Barry County Sheriff's Dept. hosts Shell Knob active shooter training

As part of annual training efforts, the Barry County Sheriff's Department hosted an active shooter training at the Shell Knob Elementary School on Tuesday, August 18. The exercise is part of a series of active shooter events that the deputies participate in at various area schools to practice in the event that a shooter enters the schools.

This year at Shell Knob, the training involved the Sheriff's Department partnering with Cox Health EMS, Cox Health Trauma Services, Central Crossing Fire Department and the City of Wheaton Police Department. Overall, Sheriff Mick Epperly felt that the day was successful.

He said, "It went pretty well. I was in incident command, and we still had a few problems with navigating the building, but this is what these exercises are for, to get officers familiar with the layout of the schools and communicating to see where issues are."

The event featured three shooters and a variety of victims who displayed realistic wounds, courtesy of Cox Health Trauma Services, to give both law enforcement and emergency medical personnel both shooter and victim scenarios to deal with at the scene.

Epperly said that the active shooter training does not necessarily follow any particular program or protocol, but rather it builds upon itself as the officers gain more experience and practice in case of a real-life event. Teachers and administrators gain insight into what an active shooter situation would be like in their school,

Sheriff Epperly commented, "We had questions coming from the teachers after at Shell

Knob. I think its getting people more involved with what to expect out of us in the event that it actually happened."

Around 15 officers were involved in the Shell Knob training, but Epperly said that

Renovations complete on new Cassville press box

The Cassville Wildcats have a brand new press box just in time for the 2015-2016 football season.

"We are very proud of the job our maintenance staff has done with our newly renovated press box. We are excited to have a safe, sturdy structure our coaches, game operators, media, visiting team personnel and others can utilize during school events at Wildcat Stadium," stated Dr. Richard Asbill, Cassville R-IV School District Superintendent.

"The original press box was over 30 years old. It was built in the 1980's and served its purpose for a long time; however, it was no longer considered a safe structure," added Asbill.

The school opted to do all of the press box work in-house rather than hiring an outside contractor. The maintenance department crew consists of maintenance supervisor Rick Morgan, Bill Spinks, Kent Stephenson, Lennis Periman, Justin Spears and Jack Barber. They began construction of the press box in January.

57th annual Wheaton BBQ planned for Saturday

This Saturday will mark the 57th annual Wheaton BBQ, sponsored by the Wheaton Fire Department. The day will be filled with good food, music and activities for all ages. Most importantly, it marks an occasion for the community to come together and support the volunteer firefighters.

The barbecue started as an annual tradition to raise funds for the department. Two years ago, Wheaton became a Fire Protection District, but assistant chief Lindy Lombard said that the fire department still likes to fund the maintenance of equipment themselves instead of asking for it out of the tax funds.

Lombard said, "This raises money for the odds and ends without having to request it from the Fire Protection District."

Lombard explained that major expenses are covered by the Wheaton Fire Protection District, including maintaining the station in

U.S. Rep. Billy Long visits during land tax sale

At Barry County's annual Land Tax Sale held on Monday, August 24, property sales were significantly lower than last year. U.S. Representative Billy Long also stopped in to sell a few parcels of land while taking a tour of the Barry County courthouse.

This year, there were 40 registered buyers and 151 properties up for sale. A total of 95 properties did not sell. The total \$85,571.75 was down from the \$150,257.31 total sold last year.

According to State Statute 140.250, whenever any lands have been offered for sale for delinquent taxes, interest, penalty and costs by the collector of the county for any two successive years and no person has bid on them, the county collector shall at the next regular tax sale of lands, sell the same to the highest bidder, and there shall be a 90-day period of redemption from such sales as specified by law. If the land is still not sold, the county collector does not need to sell or advertise that property again more often than every five years after the third offering.

Congressman Billy Long was in Cassville discussing flood recovery and the increasing tax revenue while touring the courthouse on Monday. While Long was in town, he helped assist with the county's tax auction as well by auctioning off some properties.

"It was great to be at the Barry County Courthouse and visit with the local representatives. Hearing the county's increasing revenue and progress with the flood recovery is encouraging news. The visit helped me get a better hold on what is impacting constituents on the local level. Government works best from the bottom up, and the conversations this morning were beneficial to that process," said Long.

