Wheaton Fall Festival to raise funds for caboose rehab

This Saturday marks a fun evening with proceeds going to help preserve a piece of history. This year's fall festival at the Wheaton City Park will raise funds to do much needed repairs to the caboose owned by the Wheaton Historical Society and Wheaton Depot Museum.

This year's fall festival will feature food, an auction, a costume contest and more.

Ralph Lamberson, who was integral in the rehabilitation of the Wheaton Depot, shared the history of the structure and why they are dedicating funds to restoration of the caboose in the city park.

Lamberson said the depot and the caboose help to commemorate a railroad that ran through Wheaton from 1907 until 1947. It was in 2007 that the Wheaton Historical Society was given the opportunity to purchase the dilapidated depot building that still sat in the city park.

Lamberson shared, "We had our centennial in Wheaton in 2007 and we were able to purchase the depot property through the historical society. The building was a disaster, and we rebuilt it."

Lamberson and his wife, Betty, were both integral in the restoration of the depot. He was the project manager of the restoration project, but his wife had a personal connection to the depot prior to its decommission. Lamberson shared, "My wife's grandfather was the station agent there from when it opened in the 1920s until it closed in 1947."

To fund the restoration project, Lamberson and Betty wrote a historical book called "Wheaton Echoes" printed in Cassville at Litho Printers. Proceeds went to give seed money to the restoration project to turn it into a museum.

Today, the museum houses memorabilia not only from the Wheaton area's railroad days, but railroad memorabilia from all over southwest Missouri, as well. Lamberson shared, "We have one of the finest collections in southwest Missouri of railroad memorabilia from Wheaton and all the way back to the beginnings. We have it chocked full of displays and very important items, railroad and otherwise."

The depot itself is on the National Register of Historic Places. While the depot is not currently open to the public on regular days, they are open for scheduled visits. Lamberson hopes to open the building for regular hours if they can get more volunteers to help. He said, "The depot is not open for regular hours until we find regular volunteers, even one day a month if we can get people to help us and get a regular schedule. We open it by appointment."

Following the depot rehabilitation project, the historical society was gifted a caboose that was also moved on site in 2009.

Cassville claims historic win over Lamar

'CATS VICTORY ENDS 57 GAME WINNING STREAK FOR LAMAR

Where were you at nine o'clock on Friday night?

If you were at Wildcat Stadium, you weren't alone, and you saw a historic win by the Cassville Wildcats. Sophomore placekicker Drake Reese drilled a 37-yard field goal as time expired to lift Cassville to the thrilling 24-21 victory over Lamar.

Cassville defeated Lamar in as good a high school football game as you will ever see. Both teams had run roughshod over opponents during the regular season to enter this contest at 8-0. Lamar, with its nation-leading 57-game win streak, had not lost to Cassville since 2012.

The gates opened at 5 p.m. to allow for the overflow crowd to locate seats. With the lawn chairs rowed up on the track to complement the bleacher seating, the crowd was reminiscent of the games in the 2008-12 era.

This game had fans buzzing with comparisons to playoff games against Rogersville and Richmond. But as good as those games were, they lacked the complete momentum swing from half to half that football fans saw on Friday night, and they lacked the dramatic final play that sucked all the emotion out of Wildcat Stadium.

With all the pregame hype and expectations, one thing was clear: this game meant more to Cassville than it did to Lamar. After watching the

series become a one-sided affair in recent years, the Wildcats had to prove that they had progressed to the point of playing at the same high level as the Tigers.

First half blues

Lamar's Landon Hardman returned the opening kickoff 98 yards for a quick 7-0 lead, and then the Tigers seemed on the brink of running the Wildcats out of the stadium. The Tigers scored on their first offensive series to take a 14-0 lead and drove into the Cassville red zone before missing a field goal early in the second quarter.

With the Wildcats already in a precarious position, Clay Weldy turned to the last page of the playbook. On first down, Shannon Haney drilled a quick curl to Ethan Hoppes in the left flat, and Hoppes flipped the ball to Bowen Preddy on the hook and ladder. Preddy raced untouched down the sideline for Cassville's first score of the game. Reese added the PAT to cut the lead to 14-7 with 10:04 left in the half.

But the Tigers answered, scoring on a 4-play, 62-yard drive to lead 21-7 at the 8:23 mark.

The Wildcats desperately needed to reach halftime without further damage, but Cassville's offense could not make any headway. A three-and-out and an interception summed up the home team's final two possessions of the half. But the

Cassville defense stood tall, denying Lamar until intermission.

