Cassville advancing on water, sewer repairs ENGINEERING FIRM WORKING ON PLAN DESIGN

The City of Cassville is moving forward with the \$11 million water and sewer work that voters approved in April 2017. At Monday night's, July 9, city council meeting, there were multiple bills and resolutions passed to ensure the city can continue the process for securing the loans to get work started.

David Brock, Public Works director, said he anticipates the loan approval from USDA should come through any day. Some changes in the loan led to the council approving different resolutions and ordinances to move forward. He said, "We had initially applied through the State of Missouri for the water side of things. But we are hearing some positive things from USDA so we are going to apply to USDA for the water improvements, as

well. The attractive features are they are willing to let us do that loan over a 30 year period instead of 20 years on the State side of things, and they have grant money possibly available."

Brock continued, "The wastewater is a little bit more advanced. We are just waiting for USDA to approve the engineering contract and the engineer is going to draw up plans and specs for the engineering work."

Voters approved the city to get a bond to make the improvements primarily to get the city in compliance with an agreement made with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. The city agreed to fix the wastewater treatment issue, where untreated water was being released into Flat Creek, usually due to heavy flooding and rain, voluntarily through

an agreement in 2011. With extensions granted in 2015, the city was faced with a \$5.4 million sewer repair issue, but no funding to complete it until the bond passed.

With the city needing to make sewer repairs, water repairs went hand in hand with that issue, and voters approved all of the funding, a total of \$11 million, to complete the rehabilitation and repairs side-by-side.

The sewer project will involve replacing most of the aging main line, which is allowing water to infiltrate the lines and causing an excess of ground and rain water in the sewer system to be treated at the wastewater plant. The plant is not equipped to treat the additional influx of water through leaks, which is what was leading to untreated water being released into the

Technology upgrade means new phone, dispatch system for local E91-1

Technology upgrades at the local emergency dispatching center meant a new phone and dispatching system last month. As of June 27, the Barry County E91-1 Center is live with a new phone system. Eventually, the system will allow text messaging to be a way to communicate with 911.

Mike Phillips, E91-1 director, said the upgrade was necessary and also fulfilled a promise made to Barry County voters to keep up with technology upgrades. He said, "It replaces the old system that we had from when we were first established over 10 years ago. The system we went with is called Viper. It will support text messaging and newer upgrades as new technology becomes available. The old system we had was 10 plus years old. The manufacturer no longer had parts for it. There was a high concern for us to upgrade our technol-

ogy in a timely fashion with the equipment being over ten years old."

In the future, the upgrade will mean that Barry County's E9-1-1 will be able to accept text messages. Phillips anticipates that service will be available in December or January.

Phillips explained, "There will be a public education component with that. The message for us to get across is call if you can, text if you must.


"We still want people to use voice communication. You can get so much more that way than you can in a text message. In certain situations, there will be where it is more appropriate to text, whether that is a fear of retaliation or a domestic abuse situation. But calling 911 is still usually the best option."

Right now, if you text 911, there is a kickback message from the cellular provider saying the service is not available and to call 911, not text.

Phillips said there will be additional configuration that will need

to happen before the service is available, but the new system fully supports it once all of the other elements are in place.

Barry County was able to upgrade to the new Viper phone system for approximately \$147,000, which

One arrested after two wrecks near Wheaton

Three people were injured in a crash outside of Wheaton on Friday, July 6. The Missouri State Highway Patrol reported the first crash occurred at 9:35 p.m., the one car drove off and crash again three minutes later.

Michael A. Pendergraft, 23, of Wheaton, was driving a 2007 Dodge Challenger eastbound on Missouri 97 about five miles north of Wheaton. Pendergraft's passenger in the car was Kyla R. Howard, 19, of Wentworth. Travelling westbound was a 1994 Honda Civic driven by Carlos A. Lopez, 21, of Monett.

Lopez crossed over the center link and struck the Challenger. Lopez then drove off.

Three minutes later, Lopez crashed. While headed northbound on Farm Road 1015, the Civic travelled through the intersection of Farm Roads 1015 and 2070 and struck an embankment

The passenger in the first car, Howard, suffered moderate injuries and was transported to Cox Hospital in Monett by ambu-

Howard and Pendergraft were both wearing seatbelts at the

Lopez and a passenger, Elizabeth P. Henry, 20, of Aurora, were both injured and transported to Mercy Hospital in Joplin by ambulance. Henry suffered minor injuries. Lopez had moderate injuries.

