Southwest to add preschool in December

In an exciting announcement made by Southwest Schools, it was revealed that the school will be adding a preschool hopefully as early as late November or early December. The preschool was made possible by the Missouri Preschool Project Grant through the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education (DESE).

Southwest was awarded \$80,000 that is renewable for five years and goes to provide funding for the program through leasing a new modular building and adding a new teacher and possibly an assistant. According to Southwest Superintendent Bob Walker, the district will be supplementing the grant money with district funds to get the program running and continue it in future years.

gram that has been in effect for over 20 years. Title I is a federally funded program that serves children who are three and four years old who have an educational need and meet the eligibility requirements. Wanda Smith, Director of Special Services for Southwest, stated that the program provides serves under special education laws. She said, "The number of children served varies due to eligibility or handicapping conditions within the district's student population. We usually have around 10 Early Childhood Special Education (ESCE) preschool students."

With the new grant funding, the new preschool will be able to serve up to 40 preschoolers, 20 in the morning and 20 in the afternoon. The school hopes to have enroll-

ment start around December 1 of this year and have the preschool open by December 15.

When asked by the decided to apply for the grant, Walker stated, "Our intent is to better serve our community's needs by providing additional four year-old preschool services for those who do not qualify for our ESCE program, and in this process, afford future kindergarten students an opportunity to arrive better prepared."

He continued, "This program will make us more effective, as a quality preschool program can impact children's foundational skills, both academically and socially. Concerning our community, besides providing a half-day child care option, the program will start estab-

Local legislators sound off on Amendments on ballot

While the General Election ballot won't have much bearing on local candidates since they are running unopposed, Barry County voters do have four amendments to decide on in Tuesday's election.

Amendment 2

Amendment 2 would render prior criminal acts admissible in court when the case is a child sexual abuse trial.

Barry County Prosecuting Attorney Johnnie Cox is a proponent of the Amendement. He issued a statement saying, "As the law stands now, if a defendant has a prior conviction for a sex crime against a person under the age of 18, the jury will never be made aware of that fact unless the defendant testifies. This means that a defendant can keep that information from the jury by not taking the stand.

"Amendment 2 will allow prosecutors to introduce this

evidence in their case in chief, regardless of whether the defendant testifies, if a judge determines the propensity evidence is admissible. It is important to note that there is the safeguard in place that a judge still must determine whether propensity evidence is admissible or not and that the prior charges must also be of a sexual nature against a person under 18.

"This may decrease the trauma that victims may have to go through. There are several states, including the federal government, that already allow this type of evidence and this amendment would bring Missouri in line with other jurisdictions that aggressively prosecute crimes against children."

Opponents of the measure argue that the amendment

Amendment 6

Amendment 6 would create an early voting period of six days before each Election Dav.

Supporters of Amendment 6 say that an early voting period would encourage a higher voter turnout at minimal cost. Proponents also say that it would make voting easier for people who would otherwise have difficulty voting because of their work schedules or other commitments.

Opposing the amendment, State Senator David Sater stated, "Amendment 6 would create an early voting period in Missouri period of six business days before election day, excluding Saturday and Sunday. Other proposals promoted by national progressives would push early voting out as far as six weeks before the election, would come at significant costs to taxpayers and be extremely difficult for local election officials to manage. I have serious concerns about early voting proposals. One of the most sacred rights of Missourians is the right to vote and, instead of creating never-ending voting periods, we should exercise our civic duty and get out and vote on Election Day."

Amendment 10

Amendment 10 would prohibit the governor from estimating available state revenues when making budget recommendations under specific legislative circumstances.

Representative Scott Fitzpatrick was a co-sponsor of the bill. Senator Sater stated, "As we have seen, our current governor often uses the budget as a political tool to force legislative action that has nothing to do with the responsibility to balance our state budget. The governor targets important budget items, like public education with his withholds to draw more attention and put pressure on lawmakers to bow to his wishes. Budget withholds is an area where the governor has nearly unrestricted power and we should have a mechanism by which that power can be checked.

"If Amendment 10 passes, the Legislature could override budget withholds by the governor similar to the way we can override a veto. Amendment 10 would also prohibit the governor from forecasting revenues based on what the General Assembly may do. He has to budget based on the facts and the current budget situation, not one of his own imagination."

Opponents of the bill believe that the current system has worked for many years without a problem. They also state that it would restrict flexibility of budgetary changes which could affect Missouri's AAA credit rating.







Cassville ground game overwhelms Mt. Vernon in district play

It's that time of year in Missouri high school football. Win or go home.

The Cassville Wildcats put on an impressive rushing performance to move on in district play with a 54-20 win over Mt. Vernon on Friday night at Wildcat Stadium. River Phelps and Leigh Cox scored four touchdowns each in the game, seemingly daring each other to a game of "Can you top this?" Phelps finished with 235 yards rushing on the night, while Cox totalled 118 but added a 79yard kickoff return for one of his four scores.

The continued strong play

of the backfield tandem has helped lift the Wildcats to a four-game winning streak. When Chase Jackson went down for the season, most of the offensive burden fell on Gabe Kirk who struggled as a workhorse in single-harness. But with the development of Phelps and Cox, the Cassville offense has become a multifaceted force.

The Wildcat defense turned in another strong performance as well. The Mountaineers' first touchdown came midway through the first quarter to give the visitors a 7-0 lead. Cassville responded with 35 unanswered points and held a 35-7 lead until Mt. Vernon's Andrew Montemayor returned a kickoff 97 yards for a score at the 6:54 mark of the third quarter. The visitors squeezed out a last-second touchdown with the game ending to create the final score of 54-20.

Mt. Vernon was fired up to start the contest, but faded against the relentless Cassville ground game. Cassville's Leigh Cox returned the opening kickoff 62 yards to the Mt. Vernon 15-yard line, but a first-down, firstsnap fumble gave the Mountaineers the ball. Mt. Vernon then put together a 12-play, 77-yard drive to take a 7-0 lead at the 7:30 mark of the first quarter. It was the only lead the visitors would have, a stark contrast to the backand-forth battle these teams waged back in week 7.

Cox returned the next kickoff 79 yards for the tying
