Arkansas man killed in motorcycle crash

An Arkansas man was killed in a motorcycle crash on Monday afternoon near Aurora. According to the Missouri State Highway Patrol crash report, the man died after a car failed to yield and hit the motorcyclist, ejecting the driver.

On Monday, September 11, Nicholas L. Woods, 25, of Aurora, was driving a 1993 Oldsmobile Cutlass northbound on Highway 39 at Highway Z about four miles south of Aurora. Woods failed to yield to a motorcycle heading southbound. Woods struck the 2005 Harley Davidson driven by Rodney P. Campbell, 54, of Berryville, Ark., ejecting the driver.


Campbell was transported to Mercy Hospital of Aurora by emergency medical services. He was pronounced dead by Dr. Kenneth Stangler at 4:20


Woods had no reported injuries at the time of the crash. Woods was wearing a seat belt at the time of the accident. Campbell was not wearing a helmet.

When Dr. Hunter purchased the clinic, it was a preventative crown and bridge practice, and she kept it that way. However, with Dr. Spears taking the helm, he plans to expand services. She said, "I wanted a crown and bridge practice. When I first came here, I had a lot of established patients and was able to do comprehensive dentistry, not just fixing a broken tooth."

She added, "He loves crown and bridge work, and he will also be doing implants and has had experience with braces. He's also very gentle with extractions."

Dr. Spears said that moving to the midwest was a goal because they have family in Bentonville. He is originally from northern California where he also owned his own dental practice. He said, "I was really drawn to this area. I came across Dr. Hunter's practice and had an impromptu meeting with her and from the time we walked in the door and met with Dr. Hunter, we felt good about the practice. Then it was just a matter of logistics."

compared to when she first started. She said, "Looking back, when I started, we didn't have a typewriter in the office; I had to bring my own. We went to the bank to have a copy made. Now, we've got 14 computer work stations. There are digital X-rays and computer-guided implants that make it easier to place it."

Now, Dr. Spears is adding even newer equipment. He said, "We're starting to do some new things; things that are more surgically-oriented that previously we had to refer out to other offices in the community.

"We always have to be improving and changing for the better. Change gets us better services when it's done the right way."

By expanding services,

they hope to improve service and also how quickly things get done and offer immediate results. He said, "We try to get them in and take care of things. We want to get that work done as quickly as possible"

Dr. Hunter said, "It's important to get some things done the same day."

With the office adding services, Dr. Hunter said she is sure her current patients and new patients will be pleased with the office. She said, "We have very similar philosophies and we've really enjoyed working together." Dr. Spears said, "We understand that a lot of folks in the community might have insurance through their employer, but a lot of people don't have insurance, too. We want to be as practical as possible and still deliver what people need, which is a healthy mouth."

Dr. Spears has been married to his wife, Emily, for 18 years. They have five children, Logan, 15, Boston, 14, Sydney 12, Georgia, 7, and Lincoln, 5.

Dr. Spears graduated from the University of the Pacific Dental School in 2004 and has been working in his hometown of Yuba City, Calif., since 2006.



Mustangs post upset over Wildcats

Homecoming. Football. Marching bands. Kings and queens. They were all on display at Wildcat Stadium on Friday night, and a wild celebration continued for quite some time after the game. But it wasn't the Wildcats or their fans who were celebrating.

The McDonald County Mustangs, under first year head coach Kellen Hoover, shocked Cassville with a 21-14 road victory. Three different Mustangs found the end zone, but the Mac defense was the story of the game.

The punt block to set up the tying touchdown earned Best Supporting Actor Award for the McDonald County special teams unit.

Besides the smothering defense, the Mustangs used a ball-control offense to run down the clock and wear out the Cassville defense.

Workhorse tailback Isrrael Desantiago carried 32 times for 137 yards and

a touchdown to pace the McDonald County offense. Desantiago also bailed out quarterback Peyton Barton with a pair of impromptu third-down catches.

Give the Mustangs, their coaches, and their fans the credit they deserve. On this night, they were the better football team.

The Wildcats drove the field with the opening kickoff to take a 6-0 lead. Anthony Tolbert capped the 12-play, 78-yard drive with a 2-yard touchdown blast out of the wishbone to give the Cats a 6-0 lead at the 5:53 mark of the first quarter.

The Mustangs together an 8-play, 74-yard scoring drive to open the second quarter. Desantiago burst into the Cassville secondary for a 27-yard touchdown run, and Dylan Allison's PAT gave Mac a 7-6 lead.

Cassville scored again with a Shannon Haney-to-DJ White 35-yard touchdown pass for a 14-7 lead at half-

time. After that, the Mustangs corralled the Cassville offense. Not only did Cassville not score in the second half, but the Wildcats failed to move the chains even once in that half.

