#### Youngblood takes presiding commissioner race Still to be Recorder of Deeds in 2019

January 2019 will see a new presiding commissioner after last night's Primary Election. Current county clerk Gary Youngblood took the seat with 51 percent of the vote, besting incumbent Cherry Warren and newcomer John Hendricks. Warren has been presiding commissioner for 24 years, the same length of time Youngblood has served as county clerk. All three ran on the Republican ticket, and Youngblood won't face a challenger from another party in the November election.

When asked for his reaction to the election, Youngblood said, "I was humbled by the votes for me. I was surprised. I thought the race would be closer than that."

Warren and Hendricks both wished Youngblood well in his position, and Warren said he looked back fondly on his years with the county.

Warren said, "I'm proud of the accomplishments for Barry County since I've been presiding commissioner. When you look at the things we did, I think we made

more improvements to infrastructure than any administration has ever done. We're

#### OACAC Back-to-School Fair provides school supplies to hundreds

The seemingly endless lists of school supplies that parents are required to purchase for school each year can be a daunting prospect for many area families. For the past 17 years, the Ozarks Area Community Action Corporation (OACAC) has worked with local businesses to host a back-to-school fair for local children, helping to relieve the financial strain placed on their families.

Held this year on Saturday, August 4, at the First Baptist Church Family Life Center in Cassville, the fair provided services and school supplies to over 160 children grades K-6 from Cassville,

Purdy, Wheaton, Exeter and Southwest school districts. A few of the services offered included vision and dental screenings, height and weight checks, nutrition education, and 9-1-1 safety information.

"So many of our families don't take advantage of the programs available to them," said Gail Reed, supervisor for the Cassville OACAC Neighborhood Center. "We want kids to access the services available." A number of families simply do not realize the programs and services available to them until attending the fair, and providing an introduction to those services helps families as a whole.

Melissa Gregory, whose son, Milez, attended this year's fair, shared her gratitude regarding the event. "The people that run it are very helpful and explain what they have to offer." Gregory reports that her family has benefited from the services showcased at the fair.

In addition to health and hygiene-related services, a number of booths at the fair focused on after school programs, including Boy Scouts, Girl Scouts and 4-H. Others focused on opportunities for younger siblings, such as Head Start, while booths offered by Crowder

#### City of Purdy moves forward with sewer project

Progress is being made in the City of Purdy sewer project that is running sewer lines to have residents' sewer treated at the Monett wastewater treatment facility.

Purdy mayor Bo Prock said, "We are laying pipe right now." By next summer, the city's sewer will all be sent to Monett to be treated safely.

Rosetta Construction, of Springfield, was awarded the contract to run sewer lines from Purdy to Monett to be processed at the Monett wastewater treat-

Rosetta was one of 11 companies that bid the project, and Prock said the construction group came in around \$400,000 under the other bids.

Prock said no changes were made to the contract, and the engineering service the city hired to oversee the project also reviewed the bids before the council voted to accept a bid. The city retained Allgiere, Martin and Associates Engineering to plan the project.

Rosetta began the project the second week of June and, per the contract, they

have 12 months to complete it. At that point, Purdy's sewer will be treated at the Monett facility.

Prock said the contract with Monett has been signed and will go into effect as soon as the work is complete. He said, "We'll flip the switch and send all the sewer to Monett for treatment."

Purdy's current wastewater facility, the sewer lagoon, will stay in place as a holding facility, but Prock said they will pump that out to Monett during low times of use for the partner facil-

In each REALL simulation, the individual must determine how to pay their bills, provide daycare, and handle practical real life situations both as a graduate and a non-graduate. The aim of the program is to encourage teens to stay in school to receive their diploma. OACAC provided a pizza party for the teens and families in attendance, and the students received

Registration for back-to-school fair takes place each year from Memorial Day to July 4th. For any families who do not pre-register for either event, a third opportunity to access school supplies took place at a Life Skills class in the Neighborhood Center. "We want to prepare all kids for a good school year," Reed said.

