Local volunteers help kids look forward to back-to-school

Fourteen years ago, Gail Reed asked people in the community for donations to help buy underprivileged kids back-to-school supplies if their parents couldn't afford them. Reed collected \$200 that year. Now, the program has grown and nearly 200 kids got what they needed to make sure they have a great start to a new school year.

Reed is the supervisor at the Ozarks Area Community Action Corporation Neighborhood Center in Cassville. Each year, the local OACAC hosts a back to school fair where children from area schools can sign up to receive free school supplies if their families are unable to provide

"It's really evolved over the years to grow so much bigger than I ever thought it would," Reed stated.

"When I first decided to do this, I went around to different businesses and collected \$200 and bought as many school supplies as I could. Then I just handed them out of the back room, but it's become so much more than that

Today, OACAC pairs with Bright Futures at the Cassville School, the Cassville Ministerial Alliance, the United Methodist Church and a variety of local businesses and groups to get the event put together. Reed said, "It's so much more for the family now with the help we get. They can eat together and really enjoy themselves."

The back to school fair not only gives each child a new backpack and a bag of school supplies they need for their grade level, but kids also go home with new shoes, a haircut, and plenty of information about different community groups that help kids and families in the area. Groups like The Boy and Girl Scouts, the Barry County E9-1-1 Center, 4H, the Barry-Lawrence Regional Library and more have tables set up to tell families and kids what they have to offer or give them useful information. While kids mill around the Family Life Center, they have plenty to do



Almost 200 kids went to the OACAC back-to-school fair over the weekend to get the supplies they need for the upcoming year. Volunteers all over the community donate their time and money to make the event possible and help local families in need.

It is truly a community effort to make the fair the celebration that it has become. The YMCA provides bounce houses for the kids to enjoy, the United Methodist Church provides shoes, they get a new backpack, and the Ministerial Alliance provides a meal

Cassville Senior Center experiences new low with flag theft

Certain types of theft and vandalism just hits a little too hard. This is the case with the most recent issue that the Cassville Senior Center is facing after someone stole their American flag.

Adena Cox-Holloway, administrator for the center, said, "The rope had just been cut, and the flag was

The Senior Center, located on Fair Street in Cassville, has had issues with vandalism and theft in the past, but no one expected their flag to go missing.

The flag was normally a welcome sight for some of the many veterans and civilians alike that frequent the Center, but its absence has hit many close to home. Cox-Holloway said, "We've had issues with vandalism in the past on our sign and had the police out for that, and we've made the reports, but nothing turned up."

Lieutenant Danny Boyd with the Cassville Police Department said that there hasn't been any increase in crime lately. He said, "Everything has been pretty normal, but it always decreases when school starts.

"In this case, we think it was probably kids who were bored and just cut it down. That street has a lot of traffic with people walking, and its summer, so kids aren't in school."

Boyd said that there had been no other issues with flags being tampered with. He said, "Even with a lock on the flag, like we have here at City Hall, someone could still cut the rope. The only way to be sure they are safe is to take them down at night, but this is probably an isolated event."

Man wanted for murder arrested in Wheaton

A 25 year-old man was arrested in Wheaton on Friday for his alleged involvement in the murder of Pittsburg State University student on October 9, 2014.

According to a press release by the Pittsburg, Kan., Police Department, Juan Salas-Rueda, formerly of Pittsburg, was arrested by the Wheaton Police Department for a warrant issued through Crawford County, Kansas Attorney's Office. Salas-Rueda is the fourth person to be arrested in connection with the murder of Taylor Thomas, 20, in his home by a gunshot wound. According to information released by detectives and the Prosecuting Attorney's office, the burglary was related to marijuana in the home that was owned by Thomas' roommate.