Wheaton and the sub-station in Ridgley. However, all other maintenance the firefighters raise funds for themselves, even though all of them are volunteers.

Dedication and community support drives the firefighters to do monthly training and raise money for extra expenses. They go on around 250 calls a year between fires, medical calls, first responder calls and mutual aid to other departments. Wheaton's firefighters serve a large portion of Barry County, covering the area bordering Exeter, Purdy, and Fairview's departments, and actually serving part of Newton and McDonald counties, as well.

Around 5 a.m. on Saturday, the 20 volunteers who serve as the Wheaton Fire Department will gather together, light the fire where they'll cook barbecue chicken all day, and set out to raise funds to help keep the wheels in motion for the department. Even though the volunteers are integral, Lombard said that it wouldn't be possible without the help of the community, as well.

He said, "We couldn't pull this off without the community volunteers in the serving shack, and the businesses in our community and the surrounding communities who sponsor us. The bands aren't paid, it's all a donation of their time and talents to make it happen."

Business sponsors donate to sponsor the free rides for kids that run from 1 p.m. to 8 p.m. when the Duck Race starts on Saturday.

Lombard added, "We also are really appreciative to the Wheaton First Baptist Church. They get breakfast ready for us at 6 a.m. and feed all of the firemen before we starting cooking the chicken. They just take it upon themselves to do that for us."

Festivities at the Wheaton BBQ will begin Saturday, August 29, at 11 a.m. when the Show and Shine Car Event starts. Then, at 11:30 a.m., food service starts and the annual Spud McCracken Memorial Horseshoe Tour-

nament takes place.

This year, the firefighters will be offering half a barbecued chicken for \$6 for adults and \$3 for kids which includes a baked potato, baked beans, bread and milk or coffee. There will also be homemade pulled pork sandwiches and baked beans for \$5, a firemen's root beer float stand and homemade pies by the Wheaton United Methodist women.

The locally famous Duck Race will begin at 8 p.m. This year, first place takes \$500, second place is \$250, third place is \$125, fourth place is \$75 and fifth place is \$50. Attendees are encouraged to purchase numbered rubber ducks that are then released by firefighters and sprayed to the finish line with firehoses.








Waugh recognized for years of volunteer service

After years of dedicating countless hours to the families of Roaring River State Park, David Waugh received special recognition from the Missouri Department of Conservation at the fall Kids' Fishing Day event last weekend.

Waugh, general manager for MO Parks Inc., has been with Roaring River for 11 years. MO Parks, Inc. is the concessionaire at the park. In total, he has been working in parks for 19 years after starting at Bennett Springs. However, his passion for fishing and the outdoors started when he was

just nine years old the first time he picked up a pole. That love of fishing and the outdoors has stuck with him throughout his life, and now he does what he can to instill that passion for the upcoming generation.

Hatchery manager Paul Spurgeon presented Waugh with the award, appropriately on a plaque in the shape of a fish, after the MDC made the decision to acknowledge his efforts. Each year, Waugh teaches fly casting classes at both the spring and fall Kids' Fishing Days, but he also works behind the scenes, cooking and serving hot dogs

to hungry pint-sized anglers and their families. His efforts don't stop there, but extend to any time the park has needed him over the years, including helping with evacuation during times of danger or emer-

Waugh said, "I just do whatever needs to be done. Over the years, it's been maintenance, cooking hot dogs, the fly casting class. I help where I'm needed."

Year after year, Waugh helps families learn to fish the crystal, cool waters of Roaring River. At times, that meant kids' parents had never touched a fishing pole before.

He explained how emotional the experience can be, "When you teach an adult how to fish, they are grateful, but when you teach their kid to fish, they'll never forget."

Those lessons lead to relationships that span through the years of volunteering with the park. He said, "You see these repeat kids every year. Each time, they've grown a little more, and they keep coming back. It's amazing to see that."

