

manager for Justin Brands, the closure of the Justin and Chippewa factories in Cassville and in Carthage was a difficult decision brought about by unprecedented

"Unfortunately, the economic reality has forced us to make hard decisions that are necessary to sustain the legacy of our brands long into the future," Nelson said.

"We recognize the skill that has gone into the footwear produced in Missouri over the years, which is why we have asked our Missouri workers to consider the possibility of relocating to one of our other factories," she continued. "Making high-quality boots is an art, and we value the skills, loyalty and dedication of the Cassville and Carthage area employees."

Angie Periman, who has worked for Justin as a double-needler for the past four years, said employees were notified by text last Thursday to be in attendance on a conference call scheduled for 9 a.m. Monday, July 6.

"We thought the reason for

the conference call was to let us know when we could go back to work," she said. "Instead, they told us they were closing the plant. Because it was a conference call, we could hear everyone's reaction to the news. Some people got really angry; others began crying."

Periman could not hold back her own tears as she explained what the plant closure meant to her.

"We were like family at

Justin," she said. "We were all really close, so having the plant shut down is like losing family."

Justin Brands has been manufacturing boots in Cassville since 1981, when they purchased 45,000 square feet of floor space from Jumping Jacks and U.S. Shoe Corporations.

They officially began operation on July 6, 1981. Eightyseven employees were hired over the following two-week period, with preference given to those who had previously worked for Jumping Jacks before their closure in 1980.

Peggy and Doyle Edie, of Exeter, were two such employees, who have since retired.

"It was hard when Jumping Jacks closed," Peggy Edie said, "so I know what the Justin employees are going

### COVID-19 reported in Lacoba Homes

Covid-19 numbers continue to rise in southwest Missouri, with Barry County reporting 87 cases as of July 7, an increase of 34 cases over last week. Of the 87 cases, 40 are in isolation and 47 have recovered. Seventy-four close contacts of those who tested positive are in isolation.

One case of COVID-19 has been reported in Lacoba Homes, in Monett, a first for the facility. According to Barry County Health Department Administrator, Roger Brock, the case was probably the result of community spread.

Statewide, 426,745 PCR COVID-19 tests have been performed. Of those, 23,242 were positive for COVID-19, and 1,028 deaths resulted.


Moving forward, the Barry County Health Department and Office of Emergency Management are opting to publish the current number of COVID-19 patients only on a weekly basis, probably on Tuesdays, according to health department administrator, Roger Brock.

"With the numbers increasing every day, the public is aware that COVID-19 is out there, so they can take the necessary precautions. Unless we have a situation where we're unable to trace contacts, there's really no need to publish a press release more than once a week," Brock said.

### New opportunity at Crowder College

staff person for supplemental support. Students are also able to take fewer courses at a time and in 8-week blocks so they can concentrate on fewer subjects at one time. I also like that the program is designed to make sure a student takes their general education courses that align with the Missouri Core 42 transfer program so they can easily transfer to a 4-year when completed. The program was built with student success in mind; I'm ready to get to kick it off this fall."

The classes are taught in an 8-week format as opposed to the traditional 16-week classes. This instruction provides students the advantage of only studying a couple of subjects at a time, as opposed to four or five. They will still complete a full-time schedule during the semester, keeping them on track for graduation.



### Missouri State Highway Patrol announces Community Alliance Program

Captain John Enderle, commanding officer Troop D, Springfield, announces the Missouri State Highway Patrol will be conducting a Community Alliance Program at the Troop D Headquarters, beginning Thursday, October 1, and concluding October 2020.

The mission of the Community Alliance Program is to provide personal interaction between area citizens and the Patrol. The program is designed to allow the public to learn more about the Patrol's purpose and role within the law enforcement community. The Highway Patrol is seeking responsible citizens, community leaders, students, and professional/ business associates who are willing to commit to a program that provides a unique opportunity.