It is believed that Salas-Rueda helped another suspect, Bryan Levi Bridges, 20, avoid capture. There is a \$10,000 reward out for information that leads to Bridges' arrest. It is unknown at this time what Salas-Rueda was doing in Wheaton or what his ties are to the area. Wheaton Police Chief Clint Clark

said he was unable to make a comment regarding the arrest at this time because it is an ongoing investigation.

Salas-Rueda is currently being held in the Crawford County, Kan., jail in lieu of a \$2,000,000 bond on charges of murder, aggravated robbery, aggravated burglary and obstructing apprehension or prosecution.

The dedication that Richmiller has to her students proved to be seen not only to those in her school, but choir directors across Southwest Missouri. For the third time, Richmiller was selected as the Outstanding Director of the Southwest District by the Missouri Choral Directors Association, and for many, it isn't a surprise.

Judie Starchman, former Cassville Elementary choir director and longtime friend of Richmiller, said, "These people have gone to all of these Show Choir concerts and listened at the competitions, so they know what's going on in our district, and they see Mary for who she is."

Starchman added, "She is here from 7 a.m. to 9 p.m. almost everyday. She works so hard for these kids."

For her part, Richmiller is humble about her achievements. In her mind, all of this is about one thing: her students and their successes.

Richmiller started with Cassville Schools in 1993. She worked with choirs and spent over 20 years developing strategies that not only earned students awards at competitions, but life lessons that will help them through what life throws at them along the way.

Unlike many other classes, choir requires students to rely on one another, regardless of their background or interests. It's a team effort. She said, "It's really an inclusive family in the choirs. We have kids that have trouble in school for one reason or another that look forward to that hour of choir because they fit, no matter who they are"

Starchman added, "That might be the reason why some stay in school that might otherwise not. Mary has such a great way to get on to those kids that aren't living up to what they can do, and yet they still know she loves them. I can't imagine anyone better for that."

Richmiller began with two choirs before adding a show choir, Centerstage, in the late 1990's and starting competitions in the early 2000's. Since then, the Show Choir has grown in size and notoriety with an additional choir added a few years later, NBA (No Boys Allowed). Richmiller said, "We've always had more girls try out than boys, so we wanted them to have someplace of their own to go."

She recalled the early days of competition for the

show choir with a laugh, "At that first competition, we thought we were just going to wow them all. But we found all of these things that we didn't do that all of the other choirs did. So we started out with the lowest scoring, but we've worked our way up."

She said, "In fact, we won first place at every Class 3 competition we went to this year. They've done really well"

She went on, "But it isn't about the trophies. It's about having a show that other people want to see. That's where the real satisfaction is." Richmiller and Starchman both agreed that show choir competitions are special in that regard. While a rivalry football game may draw heated heckling from the other side, it isn't that way with the choir competitions. Starchman said, "You aren't going to see our fans cheering on Monett for that great touchdown they just scored."

Richmiller explained, "The nice thing about show choir is that all of the other choirs and parents are watching, too, and when they like it, they're on their feet, clapping and cheering. They're really into it, and that's encouraging."

As far as her favorite part about teaching choir?

"I like that they get to be expressive. They learn to resolve problems together as a group. They get to decide what we do to make it more beautiful than before," she said.

"It's about two parts: making beautiful music and having fun while making beautiful music."

Perhaps part of the reason why the Cassville High School choirs are so exceptional is a multiple part explanation. The kids, Richmiller and the strategy all

work together to create the perfect blend for success. She said, "They work together to decide where to go next, that's it. They might listen to a song and say, 'What if we tried going really soft here and building up."

Starchman said, "Kids learn best when they have to learn it on their own and figure it out together. I don't know anyone who does that better. They really learn through her."

As reluctant as Richmiller might be to the accolades shared by her peers and children on Facebook and across the spectrum, she does see the importance of music and the arts in school and in her students' lives. She said, "They say that performing music and creating

art are some of the only activities that use both sides of their brain at the same time, and it's important for these kids to do this."

