Summer break is nearing its end for Barry County students. Within the next few weeks, kids will be packing their bags and heading back to school for another year. Area schools provided the following details about their back-to-school events. School supply lists are also available in this week's paper.

Cassville

New elementary, intermediate and middle school students can enroll at their building offices between 8:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m. beginning August 1.

Schedule and locker pick up for middle school students will be August 8 and 9, from 9 a.m. and 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. Eighth grade students need to have their current immunizations for TDap and Menectra on record at the school or proof of having received them or they will not be able to pick up their schedules or pick out their lockers.

New high school students registration will be Monday, August 6, and Tuesday, August 7, from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. to 2:30 p.m.

Senior schedule pick up will be Wednesday, August 8, from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Junior schedule pick up will be 1 p.m. to 2:30 p.m., also on the August 8. Sophomore schedule pick up will be Thursday, August 9, from 9 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Freshman and new high school students orientation is Monday, August 13, in the High School Gym at 6 p.m.

For new students enrollment, bring: proof of residence, copy of birth certificate, vaccination record and copy of parent's driver's license.

Stop, Drop and Go to drop off supplies and meet teachers for elementary, intermediate and middle school students is August 13 from 4:30 p.m. to 6:30 p.m.

The first day of school is Wednesday, August 15.

Back to school night is August 13. Food will be served at 6 p.m. The first day of school is August 14.

Local guild donates quilts for kids in need

There is a side of law enforcement that a lot of people don't often think about. There are times that officers have to remove children from their homes for a myriad of reasons. Regardless of how sensitive and caring officers are, it's a traumatic experience for the kids going through it.

A local quilting group teamed up with the Barry County Sheriff's Department to try to give children a bit of comfort during those times. The Ozark Country Quilt Guild recently donated 15 quilts its members made to be placed in Barry County Sheriff's Department cars for kids to take if they have to be placed into child protective services.

Vickie Clancy, president of the Ozark Country Quilt Guild, said the partnership came up through Barry County Sheriff's Gary Davis' Sunday school group. She said, "One of our members is in Sunday school with the sheriff and she asked if they had quilts in their cars for those kids."

At that time, the Sheriff's office did not carry quilts to wrap kids up with and send with them after.

Clancy continued, "So when we talked about it as a guild, we agreed to take it on as one of our donation projects."

The member who suggested it, Molly McKay, is the committee chair for

Proposed library tax levy increase postponed another year

After public backlash regarding seeking a property tax levy increase to support the Barry-Lawrence Regional Library, the decision was made to postpone the tax levy increase request until 2019. The library's board voted and unanimously decided to wait until August or November 2019 to ask the public for additional tax money to increase operating funds for the library system.

Much of the controversy surrounding the proposed tax levy increase request, which was slated to go on the August or November ballot of this year, was the board declining an anonymous donor's offer of \$3 million for a new Monett Library branch if the board would move the library downtown. Multiple factors led the board to decline the offer, but the public comments led the board to reconsider some of the library's goals

before requesting a tax levy

The board first requested a property tax levy increase in April 2016. However, Barry and Lawrence County voters both voted in opposition of the increase with only 41 percent of voters in favor. If the proposed levy had passed, it would have generated an additional \$600,000 to run the ten branches.

Prior to the board deciding to ask voters for the levy increase again, the forma-

Cassville woman arrested for burglarizing neighbor

A Cassville woman was jailed after allegedly stealing from her neighbor on July 18. Alixandrea Corie Eisenbraun, 26, of Cassville, is charged with burglary in the second degree and stealing \$750 or more.

According to affidavits of probable cause, the Barry County Sheriff's Department responded to a call that a neighbor had burglarized the victim's home. According to the victim's statement, he had returned home to find that multiple items were missing from his home. When he spoke to Eisenbraun to ask if she had seen anyone at his apartment, she opened the door and he saw his possessions in her apartment.

The victim told officers before he could say anything, she said, "I thought you moved out" and slammed the door shut. At that point, the victim warned her he was calling the police and she opened the door and asked if they could work something out.

