29 through July 5, 2018, to put an end to drunk driving. In support of law enforcement's dedication to protecting the lives of residents in their communities, you'll see increased enforcement on the roads with zero tolerance for those who drive impaired.

During the 2016 Fourth of July holiday (6 p.m. July 2 to 5:59 a.m. July 6), 188 people were killed in crashes involving at least one driver or motorcycle operator with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .08 or higher. This is a 28 percent increase from 2015, during which 146 people were killed during the same holiday period. That's 188 families who will forever remember Independence Day with a heavy heart and nightmarish memories.

"It's essential that our community members understand the safety and financial risks they take when they drink and drive,"

said Chief Matt Phillips. "Under no circumstances is it ever acceptable to get behind the wheel of a vehicle after you've been drinking. Doing so endangers you, and everyone on the road with you. If you're heading to Fourth of July parties this summer, remember: Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over."

According to NHTSA,

37,461 people were killed in motor vehicle traffic crashes in 2016, and 28 percent (10,497) of those fatalities occurred in a crash during which the driver had a BAC over the legal limit of .08. With Fourth of July festivities wrapping up in the evening or late at night, more cars will be on the roads. Nighttime is especially dangerous: the rate of alcohol impairment among drivers involved in fatal crashes during the 2016 July Fourth holiday period was more than three times higher at night than it was during the day.

"This should not come as a surprise to drivers in this country: In all 50 States, Washington, D.C., and Puerto Rico, it is illegal to drive with a BAC over .08," said Chief Phillips. "But since people aren't getting it, and since thousands of people are still dying as a result of this behavior year

after year, we will be patrolling over the holiday season and we will accept absolutely zero excuses."

Remember these tips for a safe night on the roads:

SaferRide allows users to call a taxi or a predetermined friend, and identifies the user's location so he or she can be picked up.
- If you see a drunk driver on the road, contact Seligman Police Department.
 - Have a friend who is

about to drink and drive? Take the keys away and make arrangements to get your friend home safely.

Drinking and driving is dangerous, even if you're "just buzzed." When you drive impaired, you risk your life and safety, and the lives and safety of those riding with you and around you

Farmers asked to respond to land rent survey

Missouri farmers are asked to respond to a land rent survey, says University of Missouri Extension economist Ray Massey. A report compiled from the anonymous survey responses will help landowners and renters make better decisions about lease

The survey is issued only in electronic form this year. It takes about five minutes to complete. Massey says he hopes that the new delivery method will encourage landowners and renters to respond.

The survey covers criteria such as cash rent cost for cropland, pasture land and fee hunting property, as well as location of land, average yield and storage facilities.

MU and partner agencies, including Missouri Farm Bureau, FCS Financial and others, work together to obtain information that helps economists on the local, state and federal level to assess supply and demand for land, as well as production costs and market prices. Survey results also help landowners and renters understand market values in their area.

MU conducts the survey every three years and releases a summary online and at its annual ag lending schools.





MDC sets CWD sampling efforts for deer season

The Missouri Conservation Commission recently approved recommendations by the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) for its fall and winter efforts to find cases of chronic wasting disease (CWD) and help limit the spread of the deadly deer disease to more deer and more

MDC confirmed 33 new cases of CWD following the testing of nearly 24,500 freeranging Missouri deer through its sampling and testing efforts last season. The new cases were found in Adair, Cedar, Franklin, Jefferson, Linn, Macon, Perry, Polk, St. Clair, and Ste. Genevieve counties. These new cases bring the total number of free-ranging deer in Missouri confirmed to have CWD to 75. Learn more at mdc.mo.gov/cwd under "CWD in Missouri."

New counties added to CWD management zone

Based on the findings from the past season, MDC has added seven new counties to its CWD Management Zone: Bollinger, Cape Girardeau, Grundy, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, and Perry.

These seven new counties join 41 existing counties of the Department's CWD Management Zone. The Zone consists of counties in or near where cases of the disease have been found. Mercer County was added because of the proximity of a CWD-positive deer found in southern Iowa. McDonald County was added because of CWD detection in northwest Arkansas.