Henry was wearing a seat belt in the crash. Lopez was not wearing a seat belt.

The Civic was totalled and towed and left on the scene to be removed later. The Challenger was moderately damaged and driven from the scene.

Lopez was arrested and then released for medical treatment by the Missouri State Highway Patrol following the crash. According to the arrest report, Lopez was arrested for felony driving while intoxicated, felony leaving the scene of an accident, operating a motor vehicle without a valid license, operating a motor vehicle with expired registration, and failure to wear a seat belt.

No charges had been filed by the Barry County Prosecuting Attorney's office as of time of press.

One of the bills passed at the council meeting was approving the city's financial company, D. A. Davidson, to pursue a \$350,000 interim bond to secure the engineering services of Allgeire,

Martin and Associates so the project can be put out to bid. The \$350,000 will be rolled into the \$11 million once the USDA loan is secured.

Brock said, "The engineers will go back through all of the smoke testing and flow testing and all the videos the city has taken with our closed circuit TV system and they'll go through and for each deficient area, they'll decide the best rehab for the sewer lines. Do they dig it up or fit it with a sleeve.

"It's essentially a PVC sleeve that goes inside the existing pipe if there is enough structural integrity

The timeline for completion of the project will be more certain once the project is bid. Brock said that should happen later this year or early 2019.

Brock said, "The projects will be bid separately, and the water will trail the sewer work. The application will go through a little faster for the water side of that. It should trail by six or eight months."

The city is using the same engineering firm for both projects.





Barry County courts incarcerate 13 in the month of June

• Patrick Edward Anderson, of Rocky Comfort, pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears over 12 months. Anderson received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

As of March 10, 2017, Anderson was behind \$21,121.61 in child support payments for two children.

Anderson is to serve probation until June 18, 2023

• James Andrew Beardslee, of Verona, pled guilty to stealing \$750 or more. Beardslee received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence and five years supervised probation.

On February 25, 2018, the victim's debit card and cash were stolen while he was at Beardslee's apartment. There was \$900 in cash stolen from his wallet. The debit card was used at multiple locations, including Casey's. Officers were able to show a photo of Beardslee to the clerk, who identified him.

Beardslee is to serve probation until June 12, 2023.

• Michael James Bogle, of Purdy, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance in November 2016. His probation has since been revoked and he is to serve seven years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On August 25, 2016, Bogle was found to be selling methamphetamine in Exeter. Officers found a glass pipe, a drug ledger, and a measurable amount of methamphetamine.

• Jamie Lee Brooks, of Cassville, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance and endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree January 2014. Brooks' probation has since been revoked and he is to serve four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In February 2011, Brooks was stopped for a traffic violation during which Brooks admitted having K2 in the car. Officers then found a pipe that smelled like marijuana and a green leafy substance in a baggie, as well as a baggie with methamphetamine residue. Brooks had been smoking the pipe with the windows up while the child was in the car. The methamphetamine baggie was also within reach of the child.

• Matthew Evan Catlin, of Rocky Comfort, pled guilty to five counts of passing a bad check of \$500 or more. Catlin received a suspended imposition of sentencing and three years supervised probation.

Catlin wrote multiple checks in varying amounts to different establishments in 2016. Amounts ranged from tens to over one hundred dollars.

Catlin is to serve probation until June 19, 2021.

• Kenny Wade Felton, of Fulton, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Felton received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

On September 23, 2017, officers were dispatched to a domestic assault on Bond Street in Monett. When officers arrived, the woman claimed Felton had been beating her and had drugs in his car. Officers searched the vehicle and found methamphetamine and hydrocodone pills.

When officers asked Felton if he had taken any drugs, he claimed he had swallowed four hydrocodones and 11 oxycontins to avoid being caught with them. He was taken for emergency treatment.

Felton is to serve probation until June 19, 2023.

• Randall Scott Ford, of Springfield, pled guilty to tampering with a motor vehicle in the first degree in August 2017. Ford's probation has since been revoked and he is to serve six years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On May 31, 2017, officers were dispatched to Kum & Go in Monett for a stolen vehicle. The victim had gone into the store and when she came back out, the vehicle was gone. The surveillance footage showed Ford stealing it after she went into the store.

Later, in Greene County, the police were called regarding a suspicious person. He drove off and abandoned the stolen vehicle at Dollar General. Inside the stolen car was Ford's work ID, and the boots he was

• Stephen Michael Graessle, of Monett, pled guilty to sexual misconduct or attempt involving a child under the age of 15 as a first offense in October 2017. Graessle's probation has since been revoked and he is to serve 120 days of shock time with the Department of Corrections as part of a four year incarceration sentence.