Cassville High School principal Jeff Swadley said, "Nobody loves her students more than Mrs. Richmiller. She strives for perfection each and every day both in the classroom as well as out of the classroom. I am extremely proud of her accomplishments, but I have to admit it is no surprise to me."


Richmiller leads Cassville's traditional choir, girls choir, two show choirs and also helps with the junior high choir. This year will be her 22nd year with Cassville Schools.



Scooter driver charged for injury wreck

Tommy E. Canada, 30, of Seligman, was arrested on charges related to a scooter wreck that occurred near Roaring River last week. Canada was charged with leaving the scene of a motor vehicle accident with an injury, driving while revoked, and operating a motor vehicle in a careless and imprudent manner.

Canada was driving the scooter on Missouri 112 when he ran off the roadway and his passenger, Patric L. Smith, 22, of Seligman, was ejected.

The wreck happened around 9:30 p.m. on Tuesday, July 28. Smith was picked up by someone passing by after the wreck and had to be transported by ambulance to Mercy Hospital in Cassville. According to a witness statement, Canada had left the scene of the wreck on his scooter and Smith was in the roadway bleeding when he picked him up.

Three more charged in jail drug conspiracy

other person have been charged with the Barry County Jail drug conspiracy discovered by the Missouri State Highway Patrol.

On Friday, July 24, corrections officer Matthew A. Hernandez, 24, of Buttefield, was allegedly found to be delivering marijuana to the Barry County Jail for two inmates, Matthew Miller and Norman Baez. The operation was discovered when the Missouri State Highway Patrol got a warrant for a man's cell phone who was wanted for leaving the scene of an accident.

Text messages on Logan Moore, 18, of Rocky Comfort, and Hernandez indi-

cated that drugs were being exchanged and being taken into the jail for inmates housed there.

Barry County Prosecuting Attorney Amy Boxx filed formal charges against Hernandez on Friday, July 24, for delivery of a controlled substance into a jail, a class C felony. Boxx filed charges against the other three connected with the conspiracy on Thursday, July 30.

The two inmates, Matthew Miller, 22, and Baez, 25, were each charged with delivery or possession of a controlled substance at a county jail.

Septic systems in southern Missouri need regular maintenance for safety

Most rural counties in southern Missouri have no sewage regulations on properties larger than three acres. However, that does not mean landowners are "grandfathered" from installing or operating their septic system in ways that protect water supplies.

"Septic system failures continue to be a primary polluter of streams, lakes and groundwater aquifers (waterbearing rock formations) in the Ozarks," said Bob Schultheis, natural resource engineering specialist.

Pollution can come from an underground problem from old leaky steel septic tanks or soil absorption field lateral lines buried too deep. It can be an overland problem from surface runoff of sewage effluent into ditches, ponds, streams, and sinkholes.

Spring and fall rainy seasons are particularly a problem because the restrictive clay soils in southern Missouri get saturated and cannot accept more wastewater from the increasing number of rural homes.

"It is fairly easy to tell if a septic tank system has a problem. Sinks will drain slowly, toilets will not flush right and sewage may surface in the yard. Worst of all, drinking water from private wells will have bacterial contamination, and family members may get sick," said Schultheis.

Unfortunately, television, magazine and Internet advertising would lead a person to believe that flushing some yeast, enzymes or other additives down the toilet will magically solve septic maintenance

problem

"We do not recommend the use of these additives. Some are damaging to the soil or groundwater. Others are unlikely to pollute groundwater but interfere with settling of the solids in the septic tank. Additives that dissolve solids in the tank often just move them to the absorption field and plug it, forcing expensive repairs," said Schultheis.

Instead, Schultheis recommends pumping the tank on a regular basis. Sludge and scum levels should be checked annually. Depending on the tank's size and number of people in the house, the tank usually needs pumping every two to five years.

"Using water conservation measures in the home will help reduce the likelihood of absorption field failure, especially during wet weather. If you have an abandoned metal septic tank, it should be pumped and removed, and the hole filled in," said Schultheis.