Occasionally additional families will visit OACAC in search of school supplies after the fairs and class have finished, and the Neighborhood Center will work to provide those students with the supplies they need. "By the end of the program, we will have provided school supplies to approximately 250 kids," Reed stated.

#### Two charged in Purdy marijuana grow operation HELICOPTER SPOTTED SUSPECTS CUTTING PLANTS

A helicopter fly-over yielded two arrests for a marijuana growing operation on a Farm Road near Purdy earlier this week. According to affidavits of probable cause, Suzzanne Marie Bland, 47, and Dana Wayne Bland, 60, both of Purdy, were growing marijuana on their property on Farm Road 2125.

On August 6, an air crew on a helicopter observed the Blands cutting marijuana plants down and putting them in a shed on the property. When officers arrived, they saw the couple had 13 plants, with cut plants in the shed and

buckets with cut stalks with roots still attached still on the property.

Officers with the Barry County Sheriff's Department said the items were consistent with a marijuana grow operation within a close proximity to the buck-

# Sexual assault charge for Carthage man

A Cassville man was arrested and charged with sodomy in the second degree after an alleged sexual assault on Tuesday, August 7. Ryan Lee Mitchell, 19, of Carthage, was at the victim's residence spending the night when the assault took place.

According to the affidavits probable cause filed by the Cassville Police Department, Mitchell was at the victim's residence on Kathy Drive and started touching her breast and buttocks. When the victim told Mitchell to stop, he did not, according to the report.

Mitchell proceeded to touch the victim inappropriately in a sexual manner until she said she needed to go to the bathroom and called 911.

Mitchell is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$15,000 cash-only bond.

#### Hearing set for Aug. 17 for possible removal of Exeter Police Chief

The hearing to consider the removal of current Exeter Chief of Police Kenen Martinez has been scheduled for mid-August. According to Martinez, he is waiving his right to a closed hearing and opting for a public hearing.

However, Martinez said he has heard that the council will not allow the hearing to be public. He said, "Whether it's open or not, I'm asking people to come."

Martinez said he has received an outpouring of support from members of the community. "It's been overwhelmingly positive and I appreciate the community's support," he said.

In the notice for the hearing to consider Martinez's removal, the city council outlines a myriad of complaints against the police chief. However, Martinez said the complaints are taken out of context or easily explainable. He said, "I have nothing to hide. I always try to be transparent as a member of law enforcement."

The complaints fall into

five different categories: misuse of city funds, dereliction of duty, acting in a way to only further himself, threatening/harassing city employees, and insubordination.

Martinez said, regardless of the complaints outline, the issues outlined are not why he feels he is being ousted. "Tve been told privately by members of the city government that they did not want a police officer. They wanted someone to write code enforcements and run traffic stops for the city to generate revenue for the city.

"I told them I would be more than happy to write those citations for the beautification of the city and traffic tickets when people actually deserved those tickets, not just for revenue. I wasn't going to write tickets relating to someone's family name.

"I was told to hand the criminal cases over to Barry County. I was told they did not want me outside of the city limits to help county or other departments. I was to focus on Exeter and only Exeter," he said.

He added, "Some of the accusations look pretty damning. But for the city's funds, they don't give me a budget. I've been able to buy things in the past and repay the city if it wasn't approved prior to the purchase. I've had to buy my own ink, my own printer. These were purchases for the department.

"Everything I purchased was for the department, and often I paid it back out of my own money."

In the weeks since Martinez was initially notified they were considering his removal, tension has increased between him and the city employees and council members. Even culminating with the city clerk applying for an ex parte against Martinez for using a "threatening tone" against

her according to the statement. The initial ex parte was denied and a hearing date was set for the future.

Martinez claims issues stem from discoveries he's made regarding the city's way of operating. He said, "I'm trying to blow the whistle on corruption and nepotism.

"The division between the city and myself is great. It's going to take years before the citizens who support me and the city come to some resolution

"Ideally, I'd like to see some change in the way things are done in the city."