After the initial closed executive meeting, the Board went into its regular session to approve the minutes, financial reports, bills, and administrative reports and to share a note of thanks from the Brown family.

Seated classes for grades K-6 and credit recovery for high school students went well.



2020 PDC budget, spending 50 percent of the required 1 percent for Professional Development, due to the CO-VID-19 Wellness Break. The Bond Proceeds account was closed, and the 2020-2021 preliminary budget was ap-

Important upcoming events include the next regular board meeting on July 20th at 7:00 PM, the Fiscal Year 2020 Audit on July 28th-29th, and the 2020-2021 Tax Rate Hearing on August 17th at 7:00 PM. The Board met in a brief executive session and then adjourned.





### Justin Brands 1988 employee photos capture spirit of workplace





For Peggy Edie, the transition from making shoes to making boots simply meant more leather to clean, until she was promoted to a lead person for the packing department, a position she held until she retired.

After Justin began operation in 1981, their initial output with a new crew of em-

boots a day, a number which Justin

quickly increased.

According to a record left by James Latshaw, previous plant manager, Justin was producing 2,200 pairs of boots per day in 1988. Prior to this year's March closing, the plant was producing 4,000 pairs per week.

In July 1984, three years after Justin Brands began production in Cassville, a new 19,200 square foot warehouse was added to their facility; in 1985, part of the boot production was moved to the newly acquired building on the north end of the property which previously housed Mozark Poultry Company; then, in 1988,

Justin purchased the former Garrett Manufacturing building across County Farm Road, to the west of its thenexisting structure, with plans to increase its workforce and manufacturing capability.

Current plant manager, Marc McCracken, says he is devastated by the plant's closure in Cassville.

"We've been like a family here," he said. "All of the employees have gone over and above with this job. We've been through some tough times together. During the last big flood we had here, we had water running through the plant, but the very next week, we were meeting our quota again."

McCracken, who's 62 years old, isn't sure what he'll do next.

"I'll be here shipping out inventory and materials for the next 90 days or so," he said. "I have a small crew lined up to help me. After we're finished, though, I don't know what I'll do. I'm not ready to retire yet. I feel like I still have some good miles left in me."

According to 46-year-old Angie Periman, Justin offered employees severance packages, due to arrive in the mail within two days. She's not sure what her package will consist of.

"They did offer me the opportunity to relocate," she said, "to either El Paso or somewhere in Pennsylvania."

Neither was an option she was willing or able to consider.

Justin Brands employed 147 people in its Cassville plant, and 171 people in its Carthage facility. Their withdrawal from these communities will spell loss for many.

### July 16 TRLOC meeting to be held via teleconference

The US Army Corps of Engineers has announced that the upcoming third meeting of the Table Rock Lake Oversight Committee (TRLOC) will be held via teleconference in lieu of a physical meeting. The meeting is scheduled to begin at 8 a.m. and last until 5 p.m. at the latest.

The conference line will open at 7:30 a.m. on July 16. Members of the public that want to listen to the committee meeting should to call 844-291-4185 or 409-207-6997 and when asked use access code 6899777. Once you dial in the operator will ask you for your name. You will then be put on hold and muted until the meeting begins at 8 a.m.

Members of the public will be allowed to make verbal comments for a portion of this meeting, a three hour period sometime early in the meeting after the call to order. In the interest of time and to give everyone a chance to be heard, each person who wants to comment will be given a maximum of two minutes to address their comments to the TRLOC. You will not be allowed to transfer time to other individuals.

Once the verbal comment period opens, the operator will ask the individuals wishing to speak to type a specific code on their phone and they will be put in a public comment queue. When it is time for the individual to make their comments, the operator will again ask for their name and unmute their line so they can make their comments. Once their two minutes are up they will be put on mute and the next caller will be identified. Anyone who's comments are "unruly" will be immediately muted and possibly removed from the call, warns the Corps.