The Wildcats managed a paltry 27 yards rushing for the entire first half. Lamar owned the ball for most of the half with a time of possession advantage of 16:36 to 7:24. To this point, the game was extremely one-sided, and there were a lot of anxious faces in the Wildcat Nation crowd.

Reversal

But at halftime, Lance Parnell made some critical defensive adjustments, changing both schemes and personnel to blunt the Lamar rushing onslaught. On offense, the Wildcats committed to running the football, trusting that

The City of Cassville is seeking input on a project that would a make a pedestrian and bike-friendly connection from the Cassville Elementary School on 14th Street to the Greenway trail head at Rocky Edmondson Park. Hoping to receive grant funding through a Transportation Alternatives Program through MoDOT, public works director David Brock said the city hopes to complete the project in approximately two years.

A survey is available online for residents and others interested in the project to fill out at https://www.surveymonkey.com/r/BJZC953.

Brock said, "The administration and elected officials recognize the popularity of the Greenway Trail. Responses from the park facility survey completed last year cited the trail as the most popular reason for using City parks. In addition to adding to the trail system, the project meets one of our internal goals which is to extend the

trail system to the east side of Flat Creek." With the improvements, the section that will be redone will be ADA compliant and allow for more use of the Greenway trail while also helping the school. Cassville R-IV School District has already come out in support of the improvements, as well.

Partnership with the school and the city is crucial to the project's success. Brock commented, "This cooperative atmosphere was critical to selecting the limits and scope of the project."

"The primary benefit of the project is constructing pedestrian facilities where they don't presently exist, linking the school complex with RE Edmondson Park. The project will pave several hundred feet of existing gravel trail, improving durability and ADA accessibility. The 13th Street bridge over Flat Creek has a pedestrian lane (the only one in Cassville) but there is no good bike/pedestrian corridors to reach the bridge. The bridge is an asset that fits nicely into the project

Lamberson shared, "After the building was completed, some people in Joplin donated a caboose to us. We got it cleaned up.

"It's not had anything done to it other than we painted when we first got it. Now, we are going to have to do several thousands of dollars of repairs to it.

"We are hoping to raise at least part of that money to do that project."

All of the funds from Saturday's event will go to replace the wood on the outside of the caboose.

Lamberson explained, "The exterior will have to be removed and replaced. It's a 1922 model caboose. It's almost 100 years old."

The fall festival begins at 5 p.m. on Saturday, October 27, and typically runs until

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

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Manager accused of stealing \$18K from local business

A Fastrip employee is charged with stealing over \$18,000 in cash that was to be put in the convenience store's ATM in the last year and a half. According to affidavits of probable cause, Laura A. Hollingsworth, 54, of Exeter, is charged with felony stealing of \$750 or more.

The Cassville Police Department investigated the incident after D-Carr Investments Incorporated reported on October 10 that an employee had been stealing from Fastrip in Cassville. The owners told a detective that Hollingsworth was a manager at the time and between January 2017 and September 2018, she had misappropriated funds that were to be placed into an ATM inside the store. In all, Hollingsworth allegedly stole \$18,280 in cash.

Hollingsworth was booked into the Barry County Jail on October 18 and posted a \$20,000 cash, corp. surety or 10 percent bond on October 19 through a bail bondsman.

Seligman man charged with dealing drugs

A Seligman man is in the Barry County Jail after being arrested last Friday night. According to affidavits of probable cause used in filing charges against him, Nathaniel B. Neal, 26, was found with drugs, scales, baggies, a loaded gun and other drug paraphernalia.

On Friday, October 19, Barry County Deputy Kissinger reportedly stopped a vehicle for failure to use a turn signal. The owner of the vehicle reportedly gave permission for the deputy to search the vehicle. In the course of this search, Nathaniel Neal was allegedly found with a fully loaded revolver, two baggies of marijuana and two baggies of methamphetamine in several baggies. Under Missouri law, possessing a firearm while also in the possession of a felony

amount of controlled substances is a felony.

Further, the probable cause statement alleges that Neal was found with 22 syringes. Of these, 9 were field tested for illicit substances and indicated for methamphetamine.

Neal was allegedly also in possession of several empty baggies and four scales.