It's that love of the outdoors that Waugh wants to foster in the next generation of park goers. When talking about his own involvement with the park and the families that have visited over the years, he is quick to shirk the gravity of his involvement. He quickly said, "There's a lot of people who put in a lot of work into kids' day. Paul [Spurgeon], Brad [Farwell], the Mako Fly Fishing team guys, you can't even name them all. It's not any one of us who makes it happen, because no one could do this

Spurgeon added, "That's the great thing about it, it's the collaboration of everyone who puts in the time to make it happen."

However, even while being humble about his own service to the park, it's clear that the award's gesture has special meaning to Waugh. He said, "I appreciate this. You have no idea how much."

Spurgeon replied, "You've

been doing this so many years,

you deserved it." When asked why he spends so much of his energy helping out at the biannual event, Waugh said, "Let me ask you a question, why not volunteer? These trout parks are meant for families. It's worth it to invest in them."

Waugh added, "It's the next generation of park goers that we've got to teach. If we could get our kids fishing instead of playing on computers, video games and phones, we would have less crime. It'll make a better world, I'm sure of it."

Waugh reminisced about a time when families would make camping an annual tradition. He said, "People used to come to the park, play Scrabble in their cabins and turn off their phones. Now, people want to know what cable package they can get. We're trying to create memories with these families of them spending time together. That's what Kids' Day is all about." A day geared toward teaching children and their parents to have a new found appreciation for the outdoors is one of the ways to keep families going out to the park together, with no technology to distract them.







A convergence of natural

dead fish floating in the water is alarming, Missouri Department of Conservation (MDC) biologists say the lake's health and overall water quality are fine. What people are seeing at some spots on the reservoir is simply the results of several factors that, when combined, can be fatal for fish.

Initial observations of dead fish were made during the week of July 27 in Barry County on the lake's western part. On Friday (Aug. 14), MDC biologists investigated reports of dead fish seen in the Kings River Arm (also in Barry County) and in the Long Creek Arm (Taney County). Gizzard shad and suckers comprised the bulk of the dead fish, but some sportfish species (crappie,

black bass, etc.) were observed, too. MDC staff received a report of dead fish in the James River Arm (Stone County) of Table Rock on Wednesday (Aug. 19). Suckers were the only species reported for this event.

Table Rock fish die-off from natural events

Based on observations and readings that have been taken, depleted oxygen appears to be what caused the fish to die at all sites. In these occurrences, low oxygen levels are the final result of a chain of events that began with recent heavy rains.

"Parts of Table Rock have turned a greenish color in recent weeks in response to a large planktonic algae bloom," MDC Fisheries Biologist Shane Bush said. Bush oversees fishery management at Table Rock Lake. "This is very common when water temperatures warm up following high inflows of water into the reservoir." In Table Rock's case, these high inflows came during heavy rains that occurred in recent

"The water that flows into the lake during flood events is often high in nutrients such as phosphorus and nitrogen, which fuels the growth of algae," Bush said. He explained that when the algae die off, they use up much of the oxygen in the water. High temperatures experienced the past couple of weeks exacerbated the situation because the warmer the water is, the less oxygen it can hold. Put these factors together and it creates spots where it's extremely hard for fish to survive.

Bush says it may take a number of weeks for some spots to cycle through this phase, but added that any additional fish die-off events that occur in future weeks will likely be relegated to smaller sections of the lake.



he, Major Leonard Collins and Wheaton Police Chief Clint Clark at the incident command location all had live ammunition in case there was an event while officers were in training. He said, "We want to make sure safety is our first concern."

Different fire departments and local police forces are involved depending on the school district officers are in. So far this year, Shell Knob, Wheaton and Exeter have all had active shooter training. Epperly said that he expects Southwest to be next. The Barry County Sheriff's Department also participates when the Cassville Police Department has events at their schools.

Epperly said, "We're learning a lot through going through the actual motions on how we

would respond."

He added, "This time, we tried five minute intervals for responding officers to go in. The real life event wouldn't have staging like that. Whatever officer is close is going to have to go in and do their best given what they have."


At the Shell Knob training, officers managed to find all three shooters and all of the victims. Events like this help familiarize officers of the lay out of the schools on a regular basis to make communication easier. Epperly said, "Working with the staff is always helpful, too, because they have intercoms into all of the classrooms and we can get information back to us about what's going on inside."