In July 2016, the mother of two victims reported she had been told Graessle had shown the 10 and nine year old children pornographic photos, including one of his genitals. When officers interviewed him, he said he had a photo like the one described on his phone, but he had not shown the children and said they must have taken his phone while it was unattended.

• James Calvin Harkins, Jr., of Monett, made an Alford plea to possession of a controlled substance. Harkins was sentenced to ten years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In September 2016, Harkins was arrested for being in possession of marijuana and drug paraphernalia. While held in jail, two peo-

ple attempted to gain entry to Harkins' car but would not say why. When a search warrant was served, officers found 235.8 grams of methamphetamine in his home, 16.6 grams of methamphetamine in his car, five scales, 300 clear plastic baggies, 10 unused syringes and 21 pipes.

• Chad Anthony Harp, of Monett, pled guilty to resisting arrest for a felony in September 2017. Harp's probation has since been revoked and he was granted a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence and five years supervised probation.

On August 10, 2017, officers were attempting to serve a search warrant on a different person in the residence where Harp was inside. Harp attempted to run while officers were there, and he also had an active warrant. He also admitted a methamphetamine syringe was his.

Harp is to serve probation until June 25, 2023.

• Tyler Ray Hayes, of Cassville, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Hayes received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

In January 2018, the Cassville Police Department was dispatched for a suspicious person. When officers arrived, they found Hayes to be intoxicated. When officers asked Hayes to take his hand out of his pocket, a white tissue fell out that contained a syringe. They also found marijuana and prescription pills.

Hayes is to serve probation until June 19, 2023.

• Mark Mathias Herda, of Cassville, pled guilty to being a sex offender within 500 feet of a playground/pool/museum. Herda received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence and five years supervised probation.

In November 2017, the Park Ranger saw Herda walking two dogs without leashes. When the officer spoke with him, they found he was a convicted sex offender on the registry and was not allowed to be in the park because of the playgrounds and swimming pool. 

Christian County are the hosts. Then other counties are all satellites or nodes off of the system. We did cost sharing. Instead of each county having all of it, we have two of us as hosts, and everyone else shares it."

Each week, a new emergency dispatch center will go live on the system until all eight are operational. That process will be complete by the end of July.

Phillips said this isn't a common practice of centers, but that is partially because the technology hasn't been upgraded recently to allow it. He said, "Technology is just now becoming available. Before there weren't really options on the table. This actually started two and a half years ago. It was a huge group of directors having a round table discussion. Over the years of discussion, this went down to the reasonable management of eight systems that wanted in."

Since Barry County's old phone system no longer had support available for it, this was a necessary step.

As part of the upgrade, there are four completely new stations in the dispatch room as well as new cables, phone lines, servers, hardware upgrades, computers, monitors, mics and phones. All of the equipment has a

one to three year warranty, then the maintenance contract includes discounted repairs and replacement costs after that.

Phillips added, "We also have an additional computer that is our 'dark station.' In the event we have another disaster, like a tornado or ice storm, we have another computer where we can bring another person in. We always want to have a plan A and a plan B. We could also use that if we had a monitor or PC go down."

At any given time, there are up to four dispatchers on duty. The number of those in dispatch is based on statistics of typical call volume into the center.

Administration and dispatchers were fully trained on the system as part of the purchase.

Phillips concluded, "It's truly equipment that was outdated. That was also a dedication we made to citizens when we went into a tax increase. We wanted to make sure we were honoring what we said we were going to do. We said we would keep up to date with technology."



substance and unlawful use of a weapon in December 2014. Hixson's probation has since been revoked and he was sentenced to five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections with the execution of that sentence suspended and five years supervised probation.

In June 2014, Hixon was found to have methamphetamine in a dresser drawer in his bedroom. He shared the room with his two young sons. Hixon was also found to have pointed a 9 mm handgun at another person's face and threatened to shoot him. Officers also found the pistol in the home.

Hixon is to serve probation until June 19, 2023.

• What experience do you have that makes you a good candidate for Presiding Commissioner?





three years unsupervised probation.

McGrane wrote multiple bad checks in 2017 ranging from \$30 to over a hundred.

McGrane is to serve probation until June 18, 2021.

• Kevin Earl McNeill, of Exeter, pled guilty to DWI - alcohol as a persistent offender. McNeill received a suspended execution of a five year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections, 480 hours of community service and five years supervised probation.

