Race heats up for Prosecuting Attorney candidates

As campaigning season is well under way for August's Primary Election, signs are popping up all over the county and candidates are preparing for open forums to present their reasons for running for office and plans for if they are elected.

For the three candidates for the open position of Barry County Prosecuting Attorney, Thursday night will mean a chance for the three to answer questions in a forum and get their voices out in attempt to persuade voters to cast their ballots in their favor.

Since only Republicans filed for the Prosecuting Attorney position that opened when Johnnie Cox announced that he was running for the open judge position, whoever wins the Primary is guaranteed the seat in November's official election and will take over duties next year. The judge position opened when Victor Head announced his retirement earlier this year.

Steve Dunker, Amy Boxx and Matthew Weatherman are the three candidates on August's Primary ballot and each brings differing experi-

ence and talent to the position.

Dunker, Cassville, is a former police officer and police detective. Most recently, he has been the assistant prosecutor for the Aurora Child Support Enforcement Project since 2010, a division of the 39th Judicial Circuit that includes Barry, Lawrence and Stone Counties. Dunker is responsible for prosecuting felony and misdemeanor child support cases in those three counties as well as Dade County.

Dunker earned his Bachelors in Criminal Justice Administration from Missouri Southern State University. He attended law school at the University of Missouri - Kansas City in 1996. On his resume, Dunker has worked as a detective for the Joplin Police Department, owned his own investigation business and has been teaching criminal justice at a variety of universities, including at Crowder in Cassville.

Dunker stated, "One of my goals for going to law school as to become a prosecutor. I have spent most of my career working in the criminal justice sector as an officer, educa-

tor and assistant prosecutor. This is the next step."

He continued, "As a former police officer, I have investigated nearly every type of crime. I have seen up close the effect crime has on victims, their family and the community. I think a prosecutor should always keep in mind the impact the crime has had and prosecute the case accordingly...I believe a prosecutor's job is to seek justice."

Amy Boxx, Monett, has practiced law in Monett for the past 18 years. She has served as the City of Monett's prosecutor since 2007. She also has her own private practice firm and has served as a special prosecutor for Barry County since 2002.

Boxx earned her Bachelors from the University of Missouri - Columbia. She then

earned her Juris Doctorate from the University of Oklahoma law school in 1995.

Boxx stated, "I enjoy my City prosecutor job, then then I found out that Johnnie was leaving it seemed like a natural progression."

She continued, "I've been in private practice for 19 years, some of that has been in defense work, so I've seen both sides of it that way, which I think will continue to help me as prosecutor."

Matthew Weatherman, Golden, has worked a Missouri State Public Defender since July 2013. He also interned in the Barry County Prosecuting Attorney's Office from May to October 2012.

Weatherman earned a Bachelors in Criminal Justice in 2007 from Quincy University. He earned his Ju-

ris Doctorate in 2012 from the Thomas M. Cooley Law School.

Weatherman stated, "I'm a tireless worker and strive to be better everyday. I've been through numerous trial trainings and formal training with the Missouri State Public Defenders."

He continued, "I get along with people, which is an important part of the prosecutor's job. You have to be able to interact with different types of people."

Dunker, Boxx and Weatherman will all be in attendance at the special forum. Thursday's open forum is hosted by the Ozark Property Rights Alliance and will be held at 7 p.m. on July 10 at the Crowder College Community Building on Highway 37. Barry County residents are encouraged to attend to participate in the question and answer period.

Gov. Nixon vetoes Sater's abortion bill, override in works

In an anticipated move, Governor Jay Nixon vetoed a bill passed during this legislative session that would change the waiting time for an abortion from 24 hours to 72 hours from the initial appointment to when the procedure was done.

Nixon vetoed the bill, calling it "a callous disregard for women who find themselves in horrific circumstances."

The bill, sponsored by Cassville's Senator David Sater, was approved by enough Representatives to make a veto override possible with 111-39, and the Senate was one vote shy of a supermajority at 22-9.

Regarding Nixon's veto, Sen. Sater stated, "I am deeply disappointed with Governor Nixon's veto of HBs 1307 and 1313. Abortion is a matter of life and death. This is an irreversible and permanent decision and taking the time to think about the consequences is not unreasonable or a burden. Governor Nixon decides to be pro-life or pro-choice depending on the next election. Serious elected of-

ficials remember that unborn children are not abstractions to play politics with. They are real. They are human beings like you and me, and deserve protection under the law. I firmly believe that most Missourians do not think three days is too much time to decide whether to bring a child into this world."

Missouri would be the third state to have a three day waiting period have Nixon signed the bill. The other two states are South Dakota and Utah. Utah's law provides an exception for cases of rape and incest.

Missouri's law would not have provided that exception for the case of rape and incest. Sater defended the bill, saying, "Rape is a horrible, heinous crime and if I had my way, the perpetrator would have swift and permanent justice. Under current law, the victims of rape can immediately receive medical treatment at a hospital emergency room and cannot be turned away. After a physical examination, the patient is

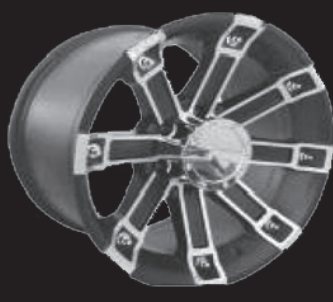

given options of treatment of care, including psychological and physical care, as well as preventative contraception. If the patient forgoes this treatment and becomes pregnant, the current 24-hour waiting period law applies. HBs 1307 and 1313 simply extend that waiting period to 72 hours and in no way changes the existing law allowing a victim to seek medical treatment or contraception. Cases involving sexual assault are extremely serious and sensitive. We must also remember that there have been tens of millions of abortions performed since 1973 that were not the result of sexual assault."

Representative Scott Fitzpatrick - Shell Knob also supported Sater's bill. He stated, "House Republicans will be meeting August 7-9 to discuss the September veto session. We will consider all vetoed bills during that meeting. The bill in question passed the house with 111 votes. There were a handful of Republicans who missed the vote, and the bill had support from multiple democrats. With that information, I am confident that this particular bill will be overridden. Senator Sater did an excellent job getting this bill through the Senate during the regular ses-

sion, and I am going to do my best to see to it that the House overrides the veto so that Senator Sater can do his part in the Senate to get it on the books."

Sater is confident that a veto override will happen, as well. He stated, "HBs 1307 and 1313 passed with overwhelming majorities in both the Senate and the House, and I am confident my colleagues will again vote in September in support of life."

Senate Leader Tom Dempsey, R-St. Charles, issued a statement regarding the Governor's veto: We have a duty to protect the lives of the unborn and to provide help to any women who finds herself in such a desperate situation. The extended waiting period called for in our bill would have afforded women struggling with difficult cir-

cumstances with time to access pregnancy resource centers and consider alternatives to abortion, such as adoption.

"As a pro-life legislator, I believe that every life is valuable. A compassionate society is one that gives the benefit of time to a woman who may be pressured by others to make a quick decision. Giving her the protection of the law to make up her mind after considering all the options is the least we can do."

Opponents of the bill stand in support of Governor Nixon's veto. Many have stated that by increasing the waiting period to 72-hours, it places an overwhelming burden on women who need to travel to have the procedure done. Missouri's only abortion clinic is located in St. Louis.

MoDot releases priority list

When Missourians head to the polls on Aug. 5, they will know exactly what their tax dollars will bring to the state if they approve Constitutional Amendment 7. That's because the Missouri Highways and Transportation Commission today approved a list of hundreds of transportation projects that represents the commission's commitment to Missourians who want to invest in the state's transportation future.