He continued, "The first 10

to 15 minutes is always chaotic, so having the experience in the building itself is helpful."


Jason Nape, paramedic field supervisor for Cox Health EMS, said that Cox tries to be involved in three or four exercises each year. He said, "For us to be able to participate, it creates a good interaction with the Sheriff's Department. Communication is usually the hardest aspect of situations like this in real life, and this gives us the ability to practice how we would go about any of those issues."







Cassville wins thriller over Aurora

The lights were on Friday night to start the 2015 football season, and they shined especially bright at Wildcat Stadium. Cassville staged a cardiac comeback to claim a critical conference victory over the Aurora Houndawgs in the home opener, 21-20. Senior quarterback Leigh Cox scored three touchdowns and the defense stymied Aurora in the final quarter to key the victory.

The Wildcats had a lot of questions to answer following a mediocre performance at last week's Jamboree, and there was a lot of discussion in the home stands about where Cassville fits in the big picture of the Big 8. Aurora, a team with size and skill, posed a serious threat to the Wildcats' hope for a fast start to the new season.

First quarter lead

The Houns looked sharp on offense with the game's first possession, but a holding penalty ruined a promising drive. The Wildcats managed one first down on their initial set of downs, but punted after six snaps.

The Cassville defense held the Houns to a three-andout, stuffing Caelum Friggle

at the line on third-and-one. Payton Evans punted out of bounds at the Aurora 43yard line to set up the second Wildcat possession.

Cassville scored in just three plays, aided by a facemask penalty. Cox broke free into the secondary, and raced into the end zone to complete a 21-yard scoring romp with 2:41 left in the quarter. River Phelps booted the PAT to give the Wildcats a 7-0 lead.

Beginning at their own 23-yard line after the Cox score, the Houns mounted a long drive that stretched into the second quarter. Evans completed four consecutive passes, three of them to wideout Billy Meredith, as Aurora gained a first down just outside the Cassville 10yard stripe.

Friggle gashed the line for nine yards on first down, and only a big stick by Garrett Knight derailed the big back's bid for the end zone. Then, Evans slipped down for no gain on the following play against the desperate Cassville defense.

On third down, Evans floated a little outlet pass to Meredith in the left flat. Cox smelled out the play, and dumped the receiver for a five-yard loss. Evans threw long and incomplete on fourth down and the Wildcats took over at their own six-yard line with 10:29 left in the half.

Momentum shift

A demoralized Aurora defense surrendered yardage in chunks to a determined Cassville offense. Phelps and Kyle Ruark took turns gashing the line as the Wildcats moved 94 yards in 13 plays. Cox scrambled to avoid a sack, and skated past the pylon and into the end zone from nine yards out to cap an impressive drive. A bad snap doomed the PAT, but the Wildcats held a 13-0 lead with 5:35 on the secondquarter clock.

Diehard fans of both

teams were well aware that Aurora had not defeated Cassville since 2004, when the Houns claimed a 24-21 victory over a good David Large team that would finish with an 8-3 record. Since that game, Cassville has enjoyed a decade-long winning streak in the conference rivalry, posting a combined score advantage of 352-46. Four of those ten games were shutouts and the Houns only scored in double digits once, managing two touchdowns in last year's 36-12 game.

Their backs against the wall, the Houns answered with a vengeance.

The Aurora coaching staff recognized early on that their running attack could not sustain drives against the inspired Cassville defense. The Houns' offense evolved into a game of catch between Evans and his receiving corps on a drive that wore out the Cassville secondary. Evans only misfired on one of his eight attempts as he led Aurora on a 12-play, 80-yard drive to get on the scoreboard. Meredith caught a litle 5-yard flip in the end zone in the final minute of the half, and then Lindi Osmani supplied the PAT to cut the lead to 13-7.

Third quarter domi-

The momentum shift carried over into the third quarter. The Wildcats started on offense, but Cox fumbled on third-and-five and Aurora recovered at the Cassville 45yard line. Evans directed a seven-play scoring drive, and scored on a sneak to tie the game at 13-13 with 6:57 on the third-quarter clock.

