As campaigning season is well under way for August's Primary Election, signs are popping up all over the county and candidates are preparing for open forums to present their reasons for running for office and plans for if they are elected.

For the three candidates for the open position of Barry County Prosecuting Attorney, Thursday night will mean a chance for the three to answer questions in a forum and get their voices out in attempt to persuade voters to cast their ballots in their favor.

Since only Republicans filed for the Prosecuting Attorney position that opened when Johnnie Cox announced that he was running for the open judge position, whoever wins the Primary is guaranteed the seat in November's official election and will take over duties next year. The judge position opened when Victor Head announced his retirement earlier this year.

Steve Dunker, Amy Boxx and Matthew Weatherman are the three candidates on August's Primary ballot and each brings differing experi-

In an anticipated move, Governor Jay Nixon vetoed a bill passed during this legislative session that would change the waiting time for an abortion from 24 hours to 72 hours from the initial appointment to when the procedure was done.



Nixon vetoed the bill, calling it "a callous disregard for women who find themselves in horrific circumstances." The bill, sponsored by Cassville's Senator David Sater, was approved by enough Representatives to make a veto override pos-

sible with 111-39, and the Senate was one vote shy of a supermajority at 22-9.

Regarding Nixon's veto, Sen. Sater stated, "I am deeply disappointed with Governor Nixon's veto of HBs 1307 and 1313. Abortion is a matter of life and death. This is an irreversible and permanent decision and taking the time to think about the consequences is not unreasonable or a burden. Governor Nixon decides to be pro-life or prochoice depending on the next election. Serious elected of-

Missouri would be the third state to have a three day waiting period have Nixon signed the bill. The other two states are South Dakota and Utah. Utah's law provides an exception for cases of rape and incest.

Missouri's law would not have provided that exception for the case of rape and incest. Sater defended the bill, saying, "Rape is a horrible, heinous crime and if I had my way, the perpetrator would have swift and permanent justice. Under current law, the victims of rape can immediately receive medical treatment at a hospital emergency room and cannot be turned away. After a physical examination, the patient is

given options of treatment of care, including psychological and physical care, as well as preventative contraception. If the patient forgoes this treatment and becomes pregnant, the current 24-hour waiting period law applies. HBs 1307 and 1313 simply extend that waiting period to 72 hours and in no way changes the existing law allowing a victim to seek medical treatment or contraception. Cases involving sexual assault are extremely serious and sensitive. We must also remember that there have been tens of millions of abortions performed since 1973 that were not the result of sexual assault."

Representative Scott Fitzpatrick - Shell Knob also supported Sater's bill. He stated, "House Republicans will be meeting August 7-9 to discuss the September veto session. We will consider all vetoed bills during that meeting. The bill in question passed the house with 111 votes. There were a handful of Republicans who missed the vote, and the bill had support from multiple democrats. With that information, I am confident that this particular bill will be overridden. Senator Sater did an excellent job getting this bill through the Senate during the regular ses-



sion, and I am going to do my best to see to it that the House overrides the veto so that Senator Sater can do his part in the Senate to get it on

the books." Sater is confident that a veto override will happen, as well. He stated, "HBs 1307 and 1313 passed with overwhelming majorities in both the Senate and the House, and I am confident my colleagues will again vote in September in support of life."

Leader Senate Tom Dempsey, R-St. Charles, issued a statement regarding the Governor's veto: We have a duty to protect the lives of the unborn and to provide help to any women who finds herself in such a desperate situation. The extended waiting period called for in our bill would have afforded women struggling with difficult circumstances with time to access pregnancy resource centers and consider alternatives to abortion, such as adoption.

"As a pro-life legislator, I believe that every life is valuable. A compassionate society is one that gives the benefit of time to a woman who may be pressured by others to make a quick decision. Giving her the protection of the law to make up her mind after considering all the options is the least we can do."

Opponents of the bill stand in support of Governor Nixon's veto. Many have stated that by increasing the waiting period to 72-hours, it places an overwhelming burden on women who need to travel to have the procedure done. Missouri's only abortion clinic is located in St. Louis.


The role of the residential life staff, which includes a hall director and at least one assistant on each floor of all residence halls, is to insure that students have a successful and positive experience in the halls.

Library vying for new Shell Knob building

The Shell Knob Friends of the Library Group presented Suzy Anglim, Shell Knob Branch Supervisor, with a \$2,000 check for the new Shell Knob Library building fund. Friends of the Library are: Karen Foster, President; Pat Coffman, past president; Danasia Hayes, vice president and treasurer; and Barb Dickerson, secretary.

The Barry-Lawrence Regional Library is seeking funds to purchase or build a new location for the Shell Knob Branch of the library.