"This list is the culmination of years of work, with collaboration from local transportation planners as well as input from thousands of citizens from across the state," said Commission Chair Stephen Miller.

The list includes \$4.8 billion in transportation projects. While the majority of work focuses on Missouri's roads and bridges, it also incorporates other modes of transportation.

"One of the most impressive things about this list is the expanse of work it covers and the real, tangible value you can see for your money," said MoDOT Director Dave Nichols. "It includes resurfacing thousands of miles of roads, improving ports, railroads and airports, and even provides additional OATS service throughout rural regions of the state."

The entire transportation improvement list and information about the amendment are available at www.modot.org/movingforward.

On Aug. 5, Missouri voters will decide on Amendment 7, a ballot measure to temporarily raise Missouri's sales tax by ¾ of a cent. All proceeds from the 10-year tax would go toward much-needed transportation improvements across the state. The amendment's provisions include the creation of a project list prior to the election so Missourians can see what their tax dollars would fund.

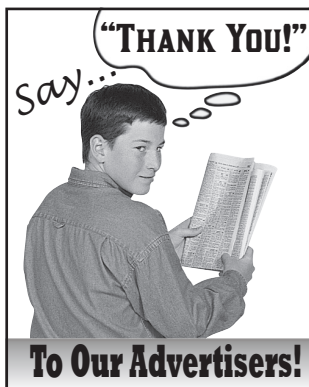
Zanaboni residential staff at CMU

The Barry-Lawrence Regional Library is seeking funds to purchase or build a new location for the Shell Knob Branch of the library.

According to Barry-Lawrence Library Director Gena Milburn, space is an overriding factor in the need for a new branch location. The current location in Shell Knob has about 3,000 square feet on two levels. Because the branch has only two staff members, only one level can safely be in use at a time which essentially limits the branch to only being able to use 1,500 feet.

“Safety is important to us,” Milburn said. “The times we live in, we need to monitor (the space) effectively.

Milburn says an ideal location for the new branch will be a 4,500 square foot building on one level located on Highway 39. At this point, a suitable location has yet to be found.

“We’ve looked at a lot of different pieces of property,” Milburn said. “We just haven’t found a lot that’s suitable. We want to be ...in the main part of town. We want to be visible like we are now.”

At this point, Milburn is not yet certain how much the new location will cost, but estimates \$500,000 based on the cost of other projects of similar sizes.

“That’s our educated guess,” she said.

Helping the library’s cause is the Friends of the Library. According to Milburn, the organization presented the library with a \$2,000 check around April 1st, and also have a stated goal to raise about \$250,000 for purchasing a new location.

“They’re the driving force behind the project,” Milburn stated.

Other fundraising efforts have included a pledge drive and in October, the Peace Lutheran Church/Thrivant Financial will be holding a special dinner to help benefit the library.

“(The church) invited us to be the recipient along with the senior center at a soup supper to be held on October 3rd, from 4 p.m to 7 p.m. at the Shell Knob Community Center,” Milburn said.

Of course, members of the community are also welcome to contribute. Milburn stated anyone wishing to make a donation will need to send it to the regional office in Monett; checks should be made out to the Shell Knob Building Fund. Milburn also added donors “can make either a one-time donation or a donation over a three-year period of time.” At present, a total of \$4,000 has been raised towards the project.

In terms of time, Milburn expects the acquisition of a new location to be a long-term project. She estimates it will be “at least two years” before the Shell Knob branch finds a new home.