In one of the biggest mysteries of the night, Aurora decided to go for two instead of kicking the PAT for the lead. The conversion attempt failed and the score remained tied. It was a decision that would haunt the Houns and first-year head coach Kale Kilgo later on.

A penalty on the ensuing

Ruark punished the defense with three battering ram carries for gains of 8, 9, and 7 yards as the 'Cats drove

to midfield. But Cox had passes batted by the defensive line on consecutive plays, and the second attempt was swatted and then intercepted on a great individual effort by Aurora's big Tyler Moore.

Evans found Meredith open on a wheel route on the very next play for a 34yard advance to the Cassville 9-yard line. Then, Friggle shot through a gap and scored untouched to give Aurora the lead. Osmani's true PAT put the Houns ahead, 20-13, with 3:01 left in the quarter.

Game of inches

The Wildcats fought back, driving into Aurora territory. But Phelps was stopped just short on fourth-and-three, and the Houns took over at their own 30-yard line early in the final quarter.

Just nine minutes shy of ending a decade-long losing streak, Aurora was unable to finish. Faced with a punting situation near midfield, Evto force the Wildcats to honor the play possibility, took the long snap and quickkicked. But the ball clipped one of his own lineman and was downed at the Cassville 48-yard line with 7:34 left in the game.

Cox sprinted off left tackle for a nice gain on first down, but limped off with an injury after the play. Phelps shifted to the quarterback spot and fed Ruark and Knight for gains down to the Aurora 20yard line as the clock became

Trailing 20-13 with just five minutes left in the game, the Wildcats faced a critical fourth-and-three. Out of the wishbone set, Phelps circled left and his desperate plunge through defenders had the officials stretching the chains for a measurement. The result? Phelps had earned a first down by inches with a generous spot. Four plays later, Leigh Cox sneaked into the end zone from the one-yard line to pull the 'Cats within a point at 20-19.

Lance Parnell thought about kicking the tying PAT, then sent the offense back out. Standard protocol in that situation is for a team to

play for a tie at home, go for the win on the road. Flying in the face of convention, Parnell kept his offense on the field and Phelps dove into the end zone out of the wishbone to give Cassville a 21-20 lead at the 3:16 mark of the final

Fighting the defense and the clock, Evans rallied the Houns to midfield on their final possession, but his long bomb intended for Meredith was intercepted by Cassville's Devin Messbarger in the red

The Wildcats ran out the final 1:19 and celebrated the nailbiter victory.

Aurora won the stat battle, and overwhelmingly so in the passing game.

Evans assaulted the Wildcat secondary for 247 yards, while Cox threw for just 16 in the run, run, run Cassville offense. The Aurora backs combined for 111 yards

Cassville's strength was on the ground, where the Wildcats gained 255 yards. Phelps reached the century mark, gaining 100 yards with his 20 carries. Ruark carried 16 times for an additional 82 yards, and Cox had a dozen carries for 66 yards while scoring three times.

Turnovers, penalties, and measurements played a big part in determining the winner of this game, and the twopoint conversion attempts one good, the other... not so much - figured mightily in the outcome.



Multiple changes proposed for 2016-2017 deer season

The Missouri Conservation Commission set season dates and limits for the 2016-2017 fall deer season and gave initial approval to several deer-hunting regulation changes proposed by the Missouri Department of

Conservation (MDC) at the Commission's Aug. 19 meeting in Jefferson City.

Approved changes to fall deer season structure for 2016-2017 include:

• Maintain current timing of the November portion and reduce the length from 11 to nine days.

• Expand the late youth portion to three days beginning the first Friday after Thanksgiving.

• Reduce the length of the antlerless portion from 12 to

three days and begin on the first Friday in December.

• Eliminate the urban

Allow crossbows as a

- Allow the use of crossbows during the fall firearms turkey season.
- Reduce the limit of antlered deer from three to two during the combined archery and firearms deer hunting season, with no more than one antlered deer taken during the firearms deer hunting season.
- Remove the hunting method exemption requirement related to crossbows.