The victim's stolen items included a Samsung TV worth \$100, a pair of jeans worth \$39.95, a Superman shirt worth \$7.95, a love seat and couch worth \$600 and a black table worth \$35.

Eisenbraun is still being held in the Barry County jail in lieu of a \$15,000 cash, corp surety or 10 percent bond.

ing the day. They also have a June tea and a May Airing every other year where members display their quilts. During the May Airing, the community is invited to attend and the members talk about their quilts and what techniques they used in their creation.

On even years, the group also puts on a large quilt show at Crowder College in Cassville.

tion of a campaign committee to help evaluate the public's pinion on the ballot initiative. Discussions turned heated following the board's decision to turn down of the anonymous donor's funds for a new branch.

Charges filed after chase leads to \$18K in damage to Barry County patrol vehicles

A Seligman man has been charged with four different criminal counts for a car chase that led to over \$18,000 of damage to both Barry County Sheriff's Department and private property in April. Jason Ward Degroff, 37, of Seligman, is charged with felony resisting arrest by fleeing, causing substantial risk of serious injury or death to any person; felony property damage in the first degree; misdemeanor property damage in the second degree; and misdemeanor domestic assault in the fourth degree. Degroff could not be located at the time of the crime as he fled on foot, according to

According to affidavits of probable cause, Barry County Sheriff's deputies were dispatched to a residence on Longview Lane in Seligman for an alleged physical

altercation between Degroff and the victim on April 24. The victim suffered minor injuries and was in fear for her safety at the time of the crime.

When officers attempted to stop Degroff, he fled in a vehicle, refusing to stop. As officers pursued Degroff, over \$10,000 worth of damage was done to one patrol vehicle and over \$8,000 worth of damage was done to a second patrol vehicle. There was also a private fence damaged in the pursuit, netting approximately \$189 of repairs.

Officers reported that Degroff fled on foot into woods following the chase and could not be found.

Degroff was arrested on July 26 and is currently being held in the Barry County Jail on a \$15,000 cash-only bond.







Beebe's Roaring River Waterslide celebrates 40 years as local attraction

Wilderness enthusiasts, tourists, and locals alike have enjoyed careening around the corners of Cassville's family-owned Beebe's Roaring River Waterslide every summer for 40 years.

Built in 1978 by Laverne and Shirley Blythe, the slide, which stands perched on the side of an Ozark hill, was originally called "Laverne and Shirley's Mountain." The waterslide changed hands over the years, and the current owners, Jerry and Rita Beebe, are the third couple to own the attraction, having purchased it 25 years ago.

The Beebes have two children, Travis Beebe and Skyler (Beebe) Bowman, and Skyler and her husband, Levi, help operate the waterslide on weekends. "It's very much a family business," said Bowman. "That's the beauty of it." There are five grandchildren who take advantage of sliding every chance they get, and the family hopes they will all join the family business as employees when they are teenagers.

The waterslide is constructed from concrete, and Jerry, aka "the man in the straw hat," sands it by hand

and paints it a vibrant blue color every year as part of the necessary maintenance. Once the season is over, he pulls the plug and drains it for the winter.

Not only is Jerry the onsite maintenance man and co-owner, he is also the face everyone remembers. Though the Beebe family has friends who help run the onsite restaurant, Jerry in his signature straw hat tends to be the one person slide fans

get to know most. "Rarely is anyone else in the slide booth handing out mats but Jerry," Bowman said.

Despite occasional area tornadoes and severe thunderstorms, the slide has been open every summer since the Beebes have owned it. The waterslide opens yearly from Memorial Day through Labor Day, 11 a.m. to 6 p.m., seven days a week, unless it rains. The attraction offers a small snack shack upstairs

where patrons can purchase ice cream, shaved ice, hot dogs, nachos, chicken strips and more during their visit.

Roaring River State Park is just down the hill from the slide, and oftentimes campers, hikers, and fishermen join the tourists and locals for an exciting time at the waterslide. "We bought the slide when I was in fifth grade, and I loved sliding with all the tourists and showing them how to make good trains or

how to go faster," said Bowman. "It's even more fun watching our kids do that."