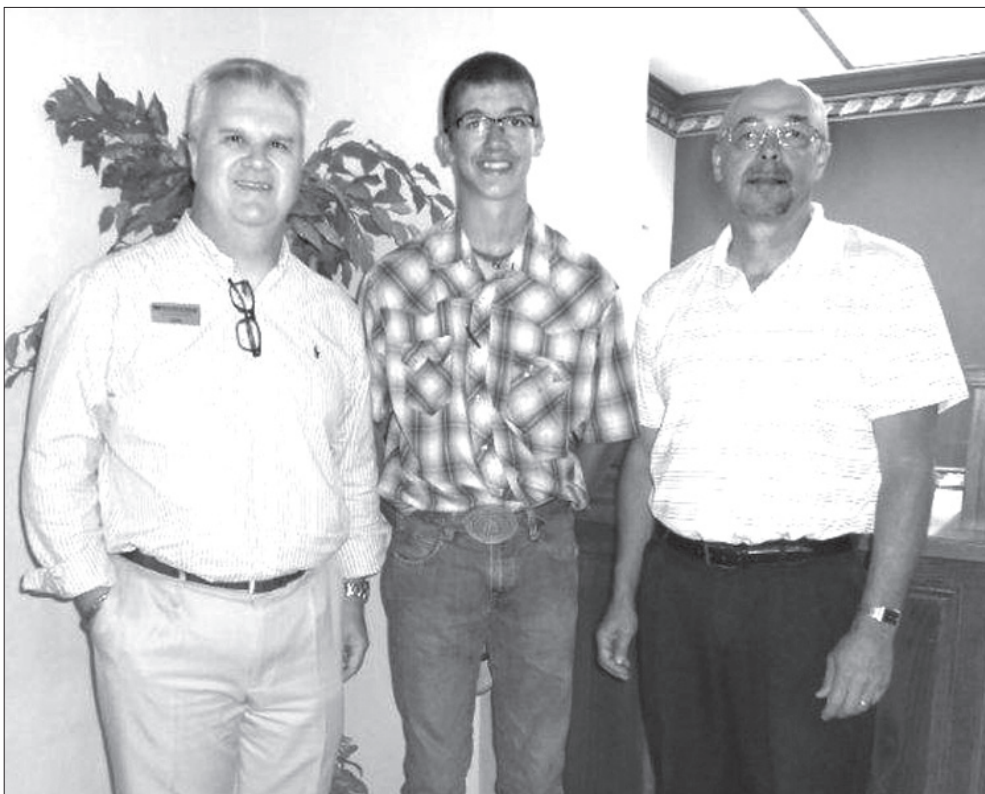

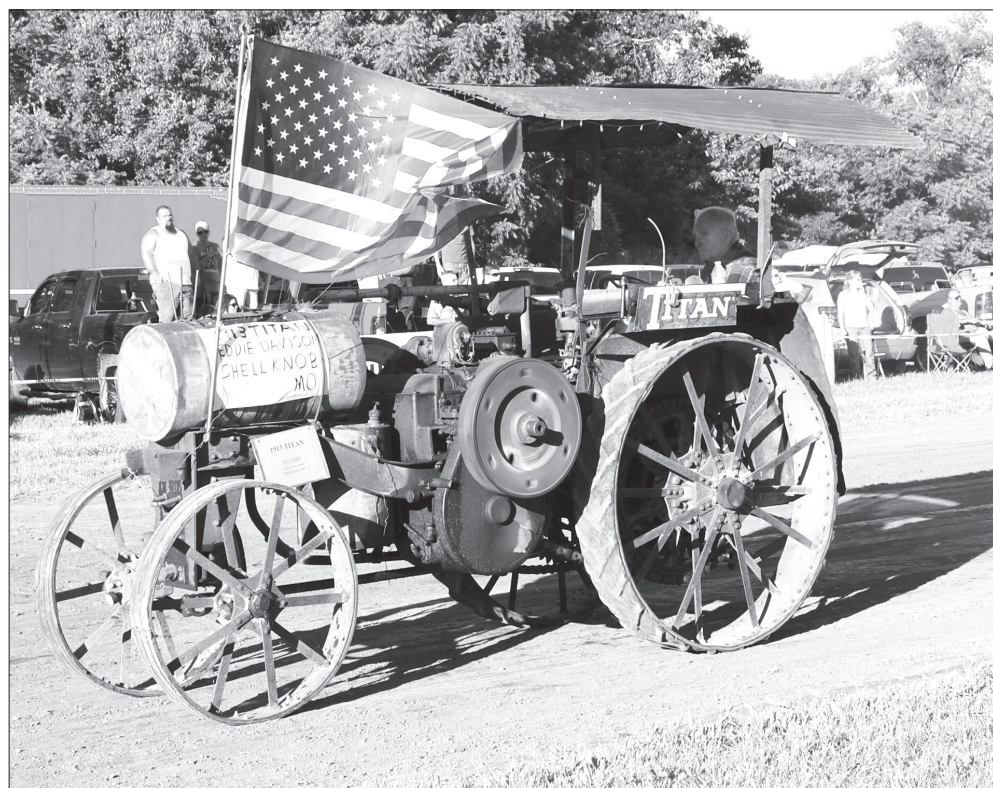

To be submitted to the qualified voters of the State of Missouri at the

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1
[Proposed by the 97th General Assembly
(First Regular Session) CCS No. 2 SS HCS
HJR Nos. 11 & 7]

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE:
Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to ensure that the right of Missouri citizens to engage in agricultural production and ranching practices shall not be infringed?

The potential costs or savings to governmental entities are unknown, but likely limited unless the resolution leads to increased litigation costs and/or the loss of federal funding.

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment to article I of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section relating to the right to farm.

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2014, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article I of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Article I, Constitution of Missouri, is amended by adding thereto one new section, to be known as section 35, to read as follows:

Section 35. That agriculture which provides food, energy, health benefits, and security is the foundation and stabilizing force of Missouri's economy. To protect this vital sector of Missouri's economy, the right of farmers and ranchers to engage in farming and ranching practices shall be forever guaranteed in this state, subject to duly authorized powers, if any, conferred by article VI of the Constitution of Missouri.

Section B. Pursuant to Chapter 116, RSMo, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of a joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official ballot title of the amendment proposed in Section A shall be as follows:

"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to ensure that the right of Missouri citizens to engage in agricultural production and ranching practices shall not be infringed?"

EXPLANATION—Matter enclosed in bold-faced brackets [thus] in the above bill is not enacted and is intended to be omitted from the law. Matter in bold-face type in the above bill is proposed language.

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 5
[Proposed by the 97th General Assembly
(Second Regular Session) SCS SJR No. 36]

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE:
Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to include a declaration that the right to keep and bear arms is an unalienable right and that the state government is obligated to uphold that right?

State and local governmental entities should have no direct costs or savings from this proposal. However, the proposal's passage will likely lead to increased litigation and criminal justice related costs. The total potential costs are unknown, but could be significant.

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment repealing section 23 of article I of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section in lieu thereof relating to the right of Missouri citizens to keep and bear arms.

Be it resolved by the Senate, the House of Representatives concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2014, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article I of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 23, article I, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 23, to read as follows:

Section 23. That the right of every citizen to keep and bear arms, ammunition, and accessories typical to the normal function of such arms, in defense of his home, person, family and property, or when lawfully

summoned in aid of the civil power, shall not be questioned; but this shall not justify the wearing of concealed weapons]. The rights guaranteed by this section shall be unalienable. Any restriction on these rights shall be subject to strict scrutiny and the state of Missouri shall be obligated to uphold these rights and shall under no circumstances decline to protect against their infringement. Nothing in this section shall be construed to prevent the general assembly from enacting general laws which limit the rights of convicted violent felons or those adjudicated by a court to be a danger to self or others as result of a mental disorder or mental infirmity.

Section B. Pursuant to chapter 116, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of the this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this act to the voters of this state, the official ballot title of this act shall be as follows:

"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to include a declaration that the right to keep and bear arms is an unalienable right and that the state government is obligated to uphold that right?"

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 7
[Proposed by the 97th General Assembly
(Second Regular Session) SS HJR No. 68]

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE:
Should the Missouri Constitution be changed to enact a temporary sales tax of three-quarters of one percent to be used solely to fund state and local highways, roads, bridges and transportation projects for ten years, with priority given to repairing unsafe roads and bridges?

This change is expected to produce \$480 million annually to the state's Transportation Safety and Job Creation Fund and \$54 million for local governments. Increases in the gas tax will be prohibited. This revenue shall only be used for transportation purposes and cannot be diverted for other uses.

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri, an amendment repealing section 30(d) of article IV of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting two new sections in lieu thereof relating to a temporary tax to improve the state highway system, city streets, county roads, and the state transportation system.

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2014, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article IV of the Constitution of Missouri:

Section A. Section 30(d), article IV, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and two new sections adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as sections 30(d) and 30(e), to read as follows:

Section 30(d). 1. No state revenues derived from highway users which are [to be allocated] imposed, collected, apportioned, distributed, or deposited in the state road fund pursuant to either section 30(a) or section 30(b) shall be diverted from the highway purposes and uses specified in subsection 1 of section 30(b). No state revenues derived from highway users which are [to be allocated] imposed, collected, apportioned, distributed, or deposited in the state road bond fund pursuant to subdivision (3) of subsection 2 of section 30(b) shall be diverted from the highway purposes and uses specified in said subdivision (3). No state revenues which are imposed, collected, apportioned, distributed, or deposited into the state road fund or transportation safety and job creation fund pursuant to section 30(e) of this article shall be used for administrative purposes or diverted from the state highway system purposes and uses and the state transportation system purposes and uses specified in section 30(e) of this article. The oversight division of the committee on legislative research shall conduct a program evaluation of the department of transportation to ensure the additional funds under section 30(e) are used as required under this article and provide a report to the general assembly by January 1, 2020.

2. All of the provisions of sections 29, 30(a), 30(b), 30(c) [and], 30(d), and 30(e) shall be self executing. All of the provisions of sections 29, 30(a), 30(b), 30(c) [and], 30(d), and 30(e) are severable. If any provision of sections 29, 30(a), 30(b), 30(c) [and], 30(d), and 30(e) is found by a court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional or unconstitutionally enacted, the remaining provisions of these sections shall be and remain valid.

3. The provisions of [sections 29, 30(a), 30(b), 30(c) and 30(d)] this section and section 30(e) shall become effective on [July 1, 2005] January 1, 2015.

Section 30(e). 1. To provide additional moneys for state highway system purposes and uses, city streets, county roads and state transportation system purposes and uses: First, an additional state sales tax of three-quarters of one percent is hereby levied and imposed upon all transactions on which the Missouri state sales tax is imposed, subject to the provisions of and to be collected as provided in the Sales Tax Law and the rules adopted in connection therewith; and Second, an additional state use tax of three-quarters of one percent is hereby levied and imposed upon all transactions on which the Missouri state use tax is imposed, subject to the provisions of and to be collected as provided in the Compensating Use Tax Law and the rules adopted in connection therewith. No tax levied or imposed under this section shall apply to the retail sale of food as defined in the Sales Tax Law.

