For the second time this year, Roaring River State Park is preparing for an influx of small fishers looking for big catches at the fall Kids' Fishing Day. The everpopular day that allows children to fish for free will be this Saturday, August 16.

Paul Spurgeon, Roaring River Hatchery manager, said that the staff is stocking the waters with around 3,000 trout. Of that total, 100 will be tagged for special prizes and 50 are lunkers.

Like each Kids' Fishing Day, there is more to do for

youngsters and adults alike other than fishing. From 9 a.m. until 4:30 p.m. different classes will be offered for kids wanting to learn how to shoot a bow, learn to fly fish, and much more. Cassville Council considers \$4.8M in waterline repairs

During Monday night's Cassville City Council meeting, the aldermen heard from Ronnie Marshall, a representative from Schultz Surveying and Engineering in Branson, made a presentation about repairing and improving the City's waterlines.

The project, estimated to cost around \$4,894,045, would be primarily funded with grants, but the percentage would be determined later on down the line. Mayor Bill Shiveley said, "Whether our part of that financially was a bond or something like that, it would still have to be approved by the voters." The investigation into the City's waterlines came from the instruction of the Missouri Department of Natural Resources because the City had around 30 percent water loss. Much of the water being pumped was being lost because of aging pipes and other issues.

Marshall said, "To do nothing, status quo, is not acceptable. Something will have to be done because of the situation with the old pipes." Currently, much of

Seligman man faces murder charge for wreck

A Seligman man is facing 2nd degree murder charges following a wreck west of Washburn on Sunday, August 3.

Brian R. Sharp, 32, Seligman, is charged with 2nd degree murder, driving while revoked subsequent offense, and leaving the scene of a motor vehicle accident. Sharp is currently being held in the Barry County Jail in lieu of a \$100,000 bond.

According to affidavits of probable cause, on the date of the crash, the Missouri State Highway Patrol was dispatched to an accident on Missouri 90 west of Washburn around 6:18 p.m. When a trooper arrived, a 1979 Chevrolet Corvette was crashed with the passenger, Kenneth A. Patterson, 52, Seligman, dead inside the car. The ground was littered with beer cans and the driver was missing. Patterson was pronounced dead by Deputy Coroner Charles McManus at 6:50 p.m.

After an investigation, officers determined the driver to be Sharp after speaking to family members and finding his cell phone still in the vehicle.

When a computer check was run on Sharp, he was found to be on a minimum

ten-year drivers license privilege revoked and ten other convictions for driving while revoked and driving related charges.

If convicted, Sharp faces 10 years up to life in prison.

Sales tax revenue rises

For yet another month, sales tax revenue for both the county and the City of Cassville continues to spike. In the month of July, Barry County's tax revenue was up 15.84 percent when compared to July 2013. That increase means an additional \$18,094.44 for the County's general revenue.

The City of Cassville's revenue was also up for July with numbers coming in at 7.3 percent over last year's totals. For the City, the equated to an additional \$8,000 approximately.

For the year, both Cassville and Barry County have a good cushion of extra revenue when compared to 2013. For the year, Cassville is up 6.4 percent with \$66,773 over the budgeted funds for months January through July. Barry County's revenue is up 12.57 percent for the year with \$134,333.98 over anticipated funding from sales taxes.

The County also held steady in its collection of the new 1/8 cent tax that began in October of last year. Most months, the amount collected has hovered around \$33-37,000. July's collected amount was \$33,132.40. If trends continue, Cassville and Barry County could be left with a hefty revenue cushion by the end of the year.

Seligman family busted for meth lab

Four are in jail following a meth lab bust on Wednesday last week. David Michael Oplinger, 23; Shawn Marie Short, 41; Cody Lane Oplinger, 24; and Jessie W. Oplinger were arrested on August 6 after an investigation by the Southwest Missouri Drug Task Force in Seligman.

The SWMDTF and the Barry County Sheriff went to a residence on West View Road after receiving information that there was a methamphetamine lab inside. The owner granted permission for the trailer and surrounding to be searched.

While officers were searching, they found an orange backpack and a black backpack located in a car on the property that contained Drano, lighter fluid, cold packs, lithium batteries, and other ma-

terials necessary for making methamphetamine. In another car, officers found crystal drain opener, starter fluid, and a grinder with a white powdery substance in it.