McDonald County's special teams blocked Bowen Preddy's rugby punt to set up the tying touchdown late in the third quarter, and Timber Teague's one-yard scoring plunge at the 6:56 mark of the fourth quarter propelled the Mustangs into the lead.

The Wildcat Nation could only watch in disbelief as the Mustangs ran out the clock on a monumental and historic upset. McDonald County, known as one of the perennial doormats of southwest Missouri football, played more like Webb City while defeating Cassville.

The Wildcats (2-2) now face the long road trip to play at St. James. The Tigers boast a perfect 4-0 record, with lopsided victories over Cuba, Houston, Hermann, and Owensville. Kickoff is set





Mexican Quinoa Salad

This is a quick, make ahead recipe that is tasty, light and healthy. Using quinoa instead of pasta or rice makes it much more carb-friendly than traditional cold salads. This is a great recipe for people who don't think they like quinoa.

Serves: 6 Active time: 20 min. Total time: 45 min.

- 1 cup quinoa, rinsed
- 1 TBS butter
- 2 cups chicken broth or water
- 1 tomato, diced
- can black beans, drained and rinsed
- 1 can corn, drained
- 1 onion, diced
- 1 green bell pepper, chopped
- bunch 1 cilantro, chopped (optional)
- 1 clove garlic, minced
- Juice of 3 limes
- 1/4 cup olive oil
- 1/2 tsp salt
- 1/2 tsp chili powder (or chipotle chili powder for more kick)
 - 1 cup feta cheese crum-

Melt butter in a saucepan over medium heat. Add quinoa and cook 3-4 minutes until quinoa is toasted and brown. Add the broth or water to pan and bring to a boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer, covered, for 15-20 minutes or until all liquid has been absorbed. Prepare other ingredients while this is cooking.

Add all other ingredients into a large bowl and toss to combine and coat with liquid. Cover and place in the refrigerator to marinate.

Once quinoa is finished, fluff it with a fork and cool to room temperature before adding it to the bowl of vegetables and dressing. Toss to combine and serve cold. This also keeps well in the refrigerator for a few days.

*Note: You can vary spices and ingredients to taste. I've also made this with chopped avocado, chicken, black olives,



MU Extension offers healthy tips for children's lunches

You probably go to great lengths during the school year to ensure your child has the right equipment — pens, notebooks, clothing — to make it through the day.

"Proper nutrition is also a key ingredient for school success because it fuels brain cells and gives your child the energy and nutrients he or she needs for optimal learning," says Damaris Karanja, University of Missouri Extension nutrition and health education specialist.

"Packing your child's lunch lets you know exactly what he or she is eating," Karanja says. She offers the following tips to save money while providing your child a nutritious, enjoyable lunch.

Save money

- 1. Invest in a good container. Choose an insulated bag and freezer packs to keep food at a safe temperature.
- 2. Use washable and reusable containers. Avoid using plastic sandwich baggies. Buy containers in a variety of sizes to fit your lunchbox needs.
- 3. Buy in bulk. Avoid single-serve packaging. You save money when you buy food in bulk and pack it yourself into single servings. Buy a large container of yogurt or pudding and use 4-ounce containers to pack your own. Buy a block of cheese and cut it into cubes or shred it. Buy crackers in boxes rather than individual packages.
- 4. Make your own. Look beyond lunchmeat. Slice your own meat, or grill chicken breast and cut it into strips or cubes. Avoid prepackaged lunches since they are high-

- 5. Send in leftovers. Invest in a good insulated food container to keep food warm. Homemade soup is always a good option.
- 6. Buy what is on sale and use coupons. Get whatever is on sale each week and work it into a menu. Use fruits and vegetables that are in season.
- 7. Buy store-brand food and compare unit prices.
- 8. Look high and low. Bargains are usually on the top or bottom shelves, not at eye level
- 9. Plan ahead and have a list when you go to the store. The more time you spend in a store, the more money you spend.

Make it nutritious

- 10. Pack a rainbow! Provide a variety of options the more color, the more nutrients
- 11. A healthy lunch should contain foods from each of the five food groups: carbohydrates, protein, dairy, fruits and vegetables. Choose wholegrain products like bread, tortillas, pita bread, bagels or whole-grain crackers. These have more fiber, vitamins and minerals, and keep blood sugar steady for optimal learning.
- 12. Select protein foods wisely. Use lean meat like chicken or turkey breast, hardboiled eggs, tuna packed in water, beans, or peanut butter. Protein in every meal helps keep blood sugar steady.
 - 13. Buy fruits and veg-

etables that are in season and serve them creatively. Examples include baby carrots with yogurt dip, or other cut vegetables with low-fat dip or hummus.