Missouri's rule-making process includes a 30-day public comment period. Comments related to the proposed regulation chang-

es can be submitted online to the Conservation Department from Oct. 2-31 at mdc. mo.gov/node/24141. verbiage of the proposed amendments will be posted on the webpage after Sept.

The Commission will make its final decision on these proposed changes at its December meeting. With final approval, the regulation changes would become effective in March 2016 and implemented for the 2016-2017 deer hunting seasons.

The Department is also working to simplify conservation area deer-hunting regulations by limiting methods and use of firearms and archery antlerless permits. The Department will also continue to gather input from citizens on a variety of deer hunting-related topics, including nonresident permits and prices, through public surveys and its website in early 2016.

When formulating recommendations for these regulation changes, the Conservation Department used deer hunter surveys, landowner surveys, archeryhunter observation surveys, deer population simulations, biological data, harvest summaries, and public input gathered from 22 public open houses held around the state and about 11,800 public comments received at the public meetings and online.

"The goal of the Conservation Department's deer management program is to use science-based wildlife management combined with public input to maintain deer population levels throughout the state that provide quality recreational opportunities while minimizing human-deer conflicts," said MDC Deer Biologist Jason Sumners. "As deer populations in Missouri have changed over the last 75 years, so have our management strategies. In modifying the hunting season structure, our aim is to achieve a deer population that is biologically and socially acceptable while also promoting hunter participation, recruitment and retention."

Missouri offers some of the best deer hunting in the country, and deer hunting is an important part of many Missourians' lives and family traditions. Deer hunting is also an important economic driver in Missouri and gives a \$1 billion annual boost to the state and local econo-

Reasons for regulation changes reducing November portion length

Regarding maintaining the current timing of the November portion and reducing the length to nine days, MDC Deer Biologist Jason Sumners explained that over the last two decades deer hunter numbers and deer harvest opportunities have increased substantially while the deer population has stabilized or been reduced in many parts of Missouri so additional har-



vest opportunities are no longer necessary to meet desired deer population goals.

"The final two days of the November portion of the firearms deer season have traditionally been the two days with the lowest hunter harvest and number of hunting trips," said Sumners. "Reducing the November portion by two days will not result in a dramatic decrease in harvest or hunting opportunities. This one regulatory component, when combined with other changes, will help to stabilize and increase deer populations in some areas."

Expanding late youth

Sumners explained that the current late December or early January timing of the late youth portion has resulted in low participation and low success. Expanding the length to three days and adjusting the timing to the weekend after Thanksgiving should increase participation and success as a result of better deer activity and weather conditions in late November compared to the current timing.

"Hunter recruitment and retention is an important component in maintaining Missouri's hunting heritage and our ability to manage deer populations in the future," Sumners said.

Reducing length of anterless portion

Regarding reducing the length of the antlerless portion to three days and beginning on the first Friday in December, Sumners explained that the deer population in most of Missouri is currently at or below population goals so the additional antlerless-harvest opportunities are no longer necessary to meet desired deer population goals.

"Shortening the antlerless portion is a compromise to maintain some additional hunting opportunities and allow for additional antlerless harvest where necessary," Sumners said. "The increase in the number of deer hunting days over the last two decades as a result of the creation of early and late youth portions, and the expansion of November, antlerless and alternative methods portions has created conflicts between deer hunters and other outdoor users such as small game hunters. Therefore, the reduction is a compromise that is acceptable to most firearms deer hunters and will reduce conflicts that occur between deer hunters and other outdoor users due to the length of the current deer hunting seasons."

Eliminating urban

Sumners explained that eliminating the urban zones portion will simplify the deer season structure and will not jeopardize progress towards effective urban deer management that has occurred in many communities across the state.

"The urban zones portion was implemented as one tool to address issues associated with overabundant urban deer populations," Sumners said. "However, additional firearms hunting opportunities in urban zones do little to manage deer populations where the ability to use firearms is limited. The majority of harvest during the urban zones portion occurs in the most rural areas and does not ensure adequate deer harvest in the locations where urban deer conflicts occur."