Cody Oplinger is charged with possession of a controlled substance for two baggies of methamphetamine found on August 5 before the property search on Wednesday as well as distribution. Shawn Marie Short, Jessie Oplinger and David Oplinger are all facing manufacturing to distribute charges as well as probation violations. Short is being held in lieu of a \$25,000 bond. David is being held in lieu of a \$30,000 bond. Jessie is being held in lieu of a \$10,182 for probation violation and failure to appear. Cody has already posted bond.

Amendment No. 7 took a drubbing E.M.get is projected to plummet

Missouri has 114 counties and the City of St. Louis. In the Tuesday Primary Election last week, there were two of the five constitutional amendments that sparked controversy.

Amendment No. 1, which dealt with a "right -to-farm" provision in the constitution, was narrowly adopted by the voters.

Amendment No. 7, sponsored by the Missouri State Highway Department supporters who fueled the effort with some four million dollars, were decisively defeated by a vote of 590,963 against the multimillion sales tax increase, with 407,532 supporting the 10 year tax hike. Opponents of the measure raised and spent only \$25,000.00 to defeat the added tax burden.



from a recent high of \$1.3 billion annually to \$325 million by 2017. There is no Plan B to replace that money since the amendment was projected to raise at least \$540 million annually.

Construction contractors, labor unions, engineering firms and others poured more than \$4 million into the Missouri sales tax campaign and outspent opponents by a more than 100-to-1 ratio.

Opposition came from both staunch conservatives and strident liberals, who fear the sales tax, would hit the poorest the hardest while collecting nothing from the heaviest highway users. The sales tax hike wouldn't apply to tractortrailer rigs.



Cassville DUI Labor Day weekend crackdown

Labor Day weekend is coming up. For many Americans, that means an extra day off, backyard and beach barbecues, and visiting friends and family. Unfortunately, it also means a sharp increase in drunk-driving-related fatalities. So starting August 15 and continuing through September 1, local police will be aggressively targeting drunk drivers as part of a nationwide effort to end drunk driving and save lives. The Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign will pair increased public awareness with high-visibility enforcement, resulting in fewer drunk drivers on Cassville roads.

In 2012, there were 10,322 people killed in drunk-driving crashes in the United States. Over Labor Day weekend (6 p.m. Friday to 5:59 a.m. Tuesday) that year, more than a third (38%) of all traffic fatalities were in drunkdriving crashes. These grim facts should speak for theselves, but they haven't gotten everyone's attention yet.

"It's tragic how many people lose their lives to drunk driving," said Dana Kammerlohr, Cassville Chief of Police. "If the news reported that more than 10,000 people were killed in a preventable crime spree, the American public would be outraged!" Kammerlohr continued. For the first time, the Cassville Police Department will be joining the national Drive Sober or Get Pulled Over campaign and will ar-



rest anyone caught driving drunk. No tolerance, no excuses.

Over the Labor Day weekend in 2012, there were 147 people killed in alcohol-impaired-driving crashes across the country. And here's a staggering statistic: out of all the crash fatalities that weekend, one in four (25%) were attributed to drivers with a blood alcohol concentration (BAC) of .15 grams per deciliter (g/dL) or higher almost twice the legal limit in all 50 states and the District of Columbia.

Every 51 minutes, someone is killed in a drunk-driving crash. Over the Labor Day weekend, those fatalities increase to one every 34 minutes. Nighttime is especially dangerous; almost half (46%) of the fatalities in nighttime (6 p.m. to 5:59 a.m.) crashes over the Labor Day weekend involved a driver with a BACs of .08 or higher. By comparison, 25 percent of the fatalities in daytime fatal crashes involved an impaired driver. Young drivers are over-

represented in drunk-driving crashes, too. Among young drivers-between the ages of 18 and 34killed in motor vehicle crashes during the 2012 Labor Day weekend, almost half (48%) had a BAC of .08 or higher, the legal limit in all states. For drivers under

21, anything above a BAC of .00 is illegal.