It is also recommended that owners of private wells get their well water tested at least annually through their county health department. Landowners can find a local office online at http://health.mo.gov/living/lpha/lphas.php.

For persons repairing or installing a septic system, the health department also maintains lists of registered soil evaluators (http://health.mo.gov/living/environment/onsite/ose/) and onsite wastewater treatment system installers (http://health.mo.gov/living/environment/onsite/counties/.

"These professionals can help ensure the renovated or new septic system will function properly for the soil location you have," said Schultheis.



Barry County courts send seven to prison in the month of July

• Nathan Alex Bland, 21, of Seligman, entered an Alford plea for receiving stolen property, manufacture of a controlled substance, possession of a controlled substance, and endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree on July 21. Bland was granted a suspended imposition of sentencing and five years of supervised probation.

substance and endangering the welfare of a child in the first degree on January 21, 2014. Brooks' probation has since been revoked for drug use, and she is to complete the Barry County CRISP program and was granted a suspended imposition of sentence with five years supervised probation.

Brooks was originally charged in February 2012 when the Barry County Sheriff's Office was stopped for expired tags on her vehicle. She was in possession of methamphetamine and a green leafy substance. Brooks was smoking the methamphetamine with the windows rolled up with a child in the car.

• Alexander Calhoun, Jr., of Monett, pled guilty to burglary in the second degree on July 31. Calhoun was sentenced to four years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.







On October 29, 2014, Strnad borrowed a vehicle from another person, and she would not return it. When the owner saw her, she

drove away, trying to keep him from obtaining it.

Strnad is to serve probation until July 20, 2017.

• Tony James Tipton, of Blue Eye, pled guilty to possession of a controlled substance in September 2012. Tipton's probation has since been revoked for a violation, and he is to serve five years incarceration with the Department of Corrections.

Tipton was originally charged after the Barry County Sheriff's Department found him to be in possession of two glass pipes that field tested positive for methamphetamine and a substance believed to be marijuana.

• Andy Eugene Wentz, 39, of Washburn, pled guilty to domestic assault in the first degree on July 21. Wentz was sentenced to 120 days of shock incarceration of a seven year sentence.

In May 2015, Wentz was investigated for domestic assault on Farm Road 2210 in Washburn. According to the affidavit of probable cause, Wentz assaulted two victims, including a man with cerebral palsy. Wentz struck the woman and wrestled the man onto the floor, causing abrasions.

• Josiah D. Youngblood, 30, of Aurora, entered an Alford plea for stealing of less than \$500 on July 20. Youngblood was granted a suspended imposition of sentencing, one year unsupervised probation and was ordered to pay restituting.

On January 20, 2012, a report was filed with the Barry County Sheriff's Office that Youngblood had taken a Yamaha electric guitar and never returned it. Youngblood admitted to taking the guitar via text messages.

Youngblood is to serve probation until July 20, 2016.

How to help kids transition back to the classroom

Washburn man pleads guilty to assaulting man with cerebral palsy

A Washburn man pled guilty in court last month for domestic assault in the first degree for assaulting a man with cerebral palsy. Andy Eugene Wentz, 39, was first arrested for the incident, which occurred on Farm Road 2230 near Washburn in Barry County. Wentz was sentenced to seven years of incarceration with the Department of Corrections of which he will serve 120 days of shock

According to an affidavit of probable cause by Corporal Kerry Headrick with the Barry County Sheriff's Department, Wentz attacked two people who lived in the same residence on May 28, 2015. Wentz kicked the man with cerebral palsy on the arm and head when he was seated on the floor.

Then Wentz turned his attention to the woman in the home and struck her in the face, causing a cut on her forehead. Wentz turned back to the man, wrestling him to the floor and caused abrasions on his knees.

According to the statement, the man is unable to stand and effectively defend himself. He also received abrasions on his right arm.