2. The proceeds from the additional state sales and use taxes imposed under this section shall be collected, apportioned, distributed, and deposited by the department of revenue as provided in this section. The term "proceeds from the additional state sales and use taxes" used in this subsection shall mean and include all proceeds collected by the department of revenue reduced only by refunds for overpayments and erroneous payments of such taxes as permitted by law and the department's actual costs to collect these proceeds, which shall not exceed one percent of the total amount of the tax collected. The department's actual costs to collect these proceeds shall be limited to actual costs incurred by the department of revenue, including any other entity or person designated by law or by the department to collect or to provide goods or services used to collect the additional state sales and use taxes.

3. The proceeds from the additional state sales and use taxes imposed under this section shall be apportioned, distributed, and deposited by the director of revenue as follows:

(1) Five percent of the proceeds shall be deposited into a special trust fund known as the "County Aid Transportation Fund". Moneys in the county aid transportation fund shall be apportioned and distributed to the various counties of the state based on the county road mileage and assessed rural land valuation calculations in subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of section 30(a) of this article, except that five percent of these moneys shall be apportioned and distributed solely to cities not within any county in this state. Moneys in this fund shall be expended at the sole discretion of the various counties for any of the county road and bridge purposes and uses provided in subdivision (1) of subsection 1 of section 30(a) of this article, any state highway system purposes and uses authorized under section 30(b) of this article, or for any county transportation system purposes and uses as set forth in subdivision (4) of this subsection;

(2) Five percent of the proceeds shall be deposited into a special trust fund known as the "Municipal Aid Transportation Fund". Moneys in the municipal aid transportation fund shall be apportioned and distributed to the various incorporated cities, towns, and villages in the state based on the population ratio calculations in subdivision (2) of subsection 1 of section 30(a) of this article. Moneys in this fund shall be expended at the sole discretion of the various incorporated cities, towns, and villages for any of the city road, street and bridge purposes and uses provided in subdivision (2) of subsection 1 of section 30(a) of this article, any state highway system purposes and uses authorized under section 30(b) of this article, or for any city transportation system purposes and uses as set forth in subdivision (4) of this subsection;

(3) Ninety percent of the proceeds shall be deposited into a special trust fund known as the "Transportation Safety and Job Creation Fund", which is created within the state treasury. Moneys in the transportation safety and job creation fund shall stand appropriated without legislative action to be used and expended at the sole discretion of the highways and transportation commission for the following purposes and uses, and no other:

(a) For deposit into the state road fund for state highway system purposes and uses authorized under section 30(b) of this article; or

(b) For state transportation system purposes and uses as set forth in subdivision (4) of this subsection;

(4) The term "transportation system purposes and uses" shall include authority for the commission, any county or any city to plan, locate, relocate, establish, acquire, construct, maintain, control, operate, develop, and fund public transportation facilities such as, but not limited to, aviation, mass transportation, transportation for elderly and handicapped persons, railroads, ports, waterborne commerce, intermodal connections, bicycle, and pedestrian improvements;

(5) All interest earned on moneys deposited into the county aid transportation

fund, the municipal aid transportation fund or the transportation safety and job creation fund shall be credited to and deposited into such fund. The unexpended balance remaining in the county aid transportation fund, the municipal aid transportation fund, and the transportation safety and job creation fund at the end of the biennium and after all warrants on same have been discharged and the appropriation, if applicable, has lapsed, shall not be transferred and placed to the credit of the general revenue fund of the state or any other fund;

(6) The moneys apportioned or distributed under this section to the transportation safety and job creation fund, county aid transportation fund, and municipal aid transportation fund shall not be included within "total state revenues" under section 17 of article X of the Constitution of Missouri, nor be considered an "expense of state government" under section 20 of article X of the Constitution of Missouri.

4. (1) The general assembly, counties, and municipalities are prohibited from increasing or decreasing the tax upon, or measured by, motor fuel used to propel highway motor vehicles from the rate of the tax authorized by law on January 1, 2014, while this section is in effect.

(2) The state highways and transportation commission shall not authorize, own, or operate a toll highway or toll bridge on a state highway or bridge while the sales and use tax authorized by this section is in effect. A county or municipality shall not authorize, own or operate a toll highway or toll bridge on any highway or bridge under its jurisdiction while the sales and use tax authorized by this section is in effect.

(3) Prior to the effective date of this section and prior to any subsequent election in which this section shall be submitted to voters for approval, the commission shall approve its list of projects, programs, and facilities, with a priority given to safety, on the state highway system and state transportation system that shall be funded from the proceeds from the additional sales and use taxes deposited into the transportation safety and job creation fund under this section. Starting in the second calendar year following the effective date of this section, the commission shall annually submit a report to the governor, general assembly, and joint committee on transportation oversight that shall include the status of the approved list of projects, programs, and facilities on the state highway system and state transportation system. During the ten-year period the temporary tax is in effect, the commission shall include the approved projects, programs, and facilities in one or more of the five-year statewide transportation improvement programs approved by the commission. A taxpayer of the state shall have standing to bring suit to compel the commission's inclusion of approved projects in a five-year statewide transportation improvement program. All such suits shall be brought in the circuit court of Cole County.

(4) Upon voter approval of the temporary three-quarters of one percent state sales and use tax in this section at the general election held in 2014, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, this section shall be effective January 1, 2015, and shall continue for ten years. This section shall be resubmitted to the voters for approval at the general election held in 2024. The secretary of state shall submit the ballot measure for such ten-year resubmission. If approved by a simple majority of votes cast, this section shall continue to be effective for an additional temporary ten-year period. Every ten years thereafter, the secretary of state shall submit to the voters for approval the issue of whether the sales and use tax authorized by this section shall be imposed for another ten-year period. If at any subsequent general election a simple majority of votes cast do not approve such issue, then this section shall terminate on December thirty-first of the calendar year when the last election was held.

Section B. Pursuant to section 116.155, RSMo, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of this state authorizing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of a joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official ballot title of the amendment proposed in section A shall be as follows:

"Should the Missouri Constitution be changed to enact a temporary sales tax of three-quarters of one percent to be used solely to fund state and local highways, roads, bridges and transportation projects for ten years, with priority given to repairing unsafe roads and bridges?"

Section C. Pursuant to section 116.155, RSMo, and other applicable constitutional provisions and the laws of this state authorizing the general assembly to adopt a fiscal note summary for the submission of a joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official fiscal note summary of the amendment proposed by section A shall be as follows:

"This change is expected to produce \$480 million annually to the state's Transportation Safety and Job Creation Fund and \$54 million for local governments. Increases in the gas tax will be prohibited. This revenue shall only be used for transportation purposes and cannot be diverted for other uses."

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 8
[Proposed by the 97th General Assembly
(Second Regular Session) HJR No. 48]

OFFICIAL BALLOT TITLE:
Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended to create a "Veterans Lottery Ticket" and to use the revenue from the sale of these tickets for projects and services related to veterans?

The annual cost or savings to state and local governmental entities is unknown, but likely minimal. If sales of a veterans lottery ticket game decrease existing lottery ticket sales, the profits of which fund education, there could be a small annual shift in funding from education to veterans' programs.

Submitting to the qualified voters of Missouri an amendment repealing section 39(b) of article III of the Constitution of Missouri, and adopting one new section in lieu thereof relating to the state lottery.