According to Barry-Lawrence Library Director Gena Milburn, space is an overriding factor in the need for a new branch location. The current location in Shell Knob has about 3,000 square feet on two levels. Because the branch has only two staff members, only one level can safely be in use at a time which essentially limits the branch to only being able to use 1,500 feet.

"Safety is important to

us," Milburn said. "The times we live in, we need to monitor (the space) effectively.

Milburn says an ideal location for the new branch will be a 4,500 square foot building on one level located on Highway 39. At this point, a suitable location has yet to be found.

"We've looked at a lot of different pieces of property," Milburn said. "We just haven't found a lot that's suitable. We want to be ...in the main part of town. We want to be visible like we are now."

At this point, Milburn is not yet certain how much the new location will cost,

but estimates \$500,000 based on the cost of other projects of similar sizes.

"That's our educated guess," she said.

Helping the library's cause is the Friends of the Library. According to Milburn, the organization presented the library with a \$2,000 check around April 1st, and also have a stated goal to raise about \$250,000 for purchasing a new location.

"They're the driving force behind the project," Milburn stated

Other fundraising efforts have included a pledge drive and in October, the Peace Lutheran Church/Thrivant Financial will be holding a special dinner to help benefit the library.

"(The church) invited us to be the recipient along with the senior center at a soup supper to be held on October 3rd, from 4 p.m to 7 p.m. at the Shell Knob Community Center," Milburn said.

Of course, members of the community are also welcome to contribute. Milburn stated anyone wishing to make a donation will need to send it to the regional office in Monett; checks should be made out to the Shell Knob Building Fund. Milburn also added donors "can make either a one-time donation or a donation over a three-year period of time." At present, a total of \$4,000 has been raised towards the project. In terms of time, Milburn expects the acquisition of a new location to be a longterm project. She estimates it will be "at least two years" before the Shell Knob branch finds a new home.



Japanese beetles have been reported in large numbers across Missouri according to Sarah Kenyon, agronomy specialist with University of Missouri Extension.

"These destructive insects feed on roses, shrub, vegetables, and even field crops like corn and soybean. The damaged leaves typically look like Swiss cheese," said Kenyon.

Trap counts across the state indicate the population will continue to climb and will peak later in July. The green, dime-size beetle with bronze wings and white tufts of hair around its shell is amid a multi-year population boom.

Japanese beetles show little discrimination in filling their stomachs, and will feed on any plant that has a pleasant smell.

"Roses and linden trees are their favorite crops, but they'll feed on a wide variety of ornamentals, fruit trees, grapes and 440 different plants species," said MU Entomologist Wayne Bailey. "They usually feed on the tops of plants in the sunlight, and they like plants that smell succulent, so if it smells good to you they likely will prefer those plants."

Field crops also appear on the menu for the Japanese beetle. Both corn and

soybeans can receive significant damage if control measures aren't implemented.

This can be a serious pest for corn farmers. The insect will chew on corn silk and tassels. If the silks have been taken down to less than half an inch in length, there will not be any pollination, resulting in poor corn production. In corn, treatment is recommended if there are three or more beetles per ear that are producing green silks and pollination is less than 50 percent complete.

In soybean crops, Japanese beetles chew at the leaves. They prefer lush leaflets at the top of plants and can hurt yield by significantly defoliating the plant. Control is justified if there is 25 percent damage to the leaves of soybeans.

Japanese beetles live for one year. The adult lays eggs in July that hatch and develop into white larvae, which overwinter in the soil and mature during the spring. They emerge as beetles in mid-June and begin feeding. Each healthy female lays 40 to 60 eggs. Adults live up to 60 days.

Homeowners can fall back on a staple insecticide,



These individuals all abused the public's trust and stole from the very people they were supposed to be serving. They had something else in common though - to my amazement, there was no Missouri law prohibiting these individuals from receiving their public pensions. That means after committing criminal

acts against taxpayers, they could take advantage of retirement benefits funded by those same taxpayers. This loophole in our state law is completely inconsistent with our shared belief in personal and fiscal responsibility and, to correct it, I filed Senate Bill 550 this past session.

The purpose of my bill was to prohibit retirement benefits for a public employee if convicted of the following crimes: felony stealing, receiving stolen property, forgery, counterfeiting, and bribery of a public servant. These address the most serious crimes of stealing and those that have resulted in a serious erosion of public trust. A public employee would only lose their pension if the crime is related to their official job duties and does not apply to crimes committed outside of work. We ran out of time before we could consider my standalone SB 550 but I was able to amend it onto House Bill

1217, which passed and is now awaiting the governor's signature. Being a public employee it is more than a job, it is a responsibility. The people are placing their trust in you and counting on you to represent their morals and values. I am proud we made this change to our law and are now better protecting our public employee retirement system, the taxpayers' investment and, most importantly, the public's trust.