The 48 counties are: Adair, Barry, Benton, Bollinger, Boone, Callaway, Cape Girardeau, Carroll, Cedar, Chariton, Cole, Cooper, Crawford, Dade, Franklin, Gasconade, Grundy, Hickory, Jefferson, Knox, Linn, Livingston, Macon, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, Miller, Moniteau, Morgan, Osage, Ozark, Perry, Polk, Putnam, Randolph, Schuyler, Scotland, Shelby, St. Charles, St. Clair, St. Francois, Ste. Genevieve, St. Louis, Stone, Sullivan, Taney, Warren, and Washington.

MDC has increased the availability of antlerless permits in the seven new counties and expanded the firearms antlerless portion to help harvest more deer in the counties and limit the spread of the disease.

MDC has also removed the antler-point restriction for Grundy and Mercer counties, which are included in the

To help limit the possible spread of CWD, MDC encourages hunters to process deer as close as possible to where harvested and to properly dispose of carcass parts by leaving or burying parts on site, or bagging parts and placing them in trash containers.

New counties part of deer feeding ban

The seven new counties added to the CWD Management Zone are also now included in MDC's ban on feeding deer and providing mineral supplements, effective July 1.

According to the Wildlife Code of Missouri, the placement of grain, salt products, minerals, and other consumable natural and manufactured products used to attract deer is prohibited year-round within counties of the CWD Management Zone. Exceptions are feed placed within 100 feet of any residence or occupied building, feed placed in such a manner to reasonably exclude access by deer, and feed and minerals present solely as a result of normal agricultural or forest management, or crop

and wildlife food production practices.

The feeding ban does not apply to food plots or other agricultural practices.

Mandatory CWD sampling

MDC will require hunters who harvest deer in 31 counties of its CWD Management Zone during the opening weekend of firearms deer season, Nov. 10 and 11, to present their deer – or the head with at least six inches of neck attached – for CWD sampling at one of 61 sampling stations throughout the counties.

The 31 counties include those where CWD has previously been detected, those within approximately five miles of a positive, select counties along the Missouri-Arkansas border near where cases of CWD have been found in Arkansas, and the seven counties added to the CWD Management Zone.

The 31 counties for mandatory sampling are: Adair, Barry, Bollinger, Cape Girardeau, Cedar, Cole, Crawford, Franklin, Grundy, Hickory, Jefferson, Knox, Linn, Macon, Madison, McDonald, Mercer, Moniteau, Ozark, Perry, Polk, Putnam, St. Charles, St. Clair, St. Francois, Ste. Genevieve, Stone, Sullivan, Taney, Warren, and Washington.

MDC asks hunters to field dress and Telecheck their deer before taking them to a CWD sampling station. Hunters can get test results for their CWD-sampled deer online at mdc. mo.gov/CWDTestResults.

"MDC is trying to limit the

spread of CWD in Missouri by finding cases and slowing the spread to more deer and more areas," said MDC Cervid Program Supervisor Barbara Keller. "Mandatory sampling is a powerful surveillance tool we use to monitor the levels of CWD in areas known to have the disease, but more importantly, to detect any 'sparks' or new areas of infection so we can begin managing for the disease in those areas without delay. With 75 confirmed cases of CWD in wild deer since 2012, the disease is still relatively rare in the state and we want to keep it that way."

Voluntary CWD sampling

MDC will again offer voluntary CWD sampling for deer harvested in any of the 48 counties of the CWD Management Zone during the entire deer season from Sept. 15 through Jan. 15, 2019. Get more information on MDC's voluntary sampling efforts, including locations, later this summer at mdc.mo.gov/cwd under "Voluntary Sampling."

MDC asks hunters to field dress and Telecheck their deer before taking them to a CWD sampling station. Hunters can get test results for their CWD- sampled deer online at mdc. mo.gov/CWDTestResults.