Be it resolved by the House of Representatives, the Senate concurring therein:

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2014, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article III of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 39(b), article III, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 39(b), to read as follows:

Section 39(b). 1. The general assembly shall have authority to authorize a Missouri state lottery by law. If such legislation is adopted, there shall be created a "State Lottery Commission" consisting of five members who shall be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate and who may be removed, for cause by the governor and who shall be chosen from the state at large and represent a broad geographic spectrum with no more than one member chosen from each federal congressional district. Each member at the time of his or her appointment and qualification shall have been a resident of this state for a period of at least five years next preceding his or her appointment and qualification and shall also be a qualified elector therein and be not less than thirty years of age. No more than three members of the commission shall be members of the same political party. Members of the commission shall have three-year terms as provided by law. Members of the commission shall receive no salary but shall receive their actual expenses incurred in the performance of their responsibilities. The commission shall employ such persons as provided by law. The commission shall have the authority to join other states and jurisdictions for the purpose of conducting joint lottery games.

2. The money received by the Missouri State Lottery commission from the sale of Missouri lottery tickets, and from all other sources, shall be deposited in the "State Lottery Fund", which is hereby created in the state treasury. No later than July 1, 2015, the state lottery commission shall develop and begin selling a "Veterans Lottery Ticket", and all net proceeds received from the sales of such tickets shall be deposited solely in the veterans commission capital improvement trust fund, as provided by law.

3. [The] Except as provided in subsection 2 of this section, the monies received from the Missouri state lottery shall be governed by appropriation of the general assembly. Beginning July 1, 1993, monies representing net proceeds after payment of prizes and administrative expenses shall be transferred by appropriation to the "Lottery Proceeds Fund" which is hereby created within the state treasury and such monies in the lottery proceeds fund shall be appropriated solely for public institutions of elementary, secondary and higher education.

4. A minimum of forty-five percent of the money received from the sale of Missouri state lottery tickets shall be awarded as prizes.

5. The commission shall have the authority to purchase and hold title to any securities of the United States government or its agencies and instrumentalities thereof for prizes, as provided by law.

6. Until July 1, 1993, any person possessing a department of revenue retail sales license as provided by law or any chartered civic, fraternal, charitable or political organization or labor organization shall be eligible to obtain a license to act as a lottery ticket sales agent except a license to act as an agent to sell lottery tickets shall not be issued to any person primarily engaged in business as a lottery ticket sales agent. Until July 1, 1993, the general assembly may impose additional qualifications on such persons to obtain a lottery ticket sales agent license as it deems appropriate. Until July 1, 1993, the commission is also authorized to sell lottery tickets at its office and at special events as provided by law. Beginning July 1, 1993, the general assembly shall enact laws governing lottery ticket sales.

7. Revenues produced from the conduct of a state lottery shall not be part of "total state revenues" as defined in sections 17 and 18 of article X of this constitution and the expenditure of such revenue shall not be an "expense of state government" under section 20 of article X of this constitution.

That at the next general election to be held in the state of Missouri, on Tuesday next following the first Monday in November, 2014, or at a special election to be called by the governor for that purpose, there is hereby submitted to the qualified voters of this state, for adoption or rejection, the following amendment to article I of the Constitution of the state of Missouri:

Section A. Section 15, article I, Constitution of Missouri, is repealed and one new section adopted in lieu thereof, to be known as section 15, to read as follows:

Section 15. That the people shall be secure in their persons, papers, homes[and], effects, and electronic communications and data, from unreasonable searches and seizures; and no warrant to search any place, or seize any person or thing, or access electronic data or communication, shall issue without describing the place to be searched, or the person or thing to be seized, or the data or communication to be accessed, as nearly as may be; nor without probable cause, supported by written oath or affirmation.

Section B. Pursuant to chapter 116, and other applicable constitutional provisions and laws of the this state allowing the general assembly to adopt ballot language for the submission of this joint resolution to the voters of this state, the official summary statement of this resolution shall be as follows:

"Shall the Missouri Constitution be amended so that the people shall be secure in their electronic communications and data from unreasonable searches and seizures as they are now likewise secure in their persons, homes, papers and effects?"

Japanese beetles expected to peak in late July

Japanese beetles have been reported in large numbers across Missouri according to Sarah Kenyon, agronomy specialist with University of Missouri Extension.

“These destructive insects feed on roses, shrub, vegetables, and even field crops like corn and soybean. The damaged leaves typically look like Swiss cheese,” said Kenyon.

Trap counts across the state indicate the population will continue to climb and will peak later in July. The green, dime-size beetle with bronze wings and white tufts of hair around its shell is amid a multi-year population boom.

Japanese beetles show little discrimination in filling their stomachs, and will feed on any plant that has a pleasant smell.

“Roses and linden trees are their favorite crops, but they’ll feed on a wide variety of ornamentals, fruit trees, grapes and 440 different plants species,” said MU Entomologist Wayne Bailey. “They usually feed on the tops of plants in the sunlight, and they like plants that smell succulent, so if it smells good to you they likely will prefer those plants.”

Field crops also appear on the menu for the Japanese beetle. Both corn and

soybeans can receive significant damage if control measures aren’t implemented.

This can be a serious pest for corn farmers. The insect will chew on corn silk and tassels. If the silks have been taken down to less than half an inch in length, there will not be any pollination, resulting in poor corn production. In corn, treatment is recommended if there are three or more beetles per ear that are producing green silks and pollination is less than 50 percent complete.

In soybean crops, Japanese beetles chew at the leaves. They prefer lush leaflets at the top of plants and can hurt yield by significantly defoliating the plant. Control is justified if there is 25 percent damage to the leaves of soybeans.

Japanese beetles live for one year. The adult lays eggs in July that hatch and develop into white larvae, which overwinter in the soil and mature during the spring. They emerge as beetles in mid-June and begin feeding. Each healthy female lays 40 to 60 eggs. Adults live up to 60 days.

Homeowners can fall back on a staple insecticide,

powdered Sevin (carbaryl), to combat the destruction of Japanese beetles. “Sevin is probably one of the best, because it’s readily available and relatively safe to most everything around,” Bailey

said.

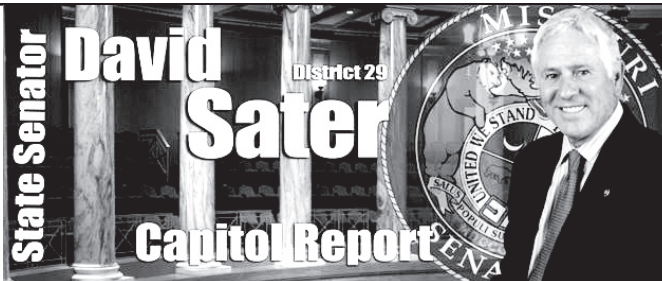

The public expects and deserves honest service, and public employees are, and should, be held to a high standard. Most public employees take their jobs seriously and understand the importance of protecting the public's trust. Unfortunately, some have abused their positions for personal gain. Just last year, Mark Brixey, former director of the Missouri State Bookstore, was convicted of stealing more than \$1.3 million from the university. In 2011, an ambulance district administrator in Northeast Missouri pled guilty to stealing more than \$41,000. In 2010, an employee of the Missouri Veterans Commission pled guilty to stealing more than \$90,000 that should have been used for our veterans. These are just a few of the cases. There are many, many more.

These individuals all abused the public's trust and stole from the very people they were supposed to be serving. They had something else in common though – to my amazement, there was no Missouri law prohibiting these individuals from receiving their public pensions. That means after committing criminal



acts against taxpayers, they could take advantage of retirement benefits funded by those same taxpayers. This loophole in our state law is completely inconsistent with our shared belief in personal and fiscal responsibility and, to correct it, I filed Senate Bill 550 this past session.