Martinez said that he hopes in the future the city will have written directives for his position however, he claims the council wants to dissolve the police department. He said, "I've men-

tioned to them it is not lawful to dissolve the police department. State statute says if you don't have a police department, you're to have a state Marshall or a contract with the county. They told me they've done it before, and they'll do it again."


Martinez is also asking for anyone in support of him to attend the meeting for moral support and to express their opinions on the termination of his employment.

He said, "In a conversation with the mayor, I was told this is just a formality. We will be firing you and it would be better to resign. I said I would have my day in the hearing and have my day in court."

The hearing will be Friday, August 17, at 3:30 p.m. at the Exeter City Hall.

#### Schools are back in session soon; watch for students

As summer vacation comes to a close, students across Missouri are preparing to begin their 2018-2019 school year. The Missouri State Highway Patrol reminds drivers this brings a change in traffic patterns when school buses and parents taking their children to school will join other motorists on the road and affect the morning and afternoon commute. It is critical for drivers to be alert, especially near school zones, playgrounds, and bicycle paths. Whatever route you drive, expect this additional traffic and prepare by allowing extra time to reach your destination.

In 2017, five people were killed and 401 people were injured in 869 traffic crashes involving school buses. Parents are encouraged to talk to their children about riding a bus, walking, or driving to school in a safe manner. If they ride a bike, please make sure they

wear a helmet and follow traffic laws.

Most traffic crashes involving young drivers (under the age of 21) in 2017 occurred between 3 p.m. and 4 p.m., when school typically lets out. Drivers need to be aware of the increased traffic during this time—and not just in areas around schools. Many of these drivers are young and inexperienced. Parents: It is important to encourage those young drivers to remember driving is a fulltime job. Using a cell phone, texting, or adjusting the radio can be the distraction that leads to a traffic crash. Texting is against the law for anyone under the age of

Missouri law states that on a two-lane road, if a school bus is stopped and displaying warning signals while loading or unloading children, drivers must stop when meeting and following the bus. However, it is only necessary to stop on a four-lane highway when following the bus. Drivers, when you see a stopped school bus, stay alert and follow the law. Children may not be aware of traffic and dart unexpectedly into

the roadway.

The only 100 percent survivable crash is the one that never happens. Make sure everyone in the vehicle is properly restrained in a seat belt or child restraint. Every day as we travel on Missouri's roadways, we trust that every driver on the road is going to obey the speed limit, pay attention, and drive sober. "Don't Violate The Trust."

Prock said customers will see a difference in their bills, but it shouldn't be substantial. He said, "Prices will go up. It is estimated to an average of around \$65 for water and sewer. Currently, it's around \$55 for both."

Without pairing with Monett, the city would have had to build a treatment facility to be in compliance with the Missouri Department of Natural Resources. The city was not in compliance for a number of years as lagoons are being phased out as a whole across the country.

The sewer project was made possible by voter approval of a \$4.6 million bond in November 2015. However, the project came in under that estimate.

Funding for the project is a combination of grant funding and utilizing the city's bonding capacity that was approved in November 2015.

The City qualified for \$1.7 million in USDA grant money, \$1.25 million from DNR's community development block grant funds and also secured a loan through the USDA for \$1.69 million.

#### **Drought survival meetings** Aug. 17 in Springfield, Mt. Vernon

Summer drought has caused headaches for livestock producers who are preparing to feed cattle this winter with little forage or hay on hand.

As a result, county extension offices have been flooded with questions about what to do. Those questions have led to the Lawrence and Greene County MU Extension Councils offering meetings on Friday, August 17, for cattle producers who want tips for surviving the drought.

The meetings on Aug. 17 will be offered from 9 a.m. until noon at the University of Missouri Southwest Research Center, 14548 Hwy. H, Mt. Vernon and from 2 p.m. to 5 p.m. the same day at the Springfield Livestock Marketing Center, 821 W. Independence Dr., Springfield.

The programs will focus on supplementing low-quality hay, alternative feeds, herd culling, precautions with nitrates and prussic acid, fall forage alternatives and assessing the price of forages.