There have been no cases of CWD infecting people, but the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) strongly recommends having deer tested for CWD if harvested in an area known to have cases of the disease. The CDC also recommends not eating meat from animals that test positive for CWD.

Additional efforts

MDC will again contact landowners of five acres or more in areas very near to where multiple infected deer have been found to offer nocost "CWD Management Seals" to further reduce deer numbers and help limit the spread of the disease.

MDC will again also work with landowners on a voluntary basis to harvest more deer in immediate areas where CWD has been found through post-season targeted culling. These efforts help limit the spread of the disease by removing more infected deer from the areas.

More information

The Missouri Conservation Commission also recently approved several recommendations by MDC for the upcoming deer hunting season.

Growing deer numbers led MDC to allow unlimited archery antlerless permits in Butler, Iron, and Reynolds counties and to include Howell County in the antlerless portion of the fall firearms season.



Heatstroke can kill quickly in hot cars

When the news has another tragic story about a child accidentally left in a hot car, parents might believe they could never make a mistake like that.

"It's not just negligent parents or indifferent caregivers. When juggling the demands of work, parenting and daily life, it's easier than you might think to make a simple but fatal mistake," says Karen Funkenbusch, University of Missouri Extension health and safety specialist.

On average, 37 children die in the U.S. each year from heatstroke in cars, according to the nonprofit child-safety organization Kids and Cars. That's one child every nine days. And there are hundreds of cases of nonfatal heat-related illness every year, some of which result in permanent brain damage.

Pets, the elderly and people with movement disabilities are also at risk, Funkenbusch notes.

The 2010 death of Jahzel Piñon was the tragic result of miscommunication between parents, as Jahzel's mother, Stephanie

Piñon, recounts on the Kids and Cars website. Piñon was running late for a meeting one morning, she writes, when her husband helpfully buckled their 2-year-old daughter in the back of the family minivan while Piñon finished getting ready. She drove off thinking Jahzel was at home with dad. She had no idea that the shy, quiet toddler was in the minivan until she returned to her parked vehicle several hours later. An ambulance rushed Jahzel to the hospital, where she died 90 minutes after arrival. In addition to the grief and loss, Piñon faced criminal prosecution and the possibility of years in prison. She agreed to a plea deal and was sentenced to five years of probation.

Funkenbusch warns parents that leaving a child in car for even a few minutes is dangerous. The cool interior of an air-conditioned car can quickly turn deadly once you shut off the engine. Within 10 minutes the inside temperature can rise more than 20 degrees. After an hour, temperatures can increase by 40 degrees

or more, according to a 2005 study published in the journal Pediatrics. The same study revealed that leaving windows open an inch or two won't stop a car in direct sunlight from quickly becoming dangerously hot.

"You might think you'll be just a few feet away for a few seconds," Funkenbusch says. "But modern life is full of distractions—an urgent phone call, a broken ATM, a chance encounter with a friend."

The danger of heatstroke in cars isn't confined to hot days. Even when the outside temperature is only in the mid-60s, sunlight can heat the interior to 110 degrees or more, according to the National Highway Transportation Safety Administration (NHTSA).

Tips from NHTSA

• For parents and caregivers:

Look before you lock. Make a habit of always checking the back seat of your vehicle before walking

Place a needed item such as your phone, briefcase or purse in the back seat. That way, you'll see your child when you retrieve the item.

Keep your vehicle locked and keys out of reach of children. Almost 30 percent of vehicle-related heatstroke deaths happen when an unsupervised child climbs inside a vehicle.

• For bystanders who see a child alone in a vehicle:

Make sure the child is OK. If not, call 911 immediately.

If the child appears to be OK, try to find the parents. If at a store or other facility, try to have the car owner paged over the PA system.

If the child is unresponsive and appears to be in distress, attempt to get into the car to help the child, even if that means breaking a window.