The purpose of my bill was to prohibit retirement benefits for a public employee if convicted of the following crimes: felony stealing, receiving stolen property, forgery, counterfeiting, and bribery of a public servant. These address the most serious crimes of stealing and those that have resulted in a serious erosion of public trust. A public employee would only lose their pension if the crime is related to their official job duties and does not apply to crimes committed outside of work. We ran out of time before we could consider my standalone SB 550 but I was able to amend it onto House Bill

1217, which passed and is now awaiting the governor's signature. Being a public employee it is more than a job, it is a responsibility. The people are placing their trust in you and counting on you to represent their morals and values. I am proud we made this change to our law and are now better protecting our public employee retirement system, the taxpayers' investment and, most importantly, the public's trust.

Agriculture is so important to our local economy and to the people I represent. It is also important to me and that is why I sponsored two pro-agriculture bills this past session. The first was Senate Bill 591. Many of you may know that \$1 on every head of cattle sold in the state goes to the Beef Check-off program. Fifty cents goes to Cattlemen's Beef Promotion and Research Board for national promotion and research efforts and 50 cents

remains in state to promote Missouri beef. Right now, state law prohibits Missouri cattle farmers from voting on any changes to the state checkoff program. My bill simply repeals this law, puts the decision in the hands of cattle farmers, and lets them decide how they want to structure this program. We have a strong agricultural tradition and if we want Missouri to continue to be a leader in cattle production, it is important we promote the beef industry in our state and give the industry the ability to best decide how to accomplish that goal.

The other bill I sponsored was Senate Bill 671, which extends liability protection to livestock operations for the inherent risks of working with livestock. We all know livestock can be unpredictable, and our common sense tells us to be careful and not do anything that would put ourselves in harm's way with these animals. Not everyone uses their common sense though. I have heard of customers at a stockyard or individuals at a livestock fair getting hurt because they jumped in a pen with a bull or went somewhere they weren't supposed to be. The business owner then gets stuck with the bill or gets sued. There are protections in the bill if the livestock operation is intentionally putting people at risk or acting outside law. This bill was based on existing protections in state law for equine (horse) operations and is a common-sense fix to our law.

Senate Bill 591 was one of the first bills to pass the Senate this year and did so unanimously (32-0). Unfortunately, it got bogged down in the House after a number of other bills were added to it. Both bills ended up rolled into larger agriculture bills, Senate Bill 506 and House Bill 1326, that included other provisions such as the large animal veterinarian student loan program and the Missouri Dairy Revitalization Act. Both bills passed the last week of session but were vetoed by the governor just this week because of language in the bill that would have transferred supervision of captive deer from the Missouri Department of Conservation to the Missouri Department of Agriculture. Lawmakers will meet in September at the annual veto session to consider action on all the governor's vetoes.

The Barry County 4-H Program has set up a display of 4-H memorabilia dating as far back as the 1930s, detailing the activities of past members. Barry

County 4-H Youth Program Assistant Anna Klem, who was responsible for putting the display together, says the purpose of the display is to show how 4-H played an important role in Barry

County in the past. She also hopes the display will help to revitalize the program.

“Barry County 4-H has been somewhat dormant for the past few years, but before that time, it was

booming,” Klem said. “Lots of members and lots of activity within the county.

“Most of this display is from about the 1930s on. It shows a lot of the activity throughout the years...and I think it’s a good way to show the community what has been and what’s going on now with Barry County 4-H.”

Much of the display consists of newspaper articles written about 4-H activities. There are also scrapbooks, pictures and various 4-H publications. Klem believes that past 4-H members will enjoy coming to the display to view the activities they participated in when they were younger.

“We have scrapbooks dating back to the 1950s, and all of the scrapbooks that we have here have names and pictures and that kind of thing,” she said. “So if there are any 4-H alumni from Barry County that would like to come see themselves or a bit of the past, it’s a good little place to reminisce.”

According to Klem, the display shows how much the 4-H program has changed over the years.

“Originally, 4-H was all about livestock and agriculture, and now it’s changed a lot,” she said. “It’s more

Home repair grants offered through Rural Development

The Neosho Rural Development (RD) staff celebrated June as Homeownership Month by acknowledging the care and compassion of Theresa and James McMurray in assuring their neighbor, Robert Hitson, had a decent and safe place to return after a serious illness. The McMurray's assisted Mr. Hitson by contacting RD staff regarding repair funding and by supplying labor toward completing the repairs.

The Neosho RD Office was contacted by Ms. McMurray inquiring about funding to assist Mr. Hitson with needed repairs to his home. Mr. Hitson had a severe stroke and was in a healthcare facility undergoing advanced therapy. He had improved to a point that he would be able to return to his home. But his home needed of a new roof, additional insulation, and flooring. Mr. Hitson's wheelchair was difficult to maneuver with worn and torn carpet. Funding from RD allowed Mr. Hitson to get a new roof, insulation and flooring.

Mr. and Mrs. McMurray, have adopted Mr. Hitson into their family and help him by taking him to his doctor appointments, the grocery store and looking in on him on a regular basis. During the process of completion of the repairs they also assisted by pulling up and disposing of the old floor coverings, painted all the interior walls and trim, and general clean up. Mr. Hitson says he is very grateful for their help and feels blessed to have

them as neighbors.

Funding for the repairs was provided through the 504 Loan/Grant Program. Grants are available to eligible applicants that are age 62 or older, own and occupy the home and have an income within guidelines. Grant funds are used for essential repairs to make the home safe and sanitary by removing health and safety hazards. The 504 loans offer a 1% interest rate with up to a 20 year term for amounts up to \$20,000 to eligible applicants. Grant funding is limited and many times repairs will be funded with a combination of a loan and grant.

Most repairs completed under the 504 program are roof, siding, window and door replacement, electrical repairs, furnace and air conditioning replacement and any other repairs needed to

keep the home livable. All repairs are completed by a contractor of the applicant's choosing. There are no initial costs involved in submitting an application for the 504 Loan/Grant Program.

Applicants wishing to purchase a home or are in need of home repairs may contact the USDA Rural Development Office in Neosho at (417) 451-1007 Ext. 4. Every June, USDA Rural Development celebrates National Homeownership Month to bring attention to the role housing plays in the U.S. economy. This year's theme, "Own Your Future. Own Your Home," celebrates the rural families who are working their way into the American dream by investing in a home of their own.

USDA Rural Development programs that support rural homeownership include:

- Direct home loans for very-low-income applicants. Payment assistance is provided that can lower the loan's interest rate to as low as one percent.

- Guaranteed home loans for moderate-income families. The agency works in partnership with private-sector lenders to back the lenders' loans.

- Home repair loans and grants to help rural homeowners make improvements or repairs. Examples include making homes accessible for people with disabilities or removing health and safety hazards like poor wiring or plumbing.

Firing up the grill less expensive in Missouri

Hot dogs, hamburgers, ribs — come and get it! Summer is in full swing. Families and friends gather to share food and fellowship. From class and family reunions to community events, outdoor meals are a tradition of the season.

Cooks will pay a bit more this summer for most meat items placed on their grill. The recent American Farm Bureau food survey revealed that a typical all-American meal for 10 of hot dogs, cheeseburgers, pork spare ribs, potato salad, baked beans, corn chips, watermelon, lemonade, chocolate

milk and the condiments will cost more than in 2013.

In Missouri, shoppers will pay less for the items needed to prepare this meal compared to the national average. The total bill in Missouri rang in at \$47.83 or \$4.78 per person. The national average for the same items cost \$58.72 or \$5.87 per person. Although higher than a year ago, a complete meal remains affordable.