Producers are also welcome to bring lower stems of fertilized sudangrass, millet, Johnsongrass and bermudagrass for a quick subjective analysis of nitrates.

"The drought has taken a major toll on beef and dairy farms in the area. Short hay supplies will continue to plague these farms as we go into winter", said Tim Schnakenberg, agronomy specialist with University of Missouri Extension. "Producers need to take extra steps to stretch their feed supplies and know what alternatives are available to address the crisis."

Schnakenberg, along with Dr. Eric Bailey, state beef nutrition specialist; Eldon Cole, regional livestock specialist; Jill Scheidt, regional agronomy specialist; and Jim Spencer, regional ag business specialist; will be on hand for the discussion at both meetings.

#### Remember safety for back to school, says Cassville PD


Lomeli suffered moder-

#### **Southwest Trap Team wins National Championship**

For the second time in Southwest Trap Team history, a National Championship trophy came home to rest.

Southwest's first national championship came for the High School team in 2009. Now, nine years later, it is the junior high team that brought home the AIM Grand National Title. The tournament is held annually at the World Shooting Complex in Sparta, Illinois.

The junior high team of Ty Howard, Olivia Ayer, Samuel Jennings, Caleb Ayer, Joseph Stockton along with alternates Colton Phillips and Alex Ramirez shot a total score of 874/1000 to outdistance 36 other teams from across the U.S and Canada in their class. Ty led the team in targets breaking 190/200 over the two-day competition followed by a 183 and a 172 from Samuel and Olivia. These three shooters will be moving on to the High School Team next season and will bring a great dynamic to an already good

Team coach Mike Vining said, "After the first day, we were tied for the lead at 429/500 targets. Assistant coach Larry Hicks and I met with the team that evening in the hotel. I debated whether to let them know where they stood and possibly cause them to tighten up the next day or to not tell them and hope for the best on day two.

"I have always been the type to be up front with the kids, so I told them where they stood. Larry and I told them to go out the next day, stay focused, find their zone, shoot to their potential, and have a great day."

They not only matched the first day round but increased their score by 16 targets. Vining commented, "At that point, I knew we had a shot, and it was then a matter of playing the waiting game for final scores to start coming in."

He continued, "I have been saying for a couple of years that this bunch of kids were showing great potential and that we were excited for what lay in store for them in the future. They have worked hard for a couple of years and we are all happy and proud that the work they have put in has paid off."

The high school team of Heather Windes, Dylan Morgan, Emily Snyder, Hunter Stanley and Leland Colf represented Southwest very well in their toughest competition of the season.

"Every Vining said, shooter on the squad shot several good rounds throughout nationals, but we couldn't get things going on day one as a team. Larry and I met with them after the first day's round as well just to give them a chance to clear their heads and be ready for day two.

"They knew they had an off day, so there was no need to go down that road with them. Larry and I re-enforced to them that our expectations are never to win every shoot, but rather to shoot to their potential each time out. It would have been very easy for them to give up after the first day, but they went out on the second day, shot much better as a team and increased their

Southwest's trap team will lose one senior off this year's squad: Emily Snyder. "Emily has been with us a long time and even though we hate losing such a great young lady and shooter, I know great things are ahead of her," Vining stated. "Southwest has a good tradition of graduating kids with a great work ethic and Emily has that trait. She will succeed in whatever she does."

Vining said, "Win, lose or draw, I would take this bunch of shooters to compete anywhere against anyone. I needed to do a better job of having them mentally prepared, so that was on me."

Vining concluded, "Thanks go out first and foremost to our assistant coach Larry Hicks. Larry brings 40 years of trap shooting experience to our kids. His passion for the sport and willingness to dedicate his time to the kids is tremendous. To our booster club and all the area businesses and supporters of our little band of shooters. Words can't come close to letting you know what you mean to our program. Thank you all for your generosity."