- 14. Choose low-fat or fat-free dairy products like yogurt, milk and cheese. These are great calcium and protein sources.
- 15. For side items, rethink that bag of chips. Instead, choose carrots sticks, celery sticks with peanut butter and raisins, apple slices with peanut butter, fruit salad, whole fruit, raisins, or pretzels.
- 16. For dessert, think beyond the cookie. Try wholegrain graham crackers, gingersnaps, raisins, unsweetened applesauce, homemade muffins or fresh fruit.
- 17. Choose a beverage that hydrates, like water, or choose low-fat or fat-free milk for additional protein, calcium and vitamin D. Avoid drinks with calories and no nutrients.

Make it fun

- 18. Add some fun touches to the meal. The traditional peanut butter and jelly sandwich can become pretty boring. Get a couple of cookie cutters and have kids cut the sandwich into different shapes.
- 19. Include the kids in the preparation process and give them choices. Take them along when grocery shopping. Let them pick one new fruit or vegetable each week that they would like to try. Let them help pack their lunch.
 - 20. Think beyond bread

when making sandwiches. Think whole-grain bagels, whole-grain pita wraps and whole-wheat tortillas. A good alternative is a whole-wheat pita pocket with hummus, shredded vegetables and grilled chicken strips.

- 21. Pack a variety of options to keep a child's interest. Avoid packing the same lunch every day. This prevents kids from getting bored.
- 22. Vary the preparation. Try grilled or baked, chopped or grated, plain or with a dip.
- 23. Practice good nutrition yourself. Children learn by association; you need to be a role model. Discuss with them the benefits of healthy eating.
- 24. Don't get discouraged if your child rejects a food on first taste. It can take 15-20 tries before a child gets used to a new food.

"A nutritious lunch does not have to be boring or cost you a fortune," Karanja says. "Making small changes can save you money. Try one or two tips each week and soon you should see some relief in your grocery bills. Remember that well-nourished children have a greater chance of success at school because they have the fuel and the energy they need to play and learn."



Train employees, others before livestock disease outbreaks occur

One small breach of protocol can lead to a disease outbreak and financial loss for livestock producers.

An MU Extension team teaches livestock producers throughout Missouri to follow protocols that protect animal and human health, food, and the environment.

The team received USDA Extension Education funding to offer a series of biosecurity workshops in Missouri recently.

Prevention of disease outbreaks saves animal lives and money, says Joe Zulovich, principal investigator on the grant. Training staff and putting protocols in place can prevent or reduce losses.

The first step is to assess risks by reviewing workflow and traffic flow across farm and barn boundaries, says Zulovich.

Biosecurity begins with creation of "clean zones" and "dirty zones," he says.

> Livestock producers

should create clearly defined boundaries inside and outside of the farm to prevent visitors and workers from carrying disease directly into areas where animals

Restricted access to the farm and buildings creates a buffer of protection to animals. Post warning signs at farm entrances and buildings where animals live, Zulovich says. Train employees, service personnel such as delivery drivers, and general visitors to break the chain of contamination. Keep supplies such as soap, sanitizer and plastic boots readily available to visitors.

Workers and approved visitors should wear clean, site-specific booties and clothing to prevent the spread of disease into animal-raising areas. People can carry disease on their boots, clothing, supplies, equipment and other objects. It can be airborne or brought in through animal food and water. Rodents, pests and birds also create risks.

Some systems require workers to shower on-site before entering the clean zone, and again when leaving the clean zone.

Establish barriers that limit access to the farm. Examine the workflow of your farm to consider openings where disease can come in. Restrict feed trucks by placing feed bins close to a perimeter fence, Zulovich says. Arrange for packages to be delivered off-site.

Zulovich says most swine and poultry producers have good systems in place. The challenge is in getting employees to follow the rules. Disease risk increases when employees do not strictly follow protocol at all times.

"Make sure you train your employees," says Teng Lim, co-principal investigator on the USDA grant.

"Details matter." He urges producers to establish a written plan for training and response. Test and audit the plan on a regular basis, he

The materials presented in the workshops can be found at faculty.missouri. edu/limt/Biosecurity.shtml. The webpage includes a short animated video illustrating the biosecurity checklist. The video can be used for quick reminders or in-house training, Lim says.

Producers should be on the lookout for disease presence, especially when other states and countries report disease. Producers should alert the state veterinarian when they see unusual symptoms or unexplained death losses in their herds or flocks, or when there is

any suspicion of foreign animal disease. Contact the state veterinarian immediately when a mass mortality occurs due to disease, Zulovich says.


The state of Missouri requires that all animal mortalities be disposed of within 24 hours. MU Extension serves in an advisory role to the state veterinarian when there is a mass mortality. The MU Extension publication "Composting Dead Swine" (WQ351) is available for download at extension. missouri.edu/p/WQ351. "The Feasibility of Ruminant Composting" is available at agebb.missouri.edu/commag/resources.