Bowman and her brother have fond memories of the family business, sliding daily for five summers straight before they missed a single day. "We just didn't get tired of it. "We are continually grateful that everyone still shows up each summer," Bowman said. "The Master Gardener program was initiated to do just that," he said. "Its

motto, 'helping others learn to grow,' emphasizes service to others as the program's main objective."

In the past, those interested in becoming a Master Gardener had to attend classes for 14 weeks. But many people found it inconvenient to travel to a classroom on a particular

day and time, Trinklein said.

"Today, thanks to the internet and a learning platform known as Canvas, classes are available online 24/7. Students work on class material at their own pace and time schedule," he said.

Extension regional horticulture specialist Sarah Denkler teach the 14 online sessions. "These classes represent a viable option for people who can't take the weekly classes in person," Trinklein said.

Classes are delivered as a series of scripted and narrated PowerPoint presentations. Topics include basic botany, soils and plant nutrition, vegetable gardening, fruit production, insects and diseases, landscaping and landscape plants, turf management, and pesticide safety.

Core training is the first step toward Master Gardener certification. Additionally, a minimum of 30 hours of volunteer service is required. Local Master Gardener chapters help online trainees find volunteer opportunities to meet Help Finding My Father: the service requirements.

"There are Master Gardener programs in every state of the union and in most provinces of Canada," Trinklein said.

Registration for the fall session is Aug. 12. Online classes begin Aug. 19. The course also may be taken for personal enrichment only, with no a higher fee.

Small grain crops seeded this fall replace dry pastures for cow herds

Seeding winter annual small grain offers fall grazing for beef cow herds short on grass and hay.

"Lots of calls are coming in," said Craig Roberts, University of Missouri Extension forage specialist. He offers encouraging words and cautions.

Interest grew as some local USDA Farm Service Agency offices offer added drought disaster assistance.

Drilling wheat, cereal rye or oats can provide forage. Seeded in the fall, the grain crops become annual grass pasture for fall and winter. They supply quick grazing when fall rains return. Wheat and rye also provide more forage early next spring.

Annual grasses give short-term gain but could start long-term pasture renovation.

Thickly seeded grain crops can kill weak existing forages. "If you have a good stand of fescue or alfalfa, don't drill grain seedings on that land. Annual grain crops should be seeded only on weak pastures," Roberts said. "There should be plenty of those this year."

Rob Kallenbach, MU forage specialist, cautioned that he has seeded winter grains into strong stands of fescue in his research. "All failed," he added. "Fescue sod makes strong competition."

Farmers should use caution seeding into an alfalfa field. "The cost of getting alfalfa seeded must be protected. Seed only into weak alfalfa stands that need renovation," Roberts said.

The weekly MU agronomy teleconference covered several forage options. Regional agronomists pose local problems for open discussion. Ideas are shared among regional and state specialists.

This week, specialists talked of small grain to use for forage. Cereal rye

remains winter-hardy with quick regrowth next spring. The weaker oats give good fall growth but fade over winter. That leaves land open in spring for planting crops or seeding pastures.

This year needs extra attention to stockpiling fescue pastures for winter grazing, according to specialists.

"If there was ever a year to apply fall nitrogen, this is it," said John Lory, MU Extension soil specialist. "You'll get a big bang for your buck." High-price hay makes grazing forage a cost cutter.

Fall pasture care includes clipping stemmy fescue seed heads to encourage regrowth. In normal years this includes grazing down to 3 inches. However, in drought areas most grass leaves are already too short.

Winter pasture stockpile needs 40 to 50 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer per acre. This should go on by mid-August before fall rains. Most years those rains start Sept. 1.

A field staff member added that fall-applied nitrogen won't be wasted if rains don't come. Fertilizer will still be there for spring growth. Usually spring nitrogen isn't needed. If it doesn't rain, spring forage becomes worth even more.

"All plans for fall grass growth depend on return of rains," Roberts says. "Just assume rains will come. They usually do."

Farmers recall th

drought of 2012. An extreme summer drought that year broke when big rains came the first week of September. Remnants of a Gulf Coast hurricane soaked much of the state. That rain restored grasses and made a soybean crop. Droughts do end.