Allowing crossbows during archery season

Sumners explained that allowing crossbows as a legal method during the archery deer and turkey season will provide additional opportunities for young hunters and prolong participation for older hunters while not significantly increasing the

"Physical limitations of young hunters delay their entry into archery hunting and physical limitations of older archery hunters result in their declining participation," Sumners said. "Our challenge is to balance contrasting hunter opinions with the desire to provide maximum hunting opportunities while also responsibly managing Missouri's deer population. We have received an increasing number of requests to expand the archery season to include crossbows. We expect that the inclusion of crossbows will increase the harvest during the archery season, but do not expect it to result in a significant increase in total deer harvest."

Allowing crossbows during fall turkey firearms

Sumners explained that allowing the use of crossbows during the fall firearms turkey season would be consistent with method allowances for other firearms hunting seasons and spring turkev season.

"The Department has tended to allow all lesser hunting methods during firearms hunting seasons, so it is natural to allow crossbows during the fall firearms turkey season," Sumners

Reducing antlered deer

Sumners explained that reducing the antlered deer limit stems from an increasing desire of hunters to see more bucks in older age

"We considered a number of regulation changes, including pushing back the opening of the November portion of the firearms season and limiting hunters to one buck during the combined archery and firearms hunting season," Sumners

our archery and firearms hunter surveys showed little support for those changes. Therefore, reducing the limit for antlered deer from three to two during the combined archery and firearms deer hunting season, with no more than one antlered deer taken during the firearms deer hunting season, is supported by many hunters, and a step in the right direction."

Removing hunting method exemption related to crossbows

Sumners explained that allowing crossbows during archery seasons will make the crossbow medical exemption no longer neces-

Simplifying area regula-

Sumners explained that simplifying various conservation area regulations by limiting methods and use of firearms and archery antlerless permits would both increase hunter satisfaction and give area managers the ability to adjust regulations to adapt to current deer population conditions.

"We continue to strive to manage deer numbers at desirable levels while providing diverse deer hunting opportunities for the public," Sumners said. "The current set of deer hunting options on conservation areas can be confusing and do not allow managers to adapt regulations to changing deer populations. As a result, deer hunters on public land generally have lower success rates, perceive lower deer numbers, and tend to rate their hunting experiences lower than hunters on private land."

Tips offered for back-to-school fears

Close to 890,000 Missouri students are in the process of starting a new school year. Once the familiar family routine falls back into place, parents are urged to pay close attention to the mental health needs of their children. "No matter what point on the school-year calendar you are, it is always time to pay attention to your child's mood and outlook," says Angela Bratcher, statewide director of student support services at Great Circle. Great Circle is a statewide not-for-profit agency providing behavioral health services for children and families.

According to a report released this summer, anxiety disorders are the most prevalent psychiatric illnesses in children. If your child has trouble sleeping or concentrating, is irritable, overly tired or restless or even on the opposite side of the spectrum is excessively active, they could be showing signs of anxiety. Talk to your doctor or a mental health professional if you have any con-

Some ways you can help monitor your child's mental well-being:

- Be the person you want your child to be. If you are calm, reassuring, optimistic and supportive, your child will feel confident and competent. Be positive and it is likely your child will follow your cue.
- Parents can have butterflies, too. Children and parents can and will experience separation anxiety. Do not burden your child with your

anxieties. Seek out a trusted family member, friend or professional to deal with your own feelings.

- Spend alone time with each child every day. Each child needs your undivided attention every day. Take 15 or 20 minutes to do something with them - play a game, take a walk after din-
- Be a conversation starter. Don't wait for your child to bring up what's on his/ her mind. Involving them in a conversation gives them some sense of control of their lives and experiences. Never embarrass, discount or demean your child's feelings. Ask what you can do to help. Talk to them about their fears, and listen with empathy.

Reassure. When your child brings up something that worries him/her, ask questions to get to the heart of the issue and offer reassurance. Are they afraid they won't make new friends? Are they concerned about a certain teacher? Is the thought of schoolwork stressing them out? Are they worried about the bully from last year? If your child has something that is bothering them, creating a plan of action and sharing it with your child will help reassure him/her of your support.

Be there. Most important, whether it's the first day of school or the last, make sure your kids know you are there to listen to their feelings and concerns, and that you don't expect perfection, only that they try their best.