#### MoDOT streamlines hay movement for drought relief to Missouri farmers and ranchers

#### PERMIT FEES AND SOME RESTRICTIONS WAIVED

Severe drought conditions through much of the state have prompted the Missouri Department of Transportation to offer a special overwidth hauling permit to help farmers and ranchers move hay as needed. Loads must be of legal height, length and weight. Permits can be requested via phone and will, in most cases, be issued within minutes via fax or email. The \$32 permit fee will be waived through Oct. 31, 2018.

Before hauling, drivers must apply for the special overwidth hauling permit for loads that exceed eight feet and six inches in width, and map their route to avoid work zones, bridges and other areas that have weight, narrow lane or height restrictions. This information, as well as a special bridge and height restriction view, is available on the MoDOT Traveler Information Map at modot.

"Missouri's agriculture community thrives when neighbors and rural communities rely on one another, and that is exactly the support this waiver will encourage," Director of Agriculture Chris Chinn said. "We sincerely thank Governor Parson, as well as the Departments of Natural Resources and Transportation, for their continued support of farmers and ranchers during this extensive drought season."

MoDOT's waiver and special overwidth permit allows drivers in Missouri

• Obtain the permit at no

 Haul hay loads of up to 12 feet and 4 inches in width

• Move hay during holiday periods and at night. At night, or when visibility is less than 500 feet, drivers must use a reflective, oversized load sign and clearance lights instead of the normal flags required at the edges of the load.

Drivers must adhere to all permit requirements, such as using proper signing and lighting and stopping at weigh stations. Drivers should also be advised that most of the southeastern United States is currently under a quarantine zone for imported fire ants, which can be easily spread through the movement of hay. Farmers and ranchers who believe they have received fire ants in a shipment of hay should call their local University of Missouri Extension agent as soon as possible.

To obtain a permit, hay haulers should call MoDOT's Motor Carrier Services office at 1-800-877-8499 to report the year, make, license plate number and vehicle identification number (VIN) of the power unit and provide the farm business name and address. MoDOT permits cover movement within Missouri only and are required for each truck.

# Beef farmers plan on fall rains to make winter pasture

Stunted, stemmy pastures unable to support grazing cattle have potential. Depend on fall rains to bring fall regrowth, says University of Missouri Extension forage agronomist Craig Roberts.

Cool-season grass growth always slumps in summer. Fescue goes dormant. This year, the slump dives deep with lack of rain and too much heat. In spite of that, Missouri farmers should prepare for fall regrowth for winter grazing.

Roberts reminds farmers to think back to the big drought of 2012. After a prolonged dry spell, rains returned Sept. 1. After the drought, grass grew and soybean fields made big yields.

Fall rains and renewed growth are normal. Sometimes remnants of hurricanes, as in 2012, bring big rains.

To prepare for fall growth every year, farmers clip pastures to encourage regrowth and apply 40 to 50 pounds of nitrogen fertilizer. Then they wait for rains and new grass. Often as not, it works.

"If you prepare and it rains, you win," Roberts says. "If not prepared, you can't win."

Roberts cautions farmers to not clip too early. "Wait to clip the canopy until mid-August."

Friendly weeds may prove welcome this year, Roberts says. Grassy weeds such as

crabgrass, foxtail, barnyardgrass and goosegrass are summer annuals. "Weeds are just waiting to grow. If we get some rain, they may make forage to bale."

"Weeds aren't great," Robert adds. "But this year, take what Mother Nature gives. However, avoid baling poisonous or thorny weeds. We just want friendly weeds."

Cool-season grasses have two growing seasons. The spring season provides twothirds of annual production. That other third of growth usually goes into stockpile, which is left unbaled and held for winter grazing.

When cows harvest grass by grazing, it cuts winter feed bills

Management-intensive grazing, taught in MU grazing schools, boosts production per acre by one third.

Roberts says he's getting lots of phone calls about clipping pastures now. Farmers want to speed regrowth, but he urges patience. "Wait until the first or second week of August."

By nature, Missouri farmers take risks. "Just wait and play the odds," he says.

Regional MU Extension field crops or livestock specialists advise on managing grass and cow herds.