When a disease outbreak happens, the most feasible option may be burning or composting dead animals on-farm. Mortality composters are large, heated drums that rotate similarly to a concrete mixer.

In recent years, Missouri poultry producers have faced outbreaks of highly pathogenic avian influenza. Porcine epidemic diarrhea virus and Seneca Valley virus are among the diseases found in Missouri in the last two decades.

Zulovich and Lim recommend that producers review biosecurity protocols before an outbreak occurs. "Plan ahead," Lim says.

Daylilies are a flower that thrive in neglect

Few garden flowers give more and ask for less than daylily. In the quest for a "no maintenance" perennial, daylily is about as close as one can get, said University of Missouri Extension horticulturist David Trinklein. There are some who maintain that daylilies thrive on neglect, he added.

With their ease of care and the myriad flower colors, types and sizes available, it is little wonder why daylily is America's most popular perennial flowering plant, said Trinklein.

Daylily belongs to the genus Hemerocallis, a name derived from the Greek words hemera (day) and kalos (beautiful). It makes reference to the fact that the showy flowers of this plant rarely last for more than 24 hours.

Daylily is thought to be native to China, Japan and Korea. A written record dating back to 2697 B.C. indicates Chinese used it as food and for its perceived medicinal properties. It is mentioned in several 16th-century European herbals under a variety of names no longer used today.

By the late 1800s, many daylily species had found their way into Ameri-

can gardens. But it was the work of plant breeder Arlow B. Stout that started daylily on the path to the popularity it enjoys today. Stout received plants and seeds from China in 1924 and began a program of breeding and improvement.

His work inspired professional and amateur plant breeders to hybridize daylily. Their efforts resulted in an astonishing 83,955 daylily cultivars registered by the American Hemerocallis Society, according to its 2017 database.

Such a multitude of cultivars requires a sizable glossary to describe daylily flowers and distinguish one cultivar from another. Terms such as single, double, spider, circular, flat, informal, triangular, star and recurved are a few of the many terms used to describe flower form. Flower color and/or pattern are described by terms such as self, blend, polychrome, bi-tone, bicolour, watermark and eye zone.

A sun-loving perennial, daylily needs a minimum of six to eight hours of direct sun daily. However, a bit of late afternoon shade does help to preserve flower color and longevity. In shady exposures, the lily produces abundant foliage but very few flowers.

Daylily prefers a medium-heavy garden loam, although it can tolerate a wide array of soil textures. Soil of any texture can be improved by incorporating liberal amounts of organic matter in the form of well-rotted manure, compost or peat moss before planting, according to Trinklein.

Fertilizer should be applied sparingly; too much nitrogen can be detrimental. "If daylilies produce lush, abundant foliage but few flowers, they probably are receiving too much fertilizer," Trinklein added. Daylilies growing in fairly rich soils need little if any additional fertilizer.

Although daylily is fairly drought-tolerant, adequate water increases flower number and size.

Water is important in the spring when the plants form scapes and set buds and later when plants are in bloom

Daylily faces attack by a variety of pests and diseases, but most do only minor damage. Aphids, thrips and spider mites are the most common insect pests. Crown and root rot, leaf streak and daylily rust are diseases that can be problematic.

Like most clump-forming perennials, daylilies need periodic division for best garden performance. The frequency of division depends largely on cultivar and growing conditions.

Cultivars known for their reblooming tendency such as Stella de Oro should be divided relatively frequently. This helps to force new growth throughout the growing season, which is the primary factor that causes a daylily to rebloom. Daylilies can be divided or planted any time the ground is not frozen. However, late August through September is considered the most ideal time, Trinklein said.

Patrol's Troop D releases Labor Day stats

Captain Juan Villanueva, commanding officer of Troop D, Springfield, announces the 2017 Labor Day weekend traffic crash and enforcement totals for the Troop D area, which consists of the 18 southwest counties of Missouri. During the holiday weekend, troopers participated in Operation C.A.R.E. (Crash Awareness Reduction Effort). In addition, troopers took part in a holiday traffic crash reduction enforcement operation on Interstate 44 on Friday, September 1, 2017, and Monday, September 4, 2017.

During the 2017 Labor Day weekend traffic crash counting period, which began at 6 p.m., Friday, September 1, and ended at 11:59 p.m., Monday, September 4, Troop D officers investigated 62 traffic crashes resulting in 21 injuries and no fatalities. Preliminary enforcement totals show troopers made 23 arrests for driving while intoxicated and six arrests for boating while intoxicated. There were no boating crashes or drownings in the Troop D area during the holiday weekend.

Purdy Fire receives MDC grant