"Driving drunk is totally inexcusable," said Chief Kammerlohr. "We're hoping that Cassville drivers get the message and take some simple steps to prevent a tragedy. There's always another way home." The Cassville Police Department is reminding drivers to plan ahead and designate a sober driver before attending any events where alcohol will be served. "Planning a sober ride home, whether it's a friend, a taxi, or public transportation, is the right choice," added Chief Kammerlohr.

This Labor Day weekend don't let the festivities turn into fatalities. Law enforcement is not messing around: if you're caught driving drunk, you will be arrested. Remember that aside from the obvious risks of killing yourself or someone else, driving impaired can also lead to serious punitive consequences. A DUI arrest can mean time in jail, loss of your license, and steep financial expenses; the average DUI costs about \$10,000.


School safety notice

the City's pipes are copper with lead joints. Overtime, the pipes are deteriorated, causing issues.

So far, all the City is out financially is \$2,000 to cover the costs of the study done by Schultz. The council members motioned to move forward on the grant paperwork to see what percentage of the project could be funded. According to Marshall, a little less than half of the City's 43 miles of pipes would need to be replaced with 30,000 feet of 8 inch pipe and 55,000 feet of 6 inch pipe. Some of the City's pipe has already been replaced with PVC, but the totals for that were not available.


Once completed, Marshall estimated that the City would save \$17,000 annually just on energy due to electricity usage. Some of the pipe to be laced would be in new areas to bypass old systems of pipeline, as well.

The biggest issue with the pipes as it stands, according to Marshall, is primarily age. Some of the pipes in place are 80-90 years old, which is past the reasonable expected life of the material.







In a partnership between the Barry County Sheriff's Department and the Exeter School District, the department held a mock shooter training at the school.

The purpose of the event, according to Sheriff Mick Epperly, is to get officers familiar with the schools, but also recognize areas where they might need to change their tactics.

Two mock events were held on Thursday, August 7.



In the first session, officers quickly found the shooters, took out injured parties and safely got the teachers and staff out of the building. Epperly stated, "Thank God we've never had that happen down here, but we want to be as prepared as we can if it ever did happen."



Two students raising funds to build home for homeless

Two young members of the First Christian Church of Cassville are attempting to raise money to help build a house for a homeless family in El Salvador. Chris Dunker, 19, and Jessica Haney, 17, hope to raise \$8,000 by September 25 to donate to 1Mission, an organization dedicated to building housing for homeless people around the globe.

Haney said she and Dunker were inspired to undergo the endeavor after watching a video about 1Mission while on a church conference in Nebraska.

"We watched a video about a girl named Ruby, and she raised \$10,000 for 1Mission, and it was really inspiring, so we decided to do it ourselves," she said.

1Mission was started by founder Jason Law in 2008 with the goal of helping impoverished people around the world help themselves and their communities. According to Dunker, 100 percent of the donated money goes toward this cause.

"It helps pay for education, supplies, the workers who go down there, and the materials. It helps pay for all those so they will be able to build and improve their community," he said.

Dunker also added that, while the homeless family is getting a house, it is not giv-

Haney said she has sent letters asking for donations to friends who are not on Facebook. They have also received money from their church's vacation Bible school. According to Haney, the children there donated an estimated \$630.

Dunker and Haney are also getting help in their fundraising efforts from local photographer Mitzi Starkweather. Starkweather is helping to raise money by offering a special photography package to customers of five sessions for \$250. She added that such a package is usually worth around \$600. Starkweather will sell up to five of the packages.

In addition to the photography sessions, Starkweather is also offering other products, such as custom photo books, wall art and albums. These products range in price from \$350 to \$600, and Starkweather says she will donate 75 percent of the proceeds from the sale of the products to 1Mission in addition to the money raised through the photography sessions. Barry County July Food Service Report

Barry County The Health Department divides food service code violations into two categories: Priority and Core Violations.

Priority Violations (previously referred to as "Critical") are more likely than other violations to contribute to food contamination or illness and/or injury.

Core Violations (previously referred to as "Non-Critical"), although important to the overall hygiene of the establishment, do not necessarily present an immediate threat to food contamination or illness and/or injury.

A report for each establishment that is inspected shows the number of critical violations, along with a short statement as to the nature of the violations. The report also shows the number of non-critical violations but doesn't list the nature of those violations.