October 2016, McNeill saw a bag blow out of his truck while driving. McNeill saw a Highway patrol officer, but did not stop to pick the bag up.

Romero stole a truck from a victim in Verona. The truck was located in Oklahoma, and Romero admitted to stealing it.

· Charles Romine, of Springfield, pled guilty to burglary in the second degree in June 2015. Romine's probation has since been revoked and he is to serve seven years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

In October 2014, Steve's All American Garage was burglarized. A DVD player stolen was later found at a residence in Purdy and texts confirmed Romine stole it. He then sold the DVD player. Other items stolen included tools and collectible pocket knives.

tion until June 18, 2023.

• Raymond Allan Sanders, of Exeter, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance. Sanders received a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years supervised probation.

In October 2017, Sanders was stopped for being reported as a suspicious person. During a pat down, officers found plastic bagmethamphetamine, marijuana, a straw and a pipe.

Sanders is to serve probation until June 18, 2023.

• Jonathan Ryan Singer, of Washburn, made an Alford plea to assault in the second degree and felonious restraint. Singer received a suspended imposition of sentencing and four years supervised probation.

In June 2016, Singer attacked the victim, who he was romantically involved with. He choked her until unconscious, was punched and kicked her, hit her in the head with a cast iron skillet and held her down, refusing to let her leave. She finally escaped and called the police from the bathroom.

Singer is to serve probation until June 13, 2022.

• Jason Charles Sisco, of Shell Knob, pled guilty to non-support with the total arrears in excess of 12

months in July 2015. Sisco's probation has since been revoked and he received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

As of June 2014, Sisco owed \$18,870.60 in child support for one child.

Sisco is to serve probation until June 27, 2023.

• Ricky Gene White, of Bella Vista, Ark., pled guilty to resisting arrest by fleeing - causing a substantial risk of serious injury or death to any other person. White received a suspended execution of a four year incarceration sentence with the Department of Corrections and five years supervised probation.

White is to serve probation until June 18, 2023.

• Zachary Lynn Whiteley, of Purdy, pled guilty to child molestation in the second degree - aggravated sexual offense with a child under the age of 17 and the offender at least four years older than the victim. Whiteley was sentenced to eight years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

On June 2017, Whiteley went to the Barry County Sheriff's Office and turned himself in for having inappropriate sexual contact with a child under the age of 16. He told officers he had touched her inappropriately after removing the victim's clothing.

In October 2017, Whittenburg was taken into custody by police. While searched, officers found methamphetamine in a cigarette pack.







Sealing work on MO-39 begins July 16, one lane traffic expected

Work to begin sealing Missouri Route 39 with a mixture of rock and oil in Barry and Stone Counties is scheduled to begin the week of July 16, the Missouri Department of Transportation said.

Contractor crews will seal the highway between Missouri Route 248 in Barry County south to the Missouri/Arkansas state line in Stone County.





During drought, Barry County farmers should consider baling corn silage

Corn silage is a staple to dairy cattle rations, often comprising about half of the ration for confinement dairy cattle in Southwest Missouri. High quality silage is difficult to replace in the ration because it serves as both a forage to keep the rumen satisfied yet it also provides energy from the grain.

This growing season has been difficult for many stands. Barry Co. has received just two inches of rainfall since June 1st, according to a COCORAHS rain reporter near Purdy. Some areas have had less, as rainfall this growing season has been spotty.

"Drought-stressed stands of corn are beginning to, or have already began to, tassel" says Reagan Bluel, dairy specialist and county program director for University of Missouri – Extension of Barry Co. "Without rain during this critical phase, corn ears won't develop properly."

"Although silage made from drought-stressed corn will not be as good as normal, we can still capture some feeding value if producers act fast to bale before the plant burns up." Says Bluel. Those without chopping equipment might consider using the baler they have on hand.

In 2016, a Lawrence county dairyman baled a test plot of corn for silage in collaboration with University of Missouri - Extension, S&H Farm Supply, and Crown Power of Monett. Two balers used included newly available crop cutting technology, while the third baler was a standard baler.

Corn was mowed with a roller mower. This method helped keep cobs intact on plants and not left in the field. This type of mower also allowed the corn to fall in rows to accommodate the baler without tedding or raking.

Corn wilted in the field until it reached 75% moisture. Corn was baled, net wrapped then wrapped in white plastic. These bales then underwent fermentation until early October.

"The fermentation profile was remarkably similar to typical corn silage," Said Bluel. At feedout, cows wasted little feed and milked well.