Meat costs are the main contributor to the price increase. Retail meat prices are trending higher. The increase is due in large part to the historically low number

of cattle and hogs available to provide the meat we eat.

Show-Me chefs using ground round for the burgers will pay an average of \$4.82 per pound, an increase of \$1.54 over last year. The national average was \$4.45. Pork spare ribs will average \$2.80 per pound for an increase of \$0.18 per pound while mixed meat hot dogs will ring in at the same price as 2013, \$1.27 per pound.

Volunteer shoppers from Missouri and the nation provide local prices included in this survey. This informal gathering of information allows an insight into food

costs and trends.

Although the prices have increased modestly over the past year, shoppers will still find a great selection of food from which to choose for their summer picnics.

Summer is an important time for agriculture. Missouri farmers work diligently planting crops and caring for livestock. A trip across our picturesque state serves as a reminder of the source of our food supply and the importance of farmers to provide food and fiber for all of us.

As you grill out this summer, remember to thank a farmer.

Barry County courts send 12 to prison in June

• **Brian Dail Adams**, Cassville, pled guilty to DWI-Alcohol as a persistent offender. He was sentenced to three years incarceration.

Adams was stopped by the Monett Police Department on February 8, 2013, on Central in connection with an assault that had taken place early that morning. When the officer made contact with Adams, he admitted to having a revoked drivers license and failed field sobriety tests. Adams had two prior DWI convictions.

• **James L. Beck**, of Cassville, pled guilty to operating a motor vehicle on the highway while his driver's license was revoked. Beck received a suspended execution of a four year sentence with supervised probation.

Beck was charged two separate times for driving while revoked after being involved in wrecks. On March 21, 2011, the Cassville Police Department responded to an car accident where Beck was one of the drivers. In a separate incident, Beck was travelling northbound on Highway 37 on April 27, 2011, when he was involved in another motor vehicle accident. The Cassville Police

Department found that Beck had been convicted on driving while revoked two previous times in 2007 and 2009.

Beck is to serve supervised probation until June 16, 2019.

• **Louis T. Briley**, Branson, pled guilty to possession of a chemical with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance. He was sentenced to seven years incarceration with the execution of that sentence suspended. He is to serve supervised probation for five years.

Detective Doug Henry with the Barry County's Sheriff's Department was dispatched to an address in Elmo's Subdivision for a burglary in progress. When Det. Henry arrived, a window screen had been removed and Briley was inside the residence. Briley had a room in the residence that he referred to as "his room" where officers found methamphetamine, cold packs, camping fuel, pseudoephedrine and other items consistent with methamphetamine manufacturing.

Briley is to serve probation until June 19, 2019.

• **Carri Ann Brown**, Cassville, pled guilty to pos-

session of a controlled substance. She was sentenced to seven years incarceration with the execution of that sentence suspended. She will serve eight days shock time in the Barry County Jail by August, 1, 2014, and supervised probation for five years.

On July 24, 2013, Cpl. John Lueckenhoff with the Missouri State Highway Patrol stopped a vehicle driven by Brown for failing to dim her headlights. Once pulled over, Brown was found to be intoxicated and in possession of five hydrocodone pills and a bottle of unknown white powder.

Brown is to serve probation until June 17, 2019.

• **Jeremy A. Cape**, Purdy, pled guilty to two counts of possession of a controlled substance. He was given a suspended imposition of sentence and is to serve 100 hours of community service, 30 days in the Barry County Jail with credit for time already served and five years supervised probation.

On July 17, 2013, Cape was found to be passed out behind the wheel of his 2001 Tahoe on Farm Road 2165. Sgt. Steven Jabben with the Barry County Sheriff's Department found a baggie of crystalline substance and a syringe on the ground next to the open driver's side door. Cape admitted to doing both methamphetamine and Fentanyl. Once in custody, officers found a bag with scales, baggies, syringes, scissors, spoons and Fentanyl patches.

On March 16, 2014, Cape was found to be in possession of methamphetamine again on Farm Road 1057 near Exeter, as well as a digital scale.

Cape is to serve probation until June 16, 2019.

• **Justin Bo Cape**, Bolivar, pled guilty to trespassing in the first degree. He received a suspended imposition of sentencing and must pay restitution of \$250, serve 100 hours of community service and serve unsupervised probation for two years.

On December 12, 2011, officers with the Barry County Sheriff's Department were dispatched to an address on State Highway 37 north of George's where Cape and another suspect were found attempting to steal a truck bed full of scrap metal.

Cape is to serve probation until June 17, 2016.

• **Jason E. Carter**, Blue Eye, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance stemming from a charge from 2008. Carter was found to have violated his probation and was sentenced to 30 days jail time with credit for 19 days served. His probation was also extended for an additional two years.

• **Jessie Causby III**, Seligman, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. He

received a suspended imposition of sentencing with five years supervised probation and 200 hours of community service.

On December 9, 2010, The Southwest Missouri Drug Task Force, the Barry County Sheriff's Office and the Benton County, Ark., Sheriff's Office conducted a knock and talk investigation at Causby's residence on Roller Ridge near Seligman, about a possible manufacturing of methamphetamine and receiving stolen property. Inside the garage at the residence, investigators found multiple chemicals and paraphernalia involved in the manufacturing of methamphetamine as well as methamphetamine itself.

Causby is to serve probation until June 16, 2019.

• **Justin Craig Childress**, Pierce City, pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears more than 12 months. He was sentenced to four years incarceration.

Childress was ordered to pay support in the amount of \$241 per month in August 2009. When charged on October 3, 2011, he was in total arrears of \$4,104.53.

• **Christopher Courtney**, Goodman, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance on May 21, 2012, stemming from a charge from September 2009. He was given an additional five years supervised probation due to end June 24, 2019, after violating the terms of his probation.

• **Jeremy Michael Danzer**, Cassville, made an Alford plea to theft/stealing of more than \$500 but less than \$25,000. He received a suspended execution of a three year incarceration sentence, and must pay \$750 restitution. He is to serve five years supervised probation.

Officer Robert Kauffman with the Monett Police Department investigated a theft of stereo equipment at property located at 311 E. Broadway. Danzer was found to have traded the stolen stereo, worth \$2,395, for a truck.

Danzer is set to serve probation until June 19, 2019.

• **Falisha D. DeShields**, Seligman, made an Alford plea for possession of a controlled substance and five counts of endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree. DeShields was given a suspended imposition of sentence and must serve 100 hours of community service before June 16, 2015, and supervised probation for five years.

On September 30, 2013, Deputy Bill Watkins with the Barry County Sheriff's Department investigated at DeShields's residence on Ridgcrest in Seligman. A cut straw with a white powdery substance that field tested positive for methamphetamine was found on the edge of her mattress within reach of all five children in the home.

DeShields is to serve supervised probation until June 16, 2019.

• **Jeremiah Durham**, Monett, pled guilty to tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree, burglary in the second degree, unlawful use of a weapon, robbery in the second degree, assault in the second degree and possession of a controlled substance with intent to distribute. He was sentenced to five years incarceration.

On July 4, 2013, Durham struck another man with the butt of his gun, pointed the weapon at him and demanded his car keys and money. He took \$513 in cash and the victim's Pontiac Bonneville on Farm Road 1080 in Purdy.

On July 20, 2013, Dur-

ham took a 1980 Chevrolet El Camino along with scrap items worth \$100. Durham then fled the scene in a Buick before travelling off the roadway on Farm Road 1095 in Purdy, through a fence and wrecking. He then fled on foot with two other suspects.