Wentz fled the scene before law enforcement officers arrived, and had a criminal history before the incident. Wentz was taken into custody later that evening. His original charges were domestic assault in the first degree and domestic assault in the third de-

tative and Cassville Assistant Superintendent Jill LeCompte said, "A few years ago, Gail and I talked about how to combine forces, and the Ministerial Alliance was interested, too, So, we went forward." This year Bright Futures passed out 35 backpacks for kids that weren't signed up for the fair but showed up on Saturday.

LeCompte added, "Our goal is to make sure kids have everything they need to be successful, and school supplies are a big part of that."

The carnival atmosphere gets kids excited about the new school year by giving them the help they need, but also adds fun with popcorn, snow cones and a party-like good time that brings families

Even with all of the fun to be had at the event each year, at the end of the day, what matters is the sense of security the kids walk away with, knowing that they have what they need for school, and that can be a huge burden lifted off of their parents, too. Reed said, "A lot of people come in and say, 'I never thought I would be here,' but all it takes is one thing to happen, like a car accident, for people to get in trouble and need help. It may be just missing those two paychecks that makes the dif-

She said, "The bottom line is seeing these kids with their backpacks, knowing that they'll get to start school with all that they needs, that's what it's all about."

FAIR from FRONT

Going from a \$200 budget to serving almost 200 kids, 166 who signed up in advance and around 30 who showed up the day of the event, shows the ability of a community to step up and do what is needed to support area children in need. Reed said, "It was so much smaller in the beginning, and there wasn't as much to do. We didn't have many volunteers or services for them, but by trial and error, we've figured out the timing for when we need help and people are willing to do it."

She added, "A lot of volunteers come out of the woodwork to make this all come together as a success. Freedom Bank employees even come in advance to pack the school supplies."

What many don't realize is that the back to school fair each year doesn't just cater to younger students, it over arches to high school age kids, as well. Reed said, "We have a program called After School Opportunities that talks about what to do after high school. Because we go from kindergarten through 12th grades with this, it was great to see Crowder and Drury come out to talk to kids about what they can achieve after school ends."

The back to school fair is just one of many programs that OACAC sponsors. The Neighborhood Center helps with everything from utility assistance to life skills classes, weatherization programs and family planning services. Each of the programs is to help encourage individuals and families and help them get on their feet if they are unable to provide what they need. Reed said, "We manage to stay really busy with all of our programs."

She said that one program even helps kids understand the consequences of their choices and shows potential outcomes for their decisions. She said, "With some kids, they don't take it seriously. But at the end of the day, when you see that light bulb go on with just one student, it makes a difference. I love it when they come and say that they were thinking about dropping out of school, but after thinking about the consequences, they decided to stay in."

Reed said, "Part of the excitement of back-to-school time is the fun of the new backpack and supplies, and the thought that some parents can't provide that just breaks my heart. Every child deserves that. Self-esteem goes a long way with little kids, and everything builds on that."

She added, "Watching the kids' faces is just so much fun. There were mommas sitting on the floor with their kids trying on their new shoes because they were just so excited to have them. It was so sweet



Kids' Fishing Day slated for August 15


Fishing helps kids discover nature. Helping children get hooked on the thrill of fishing will be the focus of Kids' Fishing Day on Aug. 15 at Roaring River State Park. This free event will be held 7 a.m. to 8 p.m. The event is sponsored by the Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC), Missouri Department of Natural Resources and a number of businesses and local organizations.

At Kids' Fishing Day, children age 15 and under will be able to pick up free trout tags at the hatchery office any time the day prior to the event (Aug. 14) or all day on the day of the event. A portion of the park's fishing area will be reserved for the event. Volunteers will be available to assist the young anglers. Children are encouraged to bring their own fishing equipment. 




Extension warns about herbicide drift

New soybean varieties resistant to weedkillers 2,4-D and dicamba are expected to be available to Missouri producers next year, pending regulatory review.