Illness from mosquito, flea, tick bites has tripled since 2004

University of Missouri Extension health and safety specialist Karen Funkenbusch urges Missouri residents to take precautions to ward off mosquitoes, ticks and fleas this summer.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported in May that diseases from the bites of these insects tripled from 2004 to 2016. Also, CDC reported that nine new germs spread by mosquitoes and ticks were introduced or discovered in the United States since 2004.

Funkenbusch says people should take precautions to avoid these pests:

- Spray an Environmental Protection Agencyregistered insect repellent on your body and clothing before going outside. Follow label instructions. Reapply often. CDC recommends that you apply sunscreen before insect repellent, if using both. Do not use insect repellent on children under 2 months old. If applying to children's faces, spray on your hands first and gently rub on the child's face, avoiding contact with eyes.
- Wear long sleeves and long pants to reduce the amount of exposed skin.

Cover strollers, carriers and playpens with mosquito netting if you have to be outside.

• Control ticks and fleas

- on pets by using veterinaryapproved products.

 • Check yourself, family
- Check yourself, family members and pets for ticks daily.
- Avoid grassy areas, overhanging brush and places with standing water. Mow grass regularly and empty any containers, including objects such as toys and tires, that have standing water where mosquitoes can breed.
- Use screens on doors and windows. Remind children to close doors quickly. Repair holes in screens. Use air conditioning when pos-

Pastures were short then and hay harvest low. When bales ran out, herd owners turned cows into pastures that had not grown many leaves. Winter overgrazing grubbed pastures down, eating tillers for regrowth.

Heat and lack of rain prevent pasture recovery. Many hayfields come up 75 percent below normal, Roberts said. The problems grow.

Grass that grew this spring is long on seed stalks and short on leaves. When baled for hay, that grass can be low-energy fiber, not nutrition. It may also

"This is a year for ammoniation," Roberts said. That requires covering stacks of low-quality hay bales with plastic. Then anhydrous ammonia is leaked into the stack. Over time the gaseous nitrogen normally used for fertilizer breaks down cell-wall fiber. This releases digestible nutrients and lowers toxins in fescue hay.

The gas process used in recent droughts improved cat-

Also, beware of poisonous plants," Roberts told listeners.

The night before the teleconference, rains fell across most of the state. But rain was spotty. Some areas received 2 inches. Others got a trace, or

Spotty thunderstorms are a result of a high-pressure dome stalled over the state, said Pat Guinan, MU Extension climatologist. Weather disturbances travel along the dome edge, giving more rainfall chances. Inside the dome, isolated highenergy thunderheads drop intense rains.

Long-range forecast calls for the dome to move eastward, Guinan said. That could bring more rains as high pressure moves out.

Last weekend big rains fell over Iowa into Illinois. "Those rains were anticipated to hit more of Missouri," Guinan said. "They went north."

Strong storms brought crop-destroying hail to some

Valerie Tate, MU agronomist at Linneus, said a storm in Linn County was about a quarter-mile wide and 5 miles long.

Corn and soybean crops were shattered.

"Even hail-damaged crops are being considered for balage," Roberts said. "However, those crops should be checked for nitrate content. High nitrates can kill cattle."

Crop scouts see unusual developments of corn and soybean crops. Some soybean plants, only a few inches tall, carry blooms already.

Bill Wiebold, MU soybean specialist, has seen plants with only three trifoliate leaves in bloom. High heat slows internode growth. The plants won't grow tall but they can set pods.

Early blooms shut down use of several post-emergence herbicides. Herbicide labels tell stages of growth that stop use. Some growers may not realize soybean fields are blooming.

A common comment among specialists has been, "We've never seen anything

Some corn has shot up nearing reproductive stage in the hot weather. That's weeks ahead of normal. Other corn and soybean seed planted in dry soil hasn't germinated or emerged. One specialist reported that crusted soil stopped corn emergence.

Ranges in crop development can be extreme.

More problems may come. "Drought brings grasshoppers," Roberts said.

Farmers with unusual crop conditions seek help at their local MU Extension center. Specialists might take the questions to the weekly teleconference for help.