Following the public comments, several presentations are scheduled. These include material the committee requested about the draft master and shoreline management plans, a presentation from the Corps on the review of permit and finally several discussions amongst the committee and the Corps staff about the Table Rock lake master plan, shoreline management plan and the review of permit.

All materials, powerpoints, etc. related to these presentations will be available online prior to the start of the meeting on the TRLOC website. To access the site, visit https://go.usa.gov/xfcmr.

The Corps notes that all



# public comments, written or verbal, are considered a public record and will be available online sometime after the end of the meeting.

As of this publication, no more written public comments are being accepted. The final day for delivery of those comments to the Corps in Little Rock was today, July

At the end of this meeting, the committee will give their final recommendations to the Corps about the draft plans. The finalized plans will be released during a fourth meeting scheduled later this summer.

The TRLOC is an independent Federal advisory committee established as directed by Section 1185(c) of the Water Resources Development Act of 2016. The committee is advisory in nature only with duties to include providing information and recommendations to the Little Rock District commander on revisions to the Table Rock Lake Master Plan and Shoreline Management Plan.

### **Take action for Dicamba settlement**

For American farmers who have suffered damage to millions of acres of crops near those sprayed with the controversial dicamba herbicide, the time will soon be here to claim their portion of a \$400 million settlement announced today, according to the law firm Peiffer Wolf Carr Kane & Conway (Peiffer Wolf)

Monsanto has agreed to pay up to \$400 million to soybean producers and additional amounts to certain producers of other crops who suffered dicamba damage from dicamba sprayed over-the-top of dicamba tolerant soybeans or cotton from 2015 through 2020. Monsanto will also pay litigation expenses, attorneys' fees, claims administration expenses and other costs in addition to the amounts provided to qualified claimants. The total value of the settlement is expected to reach up to \$400 million.

Producers who make a claim will be required to produce evidence of dicamba symptomology and yield loss. It is expected that the claims process will begin later this year after the 2020 harvest has been completed. Details

and timing issues are still being worked out. Farmers who want to stay informed can go to https://dicambadrift.com/,where Peiffer Wolf will provide regular updates as the process unfolds.

Peiffer Wolf managing partner Joseph Peiffer said: "This settlement could not come at a better time for farmers. It will provide much needed resources for farmers in these difficult times and compensate them for the dicamba-related losses they have suffered. We have been fighting to get justice for the backbone of America's economy and way of life. The settlement announced today is an important step to making things right for the farmers who just want to be able to put food on the table of America and the world."

Peiffer Wolf attorney Paul Lesko, a member of the plaintiff's Executive Committee that worked out the settlement, said: "We cannot stress enough the importance for farmers who have suffered dicamba damage to step forward and make their claim. This money will not flow out automatically. Farmers with dicamba crop damage will need to go through a process

to get these funds, and we encourage them to get started now."

Earlier this month, the U.S. Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals vacated registrations for three dicamba herbicides — including Monsanto/ Bayer's Xtendimax — after finding that the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) mishandling of the registration process resulted in more than one million acres of crop damage in 18 states

Peiffer Wolf represents dozens of farmers with dicamba damage, including many that have come forward since the landmark \$265 million Bader Farms verdict in February.


In 2017, 3.6 million acres of soybeans on 2,708 farms nationwide were damaged by dicamba, according to the estimate of University of Missouri crop science professor Kevin Bradley.







### 2020 July Fourth Holiday Traffic Statistics Letter to

The Missouri State Highway Patrol reports the following 2020 July Fourth holiday statistics:

Troopers worked 294 traffic crashes, which included 107 injuries and all five fatalities. Troopers also made 139 DWI arrests and 126 drug arrests over the holiday weekend.

Troopers worked nine boating crashes, which included four injuries and zero fatalities. Troopers made six BWI arrests and 25 drug arrests. There was one drowning over the holiday weekend.

The 2020 July Fourth holiday counting period began at 6 p.m., Thursday, July 2, and ended at 11:59 p.m., Sunday, July 5, 2020.