Agriculture is so important to our local economy and to the people I represent. It is also important to me and that is why I sponsored two pro-agriculture bills this past session. The first was Senate Bill 591. Many of you may know that \$1 on every head of cattle sold in the state goes to the Beef Checkoff program. Fifty cents goes to Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board for national promotion and research efforts and 50 cents

remains in state to promote Missouri beef. Right now, state law prohibits Missouri cattle farmers from voting on any changes to the state checkoff program. My bill simply repeals this law, puts the decision in the hands of cattle farmers, and lets them decide how they want to structure this program. We have a strong agricultural tradition and if we want Missouri to continue to be a leader in cattle production, it is important we promote the beef industry in our state and give the industry the ability to best decide how to accomplish that goal.

The other bill I sponsored was Senate Bill 671, which extends liability protection to livestock operations for the inherent risks of working with livestock. We all know livestock can be unpredictable, and our common sense tells us to be careful and not do anything that would put ourselves in harm's way with these animals. Not everyone uses their common sense though. I have heard of customers at a stockyard or individuals at a livestock fair getting hurt because they jumped in a pen with a bull or went somewhere they weren't supposed to be. The business owner then gets stuck with the bill or gets sued. There are protections in the bill if the livestock operation is intentionally putting people at risk or acting outside law. This bill was based on existing protections in state law for equine (horse) operations and is a commonsense fix to our law.

Senate Bill 591 was one of the first bills to pass the Senate this year and did so unanimously (32-0). Unfortunately, it got bogged down in the House after a number of other bills were added to it. Both bills ended up rolled into larger agriculture bills, Senate Bill 506 and House Bill 1326, that included other provisions such as the large animal veterinarian student loan program and the Missouri Dairy Revitalization Act. Both bills passed the last week of session but were vetoed by the governor just this week because of language in the bill that would have transferred



The McMurray's assisted Mr. Hitson by contacting RD staff regarding repair funding and by supplying labor toward completing the repairs.

The Neosho RD Office was contacted by Ms. Mc-Murray inquiring about funding to assist Mr. Hitson with needed repairs to his home. Mr. Hitson had a severe stroke and was in a healthcare facility undergoing advanced therapy. He had improved to a point that he would be able to return to his home. But his home needed of a new roof, additional insulation, and flooring. Mr. Hitson's wheelchair was difficult to maneuver with worn and torn carpet. Funding from RD allowed Mr. Hitson to get a new roof, insulation and flooring.

Home repair grants offered through Rural Development

Mr. and Mrs. McMurray, have adopted Mr. Hitson into their family and help him by taking him to his doctor appointments, the grocery store and looking in on him on a regular basis. During the process of completion of the repairs they also assisted by pulling up and disposing of the old floor coverings, painted all the interior walls and trim, and general clean up. Mr. Hitson says he is very grateful for their help and feels blessed to have

them as neighbors. Funding for the repairs was provided through the 504 Loan/Grant Program. Grants are available to eligible applicants that are age 62 or older, own and occupy the home and have an income within guidelines. Grant funds are used for essential repairs to make the home safe and sanitary by removing health and safety hazards. The 504 loans offer a 1% interest rate with up to a 20 year term for amounts up to \$20,000 to eligible applicants. Grant funding is limited and many times repairs will be funded with a combination of a loan and grant. Most repairs completed

Most repairs completed under the 504 program are roof, siding, window and door replacement, electrical repairs, furnace and air conditioning replacement and any other repairs needed to keep the home livable. All repairs are completed by a contractor of the applicant's choosing. There are no initial costs involved in submitting an application for the 504 Loan/Grant Program.

Applicants wishing to purchase a home or are in need of home repairs may contact the USDA Rural Development Office in Neosho at (417) 451-1007 Ext. 4. 





Firing up the grill less expensive in Missouri

Hot dogs, hamburgers, ribs - come and get it! Summer is in full swing. Families and friends gather to share food and fellowship. From class and family reunions to community events, outdoor meals are a tradition of the season.

Cooks will pay a bit more this summer for most meat items placed on their grill. The recent American Farm Bureau food survey revealed that a typical all-American meal for 10 of hot dogs, cheeseburgers, pork spare ribs, potato salad, baked beans, corn chips, watermelon, lemonade, chocolate

milk and the condiments will cost more than in 2013.