Neal was placed under arrest and booked into the Barry County Jail. Online court records indicate charges were filed on October 20. Neal is charged with unlawful use of a weapon for possessing a weapon and felony controlled substance, possession of a controlled substance and delivery of a controlled substance. Neal is being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of \$50,000 cash or corporate surety bond.

passed by a persimmon tree the other day. I've got to go back in a few days when the persimmons start falling, to get some seeds. Why? Well, to see how bad the winter of 2018-19 will be. If you open the seeds, there are three different gns and predictions. A fork, light powdery snow, a milder winter. A shovel, deep snow, a harsh winter. A knife, not much snow, but frigid temperatures, with winds that cut like a knife. I'm resorting to persimmon seeds because I haven't seen any wooly worms. If they have a large black stripe on either end, watch out for lots of snow. Black on the head means early snow, on the tail, late snow. While we need the nitrogen and moisture, I'm leaning toward hoping for very few "shovel seeds" and small black bands. I've got nothing against snow, if it would just stay off the road. All these "signs" are the results of man's desire to know the future, and if necessary, prepare for what awaits. I can't tell you about the weather, however, I can tell the future and how to prepare. "And as it is appointed unto men once to die, but after this the judgment," Hebrews 9:27. That is the prediction. "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to everyone that believeth: to the Jew first, and also to the Greek.... The just shall live by faith." Romans 11:16-17. That is the preparation. Perhaps not as entertaining as the persimmon seed or woolv worm, this is good. When you are dealing with eternity, accuracy is what counts.

concept," Brock stated.

The particular grant the city is applying for would fund 80 percent of the approximately \$400,000 project. Brock explained the Transportation Alternatives Program. 



When asked if other projects similar to this might be on the table for the future, Brock replied, "We would hope to do so but will likely need funding assistance as might be available in the future. Much of the trail is in the flood plain; resiliency and repairability of the trail surface is dictated by the velocity of flood waters at any particular spot. Gravel trails are easy to wash out but also inexpensive to rebuild. An asphalt surface is more resilient if the area only experiences slow moving flood waters but they are substantially more expensive to build and repair if they do wash out. Concrete trails are the most durable but are also the most expensive."

This was Southwest's first appearance at the SWCL meet after moving over from the Ozark 7 Conference.





their conditioning would win out in the end.

The Wildcats took the third quarter kickoff and marched 81 yards in a time-consuming 12-play drive. Every play was a run, and Haney kept the ball on six of those. The Cassville quarterback kept the drive alive with a sneak on 4th-and-1 at the Lamar 25-yard line, then spun into the end-zone from 9 yards out. The Reese kick cut Lamar's lead to 21-14 with 7:04 left in the quarter.

After only rushing for 27 yards in the entire first half, the Wildcats tripled that on the first drive of the third quarter. Momentum had changed. As the game progressed, Cassville running backs would amass over 270 yards in that fateful second half.

The Tigers marched to the Cassville 34-yard line before a penalty and back-to-back losses forced a punt. Duncan Gepner angled his kick to the coffin corner, pinning the Wildcats at their own two-

yard line.

The Drive

Starting with their feet in their own end zone, the Wildcats responded with an astonishing 9-play, 98-yard drive to tie the game.

On 3rd-and-7 at his own 18-yard line, Haney pitched a quick out to Hoppes on the Cassville sideline for 8 yards and a first down. Three plays later, after the teams switched ends for the final quarter, Anthony Tolbert popped through the line and raced 64 yards down to the Lamar two-yard line before the safeties could trip him up.

Preddy hurdled through the line to score on the next play, and Reese tied the game with the PAT, 21-21.

A lot of time remained in the game: 10:56.

Redemption

Shaken and out of sync, the Lamar offense sputtered to a rare three-and-out. Gepner's punt died at the Cassville 17-yard line with 8:44 left to play.

Haney drove the Wildcats to the Lamar 7-yard line in 14 grueling plays. On 4th-and-4, Reese came on for the chip shot field goal. But the snap and hold were off, and the kick bounced harmlessly in the backfield. The Tigers took over at their own 15-yard line with 1:52 remaining.

Instead of playing for overtime, the Lamar coaches opted to go for the win in regulation. Deven Bates intercepted a deep throw and returned the ball to the Cassville 43-yard line with just 20 seconds left.

The Cassville defense had shut Lamar out for the entire second half. Now, the offense needed to deliver.

Haney circled left on a sweep and handed to Preddy on a reverse to the wide side. Preddy matched his uniform number with a 34-yard run to give Cassville the ball at the Lamar 23-yard line.

Cassville called for time with just ticks left on the clock. Haney kept for four more yards, diving to place the ball

Then, Drake Reese took down the Lamar win streak

The Cassville crowd, which had waited for years for a signature win, rushed the field, trampling what little grass remained into the mud.