During the 2019 counting period, 15 people were killed and 457 injured statewide in Missouri over the holiday in 1,109 traffic crashes. Troopers arrested 162 people for driving while intoxicated last year. Over the 2019 July Fourth holiday, there were nine boating crashes, which included four injuries and zero fatalities. Three people drowned during last year's holiday. Troopers made 13 boating while intoxicated arrests during the 2019 counting period.

Traffic fatalities occurred in the Troop A, Lee's Summi; Troop C, Weldon Spring; Troop E, Poplar Bluff; and Troop F, Jefferson City, areas. Troopers worked all five traffic fatalities.

One person drowned Friday, July 3, 2020. Gregory J. Muller, 62, of O'Fallon, drowned when he was swimming off a sandbar and got caught in an eddy. Muller was not wearing a life jacket. The incident occurred at the 54mile marker of the Missouri River in St. Charles County. St. Charles Ambulance District personnel pronounced Muller deceased at the scene.

### Don't let the pandemic spoil your retirement

The pandemic has brought the possibility that some older workers will have to retire sooner than they planned.

One factor is that people 65 and above are considered to be among the highestrisk groups for severe illness from COVID-19. Thus, as the economy opens back up, baby boomers in particular are thinking twice about returning to office environments that could expose them to an increased risk of contracting the disease. And while in some cases retirement decisions will be voluntary, retirement may be essentially decided for some older workers due to jobs being eliminated as struggling companies restructure.

One report showed retirements of people from 50 to 65 and over have surged because of the pandemic. Medicare eligibility starting at age 65 and full Social Security benefits soon thereafter become economic incentives. But as we know, it takes a lot more than government aid to get us through the retirement years. And for older workers who planned to work long enough to collect full Social Security benefits but instead retire earlier, that could have permanent financial consequences. Filing at the earliest age of 62 will get the retiree only 75% of their annual full benefit. Whereas every year you delay filing for Social Security past full retirement age brings an additional 8% until you turn 70.

People often keep working as long as they can so they can continue to add to their retirement savings while also benefiting from employer-subsidized health insurance. Many older workers from the 40s on up think they will need to work longer because of the current economic crisis. But due to the pandemic, we seem to have less control over length-ofcareer considerations than ever before. And because of that, it ups the ante on taking care of your retirement funds in advance of retirement, and knowing ways to grow them and balance the risk to them.

When trying to figure out how to protect your retirement portfolio in the uncertain months ahead, remember that sometimes, trying to save yourself from future market volatility can result in major investing mistakes. Here are some examples to avoid during this recession:

Being too conservative. Finding a foothold for financial stability is on many

people's minds given these nervous times, but stability can be taken a bit too far. For example, focusing almost exclusively on fixed-income investments limits your growth potential. They won't match the growth of equities when the economy rebounds. One rule of thumb: the majority of those not yet retired should put at least half of their portfolios in equities, and the younger one is, the higher the percentage of equities. You can reduce risk and achieve stability by improving the quality of your equities, such as those with well-regarded management and consistent customers, and those that have paid dividends over a long period.

Ceasing to invest. While some companies have paused matching employee 401(k) programs due to the pandemic, it's not out of the question that they'll one day resume when a recovery ensues. But no saving plus no investing equals putting yourself much further behind for retirement. If you can afford to contribute to an IRA or 401(k) during the recession, do it. Suspending your investing because of concerns that your positions will lose value is a back-sliding strategy that can bite you. As the economy climbs back, share prices increase, but if you sat on cash while waiting for a recovery, you won't benefit from the upswing. And later on you'll pay higher prices for those shares, when you could have gotten them

Trying to time the market. Basing investment decisions on current market conditions is tricky. Some people are making those kinds of decisions, such as selling off or pausing contributions, to protect themselves from future market declines. But for example, when deciding to liquidate, you later may have to decide when to reinvest. Will that timing always be good? No. Even professional fund managers have difficulty timing the market. So it's better to remember that you got into the stock market in the first place because, over long periods, history shows it often trends up. Don't react to what's happening today. Stick to a consistent schedule of investing. And remember: long-term growth helps fund your retirement.