In Missouri, shoppers will pay less for the items needed to prepare this meal compared to the national average. The total bill in Missouri rang in at \$47.83 or \$4.78 per person. The national average for the same items cost \$58.72 or \$5.87 per person. Although higher than a year ago, a complete meal remains affordable.

Meat costs are the main contributor to the price increase. Retail meat prices are trending higher. The increase is due in large part to the historically low number

of cattle and hogs available to provide the meat we eat.

Show-Me chefs using ground round for the burgers will pay an average of \$4.82 per pound, an increase of \$1.54 over last year. The national average was \$4.45. Pork spare ribs will average \$2.80 per pound for an increase of \$0.18 per pound while mixed meat hot dogs will ring in at the same price as 2013, \$1.27 per pound.

Volunteer shoppers from Missouri and the nation provide local prices included in this survey. This informal gathering of information allows an insight into food costs and trends.

Although the prices have increased modestly over the past year, shoppers will still find a great selection of food from which to choose for their summer picnics.



Barry County courts send 12 to prison in June

• Brian Dail Adams, Cassville, pled guilty to DWI-Alcohol as a persistent offender. He was sentenced to three years incarceration.

Adams was stopped by the Monett Police Department on February 8, 2013, on Central in connection with an assault that had taken place early that morning. When the officer made contact with Adams, he admitted to having a revoked drivers license and failed field sobriety tests. Adams had two prior DWI convictions.

• James L. Beck, of Cassville, pled guilty to operating a motor vehicle on the highway while his driver's license was revoked. Beck received a suspended execution of a four year sentence with supervised probation.

Beck was charged two separate times for driving while revoked after being involved in wrecks. On March 21, 2011, the Cassville Police Department responded to an car accident where Beck was one of the drivers. In a separate incident, Beck was travelling northbound on Highway 37 on April 27, 2011, when he was involved in another motor vehicle accident. The Cassville Police

Department found that Beck session of a controlled subhad been convicted on driving while revoked two previous times in 2007 and 2009.

vised probation until June 16, 2019.

• Louis T. Briley, Branson, pled guilty to possession of a chemical with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance. He was sentenced to seven years incarceration with the execution of that sentence suspended. He is to serve supervised probation for five years.

Detective Doug Henry with the Barry County's Sheriff's Department was dispatched to an address in Elmo's Subdivision for a burglary in progress. When Det. Henry arrived, a window screen had been removed and Briley was inside the residence. Briley had a room in the residence that he referred to as "his room" where officers found methamphetamine, cold packs, camping fuel, pseudoephedrine and other items consistent with methamphetamine manufacturing.

Briley is to serve probation until June 19, 2019.

• Carri Ann Brown, Cassville, pled guilty to posstance. She was sentenced to seven years incarceration with the execution of that sentence suspended. She will serve eight days shock time in the Barry County Jail by August, 1, 2014, and supervised probation for five years.

On July 24, 2013, Cpl. John Lueckenhoff with the Missouri State Highway Patrol stopped a vehicle driven by Brown for failing to dim her headlights. Once pulled over, Brown was found to be intoxicated and in possession of five hydrocodone pills and a bottle of unknown white powder.

Brown is to serve probation until June 17, 2019.

• Jeremy A. Cape, Purdy, pled guilty to two counts of possession of a controlled substance. He was given a suspended imposition of sentence and is to serve 100 hours of community service, 30 days in the Barry County Jail with credit for time already served and five years supervised probation.

On July 17, 2013, Cape was found to be passed out behind the wheel of his 2001 Tahoe on Farm Road 2165. Sgt. Steven Jabben with the Barry County Sheriff's Department found a baggie of crystalline substance and a syringe on the ground next to the open driver's side door. Cape admitted to doing both methamphetamine and Fen-

tanyl. Once in custody, officers found a bag with scales, baggies, syringes, scissors, spoons and Fentanyl patches.

On March 16, 2014, Cape was found to be in possession of methamphetamine again on Farm Road 1057 near Exeter, as well as a digital scale. Cape is to serve probation

until June 16, 2019. • Justin Bo Cape, Bolivar,

pled guilty to trespassing in the first degree. He received a suspended imposition of sentencing and must pay restitution of \$250, serve 100 hours of community service and serve unsupervised probation for two years.

On December 12, 2011, officers with the Barry County Sheriff's Department were dispatched to an address on State Highway 37 north of George's where Cape and another suspect were found attempting to steal a truck bed full of scrap metal.

Cape is to serve probation until June 17, 2016.

• Jason E. Carter, Blue Eye, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance stemming from a charge from 2008. Carter was found to have violated his probation and was sentenced to 30 days jail time with credit for 19 days served. His probation was also extended for an additional two years.

• Jessie Causby III, Seligman, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. He