On July 23, 2013, Durham was found to be in possession of a glass pipe with a green substance in it on Farm Road 1080 in Purdy. Officers with the Barry County Sheriff's Department also found a pill bottle with a white powdery substance that field tested positive for methamphetamine.

On September 28, 2013, Durham admitted to be in possession of a sawed off shotgun and also discharged the weapon.

On March 16, 2014, Durham's residence on 6th Street in Monett was found to contain methamphetamine and six marijuana plants being watered, fertilized and under artificial grow lights. He also had methamphetamine and paraphernalia on his person.

• **John H. Gamroth**, of Monett, pled guilty to DWI-Alcohol as a persistent offender. He was sentenced to four years incarceration with the execution of that sentence suspended. He will serve 30 days of shock in the Barry County Jail to be served by December 16, 2014. He will then serve supervised probation.

On December 25, 2013, Gamroth was pulled over for speeding and crossing the center line by the Missouri State Highway Patrol on Eisenhower in Monett. Gamroth failed multiple field sobriety tests.

• **Nicholas A. Granger** was sentenced to five years supervised probation after violating the terms of his probation. Ganger pled guilty to possession of a chemical with the intent to manufacture a controlled substance and distribution of a controlled substance.

• **Salvador Junior Hernandez**, Monett, was placed on supervised probation after serving his shock time for a sentence from March 2014. Hernandez pled guilty to distribution of a controlled substance in March stemming from charges from February 2010. He is to serve supervised probation until July 11, 2019.

• **Christopher Earl Hut-**

chason, Rogers, Ark., pled guilty to stealing a motor vehicle in January 2014. His probation has since been revoked and he is to serve his four year incarceration sentence.

Hutchason originally contacted the owner of a vehicle for sale in December 2010. While test driving the car, he claimed that the brakes went out and that he had the vehicle at his house. Then he claimed he would purchase the vehicle for \$900, but never paid the owner.

• **Michael Lee Johnson**, Cassville, made an Alford plea for Class C felony theft/stealing. He received a suspended imposition of sentence with five years supervised probation and 100 hours of community service to be completed by June 16, 2015.

On July 17, 2012, Johnson was visiting his grandparents when he abruptly left their residence after being asked to retrieve a pain pill from a prescription bottle. When they checked the bottle, he had stolen the remaining pills in the Oxycontin bottle. They claimed that he had stolen prescription medication before but that they had not reported it.

Johnson is to serve supervised probation until June 16, 2019.

• **David Keith Luster**, Green Forest, Ark., had a probation violation hearing for a case he pled guilty to in 2013. Luster was originally arrested in 2010 for unlawful possession of a firearm. He was ordered to serve 30 days

shock incarceration before serving the remainder of his probation.

• **Conrad Justin Marrs**, Cassville, pled guilty to assault in the first degree and given a suspended imposition of sentencing with 100 hours of community service and three years supervised probation.

On March 1, 2013, Marrs attempted to cause serious physical injury to another person by chasing and hitting the victim's vehicle with his vehicle.

Marrs is to serve probation until June 16, 2017.

• **Kim Wayne McClintock**, Cassville, had their probation revoked from a guilty plea on a charge from 2008. The execution of the of the five years incarceration with suspended and new terms of probation were given. McClintock is to serve five years supervised probation due to end on June 16, 2019.

• **Anastasia C. McDaniel**, Anderson, pled guilty to failure to return leased or rented property of a value of less than \$500. She was sentenced to 60 days incarceration with credit for 60 days already served.

• **Billy Ray Mulford** made an Alford plea for unlawful use of drug paraphernalia pertaining to methamphetamine. Mulford was sentenced to four years incarceration with the execution of that sentence suspended. Mulford is to serve 10 days shock incarceration in the Barry County Jail and supervised probation for five years.

On September 12, 2011, Mulford granted the Barry County Sheriff's Office to search his vehicle during a routine traffic stop. Inside a bag was a straw that field tested positive for methamphetamine.

Mulford is to serve probation until June 17, 2019.

• **Krystal Lee Nation**, Cassville, pled guilty to burglary in the first degree, endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree, and assault in the second degree. Her probation has since been revoked. Nation will serve 120 days shock incarceration followed by supervised probation.

On October 25, 2012, the Cassville Police Department was dispatched to a disturbance between a female and man. Nation had gone onto property owned by the victim and broke the window out of his back door. The victim claimed that she was screaming that she was going to stab his eye out.

On June 14, 2013, the Cassville Police Department was dispatched to Nation's residence for an intoxicated minor. Nation admitted to providing a 14-year-old with a half a pint of vodka. The child had a blood alcohol content of 0.150 percent.

On May 8, 2014, Nation attempted to strike a man with a clock that was shaped like a saw blade because he would not give her money.

• **Jacob Don Rose**, Cassville, pled guilty to burglary in the first degree. He was given a suspended imposition of sentence, 100 hours of community service to be completed by June 17, 2014, and restitution of \$2,500.

On April 23, 2013, the Cassville Police Department was dispatched for a burglary on Old Exeter Road. Rose was found to have removed a Dell laptop worth over \$500. His family claimed he was going to sell it to buy drugs.

Rose will serve supervised probation until June 17, 2019.

• **Heath Alan Sanborn**, Springfield, pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears of more than 12 months. He received a suspended imposition of sentence with five years supervised probation.

Sanborn was ordered to pay \$251 per month in child support in September 2008. As of August 4, 2011, he was in total arrears of \$9,359.44.

Sanborn is to serve probation until June 17, 2019.

• **Sherman Alan Saylor**, Eagle Rock, pled guilty to two counts of possession of a controlled substance from two different arrests from 2011 and 2014. Saylor was given a suspended imposition of sentence with five years supervised probation and 100 hours of community service to be completed before June 16, 2015.

On April 8, 2014, Saylor allowed the Barry County Sheriff's Department to search his resident on Farm Road 1218 in Eagle Rock. Inside, multiple paraphernalia field tested positive for methamphetamine.

Saylor is to serve probation until June 19, 2019.

• **Wendy Louise Smith**, Exeter, pled guilty to trafficking drugs in the second degree. She received a suspended execution of a five year incarceration sentence with supervised probation for five years.

Smith is to serve probation until June 17, 2019.

• **John Paul David Sullivan**, Sedalia, pled guilty to distribution of a controlled substance. He received a suspended imposition of sentence with five years supervised probation and 200 hours of community service to be completed before June 16, 2015.

Sullivan is to serve probation until June 16, 2019.

• **Cody W. Townsend**, Shell Knob, had a probation violation hearing after pleading guilty to burglary in the second degree, and four counts of theft/stealing in 2012. He received a suspended execution of a five years incarceration sentence and is to serve 40 days shock time with credit given for 21 days already served.

Townsend was originally arrested for multiple thefts. On July 10, 2011, Townsend broke into Subway through a window and attempted to steal the store's safe by dragging it outside and also attempting to steal boats from Viola Marina with two other suspects.

Townsend is to serve supervised probation until June 16, 2019.

• Joel Lynn Michael Whisman pled guilty to trespassing in the first degree. He was given a suspended imposition of sentence and 40 hours of community service.

On October 19, 2012, the Monett Police Department was dispatched for a suspicious vehicle on west Wishart. Whisman was found to have an air compressor that had been taken from a storage unit.

Whisman is to serve unsupervised probation until June 17, 2016.