The new varieties offer more options for soybean producers contending with the growing number of weeds resistant to glyphosate and other herbicides. But there's a downside.

Use of these herbicides likely will increase the risk of drift and tank contamination, says Mandy Bish, senior research specialist at the University of Missouri.

"Spray tank contamination, especially with dicamba, is going to be a huge concern," Bish says.

Farmers spraying dicamba or 2,4-D should thoroughly wash spray tanks before using them to treat fields with crops that aren't resistant to those herbicides.

When cleaning spray tanks, the third time is the charm, she told visitors at a recent MU Extension pest management field day at MU's Bradford Research Center in Columbia.

A research team including Bish and MU Extension weed scientist Kevin Bradley found that a triple rinse—water, then ammonia, then water again—minimizes the risk of injuring crops that aren't resistant to dicamba and 2,4-D, she said. Single- and doublerinse cleanings reduced yields.

Check operator manuals and the herbicide labels to learn how to properly rinse and clean sprayers after use, Bish says. Some machinery dealers suggest using commercial tank-cleaning products.

Pay special attention to boom lines in sag areas,



she says. Work your way down the boom, checking for plugged nozzles. The last nozzle on the boom is where buildup is worst.

Flush screens carefully. Even small amounts of residue can contaminate lines.

In addition to tank contamination, another concern is the risk of herbicides drifting from their intended targets, Bish says.

The Environmental Protection Agency says up to 70 million pounds of pesticide are wasted to drift each year.

Both 2,4-D and dicamba can cause significant economic loss for ornamental or commercial crop growers. "Good neighbors follow good practices," Bish says.

She advises producers to check wind speed and direction before spraying. MU's weather stations report real-time wind speeds to help figure drift risk. Go to agebb.missouri.edu/weather/stations for weather data.

In general, drift risk lessens when herbicides are applied at wind speeds from 3 to 10 mph. But sometimes what appears to be a good day to spray, due to low wind, is possibly the worst, Bish says.

Temperature inversions, when air near the ground is cooler than the air above, can happen when winds are less than 2-3 mph.

Spray particles hang in the air instead of reaching plants. Dew can prevent spray from being absorbed. "Dicamba and 2,4-D are more volatile than many other herbicides and more prone to move off-target due to temperature inversions," Bish says.

Dew or frost, horizontal smoke patterns, ground fog in low-lying areas and clear skies in the evening indicate possible inversion.

Pesticide applicators and beekeepers can view www. driftwatch.org, an online registry of the locations of sensitive crops.

Using color-coded flags is another method to alert growers to the type of soybean being grown in a field. Each type of soybean is associated with a different color flag.

Be aware of nearby land when spraying, Bish says. Grapes for Missouri's \$1.6 billion wine industry are especially susceptible to 2,4-D damage in mid-April when grapes break bud.



trogen. "Most unusual was widespread distribution of rain across the state," Guinan told farmers at the annual Crop Injury Clinic at MU Bradford Research Center, Columbia. "There was no drought anywhere."

At the crop clinic, Guinan said El Niño's influence is difficult to discern in Missouri, which is in a transition zone between the northern and southern United States.

Earlier, at the end of regular soybean planting, MU Extension soybean specialist Bill Wiebold said more than 1.3 million acres of the crop remained unplanted in Missouri. The state led the nation in unplanted crop.

On July 27 the Missouri Agricultural Statistics Service reported corn silking fell 28 points behind last year. Soybean blooming was 38 points below last year. The 2014 crop set yield re-

"Not just farming was affected by rain," Guinan said. "Persistent wet conditions create uncomfortable days. High temperatures with high humidity bring heat stress." Guinan noted there were high heat indexes in the summers of 2010 and 2011 as well.

County governments and road districts across the state suffered lost bridges and washed-out culverts. The wet season disrupted construction and transportation, Guinan added.