The project demon-

strated that baled corn is a viable feed solution. While not economically feasible in 2016 (a normal growing season), perhaps under drought conditions may be the only feasible option for some growers.

Some items to consider:

1. Visit your local Extension office to ensure drought stressed corn is not high in nitrate prior to baling.

2. Moisture is critical to ensure an appropriate fermentation profile. Too dry won't pack out oxygen and too wet will encourage clostridia production resulting in moldy/slimy silage.

3. Forage corn tonnage varies little after tassling - waiting is not advantageous.

4. At feed out, cows will likely require energy supplementation to support lactation. Work with your nutritionist or local livestock specialist to ensure the ration is balanced to meet your herd's needs.

5. Check with your insurance agent prior to harvesting grain corn for silage.



MDC encourages people to help prevent wildfires

The Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) reminds people that strong winds, low humidity, and dry conditions this time of year means extra caution is needed to avoid unexpected wildfires. According to MDC's Forestry Division, the main cause of wildfires is improper burning of debris such as leaves or brush piles.

"It's been drier and warmer than usual, which means fires could get out of control very quickly," said Forestry Field Program Supervisor Ben Webster. "We want everyone to check the weather and be extremely careful if they plan to burn leaves or debris."

Each year, MDC staff work with fire departments around the state to help suppress numerous wildfires that can consume thousands of acres. MDC urges landowners, hunters, campers, and others in the outdoors to help prevent wildfires and offers the following tips.

Outdoor burning

Do not conduct outdoor



burning during times when grasses, brush and other fire fuel are very dry, humidity is low and weather is windy. Dry fuel -- combined with high temperatures, low humidity and high winds -- makes fire nearly impossible to control.

Check with local fire departments regarding local burn ordinances or burn bans that may be in place.

A person who starts a fire for any reason is responsible for any damage it may cause.

Done properly, prescribed fire can be a beneficial tool to improve land for wildlife habitat and grazing. For more information on using prescribed fire as a land-management tool, visit mdc.mo.gov and search "Prescribed Fire."

Driving off road

Wildfires can start when fine, dry fuel such as grass comes in contact with catalytic converters on motor vehicles. Think twice before driving into and across a grassy field.

Never park over tall, dry grass or piles of leaves that can touch the underside of a vehicle.

When driving vehicles off road, regularly inspect the undercarriage to ensure that fuel and brake lines are intact and no oil leaks are apparent.

Always carry an approved fire extinguisher on vehicles that are used off road.

Check for the presence of spark arresters on ATV exhausts.

Making a campfire

Clear a generous zone around fire rings. When humidity is low and wind is high, debris can become tinder for a stray spark or ember

Store unused firewood a good distance from the fire.

Never use gasoline, kerosene, or other flammable liquid to start a fire.

Keep campfires small

and controllable.

Keep fire-extinguishing materials, such as a rake, shovel and bucket of water, close by.

Never leave a campfire unattended! Extinguish campfires each night and before leaving camp, even for a few moments.

Smokers: Practice extra

Extinguish cigarettes completely and safely, and dispose of butts responsibly.

Don't delay calling for help.

Call 911 at the first sign of a fire getting out of control.



Barry County Farm Service Agency acreage reporting dates for 2018

The United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA) Executive Director Brian Blount announced that producers in Barry County who file accurate and timely reports for all crops and land uses, including failed acreage, can prevent the potential loss of FSA program benefits.

"In order to comply with FSA program eligibility requirements, all producers are encouraged to visit the Barry County FSA office to file an accurate crop certification report by the applicable deadline," said Blount.

The following acreage reporting dates are applicable for Barry County:

- May 15, 2018: spring oats and potatoes
- July 15, 2018: CRP, burley tobacco, corn, cotton, grain sorghum, hybrid corn seed, popcorn, rice, soybeans, and all other crops
- Nov. 15, 2018: apiculture and pasture, rangeland and forage for 2019
- Dec. 15, 2018: fall barley, fall wheat, and all other fall-seeded small grains for 2019

The following exceptions apply to the above acreage reporting dates:

- If the crop has not been planted by the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 15 calendar days after planting is complete.
- If a producer acquires additional acreage after the above acreage reporting date, then the acreage must be reported no later than 30 calendar days after purchase or

acquiring the lease. Appropriate documentation must be provided to the county office.

• If a perennial forage crop is reported with the intended use of "cover only," "green manure," "left standing" or "seed," then the acreage must be reported by July 15, 2018.