Grazing wasn't the only topic this week. Specialists reported some farmers began baling cornstalks that did not make grain. Drought-stress forages should be tested for high nitrate content. Most county extension offices have refreshed quick-test kits for nitrates.





Two Cassville singers chosen Locals encouraged to reevaluate tick bite prevention this summer

As the summer season continues, it is important that tick bite prevention remains a part of your summer routing

To date in 2018, the Missouri Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS) has recorded 344 cases of spotted fever rickettsioses, including Rocky Mountain spotted fever, 208 cases of ehrlichiosis, 7 cases of Lyme disease, 11 cases of tularemia and 1 case of Heartland virus. There have been no recorded cases of acute Bourbon virus. Overall, 2018 tick-borne illness case counts are slightly behind 2017 reported cases.

"Missouri is a beautiful state, home to gorgeous parks, fantastic hiking trails, national forest lands, pretty lakes, and unfortunately ticks," said Dr. Randall Williams, DHSS Director. "Symptoms of tick-borne diseases typically begin within two weeks of a bite by an infected tick and for most people include a sudden fever, body aches and headache. Symptoms are often flu-like. If you find an attached tick, remove it promptly. The longer it

is attached, the greater the risk of infection."

To remove ticks:

- Using tweezers, grasp tick near its mouth and as close to your skin as pos-
- Pull tick firmly, straight out, away from skin. Do not jerk or twist the tick.
- Do NOT use alcohol, matches, liquid soap or petroleum jelly to remove a tick
- Wash your hands and the bite site with soap and water after the tick is removed. Apply an antiseptic to the bite site.

In 1804, Lewis and Clark even made note in their journals about Missouri's ticks and mosquitos. Back then, they didn't have the same awareness of the dangers of tick bites as we do today. Today, we know tick bites can transmit disease, which is why DHSS continues to collaborate with the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) regarding ticks and the diseases they carry, including emerging diseases such as Heartland and Bourbon viruses. As was published this past Wednesday, July 25, in the New England Journal of Medicine (Tickborne Diseases - Confronting a Growing Threat), "The burden of tickborne diseases seems likely to continue to grow substantially."

Ticks may be small pests but their bite can have big consequences. DHSS was notified by the CDC that final results for a recent possible case of Bourbon virus were not indicative of acute Bourbon virus infection. Test results indicated that the individual most likely had ehrlichiosis. It is important to note that scientists and researchers are still learning how Bourbon virus affects the body and how the body responds to exposure. Due to test results, it is possible this individual had a prior infection due to Bourbon virus.


"As with any emerging illness, we still have a lot to learn about Bourbon virus," said Williams. Missouri continues to monitor tickborne diseases and request testing through the CDC for emerging diseases such as Heartland virus and Bourbon virus when indicated. Acute Bourbon virus illness has been detected in two Missourians. Since its discovery, Bourbon virus has also been detected in tick populations in Missouri. Ongoing statewide collaborations between DHSS and the CDC, including additional testing this summer, indicate that statewide, five others in Missouri may have been infected with Bourbon virus, but to our knowledge, the infection was not associated with a known illness. Like other tick-borne diseases, not everyone who is bitten by a tick gets infected or gets sick.

"We are able to provide this number at this time because additional testing for this emerging disease has now been conducted on individuals throughout the state, including this summer, providing us and our partners at the CDC confidence that both privacy requirements and public health objectives are met," said Williams. "With such a new virus, we just don't know how prevalent the disease is in Missouri or the United States. We do know that Bourbon virus and Heartland virus are present in Missouri ticks, which is why tick bite prevention is so important. We anticipate as the tick season continues, we will continue to test for Bourbon and Heartland viruses."

In addition to collaborating on testing, DHSS is working with the CDC to better understand the burden of tick-borne illness in Missouri and the United States. DHSS and the CDC will be partnering to conduct enhanced surveillance for rickettsial disease (spotted fever group), to identify hot spots for ehrlichiosis, and to improve diagnostic testing.