Goals achieved

With the win on Senior Night, Cassville finished the regular season undefeated, won the Big 8 West in the first year of the conference realignment, and earned the top seed and home field advantage for district playoffs. The second season is about to begin.

Cassville will host Clinton in the first round of the Class 3 District 6 playoffs on Friday night at Wildcat Stadium. Kickoff is set for 7 p.m.

Letter to the Editor: Medical marijuana

While handing out invitations to an educational medical marijuana town hall meeting in Monett, I ran into a (1979) classmate of mine from Purdy High School. He dismissively pushed my invitation back to me, and asked in disbelief, "Are you promoting that?"

Because I've known and respected him for years, I wasn't offended, but I did wonder why he was so surprised. After thinking about it, though, I understood. He and I both grew up in conservative homes during the raucous 60s and 70s, in a rural community where most people went to church. We "good kids" didn't drink, smoke, nor have premarital sex (at least not that benefits needy children reputedly so). Above all, we didn't smoke marijuana, that "evil weed" we were all hyper-aware of due to propaganda films and the media's broadcast of love-ins and war protests taking place across the country - events where long-haired, pot-smoking place at the Family Life Center. hippies seemed to be taking over the United States.

> No matter that those war protestors ultimately accomplished something beneficial, marijuana was left with a bad reputation, one that I readily accepted and clung to for the next 40 years. Until I met Paula Roberts five years ago, that is.

> Paula traveled from Seattle to Springfield by Greyhound, then rented a car and drove to Barry County. She was an intelligent, responsible young woman who stayed in my home for the few days it took to put her uncle's business affairs in order before his demise. As she prepared to catch the bus back to Seattle, on a whim - since I knew that medical marijuana was legal in Washington - I asked for her opinion of it. My paradigms about marijuana were shattered by what she then told

> She was a patient, a user of medical cannabis (a.k.a. "marijuana"). Injured almost terminally as a teenager in a car accident which fractured her spine, she walked upright by the grace of God, with the assistance of two steel rods implanted permanently in her back. She lived with chronic pain, alle

viated only by the use of a topical ointment made from the distilled oil of cannabis buds. Her story was powerful, her testimony credible, and its impact indelible. Since then, I've heard from numerous people with stories similar to Paula's, people who have no reason to lie about the beneficial effects of cannabis, with medical research now backing them up.

Marijuana, put under lock and key by the federal government with its creation of the Drug Enforcement Agency in the early 1970s, has now been proven to have therapeutic value for those desperately ill with neurological issues, including chil-

I'll be the first to admit it when I'm wrong. In this case, I have been. A long-held belief doesn't necessarily mean that it's true. Nor does a law that's currently in effect mean that it's a good law. To deny the medicinal benefits of marijuana to sick people - for the sake of preserving my religious and legal traditions - is, I now realize, the opposite of the love for our fellow humans that Jesus advocated.

That's the reason I'm promoting and voting "yes" for legalized medical marijuana in Missouri on November 6th: specifically, yes for Amendment 2, and no on Amendment 3 and no *Proposition C. It's the compassionate thing to do.*

Maj. Gen. Waddell speaks to Rotary Club







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Master Gardeners hold fall workshop



More than 40 people enjoyed a fall garden workshop hosted by Barry County Master Gardeners on Sept. 8 at the Cassville Library. Nashon Bishop, a small farms specialist with Lincoln University, addressed gardening in the fall. He discussed produce that can be grown in the fall season, cover crops for the winter, and simple methods to extend the gardening season with inexpensive, but protective structures. Oscar Cross, whose family owns Hilltop Gardens in Ash Grove, offered lots of suggestions for perennials that will do well in shade, noting which plants deer might be more likely to avoid. He explained that there are almost no plants that are deer proof, but deer will leave some varieties alone as long as they find others more to their liking. Not only did both speakers make excellent presentations, but they also answered many questions from the participants.

The mission of the Missouri Master Gardener program is "to train volunteers to educate others about safe, effective and sustainable garden practices that build healthy gardens, landscapes and communities". The program exists in all 50 states and was established as part of the University of Missouri Extension in 1983. Tens of thousands of hours are recorded by volunteers each year across the state as they work toward fulfilling the mission. The Barry County Master Gardeners group has been in existence for three years, and this was the third workshop that they have hosted for the community. They maintain plantings at the Cassville Library and work with the naturalists at Roaring River State Park to maintain the park's native plant gardens.