### MU Extension announces '4-H Goes Online'

Starting this fall, Missouri 4-H will be able to reach more youths and families across the state through an easy-to-use online learning platform called Canvas that brings 4-H project-based learning directly into the home.

This fall, Missouri 4-H youths, volunteers and faculty will have access to 4-H Goes Online Canvas for projects in Clover Kids, Shooting Sports, Engineering and Technology, Environmental Science and Natural Resources, Plant and Animal Science, Healthy Living, Leadership and Personal Development, Communication, and Expressive Art.

Set to debut in October, the 4-H Goes Online Canvas course and its projects have had a soft rollout this summer for those in need of resources. These families and communities are now providing feedback to the team of lead instructors who are making further improve-

"We are constantly striving to open our doors to more families, and these projects in Canvas offer families greater flexibility to participate," said Sarah Morefield, Canvas project leader and a 4-H youth development specialist for University of Missouri Extension in Clay County. She says the Canvas course will make 4-H more accessible to families with limited transportation options or with schedules that make it difficult for their kids to attend in-person meetings.

For youths interested in projects that aren't available through their local clubs, the Canvas option offers a way to

match with instructors and other youths across the state.

"We hope not only to reach new audiences but also improve the experience for the families we already serve," Morefield said.

The research-based Canvas curriculum helps youths learn through online videos, lesson plans, discussion boards with peers and videoconferences with lead in-

"We plan to put together project kits and USB drives that can be mailed to families without stable internet so that the time and effort being put into this online course will truly benefit all of our Missouri 4-H community," she said.

The new Missouri 4-H program year runs Oct. 1, 2020, to Sept. 30, 2021. Information about registration, the Canvas projects and more than 100 online and inperson 4-H programs will be available in the Missouri 4-H Clover Catalog and on the Missouri 4-H website starting Aug. 15. Families can sign up online anytime during the program year. An annual \$5 registration fee gives families access to all 4-H programming and projects within the 4-H Canvas course.

### MDC elk permits issued

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) is offering Missourians the state's first elk-hunting season in modern history starting this October. For the inaugural season, MDC will issue one permit each to five lucky Missourians randomly drawn from 19,215 permit applications, including 33 for one resident-landowner antlered-elk permit and 19,182 for four general permits.

The five lucky applicants drawn for a permit to harvest one antlered elk in Missouri this fall are:

- Bill Clark of Van Buren, who was drawn for the resident-landowner antlered-elk permit.
- Joseph Benthall of Mount Vernon, who was drawn for an antlered-elk general per-
- Michael Buschjost of St. Thomas, who was drawn for an antlered-elk general per-
- Samuel Schultz of Winfield, who was drawn for an antlered-elk general permit.
- · Eugene Guilkey of Liberty, who was drawn for an antlered-elk general permit.

Each of the five can purchase their elk-hunting permit starting July 1 for a cost of \$50. The five hunters can then each harvest one bull

elk that has at least one antler being a minimum of six inches long. The five hunters may hunt using archery methods Oct. 17-25 and firearms methods Dec. 12-20. Each permit is valid for both the archery and firearms portions of the elk-hunting sea-

The resident landowner permit will be used by Clark on his 80 acres east of Peck Ranch Conservation Area. The four general permits may be used within Carter, Reynolds, or Shannon counties excluding the refuge portion of Peck Ranch.

Elk are a native species in Missouri but were hunted to extinction in the state through unregulated hunting during the late 1800s. Missouri's first pending elk hunt this fall comes after years of restoration efforts of the native species by MDC, numerous partners including the Rocky Mountain Elk Foundation, and many supporters including local communities and area landowners. 