DHSS and the CDC also plan to conduct additional surveillance of ticks in Missouri in the near future and will be releasing findings regarding the predicted prevalence of Heartland virus in Northwest Missouri and other vector-borne diseases in animals.

CoxHealth begins system-wide opioid education program

When used properly, opioid medications are an effective and appropriate way to manage pain. However, it's important that patients only use such prescriptions as directed, and fully understand the associated risks, when to stop, what to do with leftover medications when they're no longer needed, and alternative ways to reduce discomfort.

To increase awareness about these topics, CoxHealth recently launched a new education program that provides several different touchpoints to educate patients about opioids. This program currently involves surgical patients, and is utilized across CoxHealth.

"Opioid medications can be a very effective tool when used appropriately, but unfortunately there are situations when they aren't used as they should be," says Tina Tarter-Hamlet, patient education coordinator at CoxHealth. "Education has always been part of CoxHealth's protocol, but we wanted to give even more information so patients are even more empowered."

Under the new program, patients are educated several times through printed materials, verbal instruction and video. While encounters vary depending on whether a surgery is outpatient or inpatient, the educational points are generally done during a visit with the surgeon prior to surgery, on the day of surgery, while patients are in the hospital, on their last day in the hospital, and as they are discharged.

Additionally, its areas of focus include:

- How pain is measured
- Adverse effects of opioids
- Alternative methods to control pain, including over-thecounter options
 - How to avoid misuse and abuse
 - How to properly store and control opioids
 - What to do in case of an overdose
 - The proper disposal of opioids

"So far, patients have been very receptive to these efforts," says Tarter-Hamlet. "Hopefully, the program will help raise the level of awareness about these medications, when to use them appropriately, and that they aren't usually the only option for pain relief."

Barry County Route VV/Little Flat Creek bridge to close week of Aug. 6 for bridge replacement

Barry County Route VV at Little Flat Creek north of Mc-Dowell will CLOSE the week of August 6 to allow contractor crews to replace the aging bridge, the Missouri Department of Transportation said.

Route VV at Little Flat Creek could remain closed until mid-December 2018.

While crews are replacing the bridge, drivers must find an alternate route around the project. No formal signed detour is planned. Drivers will have access to driveways and other entrances on either side of the bridge, but will not be able to travel through the work zone.

The new bridge will be 24-feet wide. The existing bridge is 20-feet wide and was built in 1958.

The prime contractor for the project is Hartman and Company of Springfield.

The project completion date is December 15, 2018. The estimated total project cost is \$836,000.

The tick-borne disease expertise of DHSS staff in Missouri make Missouri an ideal partner for collaborations with the CDC on these issues.

Missouri has also prepared and distributed health guidance for medical professionals regarding tick-borne illness in Missouri. The health guidance includes information regarding the number of tick-borne illnesses in Missouri, common symptoms to look for, and information regarding testing and diagnosis.

Preventing tick bites will reduce your risk of tick-borne infections such as Bourbon and Heartland viruses, Rocky Mountain spotted fever, ehrlichiosis, tularemia, and Lyme or other tick-borne diseases. Everyone can more safely enjoy the outdoors, whether at home or traveling, by using the following precautions to avoid tick bites.

- Take two-minutes to apply an insect repellent with a minimum of 20% DEET, picaridin, or IR3535 on exposed skin and clothing. Choose a product that lasts several hours whenever you spend time outdoors. DEET products should not be used on infants under two months of age.
- When possible, wear protective clothing (light colored, long sleeved shirts and pants) when outdoors to keep ticks off skin.

• Avoid tick infested areas including brushy areas, tall grasses, wood piles and leaf litter. When hiking, stay near the center of trails to avoid ticks.

- Reduce ticks around your home by keeping lawns mowed short, shrubs and trees trimmed, and remove leaf litter, wood piles, fallen branches, trash and debris from yards.
- People with pets should talk with their veterinarian about use of tick prevention treatments and should regularly check pets for ticks.

- Take two more minutes to check for ticks while outdoors and again after returning from the outdoors. If possible, change clothes and shower soon after spending time outdoors.
- Always check yourself, family, and friends for ticks after spending time outdoors.
